Jones said Sunday the exercise turned up prob-

structure of about 2.1 million troops. He added that concern about weaknesses in the

Decline marked in world's population by ann blackman
WASHINGTON (AP) - The world's population growth rate, exploding since Adam and Eve, de-
clined in the last decade and experts ow predict
the population will stabilize earlier than they expectThis is the first time in history that the growth rate declined, experts say.
A new Census sureau report on world population,
released . Sunday, shows the growth rate declined
from 2.0 percent in 1966 to rom 2.0 percent in 1966 to 1.9 in 1976 . At the same time, the world's estimated population
increased rom 3.5 billion in 1967 to 4.3 billion in 1977 ,
the report says. A zero population growth rate will be rept
A thas. A zero population growth rate will be reached
between the years 2020 and 2025 , experts say, instead
of a decade later, as had been anticipated of a decade later, as had been antitecipated.
Samuel Baum the Samuel Baum, the bureau's top expert on interna-
tional demography, said the changes are small but
very significant very significant.
"These things change slowly,", he said in an
interview. "Until the last 10 years, the growth rate had beeng going steadilisup, und it had been predicted to continue going up through the 1970s and 1980s.
"This is the beginning of a trend. and it's happening a decade earlier than expected.
