

Continued from A1 project is there now.

The project's estimated cost is \$2,109,500, of which 90 percent will be provided through federal funding, with the remaining 10 percent — estimated at \$211,950 — falling to the city.

T h e project's engineering and design will be completed in the first year at a total cost of \$180,000.

In the second year, the surface of the runway will be milled off at a cost of \$1,104,500.

During the second year, pilots using the airport will use the taxiway to take off and land.

During the third year, the runway will be open, and the taxiway's surface will be milled off and replaced at an estimated cost of \$825,000.

Weather Whys: Why Bridges Ice First

Q: Why is it that ice always forms on bridges

A: The answer is heat – or a lack of it, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University's Department of Atmospheric Sciences.

Roads and highways, even though they are made of asphalt and by the ability of soil underneath to absorb

"But bridges and overpasses are suspended in the air, which means they do not have the means to absorb heat," McRoberts explains.

"So when temperatures start dropping below freezing, it takes a while for the ground temperature to reach freezing. But bridges and overpasses, with freezing air on top and below the structures, will cool down and freeze much quicker."

Q: So bridges are affected more than roads by the outside temperature?

A: True, McRoberts adds. "Bridges don't have any way to trap heat, so they lose heat quickly and this allows them to freeze quicker

than roads," he says. "The simple explanation is that bridges tend to follow the outside air temperature very closely. So if the temperature drops below freezing and it

UPDATED PROPERTY TAX INFORMATION NOW AVAILABLE FOR TEXAS TAXPAYERS

New and updated property tax information has just been compiled by Bailey Central Appraisal District and is available now to assist taxpayers. This property tax information is current and covers a wide range of topics, such as taxpayer remedies, exemptions, appraisals, and is of value to select groups, such as disabled veterans and persons who are 65 years of age or older.

Whether you are a homeowner, business owner, disabled veteran or a taxpayer, it's important you know your rights concerning the property tax laws. You can contact the appraisal district about any property tax issues with full confidence that we will provide you the most complete, accurate and up-to-date available information to assist you.

This includes information about the following programs.

Property Tax Exemptions for Disabled Veterans – The law provides partial exemptions for any property owned by veterans who are disabled, spouses and survivors of deceased disabled veterans and spouses and survivors of military personnel who died on active duty. This includes homesteads donated to disabled veterans by charitable organizations at no cost to the disabled veterans. The amount of exemption is determined according to percentage of service-connected disability. The law also provides a 100% exemption for 100% disabled veterans and their surviving spouses,

beginning in 2009. **Property Tax Exemptions** – Non-profit organizations that meet statutory requirements may seek property tax exemptions and must apply to their county appraisal district by

Rendering Taxable Property – If a business owns tangible personal property that is used to produce income, the business must file a rendition with the appraisal district by a specified date. Personal property includes inventory and equipment used by a business. Owners do not have to render exempt property such a church property or an agriculture producer's equipment used for farming.

Appraisal Notices – If a taxpayer's property value increased in the last year, the Texas taxpayer will receive a notice of appraised value from the appraisal district. The city, county school district and other local taxing units will use the appraisal district's value to set property taxes for the coming year.

Property Taxpayer Remedies - This Comptroller publication explains in detail how to protest a property appraisal, what issues the county appraisal review board (ARB) can consider and what to expect during a protest hearing. The publication also discusses the option of taking a taxpayer's case to district court or entering into binding arbitration if the taxpayer is dissatisfied with the outcome of the ARB hearing.

Homestead Exemptions – A homestead is generally defined as the home and land used as the owner's principal residence on Jan. 1 of the tax year. A homestead exemption reduces the appraised value of the home and as a result, lowers property taxes. Applications are submitted to the appraisal district.

Productivity Appraisal – Property owners who use land for agricultural purposes can be granted property tax relief on their land. They may apply to the appraisal district for an agricultural appraisal which may result in a lower appraisal of the land based on how much the taxpayer produces, versus what the land would sell for in the open market.

Residence Homestead Tax Deferral – Texas homeowners may postpone paying the currently delinquent property taxes due on the appreciation value of their homes by filing a tax deferral affidavit at the appraisal district. This tax relief allows homeowners to pay the property taxes on 105 percent of the preceding year's appraised value of their homestead, plus the taxes on any new improvements to the homestead. The remaining

taxes are postponed, but not cancelled, with interest accruing at 8 percent per year. Property Tax Deferral for Persons Age 65 or Older and Disabled Homeowners Texans who are 65 years of age or older, or who are disabled as defined by law, may postpone paying current and delinquent property taxes on their homes by signing a tax deferral affidavit. Once the affidavit is on file, taxes are deferred, but not cancelled, as long as the owner continues to own and live in the home. Interest continues to accrue on unpaid taxes. You may obtain a deferral affidavit at the appraisal district.

Notice of Availability of Electronic Communication – Chief appraisers of a county appraisal districts and appraisal review boards may communicate electronically through email or other media with property owners or their designated representatives. Written agreements are required for notices and other documents to be delivered electronically in place of mailing.

Protesting Property Appraisal Values – Property owners who disagree with the appraisal district's appraisal of their property for local taxes or for any other action that adversely affects them may protest their property value to the appraisal district's appraisal review board.

Hearing aids do help!

People often feel they are alone in their frustrations with not understanding. I see people in my office every day that are having trouble understanding, especially in a crowd. We talk about their hearing and hearing aids and make adjustments to their hearing aids to help in difficult listening situations. Hearing is complex and filtering the noise from the information you want to hear is even more complex.

A question often asked is whether the newest technology is any better than the old technology at understanding in noise. Without a doubt, the technology I fit today is much better in noisy settings than the hearing aids I fit five years ago. But, hearing aids do not repair years of damage to inner hearing nerves, and your brain is not as pliable as it was when you were forty — neither is mine! For this reason, new hearing aids are better at filtering noise, but your hearing may or may not be capable of using that information.

So why even try? Hearing aids do help! They provide an increase in volume that is required for most hearing losses. They also "shape" the sound frequencies that you are receiving to provide more usable information. For example, if sound is amplified too much in the low frequency range, it creates "upward masking", this means that the low frequencies actually interfere with the high frequencies and make it more difficult to understand. Hearing aids also compensate for some negative effects of hearing loss. Some people actually become more sensitive to loud sounds when they have hearing damage, and today's hearing aids automatically "dampen" loud sounds. Some advanced hearing systems also focus on speech in settings with non-speech noise and amplify the speech above the noise. Technology is continually being adapted to benefit the specific needs of patients with hearing loss.

The only way to really know about your hearing and whether or not hearing aids will help you is to have a hearing check.
