Mideast Peace Talks Given Renewed Hope

BY TELEPHONE, and in meetings on two continents, President Carter and his diplomats sought Monday to head off a breakdown in the Egyptian-Israeli peace talks. Egypt's Anwar Sadat reportedly considered but then dropped the idea of calling his negotiators home from Washington.

Egyptian Prime Minister Mustapha Khalil said the talks were going "not badly."
Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin arrived in Jerusalem from a U.S.-Canadian tour and said his government would be reviewing American and Egyptian proposals for resolving the central dispute in the negotiations — whether and how to link an Egyptian-Israeli treaty to a solution of the Palestinian issue.

Begin To Convene Cabinet
Begin is to convene his Cabinet on Thursday for a full-scale review of the talks and Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan, one of Israel's top negotiators in Washington, will fly back to Jerusalem to report. It was announced that Israel's other ranking delegate, Defense Minister Ezer Weizman, will remain in Washington.
State Department spokesman George Sherman said Egypt's acting foreign minister, Boutros Ghali, would go to Cairo "for brief consultations" while Defense Minister Kamal Hassan Ali, who heads the Egyptian negotiators, stays in Washington.

Carter, in a televised interview on the Public Broadcasting Service, spoke of the talks being "bogged down" in legalism and language with both the Israelis and Egyptians being stubborn. "I wouldn't want to start saying who is being more stubborn," he said.
Begin, speaking with reporters at Ben Gurion Airport, gave no details of what he called a "long and serious meeting" with Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance in New York Sunday night. At that meeting, Vance presented an American proposal for settling the "linkage" question.

Sadat, Advisers Meet
In Egypt, President Sadat and his advisers met in the Suez Canal city of Ismailia and a top Egyptian source who asked not to be identified said there was "bad news" and the recall of the delegation from Washington was "possible."
But Prime Minister Khalil denied the report and Cairo radio said Ghali would return to Egypt Wednesday to confer with Sadat.

Khalil said Sadat had spoken with Carter by telephone for the second time in two days, and Vice President Hosny Mubarak telephoned Kamal Hassan Ali in Washington. Sadat also met with U.S. Ambassador Hermann Eilts.
If Sadat had thought about recalling his team from Washington, it was not known what caused him to change his mind.
Asked whether the talks were going badly, Khalil replied, "Not badly. In anything like this there are differences... we try to explain to the other side our point of view and our logic."
No top-level sessions were scheduled in Washington. U.S. Mideast envoy Alfred L. Atherton had an afternoon meeting with the Egyptians.

In their meeting with Eilts, Egyptian officials explained their viewpoint on the necessity for a link between the bilateral
treaty and progress on the Palestinian issue, Cairo radio said.
The Israelis have balked at including a firm link in the peace treaty, but the Egyptians have proposed tying the treaty to a specific timetable for establishing an autonomous Palestinian entity in the West Bank and Gaza.
Reports in Egypt and Israel say differences remain on other issues as well — conflicting claims over oil in the Sinai Peninsula, a precise timetable for Israeli

First Tax-Tardy Group Hit By Computer Suits

IF YOU neglected to pay city-school property taxes on your automobile in recent years, there is a chance you've just been sued.

With computers doing most of the paperwork, the City of Lubbock and Lubbock Independent School District Monday filed lawsuits against about 100 car owners over allegedly delinquent tax accounts.
They represent the first batch under a computer-driven collection system that eventually may be producing 15,000 to 20,000 suits annually.
The city-school tax office simultaneously mailed to defendants letters telling them that if they pay up by Nov. 23, they will save at least \$8 in court costs.

In the past, letters threatening a lawsuit over a small amount of back taxes on personal property often have been ignored, tax officials say. One reason, they admit, is that the threats rarely were carried out.
Letters "No Bluff"
But this time is different, tax department administrators said.
"These letters are obviously no bluff," said collections supervisor Roland Wilkinson. "This time, it's the real thing."
Indeed, enclosed in each defendant's letter is a copy of the suit filed against him. The suits describe the kinds of cars and the years and amounts of taxes of the accounts involved.
Each suit is for less than \$200, so it can be handled in a justice-of-the-peace court. The computer system is not programmed to sue on larger accounts, since they must be filed in a district court or county court-at-law and involve more paperwork.
"I am enthusiastic about the new system," John Brooks, chief tax assessor-collector, said. "I feel this will answer a lot of questions about the equitability of our delinquent tax collection efforts."
Tax Paying Incentive
Equitability was the rationale of the school board and city council early this year when they authorized Brooks to proceed with the computerized in-house back-tax drive. School board president Charles Waters said that cracking down on delinquent bills "will make the community a whole lot happier about paying taxes."

Most Americans In Iran Staying Despite Threats

AHWAZ, Iran (AP) — Scores of Americans working here in the southern oil fields of Iran have been the targets of anonymous threats that they will be killed unless they leave Iran before Dec. 1.

Since the threats began two weeks ago, about 250 U.S. nationals, mainly women and children, have fled this dusty desert town on the northern edge of the Persian Gulf. This vast oil belt is the key to the economy of Iran, the world's second largest oil exporting nation.
But most Americans randomly interviewed said they plan to ignore the threats, which have come on the coattails of the bloody anti-government rioting and political turmoil that has swept Iran for the last 10 months and taken an estimated 1,100 Iranian lives.
Some said they were nervous, and few of those interviewed would allow their names to be used.
Over the weekend, the bloodiest demonstrations occurred since the shah appointed a military government last Monday. The Pars news agency reported that about 20 persons were killed and many injured.
No one has claimed responsibility for the death threats, distributed on photocopies of hand-printed leaflets that read, "Warning — don't get killed (sic). Leave this country before first of December."
Several Americans said the leaflets were handed out by Iranian children in the streets, stuck on their cars or stuffed into their shopping bags in stores.

Moslem Holy Month
December is a Moslem holy month when religious fervor runs high. Some Americans here speculate the threats may have been made by Moslems who oppose Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi because he encouraged reforms that they believe are contrary to Islamic teachings.
"We're not taking them seriously," said a senior U.S. executive with the Oil Service Co. of Iran, which operates the oilfields and refineries for the state-run National Iranian Oil Co.
"Most of the folks I know plan to bring their kids over from the states for Christmas," said one Texan. "We've got plenty of protection from the military and we certainly don't feel threatened."
There are about 2,000 Americans in Ahwaz, and 45,000 throughout the country. There are about 50,000 Europeans in Iran, and overall, some 700,000 foreigners.

Oil Workers Strike
The threats were made after the 37,000 Iranian oil workers launched a nationwide anti-government strike on Oct. 31, an unprecedented walkout which slashed the country's daily oil production to one-sixth of its six million barrels and cost the country \$60 million a day in revenues.
The Americans and other foreigners prevented the collapse of the industry and boosted output to 2.1 million barrels a day over the weekend.
This antagonized the shah, leading to political opponents who seek broad democratic reforms in his 37-year authoritarian rule.

Iran Remains Cautiously Calm After Shah Weathers Threat

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi appeared Monday to have weathered the threat to his 37-year reign caused by weeks of anti-government demonstrations and a crippling strike aimed at cutting Iran's lifeblood, its flow of oil.
Tehran remained calm Monday under the watch of heavily armed troops in key districts of the city and a strictly enforced dusk-to-dawn curfew.
Most shops and businesses were open and government agencies and public utilities operated normally.
Foreign workers and army personnel have taken over the oil fields under the watch of several thousand troops armed with tanks and machine guns. Production has been brought up from a low of 950,

000 barrels a day to 2.7 million, state oil industry officials said.
Normal production before the 37,000 Iranian oil workers walked off the job Oct. 31 to demand higher pay and to join the anti-government movement was 6 million barrels a day.
Government Position Bolstered
The position of the military government also was bolstered by the failure of a one-day general strike called in Tehran by the popular Moslem leader, Ayatollah Khomeini, in exile in Paris.
In Washington, a State Department spokesman refrained from criticizing the shah for the weekend arrest of his opposition political leader, Karim Sanjaby, saying the "emergency situation" inherent is "fully apparent."

Reagan Says Nixon Opinions 'Valuable'
NEW IBERIA, La. (AP) — Ronald Reagan says that if he were president, he would value Richard Nixon's advice on foreign and domestic affairs.
He said advice from Nixon, the only man ever to resign the presidency, "would be valuable to anyone" and that President Carter should listen to it.
Reagan unsuccessfully sought the Republican nomination for president in 1976 and is considered a possible 1980 candidate.
The former governor of California addressed the New Iberia Chamber of Commerce Monday and handed out civic service awards at the chamber's annual banquet.
Nixon was guest of honor at a reception at Shreveport this past weekend and then delivered a Veterans Day speech in Biloxi, Miss. He said he intended to speak out on foreign and domestic affairs when he left his views were needed.
But while Reagan said Nixon's opinions should be valued by those in office, he said the former president should not become a spokesman for the Republican Party.
"It's questionable whether that would be helpful," he told reporters at a pre-banquet news conference.

SNOW-PLAGUED AREAS DUE TO REMAIN COLD

A STORM that unloaded heavy snow over the Rocky Mountains and northern Great Plains during the weekend drifted into Canada on Monday but Upper Midwestwesterners were told not to expect an immediate respite from the cold.
Temperatures were at the freezing level from the northern Rockies to Lake Superior, leaving scant chance the snow accumulation would melt.
The last of the heavy snow fell in eastern North Dakota and northern Minnesota Monday night. Light snow fell in the northern Rockies.
Forecaster John Bottomley of the National Weather Service, Minneapolis, said, "The storm isn't as severe as we had anticipated, and the winds aren't going to be as high as we thought."
Travel Advisory Continued
A winter storm warning for northwestern and north-central Minnesota was discontinued but a travel advisory was in effect for the northern third of Minnesota and for western, central and northeastern South Dakota.
Meanwhile, Monday's unseasonably warm temperatures that climbed to 66

degrees in the Lubbock area are expected to be forced to much cooler levels today, as a surface ridge of high pressure moves in to the area, bringing a 50 percent chance for rain.
Forecasters are predicting today's high to reach into the mid 50s this afternoon, before dropping to near 30 tonight and rising into the mid 40s Wednesday.
Winds should be northeasterly at 10 to 15 mph.
Slightly Warmer Thursday
A slight warming trend, however, is expected to move into West Texas by Thursday, bringing in afternoon temperatures reaching to near 60 that should be accompanied by lows in the mid 20s through Saturday. The warming trend is expected to continue through the weekend.
Scattered showers that fell over portions of southeast and northeastern portions of Texas Monday, are expected to spread into West Texas today, as another cold front pushes in a new wave of moisture from the west.
Light snow and drizzle fell in much of Minnesota and the Dakotas Sunday and Monday. International Falls had received about 4 inches in 18 hours.
Temperatures were to dive Monday night to 10 to 15 in northwestern Minnesota and in the low 20s in the southeastern part of the state.
North Dakota snowfall ranged from 3 to 6 inches.
Lemmon, S.D., had 9 inches of snow accumulated, all but 1-2 inches of it from the diminishing weekend storm. Some schools in northwest South Dakota were closed Monday because of blowing snow.

County Vote Recounts Ordered

JOHN HILL and Bob Krueger, losers in gubernatorial and senatorial elections last week, won court orders Monday for recounts of ballots in Lubbock County.
County commissioners must wait out the results of the recount before they can canvass and certify the results.
Monday's action was part of a statewide recount initiative by Hill and Krueger. Lubbock County commissioners have tentative plans to start the procedure Friday morning.
Under state law the candidates are entitled to a recount because they lost by less than five percentage points.
County Judge Rod Shaw contacted

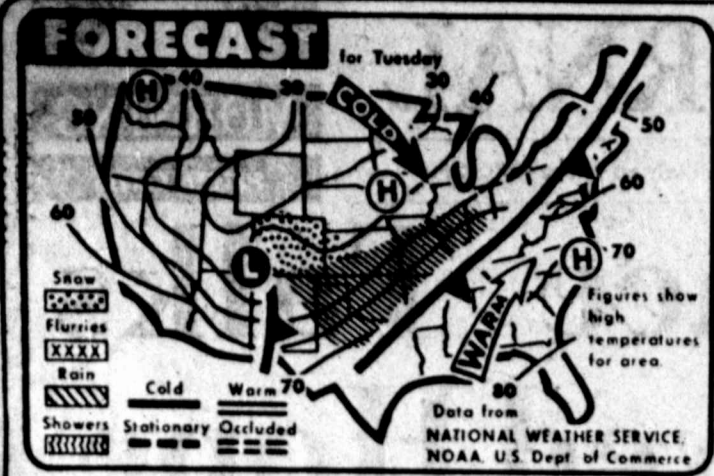
Tom Eschberger of Computer Election Systems in Dallas about taking part in the recount and was told Eschberger was not certain when he would be available to help with the procedure.
Supervisors Named
The petitions ask that the same persons who supervised the election oversee the recount. They are Bill McCullough, county computer center director and presiding election judge, County Clerk Frank Guess and Eschberger.
Attorneys Don Hunt and Joe Boerner represented Bill Clements and John Tower, the winning candidates for governor and senator, and Johnny Splawn represented Hill at the afternoon session of the commissioners court.

On the order by 237th District Judge John R. McFall, representatives of Krueger and Hill are allowed to examine the computer program used in counting the ballots, the materials used in making test counts and the ballot assemblies for all the punch card ballot voting machines.
"The ballots for all election precincts... shall be recounted, using the same methods and materials as in the original count, after the above-requested examinations and recount of the test materials have been conducted," Judge McFall ordered. "The recount shall be conducted by and under the direction of the same person who directed the original count of the ballots and on the same equipment as the original count, with the petitioner or

his designated representatives present."
The order also stipulated that the canvass be delayed until the recount is completed.

NBC Drops Probe Into 'Brainwashing'

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC officials said Monday the network has halted an investigation into alleged religious-cult "brainwashing," but not because of pressure from some of the groups being studied.

The New York Post said Monday that self-styled religious groups, including Synanon, the Church of Scientology and Hare Krishna, pressured NBC to abandon a planned report on such groups. The newspaper said an investigative unit had spent several weeks on the study when the project was halted by executive producer Joseph Angotti.

Lester Crystal, president of NBC News, said Monday, "NBC News has not been pressured by anyone to drop work on this story."

Crystal said Angotti stopped the report on cults because "the brief time available on Segment 3 (the 'NBC Nightly News' investigative unit) would not permit adequate treatment of a story involving so many diverse organizations."

He said, "The activities of Synanon and other groups will continue to be covered by NBC News. We will continue to follow every aspect of the Synanon and cult stories and will put them on the air as development warrants," he said.

An NBC spokesman said the network received "a few phone calls, letters and telegrams" criticizing the planned report.

The network produced a three-part series in June describing Synanon's evolution from a drug-rehabilitation program to a multimillion-dollar religion.

On Sunday, five Synanon members demonstrated outside the Manhattan apartment of NBC President Fred Silverman. They carried signs, one of which read: "Poor Freddie is scared of his own NBC fiction."

Last week other reputed cult members allegedly went to Silverman's apartment and spoke into his intercom.

Two members of the cult recently were charged with planting a 4 1/2-foot rattlesnake which bit a California attorney, Paul Morantz, who had won a \$300,000 lawsuit against Synanon.

Private School Supporters To Protest Federal Plans

The local Citizens for Tax-Free Private Education meet tonight to continue mapping strategy for protesting proposed government regulations which the group believes, would cripple private schools.

The organization will meet at 7:30 p.m. in the lower auditorium of Trinity Church, 7902 Canton Ave., to discuss the rules proposed by the Internal Revenue Service, said Millie Monte, a spokesman for the group.

She said the organization's interview committee will screen applicants who want to represent the group at an IRS public hearing Dec. 5 in Washington, D.C.

In the Aug. 22 Federal Register, the IRS published proposed regulations by which "private schools established after integration of the late 1950s would be presumed by to discriminatory and would be required to meet IRS quotas and standards before being restored to tax-exempt status," Mrs. Monte said.

To regain their tax-exempt status, private schools would have to actively recruit more minority students and teachers — through such things as scholarships and minority-oriented studies.

Mrs. Monte said private schools here are "not opposed to integration."

"The real issue is opposition to any federal control of private schools," she said. The IRS rules also represent a threat to hospitals, colleges and ultimately churches themselves, she added.

Meanwhile, Lisa Hughes, 6, and her brother Albert, 7, who witnessed the incident, began throwing rocks at the man and told their dog, Snoopy, to go after him.

Christina's sister, Kimberly, 10, who had been looking for Christina, also saw what was happening and joined in the rock-throwing. The children said the man released the girl and fled.

Power Plant Workers Hurt In Explosion

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (AP) — A boiler exploded at a power station Monday, blowing out the building's sides and injuring as many as 24 persons, authorities said.

Bernard Westfall, associate administrator for West Virginia University Hospital in Morgantown, said 18 of the injured were taken there, including one with severe burns who later was transferred to Pittsburgh, Pa.

An additional eight injured were taken to Monongalia General Hospital in Morgantown, according to David Woodrum, the hospital's executive vice president.

Lyle K. Corder, spokesman for Monongahela Power Co. in Fairmont, one of the owners of the Fort Martin station, said it

was at first believed that one of the two coal-fired boilers at the plant exploded.

"But now there is a possibility that both blew up," he said.

He said firemen quickly brought the resulting fire under control.

Woodrum said it was not possible to determine immediately the severity of the injuries.

"With burns it sometimes takes a couple of days to ascertain the extent of injuries," he said.

Corder said the power plant is owned jointly by Monongahela, West Penn Power, Potomac Edison and Duquesne Light. All but Duquesne Light are part of the Allegheny Power System.

Attorneys Prepare For Key Witness

HOUSTON (AP) — Prosecutors began on Monday to lay the groundwork for calling the man expected to be their key witness in the murder-for-hire trial of Fort Worth millionaire Cullen Davis.

State attorneys used the testimony of Special Agent Joseph Gray of Dallas as a "technical predicate" for what promises to be a long and turbulent appearance by FBI informant David McCrory.

Prosecutors said McCrory would take the stand today.

The prosecution says McCrory, 40, was the go-between in a plot by Davis to hire a professional gunman to kill the judge who presided in Davis' sputtering divorce case.

Prosecutors called Gray to provide the legal avenue by which they intend to introduce physical evidence critical to the case — material from videotape cameras and hidden tape recorders that the prosecution says recorded a meeting last Aug. 20 between Davis and McCrory.

Davis, 45, contends that his estranged wife, Priscilla, conspired with McCrory and others in an elaborate scheme to frame him.

Earlier Monday, an FBI photographer told the court he chemically treated a photograph of the murder victim before the snapshot was delivered to Davis. He said the Polaroid picture, depicting the body of the divorce judge, was dusted

with fluorescent powder in hopes of proving later that Davis had handled the photograph.

However, it was brought out in Davis' bond hearing that ultraviolet testing of Davis' hands showed no legally significant traces of the powder. Investigators previously explained that Davis was permitted to wash his hands after being fingerprinted at police headquarters a short time after his arrest last August.

Former SS Troopers Charged In Cologne

COLOGNE, West Germany (AP) — Two former Nazi SS elite guard officers went on trial here Monday charged with ordering executions of at least 500 Polish prisoners during World War II.

Martin Patz, 61, and Karl Mising, 65, are accused of abetting murder in the shootings of prisoners at Mokotow jail during the Warsaw uprising of August 1944.

More than 100 persons have been called to give testimony in the Cologne State court proceeding which is expected to last at least one year, a court spokesman said.

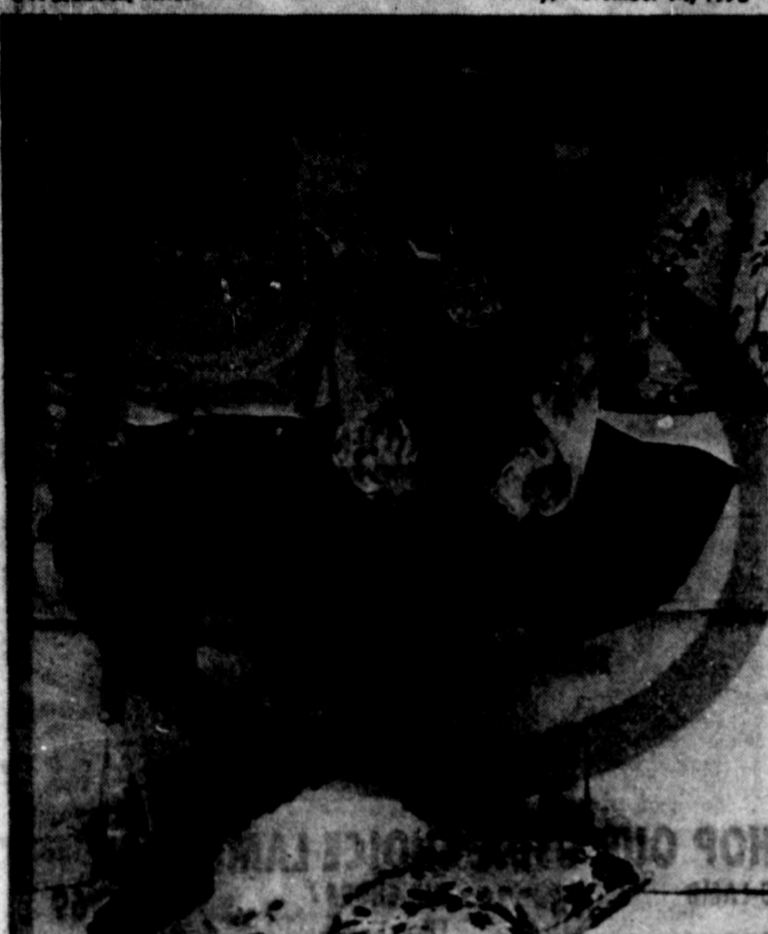

He does not make his two-spade contract. West selects the 10 of hearts as his opening lead. It doesn't matter what is played from dummy. East wins the trick, cashes a second heart and gives West a heart ruff. The defense will still get one trump trick as well as one in each minor suit.

One no-trump would go down two so South has saved something. He was also very unlucky. Both heart honors were wrong. The man with short trumps got in a ruff and the defense had no way to go wrong in either diamonds or clubs.

Adults Volunteer For Public School Program

The Volunteers in Public Schools program is a way parents and teachers say to the students "We're a team," describes Marjorie Rogers, a volunteer coordinator.

VIPS, as it is known, brings parents and other community volunteers into the schools. From a very small beginning in just a few schools about four years ago, the concept has spread to about half of the elementary schools in the Lubbock Independent School District. It is still spreading.

"Each school is a little bit different and so we tailor the program to fit each school's needs," says Linda Kinman, City PTA coordinator for the volunteer endeavor. Volunteers may be involved in such projects as marking math papers; coloring, cutting and putting together materials for a learning center; assisting with all sorts of jobs at the kindergarten

level, and just generally being helpful to the students and teachers.

Parents, retired teachers, students considering careers in teaching while enrolled at Texas Tech University or Lubbock Christian College, and other community volunteers work together to give the school program that little something extra in the way of individual attention or additional resource materials.

"Parents can see the good that is coming out of the time they give and the teachers are enthusiastic also," reports Mrs. Kinman.

"Being involved helps parents appreciate what it takes to do things like getting paint smocks on thirty youngsters," explains Mrs. Rogers, who works in the Murfee Elementary School program.

In many cases the volunteers can work with small groups of students or even with individuals on a one-to-one basis. In addition to working directly with students, volunteers assist teachers by

preparing needed materials for learning centers and enrichment activities.

In a few schools, the program involves parents who have very small children and must stay at home with them, by giving the parents directions and the basic stuff for making audio-visual resources and special packets designed for individual student use. Bayless Elementary School also provides a special room where volunteers can work.

Parents of children who are now traveling to different schools are taking the VIPS program along. In several such situations, the program is just beginning. An example is the pairing of Murfee and Wheatley Elementary Schools. Murfee was among the first to have the volunteer program and now Audrey McDonald, a resident of the southside community, is the organizing coordinator for the new Wheatley group. She views her role simply as helping the Wheatley neighborhood start its own program. The coordinator sees this as a fine opportunity for parents to work together on a common project, helping to facilitate their children's education.

Mrs. Kinman hopes to have a workshop for all the volunteers in the district before very long. She sees this as a way in which the volunteers can learn from each other.

Another aspect of the volunteer program is the service given by students from the local university and college. In addition to making the same kinds of contributions to the total education program of the public schools as other participants, this group of students has an opportunity to learn more about possible careers. These students often receive credit toward courses in education for their service, but are called volunteers

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What does pulse rate have to do with blood pressure? — N.A.

No simple answer to this one. The best way to understand is to know what the doctor is trying to determine when he measures each — pulse rate and the blood pressure.

The pulse rate tells him how fast the heart is contracting, sending surges of fresh blood into the arteries. Normally, this is approximately five ounces of blood about 72 times a minute. Blood pressure tells how efficiently the artery walls are withstanding the volume of blood. One person may have a normal pulse, but because of poor arteries have high blood pressure. Another may have a fast pulse with normal pressure.

Pulse and blood pressure are not always directly related. An overactive thyroid gland may cause fast pulse and be accompanied by high blood pressure. An infant has a fast heart rate, but blood pressure is usually normal. But an elderly person may have a slow pulse with high blood pressure. The combinations are many.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: A friend insists that one should not drink any liquids for at least 15 minutes after each meal because this would certainly wash all the vitamins out of the stomach. Is there any truth to this? — Mrs. M.F.

Not true. The body is quite efficient in absorbing the vitamins it needs from our food. And, in fact, it does this lower down in the digestive system — in the intestines. It is good to drink liquids with meals.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am getting married to my second cousin and I was wondering if our children would have a greater chance of having birth defects. — C.G.

No objection to the marriage of second cousins. The risk of birth defects is no greater than that in the marriage of unrelated couples. For readers who are not good at genetics, a second cousin might be a mother's mother's brother's son's son.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I was examined for a sore knee. The doctor said I had calcified tendons in the joint. How does the calcium get there, from my diet or what? — J.F.

More likely from an old injury or from continuing stress. Calcium deposits are part of a healing process. I doubt diet had anything to do with it. They can be removed surgically, if necessary.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: To the writer who

said she was a painter but got headaches from it, I found out I was allergic to the turpentine. I switched to one of the substitutes. Tell her to try one of them and not to give up her painting. — J.B.

Thanks for the suggestion.

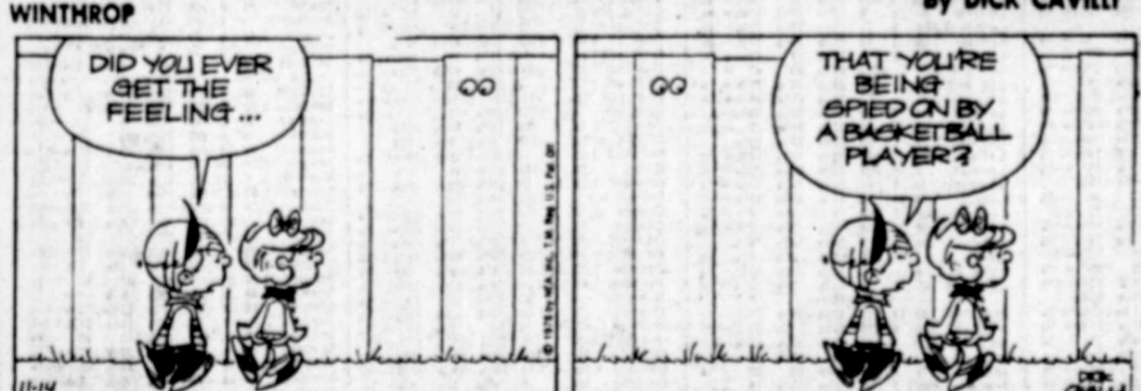

Mart Drops 15 Points

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market, beset by recession worries and a steady climbing prime rate, dropped sharply Monday in selling that left the Dow Jones industrial average at a seven-month low.

Gambling issues took the heaviest losses, but virtually all major stock groups shared in the decline.

The Dow average of 30 blue chips tumbled 15.08 to 792.01, its lowest close since it finished at 775.21 last April 13.

Losers outdistanced gainers by more than a 4-1 spread at the New York Stock Exchange.

A handful of banks in Chicago and Philadelphia raised their prime lending rates Monday from 10 1/4 to 11 percent, continuing the sharp rise in recent months in the basic charge on blue chip loans.

Analysts said the market might also have been unsettled by reports suggesting that peace talks between Egypt and Israel were going badly.

King Arrives In Washington

WASHINGTON (AP) — King Hassan of Morocco arrived here Monday for a two-day state visit after touching off a mild controversy by asserting that President Carter has offered guarantees that the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, will be returned to full Arab control.

U.S. officials quickly denied that Carter had made any such promises.

Hassan, who was greeted at Andrews Air Force Base by Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance and a delegation of some 50 cheering supporters, is one of the most pro-western and anti-Soviet leaders in the Arab world.

As the first Arab leader to endorse the visit to Jerusalem a year ago by Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, he is highly regarded by the Carter administration. Hassan holds his first meeting with Carter Tuesday morning.

Hassan made his statement about a U.S. guarantee of eventual Arab sovereignty in occupied Israeli territory during an interview published Monday with The New York Times. He based his information on a meeting he had with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat after the Camp David summit.

In denying that Carter had offered any secret guarantees, U.S. officials said Hassan's version of the U.S. position probably resulted from a "problem of semantics."

The Camp David agreements provide for eventual Palestinian self-rule in the West Bank but the final status of the area is to be decided in negotiations. As for Jerusalem, Israeli forces occupied the eastern part of the city in 1967 and the United States believes a formula should be struck for ensuring Arab sovereignty over the area without dividing the city.

Sisters Jump Six Floors To Deaths

NEW YORK (AP) — A traditional Chinese service will be held privately for the two sisters who jumped six floors to their death last week, reportedly because they were forbidden to see their boyfriends.

A spokesman at the Wah Wing Sang Funeral Home said Monday that the bodies of Betty Hwang, 16, and her sister, Jean, 13, have already been cremated. He declined to say when or give any other information about services beyond saying tradition would be observed.

Neighbors of the girls on Manhattan's East Side were mostly silent in the aftermath of the deaths. One, who asked for anonymity, said she had not seen any

members of the Hwang family lately.

"I don't blame them if they're hiding," she said. "Such a tragedy. They were such cheerful girls."

Anthony Elias, who lives downstairs from the family, said he spoke with the girls an hour before their fatal plunge.

He said the younger, Jean, looked frightened.

"I know she didn't want to jump," he said.

He said he thought the sisters really wanted no more than that "their father pay attention to them."

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Carter administration is braced for an increase in world oil prices of at least 5 percent, and maybe 10 percent, which would raise the price of gasoline and home heating oil.

Pilot, Tech Student Die In Plane Crash

A National Transportation Safety Board investigation into the early morning crash Monday of a twin-engine private plane near Lubbock International Airport will continue today, although investigators say they have found "nothing wrong with the plane itself" so far.

Lambert radioed into Lubbock Approach Control at 2:21 a.m. that he was making an instrument landing. However, radio contact was lost at 2:35 a.m. and the airport tower alerted emergency crews that there was a possible plane crash, Mydlow said.

Average \$12.70 Barrel

Homes For Lion Cubs Offered

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — State game officials will not have to destroy four orphaned mountain lion cubs after all, they said Monday.

Nationwide publicity about the cubs last week brought calls from across the country with offers to take one or more of them.

Bud Bristow, regional director of the Arizona Game and Fish Department, said that since the story appeared in newspapers, about 1,000 calls have come in. Many were from private citizens who simply wanted a cub as a pet.

But others were from zoos and animal handlers and the cubs probably will go to those types of operations, Bristow said. But first, the 2-week-old animals must grow up.

They were turned over to state game officials by a hunter who told them he shot and killed the kittens' mother after it sprang at him. Bristow said the unidentified hunter was distressed at having killed a lioness with young to care for, although the kill was legal.

Because mountain lion cubs must be taught by their mothers to hunt for food, the young animals could not be turned loose again, because they would starve, Bristow said.

He said state officials thought placement would be difficult because there is an abundance of mountain lions in zoos. But the telephone calls that have come in since Friday showed that there is plenty of room for the cubs, he said.

Q. Years ago I wrote to you and, through your column, you advised me to "stay put" with the 250 shares of stock of a large New York bank I owned. At that time, my broker and many of my friends told me to "diversify" and not keep all my eggs in one basket. I followed your advice. The stock has since doubled in price and has an excellent dividend yield.

In the meantime, I have accumulated \$48,000 in 7 1/2 percent certificates and \$12,000 in a 5 1/4 percent savings account. I am retired. My wife and I get along very nicely on my pension and Social Security. Do you still advise me to "stay put"?

A. Certainly — as far as that bank stock is concerned. It was serving you well years ago and is doing even better for you now. Yours is a rather typical story of buying a good stock and staying with it. Why tamper with success?

This column normally preaches diversification — spreading your risk among a number of securities. But diversification is not a hard and fast rule. When you have a good thing going, I say stay with it.

Q. You wrote that a person with an Individual Retirement account or a Keogh Plan won't have to pay income taxes on the money in the IRA or Keogh until you start drawing it out, most likely after retirement.

That is absolutely wrong. A person with an IRA or Keogh must receive or begin to receive distributions no later than age 70 1/2 — even if actual retirement is later. Your statement should be corrected. A number of us have been misled.

A. Gee, I don't want to have a running argument here. But I do feel the words "most likely" covered that point. After all, most people do retire before age 70 1/2.

Because your letterhead identifies you as a doctor, I hope you didn't sign up for a Keogh — self-employed person — retirement plan without studying up on all the details. Another IRA and Keogh provision is that, if you start withdrawing money before age 59 1/2, you pay income taxes plus a 10 percent penalty.

Q. Is there a conservative rule of thumb for when to sell gold or silver, at either a profit or loss? For example, should a person sell when the market price rises 10 percent or falls 10 percent from the purchase price?

A. A good conservative rule is don't buy gold, silver or any other non-income-producing thing. Gold, silver and such are not investments. They are speculations. And speculation — another word for gamble — is not a conservative procedure.

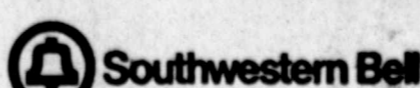

Wounded Witness Identifies Gunman Defendant

Former Brandy's Massage Parlor employee Victoria Jean Simmons Monday identified Leroy Adams as the gunman who entered the business May 19, 1976, and shot her as she was telephoning for help.

"He stood in the doorway of the room I was in and shot at me twice," Mrs. Simmons said. "Then he ran out."

Prosecutor John Kilpatrick asked Mrs. Simmons where she was shot.

"Once in the left hand. That was while I was talking on the phone like this," the tall, 19-year-old brunette said, cupping her left hand near her ear.

"It just missed my head."

The witness said she also was shot in the left knee and still carries a bullet in her leg. She said she was hospitalized for more than two weeks.

Mrs. Simmons was wounded and Adams' wife, Margaret Holt Adams, 48, was killed during a late-afternoon flurry of

gunshots at the 2802 34th St. massage parlor. Mrs. Adams, known as "Brandy," operated the establishment.

Adams, 53, was charged with murdering his wife and with aggravated assault in connection with the shooting of Mrs. Simmons.

He was tried on the murder charge in June, but a mistrial was declared after jurors were unable to reach a guilt or innocence verdict.

The current aggravated assault trial is being conducted before a jury in Judge William R. Shaver's 140th District Court. Testimony in the case began and was completed Monday, and the case was expected to go to the jury today after attorneys' arguments.

Also Monday, Adams took the witness stand to deny he had shot either his wife or Mrs. Simmons. He indicated that the shootings might have resulted from underworld efforts to seize control of the business.

Mrs. Simmons, who said she now operates a massage parlor of her own, testified that Adams came into Brandy's shortly after 5 p.m. the day of the shootings.

She indicated Adams and his wife subsequently met in a west room of the building, while she sat in a northeast room a short distance away. She said she sat by a telephone.

Mrs. Simmons said she heard Mrs. Adams say "Please, Roy, don't" and then heard a gunshot. She said she picked up

the telephone and told the operator there had been a shooting.

It was then, she said, that Adams walked in and shot her.

The witness said she fell to the floor. At further queries from Kilpatrick, Mrs. Simmons said the gunman fired other shots around the room before leaving, indicating that the shots were fired randomly.

The prosecutor asked if the shots which hit her had been aimed at random. "No, he was shooting directly at my head," Mrs. Simmons testified.

Police indicated Mrs. Adams was found lying in the west room with a bullet wound to the chest. They also said a bullet was recovered from a refrigerator in the room in which Mrs. Simmons was wounded and that an apparent bullet hole was observed in a mirror in the room.

Adams said he went to the massage parlor about 5:30 p.m. at the request of his wife.

"When I went into the parlor, then I heard a gunshot," Adams testified.

He said he whirled around, got into his car and left.

The gray-haired defendant indicated he fled because he was frightened and thought he was being "set up."

Adams said he had been informed that "the syndicate" hoped to take over the business and use it as a headquarters for a drug operation.

The defendant said he and his wife had been shot at prior to the incident in question while riding in an automobile.

Adams also testified he was shot last April while inside a club, and it was stipulated that the defendant had been admitted to a local hospital in April for treatment of a gunshot wound.

Police Release Man In Stabbing

A 25-year-old Lubbock man arrested Sunday in connection with the stabbing death of Lindsey "Lynn" Henton Bentley, was released from Lubbock County Jail Monday afternoon.

Police said there was insufficient evidence to hold the man.

Runnin' Raiders Ready

When it comes time tonight for introductions, "No speaks de English" won't suffice.

Texas Tech coach Gerald Myers introduces a new lineup, a new offensive scheme and a new season at Lubbock Coliseum tonight, and he will be introducing a new product also: international basketball.

Myers' Red Raiders, poised for a new season with newcomers and a new running offense, will host the Bulgarian national team at 7:30 p.m., and the two clubs will take the floor for the exhibition-type game using international rules.

It's still two points for a field goal, one for a free throw, but the rules are different somewhat from the college game.

"International teams coming over here for games are fairly common now," said Myers, who helped coach a U.S. team in Russia in August. "But, the Bulgarians — and the Russians and a few others — require that we play international rules. It's in the contract."

So, fans tonight will see a cone-shaped free-throw lanes under the goals, a reduction of free-throw shooting, quick out-of-bounds throw-ins, a 30-second clock, and probably more contact.

And the fans will see the first fruits of Myers' plan to speed up the offensive tempo.

"The fans enjoy it, and the players enjoy it, the Raider coach commented this week. "We don't have a big man for the first time in six years, so we're having to move it around more, get up and down the floor in a hurry. And we have some players with some speed and quickness."

Departed are the Rick Bullocks and the Mike Russells of past seasons. "We have been a power-type team in the past, and I don't exactly know what a fi-

nense team is, but I imagine we'll be closer to that than a power team."

The Raiders will open with a lineup which is not set for the year, at least Myers has indicated that he expects some changes before the conference season starts in January.

But, tonight, he will open with 6-6 Geoff Huston, 6-6 Kent Williams, 6-5 Tread Sanders, 6-8 Ralph Brewster, and 6-6 Ralph McPherson.

Huston is the only center in the lineup, and all except McPherson had starting experience from a year ago. However, Huston and Williams were starters throughout the season when the Raiders posted a 19-10 record.

Williams was the Raiders' second-leading scorer, averaging 13.6 points. Huston averaged 8.4 points.

"This is the group that I'll start," Myers observed, "but I'll come in with the other guys a lot. For one thing, we want to keep fresh people in there all the time; when you run, you can't have tired guys on the court and be effective."

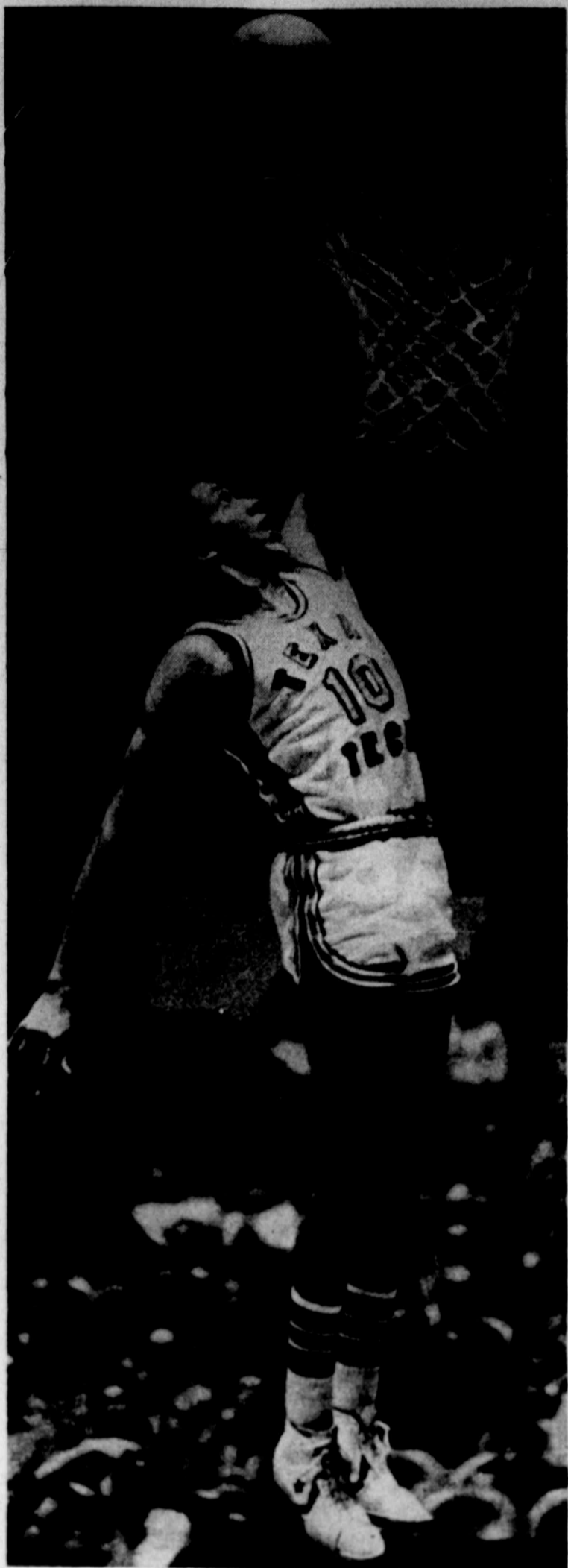
"But, also, we just want to get a look at everybody. That's the big advantage of a game such as this. Our regular season doesn't begin for another couple of weeks (Nov. 27 against Central Oklahoma). We've been working out for a month, and this will give us a chance to see how far we've progressed."

"Then, after this game, we'll have two weeks to correct our mistakes. So, it's a good game for us."

Such games at tonight are approved by the NCAA but have to go in the record as exhibitions and not as regulation games.

The Bulgarians will be a completely new opponent. The team played its first game in the United States Monday night, at Oklahoma.

Myers knows the team is large, since eight of the 12 team members stand 6-6 or better. Tallest is 16-year-old Lubomir Amiorov, who stands 6-11. By comparison, the sophomore McPherson is Tech's tallest player at 6-9.



Yankees Sign Free Agent Tiant

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Yankees signed free agent pitcher Luis Tiant to a two-year contract Monday, the American League team announced.

The veteran hurler, a longtime mainstay of the Boston Red Sox staff that becomes the first player in the 1978 re-entry draft to reach contract terms with a new team.

Because of his age, Tiant, who will be 38 later this month, was virtually ignored in the Nov. 3 draft, selected only by the Yankees in Round Eight.

With only one team selecting him, Tiant was declared available for negotiations with all 26 major league clubs, including the Red Sox, who had balked at giving him anything more than a one-year contract.

Last season, pitching for Boston, Tiant compiled a 13-8 record with a 3.31 earned run average and pushed his career record to 204-148 since coming to the majors with Cleveland in 1964.

The colorful right-hander with the

drooping moustache and herky-jerky motion was a Fenway Park favorite after the Red Sox signed him as a free agent in 1971.

He had been traded by Cleveland to Minnesota in 1970 and then released by the Twins, who thought he was washed up. He failed a tryout with Atlanta but then was rescued by the Red Sox and played a major role in Boston's American League championship in 1975.

For the Yankees, the signing of Tiant marked a return to their favorite marketplace. Previously, New York has dipped into the free agent auction to sign pitchers Catfish Hunter, Don Gullett, Rich Gossage and Rawly Eastwick and slugger Reggie Jackson. All except Eastwick have made significant contributions to three straight American League pennants and two straight World Championships for New York.

Yankees President Al Rosen introduced Tiant to a news conference saying: "We're very proud to announce the signing today of one of the top right-handed pitchers in baseball."

When Rosen was asked about Tiant's age, he laughed. "Just like good wine, Luis gets better with age," he said.

Tiant dismissed the question of his age. "As long as I can get the ball to home plate and do my job, that's more important," Tiant said.

Tiant's listed age has long been questioned. According to the record book his birthday was Nov. 23, 1940.

"That's what my mother told me — Nov. 23, 1940," he said.

The veteran right-hander claimed the Red Sox forced him into the free agent market.

"They made me go, the way they treated me," he said. "It wasn't fair all I did for that team. But they didn't care."

The Red Sox had refused to offer Tiant any more than a one-year contract, and that was the major stumbling block between the team and the pitcher.

"They shouldn't have let me go to the draft," Tiant said. "They would only give me one year. I'm only looking out for No. 1 — and that's me."

Tiant pitched in 32 games for Boston last season and had a pair of two-hitters including a 5-0 shutout of Toronto in the final game of the season which enabled the Red Sox to tie New York for the American League East championship and force a playoff for the title.

Tiant had 22 career victories against the Yankees, tying him with Baltimore's Jim Palmer as the top winner against New York among active American League pitchers.

Lacewell Takes Over At Arkansas State

JONESBORO, Ark. (AP) — Bill Davidson, saying that he was certain Larry Lacewell could do more for the Arkansas State University football program than he could, stepped aside Monday to give Lacewell his chance.

Lacewell, former defensive coordinator at the University of Oklahoma, signed a four-year contract. He volunteered his services to Davidson at the start of the current season and since that time has been working without pay and living in Davidson's house.

"It became obvious after Larry had been here one month that he could do more for this program than I could," said Davidson, who resigned to accept a position as assistant athletic director at ASU. "I have always wanted the best for Arkansas State so the decision in my mind was obvious. The doubt I had was that Larry would at all be interested. When he told me he might, I began pursuing it."

Lacewell said Davidson approached him earlier in the season and asked him to consider taking over the ASU job.

"He had contemplated resigning the last couple of years, and he just asked me to think about it," Lacewell said. "As the season progressed along, it became more like home to me."

"I came here just to let the coaching profession know I was interested in getting back where I belonged," Lacewell said. "I had no idea that things would work out like this."

Ags-Hogs Head TV Schedule

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC will televise five regional games, including Texas A&M at Arkansas, then will show UCLA-Southern California to most of the nation in a college football doubleheader next Saturday.

Dartmouth at Princeton; Navy at Florida State, Iowa State at Colorado and Central Michigan at Western Michigan will be the four other regional games starting at 11:30 p.m. CST.

The UCLA-Southern Cal game starts at 3 p.m. CST. A few small sections of the country not receiving that game will see Florida A&M at Southern University or Appalachian State at Western Carolina.

Shot Runner Invited To Marathon

BOSTON (AP) — A Michigan runner, who raced the last 16 miles of the Grand Valley Marathon with a .22-caliber slug in his head, was invited Monday to run in the Boston Marathon next April.

"I read he was disappointed because the bullet kept him from running the distance in less than three hours," Will Cloney, the Boston Marathon director, said about 26-year-old Dennis Rinear of Midland, Mich.

Rinear ran the last 16 miles of the 26-mile course Nov. 4 after a bullet slammed into his skull and raised a giant lump. He finished in three hours, nine minutes.

Rinear was quoted as regretting that a "silly thing" like the bullet kept him from running the course in three hours or less and qualifying for the Marathon. He said his best marathon time was three hours, 31 seconds.

McEnroe Routs Gullikson For Title

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — John McEnroe captured the men's singles title in the \$175,000 Stockholm Open Tennis Tournament Monday night, whipping Tim Gullikson 6-2, 6-2 in an all-American final.

The 19-year-old McEnroe had upset top-seeded Bjorn Borg of Sweden in the semifinals Sunday. The final was the most one-sided in the tournament since American Arthur Ashe trounced Tom Okker of Holland by the same score in 1974.

Duke Coach Suspends Four Stars

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — Four Duke football players disciplined prior to last Saturday's game with Wake Forest have been suspended for the rest of the season, Coach Mike McGee announced Monday.

The players are starting tailback Greg Rhett, starting wide receiver Derrick Lewis, reserve quarterback Stanley Driskell, and reserve wide receiver Marvin Brown.

The four were suspended for the Wake Forest game after it was learned they called a meeting of underclassmen players at which McGee and his staff were reportedly criticized. McGee originally said the suspension was for "activity detrimental to the best interests of the team."

Lewis leads the Blue Devils in pass receptions with 20 and has 365 yards receiving. Rhett leads the team in rushing with 412 yards, and leads in scoring with 30 points. Driskell, playing when starter Mike Dunn was injured, directed the victory over Georgia Tech and leads the team in passing.

Dorsett Angry At Press Treatment

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas Cowboy running back Tony Dorsett says it wasn't enough that he ran 149 yards in Sunday's 42-14 rout of the Green Bay Packers. Now, he says, the press is trying to run him right out of town.

"I feel like the press is trying to run me out of Dallas," said the Heisman Trophy winner told reporters in the locker room. "It seems that when things aren't going too good for us, everyone is pointing the finger at me. When you're down, they want to talk about you and write bad things about you."

Dorsett and his million-dollar legs have been making headlines since they joined the Cowboys two years ago. But then he reportedly slept through a practice and was benched by Coach Tom Landry. And with the Cowboys in a slump, his name began to crop up frequently in stories entitled "What's wrong with the Cowboys?"

But, bowl talk?

Tech officials said that any bowl scouts at Tech games have been looking at other teams: none have asked for credentials for Tech home games. There are more and more bowls popping up these days, from San Diego to the Atlantic Ocean, and this makes more spots available for teams with less than glossy records.

But, it might be better for those fans who are so quick to paint a season black two months ago over a new coach and shortage of returnees to be more realistic in examining the finished product.

TECH HAS ACHIEVED a measure of success and opened the eyes of plenty of folks downstate. Part of it has to be the resolution of the Tech team, that it just wanted to show some doom prophets that it was not as bad as predicted.

Part of it has to be the emergence of several key players. And a good part of it should go to Dockery and his coach staff and coaching efforts.

The move of James Hadnot, which looked so shaky at the time and even after a couple of games, has proven to be the surprise of the league. Here he's rushing at a clip unmatched by such pre-season all-SWCers as Ben Cowins and Curtis Dickey and four straight 100-yard-plus games is nothing to be taken for granted.

The string may be broken this week, but the fact that he has been able to barge for more than 1,000 yards in eight games is indication enough that he has talents beyond that of catching passes and blocking at tight end.

Also, the rapid development of Ron Heeves as a capable quarterback aided in the improvement of the Raiders. His passing was noticed first, and this, plus his ability to run with the ball on the option has made his passing — and Hadnot's running — more effective.

But, also, the punting of another freshman, Maury Buford, has to be counted. Tech's punting this year is about 7 yards per try longer than a year ago. Add that

up, off 51 punts this year, and Raider defenders have had 357 less yards to perfect.

These are just three of the Raiders to turn out to be such pleasant surprises.

TECH COACHES WERE able to build a defense which held USC to two touchdowns, and there are only two seniors in the group. The offensive line dominated a larger Baylor group two weeks ago and also has impressed with its development. For the efforts of both lines, as well as filling the gaps caused by injuries — especially on the defensive side — credit has to go to the coaches.

Now, Dockery and his Raiders are on the verge of achieving that goal of a winning season. The three remaining teams are not patsies. . . SMU and nationally-ranked Houston and Arkansas. But, Tech has been underdog every game except three (New Mexico, Rice, TCU) anyway.

While the bowl folks are placing calls to Lincoln, Houston, Tuscaloosa and University Park, Dockery isn't waiting for the phone to ring; he's working on a game plan for SMU. And the bowl talk drifts skyward with the cigarette smoke.

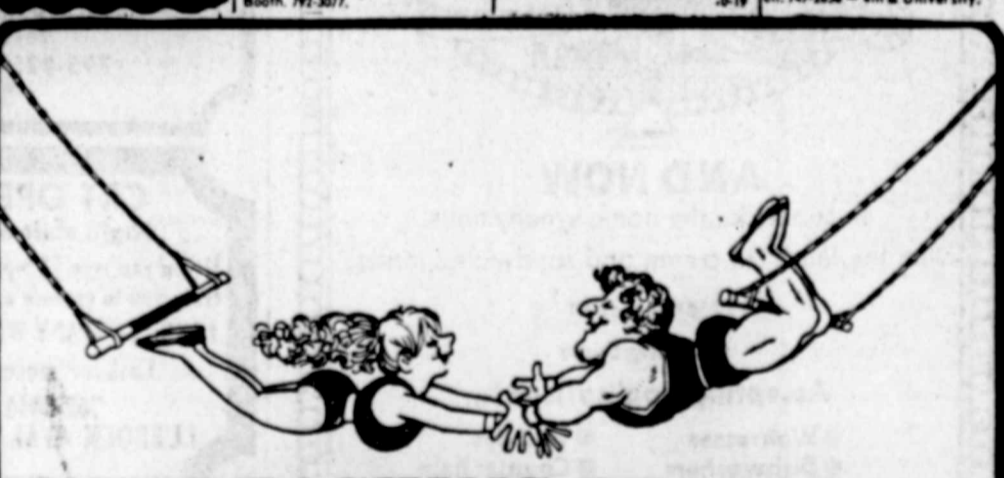

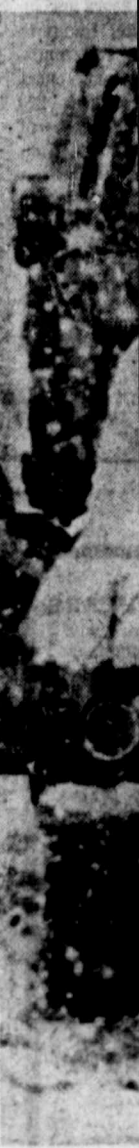
