Greek Shipping Authorities Hiring More Women

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — A year before the mast may soon be more bearable for Greek seamen. Shipping authorities are hiring the wives of merchant sailors and other women in a campaign to make life at sea "more civilized."

The program, christened "Women Aboard," promises to transform the

Greek merchant fleet, already the world's biggest, into the prettiest as well. And officials say the new "womanpower" will help cure long-standing manpower deficiencies.

Merchant Marine Minister Emmanouel Kefaloyannis, heading up the drive to attract women sailors as high as the rank of captain, told the Greek Shipping Association last week young people are rejecting careers at sea because it means long stays away from their families.

"It is therefore necessary to make ef-

orts for sailors to create a family-like environment right aboard the ship," Kefaloyannis' statement said.

He said enlisting the wives of sailors and other women is the solution, adding:

"We furthermore believe that for all sailors it will create conditions for a more civilized social co-existence, since this is definitely aided by the presence of the female sex."

He pointed out that the program also will help meet a shortage of crewmen for

the giant fleet and limit the need for foreign seamen.

About 150,000 seamen now work on 5,100 Greek-owned ships. Some have long been agitating to get wives and other women aboard.

One of these, Capt. George Tzaganas, said in a recent open letter to the press that the common Greek practice of contracting sailors to 12 months at sea, twice the normal tour in the rest of Europe, was "inhuman."

Kefaloyannis reminded Greek shipowners that other major maritime countries, N.J., purchased the original pen and ink drawing from another dealer several months ago.

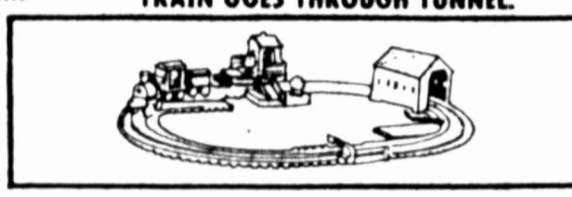

Most '1984' Predictions Correct, Scientist Says

WASHINGTON (UPI)—More than 100 of the ominous predictions George Orwell made in his novel "1984" already have been fulfilled, a psychologist said Sunday.

David Goodman, writing in Futurist magazine, said Americans may feel they are safe from the "big brother is watching" government Orwell described, but the technology for it already is here—and "triggering incidents" could create the evil social conditions.

Orwell, the pen name of Englishman Eric Blair, wrote his famous novel in 1949, outlining a future in which three superpowers are constantly at war and even thoughts are controlled by a menacing government bent on destroying all signs of individuality.

Goodman said he began his study of "1984" while seeking a doctorate at the University of California at Irvine.

His interest was perked by a student who noted that an electronic monitoring device Goodman developed was similar to a device Orwell described: Orwell's all-seeing government monitored everyone's heartbeats through a screen installed in homes; Goodman's "delicate voltage sensors" make it possible to detect the heart rate of an animal through the electrical field that surrounds all living organisms.

Since then, Goodman said, he has compiled a list of 137 predictions Orwell made about science, technology, social conditions and politics and found this year "that over 100 of the predictions had come true."

Goodman said if social trends and technological achievements of the last 30 years are compared with Orwell's vision, "a future resembling '1984' must certainly be seen as possible."

If there is a "triggering incident," such as nuclear war, he said, such a future would be even more likely.

"A nuclear explosion could easily infuse society with the siege mentality and war hysteria that the Oceania (Orwell's superpower) government adapts to its purposes," he said.

Among the developments Goodman sees as Orwellian are:

- Mind-altering drugs.
- Think tanks dedicated to developing weapons and war strategy.
- Defoliants used to wipe out huge areas of vegetation, like Agent Orange was used in Vietnam.

•Psychological treatments designed to modify behavior, including electric shock and truth serums.

•Data banks holding detailed information on thousands of people.

•Self-propelled bombs replacing bombing planes.

•Planes independent of Earth.

•Artificial insemination.

Small Profit Reported By Rescued Music Hall

NEW YORK (AP)—Radio City Music Hall is operating at a small profit under the rescue plan that kept it from closing last April, a state official said Sunday.

Richard Kahn, president of the Urban Development Corporation, said that because the state had demonstrated how the famous Art Deco theater could make money, operating control had been returned to Rockefeller Center Inc., its owner.

The UDC was the instrument through which the state moved to keep the Music Hall, with its world-famous Rockettes dancers, open after Rockefeller Center announced it was closing down the theater as a losing proposition.

Rockefeller Center Inc. resumed control of the theater at the end of August in an agreement that relieved UDC of having to cover any losses up to \$1.8 million.

The rescue had been designed to run until next April and its goal was to prevent the theater from being closed until a feasibility study could be made of whether, and how, the Music Hall could be operated profitably. The study has not yet been released.

"The purpose we had intended, which

was to buy enough time to do a feasibility study, had been achieved at no cost to the taxpayers," Kahn said, except for the \$200,000 study costs. He said it was not yet known whether the state would try to get that money back from Rockefeller Center.

State Commerce Commissioner John Dyson said using the hall for other attractions during the 13 weeks of the year that the Rockettes do not perform had been enormously profitable.

"We brought in Frank Sinatra for a week; we brought in Diana Ross for a week, and they filled all 6,000 seats for seven days in a row," Dyson said. "The return on those two weeks was \$1.6 million — \$800,000 a week in gross, which is compared to the normal gross of the hall of about \$250,000 or \$300,000."

Q. When I was younger, my grandmother gave me some stock which has a dividend reinvestment plan. I signed up for that plan, so that all dividends are used to buy more shares for me. Now that I am working, I send the company at least \$150 every three months to buy more shares through its stock purchase plan. I pay no commissions on these purchases. My goal is to increase the number of shares I own. Is this a good idea?

A. It's outstanding. You're to be congratulated for recognizing good things and taking advantage of them. And I hope you give your grandmother a big hug and kiss every time you see her for starting you down the right financial road.

This column has been in favor of both plans you describe since they appeared on the financial scene some years ago. More than 600 companies have such plans, in one form or another.

A dividend reinvestment plan provides a painless — no cash out of pocket — way to compound dividends.

A shareholder stock purchase offers the opportunity to "dollar average" — put the same amount of money into the same stock at fixed intervals — without paying the terribly high commissions brokers charge these days on small investments.

Q. About two months ago, you wrote that readers who want to know which companies provide financial reinvestment plans should go to the reference section of their public libraries and ask for the Aug. 21, 1978, issue of "The Outlook," published by Standard & Poor's Corp. to see what you called a "reasonably complete" list.

You added that Standard & Poor's would not give you permission to have the list printed for mailing to readers. I wrote to S&P and learned that the people there had offered to make the list available to readers of your column. What do you say now?

A. Yes, S&P did say it would offer the list to readers — at a charge of \$2 and with the understanding that S&P would have the use of the names and addresses of people who requested the list.

Now, I realize that most people would not object to the \$2 charge. But many would scream bloody murder at the thought of their name and addresses appearing on mailing lists. "List rental" for junk mail purposes is big business — one of which I steer clear.

Outside of myself, the only person who sees the letters addressed to this column is my blue-eyed finance officer. Among other things, she opens the mail.

Q. I read the column in which you wrote that people who own just a few shares of stock might as well "hang on," because the commission charges on selling would be too high.

I am interested in buying those "few shares," at the going market price, assuming the stocks are not cats and dogs. Would you send me the names of people who want to sell?

A. Nope! That's another thing this column does not do — put readers in touch with each other. That could lead to all kinds of problems.

Q. I need a down payment toward the purchase of a home. I have some blue chip stocks, which I'll have to either sell or borrow on. Which would be the better move?

A. If the interest on the loan will be higher than the current dividend yield on the stock, my vote is to sell and make as

Education Programs For Police Found

WASHINGTON (AP) — Many government-supported college programs for police officers are low in quality and do little to stimulate scholarship and creative thinking, a national commission reported

Sunday after a two-year study. The rapidly expanding field of police education is plagued with conflict and confusion and "by even the most modern conceptions of quality, the quality of

many of these programs is dismal," concluded the National Advisory Commission on Higher Education for Police Officers. The commission's book-length report

was expected to stir controversy among police and education officials and in the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, the federal agency which supports police education programs with \$40 million a year in grants and loans.

potential revenue sources for police education," the report said.

Charles E. Miller, president of the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences, put it more bluntly in a 1977 article quoted in the commission report. "The infusion of federal money has brought into being the greatest number of harlots the world has probably ever seen ... An awful lot of hunters, and some college presidents serving as pimps, are all looking for this LEAA dollar," Miller wrote. "In fact, I think what is going on now in criminal justice higher education is perhaps the most scandalous thing in the history of our education."

The commission takes the view that po-

The commission was assembled by the Police Foundation, a private research organization which sponsored the study. The commission chairman was Dr. Warren Bennis, former president of the University of Cincinnati.

The commission said 1,070 public and private colleges, universities and technical schools now offer undergraduate programs aimed at police officers.

Most have sprung up since 1960 when Congress launched the law enforcement education program administered by LEAA.

In the late '60s, many police reformers and critics of police conduct saw more education for officers at all levels as one solution to a host of police problems ranging from brutality to corruption.

Commission members agreed that officers need college training. But they complained that many of the programs, particularly those offered by two-year community colleges, provide no encouragement for critical thinking.

Many programs have been created in haste and staffed with only part-time faculty members, the report said.

"There is some evidence — although it is far from conclusive — that many of the programs were created because the availability of federal funds provided a

Heartline: I am a farmer, retired and drawing Social Security. Would the land that I rent out be considered under the Social Security earnings test and deducted from my benefits? Also, if I sold my sheep, would any money I received be considered as earned income and reduce my Social Security benefits? — J.F.

Heartline: I am 61 years old. My husband is 63 and does not plan to retire for several years. I know I cannot draw Social Security benefits on his record until he retires. I worked several years when I was younger and a few more during the war. However, I have no idea how much I have paid into Social Security or how many quarters I have on my account. Would you please tell me how to find out? — L.M.

Heartline: I am 47 and was recently retired on disability from the company where I worked for the last 18 years. Since I was found disabled by the company, would I also be eligible for Social Security disability benefits? — G.B.

Heartline: I have always worked under Civil Service and my husband works under Social Security. When he retires, will I be eligible for Social Security wife's benefits? — T.P.

Heartline: Under the new Social Security rulings put into effect in December 1977, a wife's governmental (federal, state or local) retirement pension will reduce the amount of Social Security wife's benefits by the amount of the governmental pension. This provision goes into effect in January 1978, but it will not affect those spouses already receiving their Social Security wife's benefits and their governmental pension. Also, it will not affect those eligible for a governmental pension within a 5-year period beginning with the month of enactment. In other words, this provision will not affect anyone until January 1983.

Two North Sea Divers Killed

ABERDEEN, Scotland (AP) — Two oil workers whose diving bell broke loose from its tethers during a storm in the North Sea were killed Sunday when the bell filled with water as it was being pulled to the surface by rescue workers, officials said.

Lifelines to the bell were severed at 6:30 a.m. Sunday as the divers worked on the seabed at Mobil Oil's Beryl A platform, connecting a flow line from a satellite well about two miles away.

"The bell was lost for a time and then traced by four divers who went down in another bell," the statement said. "They

got thumbs up from the two men inside to say they were alive and well."

In the rescue operation, recovery lines were attached to the stranded bell by 2 p.m. and support vessels began lifting it from its bed of mud about 200 feet from the water's surface.

"As the Star Canopus lifted clear of the seabed, the bell became flooded and the recovery team found that both divers were dead on retrieval," according to a statement by Mobil North Sea Ltd., operators of the Beryl field, where the accident occurred.

Initial indications were that water seeped into the bell from a damaged door, and the men apparently drowned. The accident occurred in storm-tossed waters 200 miles northeast of Aberdeen.

The divers, both British, became stranded in the Star Canopus when a sudden squall blew their support vessel off course, cutting the lines. It was thought there was enough oxygen in the bell for them to survive until 6 p.m.

Britain's Energy Department sent

important to the state to carry out a full investigation.

The Beryl field lies east of Aberdeen in the North Sea. It has been producing oil since 1975. Mobil spokesman Donald Marshall said it was possible the air and bell lines in the Star Canopus were severed when the storm blew recovery vessels from a nearby

seabed. He said the recovery vessel was unable to reach the bell's support vessel.

The divers were employed by Northern Divers of Aberdeen. Their names were not released.

Part-Time Marshal To Get Job Back

WASHINGTON (AP) — In an out-of-court settlement of a job discrimination case, the Justice Department has committed itself to reinstating a northern Virginia man to his job as a part-time marshal.

The action followed claims by William H. N. Hatcher that he was dismissed because he is black and that he was mistreated while on the job. Under terms of the settlement announced by Assistant U.S. Attorney Thomas Berger, Hatcher will be rehired for one year as a part-time federal marshal in suburban Alexandria, Va.

Berger said the government is not admitting any wrongdoing by reinstating Hatcher, who may request to have his job renewed at the end of the year.

Andrus Wants Governors To Reply

WASHINGTON (AP) — The governors of 10 Eastern states have a month to reply to Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus' request for comments on the federal government's plan to lease further offshore tracts in the Baltimore Canyon Trough area of the Atlantic Ocean.

Andrus made the request to the governors of New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts.

The offshore lease sale, scheduled for next February, includes 109 tracts covering 649,987 acres from 50 to 83 miles off New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland and Virginia. The ocean depth is between 177 feet and 2,461 feet on the tracts.

Some of the tracts were not sold during a similar sale in August 1976, when several oil companies paid \$1.13 billion for the right to explore 93 tracts in the same general area.

The U.S. Geological Survey estimates that the new tracts may contain up to 114 million barrels of oil and up to 1.93 trillion cubic feet of gas.

So far, seven oil companies have drilled 11 exploratory wells on the first leased tracts. Only Texaco has announced a significant find of natural gas at a point about 105 miles east of Atlantic City, N.J.

Mrs. Lance Sees Return To Politics For Bert

By GAY PAULEY
NEW YORK (UPI) — LaBelle Lance expects her husband, Bert, to go back into politics at the national level. The controversial Lance, she thinks, may get another call to public service from President Carter.

"And I don't rule out his seeking elective office, given the (right) time and circumstances," the Georgia-born Mrs. Lance said.

"It's purely personal opinion," she said, "but the Lord does seem to have given me a touch of prophecy ..."

"I think Bert will be used. He knows his abilities and he always says, 'Don't leave this world without leaving some contribution.' I think he may have an of-

fer from Carter. I don't think President Carter let him down."

The reference was to the president's acceptance of Lance's resignation as director of the Office of Management and Budget.

Lance, a close friend and confidant of the president, quit after eight months as budget director during a whirl of controversy and U.S. Senate inquiries into his management of funds at two banks, the family bank at Calhoun, Ga., and the Atlanta-based National Bank of Georgia.

Now a federal grand jury in Atlanta is looking into Lance's banking practices.

"They seem to be investigating all the time," Mrs. Lance said. "Remember, he has not been proved guilty of anything. I

know he's innocent ... the country knows he's innocent."

"And President Carter never said, 'Bert, you've got to go.'"

"My husband resigned to relieve the tension on everyone ... the whole administration. The president himself said that at the news conference the afternoon Bert resigned, 8 out of 10 of the questions would concern Bert no matter what other national and international issues there were."

Mrs. Lance has told the family's side of the story in "This Too Shall Pass" just published (Bantam Books, paperback).

She also has been on the lecture circuit to talk about her husband and the born-again Christianity which she said has played such a tremendous role in the entire Lance family.

And she's been traveling internationally with her husband on his business and banking consultations. Lance also is a commentator on station WXIA-TV in Atlanta.

Mrs. Lance, in an interview during a trip to New York, drew a parallel between her husband and John Adams, the second president of the United States, who, in effect, was dumped by the country's leaders but called back to service when the nation needed his acumen, she said.

The Lances, whose romance began in their teens in Calhoun, have been married 28 years. They have four sons — Tram, 26; David, 24; Stuart, 18; and Beverly, 17; and one grandson.

Homes are in Atlanta, the house and

farm in Calhoun, and a summer place on Sea Island. That house in Atlanta, with 60 rooms, was brought up during the Senate hearings and there was some questioning on how the Lances could afford it.

Mrs. Lance said it was simple. The house was being sold at auction of city courts in a bankruptcy situation.

Their bid was turned down on the first go-around. Then later, "The city clerk notified us that the house was still unsold and bidders were being contacted again."

The Lances re-bid and Mrs. Lance said, "It was the only bid and it was accepted. We bought what no one else wanted."

She doesn't discuss the amount that bought the colonial mansion.

The friendship between the Carters and Lances began in 1966 when they met at a regional political picnic barbecue in North Georgia. Carter, a state senator, was chief speaker.

Mrs. Lance said one factor that brought her husband and Carter together was "a strong kinship as born-again Christians with similar principles and goals."

"At the first meeting Jimmy disclosed his plans to run for governor ... Bert said he would be glad to do whatever he could for Carter in north Georgia."

Carter lost in his first bid for the governorship but made it the second time. He

appointed Lance his state commissioner of transportation.

Georgia does not permit governors to serve consecutive terms, so in 1974 Carter would be out of the office. She said Carter urged her husband to seek to succeed him. But Lance ran third in the race that Lester Maddox won.

Lance went back to the banking business and Carter went on to the presidency.

Mrs. Lance said she was totally opposed to her husband's plan to resign from the Carter cabinet. She even called on President Carter to discuss the matter.

"The president listened ... (and) spoke honestly about his public relations problems because of Bert's name being in the news so long," she said.

Hints Set Winter Garden

WASHINGTON (AP) — If you haven't done so, it's time to get your backyard garden ready for winter.

Robert Wearne of the Department of Agriculture says if you still have crops such as collards, kale or turnip greens growing, work around them. The cold and snow will enhance their flavor and you can still get good meals from them.

The first step, he says, is to clean up old plant material. It's best to destroy any plants that are diseased or infested with insects such as white flies. While the cold weather should kill the insects, the plants may give them protection.

Healthy plant material should be saved to dig back into the garden or for compost.

Collect enough leaves to make a three-inch thick layer over the garden and compost any extra leaves for use as mulch during the growing season. If asked, your city street department might even deliver some leaves to your home from their fall cleanup.

Shredding leaves with your lawnmower helps work them into the soil faster, or break down faster during composting. Leaves allow sandy soil to retain moisture and help clay drain.

If you haven't had a soil test for at least three years, now's the time, Wearne says.

Soil can become too acid from fertilizers and organic materials or too alkaline from buildup of sodium, calcium and other salts.

Your local county extension agent, listed in the telephone book under the name of your county, can tell you how to prepare a soil sample, where to have it tested and what the test shows your soil needs. Ask him whether a separate nitrogen test is needed.

If you need to add lime or organic matter, fall is the best time, by spring it should be effective. Plow or spade the material roughly into the soil. Rain, snow and freezing and thawing will break down the clods and work the material into the soil. A garden plowed in the fall usually only needs raking in preparation for spring planting.

Finally, clean up your equipment and store it in preparation for use next year. After cleaning tools, rub them with an oiled cloth to prevent rust.

LONDON (AP) — Pest control officers have launched a search in southwest England for descendants of a pair of large porcupines that escaped from a wildlife park in 1969.

Six porcupines have been caught, and others are blamed for stripping bark from trees in woods near the town of Okehampton. Officials said there may be no more than 20 of the rodents at large.

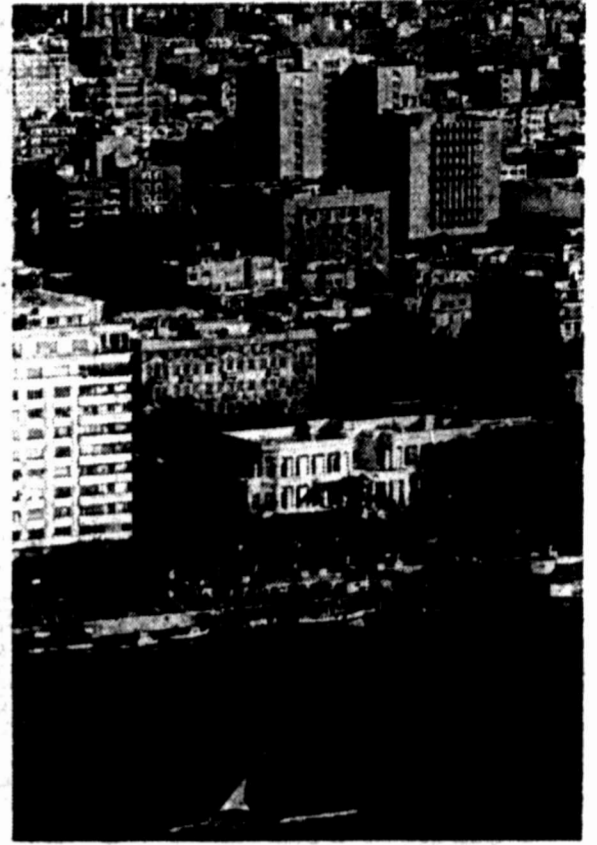

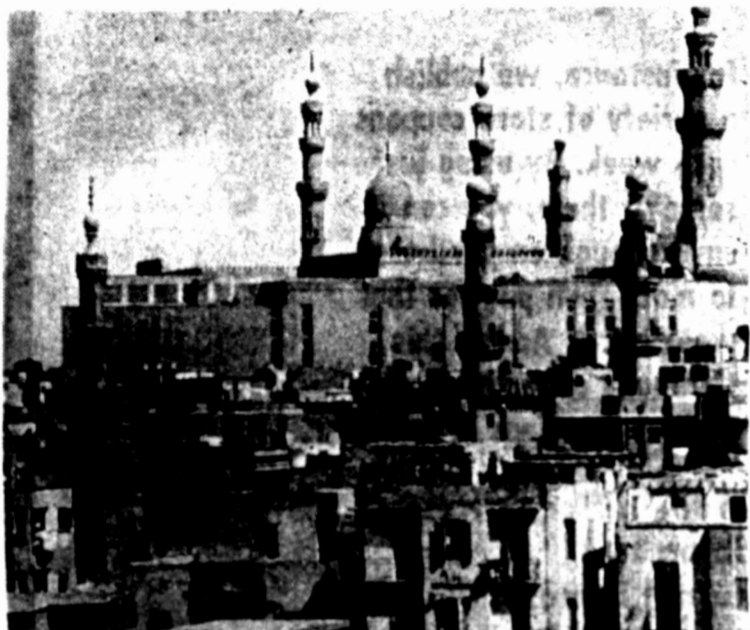

Skyscrapers, pyramids and 19th-century tenement buildings jostle each other in the skyline of Cairo. And in just the same way, its varied people jostle each other in the crowded streets where limousines side by side with horse carts emphasize the many facets of this ancient city.

It's a city which changes vividly in character from one district to another. The modern business center with its sleek, new hotels isn't far from the 1,000-year-old Al Azhar mosque, the theological seat of Islam. The Egyptian Museum with its pharaonic treasures of the past is next door to shanty-town working class districts.

Today's Cairo was founded in 969 A.D. by the Moslem conquerors of Egypt, but the site has links with much earlier, now vanished civilizations. It's a city where churches, mosques and synagogues coexist along the banks of the slow-flowing Nile river—the only source of calm in a turbulent city of eight million.

The city's name comes from the Arabic Al Qahira, which means "the victorious." Ironically, it does seem a victory of sorts for Cairenes, over 20 percent of Egypt's population, to manage to survive and function in a city built with facilities for just over two million.

"The defense played well, but the entire team did. Our defense did make big plays twice in the final minutes for the second game in a row."

And, now, the Cougars will have to win this week over Rice to go to the Cotton Bowl. Tech has a chance for that confer-

ence Promised Land, by playing the "if" game.

If Rice should upset the Cougars and Tech unseat Arkansas, then the Raiders would get the invitation to play Notre Dame in the Cotton Bowl.

We talked to them just about winning.

For our team, they're all big wins. If we were able to beat Arkansas, it would be a lift for our program. But, it was a big win last week over SMU."

But, the only bowl still within grasp is the Cotton, as all others are filled.

"Our defense has gotten better, though," said Dockery, showing the bowl talk aside. "It was the second good game for Willie Stephens (two interceptions and a fumble recovery against Houston) and (linebacker) Don Kelly continues to

play well. Jim Verden (defensive tackle) played well."

And Mike Patterson... Alan Swann goes out (rejected along with a Houston receiver in the third period) and Mike... makes the interception that turns the game around."

Patterson's theft at the 5 prevented an almost sure score (field goal or TD) with Houston leading 21-14. Tech took the interception and turned it into the winning touchdown.

"But everybody contributed," said Dockery. "And that's the key to winning."

"Sure, they're all big, but I'd guess this was the biggest win of the year, considering they were nationally ranked."

Offensively, wide receiver Brian Nelson found holes in the UH secondary for

Saturday, Estacado fans were calling and blaming everybody from President Carter to the Avalanche-Journal for the reason the Matadors must face the Snyder Tigers in Snyder Friday night.

However, the University Interscholastic League (UIL) is to blame.

According to UIL rules, if two teams meet in playoff competition within five years, then the game must be played at the opposite site of the last contest.

In other words, since both teams belonged to district 3-AAA last year and the district tilt was played at Lowrey Field, this time it's Snyder's turn to host.

Tickets for the 7:30 p.m. quarterfinal contest will go on sale Monday morning at Estacado High School and the Central Athletic Office on 19th Street.

They cost \$4 for adults, a \$1.50 for students prior to the game and \$2.50 at the gate.

The Matadors advanced to the quarterfinals by upsetting previously No. 3-ranked Fort Stockton 21-7 in Midland

Friday night. Snyder qualified by edging Burk Burnett in Abilene 17-0.

Against Fort Stockton, Estacado Coach Lewis Kelley claimed the Matadors had more overall team speed. And that team speed knocked the ball loose six times. Estacado recovered five of the miscues and turned two into touchdowns.

However, Kelley doesn't believe the same conditions held true against Snyder.

"When we scouted Friday against Burk Burnett, Snyder only at the ball in four times," said the Estacado coach. "They like to run traps, dives and options." The Tigers direct their offense out of the wing-T.

Defensively, Kelley expects Snyder to lineup in a five-man front.

But that's all next week. Right now, the Estacado mentor is having trouble get-

ting the picture of the Matadors' offense out of his mind.

"It was a real surprise to me," Kelley said. "They have got to be the best team in the district."

And what was through Kelley's mind while showing the Matadors the 19-14 district trophy?

"It just was a nice feeling," continued the Matador coach. "All those congratulations make you feel good."

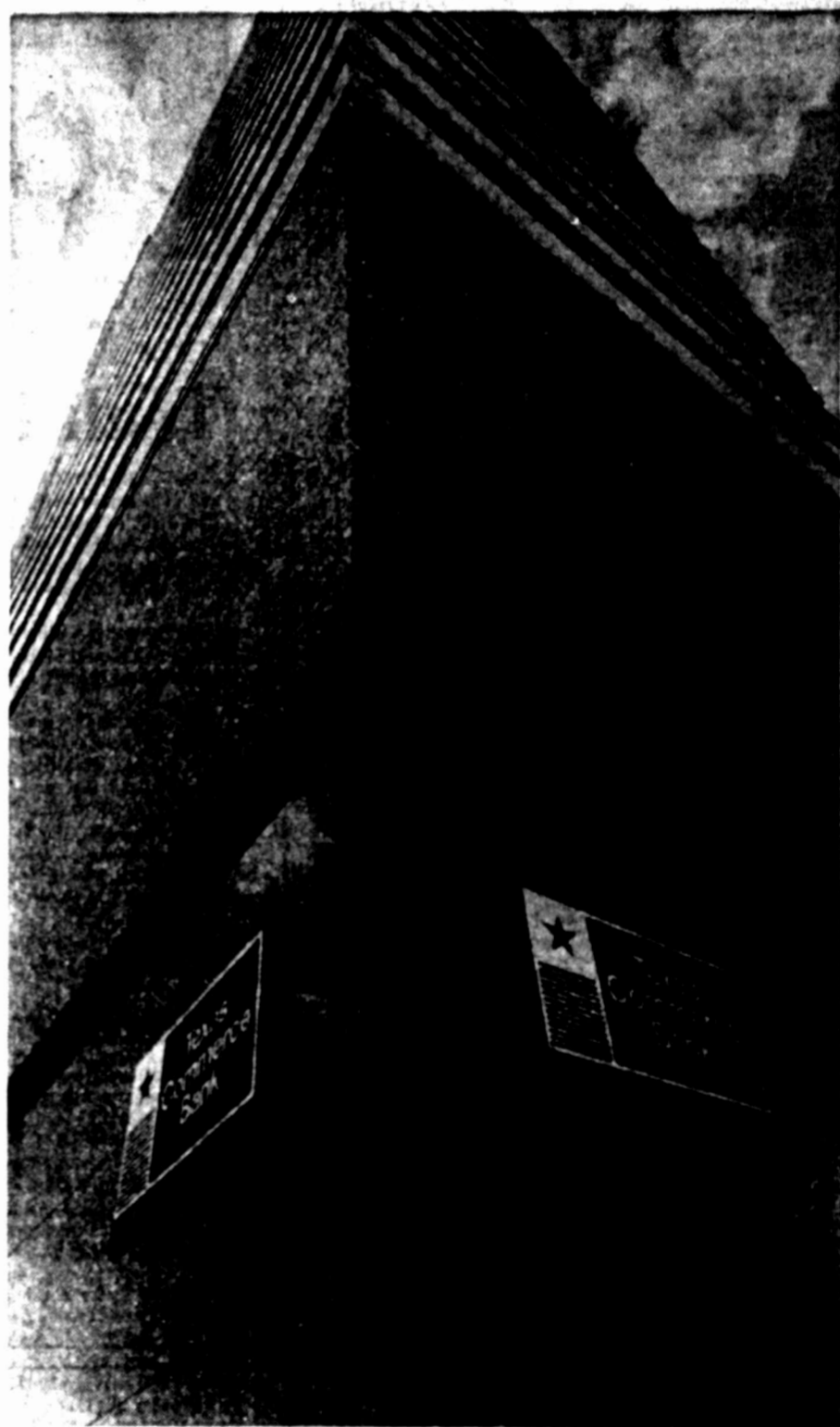
Besides shaking hands and receiving hugs from players and fans, Kelley was also being visited by scouts from just about every major college.

Lubbock Christian College Basketball Hopes To End String

DURANGO, Colo. (Special) — In journalistic terms, "30" means the end. And Lubbock Christian College basketball coach Larry Hays is anxious to write an end to the Chaps' road losing streak — which has reached 30

games. LCC will get two opportunities to do that here as it takes Fort Lewis tonight and Tuesday in 8:30 p.m. (CST) contests. The hosts will open their season tonight, but LCC will be seeking its first

victory of the year. It lost 100-94 in a home game to Paul Quinn and then dropped an 81-69 overtime verdict at Sul Ross last Tuesday. From here, the Chaps will venture to Grand Junction for a Thursday date with

Mesa State before returning to Texas, where they will challenge West Texas State in Amarillo Saturday.

Hays has been pleased, yet disappointed, in the Chaps' two outings. "We've rebounded both teams, but in crucial situations, we haven't blocked out well on the boards and our opponents have gotten second, and third and even fourth chances to score.

"We have to play with the same intensity throughout the game. We played well in spots against Sul Ross. We were down by 10 and cut that to 2, then fell back by 8 and came back in the final four minutes to tie.

"But in overtime, it just seemed like we went to sleep. We let them drive the lane three times up."
Two of LCC's senior-college victories have been over Fort Lewis. Also, the Chaps won here in 1974, 70-62. Hays is also concerned about fouls.

Four Chaps have been disqualified in each game, including Kevin Wharton who had 14 boards and 14 points in the opener and 26 points and 14 boards against Sul Ross. Wharton, a Denver product who played

at Hill Junior College, will be joined in the starting lineup by guards Bruce Carver and Bill McGee, who scored 19 and 10 points, respectively, against Sul Ross. Brian Fortner and Jim Steensma will work inside.

Edmonton Gets Grey Cup

TORONTO (AP) — Dave Cutler kicked four field goals and Jim Germany added a 2-yard touchdown run Sunday as the Edmonton Eskimos beat the Montreal Alouettes 20-13 in the Grey Cup game for the Canadian Football League championship.

The victory gave the Eskimos their second CFL title in the past four years and avenged their humiliating 41-6 loss to the Alouettes in last year's Grey Cup game.

Cutler kicked a 37-yard field goal midway through the first quarter, giving Ed-

monton a 3-0 lead, and Germany increased the margin to 10-0 about 2 1/2 minutes later with his TD burst up the middle.

Don Sweet booted a 33-yard field for Montreal with eight seconds remaining in the first quarter, cutting the margin to 10-3.

Cutler kicked his second field goal, a 34-yarder, and a single late in the second period, giving Edmonton a 14-3 halftime advantage. He increased the lead to 17-3 with a 42-yard field goal at 8:29 of the

third period, then, after Montreal had closed within 17-13 midway through the final period, Cutler closed out the scoring with a 25-yard field goal with 51 seconds left in the game.

Montreal, whose offense had been shackled during the first three quarters, began to unwind in the last period. Quarterback Joe Barnes scrambled for a 10-yard TD with 41 seconds gone in the final period and Sweet kicked a 34-yard field goal at 7:35.

But it wasn't enough to give the Alouettes a second straight CFL title.
