

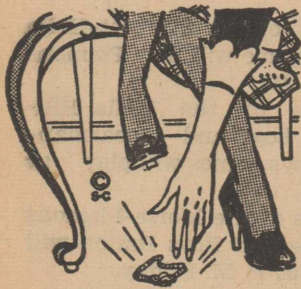

In making this announcement R. C. Buckles, present Chairman of the Sherman county P. M. A. committee, urges every farmer in the county to vote for his choice for these committees. Many decisions that will affect every farmer in the county will be made by the men elected. With cotton, wheat, and peanut farm acreage allotments in effect these men will decide what each individual farm acreage allotment will be. The county P. M. A. committee must approve each farmer's application for assistance in his soil and water conservation work under the Agricultural Conservation Program. Committeemen will have important duties to perform in connection with the Commodity Credit Corporation Loan and Price Support Programs.

Mr. Buckles explains that the P. M. A. committees have heretofore been known as A. C. A. or A. A. A. committees. The name has recently been changed to Production and Marketing Administration since they administer at the community and county levels the programs of the Production and Marketing Administration. Explaining details pertaining to the election the chairman says, a nominating committee has been selected for each community. These nominating committees have selected two of their neighbors for each position to be filled. The names of those nominated will be printed on the ballot and space will also be left for a "write in" in case any voter desires to vote for someone other than the nominee.

A polling place will be set up in the county courtroom in Stratford. It will be kept open from 8:00 A. M. to 5:00 P. M. on the day of the election. In addition to this polling place, farmers may vote by mail or by calling at the county P. M. A. office up to the day before the election.

Plaid Pointers

COLLEGE STATION — Plaids, so popular in the fashion picture this fall, present a few special problems in home dressmaking.

In training schools being held over the State by Extension clothing specialists Mary Routh and Nena Roberson of Texas A. & M. College, these problems are discussed with the home demonstration agents and leaders. Among suggestions given by the specialists are these:

It is usually necessary to buy more material than the pattern calls for to make plaid match at seams. Large plaids and those with up and down, or right and left design take the most yardage.

When choosing a pattern to make up in plaid, look for simple lines and little decorative detail. The plaid itself offers enough decoration so that fancy extra touches are not needed and the fewer the pattern pieces, the less the difficulty of matching the design when putting the garment together.

If the material must be shrunk before making up, take care to hang it straight in drying and to hold ends and selvages even in pressing so that the weave runs straight and true, the specialists caution.

The easiest way to make the plaid match is to check the notches when laying on pattern pieces, making sure that a notch on the sleeve, for example, comes at the same place in the plaid as the corresponding notch in the arm-eye.

Very often it pays, the special-

ists say, to cut pieces one at a time and on single rather than double material, except for those pieces which must be cut on a fold of

goods. Follow these suggestions and your plaid dress will be much easier to make.

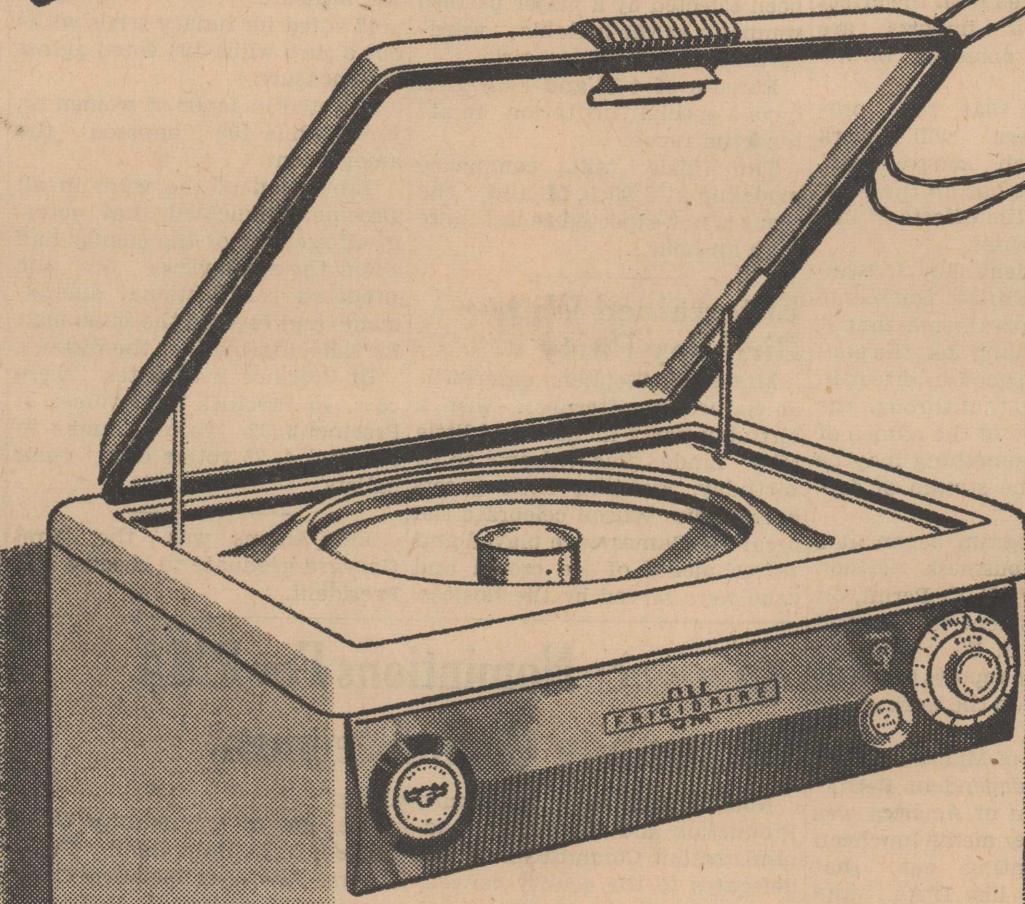

Better give the roof the once over and if repairs are needed, make them before the winter rains set in. Allen says that nails in metal roofs will become loose in hot weather and may even come out and he suggests that you check the nails. A coat of asphalt roofing cement will usually take care of the leaks in the roof that have resulted from cracks or small holes.

Be sure that rain water drains away from the buildings instead of under them. Freezing can cause the foundations to heave or crack and this means a big repair job later.

Periodic checks and proper maintenance will help keep down building costs and will save needless repairs besides saving valuable time, says Allen. Check up and see what is needed and you'll be ready for winter—if you do the jobs now.

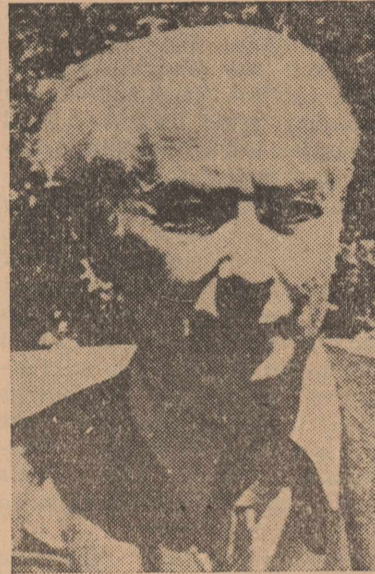

Texas A. & M. College, suggests a few for starters, here they are.

Check the floor furnace burners, controls and plumbing before you light it, says Allen, to make sure there is no escaping gas to cause explosions. Do the same thing on other gas heaters and it is a good idea to vent them. Vents will eliminate the problem of moisture condensing on the walls. Check the fireplace and chimney for loose mortar or cracks and if repairs are needed, make them before the first fire is started.

If you plan to add insulation to make the house warmer this winter, now is the time. Insulation, properly installed, will cut your fuel bills come winter, says Allen.

Check the gutters and down spouts to make sure that leaves, trash and dirt don't have them stopped up. If they are clogged, spilling over and seepage can cause damage outside and inside.

Economic Highlights

All of the criticism of President Truman's policies does not come from the formal opposition. Much of it has taken place within his own official family. The most striking example was the recent resignation of Dr. Edwin Nourse, who was the President's

chief economic advisor for three years, following a blunt speech in which he strongly criticized the Administration's economic ideas.

"I am not happy," Dr. Nourse said, "when I see the Government slipping back into deficits as a way of life." He urged that the government put its fiscal house in order, and then said: "If we are to maintain the march of economic progress, we must—in-

dividually and as groups, in private business and in politics—display industry, prudence and self-discipline, recognize that we can't get more out of the economic system than we put in. Monetary and fiscal tricks have no power of magic but are a slippery road to misery." In the course of his address, Dr. Nourse also criticized the three-day week in the coal mines ordered by John L. Lewis, the effort of the steel workers to reduce the working day, and the pricing policies of some industries.

This would not be particularly newsworthy if Dr. Nourse were a conservative business economist. But he has always been regarded as a man of liberal views, and he has favored many New Deal and Fair Deal theories. The point seems to be that he, in company with many others, has become convinced that Mr. Truman's policies, and the enormous cost they would involve, endanger our financial security as a nation. It is obvious to anyone that if the government must operate on a deficit basis in good times, when the nation income is very high and tax revenues reflect this condition, the situation would become critical if business slackened and the economic machine slowed down.

This problem is underlined by the current labor situation. Secretary of Commerce Sawyer is the authority for the statement that if the steel strike continues until December, 5,000,000 men will be out of work. The grim effect of that on the economy is easily imagined. Men who are not working cannot buy. Merchants, landlords and others cannot collect their accounts, so they too cannot buy. The cycle thus started spreads until every enterprise and every section of the country is affected. Wages and earnings drop—and so do the government's revenues. And even when a great strike ends, it takes a long, long time to make up the lost ground.

In any event, Mr. Truman undoubtedly faces stormy days ahead. He has shown no disposition to give ground on any policy. But the opposition to his economic policy is growing.

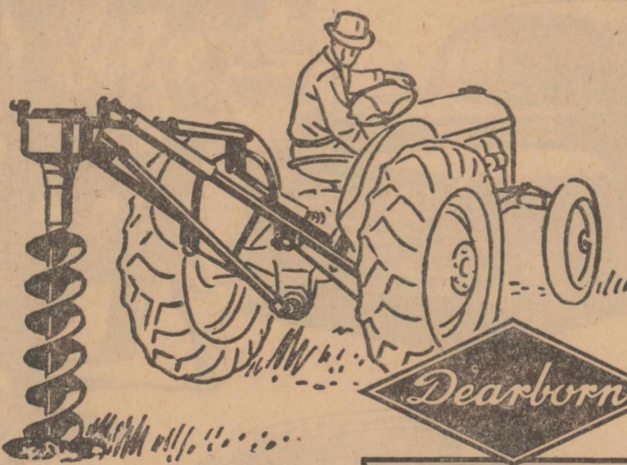

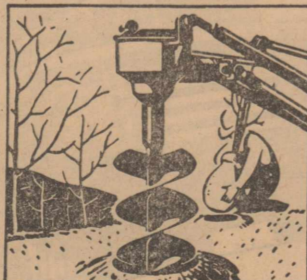

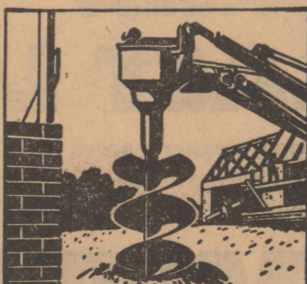

A-Bombs

Radiation Danger Minimized

PHILADELPHIA, Pa.—Rescue workers may enter areas affected by air bursting atomic bombs almost immediately without undue fear of deadly radiation, an atom bomb expert has said.

That statement was made by Dr. Eugene P. Pendergras, head of the radiology department of the University of Pennsylvania school of medicine and hospital, in a copyrighted article in the Philadelphia Inquirer.

"The early concept of a 'doomed area' of approximately two square miles directly under the point in air where the bomb explodes... is now thoroughly disproved," Dr. Pendergras said. "When the attack is made over a metropolitan area, it is probable that many persons will survive the bomb's deadly instantaneous radiations. Their survival will be the result of chance 'shielding' effect from reinforced concrete, brick and tile floors and walks."

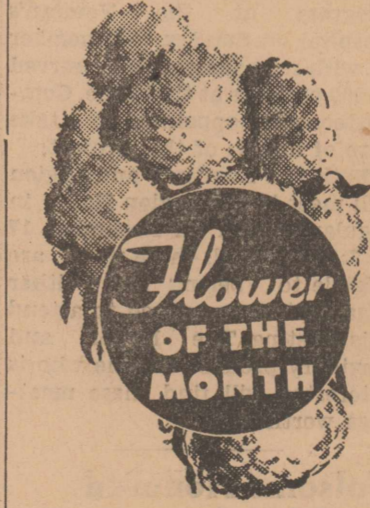

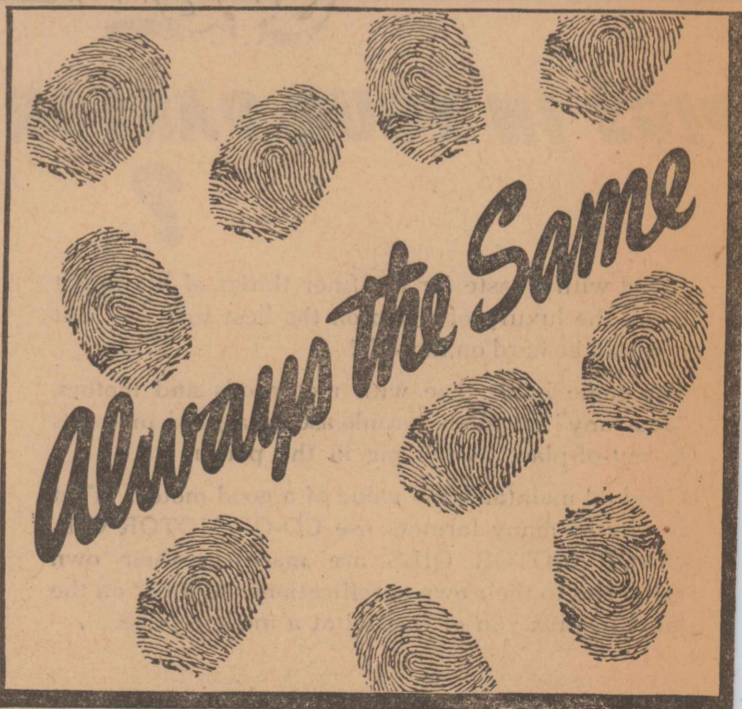

Belgium May Have Had First of All Newspapers

BRUSSELS, BELGIUM. — Belgium has traced what was perhaps the first newspaper in the world. The honor goes to the Wetlijcke Tijdinghe (Legitimate Tidings) which first appeared in Antwerp in 1605. A printer named Abraham Verhoeven was responsible.

Under various names and managements the Wetlijcke Tijdinghe was published for 222 years till 1827.

First the paper appeared twice a month and then in 1617 as a weekly. The top half of its pages were printed in French and the bottom half in Flemish. Then, as now, Belgium supported two languages. For illustrations Verhoeven used woodcuts mostly of famous persons of the day. Many battles were also shown in woodcuts, and famous buildings too, were engraved.

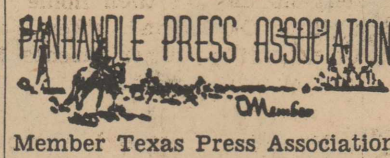

Every Texas Doctor Can Detect Cancer

HOUSTON — Every Texas Doctor is able to detect cancer. This is the conviction of Dr. E. W. Bertner of Houston, Chairman of the executive committee of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division.

"Many Texans have the idea that only a few highly trained specialists in the state, with elaborate equipment, can find evidence of cancer," says Dr. Bertner. "But, on the contrary, any careful doctor can detect conditions which may mean cancer, merely by using his eyes, ears, hands, and a few simple instruments which every physician has in his office."

Dr. Bertner carefully made this distinction, however: "Although all Texas doctors should be able to detect what may be cancer it does take trained specialists to diagnose cancer positively. It takes a team composed of pathologists, radiologists,

surgeons and sometimes gynecologists to search out and combat the disease."

There are in Texas 23 cancer clinics, Dr. Bertner pointed out. Ten are supported by American Cancer Society funds. Others receive support from the State Department of Health, or are independently operated, as are clinics at Army and Veteran Service Hospitals.

"At each of these clinics are the trained specialists who diagnose cancer," Dr. Bertner continued. "If your doctor suspects cancer, he will send you to one of these clinics for diagnosis. But be sure to go to your doctor first! Do not fall victim to a cancer quack who promises a cure. See your own family doctor."

"One of our aims in the American Cancer Society, Texas Division is to make sure that all Texas doctors recognize cancer in its early phases of development. Early cancer can be cured, and we must fight cancer with the knowledge we now have."

were below a week and year ago, while sheep and lamb numbers were above the previous week and short of a year ago.

CATTLE STRONGER HERE

At Fort Worth stocker cattle and calves ruled strong to 50 cents higher, and slaughter steers and yearlings were steady. Bulls sold about steady, and slaughter calves were weak to mostly 50 cents lower.
Good fed steers and yearlings were scarce, a few in the \$24 to \$25 range and highly finished stock was absent. Grassier and short fed beefs sold mostly at \$15 to \$23.50, with a few rannihan yearlings down to \$14. Stocker yearlings moved at \$16.50 to steers mostly \$19 downward.
Fat cows cleared at \$13.50 to \$16.50, while canners and cutters brought mostly \$9 to \$14. Stocker cows cashed at \$13 to \$17, keen demand noted for wheat pasture grazing types of cows. Bulls sold for \$13 to \$17.50.

FAT CALVES

Good and choice fat calves cleared at \$18 to \$21, with best heavyweights to \$23 and higher, while cull, common and medium killing calves drew \$12 to \$17.50. Stocker steer calves cashed at \$16.50 to \$23.50, a few choice to \$24, and heifer calves generally

Lambs were around 50c higher to feeders, and slaughter sheep and lambs ruled steady.

Good and choice shorn or wool-ed lambs cashed in the \$22 to \$23.75 bracket, while feeder lambs sold from \$22.75 downward, some rough and buck stocker lambs down to \$15. Slaughter ewes ranged from \$7.50 to \$10.50; with good aged wethers to \$11. Slaughter yearlings moved at \$17 to \$20.50, and feeder yearlings bulked at \$18 down. Old bucks sold around \$7, a fewer higher for

Meat Prices Over Nation Off For Week

Prices for most classes of meat declined during the past week at leading consuming centers, as supplies were ample to burdensome in relation to current demand.
At Chicago steer and heifer beef was quoted 50 cents to \$2 lower, cow beef steady to \$1 lower, veal and calf steady, lamb steady to \$1 lower, mutton unchanged, pork loins \$2 to \$3 lower, boston butts and spare ribs \$1 to \$2 down, pork trimmings \$2 to \$3 off, smoked meats steady to \$1 lower, and sliced bacon weak to as much as \$5 lower.
Principal livestock markets of the country handled fewer numbers of all classes than during the previous week, but with the exception of lambs, receipts were considerably larger than the same week last year.
At Fort Worth, cattle and calf supplies were larger than a week and year earlier, hog receipts

breeders. Goats were quotable \$5 to \$8. Good and choice butcher hogs averaging 200 to 270 pounds closed at \$17 to \$17.50, about steady with a week earlier. Sows were sold at \$15 to \$16, steady with last week's close. Feeder pigs at \$15 downward were \$1 lower for the week.

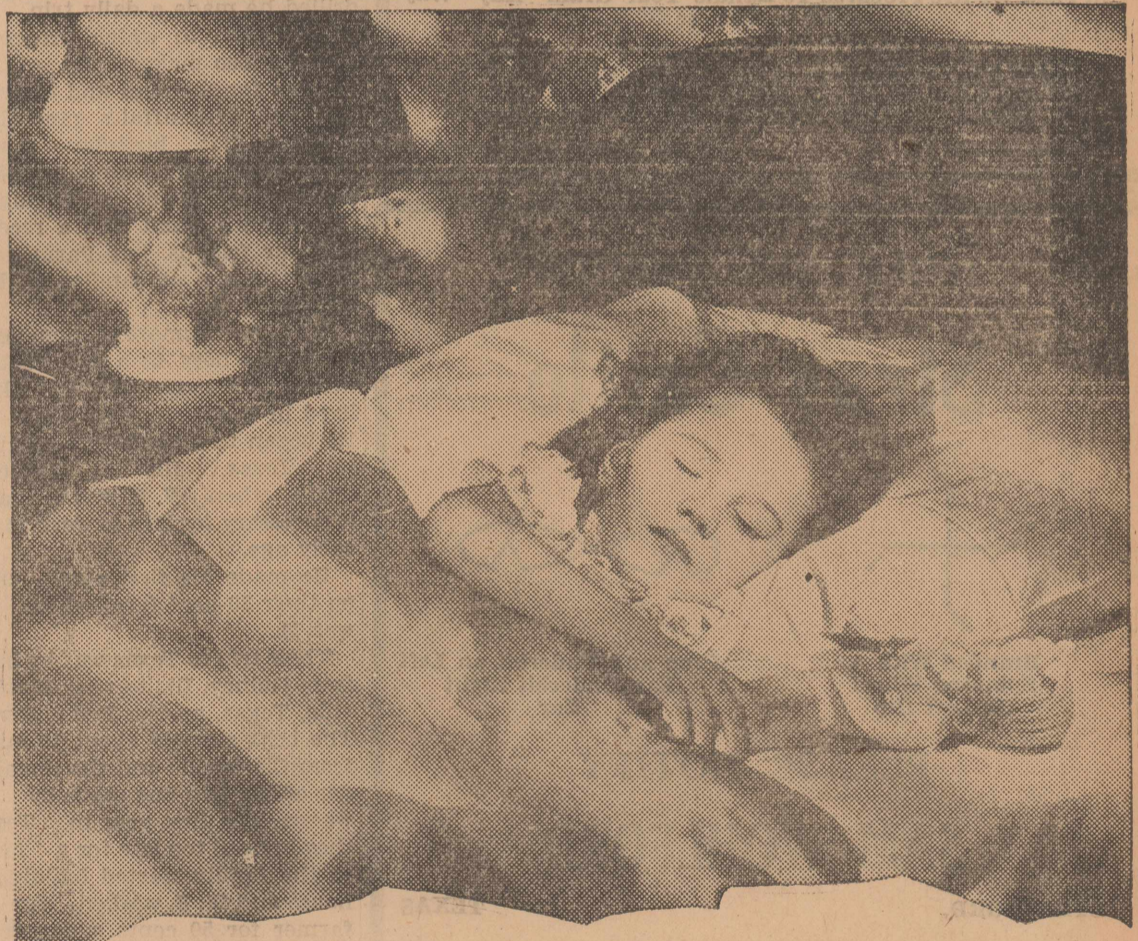

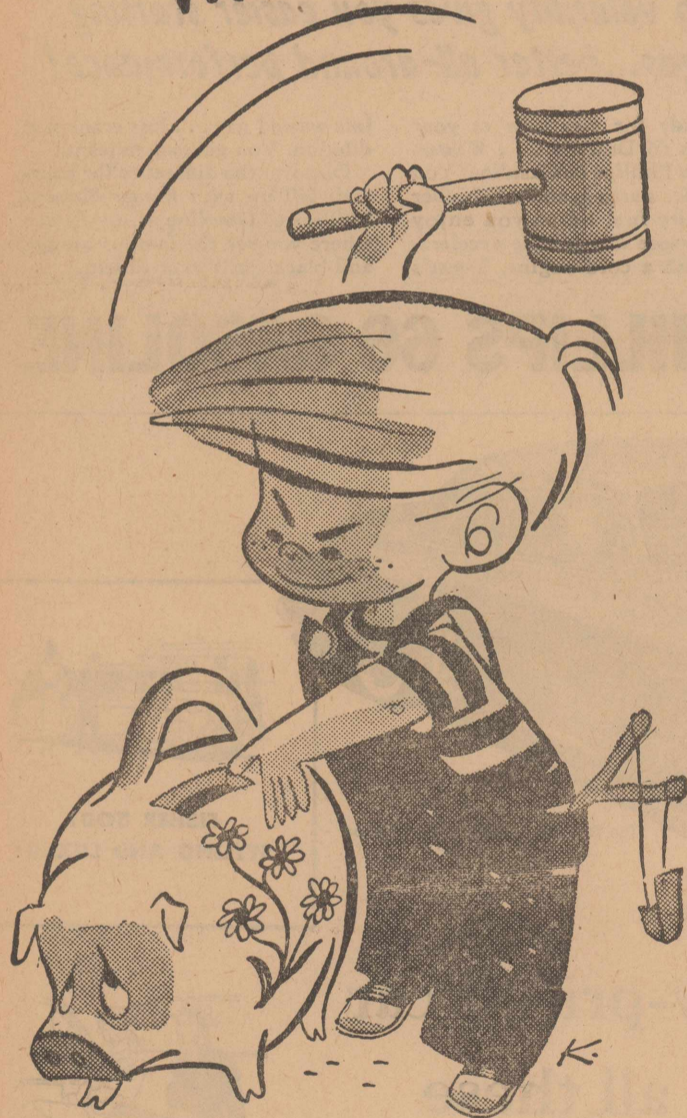

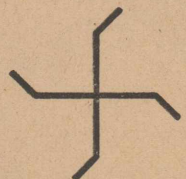

Throckmorton Man Becomes Royalty Owner At 91

W. E. Parmenter of Throckmorton took on a new line of business soon after his 91st birthday recently, becoming an oil royalty owner, with the completion of the first well drilled on his property near Throckmorton.

While the well was being drilled he made a daily trip to the location to watch progress. Now he also makes daily trips to town for the mail and to keep in touch with affairs generally.

For his 91st birthday party there was a family dinner with five generations of the Parmenter family present and a reception for friends, but Parmenter drew the line at candles on his birthday cake.

The Throckmorton nonagenarian was born in a log cabin near Jacksonville, Ill., but has lived in Texas since he was 14. He began to farm before coming to Texas. His father's death when W. E. was 6 made it necessary for him to work at an early age.

He made his first corn crop on their 30-acre farm when he was 11.

Their trip to Texas was by boat from Quincy, Ill., to near Clarksville, Texas, on the Red River. The boat stopped about 10 miles from Clarksville and the remainder of the trip was made by ox wagon. The first year in Texas they arrived too late for a crop, so the family started building a house and W. E. worked for a farmer for 50 cents a day "and dinner." He made some cattle drives in his late teens. In 1882 he married Miss Ella Blackburn. Two daughters were born to them, and they went to West Texas, spending a year in Abilene, and in 1889 they moved to Kerrville, where his wife died. He then went to Bonham and again farmed. In 1889 he married Miss Mary Sue Brolles, and two

daughters and a son were born to them.

The Parmenter family lived several years in the Indian Territory and moved from there to Throckmorton in 1901. Mrs. Parmenter died a number of years ago.

Parmenter was tax assessor for Throckmorton County from 1904 to 1908, and was county agent in 1918.

He served as county Democratic chairman for a number of years, and has been active in the Methodist Church all his adult life. He has had a total of 50 year's service as a steward on church boards, and has been an honorary member of the Throckmorton church for many years.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons By DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

DEVOTIONAL READING: I Peter 2: 19-25.

SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 42:1-4; 50: 4-9; 52:15-53:12; Jeremiah 38:1-13.

Love So Amazing

Lesson for November 13, 1949

LONG AGO riding in his slow chariot through the southern sands, a puzzled reader with Isaiah 53 in his hands asked the question other readers have asked ever since: Does the prophet speak of himself or of some other?

The answer given by Philip (see Acts 8) has been the answer of the church ever since: This prophecy can be understood only in the light from Calvary's Cross.

Philip did not say, and we need not insist, that the prophet had Jesus, and Jesus only, in mind when he wrote.

What we do say is that while these words might have described some one the prophet knew, might have described the whole nation of Israel, might even have described himself, still the words make but a poor picture of any one else, compared with the picture they make of Jesus.

THE SCARLET THREAD ISAIAH 53 has been in the center of the church's thinking about Christ from the beginning. It may be said to run like a scarlet thread through the New Testament. It was in the back of the minds of Paul and John and Peter alike. This great prophecy sheds a light on what otherwise had been a black opaque blot—the death of Christ.

What would otherwise be simply a horrible tragedy, perhaps the greatest tragedy of history—the perfect case of complete injustice, the final evidence that there is no God, in the light of Isaiah 53 becomes a center of glory.

Instead of being ashamed of the cross on which Jesus died, the church sings, "In the love of Christ I glory." . . . "Gross so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all."

We believe that Christ suffered not for his own but for others' sake. Suffering, not forced but willingly undergone, suffering not as mere pain but that others might be saved, suffering on behalf of others and for love of them—this is the key to the riddle of existence, this is the key to the heart of God.

Not Christ Alone IF CHRIST'S MEN had refused to follow where he led, if all Christians had been willing to let him carry, alone, the burden of the world's sin and grief, there never would have been a Christianity—for there would never have been any Christians. Peter and James and the rest of the apostles would have refused to die for Jesus' sake. The noble army of martyrs would have been an ignoble army of cowards.

No missionary ever would have left home and comforts and country; no mother would have laid down her life for her children; the unselfish service of those who have cared for the sick and the orphaned would never have been done; indeed, had no one ever been willing to suffer for the benefit of others, one wonders whether the world could have even held together this long.

Christ died that the world might live, yes; but others also had to die to make his death avail. He died for Africa, that Africans might live; but Africans died till men like Livingstone and Schweitzer and many a less famous man and woman also went out and lived there in loneliness and died in pain.

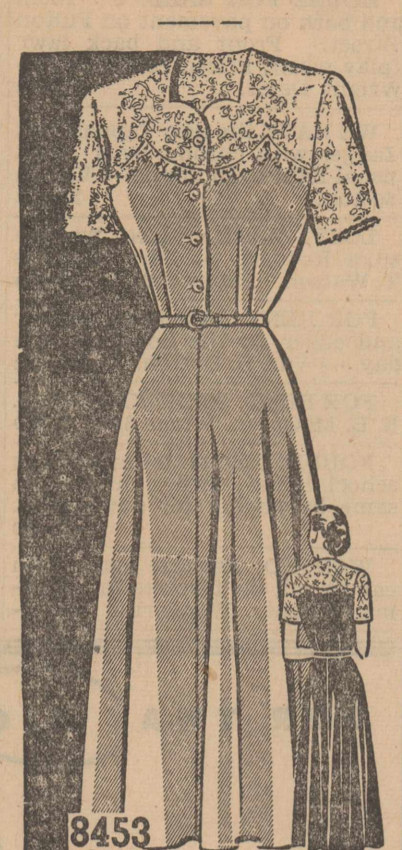
Christ died for the little children of the poor, but until the Salvation Army and others like them went down into the slums and suffered there with and for them, those poor little people died without so much as dreaming that God might love them.

Christ died for all the lepers in the world; but until a Father Damien, and others no less Christ-like, went among the outcast lepers and became outcasts themselves for the love of Christ, those lepers died in the dark.

"Let Him Take His Own Cross Daily" YES, Isaiah 53 pictures the self-sacrifice of our Lord, above all. But any one who has any intention of being a true servant of God must be willing to find his own life-direction right here. The world does not need more pain; it does need those who will suffer pain to serve others in Christ's name.

Committees Get New Titles

R. C. Buckles, Chairman of the Sherman County PMA Committee, announces a new regulation made by the U. S. Department of Agriculture that designates the county and township farm elected committees as PMA committees. Originally, the name of AAA was applied to the national, state and local committees, meaning Agricultural Adjustment Administration, explained Mr. Buckles.

In 1936 amendments designated the farm program as the Agricultural Conservation Program, the name of ACP applied to local committees under county activities into the Production and Marketing Administration which operated through commodity and service branches. The State Committees were designated as PMA Committees, but this did not apply to local committees.

County and community committees have always acted as the field force in administering all farm programs. This new ruling will be a distinct advantage, said Buckles, in harmonizing all activities of the farm program from the national administration down to the county and community elected committees under one name, P. M. A.

U. S. Now in Position To Drop Atomic Bomb Anywhere in Europe

LONDON.—The first American superfortress group with the know-how for atomic bombing arrived in England and the United States is in position to drop an atom bomb anywhere in Europe on short notice.

Air force officers revealed that the famous 509th "atom bomb" group flew to this front-line Atlantic pact base for training with its specially equipped, specially trained crews.

Included in the 509th's highly trained personnel were at least two veterans of the history-making missions that dropped atom bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, one air force source said.

The disclosure of the 509th's arrival increased speculation among foreign military observers here as to how quickly and how effectively the United States third air division, based in England, could swing into atomic action.

It was learned the group's 30 planes did not come equipped with the special racks needed for carrying atom bombs. But an air force official said "it would take only 5½ hours to install the racks once the planes are here."

Some foreign military observers believed the air force also had the makings of atom bombs in England. But others thought it most likely the bombs were kept in the United States.

The group's B-29's, with a bombing radius of more than 2,000 miles, could reach any target in Europe from their base here.

The planes, like the other superfortresses based here, were equipped with the latest radar equipment enabling them to strike even through a complete cloud cover.

The three squadrons of the 509th will be maintained at 90 per cent operational strength in England. That means nine of the 10 planes in each squadron will be kept ready to go into action, real or simulated, at all times.

Sphinxes With Human-Like Heads Are Found at Luxor

CAIRO.—A broad avenue lined with sphinxes whose heads bear human likenesses has been found at Luxor beneath a pavement which hid it for 1,750 years.

The find was by M. Zakaria Gonnem, chief inspector of antiquities for upper Egypt, throws new light on the grandeur of the ancient Pharaonic city of Thebes.

Thebes was built on the Nile south of here more than 3,000 years ago. It was the capital of a powerful line of Pharaohs whose ancestors liberated Egypt from northern invaders. Present day Luxor, a winter resort and storehouse of history, stands among its ruins. Just across the Nile is the "valley of the kings," where the tomb and treasures of Tutankhamen were found in 1922.

The remains of two great temples have attracted visitors to the site for centuries. One is the temple of Karnak, which was the earthly palace of the Theban god Amon. The other is the temple of Luxor, the god's "suburban home." In Pharaonic times, during an annual 12-day festival called Opet, priests carried statues of Amon, his wife and son in the sacred barques from the main palace to their suburban establishment.

Three kilometers separate the temples. It is known, from hieroglyphs and sculpture, that they once were connected by a broad avenue lined on each side with stone sphinxes. The road was built originally by the Pharaoh Amenhotep III, father of King Akhnaton, ill-fated advocate of a single benevolent god. Its beginnings, bordered by ram-headed sphinxes, were uncovered some time ago in front of the Temple of Karnak. Most of its length remains buried beneath the debris of successive civilizations.
