

Synanon Founder Arraigned In Snake Attack

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Charges stemming from a bizarre rattlesnake attack on a lawyer were filed Monday in Los Angeles Municipal Court against hospitalized Synanon founder Charles Dederich.

Dederich, 65, was hospitalized in Kingman, Ariz., for apparent drunkenness and mental depression shortly after his arrest Saturday. He was arraigned Sunday on a felony fugitive charge at a bedside hearing, an Arizona justice of the peace said Monday.

The proceeding was designed to give Dederich an opportunity to waive his extradition rights and return to California.

But Dederich's lawyer, Thomas Thines, refused, saying his client "was in no condition to return to California because he needed medical attention."

Thines said the \$500,000 bond set for

Dederich was "ludicrous." He added that he would ask the Mohave County, Ariz., Superior Court to reduce the bail.

Dederich, whose eyes were closed during the 25-minute hearing on Sunday, may have slept through the arraignment at Mohave County Hospital, said Los Angeles police investigator Marv Engquist, who was present at the proceeding.

The Los Angeles district attorney's office has questioned the validity of the arraignment because, lawyers say, defendants must be conscious to be arraigned.

But Lake Havasu City Justice of the Peace Gene Milam said Dederich was represented at the hearing by his lawyers and that the arraignment was legal.

An extradition hearing has been set for Jan. 2, when Dederich may also enter a plea on the fugitive charge, officials said.

In Los Angeles, Al Albergate, spokesman for the county district attorney, said Dederich was charged with conspiracy to commit murder and assault and with solicitation to commit murder in the Oct. 10 attack on lawyer Paul Morantz.

Although the charges were included in an affidavit and complaint submitted Friday to Superior Court Judge Paul Breckenridge, they were not filed with the Municipal Court until Monday.

Breckenridge said there was a chance the warrant would be quashed if it is determined at a hearing set for Wednesday in Visalia, Calif., that tapes and documents obtained in a search of Synanon's nearby Badger facility were seized illegally. Dederich's arrest warrant was based on this material.

Two Synanon members, Lance Kenton

and Joseph Musico, have been charged with conspiracy to commit murder and assault and with assault with a deadly weapon.

Kenton, the 20-year-old son of band leader of Stan Kenton, and Musico, 28, were arrested after the snake attack on Morantz, who had been involved in a judgment against Synanon.

Morantz, 35, was bitten by the rattler when he reached into the mailbox of his Los Angeles home. He spent six days in the hospital.

Energy Official Says Gas Supply Okay

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation should continue to have adequate supplies of gasoline this winter, despite temporary shortages announced by two major oil companies, an Energy Department official said Monday.

Alan T. Lockard, chief of general fuels regulation, said in an interview that the current gasoline shortage suffered by Shell Oil Co. should clear up by the beginning of next year.

That, in turn, should relieve some pressure on Amoco, which has been running short of high-octane unleaded gas, he added.

Meanwhile, Texaco said it might have to reduce gasoline deliveries to its outlets but is trying to avoid doing so.

The company said it asked the Energy Department to let it base gasoline allocations — if they become necessary — on the 1977 distribution pattern instead of on 1972, as now required.

A spokesman acknowledged in an interview that Texaco failed to win renewal of

an arrangement for obtaining some of its gasoline from a Getty Oil refinery in Delaware and has faced heavy demand from motorists lured to the roads by mild weather.

Lockard said the problems appeared limited to these companies, and there appears to be no general shortage of gasoline.

If a motorist encounters a shortage at his customary gas station, Lockard said, he should have no difficulty filling his tank somewhere else. And he added that there appears to be no reason at present to expect any serious gasoline shortage through 1979.

Lockard's assessment is supported by the American Petroleum Institute, a trade group that says gasoline demand, increased by prolonged mild weather, has begun to slacken. That allows stocks to start rising again.

Lockard said Shell had refinery problems in October and November that affected that company's gasoline produc-

tion and supply. In addition, he said, an accounting adjustment on Shell's books brought down its gasoline prices and produced a run on Shell gas.

"The pull against Shell's inventories was very, very heavy," said Lockard. Caught with its sales up and its supplies down, Shell announced last week that it

would deliver to distributors only 75 percent of the gasoline they were expecting.

Shell's problem also shifted the burden of supplying high-octane unleaded gasoline to the only other major refiners of this grade, Standard Oil of Indiana (Amoco) and Mobil Oil.

San Francisco Selects First Woman Mayor

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — City Supervisor Dianne Feinstein, who tearfully announced the assassination of Mayor George Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk last week, was named Monday to replace Moscone and become San Francisco's first woman mayor.

One of her first duties will be to appoint three city supervisors — one to replace herself, one to replace Milk and one to replace former Supervisor Dan White, who recently resigned and has been charged with the shootings of Moscone and Milk.

Miss Feinstein, 45, is the ninth woman in the country to run a city with a population over 100,000. Only women mayors in San Antonio and Phoenix have larger constituencies.

Her selection to the \$55,596-a-year position — she won votes from seven of the eight other members of the Board of Supervisors — was virtually guaranteed Sunday when Supervisor Robert Gonzales, who had announced an interest in the mayor's job, withdrew and threw his support to her.

Formerly president of the board, Miss

Feinstein has been acting mayor since the assassinations Nov. 27 of Moscone and Milk in their City Hall offices.

There are only 13 months remaining in Moscone's term. But Miss Feinstein — who ran unsuccessfully for mayor twice, including once against Moscone — was expected to seek election next November by the city's 663,000 residents.

It was Miss Feinstein who, choking back tears, stood before a crowd of reporters and city workers outside Moscone's office eight days ago to announce the assassinations.

White, who had quit his supervisor's job and then asked Moscone to appoint him to fill his own vacancy, surrendered to police about 45 minutes after the slayings.

Miss Feinstein is considered a liberal. She supports the Equal Rights Amendment and homosexual rights in this city where an estimated one-sixth of the population is gay.

She had said that if elected mayor she would name a homosexual to replace Milk. He was the city's first avowed gay elected official.

Mart Posts Mixed Day

NEW YORK (AP) — The volatile gambling issues were the big losers Monday as the stock market turned in a mixed showing, ending the rally that began late last week.

Gainers nosed out losers by a 5-4 margin in the over-all tally on the New York Stock Exchange.

But the Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, which had climbed more than 21 points last Thursday and Friday, pulled back 4.67 to 806.83.

The day's biggest percentage declines were posted by Resorts International class A shares, which fell 4% to 27 1/4, and Resorts class B stock, off 6 1/2 to 46, on the American Stock Exchange.

Trading in the two issues was halted at mid-day for the news that the New Jersey attorney general's office had filed a report opposing the granting of a permanent license to Resorts' gambling casino in Atlantic City. The casino has been operating under a temporary license since last May.

The stocks had not reopened by the 4 p.m. close in New York.

Allegheny Airlines, the only carrier with scheduled flights in and out of Atlantic City, dropped 1/4 to 9 on the NYSE.

Among Big Board-listed gambling issues, Bally Manufacturing lost 1/2 to 42 1/2; Del E. Webb 1/4 to 15 1/4 and Playboy Enterprises 1/4 to 14 1/4.

Scientists Compare Distant Venus With Earth

Because of their similarities in size, mass and distance from the sun, Earth and Venus have frequently been termed "sister" planets. In fact, a major purpose of the current Pioneer Venus mission is to gather data to help explain the climate and atmosphere of Earth.
But the differences between the two planets are as striking as their similarities.
Venus cannot support life as we know it. The planet's surface temperature is about 900 degrees Fahrenheit, hot enough to melt lead and zinc. Atmospheric pressure on Venus is about 100 times that of Earth.

In contrast to water-rich Earth, Venus is dry and desolate. Only minute amounts of water vapor have been detected in the planet's atmosphere, which is predominantly carbon dioxide.
Because Venus is nearly 26 million miles closer to the Sun than is Earth, it is logical that it is hotter — but not that it is as hot as it is. Scientists believe the planet's extreme heat may result from the "greenhouse effect," that seems to trap solar heat within its atmosphere. The same effect appears to be raising temperatures on Earth as we increase the carbon dioxide in our atmosphere by burning more and more fossil fuels.
Even with the best telescopes, we can-

not see the surface of Venus from Earth. That is because of the planet's perpetual covering of thick, pale-yellow clouds, which are thought to be composed mainly of sulfuric-acid droplets. The reflection of light off these clouds makes Venus the brightest object after the Moon in the night sky.
According to radar probes and photographs taken by two Soviet spacecraft, the surface of Venus is rugged — resembling a rock-strewn desert — but less mountainous than Earth or Mars. The planet is thought to have huge, shallow craters, as well as an enormous volcano that may be as large in area — though not as high — as Mars's Olympus Mons, the largest known volcano in the Solar System. Venus also appears to have a canyon 870 miles long, 95 miles wide and a mile or more deep.
Another difference between Earth and

Venus is the time they take to rotate on their axes. Earth rotates once every 24 hours; Venus rotates much slower — once every 243.1 Earth days.
Venus's rotation is in a retrograde direction — or a direction opposite both to that of its revolution about the Sun and to that of most other planets. As a result, the length of a solar day on Venus is 117 Earth days — 58.5 days of sunlight followed by 58.5 days of darkness.
The 23.5-degree tilt of Earth's axis accounts for our changing seasons. Because Venus's axis is tilted only about 6 degrees, seasonal differences on the planet are minor.
One additional difference between Venus and Earth is the former's lack of a moon. With this year's discovery of Pluto's moon, Venus and Mercury now appear to be the only planets in the Solar System without satellites.

Nelson applied for appointment to serve out the two years remaining on Hardin's term when the long-time tax assessor resigned last month.
Smith and Jones filed last week.
The commissioners set today as the last day for applications to be turned in.
They are to meet at 9 a.m. Tuesday to make an initial review of them.
County Judge Rodrick Shaw, who will make the appointments along with the four county commissioners, has said the group will try to reach a decision by mid-December.
Hardin, 73, made his resignation effective Dec. 31.

Conflict Cited Between Medicaid, Abortion Funds

NEW YORK (AP) — Abortion rights advocates, government attorneys and a federal judge agreed Monday that federal law could require states to abandon their Medicaid programs if they refuse to pay for medically necessary abortions.
None of those involved in the key abortion funding case recommended abolishing Medicaid for the poor, but they suggested there is a conflict between the 1965 law establishing the Medicaid program and the Hyde amendment withholding federal funds for nearly all abortions.
Proponents of women's abortion rights also maintain that legal restrictions on government funding of abortions for poor women violates the constitutional guarantee of separation of church and state. They were expected to argue that point later in the final day of hearings in the protracted suit before U.S. District Judge John F. Dooling Jr.
Attorneys for the federal government told Dooling they won't decide for the states what a state's responsibility is in applying for abortions under Medicaid, a state-administered program that receives 55 percent of its funds from the federal government.
But they did not dispute the contention of American Civil Liberties Union lawyers that the 13-year-old Medicaid law requires the states to pay for all eligible patients' medical necessities, regardless of diagnosis.
Dooling suggested that in light of the Hyde amendment "states may continue (Medicaid) or not, but if they continue, they must finance medically necessary abortions alone."

Following enactment of the amendment in October 1976, about 40 states adopted their own restrictive language regarding Medicaid abortions, and the number of procedures paid for with federal money has dropped from about 300,000 to fewer than 600.

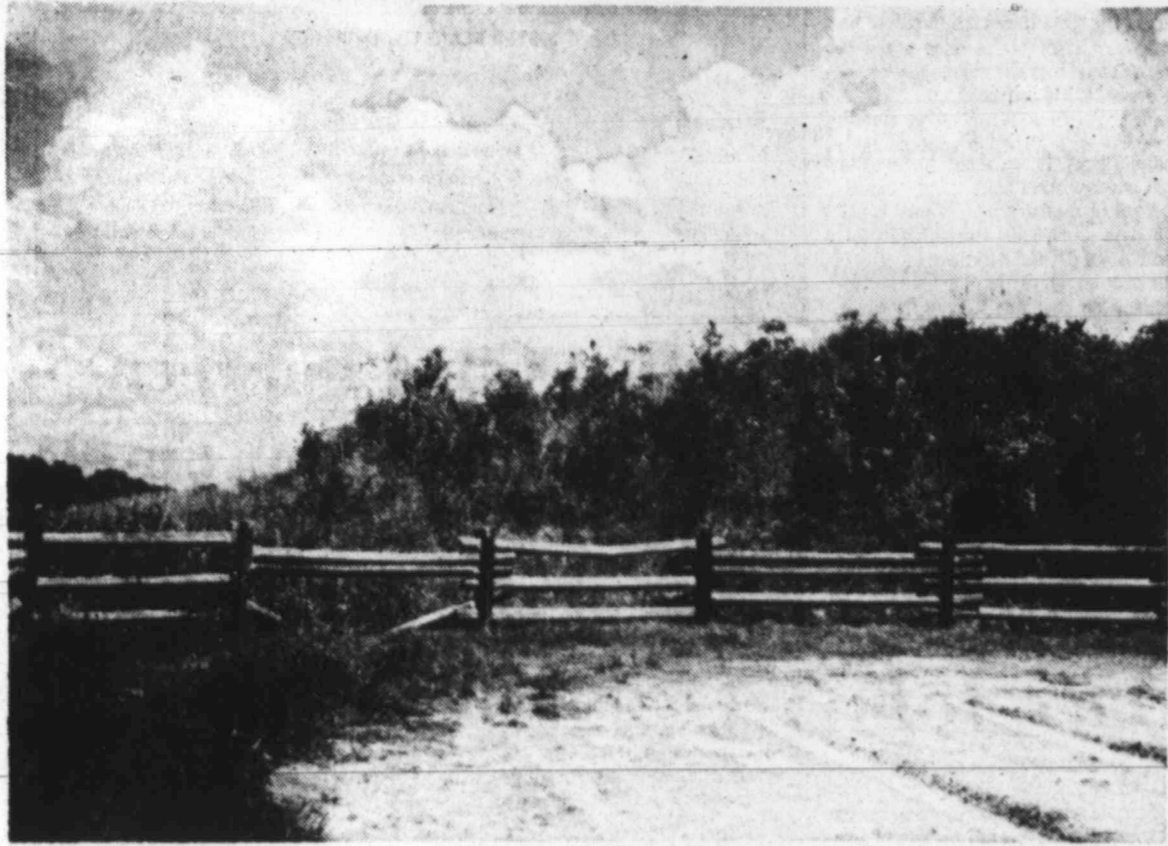

Spaniards Thrust Into Texas Seeking Gold

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second in a series of 10 articles excerpted from a new book entitled "Texas — The Beginning," written by Ed Syers of Kerrville. The book, available through Texian Press, P.O. Box 1484, Waco, Tex. 76783, chronicles the state's least-known years, 1519 to 1834.)

Intrepid names, theirs — Coronado westward; DeSoto to the east. To 1542 Spain, they were failures, yet for that then world-dominant nation they would change history.

Theirs were two of Spain's greatest expeditions — the sun-glittering array of Francisco Vasquez de Coronado, adrift in the immensity of our High Plains; the swashbucklers of Hernando de Soto, three years engulfed in Southland swamp.

Both searched for the Seven Cities of Cibola... whatever Indian fable.

Striking for the mountains remembered by wandering Cabeza de Vaca, Coronado backtrailed him across Arizona to the Rio Grande, then up it and out from it in all directions — from Grand Canyon to our plains. He already had found Cibola.

In the red sandstone of southwestern New Mexico, its walls were earthen, not gold. They only treasure was food; for that, the Pueblo Indian fought to the death.

Coronado planted crosses; he gave gifts; he tortured. Always, the great

treasure was father on. To the Indian, these fearful iron men valued only colored stones; they must be led away. Finally they were led to the real Indian treasure.

At the 12,000-year-old quarries of rainbow-linted flint — today's Alibates National Monument near Borger on the Canadian — Coronado saw the Indian's stone riches and despairing, turned back to what he knew awaited him in Spain.

DeSoto followed de Vaca from the east. From southern Florida he led his men north into wilderness swamp. The only trails followed the rivers.

For three years in great zigzags they struggled against our southeastern forests, lost in a green hell, festering in armor-ovens, fighting from village to village, dying to fever, snake, alligator, Indian ambush... yet always pressing westward.

With DeSoto dead, buried in the Mississippi he had stumbled upon twice, Luis de Moscoso hunted only a way out. At the Tejas temple mounds near Nogdoches he learned that overland deliverance in Mexico was still impossibly distant.

A cubic mile of sea water contains an average of 49.5 million tons of sodium.

Back to the Mississippi, he contrived boats that miraculously survived the awful journey by water. Then, empty-handed as Coronado, he faced Spain.

From journals of the two disasters, Spain would change her mind about this New World. It was no small collection of islands, but a vast continent.

There was no gold eastward; hereafter, search the western mountains.

There must be a better route to them than Coronado's circuitous trail.

Perhaps straight north to the great river?

Chaps Break Losing Streak

With just over a minute left the band started playing, the cheerleaders began bouncing around and the Lubbock Christian College basketball team went into a stall.

And 60 ticks later it was over. The Chaps had won. But this was cause for more celebration than usual, LCC hadn't won a game since the next-to-the-last

contest of last year — a string of seven straight losses.

But Monday night's 68-66 final over Texas College snapped that. Of course, there's still the 34 straight road losses, but save that for later.

The book on the Chaps this season is that they find the strangest ways to lose, snatching defeat from the jaws of victory. Ask a court-side observer and he'll say

"You won't believe the ways we've lost games."

And they almost pulled it off again Monday night.

The Chaps took a 64-57 lead with just under six minutes to play and seemed to have the game pretty well under control.

But Texas College scored 15 straight points to pull within 2 at 64-62 with 3:50 left. LCC turned the ball over and the Texans had a two-on-one fast break. But two layups rolled out of the hole and Jeff Eldridge, the trail man, was called for pulling the ball off the rim.

LCC got the ball back and headed up-court. But once again it threw the ball away. This time Ricky Hubbert made a nifty steal in the forecourt for TC and rammed home a slammer with 2:19 left to tie the game at 64.

Kevin Wharton put the Chaps up on a strong follow of a baseline shot with 1:50 left and then, after being fouled intentionally to end the stall, sank a pair of free throws with only 21 seconds showing to put the Chaps up 68-64.

Still Texas College came back. Robert Gay hit a follow and the Steer press almost forced another turnover, but Lubbock Christian pulled the ball down and waited the two seconds out.

Keith Gardner led the winning scorers with 23, including an 8-of-9 performance

from the field in the first half. He was trailed by guard Bruce Carver's 14. Carver also had five assists but committed eight turnovers, including several key ones at the end of the game.

Hubbert led Texas College, now 5-4 in the year, with 18 points. Trailing him was Kenneth Mercy with 14.

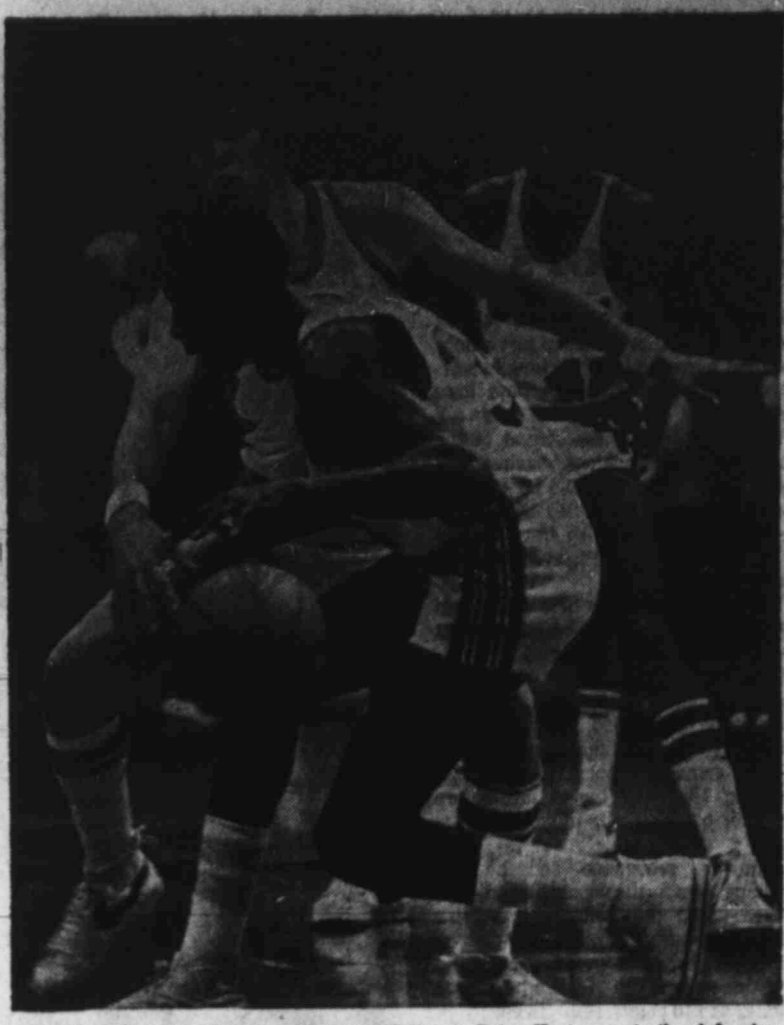
LCC outrebounded the visitors 43-30, paced by Wharton's 14 boards. Gardner had 11.

Texas College came out in a full-court press on defense and stayed with it most of the night. But it seemed to have little effect on the Chaps. Offensively, the Steers waited around the perimeter of the LCC zone, throwing up bombs that hit only infrequently. They shot just a tad over 35 percent on the night.

LCC, on the other hand, worked a slick pattern offense, tossing the ball around the outside to work a man open under-

What Bill Yeoman said had to get the blood running of all Cougar fans, however.

It was the first few days of fall workouts, and the entire southern part of the country was talking about Arkansas, Arkansas, Arkansas. Yeoman had glowing things to say about the Razorbacks, too, but...

It was not so much what he said about his Cougars as what he inferred. Yeoman started out by remarking something about how he was concerned about his tight end. That's a big area for UH, he said. But, somehow, he never got around too much to talking about decided problems.

And, he admitted, Danny Davis was hale again, although there was a little rust around the edges of his daily work.

And, too, David Hodge was laughing and enjoying workouts; just a year ago, he bailed out, saying he was tired of football. With his new attitude was his old (two years ago) ability to handle all tackles from sideline to sideline.

Thus, below the surface, there lurked the thought that, just maybe, the Cougars could win it all...

But against Arkansas, and all its talent?

SURE ENOUGH, NOW that Cotton Bowl tickets are on sale, there is much greater demand along the Bayou than in the Ozarks. Arkansas is hawking Fiesta Bowl tickets and peddling tours to Phoenix for Christmas, while in Houston, the talk is making the trip to Dallas.

With that leadership — David offensively, Hodge defensively — the Cougars stumbled but twice. They opened the season with a disaster against Memphis State, then didn't slow down until they hit Lubbock ten days ago.

ARKANSAS, PICKED BY some as the No. 1 team in the land, didn't play like that until the 11th game in the year. The Porkers didn't lose many, only to Texas and the Cougars, but they didn't display the overall power or motivation to drill folks — even weaker team such as Oklahoma State and Tulsa, even TCU and Baylor.

And when the Razorbacks stumbled, UH sped past.

Texas missed Earl Campbell; its defense had to absorb more of the playing time and at times Russell Erxleben didn't perform as expected. Its letdowns weren't frequent, but UT in the heads-up match with Houston couldn't come up with the big play or leadership to tip the scales.

In addition to not having a Campbell for the extra yard, UT tried a trio of quarterbackbacks without ever completely settling on one.

THE AGGIES HAD their ups and downs, Emory Bellard checked it in, and consistency was something they couldn't maintain. And injuries to Curtis Dickey and Mike Mosley made a difference.

Baylor and SMU, likewise, had moments of greatness — but lapses, too. SMU appeared to be just one running-back away from being a better-than-average team. But so many people loaded up on its wide receivers and sent all the others after Mike Ford that the passing game broke down.

Even at that, the team's explosive potential was evident. Next year, maybe?
