DALLAS (AP) - A little more than nouncement, stockholders approved
Dallas-based LTV Corp.'s absorption of New Orleans-based simultaneous meetings Tuesday. Corporation officials hope the $\$ 6.1$ billion merger, which creates either
the third or fourth largest steel production firm in the nation, will strengthen their two steel companies.
