# Embassy official carries reminder of ambush

GEORGETOWN, Guyana (AP) — The U.S. Embassy's second-in-command is back at his desk, his body still carrying the bullet fired at him by cultists who killed a U.S. congressman and four other persons in the prelude to the mass deaths at

"It hurts more now than it did when I was shot," Richard A. Dwyer said, sitting down gingerly in an office chair, as he told his story for the first time to The Associated Press lite Thursday and early Friday.

The 45-year-old Dwyer, deputy chief of mission at the embassy, escorted a party headed by Rep. Leo J. Ryan, D-Calif., to the Jonestown camp and was leading it out the afternoon of Saturday, Nov. 18, when the strip by members of Jonestown's Peoples Temple sect. A small-caliber bullet struck Dwyer near the base of his spine, lodging against his pelvis, and doctors have since decided to leave it there.

A short time after the attack more than 900 cultists died in a frenzy of suicide and murder at the camp.

The Ryan party, which included newsmen, had gone to Jonestown to investigate reports of abuse of sect members. On the way out, they were escorting several residents who wanted to leave the settlement.

Some of the party were already aboard the two planes that were to take them back to Georgetown when "all of a sud den somebody started shooting at us," recounted Dwyer, of

"The congressman ran by me and we both ran around the nosewheel" of the De Havilland Otter, the larger plane. The gunfire came at first from a camp tractor-trailer that had driven up alongside the run-

"Ryan was hit, but I saw him take shelter behind the nosewheel. I was headed for the bush across the runway when I saw them firing at us from the truck parked on the other side and I knew I wouldn't make it.

"I hit the deck, and that must have been when they shot me. I don't remember feeling it hit. I lay on my back and played

dead. "I remember worrying that because I was wearing dark blue slacks the blood wasn't going to show up well enough. I

was debating whether to smear some around on my shirt to make it look better.

"I was waiting there for the second shot and thinking about things my wife had told me to do that I hadn't got done. Then I heard a shotgun blast close up. There were two blasts. I flinched with each shot and wondered when he was going to get to

"There was silence. Then I heard the tractor start up and it

"I looked at the congressman. He was clearly dead. Part of his head was blown away. The same was true for (NBC correspondent Don) Harris.'

Dwyer said he checked two other journalists and found they were dead, then removed the body of the fifth victim, a woman member of the Peoples Temple, from the Otter. where it was still belted into a

Able-bodied survivors carried the wounded into the bush in case of another attack. Dwver said he knew they must get the twin-engine Otter into the air

"The pilot was still in his seat. I walked over to talk with him and walked right into the propeller. It sliced the sleeve off my shirt. It was one of the dumbest things I've ever done in my

The Otter was damaged, apparently in the attack, and could not take off. Dwyer had the pilot send an emergency radio message, and later the smaller Cessna took off carrying both

# Shell stations to limit hours

By The Associated Press

Many of Shell's 18,400 gasoline stations have decided to cut back operating hours in the wake of an announcement by the nation's largest gasoline marketer that it is short of fuel.

More than two dozen Shell dealers polled at random Friday said they were limiting their hours, and some are laying off employees because of the supply problem announced Thurs-

Other major companies say they have no plans to match Shell's move, but acknowledge they are having trouble keeping up with the high gasoline demand created by widespread summer driving season long past the traditional Labor Day fall-off. Repair shutdowns at two Shell refineries ag

gravated the problem.

Shell, with 8 percent of the nation's 200,000 service stations, is limiting dealers' gasoline supplies to about 75 percent of previous amounts.

"It will make quite a bit of difference," said Jim Minton, manager of a Shell station in Indianapolis. "I'll have to cut my hours by about half, close on Sundays and close no later than 8 p.m. It's going to be bad for

"I don't totally understand the reasons," said Wayne Weinshreider, owner of a Cleveland station, "But I understand that I will have to close my night shift. I was open 24 hours. I'll have to lay off a lot of employ-

According to Shell, the shortage

Midland's three Shell station opera tors' projections of the effect on their stations ranged from none to substan-

But motorists fearing widespread shortages were out in force Friday filling up their tanks, anyway. One non-Shell service station operator said he was exhausted after an unusually busy afternoon of filling up cars of worried motorists

Shell officials Friday began cutting back deliveries to stations to 75 percent of the gas they normally would be allocated. The officials cited a "dramatic increase in demand" for

The refinery official said he hopes the company-imposed shortages will end by the end of December, though the rationing may continue into Jan-

Whatever the law of supply and demand says, customers won't notice any increase in price, Bell said. In fact, the price has even dropped a half-cent. Bell said that's because of the complicated formula which bases the maximum price the company can charge for gasoline partly on the amount of foreign crude oil a company uses.

Among Midland stations, one owner said he won't have any problem because he usually pumps less gas in a month than he will get even under the reduced allocations.

Another said he received a full load this week, and already had some in storage, so he won't have much problem unless the reduction continues into January. However, he said he will close all day Dec. 24 and 25.

The third operator, however, said his business will be hurt badly because his operation is completely self-serve now, but wasn't for the period on which the allocation is

To cope with the shortage, he plans to start closing on Sunday. In addition, he said, he will ration himself for each day, closing when that amount of gas is pumped.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter and an emissary of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat explored prospects Friday for breaking the deadlock in the Mideast peace talks. The White House session with

Prime Minister Mustafa Khalil, who carried a message from Sadat, could be pivotal in the effort to complete a peace treaty between Egypt and Isra-

Talks between the two countries

have been stalemated over whether

the agreement should directly clear

the way for Palestinian self-rule on the West Bank of the Jordan River and in the Gaza Strip. Egypt has insisted that the treaty do just that, with a specific, four-step timetable. Israel is willing only to restate a commitment given at the

Camp David, Md., summit in September to negotiate Palestinian autonomy once the treaty is wrapped up. The United States, having accepted the role of "full partner" in the nego-

tiations, is trying to bridge these differences with compromise propos-Khalil, a 58-year-old American-edu-

cated engineer, began his discussions here Friday with Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance. In a meeting with reporters earlier.

# Sheriff to continue investigation of alleged absentee irregularities

Although the grand jury explained as human error the switch in originally reported results in the Precinct 2 county commissioner race, investigation of the Nov. 7 election isn't over

Now that he has access to public records concerning absentee voting, Sheriff Dallas Smith Friday said he plans to continue his investigation of alleged irregularities in absentee ballots mailed to certain elderly per-

Those allegations do not relate especially to the Precinct 2 race, how ever, according to Smith.

In that Precinct 2 race, incumbent Charlie Welch won by 21 votes after a recount. Election night reports indicated Welch had lost that race, ironically by the same margin, to Republican challenger Sam Snoddy.

Snoddy is expected to announce next week plans to contest the results of that race.

Thursday, the grand jury reported it found human error to be the cause of the original reporting error in that race. According to the grand jury, straight-ticket ballots in other commissioner precincts were counted erroneously as votes in the Precinct 2 race, the only contested commission-

County Clerk Rosenelle Cherry, who requested the grand jury investigation, said Friday the extra ballots counted were recorded in such a way they did not show up on the separate tally sheet for Precinct 2, but rather were added into the totals for precincts 1, 3 and 4.

Before the grand jury investigation certain records that ordinarily would be public, including those Smith was seeking, were impounded by order from 142nd District Court Judge Perry D. Pickett.

Mrs. Cherry said the only reason the records, other than the ballots themselves, were impounded was that they happened to be in the same rooms with the ballots.

Now that the grand jury investigation is over, they are available in the county clerk's office for public in-

spection, Mrs. Cherry said.

The ballots themselves, however, are still closed to public view.

## FBI 'sky spy' tells of tracking Cullen Davis

HOUSTON (AP) - An FBI "spy in the sky" told Friday of aerially tracking millionaire Cullen Davis on an erratic route to a fateful meeting and subsequent arrest in a bizarre murder conspiracy case.

"The vehicle appears to be cleaning itself," an FBI flight observer Larry Tongate said he radioed ground units that fateful August morning.

'And what does cleaning mean...?"

conscious and is trying to find if someone is following them," replied Tongate, the final witness in the state's marathon murder-for-hire case against Davis.



### MidTran gets state funding

AUSTIN - MidTran in Midland took another step forward to becoming a reality Friday when the availability of state funds for the project was certified here by the State Highways and Public Transportation Commission.

The federal Urban Mass Transportation Administration, which will finance 80 percent of the project, now will be advised that state funding assistance for the \$184,000 program is available.

The public transportation project will include the purchase of seven new 15-passenger vans, 16 communications units, two wheelchair lifts and contingency funding.

The vans will be used for a "demand-responsive transportation system" for the city of Midland, a system of transportation designed specifically to meet that city's needs.

The local share of the project is \$12,936, while the state will pick up the remaining \$24.024.



# Sadat won't appear in Norway with Begin to claim peace prize

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — President Anwar Sadat has decided not to pick up his Nobel Peace Prize in person with co-winner Menachem Begin in Norway Dec. 10, a top aide said Friday. Sadat's move appeared to rule out for the time being a new summit meeting with the Israeli prime minis-

The aide, Sayed Marei, said the decision was not meant as a protest of the current deadlock in the Egyptian-Israeli peace talks. Sadat will not attend the Nobel ceremony because he is "busy following the developments" in the negotiations, Marei

But another Egyptian official said privately that Israel's stance in the impasse over Palestinian self-rule forced Sadat to reverse his previous acceptance of the invitation to the

Nobel ceremony in Oslo.

## No conspiracy uncovered in King's assassination

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House assassinations committee completed its public inquiry into the death of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Friday without exposing a clear conspiracy in the assassination of the civil rights lead-

"The evidence tends to paint the outlines of a conspiracy," Rep. Louis Stokes, D-Ohio, the committee's chairman, said at the end of the final public hearing. But he added in an interview: "I'm not sure, given the passage of time, that we proved conclusively that there was a conspira-

King was killed in Memphis, Tenn., on April 4, 1968. James Earl Ray pleaded guilty to the assassination a year later, but later recanted his confession and said he was framed.

While not reaching any final conclusions about its two-year inquiry, the committee has said the evidence points to some involvement by Ray's brothers, Jerry and John. Investigators also explored the ex-

istence of an alleged \$50,000 offer by two St. Louis businessmen for King's death in 1968.

persons with direct links to the Ray brothers also had direct or indirect contacts with the two St. Louis men, who were, like the Ray brothers, active in the 1968 presidential campaign of George Wallace.

Committee counsel G. Robert Blakey has said because a congressional committee cannot use grand jury investigative techniques or obtain authority to use wiretaps, and because 10 years have passed, there were inherent limitations on how far the investigation could go.

could last through early January. "Demand for Shell gasoline has not only failed to taper off, but has actually increased to record levels." said Shell spokesman Norman Alt-

Part of the cutback plan includes limiting the amount of unleaded gasoline a dealer can get to 38 percent of total supply. Many dealers say un-leaded accounts for more than half of their sales. Unleaded demand has risen by more than 10 percent this year compared to 3 percent for all types of gasoline, the American Petroleum Institute reports.

Tight supplies could continue in the spring and summer if demand stays high and refineries are unable to produce sufficient reserves for peak driving months. The petroleum institute says inventories are 13 percent behind last year.

The shortage has caused slight increases in the price at the pump recently, but Shell suggested federal controls were holding prices so low that motorists were encouraged to

# Dwyer tells story of ambush

pilots and one of the injured. Dwyer, meanwhile, spotted a Guyanese defense force lieutenant and three soldiers with automatic weapons near the end of the runway, close to a damaged plane they had been sent to re-

"I asked them the obvious question — 'Where the hell were you?'," Dwyer recalled. "The lieutenant said he couldn't tell what was happening. He said it looked like Americans shooting at Americans and it happened too quickly for him to do any-

After dark, Dwyer had the badly wounded placed in the soldiers' tent and shepherded the others to a nearby tavern. The diplomat and Bob Flick of NBC then stood watch over the wounded all night, "holding their heads so they wouldn't choke on their own vomit or blood.'

Guyanese troops arrived Sunday morning and secured the airstrip. The survivors were ferried out by plane, Dwyer finally leaving Sunday afternoon.

"I went home and burned my clothes. They were pretty much a mess. The embassy nurse came over and gave me a tetanus shot. I talked with the ambassador and went to bed. The next day I went over to the hospital and checked in." He was released last Saturday.

Survivors of the airstrip attack were full of praise for Dwyer's perormance. "He was fantastic, a very brave man,' said one. "I didn't even know he

was wounded until somebody told me later." Dwyer says he was just doing

"There were certain things

that needed to be done," he said. "They were not difficult things. As the only representative of the American government there, it was my job.

Dwyer had met Peoples Temple leader Jim Jones, who ordered the mass suicide-murder, only once before the fatal Satur-"He seemed completely ratio-

nal, though he told me that at times he felt like he was getting paranoid. I told him it was a good sign that he recognized That meeting was in May. At

their final encounter Nov. 18,

Jones "was noticeably different.

He walked haltingly, with assistance. He seemed to ramble and didn't speak as logically as he had before." A physician who treated Jones and other sources have said he was seriously ill. Was there some chain that

bound the Peoples Temple together so tightly its members could poison themselves? "Yes. It was all Jim Jones,"

Dwyer said. "These people are not your average Americans. The whole thing wasn't normal, to go up into the jungles of Guyana in the first place wasn't normal...

## Lufkin's Charles Wilson isn't taking death threats lightly

LUFKIN, Texas (AP) - Rep. Charles Wilson, D-Lufkin, isn't taking the latest death threat against him lightly, claiming it is a "classic tactic of communist terrorists."

'Just for the record, I want to say I am taking the threats seriously and intend to take proper precautions," Wilson said from his vacation spot in Mexico during a telephone interview arranged by a third party.

Wilson and Rep. John Muphy, D-New York, were threatened in a letter mailed to Washington columnist Jack Anderson. The letter was turned over to FBI agents who now are taking steps to protect the two Congress-

"One must keep one's sense of humor about these things and not take it more seriously than it really is. But just for the time being, I'm not putting out any news releases as to my

whereabouts.' Wilson said he is convinced the terrorists "with guns and training directly from Cuba" are led by Fidel

Castro.

"But I'm not going to be intimidated by Marxist terrorists in Central America from discharging my constitutional duty as I see it.'

Wilson blames the state department, saying U.S. policy has encouraged Marxists in Central America just as it has encouraged Marxists in Africa.

"Personally, I don't think they will succeed in (forming) another Cuba in spite of our State Department. I believe Congressional opposition to the current U.S. policy is increasing rapidly," he said, predicting a policy change in the next six months.

He said it matters little if Nicaraguan President Anatasio Somoza stays in power, but added he does not understand State Department's resistence to Somoza's offer of a nationwide referendum. The Nicaraguan leader has proposed an election in three months between his party, the Liberals, and the Broad Opposition Front, the opposition party.



# Democrats lick political wounds

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Texas Democrats licked their political wounds Friday and pledged that Republican Bill Clements would be a one-term governor.

"Let Bill Clements have his day because he is going to have an inauguration only one time," said Sandra Davis, member of the State Democratic Executive Committee. She moved that Democrats hold a "victory" reception on the day the legislature opens, Jan. 9, instead of competing with Clements' supporters at the Jan. 16 inauguration. Excess profits from the \$25-per-couple Democratic affair will go into the state party treasury.

'This is still a Democratic state," said Travis County Commissioner Ann Richards. "Lots of Democrats want to celebrate the election of Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, Attorney General Mark White and the election of the majority of the officials of Texas."

Attorney General John Hill, who lost to Clements by about 16,000 votes, warned the state Democratic committee in its special session that



# Casinos create instant tycoons

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — The financial fallout from casino gambling has produced a dozen or more "instant millionaires" in this resort.

'There's no great art to getting rich in Atlantic City," says Boardwalk merchant Reese Palley. "It's like owning 1,000 acres in Texas when oil was

Palley, a co-owner of the former site of the Marlborough-Blenheim Hotel and other real estate properties here, is just one of many local businessmen who has has hit it big by sheer luck or by shrewd business dealing since gambling was approved here

Palley and local attorney Martin Blatt bought the old Boardwalk hotel for \$6.18 million in November 1977. A short time later, they signed a long-term agreement with Bally Manufacturing Corp. of Chicago to lease the property for \$750,000 to \$1 million a year. Bally plans a \$100 million casino hotel on the

"I never dreamed in my life I'd be in the middle of such a snowstorm of money," Palley said. "I had to take a chance, and so did almost everyone else. But so far, everyone who has taken a chance has had it pay off for them."

"I would call it more like bailing out than making money," said Tom Battles, who sold his motel, restaurant and marina last May to a New York

casino investor for \$1.9 million. Battles and his partners were among the big financial losers in this resort's darkest days of the late '60s and early '70s.

"I would have sold my property for a half million and been happy to pay off my debts and walk away from it," Battles said.

"I don't see how anyone could have survived in the mess we were in. There was no convention business. Weekends were all we were getting — if it didn't rain." Battles said.

Charles Worthington, 50, now the Atlantic County Al Baker Jr. executive, came here from Philadelphia about two years ago and bought some marshland near Absecon

Inlet for a marina business. Worthington held on to the land until "dumb luck" came his way - a Beverly Hills, Calif., development firm bought the land for \$8.8 million last August as the site of a future casino hotel.

"It's just a case of someone who made a longstanding investment in Atlantic City and who just happened to be in a fortunate place at a fortunate time," he said.

In 1976, just before gambling was approved, a group of local businessmen bought the closed and bankrupt Ambassador Hotel on the Boardwalk for

The group included local Cadillac dealer Michael A. Lubik, contractor Charles Price, attorney Elias Naame, local municipal judge Donald Kaplan, accountant Jacob Fleishman and strip-joint operator percentage of the profits.

The businessmen held on to the property until last June, when local hotelman Marvin Ashner offered

them \$7 million for it. Within a few months, Ashner sold the hotel to Ramada Inns Inc. for \$20 million.

The list goes on. For example, Strand Motel owner Emanuel Solomon sold his business to Golden Nugget for \$8.5 million.

Milton Neustadter and Maxwell "Sonny" Goldberg, principal owners of the Howard Johnson's Motor Hotel, last June signed a long-term lease with the owner of the Las Vegas casino Caesars Palace. The deal calls for a rental of \$2.5 million each year for three years and \$75,000 more each year thereaf-

Caesars also can buy the hotel in 1988 for \$40 million and must give Neustadter and Goldberg a



Under sway of the new imperialism, he said "resistance to abortion will be seen as primitive. Concern over the institution of the family will be viewed as 'untrendy' and unenlightened.

He said the new paganism uses the cultivated freedoms of Western civilization to shrink religious freedom while rejecting the value essence of the Judeo-Christian heritage.



# Being first in line at the dump vital to ragpickers

By TOM WELLS

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) - The old woman's gnarled hands clutched impatiently at a large bone and, after some fumbling, she managed to drop it into her burlap bag. It was another day for 230 unionized ragpickers at Bogota's biggest garbage dump.

The sun has not yet burned off the early morning fog at the mile-square dump each day when the several dozen men, women and children along with flocks of aggresive buzzards - descend with equal vigor on the first garbage trucks to arrive.

Being first to sift the refuse is important. The slow ones, like the aged woman with the arthritic hands, earn as little as \$7.50 a week. The young men make as much as \$12 in the same

The daily scrambling at the dump is a testimony both to man's wastefulness and to the indignity and submission that is necessary sometimes to survive in a country where per capita income is only \$650 a year.

The ragpickers formed their own union in 1961. Each of the 230 members pays the union the peso equivalent of 50 cents a week for the right to poke around in garbage to make a living. The union also charges undisclosed sums to private trash collectors who buy bones, bottles, cans and cardboard retrieved from the dump.

The ragpickers get about three cents a pound for bones, which are used for making glue. Recyclable cardboard brings about a penny a pound, aluminum cans about two cents a pound. Some bottles, such as cooking oil bottles which can be used again at factories, bring a little more than half a cent each.

The dump belongs to the Bogota Public Services Department, whose garbage collectors, through a written agreement with the department, have the right to operate the dump as a business enterprise. The city garbage collectors' union charges the ragpickers' union \$1,000 a month for the right

to work the dumps.

A 28-year-old man said he had been a unionized scavenger at the dump for three years, that he had looked for work for months before following the suggestion of a friend to work at the

The dump has become a dumping spot for some of Bogota's most downand-almost-out people. The place appears to breed contempt for the government as easily as it breeds rats

"Do you think anyone out there with government cares if we starve or not?" asked the young man as he waved a hand nonchalantly toward Bogota's skyline of 50-story high steel-and-glass buildings and then toward the international airport of El-Dorado about a mile away.

"They say there's no unemploy-ment problem here," he said, and spat for emphasis. "Where do they do the counting? Chico Reservado?'

Chico reservado is where many of the city's rich, incuding drug-traffick-

The government says the unemployment rate is 7.6 percent. Private economists, asking that they remain anonymous, say it is 10 percent or 20 percent, depending upon whether you include the underemployed such as the rag-pickers or the men who draw crowds in Bogota's small squares by walking on and rolling around in broken glass, stunts which leave their bodies bloodied and scarred.

Three women cooking a stew over an open fire amid the tons of fly-covered garbage were asked if they had children and what kind of lives they could afford for them?

"Mister, my neighborhood doesn't look much better than this dump," said one of the women, who said she was 30 but looked older. "I've got four children. Listen, Mister, they don't eat meat. They don't eat eggs. There isn't any milk for them. You go out and try to buy those kind of things

when you've got only \$8 a week.
"We eat bread, beans and a little

People in town say we poor people are lazy. Do you think I wouldn't work in a nice factory if I could? WASHINGTON (AP) - As budget time nears, a line will form outside the White House. Groups with one pet project or another will be bidding for a share of the federal

President Carter has said the budget will be tight, and the troubles facing the advocates of one relatively small program are a sample of what's to come.

The American Voca-Joseph A. Califano Jr., Patricia Bario, told Eusecretary of health, education and welfare, wants to cut \$180 million out of the \$681 million currently budgeted for job training in agriculture, business, trade and the industrial arts.



# Kermit wins as Slaton gamble fails

Trailing 14-7 and forced into a desperate situation by an ever-expiring clock, Slaton's Tigers had to gamble with only 5:40 left in Friday night's Class AA regional championship game at Midland's Memorial Sta-

The Kermit Yellow Jackets made them wish they could renege on that

With time rapidly running out, Slaton had to take a chance on a fourth and eight situation from their own 45 yard line. But as quarterback Ricky Davis dropped back to pass, Kermit's Edwin McCasland exploded into the Slaton backfield to pin Davis for a one yard loss.

Kermit then took the ball and meth-odically marched toward the Slaton goal with stellar running back Alfred McGilbra capping the drive with a seven yard burst for his second touchdown of the night. Layne Nutt's kick gave Kermit an insurmountable 21-7 lead with only 1:35 left in the game. The Yellow Jackets made that score stand up the rest of the way.

THAT LAST touchdown not only iced away the win for Kermit, but also put a misleading final touch on a contest that was much closer than the score might indicate.

A look at the statistics reveals a tighter struggle. Slaton, District 5-AA champions, finished with 15 first downs to Kermit's 13. Kermit, the District 7-AA titleist, had a slight edge in total yards with 254 as compared to Slaton's 228.

After falling behind 14-0 in the first half, Slaton appeared to have found the touch as they moved into Kermit territory on their first three possessions of the second half.

BUT THE Yellow Jacket defense, which harrassed Davis all night, dug in to stop two of those drives leaving Slaton on the short end of a 14-7

'Slaton's only touchdown of the night came the first time they got their hands on the ball in the second half. The Tigers, not exactly famous for their passing attack, turned to the airways to get that score. Davis, who had attempted only 42 passes all season prior to this game, connected with

wide receiver Billy Daniel twice in the drive to set up the touchdown.

On third and 15 from the Kermit 45, Davis hooked up with Daniel for 18 yards and a first down at the Kermit 27. On the very next play Davis found Daniel curling through the middle of the Kermit defense for 26 yards, all the way down to the one. Fullback Mike White, who had a 20 yard run in the drive, covered the final yard and Jessie Titus' kick pulled Slaton-to within a touchdown at 14-7.

While Staton's offense had problems putting the ball in the end zone from that point, the Tiger defense stopped Kermit cold on their first three possessions of the second half. Kermit managed only 26 yards in 10" plays on those three opportunities.

**BUT WHEN McCasland dumped** Davis on that big fourth down play, the dam finally burst. After taking over the ball, Kermit moved the 56 yards to paydirt in just nine plays.

Kermit took a 6-0 lead in the game when they took the opening kickoff and moved 77 yards in just five plays with Deon Bryant crashing into the end zone from two yards out. The big play in the drive was McGilbra's 48yard scamper on the second play of the game. That run moved the ball from the Kermit 31 to the Slaton 21.


A pair of Kermit fumbles gave Slaton a pair of golden opportunities go by the boards after that first touchdown when the Kermit defense stiffened with their backs against the wall. Kermit had threated to make the game a laugher when they drove

they had the ball. But at that point, Bryant mishandled a Brent Barrs pitch and Slaton's Greg Johnson recovered at the 10.

Slaton then drove all the way to the Kermit 31 before Davis had to punt the ball away. Even though the drive didn't produce any points, Davis gave the crowd a lesson in running the option. He tore off runs of 12, seven and 33 yards in the drive.

JOHNSON THEN smothered a David Fulbright bobble at the Kermit 21, but three plays produced only three yards and Titus' 36-yard field goal attempt was off the mark. Kermit quickly drove down to the

ABILENE - Quarterback Vic Vines unlimbered his passing arm here Friday night to riddle Arlington Heights with three touchdown passes as Odessa Permian blitzed the Yellow Jackets, 38-12, before 11,500 fans in P.E. Shotwell.

The victory in the Class AAAA regional football playoff game moves Mojo into the quarterfinals against either Plainview or El Paso Andress next weekend.

Permian exploded for 21 points in a three-minute span midway through the final period to break open a 17-12 game. The Panthers took a 17-0 lead at halftime.

Permian started off just like they did last week in their bi-district win over Lewisville, unable to move the football. The Black Cats were held on their first possession but Dee Witt recovered a fumble for the Panthers at the Jacket 44. Permian was unable to move as both teams fought to a holdoff in the first period with no

THE PANTHERS finally got on the scoreboard with Vines hitting Gregg Lambert with a 31-yard pass to the Heights' 16. Three plays later Lambert bulled over from the one and Robert Orrosco booted the extra point for a 7-0 lead with 5:56 left in the first

Bryan Lambert recovered a Jacket fumble on the next possession at the Heights' 23 and this time Permian had to settle for a field goal with Orrosco splitting the uprights from 25 yards out to make it 10-0 with 2: 28 left in the half.

Mike Moore, Panther defensive end who played an outstanding game, led the Mojo defense on the next possession and the Pnathers scored one more time before the half when Vines hit split end David Loper on a stop-andgo pattern from 28 yards out with 22 seconds left in the half, making it

Kelly Howard picked off a Jacket pass on the last play of the first half as Mojo took the comfortable 17-0 lead to the dressing room.

ON THE SECOND possession of the

second half for the Jackets, Arlington Heights went 42 yards in four plays with Kevin Batie scampering 18 yards on a quick pitch for the score. Terry Williams' extra point attempt sailed wide and low to the left making it 17-6 with 6:07 left in the third quarter.

# Longhorns kick Texas Ags, 22-7

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Russell Erxleben kicked two field goals and kept Texas A&M deep in its own territory with his booming punts, while linebacker Bruce Scholtz supplied a critical safety that carried the 14th-ranked Texas Longhorns to a 22-7 victory Friday night over the Southwest Conference rival Aggies.

One of Erxleben's field goals was a 59-yarder, and he boomed the ball almost the length of the field with his towering punts, including a 74-yarder with the wind, to keep the Aggies pinned down.

While Erxleben supplied the Longhorns with field position in the nationally televised game, third-string quarterback Mark McBath, starting the first time this year, provided just enough firepower.

McBath completed a 47-yard pass to set up one touchdown and ran 3 yards for another.

Sun Bowl-bound Texas, 8-3 for the year and 6-2 in SWC play, built a 10-0 halftime lead before the Aggies came alive on the passing of quarterback Mike Mosley.

THE PLAY that killed the Aggies came after Mosley had scrambled 9 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter to narrow the deficit to 10-7.

Tailback Curtis Dickey tried to reverse his field to outwit the Longhorn defenders only to be tackled by Scholtz in the Aggies end zone. Only 49 seconds later, after a 47-yard pass from McBath to Johnny Lam Jones, Johnny Ham Jones dashed 5 yards for a touchdown.

A&M will go to the Hall of Fame Bowl with a 7-4 record and 4-4 mark in league play.

Erxleben punted the ball eight times for 384 yards, an average of 48

yards per kick. MC BATH starting for the first time in 18 games, whipped the Longhorns

71 yards in 10 plays the second time they had the ball. Freshman Johnny

Jam Jones bolted 20 yards and McBath sprinted untouched around right end on a keeper for the touchdown.

Then both teams locked into a tense trench warfare struggle without either the Longhorns or the Aggies getting a first down in the second quarter.

The Aggies got only three first downs in the first half, and their only brush with a potential score came when barefoot Tony Franklin missed 46-yard field goal attempt.

Erxleben drilled a 59-yard field goal with the wind just before the halftime gun. The kick nicked the inside of the right goalpost to give the Longhorns a 10-0 lead at intermission.

THE AGGIES, who tried a psychological ploy by coming out with jerseys that had their names on them, showed plenty of good offense at times in the second half.

newspaper, quoted Ali as saying from Mississippi that "I want nothing to do with boxing anymore. I am going on to a new life. My lawyers are working on 25 deals and endorsements. That is why I want to announce my retirement in a few days. Let the young guys have it (the title). Ali is expected to be in New York

next Thursday for a press conference called by promoter Butch Lewis. "That will be the last boxing press

conference I will be at and you probably are the last writer I will have an interview with about boxing," the 36year-old Ali told Young by tele-

The sometimes unpredictable Ali has "retired" a number of times, only to climb back into the ring.

But after winning the World Boxing Association championship Sept. 15 in a bruising 15-round decision from Leon Spinks — the inexperienced youngster who had wrested the crown from him seven months earlier - Ali strongly indicated he would never fight again.

"I will be the first black man to retire with the championship," said Ali."I won't have to suffer any more.

# College season winds down with 2 bowls hanging

College football's regular season, which began more than three months ago, finally winds down Saturday...and none too soon for the three undecided bowl games.

As an omen of things to come, Penn State defeated Temple 10-7 way back on Sept. 1 and the Nittany Lions, who completed an 11-0 regular season last week, rule the roost as the nation's only unbeaten team.

But while top-rated Penn State sits back waiting to learn who its Sugar Bowl opponent will be, two of the serious challengers for the national championship will be in action.

Second-ranked Alasbama, which began the season as No. 1, meets Auburn in the traditional windup at

Birmingham while third-ranked Southern California has a night contest against Hawaii on the beach at Waikiki — or at least in beautiful Aloha Stadium.

THE SUGAR Bowl will be keeping a close watch on Alabama-Auburn, as well as the meeting in Athens, Ga., between No. 11 Georgia and Georgia

An Alabama victory will send the Crimson Tide to New Orleans against Penn State and a matchup of the nation's 1-2 teams. But an Auburn upset or a tie will put Georgia in the Sugar Bowl to represent the Southeastern Conference. Whichever loses out on the Sugar will meet.Stanford in the Bluebonnet Bowl.

The Southwest Conference's host

team in the Cotton Bowl also is up in the air, but ninth-ranked Houston can nail it down by beating or tying lowly Rice Saturday night. By that time, though, the Cougars may be sitting pretty since Texas Tech, the only other SWC team with a Cotton-pickin' chance, must defeat eighth-ranked Arkansas in an afternoon contest to stay alive.

Only 14 major games are on the weekend schedule. The rest of the slate finds Holy Cross at Boston College, Miami, Fla. at Florida in the finale for ousted Florida Coach Doug Dickey, Wyoming at Louisiana State for a night game, Army vs. Navy at Philadelphia, Utah at San Diego State under the lights, Long Beach State at San Jose State, Tennessee at Vanderbilt and Brigham Young vs. NevadaLas Vegas in, of all places, Yokohama, Japan.

THE ALABAMA-AUBURN clash has produced the tightest ticket situation in Birmingham's history, with a pair reportedly going for as high as \$200. There is no scalping law in Alabama.

Bama's Bear Bryant calls 6-3-1 Auburn "definitely the toughest conference team we've faced this year.

"They are a very explosive team. And if they have James Brooks back, we will be facing a double barrel instead of a single barrel."

Brooks has been out since the season's fourth game with a foot injury but is still the Tigers' second leading rusher with 542 yards. Auburn's No. 1 tailback, vJoe Cribbs, is No. 2 in the the SEC with an average of 120.8 yards a

game. The Georgia-Georgia Tech game pairs two of the country's leading runners. Tech's Eddie Lee Ivery, who set a national single-game record by gaining 356 yards against Air Force, is No. 4 with 1,402 yards while Georgia's Willie McClendon, No. 1 in the SEC, is 10th nationally with 1,239 despite being slowed by injuries in his last two outings.

"I don't view this as a personal duel between Willie and me," says Ivery: "I won't be tackling him and I don't think he'll be tackling me."

Parlov's plane was struck shortly before its arrival here Wednesday, but it landed safely

The fight will be televised live in the United States by CBS beginning at 3

PARLOV SCOFFED at reports that he was not in peak condition because of his difficulties in making the 175pound weight limit. "It is true I was overweight until

recently, but I lose weight as fast as I put it on. I only need a few weeks of hard training, and I have done things properly this time. The champion said he still was

ashamed for his poor showing against John Conteh of Britain last June 17 before the home folks in Belgrade. "I retained the title but I don't

intend to repeat that poor performance," he said. "I have trained hard and only with southpaws to get ready for Johnson. I have seen him in action and he is an excellent boxer, a solid puncher.

"I won't underrate him and I'll be careful. But I am confident I'll be the winner. I have two ambitions now: to see one light heavyweight champion weight crown.'
