

## Staff Named Dy DA-Elect Montford

CURRENT prosecutor Jim Darnell will become first assistant to Criminal District Attorney-elect John Montford, while Montford campaign director Hal Hensley will assume duties as chief of administration in the DA's office.

The appointments were among several made public Monday by Montford, as he unveiled the staff he will head when he takes office Jan. 1.

The staff will include seven new prosecutors, with six assistant attorney holdovers from the current team of outgoing Criminal District Attorney Alton Griffin. Darnell, one of those holdovers, ranks now as one of the more experienced prosecutors in the office. He has handled numerous major cases and currently is serving as Griffin's chief of felony prosecu-

"We tried to be reasonable and retain a percentage of the current staff as well as bring in new ones," Montford said. We considered the competency of ap-

plicants as attorneys, and also went after people dedicated to being prosecutors." Montford said he had "no apologies" in naming Hensley, his former political campaign director, to the job of chief ad-

Paulina Jacobo, currently an assistant regional attorney for the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in Dallas, will head the juvenile division.

# Strike Threat Adds **To Cleveland Woes**

Kucinich announced Monday that he will lay off 2,000 of Cleveland's 10,000 public workers Jan. 2 in an attempt to prevent bankruptcy for financially insolvent Cleveland. Angry union leaders threatened to strike.

The cutbacks hit police, fire and sanitation services hardest. Kucinich said in a news conference that 875 police, 450 firefighters, 250 sanitation employees, 225 recreation employees and 200 others

would lose their jobs. Cleveland became the first major U.S. city to default since the Depression at 12:01 a.m. Saturday, after it failed to pay \$15.5 million in notes due Friday to six local banks and its own treasury.

**Default Action Stands** There was no movement toward resolving the default. None of the six banks holding the defaulted debts took legal action to collect them, but Kucinich said one of them is interested in attaching the city's bank account. He did not identify

The mayor revealed his layoff plans to union leaders at a meeting before the news conference, and they reacted angri-

Some leaders accused Kucinich of blackmail, saying he threatened to tear up union contracts and cancel automatic

dues deductions from paychecks. The 130,000-member Cleveland Federation of Labor, AFL-CIO, was also represented at the meeting, and its president Mel Witt said that although he currently opposed a general strike in retaliation to the layoffs, his views might change after

the session with the mayor. "The criminals are about to take over. Crime will rule the city," said William McNea, president of the Cleveland Police Patrolmen's Association. McNea led police on strike against the Kucinich administration one year ago, and again in July.

Court Action Threatened Another police union, the Fraternal Order of Police, threatened court action if it felt the layoffs jeopardize the safety of Cleveland's 625,000 residents.

Jack Gannon, president of the firefighters union, said, "It's all for one and one for all. If they're going to cut us to 500, it might as well be zero.

Local detective agencies said they would hire furloughed police to beef up services to clients but would not be able to help meet municipal safety needs. Organized labor has been split on support of Kucinich in the past, but the may-

without necessarily forcing seizure of taxes or assets to satisfy the debt.

"Sooner or later they've got to do it or they lose the right to do it," said Roger Hippsley, a spokesman for Central National Bank.

A quick mayor-council agreement seemed unlikely in view of the bitter relations between the two, worsened by the city's fiscal crisis during which each side refused to budge toward a compromise plan to avert default.

# Western Financial World Jolted By Oil Price Increase

ABU DHABI, United Arab Emirates (AP) - The decision by OPEC oil ministers meeting here to raise prices 14.5 percent jolted the Western financial world Monday, driving down the dollar and the Dow Jones stock average and darkening

the U.S. economic picture for 1979. Leaders of the 13-nation Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries hastily defended the planned 1979 increase, blaming it on the West's failure to conquer inflation and contending it would actually help the world economy in the

long run. "If the industrialized states fail to control inflation or to stabilize the dollar, then the members of OPEC will not allow their revenues to suffer further losses," the oil minister of Kuwait, Sheik Ali Khalifa, said Monday,

The newly elected OPEC secretarygeneral, Rene Ortiz of Ecuador, told the Emirates News Agency the increase "is part of the measures to correct the world's economic situation." He said the OPEC governments have "responsibilities" to future generations "toward development of their countries and finding alternative sources of energy.

The dollar, already weakened abroad by U.S. inflation and trade deficits, dropped in value against all major currencies, by as much as 2 percent against the strong West German mark. Wall

Street reeled, the Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks slipping below 800 for the first time since the end of November. Similar declines were reported in the London, Frankfurt, Paris and Montreal stock markets.

One securities analyst in New York said people were "a little shocked" by the unexpectedly steep rise.

President Carter immediately called on OPEC to reconsider its decision, which he said would undermine his efforts to curb inflation. But there was no immediate reaction from the oil powers. The OPEC ministers, whose decision was unanimous, had all headed back to their homelands by late Monday

Hike In Four Steps The increase will come in four steps, beginning with a 5 percent hike Jan. 1. By late 1979 OPEC's current basic price of \$12.70 per 42-gallon barrel will have

reached \$14.54. The Carter administration's Council on Wage and Price Stability estimates the increase will add about 0.5 percent to the U.S. inflation rate over the next two years. The more expensive oil imports are expected to swell the U.S. trade defi-

cit by \$4.5 billion. The United States gets 37 percent of its oil from OPEC. The OPEC increase in itself will probably add 3 cents per gallon to the cost of gasoline and heating oil in the United States by late next year. Other inflationary factors will add 2 or 3 cents on top of

that, U.S. officials calculate. State Department spokesman Thomas Reston said in Washington market conditions do not justify the OPEC increase "since the current tightness in the world oil market is a temporary situation not reflecting underlying demand forces." He said oil producers share responsibility for the success or failure of programs to maintain world economic recovery and reduce inflation.

For the OPEC nations, the decision means a "good year-end bonus," as President-elect Luis Herrera Campins of oilrich Venezuela described it.

### Children's Tastes Change With Times, Santa Finds

SANTA CLAUS, Ind. (AP) - As the Christmas Lake, and the 611 residents resident Santa Claus here on Christmas Lake for almost half a century, Jim Yellig probably knows as much as anybody about the fickle tastes of children.

And at age 84, he notes that the favorite toys of the time reflect changes in society When he first donned his Santa suit,

Yellig said, "Girls would ask for an apron or pots and pans. You could sit here all day and not hear that today.

The \$12.70-per-barrel price had been frozen since early 1977. The OPEC countries said an increase was needed now because their revenues and holdings had been seriously eroded by world inflation and the depreciation of the dollar, which is the currency of the oil trade.

Khalifa estimated Kuwait's losses at \$1 billion in two years.

Campins of Venezuela reiterated a frequent theme of OPEC price-setting meetings of recent years - that by tapping the wealth of the industrialized nations OPEC "is a great instrument for the struggle of the Third World."

But West Germany's economics minis-ter, Otto Lambsdorff, disagreed, saying in a statement issued in Bonn that poor and developing nations will "find themselves in a more difficult situation" because they are much less able to cope with the price hike than the West is.

At the United Nations in New York, the At the United Nations in New York, the current chairman of the "Group of 77" bloc of developing nations, Ambassador Mahmoud Mestiri of Tunisia, said the price rise will be a problem but added, "I don't think it is first our problem, it's the problem of developed countries ... and we don't think even it's a big problem."

# Hospital Shucks Charity Status

**Avalanche-Journal Staff** THE CITY'S private hospitals Monday were told not to send all their "charity cases to the publicly supported Health Sciences Center Hospital, because taxpayers cannot shoulder such a burden.

Officials of the Lubbock County Hospital District-operated facility made that point repeatedly during the monthly meeting of the district's board of manag-

"Some people still think this is the free hospital," said Gerald Bosworth, executive director of the district and its facility. "This is not a free hospital. This is not a depository for bad debts (non-paying patients)" from other local hospitals.

Others Must Share Load Private hospitals must continue carryng some of the charity load or the hospital district will "have trouble surviving financially," Bosworth said.

Added Jack Strong, acting chairman of the hospital district board: "We just can't afford to pick up all the bad debts from all the other hospitals. The district was created to aid "medi-

cal indigents," persons who qualify for tax-paid care under district-approved poverty guidelines, Bosworth said. "We are doing everything we can to provide for indigency care." But he noted:

"There is a relatively fine line between medical indigents and those who are not able to pay." Some persons may not be poor enough to meet the district's criteria for indigency assistance; but at the same time, they may represent probable non-paying patients, Bosworth said.

Extreme Difficulty" Feared Such "bad debt" patients must be shared by all hospitals in the community, he said. Bosworth said the hospital district will be in "extreme difficulty" if it gets stuck with an "inordinate share of bad debts" on top of the duly qualified

The matter first came up Monday during a board discussion of recommendations from the district's arbitration committee, which handles disputes arising from the medical indigency program.

# Talks Plan Rejected By Chiang

TAIPEI, Taiwan (AP) - President Chiang Ching-kuo on Monday called the United States "the biggest sinner in history" and rejected any negotiations be-tween his government and Peking to unify the rival Chinese nations.

Chiang, son of the late Chiang Kaishek, told 500 members of the ruling Kuomintang Party at an all-day Central Committee meeting that Taiwan "will never consider dealing with any communist regime under any conditions, any pressure, any change."

The party session was called to discuss President Carter's decision to sever relations with Taiwan and establish diplomatic relations with Peking. The move prompted numerous demonstrations here and brought warnings to Americans to stay off the streets.

**Demonstration Conducted** 

Late Monday a peaceful demonstration by 100 to 200 young people was held in front of the U.S. Embassy. The protesters sang patriotic songs and distributed handbills condemning the United States. They were watched by several hundred police who have blocked off streets around the embassy with barbed wire.

Chiang told his party "the communists are on the verge of collapse at this moment. The United States' establishment of relations with the communists is to help save a bandit regime that massacres millions and millions of compatriots. See TALKS Page 14

### **Energy Department** Cancels Project

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Energy Department announced Monday it was cancelling plans to build an experimental electric generating plant at Pekin, Ill.

Known as the "Powerton Project," the \$224 million plant would have tested a system in which high-sulfur coal was gasified, with the gas used to generate electricity. The generating method would have been an alternative to burning the sulfur-laden coal, a process that also requires cleaning pollution from the exhaust

The Energy Department said a review of the project indicated it was too costly when compared to the potential bene-

### **Average Benefits** Total \$391 Monthly

WASHINGTON (AP) - The average privately employed worker received fringe benefits worth \$391 a month in 1977, according to a U.S. Chamber of Commerce survey released Monday.

The chamber said pension plans, health insurance, government-mandated benefits and time-off benefits cost private employers an average of \$4,692 per employee, or nearly 37 percent of total payroll costs. 

# Death Rate Falls To New Low While Life Expectancy Rises

WASHINGTON (AP) - The death rate in the United States fell to a all-time low last year, and life expectancy for the gen-eral population reached 73.2 years, the highest ever, the government said Mon-

The tentative vital statistics for 1977, which are the latest figures available from the National Center for Health Statistics, also show a significant decline in infant mortality. Increases were noted in the number of births, marriages and di-

"The absence of an influenza epidemic during 1977 may in part be responsible for the record low total death rate," the

report said. Public health officials had anticipated a major swine flu epidemic last year, but it never materialized, and there were only scattered outbreaks of the A-Victoria flu

As a result, the death rate from influenza and pneumonia, which together rank as the fifth leading cause of death in the United States, fell more than 20 percent.

The drop helped bring the total provisional death rate to 8.8 deaths per 1,000 population, which the statistics center, an arm of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, termed "the lowest annual rate ever recorded in this coun-

The death rate was 8.9 per 1,000 population in 1976. While the 1977 figures will remain tentative until final statistics are published next year, the numbers are not expected to change substantially in most

categories. The record low death rate was reflected in the latest life expectancy tables, which show a typical baby born in 1977 could be expected to live for 73.2 years, almost five months longer than the previous year and three full years longer than a baby born in 1968.

### China Policy A Bad Gamble

PRESIDENT CARTER'S stunning announcement that he would grant full recognition to Communist China Jan. 1 and sever diplomatic relations with Taiwan may prove to be more of a headache than a boon.

It also could be one of the major foreign policy mistakes of an administration noted for its ineptitude in that field.

Basically, the sweeping move by the President is noteworthy for the future possibilities it opens-both good and bad-more than any immediate changes. Like it or not, Asian policy and politics are again part and parcel of the U.S. and world diplomatic

WHILE BEING praised in some quarters, including former President Ford and numerous members of the liberal wing of his own party, Mr. Carter's action also brought vehement denunciation and doubt.

The denunciation came from, among others, Sen. Barry Goldwater who branded the move "cowardly" and threatened to go to court to stop it.

Former Sec. of State Henry Kissinger, who helped open the doors to Red China under President Nixon, gave cautious approval, while questioning the abandonment of Tai-

Coming on the heels of the President's less than full support of the shah of Iran, his decision to abandon this nation's historic and

moral defense ties with the nationalist Chinese severely undercuts America's credibility.

Recognition of a Communist regime in China which has to rank high among the world's governments that deny human rights to their subjects, Mr. Carter's own foreign policy foundation turns up to appear to be made of shoddy material.

IN ACCEPTING Peking's claim to rule over Taiwan, the President says he would be

merely recognizing "simple reality."

By what rationale? Does he not thereby deny the "simple reality" that the Taiwan government has existed for more than a generation now and that its 70 million people do not want to be abandoned to a Communist regime?

Administration apologists pretend that our attitude toward the island's security won't really change anything, but if time proves them wrong it will be too late to help the Taiwan people.

Reasonable doubts have been raised, too, as to the wisdom of the President's action as it affects our relations with the Soviet Un-

Trying to play the Russians off against the Chinese to make each of them afraid of jumping on the U.S. may turn out to accomplish nothing except to catch us in the middle-and that's a bad place to be.

### **UN: Gendarme Of Last Resort**

ANDREW YOUNG (remember him?) has been rather softspoken since his headlinemaking remarks on political prisoners and assorted other touchy topics of some months

But the other day the U.S. ambassador to the United Nations spoke out in the General Assembly in complaint against the lack of support forthcoming from that body's majority for Mideast peace efforts.

Young noted with distress a series of anti-Israeli resolutions that did not place the United Nations where he thought it should be-in the forefront of peace efforts.

"It should not allow itself," he said, "to be swayed by political doctrines which claim to advance peace but only hinder it."

CERTAINLY TRUE enough, but it is to be hoped that the ambassador was speaking for the record and not in revelation of any sudden realization of the part of his government of the true state of United Nations af-

The organization not only is swayed but controlled by the political doctrines of its dominant factions.

By and large, member states have always sought to use it as a vehicle for forwarding their own policies.

It is an attitude to which the United States contributed massively back in the first postwar years when, with a preponderance of the world's military and economic power and a pack of allies ready to follow its lead anywhere, it made most United Nations policy in Washington.

A NUMBER OF balances since then have shifted.

Whatever cutting edge United Nations actions have in these latter days is largely determined by the axes the multitudinous Third World states and the single-minded Arab bloc have to grind.

# Carter Vs His Party



MEMPHIS-Jimmy Carter's win here in the critical, first-round battle over higher defense and lower social welfare spending underlined a piece of private advice from one of his party's influential moderates.

The advice: take the defense-welfare spending issue to the country, and you cannot lose.

That economic medicine is intensely distasteful to the Democratic party's ideological left wing which normally dominates national conventions. Nevertheless, even in the face of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's spectacular and emotionalized ap-

peal to stick to the old ways, the bitter dose was swallowed whole at the party's mid-term meeting

What emerged from three days of acute party

KONSTANTIN U. Chernenko, 67, Communist Party leader Leonid I. Brezhnev's shirt-sleeves intimate, is the rising star in the USSR. He should be better known to us in the United

Short and stocky Chernenko has a determined face, heavy eyebrows and a shock of white hair. He is not prone to laugh. He looks expensive and restrained, like a specialist gravely sitting at the patient's bedside. And, usually, Chernenko is im-

Born Sept. 14, 1911, at Bolshaya Tes in Siberia's south-central region, Chernenko is an ethnic Russian, although the "o" ending his name is Ukrain-

BREZHNEV AND Chernenko were brought together shortly after World War II in southern Moldavia, one of the Soviet republics. But Chernenko is a loyal aide rather than a rival.

So is Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko. Anything can happen to Kremlin leaders, but, astoundingly, nothing has happened to Gromyko and only to Gromyko.

Going way back to Stalin's long era, this phenomenal survivor has surmounted every upheaval, weathered every purge and emerged in place. You cannot achieve this by being supine or contrite (Gromyko is neither), nor by hitching your wagon to some Red star. Too many rivals push you aside in that land of perpetual conspiracy.

I HAVE KNOWN Gromyko more than 34 years. Edward R. Stettinius Jr. was my University of Virginia classmate. I first met Gromyko when Stettinius, as Secretary of State, conducted the Dumbarton Oakes Conference in Washington.

Gromyko came often to Stettinius' "Horseshow Farm" home near Orange, Va., and finally, as American ambassador to Switzerland, I saw Gromyko in Geneva throughout my four years there more often than he saw his own family.

After Nikita S. Khrushchev's 1964 removal from power, Brezhnev moved to fill the Central Comnittee post of first secretary. Again, he called Chernenko to his side. In 1976 he became one of the Central Committee's 10 key secretaries and in October 1977 was appointed to the Politburo as a candidate, non-voting member.

Today, full-voting Chernenko remains secretary of the Politburo, ranking just below Brezhnev and Prime Minister Aleksei Kosygin in the formal power structure

CHERNENKO can stall when President Carter cannot stall, thus retaining the foreign policy ini-tiative, or act when President Carter cannot, thus also retaining the initiative.

Brezhnev's failures include the differences with Red China's new regime, Japan not being intimidated by Soviet opposition to the Tokyo-Peking Treaty of Friendship, the decline of Soviet influence in Egypt, India and even Western European Communist Parties

They include a new Pope from Poland who defends the right of personal conscience and reaf-firms that Eastern Europe is still a part of Western civilization and not a captive of the secular Russian philosophy and comm

Accordingly, Brezhnev must try to recapture the Kremlin losses in Iran, Iraq, Syria, etc., and wherever there is an internal struggle between the old and the new, particularly those close to the USSR borders.

Chernenko inherits a very tough job.

"In terms of the politics of the '80s," Michigan party chairman Morley Winograd told us, "Carter has grabbed the right issue at the right time.'



The Lubbock Independent School District board of trustees will seek the advice of its lawyers before resolving an issue board President Charles Waters says is "more explosive than desegregation" prayer in the schools.

Waters made that announcement Monday after the local chapter of the Ameri-Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) asked trustees to adopt and enforce a banning school-sponsored prayer. roout 200 persons, a record for a regu-

lar board meeting, packed the assembly room of the school system's administration building to hear the ACLU presentation. The audience was vocally anti-ACLU and pro-prayer.

Waters said the school board will take

the ACLU request, and the response of other members of the audience, under consideration. He said the district's legal counsel, headed by long-time school attorney Charles Cobb, is "thoroughly briefing the matter."

The board will deliberate and probably make a decision at its next regular meeting on Jan. 25, Waters said.

Thomas Griffith, president of the Lubbock ACLU chapter, said his group has been receiving complaints about schoolsponsored prayer for years, and that the organization has written several letters of protest to the district.

"It's widespread," Griffith said of prayer and other religious activities in public schools here.

According to a survey of the city's 14 secondary schools by the school district's administration, seven campuses start their class day with a morning devotion-

At Coronado High, for instance, the devotional is planned by a "group of interested students. A student reads a scripture from the Bible. Then a student offers a prayer ended in amen.'

Some schools use only a "thought for the day," "silent meditation," or "a moment of silence ended with amen."

Elementary schools rarely have schoolwide opening exercises. Exercises are handled by individual teachers. According to administrators, most exercises are patriotic or musical in nature. "The devotional type of program is becoming more and more rare.

Speaking on behalf of the ACLU were Rodric Schoen, constitutional law professor at Texas Tech University: the Rev. Art Preisinger, Lutheran campus miniter for Tech; and Clarence Solnick, a businessman and civic leader.

Schoen said the issue is one of law: The church and state must be kept separate. and government must remain neutral on religion. School-sponsored prayer over loud speakers and in classrooms violate such tenets and are forbidden by interpretations of the U.S. Supreme Court, Schoen said.

### Interest Rates No Hindrance To Housing

WASHINGTON (AP) - Despite near record-high interest rates, the nation's housing industry continues to enjoy one of the best years ever with new housing starts at an annual rate of 2.1 million in November, the government said Mon-

It was the ninth month in 1978 that new homes have been built at a rate of over 2 million, the mark of an excellent year. The rate in October was just under

2.09 million. There was some easing in new building permits for future home contruction, an indication that the home-building industry is finally feeling the effects of the

higher cost of money The Commerce Department said building permits in November were issued at an annual rate of 1.69 million. down 2 percent from the October rate of 1.72 million.

The cost of home mortgages now averages more than 10 percent nationwide, and approaches 11 percent in some areas. The fact that people have continued to buy and build homes with mortgages so costly has been a puzzle to economists.

However, most now believe that people are investing their money in new homes as a hedge against inflation. After discounting interest rates to offset the effect of inflation, which is nearly 10 percent, the actual rate of interest is no so high, ecnomists say, and homes have

become a good investment as a result. Nevertheless, Michael Sumichra chief economist for the National A ciation of Home Builders, said Morey that November may be the last mith for a while in which housing start top

Accounting Office recommended Monday that the government keep a list of persons who would be eligible for the draft in case of a national emergency despite U.S. reliance on an all-volunteer military force.

The GAO, the auditing and investigative agency for Congress, said that because of budget cuts the Selective Service System would not be able to provide the number of personnel the Defense Department said it would need in an

emergency. Selective Service would have to seek a special Privacy Act exemption to keep such a list. But the GAO said maintaining a list of eligible persons would shorten the delivery time. A list could be maintained if the United States returned to a national registration system, the GAO said.

The Selective Service budget has dropped from \$83.5 billion in 1973 during the draft years to \$7.04 million for the advent of the

BONN, West Germany (AP) - Former Chancellor Willy Brandt, who suffered a heart attack last month, drank champagne Monday at a Bonn hospital to celebrate his 65th birthday.

Brandt clinked glasses with West German President Walter Scheel at the hospital where he has been under treatment since Nov. 15. Brandt said he looked forward to

going home at the end of the week and taking a rest cure at Lake Geneva in Switzerland. He said he expects to be fully recovered by March or April. A number of European leaders have

wired their congratulations on his birthday, including Yugoslavian President Josip Broz Tito, Austrian Chancellor Bruno Kreisky, Swedish Prime Minister Ola Ullsten and French socialist chief Francois Mitterand.

Brandt served as chancellor from 1969 to 1974, when he resigned in a spy scandal. He was awarded the 1971 Nobel Peace Prize for his policies of detente with the Soviet bloc.

Brandt has remained chairman of the Social Democratic party, which rules in coalition with the Free Democrats.



Oil Strike Appears Over The state-run National Iranian Oil Co. reported that a 14-day strike in Iran's vital oil industry appeared over after the government threatened to arrest strikers.

Sources in the southwestern Khuzestan oil fields reported that troops and police were rounding up strikers and taking them to work in Soviet-made armored personnel vehicles.

Other sources said military authorities plan to set up special tribunals in Ahwaz, the heart of the oil-producing region, to try strikers under Iran's equivalent of the Taft-Hartley Act which forbids strikes by workers in services deemed essential to the state. National Oil officials claimed daily pro-

duction has risen to 2.6 million barrels less than half the normal level of about 6 million barrels. The figure shows an increase of 500,000 barrels produced in a 24 hour period over the previous day. The strike had cut production to 1.2

million barrels and cost the depleted treasury more than \$750 million in lost revenues. A 15-day strike last month cost \$1.5 billion in lost exports.

Strikes have become the opposition's main weapon in the campaign to topple 59-year-old shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi and have wreaked havoc with Iran's ailing economy.

Reliable commercial sources underlined the extent of the economic chaos by saying that two major multi-billion dollar projects in the Persian Gulf have been scrapped because government funds are low. The source said the projects were a steel plant and a huge copper storage and export terminal.

Strapped For Cash

The official Pars news agency quoted Finance Minister Hassan-Ali Mehran as. saying the government is reviewing all industrial projects because oil export losses have left Iran strapped for hard

Despite claims from the opposition, the military has denied any unrest in the army. One well-placed political source said, however, that troopers "are becoming increasingly sympathetic to the people.

These sources reported some desertions in provincial regions following appeals by Ayatullah Khomaini, the spiritual leader of Iran's 32 million Shiite Moslems and the driving force behind the bloody campaign to topple the shah. He is living in Paris.

Religious leaders believe the shah's Western-style reforms are eroding the conservative values in this overwhelmingly Moslem nation while the shah's political opposition finds fault with his authoritarian rule.

TRANSFER OF POWERS

WASHINGTON (AP) - Responsibility for enforcing federal equal pay and age discrimination laws will be transferred next July 1 from the Labor Department to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, the two agencies said Monday. The change results from President Carter's Phase I reorganization plan, which went into effect last May. Labor Secretary Ray Marshall and EEOC Chairwoman Eleanor Holmes Norton said they have promised to cooperate in the transfer so the two enforcement programs would suffer only "minimal disruption."



would reopen. There was no official word on when the 60-member embassy staff or about 750 American troops would be withdrawn. An estimated 5,000 Americans, many of

them businessmen, will remain. In Washington, government officials said a private corporation will be established to maintain all existing agreements with Taiwan, except for defense pacts. State Department officials said a crash program is under way to provide for the least possible disruption in relations with Taiwan after the United States grants Peking full recognition Jan. 1.

A meeting of the legislature has been called for Tuesday to hear a report from Premier Sun Yun-suan on the American diplomatic switch and what steps the government will take to counter it.

### Kucinich's Brother Charged In Robbery

CLEVELAND (AP) - Just hours before Mayor Dennis J. Kucinich announced layoffs Monday to stave off the city's bankruptcy, his youngest brother was arrested and charged with bank robbery, a spokesman for the mayor said.

Mayoral press aide Joseph Stewart said 22-year-old Perry Kucinich was arrested after he allegedly robbed a branch of Central National Bank, one of six Cleveland banks holding overdue loan notes that forced the city into default on Saturday. Kucinich announced 2,000 layoffs at a

news conference Monday.

Officials said Perry Kucinich allegedly handed a bank teller a note, and received money, which he put in a suitcase. Officers who arrested Perry Kucinich said they recovered a suitcase filled with an undetermined amount of mon-

The mayor told reporters that his brother, one of seven children, has been undergoing psychiatric care for five

"I'm sure he didn't understand what he was doing," Dennis Kucinich said. "He's an extremely troubled young man who needs extensive help."





(WHAT HAS HAPPENED: In Bethlehem, a surly innkeeper turns away the travelers seeking a father, a mother and a newborn baby. A stranger steps forward and offers to lead them to the cave where the baby lies. The boy wonders: A king? Born in a cave?)

# Diverse Groups Oppose Iran's Shah

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - The opponents of the Shah of Iran are a varied assortment of radical Islamic zealots, disgruntled workers, leftists and rightists and those confused by the monarch's crash program to transform Iran into a world industrial power.

They are united only in their desire to force Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi from power and remove what many consider a dictatorship propped up by the 430,000-man army and foreign gov-

ernments dependent on Iran's oil. But, a Western diplomat said, "What it really comes down to is a personal and bitter feud between two men - Kho-

maini and the shah." Ayatullah Ruhollah Khomaini, spiritual leader of Iran's 32 million Shiite Moslems, is the mastermind behind the campaign against his lifelong enemy, the shah. He directs the struggle from selfimposed exile in a Paris suburb and seeks to establish an Islamic republic in his

homeland. Khomaini, 78, claims the shah's father. Reza the Great, had Khomaini's father killed and insists that his own son, who apparently died of natural causes last year in Iraq, was another victim of the monarch's regime.

Khomaini commands his own army of 180,000 mullahs, or Moslem holy men, whose influence reaches into every village in Iran. This network, along with a vast number of Islamic theology students and zealots, provides dedicated cadres in

They are the backbone of the religious opposition and provide the only unifying thread of ideology to the disparate anti-

Islamic opposition dates back to 1923

when the shah's father, an Iranian Cossack colonel who founded the Pahlavi dynasty, launched a program of secularization, especially in education and the judiciary, traditional Islamic spheres of influ-

The present shah continued to antagonize the mullahs by taking over the mosques' vast land holdings and giving them to farmers. The mullahs want the

land back. Opposition mounted in recent years during the 59-year-old monarch's "white revolution," an ambitious economic and social program designed to make this ancient land the Middle East's industrial

The rising expectations of an emerging middle class were left unfulfilled when the economy slumped last year after four healthy years spun out of the 1973 oil

### Launch Carelessness Destroyed Missile

Navy has blamed a simple "procedural error" by preparation crews for the destruction of an unarmed Trident missile seconds after launch Saturday.

The missile, the 17th tested, was launched from the Air Force's Eastern Test Range here. It exploded five seconds after liftoff.

The Navy announced Monday that the missile was launched with its guidance system shut down, and was destroyed by a range safety officer when it deviated from its course.

"The condition (causing the error) is unique to the test set up from a flat launch pad," said Capt. Roland Raab, Trident program spokesman. "It cannot occur from sea launches."

No cost estimate of the Trident or its operation was available since it is part of an overall program, Raab said.

The anti-shah groups share a resentment of what they consider humiliating domination by the Fahrangi, or foreigners. This vestige from the colonization of earlier decades has been fueled by the support given the shah by the United States, Britain and their Western allies.

The anti-shah religious bloc is split between Khomaini's hardliners and moderates led by Ayatullah Shariatmadari, based in the holy city of Qom. A third Islamic group backs the shah.

The National Front, Iran's main opposition political group, is an umbrella organization embracing some 30 groups ranging from hardcore leftists to conservative businessmen.

It calls the monarchy illegal and seeks to force the shah to abdicate. The front demands a national referendum to decide if the shah should stay on his throne.

Front leader Karim Sanjabi formally allied the organization with Khomaini last month. The front has little popular support of its own and, a veteran diplonat commented, "is only hanging on Khomaini's shirttails because he's the one with the muscle."

The 73-year-old Sanjabi was a minister under Mohammad Mussaddeq, the prime minister who nationalized Iran's oil industry in 1951 and forced the shah into brief exile. When Mussaddeq, the front's founder, died in 1956, Sanjabi took over the moribund organization.

The front revived as discontent grew, aided by the political vacuum created by the shah's one-party system and mushrooming unrest over rampant corruption and misuse of power.

The new front embraces a wider spec-

trum of groups than it did originally, but is split between the left and right.

ers. He was lifting its lid. Balthasar dropped to his knees before the baby, bowing his head.





### TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH

DR. PAUL E. RUBLE

Dear Doctor: I have been told I have a nervous bowel and this is the cause of my abdominal pain. The doctor told me this after many tests, including special enema studies. Please tell me how a colon can be nervous. Is it in my mind, so to speak?

So to speak, yes, but not the way you might understand that term. It is as difficult to understand as how emotional factors may affect heart action or the state of one's arteries as with angina pectoris, for example. But such things as angina pain (chest) do occur with apparently normal arteries serving the heart muscle. The same with the bowels. The best explanation is that the brain, the nerve center of all bodily activities, affects how the body behaves, right down to the tiniest blood vessel. This explains how great anxiety or fear may cause loss of control of the bowels - a common occurrence in military combat.

A person under less emotional stress may have milder physical symptoms, such as cramping and bowel pain. Over an extended period this can translate into chronic diarrhea or constipation. If the physician cannot detect evidence of inflammation, bowel obstruction, or some other contributing cause he must con-clude, as did your doctor, that you have a 'nervous colon" or "spastic colon," as it is also called. The emotional causes are many and varied. I have encountered patients in whom childhood conflicts, such as with bowel training, seemed to have contributed to their problems in adult life. Eliminating emotional stress often corrects the problem.

Dear Doctor: I am a 36-year-old female with brown blotches on my face. I'm told this is called the "butterfly mask," and that it is caused by birth control pills or pregnancy. I don't use BC pills and have never been pregnant. So what's causing

You don't have to be using estrogen (in the Pill or other forms of hormone supplements), nor do you have to be pregnant to develop this "mask." A woman may get it if she is sensitive to sunlight and if her ovaries are producing excess hormones naturally. Bleaching creams can help cover the blotches, but I suggest you be examined to determine the cause for the mask.

Dear Doctor: I am writing about your recent column from the girl asking about anorexia nervosa. I had this and am interested in meeting others who have through what I have. It is very con ing to know others understand. U you've had it I don't think you really know what an anorexic is going through inside. Could you send me her address? - M.K.

Sorry, but I cannot since for obvious reasons strict confidentiality must be maintained. I do think that you and others who have encountered the problem can benefit from reading up on the subject. You might enjoy particularly a book that crossed my desk recently, a fictionalized account of one such girl who had the problem (of just not desiring to eat). It is titled, "The Best Little Girl in the World," written by Steven Levenkron, a New York pediatrician. It is published by Contemporary Books, Inc., Chicago, Anorexia nervosa is a psychologic avoidance of nourishment, a disorder affecting young females chiefly.



"John Kehoe was tried, convicted and obviously hanged," Wayne said. "In the eyes of the law, he was guilty. Therefore ve have to ask for a pardon. But we're hoping when it's over, there will be some kind of statement of innocence from the board.

Wayne operates Wayne's Hotel which has been in the Kehoe family since Black Jack bought it in 1861. He filed the appeal on behalf of Kehoe, his family and the Pennsylvania Labor Historical Society, which has strongly supported the pardon move. Kehoe was convicted of beating to death a mine official named F.W.S.







"The Meat Sheet and the Yellow Sheet published carcass beef prices based on less than 2 percent of the total federally inspected steer and heifer slaughter," the report said "USDA Market News Service, for five regional offices combined, issued price quotations based on less than 5 percent.'

In mid-October, the agency sent Bergland its first report in which basically the same material was included.

The October report was a finished product, neatly printed and included an official transmittal letter to Bergland. But Bergland, acting on a consensus of his advisers, held up releasing the first

About 3,000 copies of the first report had been printed, but most of those were destroyed after Bergland rejected the

The revised report included some additional or expanded information, such as more figures and tables to illustrate the

extent of formula pricing. Further, the new report's title was changed to "Beef Pricing Report" from "Beef Pricing Investigation" in the October version.

Another difference is that the October report included a section that showed the 'potential for manipulation" of beef prices-by packers and others. This was omitted in the later version.

The October report, as the later one also at least implied, said "the presence or absence of price manipulation through formula pricing cannot be established from one month's data.

But it went on to list "factors contributing to manipulation potential or incentive", including:

-"Upwards of 65 percent of carcasses from the sample are priced on a formula basis with the Yellow Sheet serving as the -"The negotiated prices vary over a wide range each day, making the concept of 'the price' nebulous in any particular time period.

—"The number of sales logged by Yellow Sheet reporters on a given day for a given carcass is none or small, ranging

from 0 to 7 on a given day for July 1977.

—"The sources of Yellow Sheet logged sales in the month sampled was co centrated among brokers, and the Lake and River regions.

The October version of the report also said that "day-to-day changes in quoted prices of \$1 per hundredweight and more are not infrequent" and that for each 50 cents change in quoted Yellow Sheet thousands of dollars difference in the amount of money changing hands in a large sale" of beef.

But the October report also said that there are factors that tend to mitigate potential and incentive manipulation" of beef prices.

"Even if a manipulation attempt is successful, the perpetrator risks becoming known through the industry grapevine and losing futures business," it said.

### **Cotton Acreage Voluntary Cut** Announced

WASHINGTON (Reuters) - The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced a 1979-crop upland cotton National Proeage of 10.634.181 acres and a voluntary acreage reduction of 15 percent of 1978 plantings.

The NPA is an estimate of the number of acres needed to meet domestic needs, export demand and provide a desirable carryover.

USDA said it may be revised later for purposes of determining the national allocation factor, but it cannot be reduced below the statutory minimum of 10 mil-

If deficiency payments are made, producers who voluntarily reduce their 1979 upland cotton acreage by at least 15 percent will receive payments on their entire planted acreage. Producers who do not comply will receive any deficiency payments subject to the allocation factor times the planted acreage of upland cotton, the USDA said.

Deficiency payments will be made if the average price received by farmers during calendar year 1979 is below an established target price.





Q. We will retire next July, with \$40,000 coming to us in a lump sum from a company pension plan. We understand that part of this can be "rolled over" tax-free into an "IRA." But nobody around here has the particulars on "IRA." Can you give us any information? We would like to draw out \$200 a month to supplement our Social Security.

A. Then you should have no problem at all. Frankly, I'm surprised you can't get details on IRA - short for Individual Retirement Account. Banks, savings and loan associations, insurance companies, mutual funds and other organizations have been beating the drums for IRAs ever since they were authorized by the Employee Retirement Income Security Act

An IRA allows a person who is not covered by a "qualified retirement plan" to set up his or her own personal retirement plan by putting into his or her IRA \$1,500 a year, or 15 percent of annual income whichever is less. The money put into the plan is not subject to income tax until it is withdrawn. The same rules apply to earnings - in dividends and-or interest

The roll-over provision you mention is another thing. It allows a person who receives a lump sum distribution from a "qualified retirement plan" to put that money into a special IRA account and not pay income taxes at the time of the

Your employer can tell you if the pension plan from which you will receive the lified retirement plan, a defined by the Internal Revenue Code. Only your employer's contributions into the plan qualify for the tax-free roll-over. Money you might have put in over the

Banks and savings and loan associations now pay 8 percent on their federally-insured IRA accounts. You want \$200 a month. That's \$2,400 a year, or 6 percent on \$40,000. I suggest you visit some banks and S&Ls between now and retirement time. You'll get all the particulars you

Q. I am a widow, 62, own my home and car and have no debts. I receive \$231 from Social Security and \$73.80 from a pension each month. Last year, I rereived \$2,672.65 in interest from my savings account and savings certificates.

I would still like to work a little, part time, but I am afraid that would interfere with my Social Security. Is there any way I can invest my money, instead of in sav-ings certificates, so that I would not have to report that interest to the Internal Revenue Service? Then I could work part time and still collect Social Security.

A. You can do it right now - without ever shifting your savings. Investment income - interest, dividends, rentals and such — does not reduce your Social Secu-

### Jones' Son Admits To Slayings GEORGETOWN, Guyana (AP) - The in Georgetown with the Peoples Temple basketball team but was at a hotel when

son of cult leader Jim Jones testified Monday that he killed four cultists murdered the same night that Jones and more than 900 of his followers perished in a suicide-murder ritual.

"Yeah, I killed them and was just trying to throw it off on Chuck (Beikman)," Stephan Jones, 19, said at a pretrial hearing for Beikman who is accused of the murders.

A member of the California-based Peoples Temple discounted Jones' statement and he told reporters later he made the statement because "I was mad. I'm tired of being pushed around."

Paula Adams told reporters Jones wasn't even in the cult's Georgetown house Nov. 18 when the killer slashed the throats of Sharon Amos, 42, and three of

her children. She said Jones "did not do it. He wasn't even there when it happened. I should know, I was there. He's doing this because he feels guilty about what his father did. How does a son pay back the guilt of his father?"

She was interviewed by reporters outside the courtroom and said she was among about 45 cultists gathered in the Georgetown house when the victims were slain in a bathroom

Jim Jones and some 900 followers were killed or took their own lives at the Peoples Temple settlement at Jonestown. 150 miles north of Georgetown. Stephan Jones made his startling state-

ment when the prosecutor, Carlton Weithers, asked if he had been part of a conspiracy to commit murder. During a recess after Jones' outburst,

Weithers said, "There are no legal implications to Jones' statement. It just makes him less credit-worthy as a witness."

Weithers also said he would review the matter to determine if he would ask that Jones be named a co-defendant in the

Jones had testified earlier that he was

Mrs. Amos and her children, Diane Harris, 21, Christine, 11, and Martin, 9, were killed. Mrs. Amos was the cult's press representative.

Beikman, 42, has been charged with murder and the hearing is to determine if there is sufficient evidence to bring him

He also is charged with the attempted murder of 12-year-old Stephanie Amos, who survived a four-inch gash to her

A murder conviction carries a death

In arguments following Jones's surpris ing statement, Rex McKay, Beikman's attorney, succeeded in having a statement by his client barred as evidence. In that statement, Beikman admitted being in the room where the murders occurred, but denied cutting anyone's throat.

Jones had testified under questioning by McKay that he told Beikman if he didn't give police a statement "they are going to charge us all with murder."

McKay argued this meant Beikman's statement was not "free and voluntary." Magistrate Desmond Christian agreed and ruled it could not be admitted as ev-

If the pattern continues, "we'll wind up like the church in the Soviet Union — confined to the sanctuary," Cardinal John Krol of Philadelphia told the National Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Religious protests have arisen to rulings by federal departments of labor, commerce, and health, education and welfare, with particular ire aroused by Internal Revenue Service rulings.

One says that a religious organization that polls political candidates on special moral concerns and publishes the results could lose tax-exempt status. Another insists that church-related agencies that are not integral to "exclusively religious activity" must file informational returns.

This, in effect, puts the IRS in the business of "determining what is and what is not 'religious activity,'" says the Rev. James Wood, head of the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs.

He says that "in doing so, the IRS has violated both the letter and spirit of the First Amendment, which guarantees

that government will neither establish nor restrict free exercise of religion.

Under the IRS rulings, returns are de-manded from church-related colleges, hospitals, homes for the elderly, orpha ages and various social agencies which the churches consider integral to religious work, but which the IRS says are not "integrated auxiliaries" to "exclusive

religious activities." More than 80 religious bodies have pro-

tested the ruling in formal testimony "The state has no right to define church' and therefore no basis for defining 'integrated auxiliary of a church, says the Lutheran Council of the U.S.A., also charging a constitutional violation.

The conflicts have heightened tensions between church and state in the country, with increasing legal battles headed for the courts or already in them.

Religious leaders say a basic issue is the tendency of government, through bureaucratic rule-making, to try to confine religion within government-prescribed limits, reducing religion's historic scope and its theological concepts of its own nature and duties.

It "seems intended to reduce religious activity to exclusively Sacerdotal functions," says the Lutheran Council, declar-

# GRAS List Enumerates Items Safe For Public

had the feeling that there are so many cancer scares maybe the government should just tell us what isn't dangerous, take note: There is such a list.

Known as GRAS (that's governmentese for Generally Recognized as Safe), the list currently is under review with results expected next June. The review was launched following the cyclamate scare in 1969 and 1970.

"Does everything cause cancer? No. The fact is that most things do not cause cancer," said Wayne Pines, a spokesman for the Food and Drug Administration.

"But there have been many cancer scares in the past few years emanating from a multitude of sources. The FDA has been very conservative about scaring the public. We make sure our information is very solid before we label something a carcinogen," he added. The only such reports in recent years have been on saccharin, he said, and the agency is now looking into nitrites.

In its most recent study, a tentative report from the Federation of American Sciences for Experimental Biology said Vitamin C, or ascorbic acid, is safe at cur-

Besides the natural presence of Vitam-

to fruits and vegetables as a preservative.

The GRAS list was created in 1958 and includes substances that had been in use for years and were generally regarded as safe items. While they are added to food, they are not regarded legally as food additives, which is a more tightly regulated

The GRAS list includes such things as salt, sugar, monosodium glutamate, citric acid, caffeine, caramel, vitamins and

Here is a quick look at some of the items that have already been reviewed and what was found.

Caffeine: It is added to cola and other soda-water type beverages and no studies were found showing a danger at current levels of use. However, the committee was divided on its potential, some fearing a hazard for children exposed to daily doses. Long-term study was recom-

. Monosodium glutamate: It is used as a flavor enhancer and no evidence of hazard to adults was found. But the committee recommended further study and suggested this no longer be added to baby ence of danger was found in normal use, although overindulgence can cause temporary high blood pressure symptoms.

•Sugar (sucrose): The committee found no evidence of harmful effects other than tooth decay, but suggested fur-•Nutmeg and mace: Again, no evid-

ence of hazard was found but further study was suggested.

·Caramel used as color: There was no evidence of danger but the committee recommended setting limits on some trace chemicals found in caramel.

A federal law called the Delaney Amendment provides that nothing which causes cancer can be deliberately added to food. This has been temporarily suspended by Congress in the case of saccharin while more tests are conducted.

There are naturally occurring cancer causers, such as aflatoxins in corn and

The agency sets maximum levels for these items but they can't be eliminated altogether unless every peanut and every ear of corn were inspected, Pines ex-

## Oil Price Hikes Raise Chances Of Recession

WASHINGTON (AP) - The chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, G. William Miller, said Monday the 14.5 percent increase in world oil prices by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries will worsen inflation and increase the risk of a recession.

Miller became the latest of several top government officials to admit there is a risk of recession next year, although, like the others, he said he still doesn't think one will occur.

"Yes, it increases the risk," he said of the oil price hike, "but I don't think the data indicates it will bring on a reces-

Miller said the higher oil price will force Americans to pay an additional \$4 billion to OPEC for imported oil next year above what had been estimated pre-

The higher prices also will tend to slow the nation's economy more in the second had been expecting. "But there is still room to run out our scenario (for slower growth) without going into a recession,"

Miller made these other points in a year-end interview with a group of re-

### College Rolls Fall Slightly

WASHINGTON (AP) - Enrollment in the nation's 3,100 colleges and universities took a small, unexpected downturn this fall to just under 11.4 million students, the National Center for Education Statistics reported Monday.

But the number of freshmen entering college rose, according to Andrew Pepin, the director of the survey.

Either students are dropping out of colleges at the higher levels, or they're stopping out," Pepin said. "Stop outs" are students who take a leave of absence to work or to "weigh whatever else they would like to see themselves doing," he

The preliminary fall enrollment count by the HEW agency was 11,354,756, a decline of 51,000 students, or 0.5 percent, from last fall. It was the second time in three years that enrollment was

However, the 1976 enrollment drop of 1.5 percent was followed by a 2.6 percent increase last year and the agency predicted at that time that enrollmen would not begin to decline again until the 1980s.

During the next year, the Federal Reserve Board plans to submit legislation to Congress to try to exercise international control over monetary reserves ments, such as a good share of the \$600 billion to \$700 billion in U.S. dollars held by foreigners.

Proposals also will be considered to strengthen the role of the Federal Reserve System as a central bank, giving it control over the money assets of all financial institutions, not just assets of the banks that are members of the system.

Miller said the strong growth of the economy in the fourth quarter may be worsening inflationary pressures, even apart from the OPEC increase. He said if the statistics showing a big gain in retail sales in recent months are accurate and he's not certain they are - then

"If they are true," he said, "it means people would rather hold goods than money. Frankly, that's bad news, because it shows we're not making any headway in dampening inflationary pres-

If a recession does occur next year, Miller indicated, the board will try to soften the blow, while letting it run its Friday

"If we come to a recession, we'll have to be sure we're not allowing it to be so serious a recession" that it would cause a big increase in federal spending to offset "and put us right back on an inflationary treadmill," he said.

He said that while the rate of growth of the economy will be slower next year than this year, between 2.5 and 3 percent, he hopes it will be possible to have slight-

ly improved growth in 1980. The economy is expected to end 1978 with growth for the entire year of about

# Archaeologists Unearth Herod's Pleasure Palace

**By VIRGINIA BORTIN** (Second of six parts)

According to the Gospel of Matthew, Herod the Great ordered the murder of all male babies in and around Bethlehem upon learning of Jesus' birth. He did so, Matthew says, because he feared a messiah had to come to topple him from power.

Herod's reign was marked by much cruelty. But modern biographers dismiss his "slaughter of the innocents" as having no basis in fact.

Herod's contemporaries, in fact, regarding him as a man of intellect and refinement. Egypt's Queen Cleopatra is supposed to have been infatuated with

Moreover, he was an able ruler. During 33 years on the throne of Judea, he accomplished the nearly impossible feat of maintaining peace between his rebel-

Located on the Jericho plain near the biblical "Valley of the Shadow of Death," the site was first developed as a winter palace during the second century

Rulers of the Maccabean (or Hasmonean) dynasty preceding Harod devised an elaborate system of aqueducts to bring water to the area. What had once been barren land was suddenly transformed into a paradise of flower gardens, balsam, date palm and persimmon

In 37 B.C., Herod overthrew the Maccabeans. He then launched a grandiose scheme to enhance their winter palace site. Before his death, he expanded it into a stunning complex of eleborate residences, pavilions, sunken gardens, ritual baths and oversized swimming pools.

One of these pools, excavated by Netzer, was the scene of a celebrated royal murder plotted by Herod

Shortly after assuming his throne, the king was prevailed upon by his beautiful wife, Maccabean Princess Mariamne, to put her 17-year-old brother, Aristobolus III, in the key post of high priest.

The handsome Aristobolus was a favorite of the people. At his first public appearance as priest, during the Feast of Tabernacles in 36 B.C., he was greeted with overwhelming affection. Herod, fearing a return of the Maccabeans and loss of his crown, decided to rid himself of his young rival.

Jewish historian Josephus, writing little more than a century later, describes what followed:

Aristobolus and Herod were being entertained by the ruler's mother-in-law at a family gathering in the old Maccabean palace. Herod urged Aristobolus to join some of the king's friends in the swimming pool. As darkness fell, these - on prior orders from Herod began playfully holding the boy's head under water - "as if in sport," reports Josephus, "and they did not let up until they had quite suffocated him."

Near this death pool, Herod later built what is presumed to be his private villa. He left the former two-storey Maccabean palace intact, burying its central section beneath rubble to form an artificial mound. Atop the mound, he placed a smaller, more elegant villa.

The high elevation gave him cool breezes and a dramatic view of the setting he had created, framed by the Judean hills and mountains beyond the Jordan River.

East of his villa, Herod constructed a recreation and amusement area. It included a second large swimming pool

ken gardens, a circular structure that may have been a bath house, and another palace.

Netzer found remains of a great reception hall in the ruins of this palace. Large stone columns had once lined three sides of the magnificant hall, and its floor had been embellshed with intricate designs in mosaic and marble.

Herod died following a lengthy illness that might have been cancer. Halfcrazed with pain during his last days, he... summoned to the palace Jewish leaders from every part of the country. Upon their arrival, he had them arrested and imprisoned.

Stories that Herod intended the Jews to be massacred immediately after his death are untrue. But ruins of the large hippodrome where they were held may lie nearby, awaiting discovery. The rebellion Herod tried to forestall

MOSCOW (AP) - Soviet dissident Andrei D. Sakharov said Monday he will go on a hunger strike Jan. 3 unless his wife receives government permission to travel to Florence, Italy for an eye operation.

At a news conference for Western correspondents in his Moscow apartment, the Nobel prize-winning physicist claimed Soviet authorities were deliberately holding up the visa application for his wife, Yelena Bonner. Both are prominent members of the Moscow "Helsinki" group, established to monitor Soviet compliance with the human rights portion of the Helsinki accords.
