NSLI Dividend Blanks Are Available

Distribution of application forms for the National Service Life Insurance special dividend to be paid to veterans who carried their GT insurance for three months or more prior to January 1, 1948, started Monday.

Applications may be secured from post offices, Veterans' service organizations, American Red Cross, and the Lubbock Regional office of the Veterans Administration.

The simplified application blanks are in the form of a three-fold card; the veteran will retain one third of the card, which contains the instructions, and after filling in his full name, service number, C-number if any, and insurance number or numbers if available, and address, he will place a one-cent stamp on the remaining two-fold card and mail to Veterans Administration, Washington, D. C.

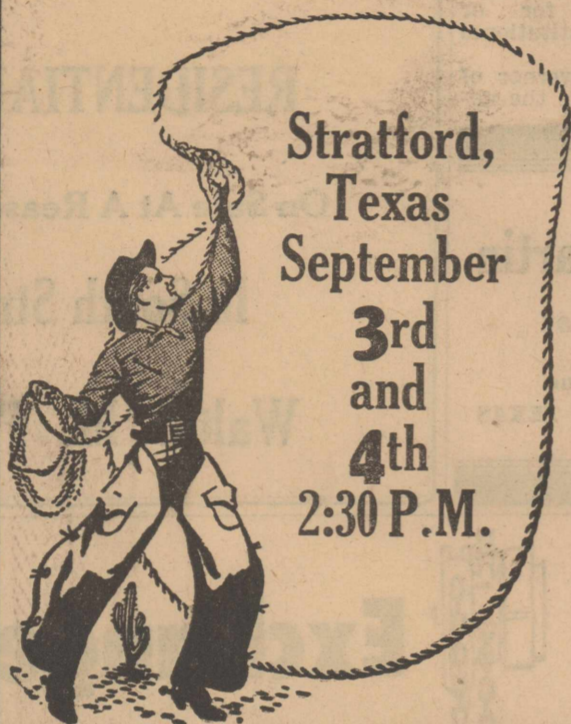

SEEKS PERFECTION

Wright Plans New Theater

HARTFORD, CONN.—A theatre where every gesture and tone of voice of the actors on stage can be seen or heard by every member of the audience. . . . A theatre where there are no "bad" seats. . . . A theatre, which in the opinion of its designer, Frank Lloyd Wright, will be so restful that it will be a pleasure just to sit in it.

This is the theatre, that if all goes well, will be built here in Hartford, a city that has made enough money from its insurance and arms manufacturing businesses to afford such community enterprises. At a Hartford club luncheon this week, Wright told leading townspeople and visiting theatrical lights what the proposed building would do for them and for culture

in general.

Gray But Sprightly

The Wisconsin born architect, gray but still sprightly at 79, declared that the legitimate theatre, unless it mended its ways, was not long for this world. But with playhouses such as the one proposed for Hartford scattered about the country, he went on, the stage would be given the intimacy and excitement that it now so sorely needs.

"We want to have the kind of a theatre that can belong to a community, not simply be imposed on it," he declared.

The Hartford venture, to be called the New theatre, has been commissioned by Paton Price, director for the last two years of the Canton summer theatre near Hartford, and two associates. Price plans to organize a professional resident company for the new playhouse, offering both winter and summer seasons.

As illustrated by a scale model Wright brought with him from Texas, the proposed theater will be

built on simple functional lines. The eight-sided main auditorium will seat the audience on a gradual downward slope, with the slightly raised stage at the bottom. There will be no balcony and no posts. The stage itself will be circular, with the inner portion revolving for quick scene changes.

Viewers Enthused

Theatrical people who viewed the model were enthusiastic. Cornelia Otis Skinner, declaring that the road had been dying partly because of a lack of suitable theatres, said, "All of us are going to be keen to play in the new theatre here."

Two possible obstacles were seen by some theatre spokesmen, however. The circular stage would make different type of sets necessary, a drawback for touring companies. And the proposed seating capacity, which Wright wants to hold to about 750 to insure the "intimacy" of atmosphere he is striving for, might not be enough to attract top flight road shows.

Wright contended, however, that the smaller seating capacity—about 500 less than most Broadway playhouses—would be compensated for by simpler scenery arrangements which would require less expensive equipment and personnel.

Elderly Miner Rescued After 10 Hours in Shaft

SHAMOKIN, PA.—A 62-year-old miner was rescued after he had been trapped for almost 10 hours by a cave-in at the bottom of a 20 foot anthracite mine shaft.

Efforts of the rescue workers were rewarded after a day-long series of trials as new coal falls threatened to take the life of Alexander Pochekilo before they could clear away the first coal slide.

The man was buried upright by a slide of coal and dirt while he and his son, Joseph, 22, worked in their independent mine at near-by Sagon. Joseph, trapped to his waist, was freed within an hour. Chinks in the coal allowed air to reach the father. To prevent further slides, the rescuers built a fence of timbers around him. Then, scooping the dirt in a five-gallon bucket and pulling it to the surface with a winch, they freed him. He was brought up with a rope.

Expert Says Man Must Turn More to Ocean for His Food

AUCKLAND, N. Z.—Man must turn more to the ocean for food to survive, Dr. J. L. Kask of the United Nations food and agriculture organization told the Pacific Science Congress.

"The ocean is man's next frontier—it may be his last," the speaker told the congress, holding its first session here since the war.

He said that the Pacific Ocean, which covers more than one-third of the world's surface supplies less than half the world's fish supplies.

There was sufficient evidence of untouched stocks of fish to warrant the United States government in appropriating a million dollars this year to investigate the fisheries of the Central Pacific, Dr. Kask said.

Most fishing has been done in relatively shallow waters, the speaker explained. Echo sounders found huge schools of edible fish at considerable depths. He urged wise exploitation of fishery resources and elimination of wasteful, cutthroat competition.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32

Proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 1 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D., 1949, at which election all ballot shall be printed thereon.

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases." Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the ne-

cessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

First Trans-America Railroad Marks 80th Anniversary in 1949

OGDEN, UTAH.—The governor of California swung a silver mallet at a golden spike—and missed. But few people knew that and no one really cared.

That swing, just 80 years ago, marked completion of America's first transcontinental railroad.

There was literal dancing in the streets over the country that day.

The driving of the golden spike at Promontory, Utah, was one of those great historical events that capture the imagination and hold it through succeeding generations.

The locomotives met at the point where rails from the Missouri River met those from the Pacific Ocean after one of the most epic building races of all time.

Any event 80 years ago is apt to become a bit distorted as fact mingles with legend. In the case of the golden spike ceremony, it seems that some of the facts have been

dropped by the wayside and it is the legend which persists.

Actually, railroad historians and the reminiscences of persons who witnessed the event are pretty well agreed that:

(1)—Gov. Leland Stanford of California, president of the Central Pacific Railroad and the man who usually gets credit for "driving" the last spike, swung the ceremonial mallet and missed.

(2)—The man who followed him was too polite to do better than his predecessor, so he too missed. (He was Dr. Thomas C. Durant, vice president of the Union Pacific Railroad).

(3)—The spike probably couldn't have been driven, anyway. It was made from 23 \$20 gold pieces and was much too soft for such treatment. Instead, it was gently tapped by many persons into a hole which had been drilled to receive it.

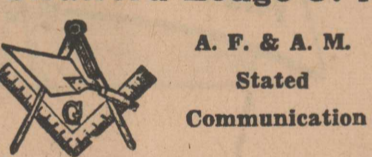

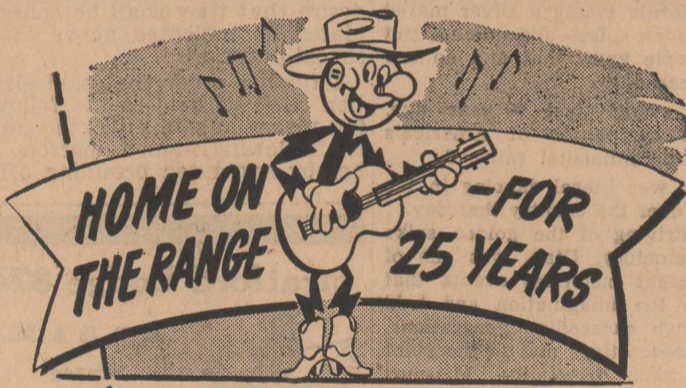

STRIFE SLOWS

India Nears Gandhi Goal

NEW DELHI.—Mohandas K. Gandhi, a kindly little man of peace, has attained in violent death goals he missed with his preaching of love.

He was slain more than a year ago.

His India and Pakistan are learning to dwell as peaceful neighbors. The fanatical religious warring between Hindu and Moslem in the two dominions has largely subsided. And India, as he desired, is

building patiently as a democratic secular state instead of the rightist religious government his assassins wanted.

People Want Justice

What Gandhi would have said about any effort to punish his slayers will be debated in India for a long time. But the people have raised no question that justice should take its course.

Bloody rioting between the Hindu and Moslem populations of India and Pakistan had become commonplace when Gandhi was shot down. He was walking to his prayer meeting place here to continue his crusade for communal peace, when three shots were fired into his body.

The crime occurred as India faced critical times and issues.

There was talk of war between the two new dominions, created when British crown rule of India ended and the country was divided in August, 1947. Refugees crammed the cities, calling for the blood of people of the opposite religion. Hindus had fled Pakistan, and Moslems from India—12 million of them.

Economy Shaken

The economy was shaken on both sides of the border.

Not all of the headway in the past months came about as Gandhi would have done it. There was more rioting, but it ebbed steadily. The police and military crushed it with their guns, bayonets and clubs.

Organizations preaching religious hatred were outlawed and harried out of existence.

Under leadership of two staunch friends, Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru and Governor-General C. Rajagopalachari, India has come far to give Gandhi in death a peaceful land.

A cease-fire agreement arranged with United Nations assistance, stopped the fighting of Indian and Pakistan troops in the neighboring state of Kashmir. In conference, leaders of the two countries agreed to strive for amicable settlement of this and other issues.

Mathematician Declares That Gamblers Can't Win

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Your wife cashes in on a horse because she likes the color of the jockey's jacket. You collect nonnegotiable tickets because you follow breeding lines.

Ever wonder why? A man who has been studying gambling for 15 years says he's found out it's because "you just can't win."

Feeding slugs into his own slot machine, Dr. Ernest E. Blanche said: "It's mine and it's honest, but it pays me only 70 per cent."

Dr. Blanche, a 36 year old mathematician, once wanted to be a physician. Instead, he has been diagnosing the probabilities of gambling success.

His aims his preaching against gambling from the practical rather than the moral viewpoint.

"People don't want to be told they can't win," he says. "My theory is that they'll always lose if they stay at it. The ones who can't be convinced are the ones I'm trying to reach."

Some of his conclusions: You've got one chance in 17 of making four straight passes with the dice, shooting for 7, 11 or your point.

If it's eight straight winning throws, the chances are one in 287. If it is 10, you have one chance in 1,181—unless the dice are crooked.

From the mathematical standpoint, he says he has tried all the angles—from roulette to hunting the red centered piece of candy that would entitle him to a free peppermint stick.

His own home is a cache of gambling equipment—all experimental and some of it phoney. He says he has been kicked out of some places merely for taking notes.

Burma Rebels See Glamour In Fame of Bandit Maid

RANGOON.—Burma rebels are cashing in on the popularity of a "beautiful young maiden" who rides

through the tropic nights on a white horse at the head of a bandit column.

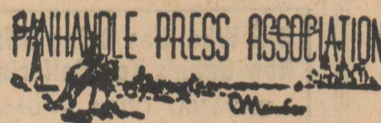
To the government, she is just Ma Khin Nyunt, unglamorous leader of 300 bloodthirsty rebels. They are part of the guerrilla forces attacking police posts, railway stations, and bridges in the interior.

The Lady of the White Horse started banditry before the present civil war, and is still a thorn in the government's side after 18 months. Two other female Robin Hoods—one time school-teachers—are reported leading bands of women who give and ask no quarter.

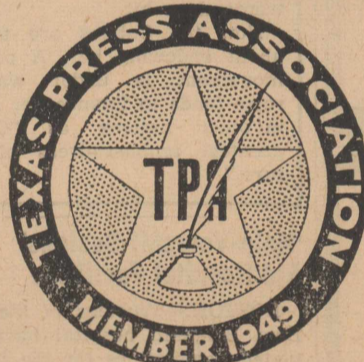

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held through-

out this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment pub-

lished as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be Numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

'Help-Yourself-Designs' Aid Hospital Facilities

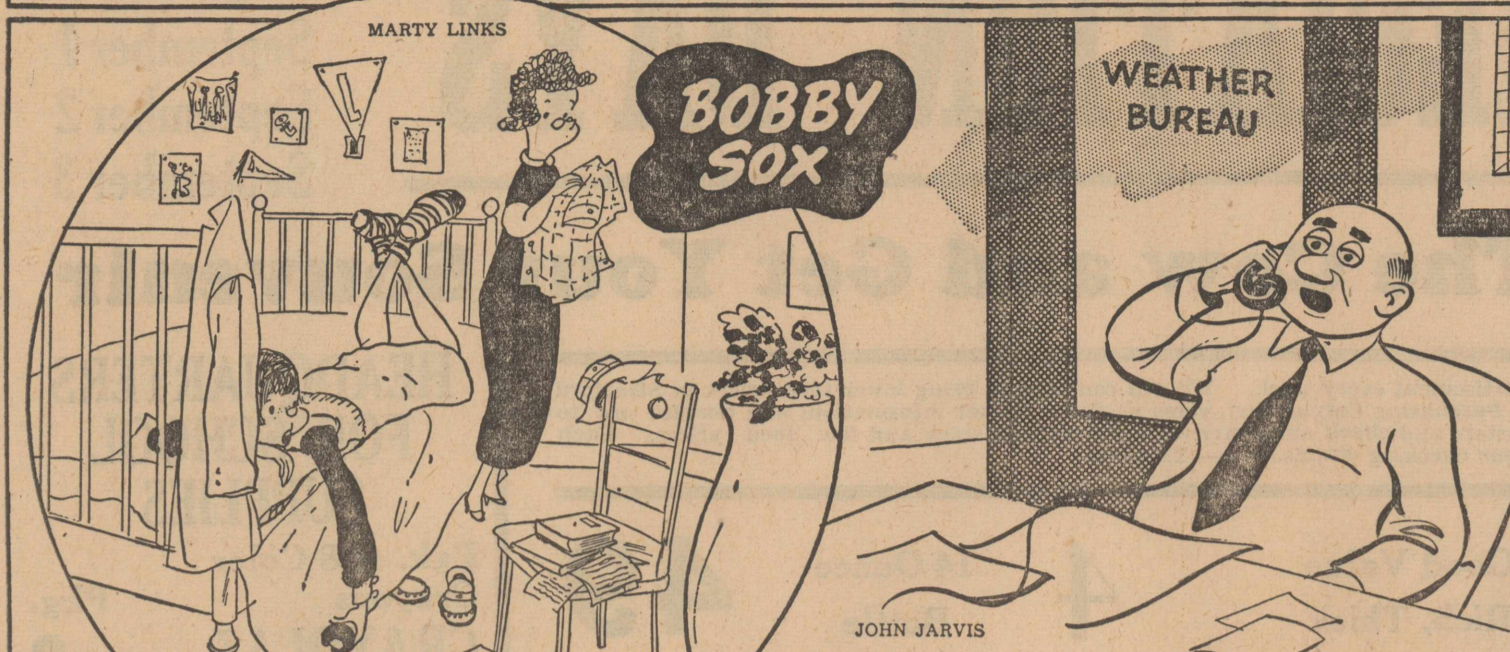

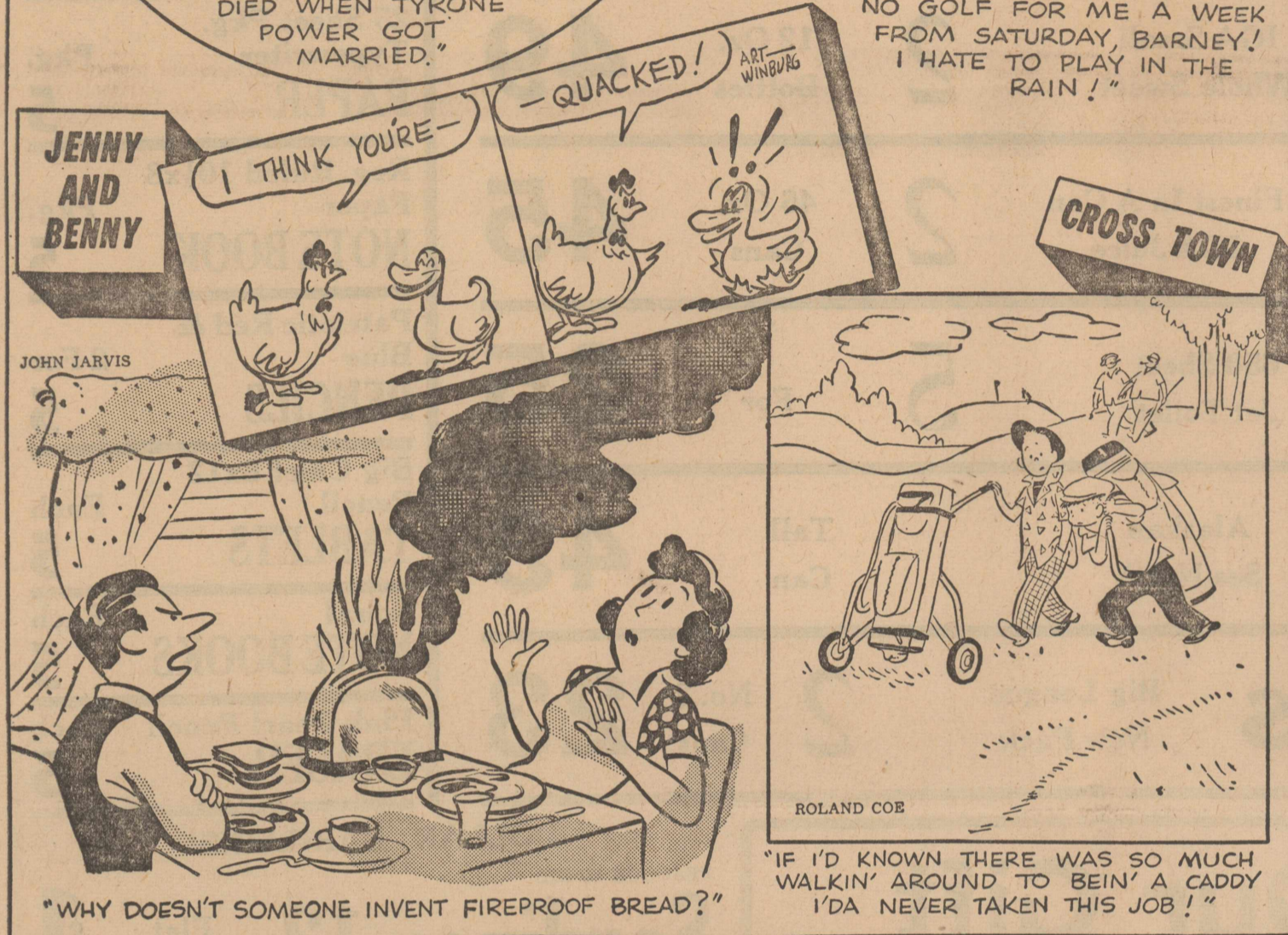

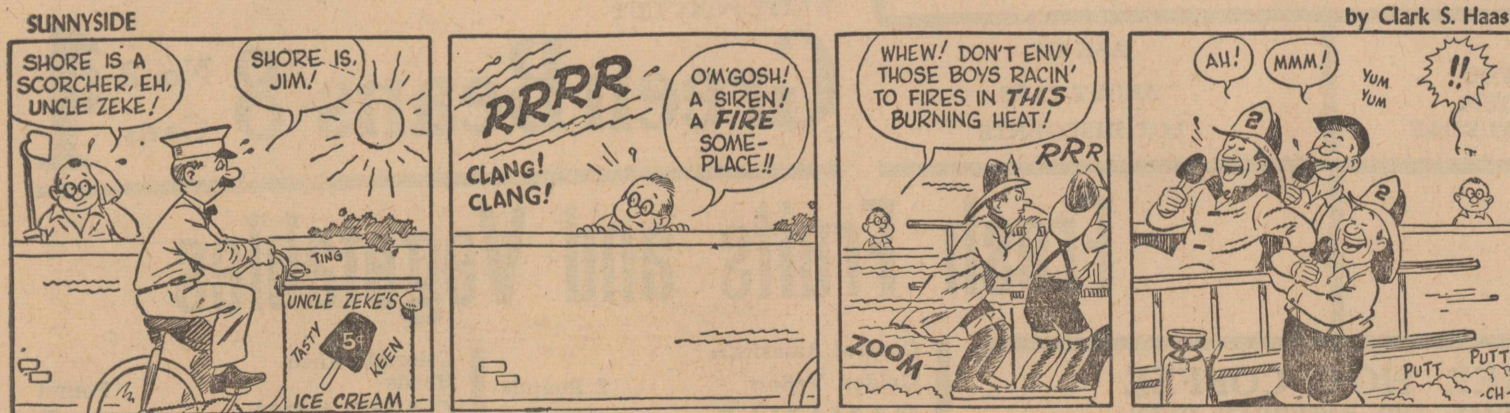

40th Anniversary

Tips for Gunners

However, when anyone takes a gun and goes hunting, safety factors should be paramount in his consciousness at all times. For that reason this list of the "Ten Commandments of Safety" for hunters is offered:

Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded, deadly weapon.

Carry only empty guns into automobile, camp or home.

Always be sure that the barrel and action are clear of obstructions.

Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble.

Be sure of the target before you shoot.

Never point a gun at anything you do not intend to shoot.

Never leave your gun unattended—unless you unload it first.

Never climb a fence or tree with a loaded gun.

Never shoot at a flat, hard surface or the surface of the water.

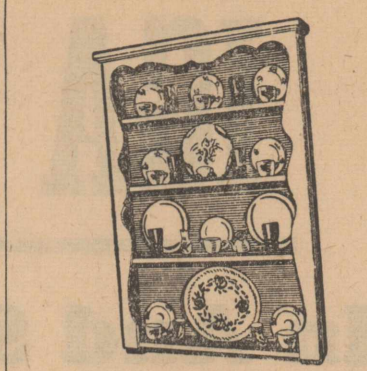
Do not mix gunpowder and alcohol.

The hunter who remembers these safety precautions is the safe and dependable companion in the hunting field. No squirrel, deer, rabbit, quail or other item of game is worth life or limb. In going afield with a gun be safe by being sure that you follow sensible safety rules.

Save Your Fish

As long as fish are alive they may be kept in the creek, tied to a root or slung over the side of a boat until the angler is done for the day. They should be checked often, however, and dead ones cleaned immediately or at least gutted and placed in dampened burlap, watercress, or, if to be transported any distance, chipped ice. They should not be allowed to lie in the water from melting ice, or they will become tasteless.

HOUSEHOLD QUESTIONS

Marks on Refrigerator

QUESTION: I have a new refrigerator with a finish that is not porcelain. I would like to know what to take marks off with. I mean when something is bumped against it and leaves a black mark. I have a small child, so you can imagine how many bumps the refrigerator gets. A cleaning agent removes the finish. I would appreciate this information.

ANSWER: As the refrigerator is still new, why not call up the dealer who sold it to you and ask him either to come and clean it up for you or else recommend a cleaning preparation? I could give you a better answer if you had told me what the material is, since it is not porcelain. If the finish is washable, which it certainly ought to be, try a damp cloth sprinkled with a scratchless scouring powder, rub very lightly, and follow with another clean, damp cloth. The powder should not be used except in instances of stubborn spots. Mild soap and water on a damp cloth should be sufficient.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

SCRIPTURE: Psalms 19:7-14; 105: 119. DEVOTIONAL READING: Proverbs 2:1-9.

God's Map for Me

Lesson for August 23, 1949

HOW did the writers of the Bible think about the Bible? We can get part of the answer by looking at our Psalms for this week. These poets already possessed a part of our Bible: the Law, some historical books, perhaps some of the Prophets. It was an incomplete Bible they had—but they loved it.

They did not think of it or use it in some of the mistaken ways you may find some people thinking of the Bible today. They did not think it was enough to read a line or two before going to bed every night. They did not think that having a copy of it around would bring good luck, or scare off demons. They said nothing about the Bible's being great literature. They were not at all bothered by miracle stories in Scripture; they believed them, and took them as evidences of the mighty power of God (see Psalm 105). They did not look on the Bible as chiefly a dictionary of Don'ts. They did not think of it as a Sabbath book, but rather as an everyday one. It did not strike them as a book of mystery.

The Psalmist's Bible

IN reading Psalm 19:7-14, it is interesting to see how many different things the Psalmist says about the Word of God. He calls it by various names, but that is only because, being a poet, he likes to use several words for the same thing. As for Psalm 105, where else but in his Bible would the poet have learned that story of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph and the deliverance from Egypt?

The reader of this Psalm will observe that the subject of most of the sentences is GOD. As the poet reviews his people's history, he shows that it is not simply the doings of the Israelites, but it is God who brings things to pass.

"Man proposes but God disposes" is a proverb which the writer of Psalm 105 would approve. Psalm 119 is known as an "alphabetic" or "acrostic" poem. It is divided into 22 sections, each one exactly eight verses long. There are 22 letters in the Hebrew alphabet, and in the Hebrew original of this Psalm each verse of the first section begins with the first letter of the Hebrew alphabet, Aleph; in the next section, Beth, and so on down to the last letter, Tau.

The Book of God

WHAT the writers of these Psalms said about the partly-done Bible of their times is of course even more true of the completed Bible which is our heritage as Christians. One thing they make clear is that this is first of all God's book. They knew as well as we do that different human minds had a part of it, but for all that it is always God whose message comes through what they wrote. The Bible, properly understood, reveals the mind of God and the will of God. The Bible reveals also the doings of God. His story is the weaving of God's eternal decrees on the looms of time. Again, these poets see that the Bible is for man and about man.

None of them thought of it as a guide to heaven, but rather as a road map or to guide us through the mazes of this world. Psalm 119 stresses this world, and no other, as the world on which God's light shines.

The commandments of God are so many lengths of barbed wire to fence us in, rather road-signs to guide us on life's open highway. The Bible presents the "How" of living. It is God's map for me.

The Bible in the Heart

THE SENTENCE: "Thy word I have hid in my heart" (Psalm 119:11) is the clue to the right use of the Bible. When a Hebrew writer says "heart" he means something more than mere emotion. The word means character, what a man really is. A young Korean was learning the Sermon on the Mount, but making slow work of it.

When a missionary asked him about it, the boy said, "I have to be slow. First I learn a verse, then I go out and live it. I can learn the words in a few minutes; but it takes longer than that to live it."

That is the right idea. One verse, translated into living, is worth more than a chapter that never gets deeper in than the edge of the brain.

Serve Good Breakfasts for Play-Packed Days (See Recipes Below)

Breakfast Essentials

THOUGH IT'S "SUMMER time and the livin' is easy," many of us find the season just like the rest of the year, busy and activity packed. With youngsters out of school, full of vigor and ready to play at top speed just as soon as the sun is up, days start early and are full, for mother as well as the youngsters.

Since youngsters are up bright and early, eager to get out of the house to the fascinating work of play as quickly as possible, mother has to keep on her toes to see that they get a good breakfast. Children burn a lot of energy on days when they can play as they want, and they should be properly fortified with nutritious food.

Good breakfasts are simple and easy to prepare. The meal should include at least these five essentials; fruit, cereal with milk, bread, butter and a beverage, which for youngsters should be milk or cocoa.

You may add to these essentials bacon, eggs, ham, sausage, creamed chipped beef and such things, but at least you know that you'll be doing a good job with the five "musts."

Vary breakfast cereals to keep interest at a high level. A bowl of hot oatmeal, rich in body-building proteins, thiamine, niacin and iron, can be just as tempting in warm weather as cool if topped with cold milk and some of the season's fresh and choice fruit.

The next day serve a prepared cereal, then switch back to cooked cereal and so forth.

DON'T UNDERESTIMATE the value of hot bread for breakfast and appetite appeal. Here are some muffins with the nutty flavor of oatmeal which are bound to please as they come hot out of the oven with butter melting on them.

As a special time-saving feature, the muffins are made from a homemade oatmeal muffin mix. Make the mix at any time when you have a few spare moments, store in a covered container on the pantry shelf, and you will need only to measure it out, add egg and milk to it for quick muffins.

Oatmeal Muffin Mix (Makes 75 small muffins)
5 1/2 cups sifted flour
1 1/2 cups sugar
6 tablespoons baking powder
1 tablespoon salt
1 1/4 cups shortening
5 1/2 cups quick, rolled oats, uncooked

Sift together twice the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Cut shortening into dry ingredients until particles are the size of rice grains. Add rolled oats and blend. Store in covered container.

Muffins from Mix (Makes 12 small muffins)
2 cups oatmeal muffin mix

1 egg, beaten
3/4 cup milk
Add beaten egg and milk to muffin mix, stirring lightly until combined. Fill small, greased muffin cups 3/4 full. Bake in a hot (425°F.) oven 15 to 20 minutes.

YOU'LL WANT the muffin mix to serve for luncheon or dinner purposes, too, so here are some interesting variations that can be made from the mix:
Bacon Muffins Glazed with Honey Butter: Place a few bits of cooked bacon in center of each muffin before baking. Two or three minutes before muffins have finished baking, remove from oven and brush with honey butter (made by combining 1 tablespoon honey with 1 tablespoon butter). Return to oven and finish baking.
Cheese Muffins: Fold 1/4 cup grated sharp cheese into batter just before baking.
*Marmalade Muffins: Place 1/4 teaspoon marmalade or preserves on top of each muffin before baking.

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JUST AS VARIETY in cereals is desirable for breakfast, so it is with eggs. Here are some simple but different ways of serving this nutritious food.

Frizzled Eggs (Serves 4)
1/2 pound chipped beef
4 teaspoons butter
4 eggs, beaten
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup milk

Cook dried beef in butter until slightly crisp. Combine eggs, pepper and milk and mix well. Pour over beef and cook as for scrambled eggs. Serve with catsup or pre-serves, if desired.

Eggs in Bacon Rings (Serves 6)
6 slices bacon
6 eggs
Salt and pepper
3 English Muffins, split, toasted, buttered

Grease bottoms of custard cups. Curl a slice of bacon around inside of each cup. Break an egg inside each bacon ring, dust with salt and pepper, and bake in a moderate oven (350°) until egg is firm but not hard. Remove carefully from cup so that egg and bacon remain together and place on half the English muffin. Note: The bacon may be fried or broiled before placing in the cup, if more crisp bacon is desired.

Poached Eggs in Apple Rings (Serves 6)
2 large apples
2 tablespoons fat
6 eggs
Salt and pepper

Wash and core apples; cut crosswise into slices 1/2 inch thick. Fry apples in fat 2 to 3 minutes on each side. Place an egg on each apple slice and season with salt and pepper. Cover pan closely and cook over low heat until eggs are firm.

Superphosphate Assists Effectiveness of Manure
One load of manure can be made to do the work of two in topdressing fields, if superphosphate is added before manure is spread, says Prof. C. J. Chapman, of the University of Wisconsin. He suggests putting 25 to 30 pounds of superphosphate in the spreader as the manure goes out into the field, or scattering superphosphate in barn gutters at the rate of a pound per cow per day.

Milk Products Add To Turkey Profits

More Eggs Result Of Judicious Use

Increased egg production of nearly 25 per cent and an increased profit of \$2.57 per hen, as a result of adding milk products to the rations of breeding turkeys, is indicated in results of a feeding demonstration reported by the Kraft foods company.

Two similar flocks of broad breasted bronze turkeys on the Lester Woodhams' ranch at Sonora, Calif., were placed on test at the beginning of the season. Both flocks were fed a ration consisting of commercial breeder mash in pellet form, some oats and a little corn. One flock had 130 hens and the other 204. Breeding and management of the two flocks was identical. A pelleted milk product was added to the ration of the smaller flock.



These turkeys show what excellent results can be obtained by turkey raisers with use of proper feed and control of flocks.

Careful records of egg production and feed consumption were maintained from the start of egg production, February 21, to May 26 when the birds were marketed because of the lateness of the hatching season. Both flocks were producing at better than 40 per cent when marketed.

During the 94-day laying period the 130 hens in the flock receiving the pelleted milk product laid a total of 6,257 eggs, an average of 48.1 eggs each. In the same period the 204 hens in the control flock laid 7,811 eggs, or an average of 38.3 each. This meant that the test flock produced better than 25 per cent more eggs. Rate of production was 51.2 per cent for the test flock compared to 40 per cent for the control flock.

Eggs from the test flock graded 91.6 per cent saleable for hatching against 89.3 per cent for the control flock. With hatching eggs at 32 cents each, this meant that each hen receiving the pelleted milk product produced an average of \$14.11 worth of hatching eggs, or \$3.17 more than the average for the control flock, which was \$10.94.

A majority vote in both elections will be required for the consolidation of the two districts.

An effort is being made to secure the Amarillo Range Riders, but they have not definitely promised to appear.

Cash prizes will be awarded in the various sections of the parade, but the amounts have not been announced.

Veterans Have FHA Loan Preference

The thirty-one county Panhandle District of the Farmers Home Administration held a planning and policy meeting in Amarillo on Wednesday and Thursday of last week. Arch Fowler and Mrs. Louise Stewart of the Dalhart office attended. Oris Bruner of Amarillo presided at the meeting. Representatives of the state office in Dallas explained the policies for the coming fiscal year and each county office was notified of the loan allotment for this year.

As loan funds are now available the local office is accepting applications now for new loans. The office located in Dalhart serves the county area, which is Dallam, Hartley, Moore and Sherman counties. Funds are available for operating type loans, both on annual basis or adjustment type basis.

The real-estate loan, called the Farm-ownership program, was also discussed, and funds are available for this type loan.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36
Proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE

OF TEXAS:
Section 1: That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Amendment to the

Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his

vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.
