Carter Seeks Nation's Support For Proposals

Congress for showing restraint in his budget, is following through with a State of the Union message that emphasizes the urgency of fighting inflation.

Carter goes before Congress and a nationwide television audience to make his address tonight (at 8 p.m. CST), a day after unveiling a "lean and austere" budget that calls for spending \$532 billion with a deficit of \$29 billion. The president obviously hopes to drum up support for his proposals.

One House member said after a briefing at the White House Monday that inflation was uppermost in the president's mind as he reviewed a succession of drafts prepared by his speechwriters.

Those at the session were told the president will ask Congress to approve his wage insurance program, hospital cost containment legislation, a scaled-down welfare revision bill and loosened government regulation of the trucking industry - all measures to cool inflation.

One source said Carter would explain a proposed \$10.8 billion increase in de-fense spending as necessary to fulfill pledges made to NATO allies and to assure military strength during arms negotiations with the Soviet Union.

On foreign affairs, Carter is expected to discuss the SALT negotiations and touch on the need for legislation implementing the Panama Canal treaties approved by the Senate last year, plus unspecified measures to reflect the new American relationship with Taiwan.

It was not clear how deeply Carter would go into any proposed legislation. A White House aide said the president is making a "serious thematic speech" and will send Congress his legislative priorities later this week.

But it was learned that the president at some point will request counter-cyclical relief for local governments in areas of particularly high unemployment, public financing of congressional campaigns, new education and natural re-

Carter, dispatching his budget to Congress, predicted that his spending pro-posals will win broad public support. "It is a budget good enough that I will

fight for it," he said.



Earlier, O'Neill himself had expressed reservations over Carter's plans to cut some Social Security benefits and jobs programs.

Clements To Press For Big Tax Slash

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Bill Clements opened the "first chapter" of his legislative program today, asking for enlarged powers for the governor. \$1 billion in tax relief, a start on property tax reform and a "Taxpayer's Bill of Rights."

While requesting constitutional amendments increasing the governor's power over the budget and the state bureaucracy. Clements also recommended a twoterm limit on governors, lieutenant governors and attorneys general.

The newly inaugurated Republican governor's first "State of the State address" contained over a dozen specific recommendations and a call to restore public confidence in government.

He called it "the first chapter in an ongoing dialogue" with legislators and said its central theme was that "government should be directly accountable to the citizens.

Where Texans have lost confidence in government, we must make them confident again. Where Texans have lost touch with government, we must put them in touch again." Clements said.

Once again - in the face of doubts by many legislative leaders - Clements said the Legislature "can and should return \$1 billion to the taxpayers of Texas over the next two years.

But he did not specify the form such tax relief should take. Possibilities mentioned so far include direct state tax reductions and added state school aid that would enable school districts to reduce property taxes.

Clements said it was not up to him to defend the budget cuts that would be needed if taxes are to be reduced.

"To the contrary, those who are atsuch increases." Clements said in a reference to the "bare bones" spending bill recommended by the Legislative Budget

Clements asked for these new powers for the governor, each of which would require a constitutional amendment approved by two-thirds of each legislative house and by the voters:

- Budget execution, which means the power of the governor to oversee the actual expenditure of money appropriated by the Legislature, blocking spending that seems unnecessary and shifting funds around to meet special needs.

Military Pleages To Uphold Shah

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - Officers of the Iranian armed forces staged a show of force with the imperial guard today, vow-ing that the army will remain united and its soldiers will "shed their blood" to maintain the monarchy and the govern-ment of Prime Minister Shahpour Bakh-

A chief political aide to religious oppo-sition leader Ayatullah Khomeini said, meanwhile, the strikes paralyzing the Iranian economy will continue until Bakhtiar's government resigns and makes way for an Islamic republican regime named by Khomeini. He is expected to return here Friday from Paris after 15-years of self-imposed exile.

The British Embassy announced the Royal Air Force, on the advice of the Iranian military command, will evacuate on Wednesday more than 200 foreigners, about one half of them Americans, from the strife-torn oil center of Ahwaz to Bahrain on the Persian Gulf.

In an unusual military demonstration held mainly for foreign reporters, Major Gen. Ali Nashat paraded 1,000 of his elite troops near Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi's Niavaran Palace. In driving, wet snow, the troops shouted "Long live the shah!" as they raced across obstacle courses and marched in a goose-stepping

"Our job is to protect and guard his majesty and the government," said Nashat. "His majesty has left on another of his regular vacations and the troops see it that way. When his majesty comes back, the troops will be here, ready as always, to shed their blood for him.

The shah left Iran last Tuesday and is

Ruler Calls Off Jaunt To U.S.

MARRAKECH, Morocco (AP) - Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi of Iran has decided to postpone indefinitely his planned visit to the United States because of President Carter's apparent support for Ayatullah Khomeini, sources close to the monarch said today.

The shah and Empress Farah arrived in Morocco's winter capital Monday to a low-key welcome from King Hassan II. Moroccan officials said at the time the shah intended to remain in Morocco for about three days and then fly directly to the United States.

Members of the shah's entourage said there has been a change of plan, but it was not yet clear whether the shah intended to remain in Morocco or would move on to another country.

In Cairo, a spokesman for President Anwar Sadat said the Egyptian leader had invited the shah, who spent the first six days of his "vacation" with Sadat in Aswan, to return. The spokesman said the shah accepted and told Sadat "he would be glad to spend most of his holidays in Egypt because he considers him-

Several other countries are under consideration, the sources said, including Saudi Arabia, Britain and France. Switzerland, where the shah usually spends a winter vacation, has been ruled out because Swiss authorities advised him they could not provide the necessary security.

Asked why the shah put off his trip to the United States, where several members of his family are living, the sources said the shah was "rather disappoint-The State Department denies that Carter supports Khomeini, contending the ayatullah is only one of several religious leaders the president would like to see

cooperate with Iran's new civilian government. Khomeini, firebrand leader of Iran's Shiite Moslem majority, played a crucial role from his Paris exile in forcing the shah to leave Iran. Khomeini is due to

return to Iran Friday after nearly 15 years in exile. The sources said the unstable situation in Iran caused by Khomeini's immi-

nent return was an additional reason why the shah decided not to cross the Atlantic at this time. "He probably prefers to wait nearby to see what happens in Iran after the aya-

A winter storm hammered a dozen states from Texas to the Great Lakes today, as a strong Arctic front continued to move across the southern Great Plains and into the middle Mississippi Valley. Snow fell from the Texas Panhandle through most of Oklahoma and eastern

Kansas into Iowa, Missouri and Minnesota. Northerly winds up to 40 miles an hour caused drifts that slowed travel and reduced visibility throughout the region. A travelers' advisory was issued for the

central and eastern Texas Panhandle through this afternoon, with the National Weather Service forecasting blowing and drifting snow in those areas. The winter storm chilled northwestern

Texas with snow and powerful winds Monday night and early today, but is expected to sweep out of the state tonight, allowing temperatures in the South Plains region to rise well above the freezing mark Wednesday. The storm made travel hazardous in

the Panhandle and eastern New Mexico, but lost most of its punch before it reached the Lubbock area. At midmorning, the Arctic front was

centered on a line extending from the Big Bend country through Central Texas and into Oklahoma, according to a National Weather Service spokesman in Lubbock. It was moving in a southeasterly direction and will leave Texas by late evening today, the spokesman added.

Compared to other sections of West Texas, Lubbock escaped the latest winter storm almost unscathed. Only trace amounts of snow were reported in the Hub City through this morning, said the NWS, and no additional precipitation is forecast through Wednesday.

One of two white men who robbed the 7-Eleven Store at 4201 Boston Ave. about 11:40 p.m. was clad in a pretty pink dress and had a white scarf wrapped around his head, according to 21-year-old attendant David Sanchez. However, the bandit probably won't

win any best-dressed awards because his brown tennis shoes clashed with his short-sleeved dress.

Sanchez said the other robber's attire was almost that of your everyday holdup man except that he also was wearing a scarf, this one designed with red polka

The attendant said the men made off

with \$50 cash, some change and three cartons of cigarettes.

letter to colleagues. William Blacklow, a Moffett aide, said a head-count showed about 100 Democrats ready to vote against Whitten, short of the majority necessary to defeat him but more than Whitten supporters were

ready to acknowledge. Whitten for years has been chairman of the Appropriations subcommittee on agriculture. If he were denied the chairmanship of the full Appropriations Committee, the post would pass automatically to Boland, who has the most seniority among Democrats on the committee aft-

Republicans were also caucusing today to ratify selections of their leadership for filling committee vacancies.

Another subject on the GOP agenda is a resolution urging Rep. Charles Diggs, D-Mich., to refrain from voting while his three-year prison sentence on a payrollfraud conviction remains under appeal.

Freshmen GOP members have already approved such a resolution and John Rhodes, House Republican leader, announced earlier this month that sanctions would be sought against Diggs - including possible expulsion from the House.

Democrats are scheduled to vote later in the week on a proposal by Rep. Peter Kostmayer, D-Pa., for an automatic House vote to expel Diggs or any other member convicted of a crime carrying a two-year prison sentence once all appeals are exhausted.

Tractorcade **Arrives In** Mississippi

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI) - Mississippi farmers linked up with fellow growers today in the American Agriculture Movement's nationwide tractorcade to Washington where the group plans a rally to protest national farm policies.

The group of farmers arrived in Mississippi from a stop in Monroe, La. The tractorcade was to stop later today in Me-

AAM leaders said Monday more than 120 vehicles had joined the tractorcade before it crossed the Mississippi River bridge at Vicksburg.

The farmers, escorted by state highway patrol units, stopped for a dinner and overnight stay in Jackson. Gov. Cliff Finch joined other state leaders in addressing the group.

The farmers are expected to gather in Washington by early February. The farmers are asking that the government lift international trade barriers and the implementation of the 1977 farm bill that allows loans of 90 percent of parity.

While the farmers were on Interstate 20 headed for Jackson, one leader of the group and several Mississippi growers joined a state legislator in urging support for the American Agriculture Movement

Marvin Weeks of Plainview said the tractorcade was already achieving its purpose of focusing attention on farm

"The purpose of the tractorcade is getting recognition. We are receiving a warm reception and we feel the effort will be worth it," Weeks said at a news conference in the state capitol.

State Rep. Lonnie Johnson of Brandon said agriculture was America's "trump card" and that he supported the protest '100 percent.'

Avalanche-Journal Staff Lubbock County commissioners voted Monday to help their City of Lubbock

counterparts strengthen the municipal judicial system and pursue delinquent property taxes on family automobiles.

The second action, granting the sheriff the personnel to serve hundreds of lawsuits churned out by city-school tax office computers, came amid controversy. Some members of the Lubbock County

Commissioners Court said the general public objects to the city-school car tax, and that trying to collect back taxes on such personal property should be a low

Commissioners voted 3-1 to give Sheriff C.H. "Choc" Blanchard a scaled-down version of his personnel request.

The county's governing body was unanimous in endorsing the Lubbock City Council's request that the Texas Legislature create a municipal court of record here. In a letter, Mayor Dirk West told county commissioners the city is drafting proposed legislation now.

"A court of record will make our entire judicial system more efficient. It will allow the city to handle the city's judicial responsibility without placing an undue burde n on the district attorney or the county courts-at-law," West said.

Currently, because it lacks "of record" status, cases appealed from municipal court must be retried in their entirety in the county courts. Due to the complications, many such appeals eventually are dismissed

Numerous defendants in traffic cases routinely appeal from municipal court and flood the docket over here," County Judge Rod Shaw said.

If a municipal court of record is established, "we'll considerably reduce the extreme nuisance factor of people appealing solely to create a bottleneck." he

Jim Blagg, assistant city manager,

sought the commissioners' endorsement. The county courts have priorities, and traffic cases are of less priority than crimes of property or against persons," Blagg explained. Consequently, county courts generally don't have time to retry traffic appeals from municipal court, he

But if Lubbock had a municipal court of record, county courts wouldn't have to rehear an appeal, Blagg said. Instead, they could decide the appeal by reading the municipal court transcript.

This would "substantially reduce the number of cases summarilly appealed to the court courts," Blagg said.

The district attorney needs to concentrate his efforts on county matters and should not have to try traffic cases as if they were new trials. (Criminal District Attorney John) Montford has gone on record supporting a court of record as a means to improving the judicial system in Lubbock," West stated.

"A court of record will not require any expenditure by the county and may in fact help eliminate the need for added county courts at law in the future."

The commissioners court wasn't as solid in its support of the back-tax drive

Since November, the tax office has been filing about 100 suits a month in the county's justice of the peace courts. All of the suits concern delinquent taxes -\$200 or less, as limited by the state's JP rules — on automobiles.

Blanchard and the head of his paperserving division, Captain D.L. Young, said they have been unable to serve any of the suits because of lack of personnel.

The tax suits aren't the only papers going unserved, Young said. He said 250 to 300 other documents, some nearly three months old, have piled up in his office. Young said his six-member staff which served about 14,000 documents last year — has its hands full serving such emergency items as subpoenas an ices of immediate court hearings.

Blanchard asked commissioners for an extra secretary, two deputies, two automobiles and related equipement.

He cited the present "backlog of civil process," and said the city-school tax office plans to generate 200 suits a month for the next two or three months and then step up to 400 suits.

Commissioner Jim Lancaster offered a compromise personnel proposal of one secretary, one deputy, an automobile and an electric typewriter. His colleagues approved by a 3-1 vote.

Dissenting was Commissioner Alton Brazell, who said "the people voted this (auto) tax out" when they passed the so-called Tax Relief Amendment in Novem-ber. The constitutional amendment al-lows the legislature to abolish the tax,

which many governmental entities — such as the county — already ignore. "I'm not for getting the people and cars to serve these suits," Brazell said. "We break our necks getting the papers served and in an hour, the lawyers are over here

getting the case postponed."

He said the city-school tax office sues only the "hardnosed" delinquent taxpay-ers, and that serving suits on such per-sons will be difficult, time-consuming and expensive.

WITH THE price of gasoline soaring, the modes between 1975 and 1976 were far more likely to abandon both public transit and carpools in favor of driving alone than vice versa," the survey indicated.

Furthermore, the study showed, the relatively few workers who switched to public transportation during that period reported they were less satisfied with it than with their previous mode of travel, whereas those who gave up public transit and carpools to drive to work alone were far happier.

SURVEYORS FOUND, meanwhile, a direct correlation between the mode of travel used and the time required to get to work, which may be the best clue.

The medial travel time for workers driving alone was 19.6 minutes; for car-poolers 22.7 minutes. But for users of public transportation it was 39.5 minutes.

The obvious conclusion? In a society increasingly more leisure-oriented, time may be worth as much if not more than money.

As long as public transportation takes significantly more time, commuters will continue to drive to work solo.

NOW THAT THE Texas Supreme Court has considered and swept aside the only major challenge to Lubbock's model sign and billboard ordinance, the beginning that has been made toward clearing out the city's signboard jungle can proceed in a smooth and orderly fashion.

Already finding favor with once-skeptical busi-

nessmen and already showing a fair degree of results, the 1975 ordinance could well be copied by other cities across Texas.

All signs and billboards in the city are to be brought into full compliance with the size and location standards by 1982.

This seven-year abatement period, which the Supreme Court ruled is sufficient, was granted so that investments which already had been made in over-sized signs when the ordinance was passed could be depreciated out.

OTHER. CHEAPER secondary signs already have disappeared from in front of most businesses. For the most part, too, new retail outlets are complying with the new regulations now rather than get a permit for a non-conforming sign that soon would have to come down.

As a result, motorists already enjoy less confusion from a multiplicity of signs. And, store owners enjoy the benefits of being able to put up smaller, more attractive and less expensive signs rather than have to try to out-do their neighbors.


In the past, a businessman could drop a bundle on a big sign only to have it hidden by his neighbor's even larger and gaudier model.

But the biggest benefit from the ordinance will be the removal of over-sized and badly placed billboards from many locations where they now overshadow retail businesses.

Billboards will be restricted to certain locations by 1982, under terms of the ordinance which the Supreme Court validated, and Lubbock will be a safer and more attractive city as a result

DO YOU HAVE even a vague notion of how many organizations keep records on you? What records they keep? How they use this privileged information? With whom they share it (at a prof-

Shocker No. 1: A full 50 organizations keep significant private information on you, a typical citizen, reports Robert Ellis Smith, author of a monthly newsletter, "Privacy Journal," and of an easy-to-read, comprehensive book spelling out answers to these and other privacy questions. 'Privacy-How to Protect What's Left of It," to be published in February (Doubleday, \$10).

Shocker No. 2: Of this total, about 15 are private institutions ranging from banks, unions, employers and hospitals to utilities, marketing research companies and charitable organizations, Smith told my associate Brooke Shearer.

SHOCKER NO. 3: About 12 are federal, 20 are state and six are municipal agencies which maintain records covering a wide variety of informa-Sometimes, the data these agencies collect is

sold, and frequently it is made public and obtained by private firms which then sell it. The Federal Communications Commission

(FCC), for instance, gives its list of citizen band radio operators and their call signs to an agency of the Commerce Department, the National Technical Information Service.

It, in turn, sells the list to private firms, although these names also are made available publ-And the Treasury, as another illustration, dis-

closes the names it keeps of certain rare coin and weapon collectors. There are four major dangers to you inherent in this eagerness for private information about

(1) THAT FACTS you disclose to one group will be passed along to others without your consent. (2) That information about you or your habits will be inaccurate and result in your not obtaining a job you seek or losing a benefit to which

(3) That correct facts will be taken out of context and misinterpreted.

For example, Smith says, "I write a lot of large checks to my local liquor store. Looking at my cancelled checks, you might conclude that I am a big drinker. But the amount of my checks to the liquor store does not reflect the amount of liquor I drink, because I often get extra cash there.

(4) THAT INFORMATION systems are insenice, painless value-added tax and later increased income tax rates, the taxpayer might be worse off cure. Payroll cards are dropped by mistake on the sidewalk, hospital records carelessly left in a trash can, or data exchanged informally among people in different lines of work.

The 47-year-old head of the department of oncology (the branch of medicine dealing with tumors) at Christ Hospital and the president of the recently organized hospice program here talks instead of improving the time that many of her patients have left in life.

She knows how many people — including her fellow doctors - view death

When death approaches, the patient becomes weak and unattractive," she said. "Dying is failure. It's the opposite of what America is supposed to stand for. so we sweep it under the carpet.

"I have to face patients who are dying. But I eannot abandon them when I can no longer cure them."

She is realistic about her work with cancer patients. She knows the figures that only one in three of her cancer patients will live five years. There is even less hope for her hospice patients.

Yet, she is a woman who laughs easily and talks of her children and her hobbies. She is not depressed about death nor does she consider herself a failure.

"Most medical schools have not taught students how to handle death or dying, she said. "With modern technology, most people believe that a dying patient means a failure for the doctor." She doesn't subscribe to the old ideas.

"It's not threatening to treat these pa tients," she said. "I feel comfortable working with the patients in the hospice program because I deal with death every day in my practice at the hospital."

She said she believes that the hospice program, which treats the terminally ill, will bring honesty to the process of dying.

"The doctor has to admit that he can't cure every patient." she said.

If the individual meets these condi-tions, he or she should file for the credit by filling out the short 1940A tax form, plus a six-step earned income credit worksheet. These can be obtained from any IRS office, post office or most

The IRS will figure the credit, if the person doesn't want to do it. Instructions are included with the forms.

The maximum credit of \$400 would be received by a person with an even \$4,000 in earned income. The amount is reduced by \$1 for each \$10 an individual earns over \$4,000, so that \$8,000 is the cutoff point at which no credit is re-

Up to the \$4,000 income level, the credit is equal to 10 percent of earnings, so that \$3,000 income would yield a \$300 credit.

Workers with low income, but who had some tax withheld from their paychecks, must file a tax return to have it reimbursed. Students and part-time workers frequently forget to claim refunds in such cases, and therefore the IRS has no way to reimburse it, the agency says.

In other words, it pays all those who

had some earned income during the year to check whether it would be to their ad-vantage to file a tax return, even if they don't have to

don't have to.

As for deciding which tax form to use, long or short, the IRS says many taxpayers who used to use the long 1040 form can now enjoy the convenience of the short 1040A form without paying any

more in taxes.

The IRS last year changed the tax tables to include both the old standard deduction, the general tax credit and the \$750 exemptions, to vastly simplify the computations. About one half of all tax-payers should be able to use the short

form, it says,





Halogen Gas Headlights Consume Less Power

NEW YORK (UPI) - The American automobile industry may turn gradually to the halogen gas headlights long used in Europe as the result of a new development by the Sylvania Corp., Danvers,

This would result in generally brighter headlights with less power consumption and perhaps a modest improvement in gasoline mileage.

American law requires the easily adjusted sealed beam headlight as original equipment on cars. The European style halogen headlight is legal in America only for foreign made cars since the inside of the lens, the reflector and the outside of the halogen capsule are open to moisture, dirt and other contamination that can make the light beam deteriorate both in intensity and direction.

The great advantage of the halogen headlight is that the tungsten filament is sealed in a hard glass capsule filled with halogen gas. In this environment, the filament can be heated to a much higher operating temperature, resulting in a whiter, more powerful light than the conventional American sealed beam headlight

On high beam, this light will increase seeing distances for motorists by more than 50 percent, according to Sylvania. On low beam, the halogen headlamp

draws five fewer amperes of electricity than the conventional sealed beam tungsten - this is a big enough saving so that, theoretically, the size of the alternator and battery could be reduced sufficiently to cut the engine's fuel consumption by two-tenths of a mile to the gallon or four miles to a 20-gallon tankful.

However, cutting the size of the automobile's generator and battery depends on many things besides the lights - on how big the engine is and how many amperes of power the starter pulls and on how many electrical accessories the car has. European cars usually have smaller generators and batteries because they have smaller engines.

Abortion Factions Renew Fight tives of anti-abortion groups, whose members marched on Capitol Hill by the

tens of thousands, and supporters of legal abortion are taking their arguments into the halls of Congress.

We demand that all abortionists stop the killing of babies," said Nellie Gray, president of the March to Life, which helped organize Monday's demonstration on the sixth anniversary of the Supreme Court decision to legalize abortion.

We demand that our elected lawmakers uphold the right of women to choose safe, legal abortion," countered Karen Mulhauser, executive director of the National Abortion Rights Action League. They must protect our Constitution from the attacks of those with the compulsory pregnancy mentality."

Miss Gray and Miss Mulhauser vowed that members of Congress will hear personally from lobbyists for their opposing sides.

During Monday's demonstration, abortion foes marched along Pennsylvania Avenue from the White House to the Capitol in what its leaders called "a new wave of pro-life action." Thousands of school children and adults chanted "Life, Life!" They distributed photographs of dead fetuses and carried roses, their symbol for life.

'Abort the Court," said some of their signs. Others declared: "You're Killing our Future" and "Abortion is Murder -It Should be Illegal.

Mrs. Gray said there were 100,000 marchers. The U.S. Park Service police estimated the number at 60,000.

Smaller demonstrations - both for and against abortion - were held Monday and over the weekend in many state capitals and other cities.

Three groups demonstrated at the same time in Olympia, Wash. About 1,500 anti-abortionists paraded on the front steps of the Legislative Building - chanting, singing and praying for an end to the use of tax dollars to pay for abortions. They got into a shouting match with about 150 pro-abortionists.

At the same time, hundreds of people were packed inside the building, demanding continued government aid for abortions. In Pittsburgh, an estimated 3,000 peo-

ple paraded solemnly in an icy rain Saturday to protest the 1973 Supreme Court decision. The marchers walked behind three drummers and three pall bearers carrying a small white coffin.

Other demonstrations, some supporting the court's decision and some opposing it, were reported in Florida. Illinois Missouri, Kansas, Massachusetts and

In Washington, Miss Gray said antiabortionists "have a full legislative package headed by a constitutional amendment. We want no compromise legislation. We want to cut out all abortions. Some anti-abortion literature said the

The commission scheduled a hearing for March 15 at the request of the Whalen Corporation to determine if Whalen Lake should be reopened as an oil field brine

The commission last year had closed the lake after environmentalists complained heavy oil content in the brine had caused a thick ring of oil around the lake's edge, and a federal wildlife official said hundreds of migratory birds landing at the playa lake had been killed.

But an order issued Monday said Whalen is prepared to submit new and additional evidence not available at the Oct. 26 hearing to support its contention the lake should remain available for brine

GSA, with 36,000 employees, owns and operates government buildings and buys \$5 billion worth of supplies for the government each year.

More than 40 present or former employees and outside contractors have been indicted in the scandal, which involves payments for work never done or supplies not delivered and the misuse of credit cards. Solomon and the White House have

been at odds over the naming of a GSA inspector general. Solomon had recomnded that Irwin Borowski, GSA special counsel, be appointed acting inspec-tor general while Congress was in recess but Carter did not do so.





But the people who voted not guilty believed Davis' story pretty much per se. They believed he talked to an FBI agent. and Karen Master's story backed him up." said James Morrison, who said the jury was deadlocked 8-4 for conviction.

Three women, including jury foreman Mary Carter, and a man made up the minority of four that held out for acquittal, Morrison and another juror said.

The others voting for Davis' innocence were Vera Miller, Helen Hill and Charles Franks, The Associated Press learned. Juror Frank DiGenova said those who believed Davis harped on the fact that the defense needed only to plant a reasonable doubt in the jurors' minds.

Mrs. Davis named her husband as the assailant who wounded her and killed her daughter and Farr in an ambush Aug. 3, 1976. Davis was acquitted of the child's slaving in a five-month trial in Amarillo in 1977 and remains indicted for Farr's

The Houston trial jurors could not agree whether Davis, 45, heir to a worldwide industrial empire with billion-dollar annual sales, plotted to arrange the slaying of his divorce judge last summer.



trump. He used the Gerber convention to check on aces. When he found out that his side held all four aces, he bid the slam in no trump, rather than clubs, to protect his partner's tenace holdings.

West was reluctant to lead from one of his queens against the slam, so he opted for a spade. To make sure that his partner would not misread the situation, he selected his second-best spade rather than the normal fourth-best. East wisely refrained from covering and dummy's ten won the trick. Declarer cashed the ace of

clubs and West discarded a diamond. This was most unwelcome news, for while declarer could pick up the club suit by finessing the ten, he had no sure re-entry to dummy. His only hope was to find a defender with a doubleton king of spades. So declarer finessed the ten of clubs, cashed the king, and then cashed the ace of spades. When the king did not drop, declarer had no way of coming to twelve tricks. With the help of an end play he scraped together

two spades, two hearts, three diamonds and three clubs for down two.

Had declarer realized the possibility of a 4-0 club division, he could have guarded against it. He needs only two tricks in spades, as long as he takes six club tricks. And he can guarantee those club tricks, providing he keeps an entry to the table to overcome any evil club distribu-

Observe the difference if declarer wins the ace of spades at trick one. Now a club to the ace reveals the distribution, and declarer can finesse the ten of clubs and clear the king. Then all he has to do is force an entry to dummy by leading a spade to the queen-jack, and the contract comes home in grand

French Pastry Makes Delectable Desserts

Eating in fancy restaurants was one of the principal thrills of my childhood, when trips into a fantasy world of manywaitered service, lavish appointments and razzle-dazzle food were, though infrequent, far from rare. They inspired within my youthful breast an as yet unregenerate love for "going out."

My indulgent parents allowed considerable experiment ("You can have whatever you want except the lobster"), I was an exceptionally curious kid, and these places had extensive, eclectic menus. I was fed more variously when a child than were most of my friends. (One woman I know remembers a maternal repertoire of five vegetables: onions, parnsips, turnips, potatoes - and cabbage on Sun-

All the variety, curiosity and assorted 18th century rationalism that characterized so much of my culinary education went down the tubes at dessert, however, when I homed just like the pigeon I remain to this day - straight as an arrow past the creme caramel, sure as an eagle beyond the chocolate mousse, arriving more certainly than mortality and the IRS at "Assorted French Pastry." Despite my concentration on the dou-

ble-decker pastry cart, a waiter was always striding up and tooling the damn thing away just as I was about to decide, finally, whether the mocha slice had crushed almonds, macaroon crumbs or possibly bits of toffee crunch pressed into its creamy sides. Of course I could never resist it. I

would scan the menu's desserts list for minutes on end, but I always came to the same foregone conclusion: "I'll have the French pastry, please.'

ers a multitude of major sins and minor peccadilloes, most of them miniature versions of classic desserts, made from the arsenal of spongecake, flaky dough and chou paste, mousses, fruits, and pastry creams. None of these basics is difficult to make. With a supply kept handy in the freezer, the provident pastry producer is in a strong position for putting grande luxe establishments to povertystricken shame.

CHOU PASTE: This is the stuff of cream puffs and eclairs, profiteroles Paris brest and croquembouche. It must be baked as soon as it is made; the raw dough will not keep or freeze. Once baked, the creampuffs stay fresh in the freezer very well. Let them thaw slowly. still wrapped, before reheating them to crispness in a 350-degree oven - 5 to 8 minutes will be enough. Let the resuscitated pastry cool once more, on racks, before filling with ice cream, mousse mixture, pastry cream or whipped cream.

All standard cookbooks give recipes for this dough, which is almost impossible to screw up. The only thing to watch for is over-egging it. Recipes usually measure eggs by number, not weight, which rarely presents a problem (chou paste is elastic in its requirements as well as its performance), but there is a limit.

Too much egg will make a slack dough that will not hold a shape before or after baking. Sometimes too much egg results from adding all the eggs the recipe calls for. The eggs in chou paste are always added one at a time, the dough being wellbeaten after each addition. Stop when the dough is smooth, shiny and yellow: soft enough to take easily the imprint of a spoon, firm enough so a spoonful stands

without slouching on a flat surface. Bake as directed, fully, even tho they'll be cooked again. Freeze as soon as they've cooled, placing them in a single layer on something flat like a baking sheet until they're sturdily stiff: then pack in boxes for storage. Bags would be fine, were the frozen pastry less fragile.

CREAMPUFF SWANS: These earn you lots of instant chachet, chefwise, though they're very easy to make.

Use a batch of ordinary chou paste dough and a large pastry bag, preferably canvas, with a quarter-inch plain tube. (One 2-cups-of-flour-sized batch will make six large swans or eight to 12 little ones.) Begin by making necks, while the dough is still firm. Use even, light pressure and a Palmer penmanship stroke to make elongated S-shapes, roughly twice

Clip 'n' Cook SCALLOPED TURKEY

blespoon butter. Remove from pan. Melt remaining butter. Blend in flour and salt. Remove from heat, Gradually add milk. Stirring constantly, cook until mixture thickens. Add turkey, celery, green pepper and pimiento. Crush potato chips lightly to make 2 cups. Put about 1-11/2 cups potato chips in bottom of a buttered 1 to 11/2 quart baking dish. Add turkey mixture. Sprinkle remaining chips on top. Bake in 350 degree oven 30 to 40 min-utes or until sauce bubbles. as many as you want swans. (Many of the necks break, burn and otherwise bite the dust before assemblage. Then you bust a few puttin' 'em together.) Be sure the end that'll be the head stays very small: the paste balloons in baking and a headshape that looks fine in raw dough may blossom to elephantine proportions in the oven. Use a separate baking sheet for the

bodies, which are made with a teaspoon instead of a bag. Dip the spoon in cold water, so the paste won't stick, then scoop out rough oval shapes, smoothing them with one or two pats of the spoon; they won't stand much fooling with. Bake the bodies as you would ordinary creampuffs. The necks cook much more quickly - bake them at a steady 400 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes, until they're well-browned and crisp throughout.

Assemble the swans at serving time, of shortly before. Cut the top two-thirds from the ovals with a sharp serrated knife. Work slowly so they don't crumble but don't worry about small nicks and chips. Then cut the hump-shaped top pieces in half the long way.

Put the filling (see below) into a large pastry bag with a large star-tip and pipe a generous mound of it into the bottom section of the ovals. Refrigerate the filling till it's well-set, then put a neck in at the narrower end and use the halved top section, stuck into the filling at appropriate angles halfway back, to simulate the

I hate to admit it, because I'm not so keen on this kind of representational foofaraw, but they're really very pretty, sailing along there on a silver platter and attracting applause all around.

FILLING: Sprinkle 1 tablespoon gelatin over 1/4 cup orange cordial or brandy. When the gelatin has softened, mix it with 1/2 cup sieved fruit puree and 1/4 cup cream. Heat the fruit-gelatin-cream mix ture, stirring it constantly until it starts to simmer and the gelatin is smoothly melted: then let it cool.

It will already be quite thick as soon as it cools, so quickly at this point fold it into 11/2 cups of cream that you have beaten to a stiffness just this side of butter. Sweeten the filling to taste and use it at once. The gelatin-fruit-cream part can be made in advance. It will solidify, of course; just resoften it over very low heat and proceed as above.

The familiar and beloved home of the Lubbock Women's Club at 2020 Broadway, where the women of Lubbock have met, relaxed, planned and celebrated for 30 years, is free of debt for the first time Just in the time from September through

Club members celebrated last week, with a formal mortgage burning, the occasion of the final payment on the club

When the women of Lubbock saw the need for a central meeting place in 1949, a group of 13 women, representing the Parent-Teachers Association, the American Association of University Women and the Rusiness and Professional Women's Clubs, set a meeting date for Jan. 17, 1945. to plan the task before them. Of the 13 women who attended that meeting, all but one are still living, although not all live in Lubbock, and were honored at the mortgage burning party at the club.

and Mrs. Amos Howard During the years that followed, the women undertook various fund-raising ctivities for the new building, such as sponsoring a circus, selling homemade cakes and pies, selling toothbrushes, memorial plates, and a dessert and candy cookbook.

Other women joined the effort for a club house, among them Dorothy Lomax, Mrs. H.F. Godeke, Mrs. Clyde Elkins, Mrs. R.O. Bennett, Mrs. T.E. Buckner, Mrs. Alfred Crosby, Mrs. Retha Martin, Mrs. T.R. Prideaux, Mrs. Robert Maxey, Mrs. Ethel Terrell Short, Mrs. Virgie Lewis, Mrs. Vera Chapman, Judge Sarah Hughes, Mrs. Vivian Johnson Adams, Mrs. Percy Spencer, Mrs. L.L. NEW YORK (WNS) - Food costs led the inflation parade last year with an 11 percent increase that left many moderate-income families wondering if a time might come when they wouldn't be able to feed their families adequately on the money they have available.

High food prices are expected to be a main force again in the 8 percent most economists look for in 1979 - a rate only a little less severe than the 9 percent that shocked the public last year. Government economists estimate that food prices will go up 6 percent to 10 percent

But unlike housing, food is one of your most flexible expenses. The table of food costs with this article shows that a family with two children under, say 14, would have to spend \$77 a week, not counting cleaning supplies, even if all meals are eaten at home. In reality, many families can't afford this much or would rather have more money for other

It is possible with knowledgeable planning and preparation to serve attractive, nutritious meals for less even than the moderate-cost plan shown here, and many families do it.

Your main problem in 1979, as it was in the last months of '78, will be the high cost of meat and some of the other protein alternatives such as fish and even

Your strategy no longer can consist largely of shifting down to the lowercost cuts. Some of these have gone up faster than the expensive cuts as more people have turned to them. Hamburger has gone up 35 percent; sirloin and round, 27 percent to 30 percent.

To avoid bankruptcy at the meat counter this year, you now really need to limit the dollar amounts you spend for meat. One yardstick could be to hold your spending for meat, poultry, fish and eggs under 4 percent of your aftertax income, or under 22 percent of your food dollar, whichever way you want to figure it. These are the "weights" or relative importance of these items as used in the Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index.

Poultry has gone up less drastically than red meats and in 1979 will be a major refuge of economy-seeking consumers. While beef prices are expected to rise another 10 to 14 percent this coming year and as much as 20 percent in the first quarter, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has forecast a 10 percent increase in broiler production.

Broilers and hamburger for ground beef are really the main competitors for a moderate-income shopper's meat dol-

Produce often is subject to impulse buying. Especially be careful about buying fruit and other items because of large size and attractive color. The red-Low-cost Moderate cost Plan large size and attractive color. The red-der apples, perfectly shaped pears, larg-er tomatoes, full-colored oranges, jumbo asparagus spears, etc., usually have no better eating quality or nutrition than less-perfect-looking specimens often priced 10 percent to 30 percent less.

Vegetables which are often relative good buys because they provide a num-ber of nutrients at moderate to medium prices include spinach, kale, collard and mustard greens, peas, canned corn, lima beans, broccoli, okra, carrots and

canned tomatoes.

In buying frozen vegetables, a winter mainstay, stick to the simplest version. You can pay from 40 cents a pound to 89 cents depending on the type and brand. Thus, researcher Jane Harmon found

frozen green beans in a 32-ounce pour bag in a house brand at 40 cents pound; the same beans in a 10-ounce package at 34 cents, which come to 54 cents a pound, a name brand in butter sauce at 50 cents for a nine-ounce box -89 cents a pound.

Or, you may pay 35 percent more for frozen broccoli with a ready-made butter sauce and 70 percent more with hollan-

One help to economy seekers is that dairy products, while they will cost more in 1979, haven't gone up as drastically as meats and produce.

But what has gone up sharply is soft drinks and other nonalcoholic bever-ages; a whopping 240 percent since 1967, more than any other food category.

How are consumers coping with the food hikes? In general, they've become much more businesslike about buying; giving more time and planning to shopping for food and household needs.

Various surveys have shown these frequent devices: Greater use of coupons; more bulk buying including meats and such specials as 10-pound and 30-pound bags of turkey drumsticks; stretching ground beef with soy granules, oatmeals, preplanning purchases to a greater ex-tent and shopping with prepared lists; checking specials in supermarket ads, and buying more of the house and gener-

Where available, the relatively new generic brands have been satisfacatory to consumers. In a survey of 1,000 people, it the Consumer Response Corp. found the great majority of those who had bought generic products would do so again. The generic or unbranded products usually lare standard grade or Grade C and loc sometimes B, instead of fancy or Grade of A and sometimes B, as the national and life house brand products usually are.

The generic brand usually cost 30 per-The generic brand usually cost 30 percent to 40 percent less than national brands and about 20 percent less than the store brands. Officials Say Transition Goes Well

By JEFF SOUTH Avalanche-Journal Staff

The second half of the academic year's desegregation plan got off to a good start as an estimated 1,650 elementary children changed schools, educators here said today.

"It was a very smooth transition," Dr. E.C. Leslie, assistant superintendent for administration, said of the midterm switchover required by the Lubbock Independent School District's new court-ordered integration plan.

From a transportation standpoint, the district experienced only minor problems, he said. Some buses were running off schedule and a few were overcrowded. Leslie said he hopes to correct those problems this week.

Principals said the student flip-flop also is going well academically. Although some parents and teachers thought the changeover would be an educational disaster, school administrators reported no such academic disruptions

The students were in gear academically from the time they arrived," said Carroll Lockett, principal of Williams Elementary, 4812 58th St.

"It was as though these kids had been here all year," he added.

The elementary-level desegregation plan involves a cross-assignment between six minority-area schools and 18 whitearea schools. The minority campuses are busing each minority student every other year to a white school; the white campuses are busing each white student for one semester of one or two grades to a minority school.

The first semester, 680 minorities and 1,050 whites were bused each day/(Another 150 children, mostly whites, are bused voluntarily to the "magnet" program at Iles Elementary.)

For the second semester, which began Monday, minorities stay where they are. The whites (last names A through L) returned to their neighborhood schools except for the 270 such pupils who opted to stay crosstown. And a new group of whites (same grades, but last names M through Z) numbering about 850 started riding the bus to non-neighborhood "sis-

Williams Elementary, for instance, got back its A-through-L fifth-graders and sixth-graders from Posey Elementary, 1301 Redbud Ave. In turn, Williams started sending to Posey the M-through-Z fifth-graders and sixth-graders.

"It's just been beautiful. It could not have been nicer for us. I have not heard one negative word, from a teacher or student, concerning the transition," Lockett

Lockett said that Monday was "a productive day, a good day" academically in marked contrast to pessimists' predictions that students would have trouble adjusting to a different school. (Besides changing teachers, some children also were changing instructional formats. Posey, for example, is a self-contained school; Williams, an open-space school.)

Principals said extensive preparations - such as faculty meetings and a new system for keeping students' academic progress - paid off in the semester swit-

Each youngster changing schools was accompanied by a large brown folder containing information on where the child left off in every subject at the end of the first semester, school administrators said.

The folder also told what textbooks the student had been using. Thus, principals said, teachers got an "instant profile" of their new students and were able to put them to work.

"The exchange of students and records was well planned all over the system, said Bob Peterson, principal of Martin Elementary, 3315 E. Broadway

Martin, a minority-area school, gets first-graders from Stewart Elementary, second-graders and sixth-graders from Wheelock Elementary, third-graders and fourth-graders from Parsons Elementary, and fifth-graders from Dupre Ele-

On Monday most of the A-L students in those designated grades returned to their neighborhood schools (although about 80 students elected to remain at Martin), and the M-Z students took their places.

"We didn't lose any children, thank goodness," Peterson said. "It was very smooth. The kids were settled in within 30 minutes after they arrived.'

Leslie said just one bus - on the morning run from Wheelock to Dupre to Martin - proved to be overcrowded. So the school system plans to change some routes (a bus will go from Wheelock directly to Martin; Dupre will be picked up on the Stewart-to-Martin run).

At-Large Ballot Impact Termed 'Insignificant'

A political science professor from the University of Texas at Arlington concluded in federal court this morning that Lubbock's at-large method of electing city council members has had "an insignificant impact on the accessibility of minorities to the political process.

Dr. Delbert Taebel, a professor in the Institute of Urban Studies at UT-Arlington, testified there is a very "insignificant" amount of voting along racial lines in Lubbock, that there is little evidence of agreement between blacks and Mexican-Americans on most issues and that minorities have determined the outcome of close city council elections.

accounted for only nine percent of the 'impact' on under-representation. The impact of an at-large system on minority representation is virtually zero in cities such as Lubbock with a black population of ten percent or less, Taebel said.

'At-large elections and the size of the city council (in Lubbock) are not important factors in accounting for the degree of under-representation of blacks," he

Taebel testified such a study would not perform for Mexican-Americans and it is inappropriate to lump the two minority groups together as Johnson did. Taebel said, contrary to Johnson's con-

clusions, that voter turnout in minority precincts in Lubbock is "extremely high." in comparison with other cities in Texas. In other cities in the state, turnout av-

erages between 15 and 20 percent while in the last Lubbock city election, 32.7 percent of the registered voters cast ballots. For all municipal elections since 1970 the average is 41 percent, he said. In the 1978 city election, a key black

precinct voted 38.4 percent, higher than the citywide average, white precincts voted about 8 percent lower than the city wide average (24.8 percent) and Mexican-American precincts turned out 19.2 percent of the registered voters.

Citing voting patterns of blacks and Mexican-Americans in two general elections, a charter election and bond elections, Taebel found "a great deal of dissimilarity between the voting patterns" of the two minority groups.

In the 1975 charter amendment election to require some city council members to meet residencey requirements, Taebel said Mexican-American precincts voted against the charter change almost two-to-one. However, black voters overwhelmingly supported the amendment with more than 90 percent of their vote.

Taebel also said minority precincts had determined the outcome of two very close elections involving Councilwoman Carolyn Jordan.

In a 1972 runoff and in a 1976 runoff, the minority voters gave Mrs. Jordan more than enough votes to be the victor in extremely close races.

Minorities can play the swing vote and have a tremendous impact" on the result of an election, Taebel said, "and certainly after the elections their impact would be recognized by those elected."

Briber Admits Paying \$5,000 To Rep. Flood

WASHINGTON (AP) - A convicted briber told the bribery-perjury trial of Rep. Daniel Flood, D-Pa., today he gave Flood \$5,000 as an advance payoff for his help in selling temporary housing to the government for Pennsylvania victims of a major flood in 1972.



Co. in Cleveland's recent default. Rep. Benjamin Rosenthal, D-N.Y., said Monday he would ask the Fed to investigate whether the bank violated its charter. by not acting in the public interest, during Cleveland's financial troubles. Rosenthal, who chairs a House subcommittee on commerce, consumer and monetary affairs, met Monday with Cleveland Mayor Dennis Kucinich. Kucinich accused the city's largest bank of "trying to dictate public policy" and forcing the city into defaulting on its notes.

Closed-Door Policy Draws Group's Ire

Avalanche-Journal Staff Legal recourse having failed, Common Cause of Texas showed up Monday night for a closed-door meeting of the Lubbock school board to vocally protest the board's secrecy in running the public's schools.

The statewide citizens lobby, unsuccessful in getting the courts to stop school trustees' "executive sessions," accused the board of "closing its doors to the citizens of Lubbock, in violation of the Texas Open Meetings Law."

There is a law in Texas that says all meetings will be open," Mary Nell Mathis, who heads Texas's Common Cause chapter, told school trustees as they locked the doors of their assembly room in the Lubbock Independent School District administration building True, Mrs. Mathis said, the law ex-

empts from open meetings certain kinds of discussion, such as certain personnel or legal matters. "But you have taken the client-attorney

privilege and stretched it beyond all recognizable hope," she said. "I must fight you in the courts. Replied board president Charles Wa-

"I note your objection...we are meeting under the advice of counsel. We feel we must follow the advice of coun-

Health Costs Expected To Jump In '79

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Personal health care will cost Americans \$207 bi!lion in 1979, a 14 percent increase of \$25 billion over what it cost last year, a University of Michigan public health economist has predicted.

Dr. Paul J. Feldstein of Michigan's School of Public Health told a national conference on health care in the American economy Monday that about 70 percent of that total will be borne by governments or insurance companies.
Governments will shoulder \$87 billion

of that total, he said.

Feldstein predicted that hospital costs alone could rise as much as 15.2 percent, although President Carter's voluntary anti-inflation program might cut that in-

crease to 13.6 percent. "Today we are spending \$130 billion a year more in personal health care than 10 years ago," the economist said in noting that 1968's health care costs were less

than \$100 billion "It is relevant to question whether the additional \$130 billion a year is worth whatever the diffference is in medical services. . .compared to what we received 10 years ago," he added.

Feldstein said inflation is not the sole cause of the rapid rise in health care costs. The methods of payment, in which insurance companies or other third parties bear much of the cost, also contribute, as does a lack of competition, he

"Price or cost competition rarely exists among medical providers," Feldstein

said. Dr. Iren Butter, also a University of Michigan public health economist, said physician fees will increase 8 percent in 1979, down from an 8.3 percent increase last year and a 9.3 percent hike in 1977. She attributed the slowdown to a grow-

ing number of physicians. Dr. Rashi Fein, a medical economist from Harvard, said the complexity of the health care industry precludes simple solutions to curbing rising costs.

"New budgeting and financing systems will be necessary for effective cost control," he said. "But the burdens of control must be spread equally. All too often, cost control simply means making it tougher on the poor. The responsibility of control lies mainly with physicians and

those providing health care. The third annual conference, sponsored by the Blue Cross-Blue Shield Association, brings together invited medical, business and political leaders to discuss key health care issues. It lasts through Wednesday.

The occasional hearings granted by the board - such as the one planned for Thursday morning - are a farce, for the citizens who appear will hear only what

They will never know how and to what extent their arguments have been presented and perhaps rejected by the school board in prior meetings closed to

Mrs. Mathis said she attempted to get

an injunction to stop Monday's closed meeting. But a request for an injunction, which ordinarily requires a hearing, usually takes 10 days, she said. "Since only three days' notice is re-

quired for school board meetings, and such notice generally is posted on Friday for a Monday meeting, the board is able to effectively circumvent the law," Mrs. Mathis said.

So she attempted a shortcut - by seeking a temporary restraining order prohibiting closed-door discussion of school boundaries and school holidays.

On these matters, law suits are neither pending nor threatened; thus there is clearly no excuse for closing the discussion," Mrs. Mathis said.

She said she appeared at the Lubbock County Courthouse at 8:20 a.m. Monday with documents requesting the restraining order. But, according to Mrs. Mathis, she was given the runaround from district judge to district judge, none of whom would grant the request.

"Irreparable damages are incurred whenever a board discusses public business behind closed doors. Words once spoken cannot be unspoken. That is the essence of the open meeting law," Mrs. Mathis's statement said.

She speculated that the judges refused to grant the restraining order because they do not want to buck the legal system. Three school board members, in-

cluding Waters, are attorneys. About 10 members of Common Cause. the American Civil Liberties Union and Parent-Teacher Associations showed up for the opening minutes of school trus-

tees' meeting. Before closing the session to the public. Waters and other board members informally discussed the agenda items,

Roloff Decides To Give Up **Fund Drive**

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) - Evangelist Lester Roloff says he's giving up his drive to buy an East Texas college campus, and he'll refund the \$2 million he collected

for that purchase. Roloff had campaigned to buy the Big Sandy campus of the Worldwide Church of God's Ambassador College. During his fund-raising drives he said he wanted to consolidate his various youth homes in

the South and Southwest. But now Roloff says he doesn't want to spread his operations and himself "any thinner" by sinking millions into the campus, which he hinted was too fancy

for his tastes. The Los Angeles-based Worldwide Church of God and its operations have been placed into receivership during a State of California investigation into use of church funds.

The East Texas branch of Ambassador College was shut down and the school moved to the main campus in Los Ange-

Roloff sought to raise \$10 million he said was the asking price of the campus and 1,600 acres which includes a golf course, tennis courts, cobblestone walks, an airport and a pair of auditoriums.

"Mine has been a work clothes minis try, not a country club," he said. He says now he will expand his Corpus Christi facilities by spending \$5 million over the next two years. He also says he has been negotiations to buy land adjacent to his property here.

"I'm tickled to death to stay. I'm so re-

lieved. Roloff said he plans to get back the \$500,000 earnest money he put up for the Big Sandy campus, although he said he expects it will take some litigation and time for that to happen.

The evangelist is offering refunds for those who contributed specifically to the campus purchase fund, but said no one has yet asked for their money back.

But he said later that the decrease in expenses stemmed from a \$2,400 insurance settlement the city received for an earlier bus accident. Wilson, speaking at the transit board's monthly meeting, said ridership on the Citibus system increased in December 1978, compared to the same period a year

Average daily passengers increased to 2,245 in 1978 from 2,172 in 1977, an increase of about three percent. Average daily revenue rose 13 percent from

\$525.33 in 1977, to \$592.47 in 1978. The two "Dime Days" days when passengers can ride anywhere in town for 10 cents, were not highly successful, however, Wilson said.


The Dime Days were held on the last Saturday in both November and Decem ber, normally the days of lowest ridership, in an effort to increase ridership The Thanksgiving holiday, which fell just before the November Dime Day, and the icy weather which hit Lubbock on Dec. 30, were cited as reasons for the

Study Shows New Federal Budget Helps Rich

WASHINGTON (AP) — President

study just out says it's the rich who'll be
helped the most.
The study, by a Brookings Institution
economist, disputes the president's claim
that the poor suffer most from inflation.
It says those who get burf worst are his-

It says those who get hurt worst are big-money people with six-figure incomes.

By this reckoning, it's the big-money people who would benefit most by budget cuts, which reduce red-ink spending and help curb the inflation rate — run ning at 9.5 percent last year and not likely to drop significantly for some time. Carter sees it just the other way

exists in this country that to control inflation hurts poor people," he said at his news conference last week. "The ones

who suffer most in our nation from rampant inflation are those who have incomes that can't be changed, those who are unemployed, those who are poor, or those who can't move from one job to another, looking for a better

life as circumstances change."

Some of these people might be less than grateful for the things Carter wants to do to help them — for instance, those who will lose the 158,000 government-provided full-time jobs and 250,000 federally subsidized part-time jobs that Carter's budget eliminates.

But presidential polister Patrick Cad-dell thinks the budget will win Carter support among the less needy in middle-

"These are voters who are often cautious on the questions of increased taxes, spending and particularly inflation," Caddell said as early as 1976, when Carter was still president-elect. Inflation, Caddell told him in a strategy memo for his first term, "mobilizes this group in a conservative fashion."

But the new study, by Joseph J. Minarik, a research associate at Brookings, a private think-tank oriented toward Democratic policies, says neither poor nor middle-income voters are hurt so badly

by inflation as the rich. In his study, Minarik adds to the Census Bureau's measure of cash income in American households such items as employer-financed benefits, appreciation in home values and the cost of taxes - "to reflect more accurately the whole range

Then he calculates the effect of a 2 percent increase in an inflation rate of 5.9 percent for one year. That makes the effective inflation rate in the study 7.9

Then he applies the 7.9 percent inflation rate for six years.

"Low income households fare somewhat worse as a sustained inflation proceeds, with losses becoming as great as 1.3 percent and probably averaging about 0.6 percent for the under \$10,000 group," Minarik says. "Middle income households again fare well, benefiting from home ownership and keeping even through wage increases.

"Above about \$25,000 of income, however, gains recorded earlier become losses; lag in dividends overcomes the rise in interest income, and the ultimate loss at the highest incomes is greater than that at the lowest."

Minarik's comparison is in percentage terms. In absolute terms, he says, the difference is even larger.

His conclusion: 'The conventional anti-inflationary tools of budgetary and monetary restraint are often justified on the ground that inflation hurts the poor. But since contractionary policies increase unemployment and reduce real wages, and thereby place a disproportionate burden on low income groups, it is clear from this analysis that the cure is far worse than the disease.

mildly pagan hip swinging. Jean-Pierre Frohlich led in a brisk corps de ballet in wine purple for the onset of Autumn.







DETROIT (UPI) - When General Motors came out last year with the first American-made diesel car in modern times, Thomas Mallovich, a truck driver

from Albuquerque, N.M., rushed out and bought the first one in town. His wife, Leah, said they liked it so

much, "We bought two more this year. We're just crazy about them." In Boston, airline pilot Charles Holman was so tickled when he learned last year

that Volkswagen had put a small diesel engine in its subcompact Rabbit, he ordered one, sight unseen. "I'm getting 50 miles a gallon with it," Holman said. "What more can I say."

American motorists, who for years shunned fuel-stingy diesels as foul-smelling, noisy and sluggish compared with gasoline-powered cars, have suddenly developed a voracious appetite for them.
"They're the hottest thing around," a
Detroit-area Oldsmobile dealer said. "We

can't get enough of them." The four major manufacturers of diesel-powered cars and light trucks - General Motors, Volkswagen, Mercedes Benz and Peugeot — sold nearly 135,000 units in the United States in 1978, nearly doubling the number of diesels on the road

from the previous year. This year, the automakers say they will make and sell more than twice as many - about 290,000 - but still expect to fall short of the sudden demand one California dealer described as "nothing short of

A major attraction, dealers say, is the diesel's reputation for topping the fuel economy of gasoline engines by 25 to 60 percent. The Environmental Protection Agency rates Volkswagen's diesel Rabbit at 41 miles per gallon-city and 55 mpghighway — the highest rating of any car

in the United States. When you consider diesel fuel costs 11 cents less than unleaded gasoline in most parts of the country, that amounts to quite a savings," Daniel Petit, a Peugeot

Fixed Specific Gravity

By LAWRENCE E. LAMB, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - I want to know about the specific gravity of urne and what is the meaning of a fixed specific gravity. I have a relative with this problem and don't understand it.

DEAR READER - Specific gravity refers to the weight per unit of volame for any substance in relation to water. Specific gravity is expressed in erms of waters. The value for water is 1.000. A fixed specific gravity for urine has a value of 1.010, just a trifle heavier than water. This is the value for the plasma, the fluid portion of your blood

The kidney filters the plasma and normally it can form concentrated urine to conserve water you need or dilute the urine to eliminate excess water you have. This means the urine may have a specific gravity of less than specific gravity of less than 1.010 if it is diluted and over 1.010 if it is

In the presence of kidney disease. he kidneys may lose the ability to diute or concentrate the plasma it filters to form urine. The specific gravity then is always the same as plasma, fixed at 1.010. This is an indication of

a loss of kidney function and additional studies are usually needed to find out how much kidney function is lost and the cause.





company agreed to a takeover by Cooper Industries. The NYSE's composite index rose .09 to 56.01. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value

Flash Fire Kills 26 **Patients**

HELSINKI, Finland (UPI) - A flash fire roared through a nursing home today, killing 26 elderly patients trapped in their beds in the second worst fire in modern Finnish history.

A doctor said 26 elderly patients died in the flames, which burned down a wooden wing of the nursing home in Virrat, 220 miles northwest of the capital.

The wooden wing, built in 1907, housed 44 patients. A brick building, which escaped undamaged, housed 25. Most of the patients were retired farmers. Of the 69 patients, 26 were dead, 41 sur-

vived and two were unaccounted for. The blaze was the second worst in modern Finnish history. In the worst fire, in 1966, 31 patients died when fire ripped a mental institution.

"The heat from the explosive fire prevented firemen from saving the bedridden. They could do nothing," said Dr. Erro Kallio of the Virrat city hospital, where dead were taken.

He said the fire started in an end of the building and the structure was engulfed by flames within five minutes. Only one night nurse was on duty when

the fire alarm rang at 4:50 a.m., the doctor said. The patients who could walk were all

saved." he said. "They only suffered minor burns. Fire Chief Kalevi Hthkio said it was not

Sheriff Expects No Suspensions Of Jailers

Sheriff C.H. "Choc" Blanchard said this morning he expects no suspensions in connection with the failure of jail personnel to discover the escape of a prisoner for more than two days.

Blanchard's statement came after a meeting with jail administrator Gary McGrew.

Authorities today were still looking for convicted armed robber Danny Burtis Eoff, 24, of Midland who apparently ducked away from deputies during a recreational period for inmates Friday after-It was not until about 1:30 a.m. Mon-

day that a jailer discovered Eoff's bunk empty. Several bundles had been placed under a blanket, making it appear the escapee's bed was occupied.

Blanchard and McGrew said about six iailers were at fault in not discovering the escape earlier, giving Eoff a two-day head start.

"I can't see suspending one person when there's more than one person at fault," Blanchard said. "And I certainly cause that would deteriorate our work force too much.

Each jailer concerned will be met with individually, and "verbally reprimanded," the sheriff said. The jail staff will be told that such mistakes in the future will not be tolerated, and suspensions will fol-

low any such foul-ups, he added.

McGrew said Eoff — recently given a 15-year prison term after being found guilty of the armed robbery of a Lubbock restaurant - apparently slipped into the basement Friday while he and other inmates on the fourth floor of the jail were being led to or from a gymnasium adjoining the county facility.

Eoff was thought to have climbed through a plumbing passageway and over a fence in making his escape. The basement door, as well as other doors prisoners pass on their way to recreational workout, are now locked in an attempt to prevent in similar break-outs in the future, Blanchard said.



Union Resumes Contract Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) - Teamsters Union and trucking industry officials re-turned to the bargaining table today to negotiate a new national contract, but only after a delayed start caused by a union

The start of the talks was delayed about 45 minutes when Roy Williams, a union vice president and co-chairman of the Teamsters' bargaining committee, walked into the meeting room, spotted a large contingent of reporters and stormed out muttering, "I ain't gonna bargain no contract in front of the news

Williams returned to the session to join union president Frank E. Fitzsimmons and chief industry negotiator J. Curtis Counts after the reporters had left the room. Union officials had allowed them

in to witness the opening of the talks.

After a five-week hiatus, the two sides sat down to begin a regular schedule of negotiations on a new contract which the Carter administration wants kept within its voluntary wage guidelines.

The current three-year contract, covering nearly 300,000 drivers and warehous workers, expires March 31. Counts said serious negotiations on wages and other economic matters would not begin until closer to the contract expiration date. The Carter administration has called

the talks a key test of the president's antiinflation program, which includes volun-tary guidelines limiting wage and fringe benefit increases to about 7 percent a

Responding mainly to objections from the Teamsters, the administration has eased its guidelines to exempt the added cost for maintaining existing health in-surance and pension benefits.

Despite the concession, the Teamsters, who won increases of more than 11 percent a year in their current contract, have refused to commit themselves to the

Administration officials remain public ly confident that the union and industry will settle within the guidelines, particularly now that oil workers have settled with the petroleum industry on a new

agreement that meets the guidelines. The Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers, under heavy pressure from the federal government, reluctantly accepted a 13 percent wage increase over two years, averaging 6.5 percent a year for some 60,000

That agreement was the first major challenge for Carter's guidelines. Administration officials have said that had the oil workers "busted" the guidelines; the Teamsters almost certainly would do the same, threatening the survival of Carter's

anti-inflation program. Meanwhile, Fitzsimmons is facing other pressures from the administration as

well as a challenge from his own union. The administration is moving to deregulate the trucking industry, a policy op-

posed by both the union and most freight companies. The administration contends that dereguiation would stimulate competition and result in lower costs to consumers. But opponents argue the opposite would occur: Larger companies would force smaller firms out of business to concen-trate the industry in fewer hands. The Teamsters fear deregulation may

push companies to make more use of lower-cost, non-union labor. A growing trend in that direction, rather than Carter's wage guidelines, may persuade Fitz-simmons to accept a moderate wage in-crease to keep his members more com-petitive in the labor market.

Bella Abzug Gains Martyrdom With Dismissal

By MIKE FEINSHBER WASHINGTON (AP) — Father ran the Live and Let Live Meat Market, and Bella Savitsky worked there Saturdays. But she never fully embraced his slogan. She became Bella the bellicose.

When Jimmy Carter fired her from his National Advisory Committee on Women for trying to meatax his economic policies, he gave her something she didn't have before: martyrdom in the eyes of

And he gave her the unquestioning sympathy of the women's movement.

Mrs. Abzug became Mrs. Wronged. Gloria Steinem embraced her in sisterly solidarity. Women who otherwise might have chafed at her leadership chafed no more. Even the staid Federation of Business and Professional Women rallied around.

Out of work, Bella Abzug is more influential among her peers than ever. She can claim she's fallen victim to male

And she's probably less inclined than ever to live and let live.

Such controversy is the meat and pota-

toes of the Abzugian style. She came to to the Eugene McCarthy presidential candidacy in 1968.

prominence by way of protest, this Bella.
She was president of the student council at New York's Hunter College. She dropped out of Columbia Law School to do what she could to end World War II by working in a shipyard.

As a young civil rights lawyer, she represented fur workers, restaurant workers, auto workers, longshoremen.

She argued, unsuccessfully, the appeal of Willie McGee, a young black sentenced to death for raping a white woman in Mississippi, then sat in a Mississippi bus station in fear she would be lynched. She married Martin Abzug, a stock-

broker who has always been comfortable staying in the background, and they raised two daughters, one an artist and the other a lawyer. She came to protest early on. She

helped found the Women's Strike for Peace in 1961 and lobbied and led antibomb rallies in Washington for a decade. She was an old hand at it when the antiwar movement came along.

She brought peace advocates to the "dump Johnson" movement in 1967 and

And then she came to Congress. By the time she arrived, she already was known to the American people and for the flightiest of reasons - her millinery. Bella Abzug wore floppy hats.

There is continuing dispute over whether William "Fishbait" Miller, who was doorman of the House, directed her to remove her hat when she first strode into the House in 1971. She says she did not tell him "to go four-letter-word himself." She had practiced law hatlessly in courtrooms for years, she says, so "when I came into this formal body, the Con-

Mays, only the ninth player ever to be enshrined in his first year of eligibility excluding the first year of voting in 1936 - received 409 of a possible 432 votes by 10-year members of the Baseball Writers Association of America participating in the annual balloting.

While Mays became the 88th player chosen for induction into the Hall at Cooperstown, N.Y., two other outstanding outfielders, Enos Slaughter and Duke Snider, again failed to receive votes.

Snider, a contemporary of Mays' when he played centerfield for the Brooklyn Dodgers, was second with 308 votes, 16 short of the required 324. It wa his 10th year on the ballot.

It was a bitter disappointment for Slaughter, a major leaguer for 21 years, 13 with the St. Louis Cardinals, who finished third with 297 votes, 27 shy of the required number. A nominee must appear on at least 75 percent of the voters' ballots to gain entrance to the Hall.

This was the 15th year he had fallen short, and he no longer is eligible unless he is elected by the Veterans' Committee. However, he must wait another five years before he can be considered by the veterans' group.

The late Gil Hodges, another former Dodger finished fourth with 242, followed by ex-Dodger pitcher Don Drys-

The bubbling, zestful Mays, nicknamed the "Say Hey Kid," retired as a player in 1973 after a total of 22 seasons with the New York and San Francisco Giants, and the New York Mets, for whom he now is

In addition to Wondrous Willie, those honored their first time on the ballot were Bob Feller, Ted Williams, Stan Musial, Jackie Robinson, Sandy Koufax, Warren Spahn, Mickey Mantle annd Er-

The highest vote-getter in history was Ty Cobb, the old "Georgia Peach," who received 98 percent of the vote in 1936. He was ignored by only four voters. Also in 1936, the legendary Babe Ruth

and Honus Wagner were named by 95 percent of the voters. Each missed being unanimous by 11 votes. Since 1936, Feller came the closest to

being chosen unanimously, garnering 94 percent of the vote in 1962. Mays' vote percentage of 94.6 was the highest since Cobb's total in 1936.

Mays, a hitter with magnificent bat control, finished his illustrious career with 660 home runs, the third leading toand Ruth.

He won the National League home run title four times, with 51 in 1955, with 49 in 1962, with 47 in 1964 and with 52 in 1965.

He compiled a lifetime batting average of .302, hitting over .300 10 times, including 1954, when he won the National League batting championship with a .345 average.


Twice, he won the NL's Most Valuable Player Award, with the Giants when they were in New York in 1954 and in 1965 when they were in San Francisco.

He was the NL's Rookie of the Year in 1951 and The Associated Press' Athlete of the Year in 1954, when he led the: Giants to a four-game sweep over the Cleveland Indians in the World Series. Following Drysdale in the voting were

Nelson Fox, with 174; Hoyt Wilhelm, 168; Maury Wills, 166; Red Schoendienst, 159, and Jim Bunning, 147. Aside from Mays, the only other firsttime eligible on this year's ballot to make

A. The TB column reflects how many times a punt has gone into the end zone for a touchback. Ties are figured as a half game won or a half game lost. Therefore, divide the total games (16) into the revised win total of 8.5 and you get

The players were introduced individually as they stepped from the plane and there were cheers for each one. But the largest ovations were saved for quarterback Roger Staubach, outspoken line-



Texas and Texas wa9m renewed their ancient feud at the Longhorns' Special Events Center Monday evening and the Longhorns were untouchable. Not only did Texas win its 23rd game

without a loss in the building, but the

16th-ranked Longhorns embarrased the ggies with an 89-66 laugher. Texas' top guns - Tyrone Branyan and Jim Krivacs - combined for 57 points

In Fayetteville, meanwhile, the Arkansas Razorbacks were the surprising victims of Baylor, 70-67. Texas thus grabbed the top spot in the

SWC race with a 5-1 record while A&M and Baylor are 4-2. Baylor and Texas meet Wednesday night in Waco.
"I'm elated," said Baylor Coach Jim Haller. "I'm proud of the Baylor Bears. It was a great win for us. Our young team

played better and harder than I've ever seen a team play. Haller surprised the Razorbacks by bringing his team out in a man-to-man defense. Arkansas had grown accus-

torned to seeinl zone defenses this sea-

"We thought they might not have worked much on man-for-man lately and would be expecting a zone," Haller said. see what happened."

Elsewhere in the conference Monday night the Rice Owls (34) held off a determined bid by TCU (0-5) to win its first league game of the year, downing the Horned Frogs, 59-56; and Houston (3-4) fought off SMU (2-3) in Houston, 82-78.

Texas has won its last five games, including a three-point victory over Arkansas in Fayetteville that ended a 35-game home winning streak for the Hogs, a 19point win over USC on national television last Saturday and Monday night's onesided win over the 14th-ranked Aggies.

"I'm still real high on A&M," said Texas Coach Abe Lemons. "We just played better tonight. I don't know when our

bubble is gonna burst. "And how about Branyan. Isn't he sweet? He's really something I'll tell you,

"We thought we would give it a try and he's a coach's dream. He has fun playing and he plays hard all the time. Branyan scored 29 points against the

Aggies and Krivacs had 28. Baylor overcame an 11-point deficit in the second half and the Bears comeback overshadowed the 21-point performance of Sidney Moncrief, who set a career scoring record at Arkansas of 1.743 points.

It was the fourth loss for Arkansas in five games.

"We dug our own grave," said Arkansas Coach Eddie Sutton. "We allowed Baylor to get back in the game. We didn't deliver the killer punch. They got some momentum going and we just couldn't catch them.

"You have to give Baylor credit," Sutton said. "They have a fine team. You can't have a dry spell as long as we did in the second half and expect to win. The biggest disappointment is that we have built up great pride playing at home, and the younger players haven't realized how much pride we take."

Other than the Texas-Baylor battle in Waco Wednesday night, conference action will resume with Arkansas visiting SMU, Houston going to Texas Tech (3-3) and Texas A&M hosting TCU.

Navratilova, who now has beaten Wade the last three times they've played, started her blitze in the first game of the match by breaking Wade, who made only one first serve in the game.



seats, but I don't have a seat. I didn't even think about it.



Ruling Goes To Patriots

In what amounts to a victory for the New England Patriots, Chuck Fairbanks' contract dispute with the National Football League team will be submitted to league ar-

Boulder District Court Judge Richard W. Dana granted on Monday a motion by Patriots attorneys for a stay in the current proceedings here pending arbitration by NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

Dana said the Boulder court would retain jurisdiction in the case and the right to review any such arbitration ruling.

In granting the motion, Dana held in abeyance a request by Fairbanks and the University of Colorado for an injunction that would prohibit the Patriots from intertering with Fairbanks' right to seek employment outside the NFL.

Fairbanks, who has four years left on his contract with the Patriots, intends to become the head coach at Colorado. But the Patriots have obtained a preliminary injunction from a federal judge in Boston preventing the coach from signing a contract with Colorado. A hearing is scheduled Thursday in Boston on the university's

Charles Sullivan, Patriots vice president, said Monday in Boston that the arbitration could be as early as this week, because Coach Fairbanks and Commissioner Rozelle will both be in Los Angeles in connection with the Pro Bowl.

It could be there or next week when Fairbanks returns to Foxboro and Rozelle returns to New York," Sullivan added.

Sullivan said the Patriots were pleased with Dana's ruling because "Fairbanks had agreed to an arbitration provision in his contract, and we believe the judge's decision sustains the provision. However, attorneys for Fairbanks and the university said they didn't view the

judge's action as a setback. "This court has retained jurisdiction and has said it will review the arbitration ruling, and that's what's important," said attorney Steven

Ehrhart said it was still unclear whether Rozelle actually would agree to arbitrate the dispute.

Fairbanks was in Los Angeles, where he will coach the American Football Conference team in the Pro Bowl, and was unavailable for comment.

In a related action Monday, Ehrhart filed an addition to the original suit, asking for damages for Fairbanks on the grounds of alleged outrageous conduct, defama

tion and antitrust violations by the Patriots. The damage request did not list specific

Dana, who required only a minute to summarize his ruling Monday following two days of lengthy hearings last week, said the court "concludes that plaintiff Fairbanks and defendant Patriots have agreed to submit any dispute between them to the commissioner of the National Football League for arbitration."

The judge said he based his ruling on provisions of Fairbanks' contract with the Patriots and the bylaws of the NFL.

Attorneys for Fairbanks had argued that the contract was effectively terminated when the coach was suspended without pay by team owner William Sullivan on Dec. 18. The attorneys maintained that the arbitration provision of the contract therefore was no longer in effect.

But the judge disagreed. "It is clear from the evidence that some employment relationship exists between the parties and will continue to exist, at least until Jan. 29, although the terms of such continued employment are in dispute," Dana wrote in

Fairbanks testified last week that he will no longer work for the Patriots after the Pro Bowl on Jan. 29.

Dana also addressed arguments by Fairbanks' attorneys that constitutional or antitrust claims were involved which cannot be submitted to binding arbitration. Dana said the "continuing jurisdiction of the court to review the award of an arbitrator, both in Colorado and Massachusetts, is sufficient to insure that public policy is not violated by such an award."

While granting the motion for a stay, Dana denied two other Patriots' motions.

In the new request for damages, Ehrhart contended that outrageous conduct existed because Fairbanks allegedly had been denied the right to seek his own employment and had been subjected to severe emotional distress.

The defamation claim contended that statements alluding to Fairbanks' decision to move to Colorado were "made with a willful and reckless intent to injure, harm and destroy the reputation" of Fairbanks or were made with reckless disregard for the truth. According to the suit, Patriots' officials or employees allegedly have stated publicly that Fairbanks was merely "a puppet on behalf of the university" and that "he does not know what he's doing."

The antitrust claim maintained that Fairbanks "has been frustrated by the unlawful combination and conspiracy in restraint of trade by the Patriots, the National

Higher Prices Encourage More Planting

WASHINGTON (AP) - Apparently encouraged by higher grain and livestock prices, farmers say they intend to boost corn and soybean plantings this spring, according to a new government survey.

The Agriculture Department said Monday that the survey indicates an increase of 1.2 percent in this year's corn acreage and a 3.5 percent increase for soybeans.

Although farmers have plenty of time to change their minds before spring planting, the figures raise questions about the administration's effort to curb grain output by requiring farmers to take part of their land from production in exchange for federal price supports.

The department's Crop Reporting Board said also that cotton producers indicate they will increase plantings 5.7 percent from last year.

In its first general look at the 1979 crop potential, the board said that surveys as of Jan. 1 indicated farmers intend to plant 79.2 million acres of corn for this year's harvest, compared to 78.3 million

Soybean plantings were indicated at

planted last year.

The report did not project how much the 1979 crops may actually produce, only the number of acres farmers said they intended to plant in the major producing

Another survey, to be announced April 16. will reflect crop acreages as farmers actually take to their fields.

Officials said the Jan. 1 survey was conducted among approximately 20,000 farmers in 34 states that last year accounted for 98.5 percent of the nation's total planted acreage of the major crops.

A year ago, a similar report indicated that farmers would reduce 1978 corn plantings by 2.1 percent and boost soybean acreages 8.2 percent. As it turned out, corn plantings were

reduced about 5 percent from 1977, and soybeans were increased 9 percent. Both crops set records for their size in

1978. Corn output rose to 7.08 billion bushels, a 10 percent gain from 1977, and soybeans climbed to 1.84 billion bushels, a 5 percent increase.

Cotton production, beset by poor yields and a smaller acreage, dropped 25 percent from 1977 to 10.8 million bales.

The administration, as it did for the 1978 crops, has announced acreage setaside programs for wheat, eorn, sorghum and barley in hopes of stemming a steady climb in the total grain supply because of recent bumper harvests.

Despite the largest grain stockpiles since the early 1960s, prices of wheat and corn at the farm have risen from year-ago

That has been due in part to heavy export shipments to overseas customers and to a government program enabling farmers to store grain - mostly wheat and corn — for up to three years so that prices will go up.

But livestock prices also have risen sharply, and the outlook calls for prices to remain relatively high this year, at

The department said in a related report that the huge 1978 corn crop had a farm value of \$14.7 billion, compared to \$12.9 billion for the 1977 harvest, based on a

Last year's wheat crop was put at \$4.74 billion, down from \$5.85 billion in 1977. The 1978 wheat harvest was smaller due to acreage cutbacks, less than 1.8 billion bushels against the 1977 harvest of 2.04

But the average farm value of 1978-crop wheat was \$2.94 a bushel, compared to \$2.33 for the 1977 harvest, the report said. Soybean prices at the farm averaged \$6.42 a bushel for the 1978 harvest, according to the preliminary figures, compared to \$5.88 in 1977.

The Jan. 1 survey also showed that farmers intend to plant 4.25 million acres of durum wheat this spring for the 1979 harvest, up 3.4 percent from last year.

Parity Plan Rejected At Convention

By KATHLEEN HARRIS Avalanche-Journal Farm Writer

The "flexible parity" plan proposed at the 60th annual American Farm Bureau Federation convention in Miami by Texas Farm Bureau delegates was rejected by an overwhelming margin, according to S.M. True. Jr. of Plainview, spokesman

True held a press conference Monday at the Hilton Hotel here.

The vote against the "flexible parity" plan was 189 to 46.

Failure of the plan, which called for the farmer to receive a certain percent of parity depending on the amount of total acres set aside, shows that the organization as a whole is very much against such policy," True said.

While the TFB maintained that the

plan would help young farmers stay in business and prevent the spread of large corporation-owned farms, the national congregation said the plan was "unworkable, too expensive, hard to administer and would increase crop production instead of control it." Delegates to the convention unani-

mously approved a \$500,000 budget to promote domestic and foreign marketing of agricultural commodities.

With cooperation from affiliated state Farm Bureaus, the AFBF marketing effort will work toward solving problems in transportation, finance and credit and restrictions on trade. "Foreigners have told us that even

though our customs and governments may vary greatly from theirs," True noted, "that is no reason we can't trade agricultural products."

When questioned about the ongoing tractorcade to Washington, True said that although the organization has not publicly come out against the movement, the bureau "prefers to work for a positive program" and is "proud to live in a country where individuals have the right to work for a cause in the way they think is right."

"One idea that was obvious at the convention is that all farmers have to unite if they are to have a strong voice in Washington," True stressed. "Corn producers, for example, have to stand behind cotton producers and vice versa to strengthen that voice.

Fighting Rail Fire Termed Too Dangerous

TIE SIDING, Wyo. (AP) - A phosphorus fire in a sparsely populated area of southern Wyoming after the derailment of a 116-car freight train will have to burn itself out, a railroad spokesman says.

Barry Coombs, spokesman for Union Pacific in Omaha, Neb., said fighting the fire would be too dangerous. Three tank cars containing eye-irritat-

ing phosphorus fueled the fire, which ignited at least three other cars, he said. Union Pacific stopped all trains on the main line across southern Wyoming indefinitely. Usually about 60 trains run the

Five families in the area were evacuated from their homes after the 4:30 a.m. derailment, but were allowed to return Monday afternoon.

The derailment occurred near the tiny town of Tie Siding, about 20 miles south of Laramie and 8 miles north of the Colorado border.

There was disagreement over whether the fumes were poisonous.

They re very toxic in great concentrations, but 15 to 25 miles away fumes would only be an irritant," said Albany County sheriff's Sgt. James Conyers. Union Pacific spokesman Ed Schafer said the phosphorus was "extremely dangerous" but "not toxic."

USDA Withdraws **Hungarian Limit**
