## Big Jim's In The Ring

UNLESS REPUBLICANS surprise every
one with a sweep next Tuesday, the off-year
eiections of 1988 arent't likely to offer many
clues to Jimmy Carter's reelection pros. clues to jummy
But that doesn't mean that this year's bal
loting has no relevance to presidential pol tics. On the contrary, for at least three men who are eyeing Carter's job with more than
casual interest, the election results will be crucial
One is California's Gov. Jerry Brown, C er's most likely Demo challinger at this writing. The second is Senate Majority Lead-
er Howard Baker Jr., R-Tenn, and the third
is GOP Gov. James Thompson of lilinois. All three are up for reelection this ye and ait three must not only win but win big
if they are to remain credible as presidential
iontenders. if they are
contenders.
ALL OF WHICH imposes added strains a campaign. especially for "Big Jim"
Thompson, 42 . Thompson became a figure to be reckoned
with in national politics when he won the governorship two years ago by a record-shat-
tering 1.4 million votes, a 65 percent margin. tunt the very size of his 1976 percent margin.

Thompson, a former federal prosecutor who made his name fighting corruption in
