

If the manufacturer's warranty has expired, you have no rights against the seller.

The major exception to this rule is the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act.

For example, if the seller misrepresented the condition of the engine, or knew about the engine problem and failed to disclose it, you may have rights under this law.


If you were successful under the Deceptive Trade Practices Act, you could recover up to three times your damages and attorneys fees.






