Fluorescent Scare Is A Myth

"Use care and avoid scare reports" was the advice today of Chetser Guthrie in the Stratford office of the Southwestern Public Service Company, in reply to the flood of scare stories now sweeping the nation about the use and disposal of fluores-

Fluorescent lamps are not killers or maimers sensation seekers to the contrary, but are as harmless as any other form of illumination if handled properly, Guthrie said.

The first false report on fluorescent lamps is the one that implies that they are dangerous when intact, Guthrie added. A three year study by the Medical Advisory Committee on Beryllium has placed a "false" tag on this rumor. The beryllium group studied this matter as Beryllium is contained in the inner coating of fluorescent lamps.
