

As the old song says, "They've been working on the railroad."

After setting for a couple of months alongside the BNSF railroad tracks passing through Muleshoe, the "old" cross-ties were replaced with new ties, in a process that is a little more highly mechanized than when the first tracks were placed here back in 1913.

According to a news story that ran in the Muleshoe Journal's Nov. 10, 1977, issue, the original tracks on the rail line extending from Lubbock to Texico, N.M., were laid between March and November 1913, on a mule and horse-graded bed — on which work began the previous year.


Obviously, there have been a lot of changes

along the line since then, among which was the closing of Muleshoe's depot in 1983, and the 80man work crews that have been slowly traveling toward each other includes machinery that lifts the welded ribbon rails and shoves the new crosstie underneath before replacing the tieplate and re-securing it with "dogspikes."

But, as the top photograph shows, that doesn't mean that some manual hammer work is no longer needed.







the December 2013 Production per cow averaged 1,920 pounds during January, 40

pounds higher than last year and 100 pounds higher than December 2013.

Milkproduction in the 23 states participating in the monthly survey totaled 16.1 billion pounds during January 2014, up 1.0 percent from production in these same states during January 2013.

December revised production, at 15.7 billion pounds, was down 0.3 percent from December 2012.

Production per cow during January averaged 1,891 pounds, 17 pounds above a year ago.

The average number of milk cows in the 23 states was 8.51 million head, 7,000 head higher than last year and 6,000 head higher than December 2013.
