

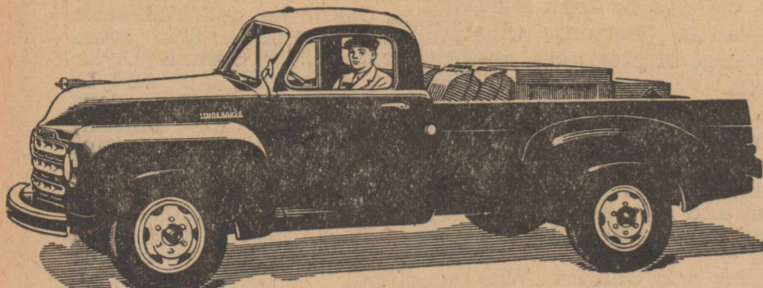
Showers Fall Over Plains Territory

White House so Worn New Inside Is Needed

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The White House is so dilapidated that an entire new house will be built inside the hollow outer shell of the historic executive mansion.

And none too soon, Lorenzo S. Wilson, White House architect, said as he conducted reporters through the empty house. He said it was a "miracle" that its central walls had not collapsed and killed someone.

Only the outside brick walls, still scarred by the fire of 1814, will be left standing. When congress gives the go ahead on repairs, the whole inside will come down.

The 149 year old presidential home is in far worse shape than anyone suspected. What started as "extensive repairs" will be complete new construction from cellar to roof.

The White House was closed in November and President Truman and his family moved across the street to the Blair House, where they will remain until the reconstruction is completed. Once work

has started, it will take 15 to 18 months to finish the job.

Estimates of the cost of repairs now range from five to eight million dollars. It would cost only two million dollars to build the house new, but that would involve scrapping historic trimmings.

Scientists Learn Humans Can Stand Severe Cold

WASHINGTON.—Scientists from the University of Washington, co-operating with the air force, have learned that man can stand up to sub-zero temperatures better than expected.

Heat loss to the body from inhaling below-zero atmosphere, the air force announced today in telling of tests made in arctic regions, is much less than formerly believed. Radiations from even a weak mid-winter Alaskan sun was found to have had a marked effect on reducing body heat loss.

Especially designed insulated clothing, equipped with wires and tubes to check temperatures at various points over the body, were worn in 40-degree-below-zero weather in making the tests.

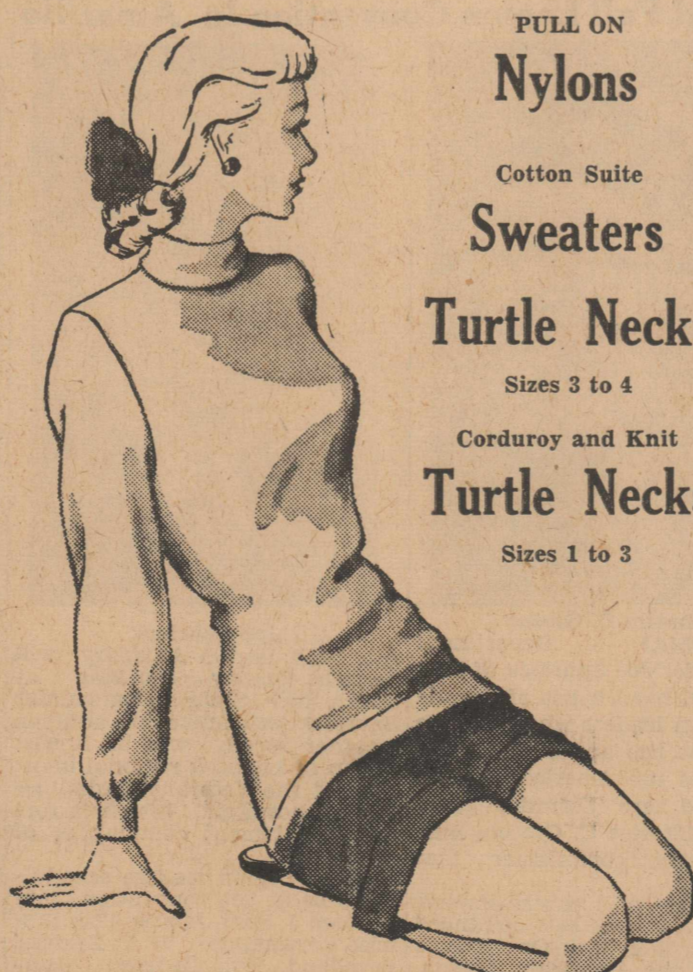

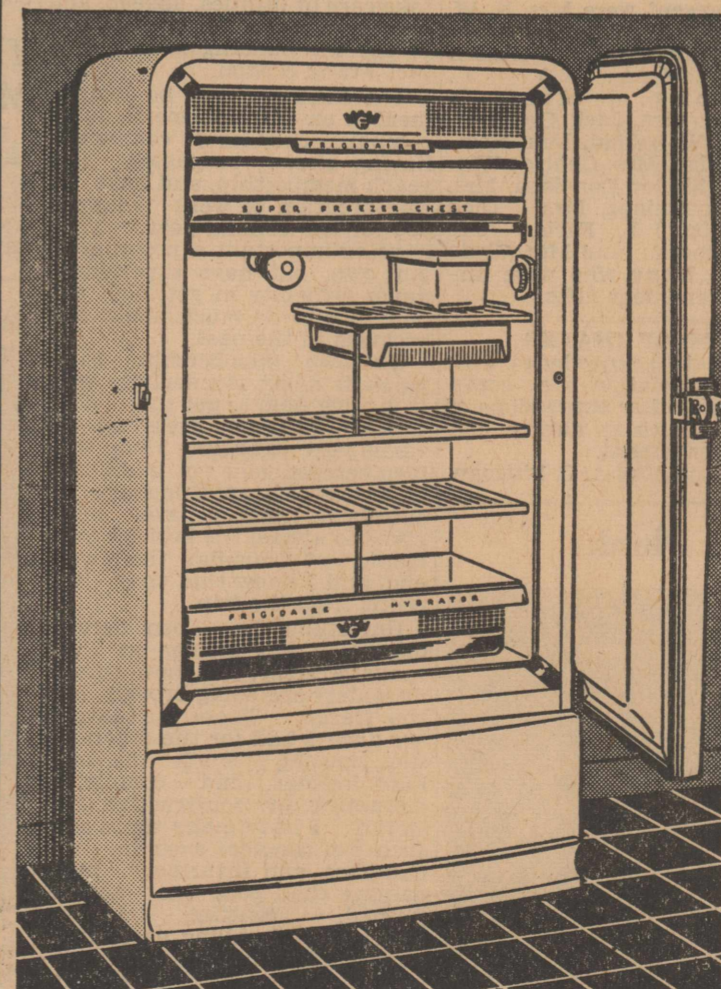

TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF ROAD DISTRICT NO. 3 OF SHERMAN COUNTY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID DISTRICT AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION: TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, Texas, on the 31 day of October, 1949, on the proposition and at the place more particularly set forth in the election order passed by the Commissioners' Court on the 29 day of September, 1949 which is as follows: "AN ORDER CALLING AN ELECTION ON THE PROPOSITION OF ISSUING \$105,000.00 OF BONDS OF ROAD DISTRICT NO. 3 OF SHERMAN COUNTY, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this Court the petition of Albert Zimmer and 38 other persons, representing themselves to be a majority of the resident, qualified electors of Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, Texas, who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, praying that this Court order an election in Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, Texas, to determine:

Whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, Texas, shall be issued in an amount not to exceed \$105,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Three and Three-fourths (3-3/4%) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed Thirty (30) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout the Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, Texas; and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, Texas, sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

WHEREAS, heretofore on the 12th day of September, 1949, the Commissioners' Court passed an order fixing a time and place for a hearing on said petition, to-wit: September 29, 1949, and directed the County Clerk to issue a notice of such time and place of hearing to inform all persons concerned of their right to appear at such hearing and to contend for or protest the ordering of such election; and

WHEREAS, the County Clerk has heretofore duly executed said notice by posting true copies of said order of hearing in three public places within said Road District No. 3, and another copy thereof at the Courthouse door of said County for ten days prior to the date fixed for the hearing, and said notice has also been published in a newspaper of general circulation in said Road District No. 3, namely, "Stratford Star," one time, on the 22 day of September, 1949, which was at least five days prior to the date fixed for said hearing; and

WHEREAS, this Court, having met at the time and place set for the hearing of said petition, proceeded to hear such petition and all matters in respect to the proposed bond election, to hear the contentions for and protest against the calling of such election, and it is found by the Court that the said petition is signed by thirty nine legally qualified electors who own taxable property in Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, there being less than fifty such electors residing in said Road District, and that the notice required by law to be given of said hearing has been given; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the hearing held on said date and from the evidence admitted at said hearing, the Court has determined that the proposed improvements would be for the benefit of all taxable property situated in said Road District No. 3, and that it is desirable and necessary to issue the bonds of said Road District No. 3 in the amount of One Hundred and Five Thousand (\$105,000.00) Dollars to construct said improvements, and that said election should be ordered; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court further finds that the amount of said proposed bond issue, together with all outstanding bonds of the same nature heretofore issued on the faith and credit of Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said District; and

WHEREAS, said Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, Texas, was heretofore created by order of the Commissioners' Court, duly entered on the 2nd day of September, 1949, which order is of record in the minutes of the Commissioners' Court:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDER-

ED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF SHERMAN COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said Sherman County Road District No. 3 on the 31 day of October, 1949, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine:

Whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, Texas, shall be issued in an amount not to exceed \$105,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Three and Three-fourths (3-3/4%) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed Thirty (30) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout the Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, Texas; and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, Texas, sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

2. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the Thirty Ninth Legislature, and only legally qualified electors of this State and of this County who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

3. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

Each voter shall mark out with blank ink or black pencil one of the expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

4. The said election shall be held at Ruby School House, Stratford, Texas, within Road District No. 3 of Sherman County, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as officers of said election:

JOHN STEEL, Presiding Judge, Arthur Milton, Judge.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the General Laws of this State regulating general elections when not in conflict with the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the 39th Legislature, hereinabove cited.

6. Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper having general circulation in Sherman County Road District No. 3 for three successive weeks before the date of said election. And in addition thereto, there shall be posted copies of this order at three public places in said District, and one at the Courthouse door of the County for three consecutive weeks prior to

said election. 7. The County Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to post said notices and to cause same to be published as hereinabove directed. Further orders by this Court are reserved until the returns of said election executed by the duly authorized election officers are received by this Court. WHEREAS, heretofore on the 12th day of September, 1949, the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed Thirty (30) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout the Road District No. 2 of Sherman County, Texas; and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in Road District No. 2 of Sherman County, Texas, sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity; which said petition was heretofore, filed in this Court; and

WHEREAS, the County Clerk has heretofore duly executed said notice by posting true copies of said order of hearing in three public places within said Road District No. 2, and another copy thereof at the Courthouse door of said County for ten days prior to the date fixed for the hearing, and said notice has also been published in a newspaper of general circulation in said Road District No. 2, namely, "Stratford Star," one time, on the 22 day of September, 1949, which was at least five days prior to the date fixed for said hearing; and

Whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. 2 of Sherman County, Texas, shall be issued in an amount not to exceed \$175,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Three and Three-fourths (3-3/4%) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed Thirty (30) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout the Road District No. 2 of Sherman County, Texas; and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in Road District No. 2 of Sherman County, Texas, sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity;

2. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of

the First Called Session of the Thirty Ninth Legislature, and only legally qualified electors of this State and of this County who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

3. The Ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

4. The said election shall be held at Lone Star School, Stratford, Texas, within Road District No. 2 of Sherman County, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as officers of said election:

Luther Browder, Presiding Judge, Cline Gilbert, Judge.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the General Laws of this State regulating general elections when not in conflict with the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the 39th Legislature, hereinabove cited.

6. Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper having general circulation in Sherman County Road District No. 2 for three successive weeks before the date of said election.

And in addition thereto, there shall be posted copies of this order at three public places in said District, and one at the Courthouse door of the County for three consecutive weeks prior to said election.

7. The County Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to post said notices and to cause same to be published as hereinabove directed. Further orders by this Court are reserved until the returns of said election executed by

the duly authorized election officers are received by this Court.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

DREW PEARSON

'Awful' Tobacco

BRITISH ECONOMIC CZAR Sir Stafford Cripps and Foreign Minister Bevin attended a National Press Club luncheon while in Washington where Cripps, who controls Britain's economy with a vice-like grip, told in detail of British sacrifices of the dollar shortage.
 "Just to give you an example of the sacrifices we are making," said Cripps, "both Mr. Bevin and I have given up tobacco as our part of the program to save dollars."
 Whereupon Bevin, turning to his luncheon companion, whispered: "That's not the case at all. The fact is I gave up smoking because I couldn't stand the bloody awful tobacco Cripps has been buying."

Note—in order to save dollars the British have been partly shunning North Carolina tobacco and turning to their African colonies.
Capital News Capsules
 G. O. P. Blocks Civil Rights—It wasn't a southern Democrat but a midwest Republican who stopped the senate labor committee from approving the fair employment practices bill behind closed doors. This is the most controversial measure in President Truman's civil rights program. But the vote was blocked on a technicality by G. O. P. senator Donnell from the President's home state—Missouri.
Atlantic Defense — The state department has called a highly secret meeting of the joint chiefs of staff of the 12 countries in the north Atlantic pact. They will meet in Washington.
Food for Democratic Countries — The food and agricultural branch of the United Nations is setting up an important organization to sell surplus American farm products to the undernourished countries of western Europe and India. The plan should benefit both American farmers and Democratic countries, and the experts claim they have worked out a plan to lick the toughest problem in international trade—the dollar shortage.

Senatorial Speculator
 It looks as if Senator Thomas's speculating partner, Dyke Cullum, has diverse and widespread interests.
 Last week it was revealed that Cullum, who frequently claims to represent Thomas, had bought 10 carloads of egg futures at the same time that the senator from Oklahoma had introduced legislation taking the support price off of eggs. Senator Thomas and Cullum have used a joint trading account on the commodity exchange in the past.
 Now, in addition to eggs, it develops that Cullum has been pulling wires with the agriculture department regarding lard.
 Cullum's influence in agricultural matters results from the fact that Thomas, as chairman of the senate agriculture committee, can block or pass most farm legislation.
 Therefore, when Cullum, who helps the senator write legislation, demands inside information from the agriculture department, agriculture officials can't tell whether they are giving it for legislative purposes or for speculative purposes. Naturally, inside knowledge of government purchases and price supports could be used to make big profits on the commodity market.

Is Senator in Lard?
 In August, Cullum began pestering the agriculture department to support lard prices. Naturally, such support would cause a spectacular jump in lard prices.
 The agriculture department, however, has adopted a policy of supporting only agricultural products, not by-products. A support price for a by-product such as lard, it feels, would not help farmers, but the meat packers.
 Nevertheless, Cullum phoned George Parks in the fats and oils branch in the name of Senator Thomas and demanded a price support for lard. Parks promised a written reply, and when it didn't come fast enough, Cullum made two phone calls to David Pettus in the livestock branch for information on price supports. Again he suggested that the government buy lard. Each time he represented himself as speaking for Senator Thomas and the senate agriculture committee.
 As a result of Cullum's activity, the agriculture department finally sent a letter to Senator Thomas.
 "This is in reply to a recent telephone request from Mr. Dyke Cullum to the fats and oils branch for information regarding the calculation of a parity price for lard. As you know, the parity price concept heretofore has applied only to direct agricultural commodities sold by farmers. It has not applied to products such as fats and oils which are processed from agricultural products and sold by processors. . . ."

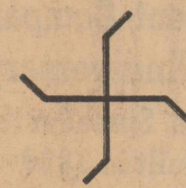

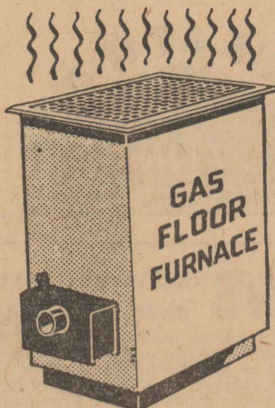
