

Billy Carter May Explain Link With Libyans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department may ask Billy Carter to explain his relationship with a group of Libyan businessmen and government officials who are touring the United States, department officials said Thursday.

Robert Havel, a Justice Department spokesman, said no decision had been made whether President Carter's younger brother would be questioned about his connections with the Libyans, whom he has been escorting around Georgia this week to meet state government officials

and business leaders.

The Justice Department's interest in the situation was disclosed as Billy's behavior during the Libyans' visit prompted an exchange between the White House and Republican National Chairman Bill Brock, who accused Billy of making bigoted and anti-Semitic remarks.

The president's brother responded Thursday to Brock's statement by saying his remarks were "not intended to be anti-Semitic. This trip is not being conducted to be an embarrassment to my brother."

Billy Carter's comments came during an American, Ga., news conference.

Federal law requires anyone who receives money from a foreign government or business to register with the Justice Department as an agent of that government. Department officials said there was no registration requirement if no money was changing hands.

Havel said, "If you feel there's a possibility this person should register, you send a letter and ask this person to re-

spond." Havel said there was no investigation, or even a preliminary inquiry, into the Carter connection with the Libyans. But he said department officials, aware of Billy's activities from newspaper accounts, were considering contacting the president's brother.

Joel Lisker, whose office oversees the Foreign Registration Act, said his office was responsible for checking out reported violations of the law. Lisker refused to comment specifically on Billy's activities.

Violations of the law carry maximum criminal penalties of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. Department officials said the criminal sanctions are rarely invoked and usually would be used only for flagrant and willful violations in which an individual deliberately lied or concealed his connections with a foreign government.

The department also has authority to take civil action in which the first step would be to seek a court order directing the individual to stop violating the law.

Billy has said he regards the Libyans as friends and is repaying the hospitality they showed him during a visit to Libya in September.

Randy Coleman, a Billy Carter associate, said the president's brother has not been paid by the Libyans nor contacted by the Justice Department yet.

The president's younger brother has been quoted as saying, in urging a friendlier U.S. policy toward the oil-rich North African nation, that "there's a hell of a lot more Arabians than there is Jews."

Trial To Proceed In Gill Case

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — U.S. District Judge Edwin Mechem rejected defense motions for acquittal in the trial of a former Lovington bank officer charged with misapplication of funds.

H. Don Gill, who resigned as board chairman and chief executive officer of Liberty National Bank June 13 and as a director Nov. 9, is charged in connection with two business deals involving the bank and a government witness, Lubbock, Texas, insurance agency Harold Harvey.

Defense attorney Leon Taylor charged Wednesday that the government had not proved allegations that Gill willfully misapplied bank funds or that he had done so with intent to injure and defraud the bank.

His motion for acquittal came after Assistant U.S. Attorney Rick Smith testified the government's case. The trial was continuing today.

The U.S. attorney's office contends Gill received half of a \$10,000 finder's fee

Feb. 17 paid to Harvey in the sale of a Lubbock apartment building and half of a \$5,893 commission paid to Harvey by an insurance company that bonded the bank.

Taylor, of Albuquerque, told the jury in his opening statement that the defense would show that \$5,000 payment by Harvey to Gill was a loan backed by a note, and that the other money was a payment by Harvey for sale of stock.

Defense witnesses Wednesday testified the commission paid by the bank in the apartment complex sale was unanimously approved because it was good for the bank.

Smith asked the witnesses whether it

wouldn't have been better for the bank if it had paid only a \$5,000 fee.

Harvey, who had been granted immunity from prosecution in return for his testimony, admitted in earlier testimony he lied in sworn affidavits, letters and in two interviews with FBI agents to protect Gill because he "was my friend."

Area Warmup Due To Continue

Remaining snow and ice across the South Plains should continue melting today as temperatures warm into the middle 50s this afternoon.

Temperatures, however, will drop slightly below freezing again tonight before they climb into the lower 40s Saturday.

Thursday's southwesterly winds that blew 15 to 20 mph should shift to the northwest and become gusty today under partly cloudy skies.

Temperatures should continue to grow warmer over the weekend, reaching into the mid 40s on Sunday and continuing to rise to the middle 50s by Tuesday, although overnight readings are expected to continue to drop to near freezing.

Thursday, Lubbockites enjoyed mild readings that climbed to 45 during the afternoon under cloudy skies. But the National Weather Service at Amarillo reported a record-breaking 317 consecutive hours of below-freezing temperatures by 11 a.m. in that city.

Temperatures generally warmed statewide Thursday, with the highest 4 p.m. reading of 62 recorded at Laredo and the lowest reading of 32 recorded at Wichita

Falls. Winds were variable along the coast at 10 to 15 mph while light and variable winds prevailed in much of central and eastern Texas.

Texas Lawmakers Confirm Results Of November Elections

AUSTIN (AP)—It's official now. Republican Bill Clements will be Texas' next governor.
 And Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby was re-elected on Nov. 7.
 Texas lawmakers performed the largely ceremonial task Thursday of officially counting the general election returns for governor and lieutenant governor. Other statewide races, including the U.S. Senate race, were canvassed Nov. 24.
 By order of the Texas Constitution, the

results in the governor's and lieutenant governor's races from the 254 counties were sent to Secretary of State Steve Oaks, who turned them over to Speaker Bill Clayton.
 While the Senate and House stood at ease, a 10-member canvassing committee worked with a staff of professional tellers to get the official total.
 The result was:
 Clements beat former Attorney General John Hill, Democrat, by 16,909 votes.

Clements got 1,118,828 votes; Hill, 1,101,919; Mario Compean, Raza Unida Party, 14,213; Sara Johnston, Socialist Workers Party, 4,824; and "other" candidates, 115.
 Hobby won re-election with 1,434,613 votes to 760,642 for Republican Gaylord Marshall; 14,855 for Socialist Workers candidate Andrea Doorack and 182 for others.
 Both houses quit until Monday, with the Senate returning at 11 a.m. and the House at 2:30 p.m.
 The Senate took care of only routine motions before going into the joint canvassing session.

The House had been expected to make its decision in the election contest filed by Kae Thomas Patrick, a Republican who lost by 738 votes to Rep. Don Cartwright, D-San Antonio. House members, however, voted to wait until Monday afternoon to hear final arguments from both sides and then vote either to seat Cartwright or call for another election.
 Clayton said that because Cartwright has several years seniority, the contest must be decided before the speaker can make his committee appointments, which are based partly on seniority.
 A select House committee that heard

Patrick's challenge recommended Wednesday night that Cartwright be seated as the legally elected winner.
 Patrick's lawyers based the challenge largely on a 1973 law that changed the district boundaries. They claimed the boundaries fixed previously by a federal court should have remained unchanged.
 The committee said in its report to the House that "the legislature has full power to reorganize the state for subsequent legislative districts at any time."

Convention Potential Interests Lubbockites

The director of the Lubbock Visitors and Convention Bureau told Civic Centers Board members Thursday that the month of Feb. 15 to March 15 will be proclaimed Community Awareness Month by Mayor Dirk West.

Roy Smith said at a regular monthly meeting promotion activities for the month will be aimed at making citizens aware of the city's potential as a convention and visitors site.

"The way to bring people in is to make citizens more cognizant of what's going on in the city and make them salespeople for the city," said Smith.

"We want to show the community that it's money-making business," he said. "Conventions in the state of Texas generate over \$700 million a year."

He said that promoters arrived at the month's theme, "It's not Lubbock without you," when they decided that the people of the city would draw conventions.

"We boiled it down to the fact that the only reason people will come is because of the people — the good people of Lubbock," said Smith.

Promotional activities will include billboard and media advertising, T-shirt and bumper sticker sales and a grade school coloring contest to determine designs for billboards.

In other business, Joan Baker was elected chairman and Al Couch was elected vice chairman of the Civic Centers Board and the Civic Lubbock Inc. board.

Members also voted to change the date of officer elections to coincide with the date of board member appointments.

Currently, officers are elected in January, while board appointments by the City Council are made in August.

"We want to save any embarrassment," said outgoing chairman Carroll McDonald. "It happened before when an officer of the board was elected for one year in January, and then he wasn't reappointed to the board in August."

Upon recommendation of Mrs. Baker, members voted to look into the completion of plaques commemorating the

board members, Urban Renewal Agency members and Citizen Advisory Committee members from 1970 to opening of the Civic Center.

The plaques were approved by the board and the City Council some two years ago, but the project was never completed.

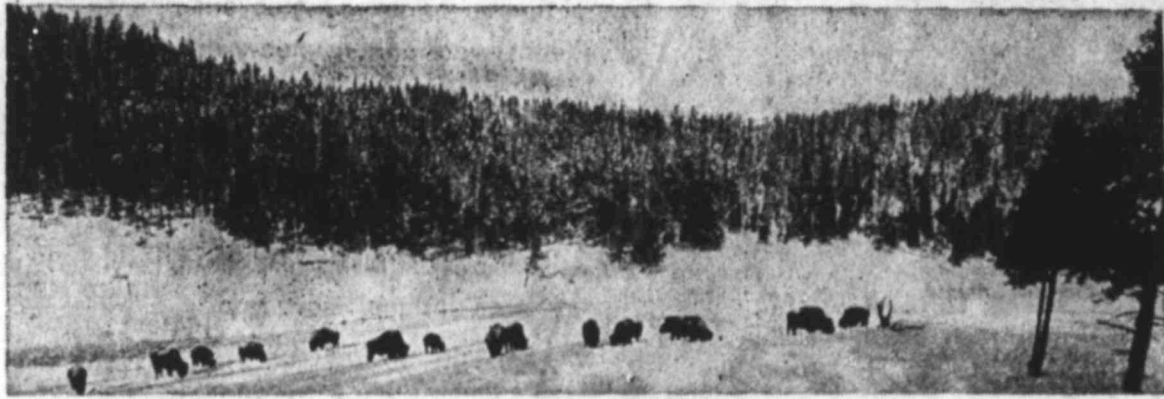

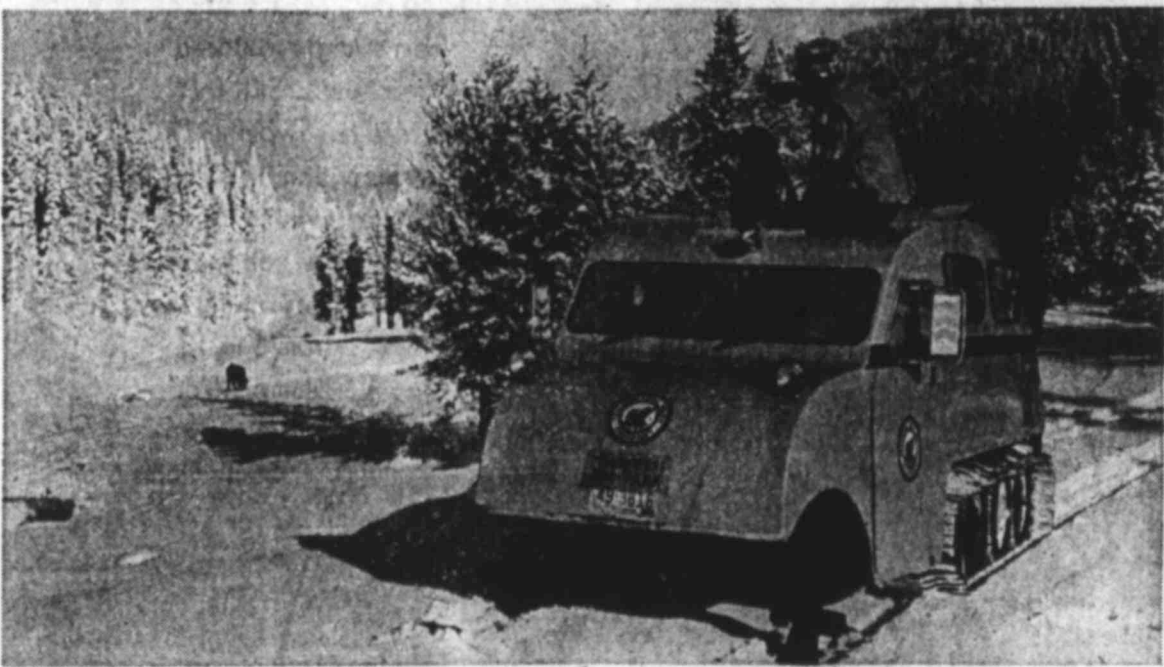
Yellowstone Park Exciting Spot In Winter, Too



WINTER FANTASIA — The gentle slopes and open meadows are almost always covered with dry and powdery snow during the winter months. Skis and snowshoes can be rented at the Bear Den Ski Shop. Old Faithful, Yellowstone Park's perhaps best known feature, is visible in the background.

EASY PARKING — What's a snowcoach? It's a big, fully enclosed, heated fun-buggy that goes over snow. The vehicle carries up to 10 passengers with luggage or lunches to adventurous places like the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone.

At first it would seem that only science fiction could create a landscape like this. A sweep of unblemished white. Stark. Still as death. Until suddenly there is a subterranean grumbling. The earth heaves. Boiling water and steam explode skyward, shattering the silence with a roar. It's wintertime in Yellowstone!

In Yellowstone National Park in winter the world can sometimes seem an unfamiliar place. Summer's green meadows are shrouded under a cover of snow. Landmarks are blanketed in white. The very shape of the land is changed as new contours are created by ever changing drifts.

Perhaps nowhere is this unfamiliarity more marked than in Yellowstone's geyser basins and fields of hot springs. It may look like no other place on earth. Picture the snowfields studded with hot springs of water tinted with minerals. Bright patches of color in the white. Picture the geysers erupting into a winter-blue sky, sending steam scudding with wind in ghostly wraiths.

But, winter hasn't changed the park as much as it might seem. Yellowstone's wildlife — except for the hibernating bears — still abounds. Elk, deer and bison graze the perimeters of hot springs, seeking the grass that is easy to find where thermal heat has melted the snow away. The snow itself provides clues to the comings and goings of other park denizens, whose mosaic of tracks is a record of their daily life.

Where hot springs flow into icy rivers they are proof against winter's encroaching ice and provide pools of warmed water and homes for waterfowl who winter in the park.

The Yellowstone winter fantasyland is there for the visitor on cross-country skis, on snowmobile — even for explorers who prefer to travel in the heated comfort of snowcoaches. Cross-country ski trails traverse the reaches of the park. There are snowshoe hikes available through the geyser basins. Both skis and snowshoes may be rented. Guide service is available.

Perhaps the most popular winter sightseeing in Yellowstone is from the Yellowstone Park Company's snowcoaches. These are unique tracked vehicles for 10 passengers, equipped with windows and roof hatches that are perfect for photo buffs.

Snowmobilers, too, find welcoming roads to explore. Yellowstone has approximately 350 miles of groomed roads, making it one of the largest areas in the country with trails maintained for snowmobilers. Gas and oil are available at Old Faithful Snow Lodge and Canyon Village, along with emergency repairs. The Four Seasons Snack Shop at Old Faithful caters especially to snowmobilers.

Yellowstone Park Company offers a variety of winter packages that present both the seasoned explorer and the novice with a convenient schedule of recreation. There's something for every kind of winter adventurer. Accommodations are available at Old Faithful Snow Lodge near the famous geyser.

There's easy access to Yellowstone National Park in the winter. Regularly scheduled airlines fly into Bozeman, Mont., and Jackson, Wyo. Tours depart West Yellowstone and Jackson. Motor-coach transportation is available through the beautiful Gallatin Canyon from Bozeman to West Yellowstone.

Cambodian Leader Rescued By Thai Helicopter

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Cambodian Deputy Premier Ieng Sary was rescued from his conquered country by a Thai helicopter Thursday, escaping capture by victorious Vietnamese units that closed in on the Thai-Cambodian border.

Ieng Sary, the No. 2 man in the Phnom Penh regime toppled last Sunday by Vietnamese troops and their Cambodian re-

bel proteges, flew to Bangkok and then to Hong Kong en route to China.

The Vietnamese, possibly operating with pro-Vietnamese Cambodian units, reportedly seized Siem Reap, 140 miles northwest of Phnom Penh, and the nearby ancient temples of Angkor Thursday. Sources said Vietnamese planes attacked Battambang, 20 miles farther northwest,

probably the last major area still in the hands of the toppled government.

The sources, who appear to have accurately predicted the three-week Vietnamese blitz across Cambodia, said they believed the entire country would be in Vietnamese or Cambodian rebel hands within two days.

There were no reports on the fate of other ousted Cambodian leaders, including President Khieu Samphan or Premier Pol Pot. But reliable Thai and Western sources said the defeated Cambodians had asked Thailand to allow the transit to China of about 500 people. They were said to be near Poipet, the Cambodian border town where two Thai helicopters landed to scoop up Ieng Sary and others with him, possibly including his family.

Some sources said Pol Pot might have been killed during the Vietnamese invasion. But Prince Norodom Sihanouk, the

former Cambodian chief of state, told reporters in New York Wednesday that Pol Pot was "in the jungle" and in daily radio contact with Peking. About 20 tanks and an unknown number of troops of the new Cambodian government were sighted to the south of Poipet before the rescue choppers landed. The tanks bore markings of the rebel Kampuchean (Cambodian) United Front that the Vietnamese army led into Phnom Penh last Sunday, but there was speculation they were Vietnamese tanks in disguise, since Hanoi claims Cambodian insurgents and not Vietnamese troops are doing the fighting.

Thailand said earlier it would grant transit to high-ranking officials of the toppled regime, but no one else. The sources said Vietnamese troops and tanks were moving along a major highway less than 60 miles from the Thai frontier. Ieng Sary, branded by many as partly

responsible for mass repression and death in his country, arrived in Hong Kong Thursday night. A government official said he would spend the night before flying to Peking, the only ally of the toppled Phnom Penh regime.

As the Vietnamese troops moved closer to Thailand, Thai military forces were reinforced at some points along the 1,290-mile border, apparently in fear that the fighting would spill over into Thailand and to prevent defeated troops from entering the country.

Associated Press photographer Jeffrey Robbins visited a Thai fire base on the border with Cambodia south of the Poipet area Thursday. The defenses were newly dug and the guns, including those on two armored personnel carriers, were

pointed in the direction of Cambodia, he reported.

The intelligence sources reported some fighting in eastern Cambodia but said it appeared to be mopping up operations by the Vietnamese and their allies.

The rebels have established a new government in Phnom Penh. It has been recognized by the Soviet Union, Vietnam's chief supporter, as well as Ethiopia, Hungary, Poland, East Germany, Mongolia, Afghanistan, Vietnam and Laos.

Twin Comets Discovery Seen

AUSTIN (AP) — A University of Texas scientist says he accidentally discovered what he believes are twin comets.

Double comets are a rare occurrence, said J. Derral Mulholland, who made the discovery Jan. 5 at the end of a 10½-hour study at UT's McDonald Observatory in southwest Texas.

Mulholland was photographing the planet Jupiter in a project for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. When the film was developed, it revealed two spots "smeared in the wrong direction," the scientist said.

Other UT astronomers have ruled out the possibility that the comets are false images created within the telescope. However, no other observations have confirmed the discovery.

Three observations are necessary for confirmation and "to get a crude idea of the comets' paths," Mulholland said. He has contacted six other observatories in the United States, France, Chile, Japan and West Germany, but skies are not clear enough to search for the objects again.

The comets appear to be traveling slowly, either north or south, the astronomer said, and one more observation will tell whether they are clockwise or counter-clockwise around the sun.

Because two comets in close parallel orbits are rare, Mulholland said, the twin objects originally may have been one comet that broke apart within the past few weeks. Jupiter's strong gravitational field could have split the comet.

Video Film Of Figure Skating Duo Should Have Broad Appeal

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Carrie and Peter are a star-crossed pair of teen-age lovers from the beginning of "Champions, A Love Story."

Her mother opposes their teaming up as figure skaters because there's "no glory in pairs." She warns Carrie, "He'll drop you."

Peter's father wants to keep him on the hockey team he coaches. He says, "Figure skating's for sissies."

Joy LeDue, who was raised in the "Ice Follies," is Carrie. James Vincent McNichol, who skated every day for seven months to train for the role, is Peter. Both are extraordinarily appealing and believable.

Shirley Knight stars as Carrie's mother.

a pushy, abrasive stage mother whose dreams exceed those of her daughter. Richard Jaeckel is Peter's father in what possibly may be the best role of his career.

"Champions," which airs Saturday on CBS, is a warm story that bursts at the seams with vitality and life. You'll find yourself rooting for Carrie and Peter to become National Skating Champions — until tragedy overtakes them at the climax.

The two-hour movie also stars Tony Lo Bianco as their coach, Anne Schedden as Lo Bianco's love and assistant, and Jennifer Warren, an actress who just keeps getting better and better, as Peter's mother.

"I'm probably a little like Peter's father," said writer-producer John Sacret Young. "My transition was like his. At one time I wouldn't be caught dead on figure skates."

"I played hockey most of my life, finally ending when I finished college. I loved it. I'd always watched the Olympic figure skaters, but I knew nothing about it."

It was while working on "Police Story" that he met a Los Angeles policeman whose daughter is a championship skater.

"He was a man, like Peter's father, who had three jobs to pay for the competition," Young said. It can cost as much as \$250,000 to train a skater for the championships. "He had no knowledge of skating, but the realization that she could be a champion had taken over his life."

He said he also drew his story partly from the plane crash that killed the U.S. figure skating team in 1961 and another plane crash that killed a youth on his way to a regional competition.

"Skating is filled with stories that are

very intense — the romances, the hatreds," said Young. "I don't think that story's ever been told. Skating is a loose fraternity. They share something, the early morning practice, the rigorous

training. It's like war veterans without the pall of death."

CBS To Air Interview With Hepburn

NEW YORK (AP)— "... I'm like one of those long-distance runners, very, very long-distance runner, who just keeps a-going. And they think, well, she's not bad, been running for a hell of a long time. Now how did she do that?"

It's Katharine Hepburn considering — of all people — Katharine Hepburn. And if you're planning to watch just one TV show this weekend, it's got to be "60 Minutes" Sunday evening at 7 EST, for Morley Safer's interview with this fascinating and very private woman.

"She is a presence, no question," says Safer, who taped the rare interview with Miss Hepburn late this fall. "When she's in a room, she takes the stage."

"At the same time, there's nothing grand about her, she's an earthy woman. She's made of ... very responsive granite."

It is, indeed, a remarkable piece of work, as electric as it is revealing. "I was excited and scared," says Safer, who distinguished himself as a war correspondent in Vietnam, "and what was fascinating to me, she was as scared as I was ..."

"We came away from it feeling better. Somehow, you just felt good ... thoroughly."

The viewer feels good, too, convinced that Miss Hepburn has been as honest as

she could possibly be. "I found her to be the most engaging sort of person," Safer says in agreement. "No question is casually answered, she has no stock of small-talk answers."

The 16-minute segment, produced by Jim Jackson and edited by Nancy Lea, includes clips from some of Miss Hepburn's most notable films, including her first, "A Bill of Divorcement," made in 1932, and "The Philadelphia Story," one of her best.

Miss Hepburn was approached by representatives from "60 Minutes" while in Wales filming an adaptation of Emlyn

Williams' "The Corn is Green" for television. The connection — CBS will broadcast the drama Jan. 29 — apparently helped persuade her to do the interview.

Safer says he approached the meeting with some questions in mind for the actress, though "I knew she didn't want to talk about her relationship with Spencer Tracy, and this was not going to be gossip-type thing."

But the subject was unavoidable, and Miss Hepburn comments on what Safer calls "the chemistry on that screen."

"I think we were the perfect American

male and female," she says.

"An idealized version of the American couple?" Safer asks.

"Not so idealized," the actress replies. "I mean, she was a scrapper, and tried to boss him around. And he just pushed her off the right moment."

The conversation, Safer says, was rambling, "just drifted all over the place," but full of candid observation on life and work and people. In the end, we're left with a fascinating portrait.

"You're a legend to so many people, I

guess, just about everyone," Safer tells the actress as the segment concludes.

"because you do not give much of your self publicly, beyond the films."

"You mean it's stupid of me to do this?" she asks.

"I don't know," Safer says, "but do you feel like a legend? Do you feel like ..."

"No," she says. "I don't think anyone feels like anything. Really. You know, I always felt they were out to get me, and that I'd better be good. You know, I struggle to do my best."

Russian Ballerina Balachova Dies At 91

PARIS (AP) — Alexandra Balachova, one of the last prima ballerinas of Imperial Russia, has died in a rest home near Paris. She was 91.

Friends said she died Jan. 5 and was buried in quiet ceremonies in the Rus-

sian cemetery here Tuesday.

One of her greatest roles was in "La Fille Mal Gardée," which she danced at the Bolshoi in Moscow before World War I and later throughout Europe. A refugee from the Soviet revolution, she was a ballet teacher in Paris from 1928 to 1972.

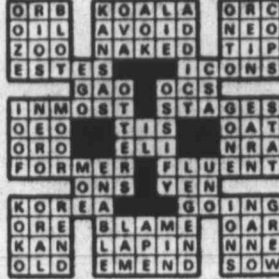

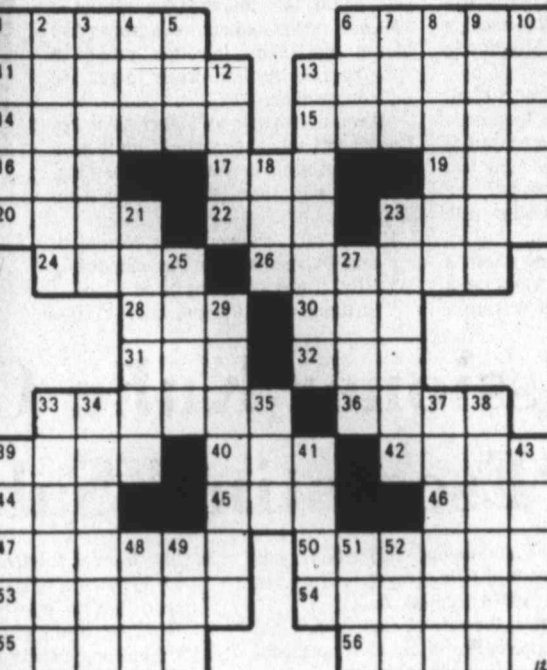

Mart Defies Bad News

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market continued to demonstrate its resiliency in the face of bad news Thursday, closing with a slight increase despite word of a rise in the producer price index.

"I continue to feel that it's the market's ability not to go into the tank despite the bad news background that's helping it," said Larry Wachtel, an analyst at Bache Halsey Stuart Shields.

"The news keeps coming in sour to bad, and the market keeps defying it," he said.

Early in the day, the Labor Department reported a 0.8 percent rise in producer prices in December — matching the November figure — and a 9.1 percent increase for all of 1978. The latter was the largest increase since 1974, and the market reacted with a quick decline.

Analysts said the market's comeback from the early losses was hampered by caution in advance of the latest money supply figures, released after the market closed.

But the Federal Reserve said the basic money supply was unchanged in the latest week, pleasantly surprising many analysts who were looking for a good-sized increase in the basic measure.

Congress rose 2 3/4 to 2 1/2. The company declared a 3-for-2 stock split and raised its dividend.
