Civil Service Offers Clerk Examinations

A new Clerk examination was announced by the United States Civil Service Commission for filling positions at \$2284 and \$2498 a year (grades CAF-2 and 3.) in various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and vicinity.

The Commission held a similar Clerk examination last March but not enough eligibles were secured as a result of that examination to fill, on a permanent basis, the Clerk jobs now occupied by war service and temporary employees, and to fill future vacancies that will occur through turnover.

Among the types of clerk positions to be filled from this examination are: Appointment, correspondence, docket, accounting, time, leave, pay-roll, statistical, coding, test rating, property and supply, mail, file, information, proofreading, editorial, indexing, purchasing, traffic, transporta-

tion rate, etc.
No previous training or experience in clerical work is required. To qualify, applicants will be required to pass a written test which will consist of questions designed to test their aptitude for learning and adjusting to the duties of the positions. A higher standard will be required for eligibility for grade CAF-3 than for CAF-2.
Applications must be received in the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, 25, D. C., not later than September 6, 1949.

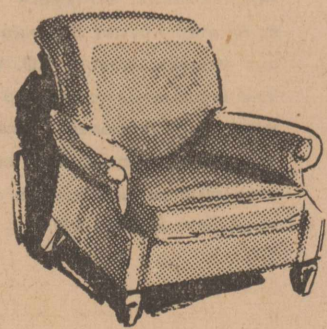
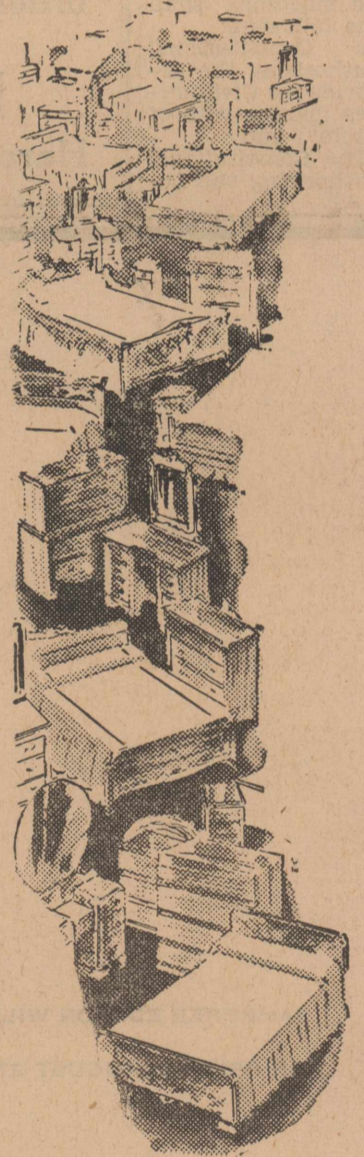

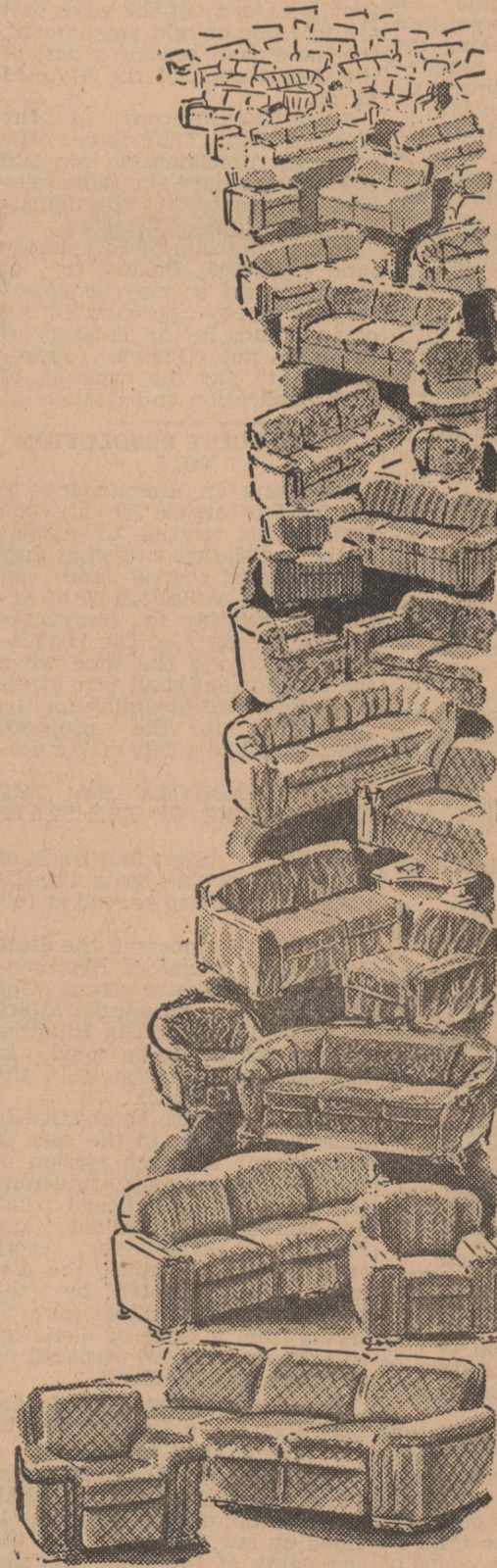

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36

Proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, and at said election the ballot shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling

said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is, hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts," and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county set prepared by the State Comptroller."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held, and until otherwise provided by law the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session.

Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4/5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Sec. 3. The Amendments pro-

posed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relatives to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the

creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof" and

"Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Le-

gislation to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

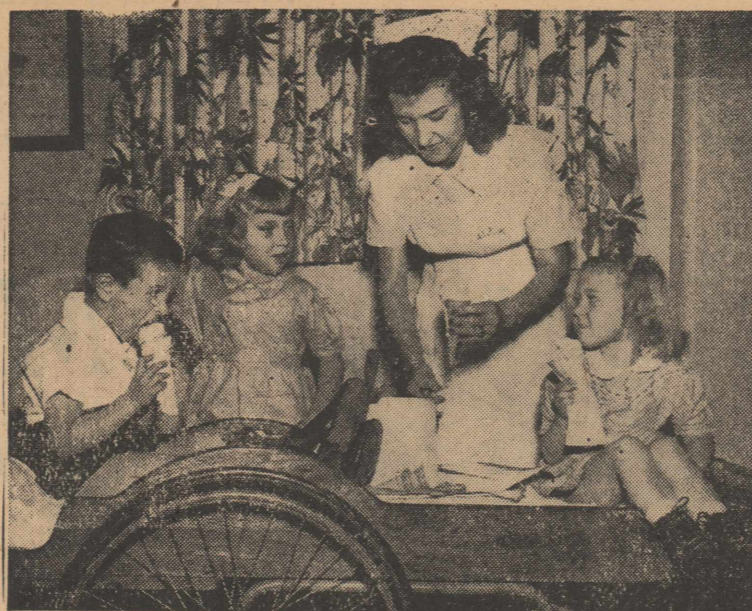

Engineers See Possibility Getting Heat from Ground

MILWAUKEE.—The day when homes will be warmed by heat from the ground is drawing closer, 250 Wisconsin refrigeration engineers have been told. Experiments are being made to tap ground heat by a system of pipes. The equipment is based on the same principle as the electric refrigerator, C. H. Randolph, air conditioning engineer of the Wisconsin electric power company, told delegates to the annual convention of the Wisconsin refrigera-

tion service engineers' society at the Wisconsin hotel. Under this system, several pipes are sunk into the ground to a depth of from 10 to 20 feet. Then freon, a gas used in refrigerators, is pumped through the pipes, picking up the ground heat and transferring it to the house.

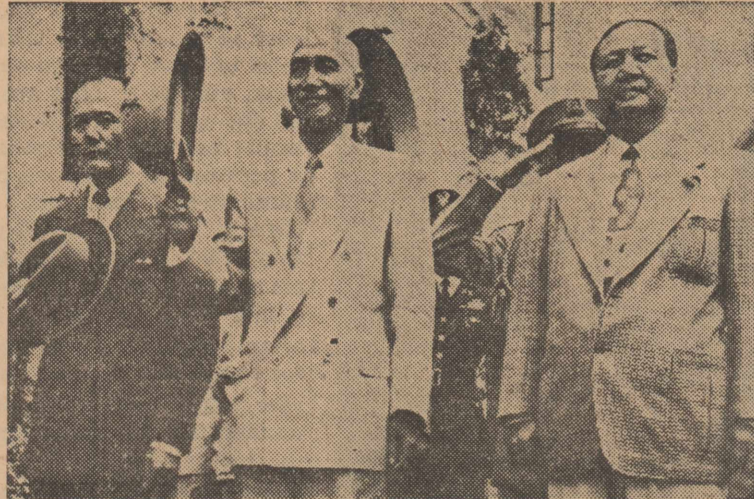

Singing, Shining

Lesson for August 21, 1949

EVERY ATOM of the universe, said Calvin, sparkles with the glory of God. That is our thought for this week: In the created universe we can see the God who is more wonderful than all his works. The selected Psalms express four different aspects of God's creative power. Psalm 8 brings out the dignity and the glory of man, made to be master of the earth; Psalm 19:1-6 listens to the majestic music of sun and stars; Psalm 65:9-13 sees nature as a farmer sees it, in terms of sun, rain and crops; Psalm 104, one of the noblest poems in existence, celebrates God's glory in all things great and small.

Mystery
THESE inspired Psalmists saw a high truth: Nature is for man's use, in part, but it has also a value, a beauty and a splendor all its own; and it is one of the ways by which we can know God. What is true of nature is true, far more, of the God who created all things. One of the thoughts suggested to their minds was the mystery of nature. Even today, with all that science has discovered, there is mystery in the most elemental facts of existence. What is light? What is life? What is energy? Where did it come from and what is the destiny of it all? A common grass blade performs miracles that chemistry has not yet initiated. The mystery of nature suggests the deeper mystery of nature's God.

Power
WE ARE beginning now to realize, even better than the Psalmists could, how much energy there is in nature. We have seen tragic evidence of the atom's power. Now we have also found that while energy cannot be destroyed, it cannot be created by us, though it constantly changes form. As the water in a power station which has run through a turbine will not climb back up to turn the turbine again, so the whole universe (they tell us) is in the process of running down. But how was the universe born, how was energy born, in the first place? How was the universe, so to speak, wound up? Science does not profess to know; but religious answers by faith: In the beginning, God...

Beauty
THE writer of Psalm 104 was well aware that some parts of nature are useless to man; but he rejoiced in them none the less. Few of his neighbors had any use for whales, for example, but he takes delight in the whale (he calls him Leviathan) just playing in the ocean. St. Augustine, in the same mood, says somewhere about things like wasps and spiders that if we could forget that they bite, we would be greatly awed by their beauty and the perfection of their mechanism. Indeed, St. Augustine, in one of his prayers, calls God "Pulchritudo." Beauty. Just as God is The Truth and The Good, so he is The Beautiful.

Law
THE writers of these nature-Psalms (especially 19 and 65) were impressed by another fact about nature: its regularity. You can count on the sunrise, you always know which order the seasons will follow. Even things like earthquakes and tornadoes, which seem pretty unpredictable, follow laws of their own. Science has now shown this to be true on a cosmic scale. The stuff of which the farthest stars are made is just the same (only a lot hotter!) as the stuff in the rocks under your feet at this minute.

The laws that govern the fall of a leaf or the shape of a rain-drop are the same laws that can be seen in the whirling of star-dust fifty million light years away. The Creator of all is not erratic, eccentric or capricious. He is the God of Law, for from his infinite Mind come all the patterns, known to us or yet unknown, by which the vast fabric of the universe is woven. Mystery, Power, Beauty, Law: All nature, not only the stars, shine with all these—and as Addison says, "Forever singing as they shine, The hand that made us is divine."

Frosting Cakes

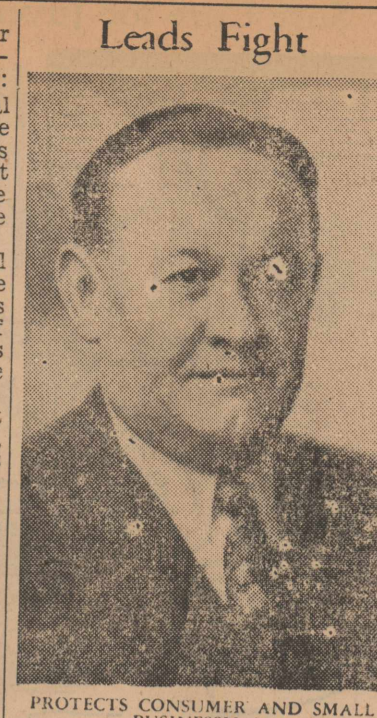

Fishermen Soviets in Need MOSCOW.—The newspaper Evening Moscow wants Moscow public opinion to mobilize in support of improvement of conditions for Moscow fishermen. The newspaper reported that Moscow's fishermen are no sissies. All they need is shelter in rainy weather, boats, bait and a glass of hot tea. Thousands of Muscovites are addicts of Izaak Walton and the Moscow region abound in good fishing spots. Evening Moscow said many places do not provide live bait and even ordinary worms are unobtainable frequently. Boats also are nonexistent at some fishing spots and on popular Senezhsky lake last summer only 50 boats were provided, with another 50 tied up on shore too leaky to put in the water. The newspaper proposed that ponds in Moscow's Izmailova park be opened to fishing and that a special direct bus service from Moscow to the fishing spots be established.

Democratic Mascot, Replacing Old One, Bears Name 'Francis' JEFFERSON CITY, MO.—Francis got a Democratic sendoff. Francis is the new Democratic party mascot, stepping into the horseshoes of Marilla, the donkey which served the party faithfully for years before her recent demise. Francis left for Washington after a farewell appearance with Gov. Forrest Smith, a man who knows good mules and good Democrats when he sees them.

Smith said he was certain Francis was a good Democrat, all right, and that the party's fortunes would be in good hands with her as the mascot. She was born and bred a Democrat, Ed Frazier, Drexel, Mo., told Smith. The mule was purchased by Democrats here for \$225 to become the party national mascot. Frazier said he knew President Truman well. He figured he was doing him, and the party, a good turn by selling Francis into the Democratic service. 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Whale Flesh Ruled Not Meat When Made into Sausages BRIGHTON, ENGLAND.—A British court ruled that whale meat isn't—at least not for sausage-making purposes. The judge fined Osborne Stores company 5 pounds (\$20) because its meat sausage had only 26 per cent meat instead of the 30 per cent required by the ministry of food. Whale meat used to make up the rest of the required percentage is not mentioned in the food ministry's definition of meat, the court noted. Osborne Stores said the sausages had been very popular.

HEALTH PROGRESS Newest Drug Fights Fever

LOUISVILLE, KY.—The army believes chloromyetin will make the country much safer against typhoid in wartime. This was indicated by Col. William Spencer Stone, Washington, chief of army medical research, who came here to discuss communicable-disease control in a lecture sponsored by Alpha Omega Alpha, medical fraternity of the University of Louisville school of medicine. Colonel Stone was graduated at the U. of L. medical school in 1929.

Colonel Stone pointed out that enteric diseases—those transmitted by food or water—are being given special attention by army researchers. The diseases have low incidence now, he said, but if safeguards such as water and milk controls were lifted, the number of cases would skyrocket because the population has developed little immunity.

In a similar situation, a breakdown of water sanitation caused 5,000 cases of typhoid in Berlin after World War II.

Drug Fights Typhoid Chloromyetin would play a big role in case of a similar threat to the health of the people in the U. S. Should water protection fail, the drug could hold the fort against typhoid until proper purification safeguards could be set up again. Chloromyetin is rapidly being developed to the point where it can conquer these diseases in two days: Typhoid, typhus, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, undulant fever, and others.

It is an antibiotic which means it prevents reproduction of germs instead of killing them. It is the purified extract of a fungus found in a soil in Venezuela.

Scientists under Colonel Stone's medical research and development board discovered potentialities of using the drug against typhoid and some other diseases.

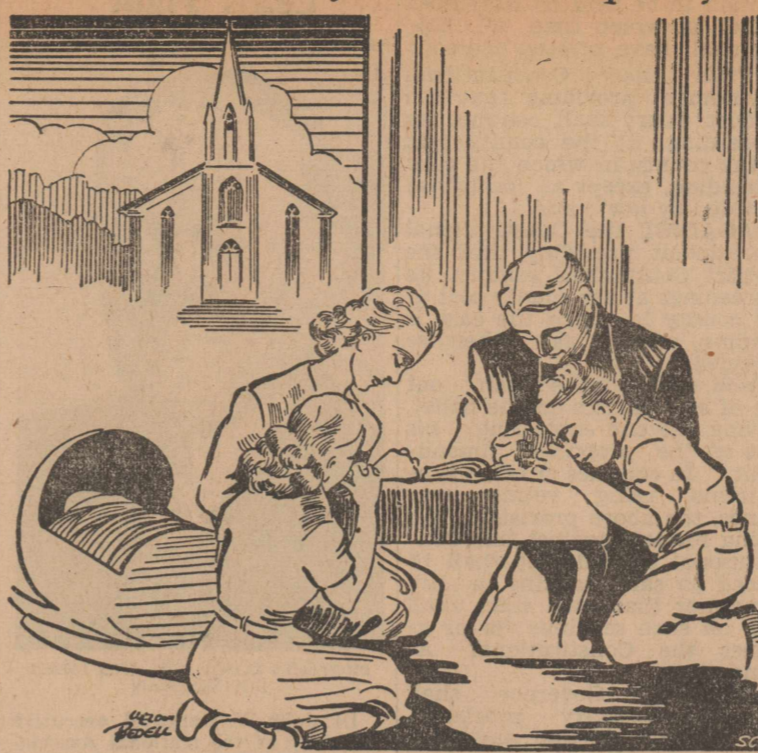

Many a good shot who knows his ducks one from another as far as he can see them in flight, never troubles to distinguish between the helpful and the harmful hawks. At the sight of a "hawk" he bangs away and nine times out of ten it's a beneficial mouse hawk he kills and leaves hanging on a fence.

Donald Culross Peattie, this country's best known nature writer, reports that he has never yet seen a Cooper's hawk or a goshawk punished for its depredations. And these are your poultry and game bird killers.

It's true that sometimes individual birds among the beneficial kinds of hawks will acquire an appetite for poultry. Such antisocial individuals can be dealt with when they start killing birds. But the man—farmer or sportsman—who shoots every marshawk and red-tail is destroying birds that make rats and mice 22 and 55 per cent, respectively, of their diet. So it is of economic importance to the country at large to learn to distinguish the hawks.

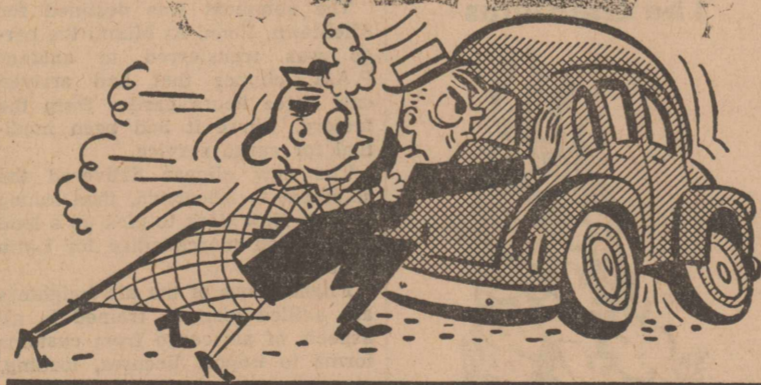

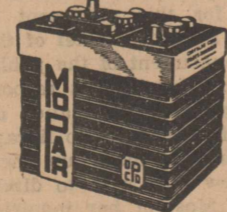

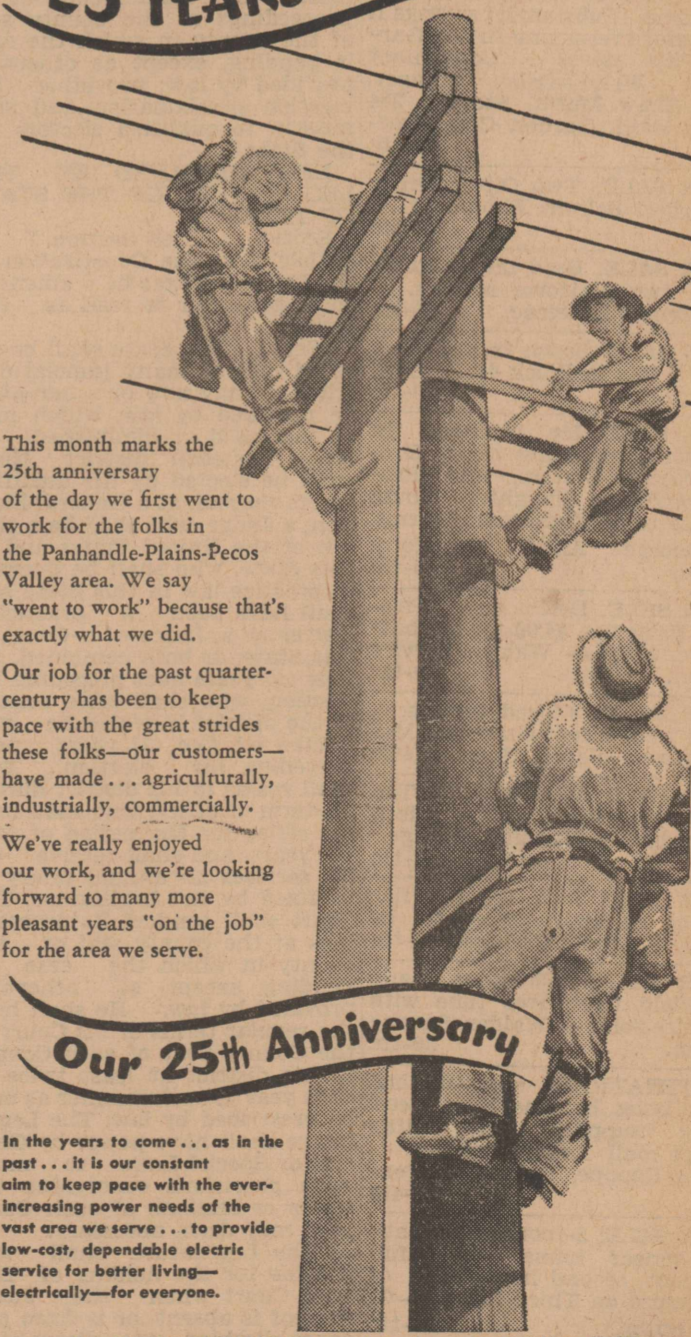

FIVE PERCENTERS MOST EVERYTHING that happens in Washington during these long summer dog days can be viewed through the jaundiced eye of politics... of what it will mean in votes next year. Latest sensation is the so-called "five percent scandal." There are those who want to blow up this five percent deal into another Teapot Dome on the eve of the 1950 elections. They want another congressional investigation to be dragged out as long as possible.

Insofar as this reporter can judge, there is nothing here that can be blown into the category of a scandal. There are scores of people who have had government jobs, who know their way around Washington in the huge and vast ramifications of this government, who are making a living telling others who come here, wanting to sell to the government, how to go about it. Of course there may be some grafters who may attempt to trade on the fact they know "HARRY." But these are few and will be weeded out anyway, for it is the "know-how" rather than "influence" which will keep these people in business.

Here is how it works. Take a big business on the scale of U.S. Steel or International Harvester or Edison Electric. This business would have a large office with a highly paid staff with an unlimited expense account to look after its government contract work here in Washington.

But a small business from St. Louis, for instance, thinks it has something the government should buy, whether it's an office desk or a new gadget. So this firm sends a representative to Washington to sell the government. He may be an able man, but he's here two weeks or a month before he establishes the proper connection, only to find out the government isn't interested or that he should have gone to San Francisco, or St. Louis or Chicago where the contract for that commodity is let.

And Washington is full of them. Lawyers who have had experience in Government practicing before the various governmental agencies; business men who have had experience in government; career men who have grown tired of government service setting up their own shop, even newsmen who have run "beats" in Washington for many years have gone into the business of "Washington representative."

But it is legitimate business and we don't believe the few grafters who attempt to trade on "influence" can blow it up into a pre-election scandal, even though some anti-administration congressmen want to try it.

Power Lobby Right now, as this is written, the private power lobby is sitting pretty, having won a signal victory over the public power cooperatives in slashing appropriations for transmission lines, particularly for the southwest power administration expansion in Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri. These projects were backed by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, which claims to represent 10 million farm people in 42 states.

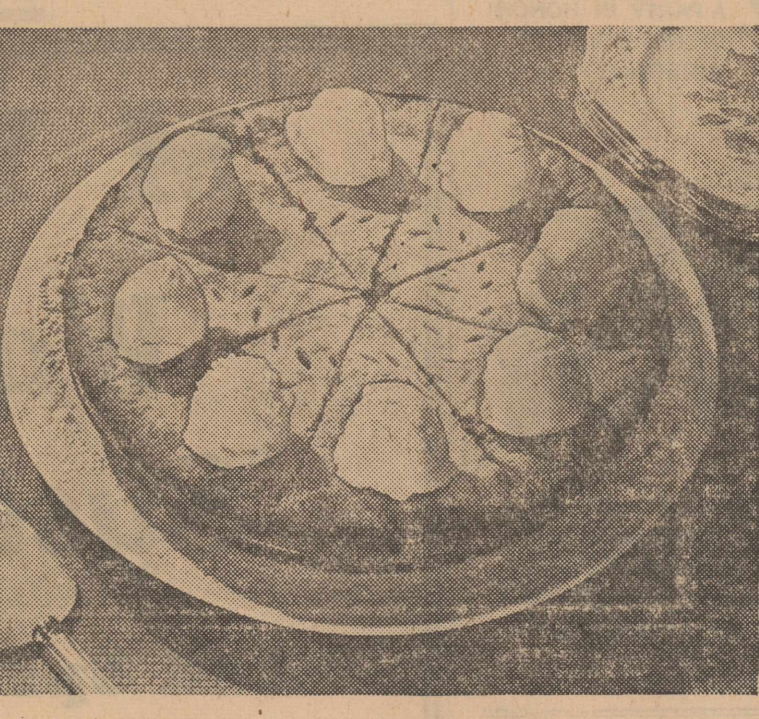
The private power lobby lost its initial fight when the house voted some \$20,000,000 for these projects. The lobby won in the senate when the senate appropriations committee not only slashed the money from the appropriations, but ordered the Southwestern Power Administration to sign contracts with the private power companies in these areas for transmission to consumers.

It may be in the closing days of this session before the battle is over, because the fight is scheduled to come on the senate floor with the public power advocates seeking to put the money back into the interior department appropriations.

Melt-in-Your-Mouth Pies Need Know-How (See Recipes Below)

Pastry Perfection ARE YOUR PIES wonderful to look at? Do they have a meltingly tender crust? Is the filling a delightful surprise instead of a disappointment? Unless you can answer a resounding "yes" to each of those three questions, better take a good look at tips given in this column. They'll help you reach pastry making perfection if you put the hints into practice.

Pie is a dessert to have at any luncheon or dinner, whether light or heavy. It might be a rich apple pie, topped with scoops of ice cream if the meal itself has been shy on calories.

Pies may be baked or chilled. Their crust may be pastry or crumb. Their fillings may be fruit, berries, juice or eggs or combinations of these, so you see how much variety pie can give your meals.

If you have some especially bright and lovely berries or fruit, don't hide them under a top crust. Place a lattice crust or crumb topping or a lacy fluting of whipped cream on the pie, and let everyone enjoy the handsome looks of the pie.

HERE'S a foolproof recipe for a single pastry shell. If you want a double crust, make twice the recipe:

Pastry Shell (Makes 1 8 or 9-inch) 1 cup sifted flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 5 tablespoons lard or shortening 2 tablespoons ice cold water

Sift together flour and salt. Cut in lard with two knives or a pastry blender. (Avoid using fingers, since they're warm and will melt the fat.) Sprinkle water in, while stirring with a fork. Press dough into a ball, then roll lightly on a pastry cloth or board. Fold over and fit pie plate. Trim edge, fold under and flute. For a baked pastry shell, prick bottom and sides with a fork. Bake in a hot (450°) oven 10 to 12 minutes or until golden brown. If the shell is to be baked with the filling, bake according to directions in recipe.

IF PEACHES are on your mind here's a peaches and cream pie that is really delectable: Southern Peach Cream Pie (Makes 1 9-inch pie) 1 unbaked pastry shell 6 peach halves, fresh or canned 1/2 cup sugar 1 tablespoon flour 1/2 teaspoon almond extract 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup rich milk 2 egg yolks, beaten 1 tablespoon melted butter 2 egg whites, beaten Arrange peaches, cut side down in pastry shell. Mix sugar, flour and salt. Combine dry ingredients with milk, almond extract, egg yolks and butter. Fold in egg

whites. Bake in a hot (450°) oven for 10 minutes, reduce heat to moderate (350°) and bake 30 minutes longer.

HERE'S a delightful variation of apple pie with its crumbly, nut topping that's so delicious. This, like a regular apple pie, may be served with scoops of ice cream, if desired: Crumbly Apple Pie (Makes 1 9-inch pie) 6 large tart apples 1/2 cup sugar 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon 1/2 cup flour 1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup pecan halves 1 unbaked pastry shell Pare apples and cut into eighths and arrange in pastry shell. Sprinkle with one-half cup sugar mixed with the cinnamon. Sift remaining one-half cup sugar with flour and cut in butter. Work mixture until crumbly and sprinkle over apples. Dot with pecan halves. Bake in a hot (450°) oven for 10 minutes, then reduce heat to moderate (350°) and bake for 40 minutes longer until apples are tender.

Leftover biscuits, split in half and covered with cheese and bacon, then broiled make a nice open-faced sandwich for soups or salads.

Leftover cocoa may be combined with coffee and served chilled with a whipped cream topping for a delicious beverage. Combine several different kinds of leftover fruit juices for cooling first course beverages: pineapple and strawberry juice; grape, lemon and pineapple juice; raspberry and pineapple juice.

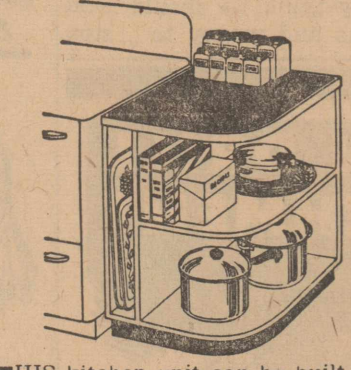

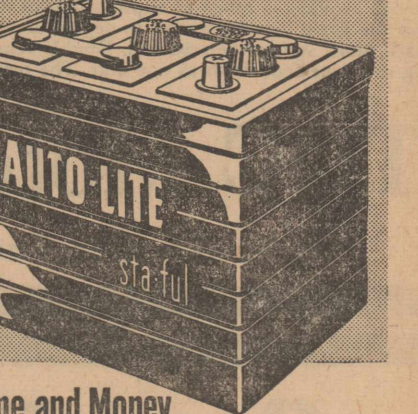

what is taking place in China. I repeat what I said in previous letters, that not all the armies and munitions and wealth of America can stop what is taking place in China. Most of the Chinese who are turning to Communism are not Communists. They know no other direction in which to turn. Why should we in America help to force upon China a regime the people as a whole so clearly repudiate?

Under the regime now gaining control, the work of the Church will probably be hindered at some points. Even now schools are closely regulated by the government. Present rules may be changed and maybe there will be less freedom than the slight amount we now have. The whole educational system in China needs drastic revision. Much could be done to improve it.

In some places new officials have established rules concerning the support and work of pastors and Bible women. There seems to be no uniform pattern for such regulations.

A new regime will almost certainly bring difficult problems. But we have a conviction that to the extent to which the Church is ministering to the people with a spirit of sacrificial service, that work will be permitted to continue. And that same spirit of sacrificial love will be able to find new avenues for service where all doors are closed. Our Christian faith affirms God has not become discouraged with all the changes that have taken place in human society. You in the Homeland, and we, your partners in this part of the world, are trying to work with Him. Let us not be discouraged and down-hearted. Let us rejoice, rather, that we live in this day and are called to play a part in building God's Kingdom here. Don't give up hope

for China. China is not lost to the forces of evil. The work of the Church is not and has not been in vain. If our motives and purposes are true, we need not be afraid when present methods are questioned and changes are necessary. Let us meet whatever difficulties arise with a sense of challenge, not of fear; with confidence in the God we serve, rather than a sense of defeat.

Illinois Governor Vetoes Bill Banning Roving Cats

SPRINGFIELD, ILL.—Gov. Adlai Stevenson has vetoed a bill to curb delinquency of cats.

The state of Illinois, he said, has "enough to do without trying to control feline delinquency."

The bill would have permitted any person to capture cats running at large anywhere in the state and turn them over to police. Owners would get their pets back by paying a \$1 fine.

Stevenson steered a neutral course between cat fanciers and bird lovers in explaining the veto. "The problem of cat versus bird is as old as time," the governor said. He vetoed the bill "not because I love birds the less or cats the more."

He warned that such a law might become a dangerous precedent. "Who knows but what we may be called upon to take sides as well in the age old problem of dog versus bird, bird versus bird, or even bird versus worm?" Stevenson asked.

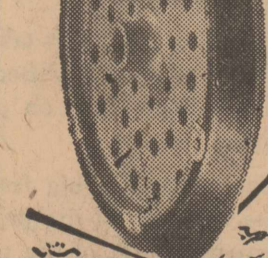

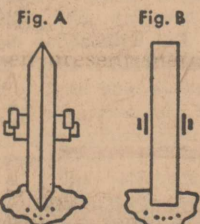

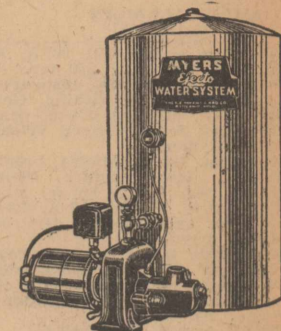
