# Refugees find bittersweet purgatory in France

CRETEIL, France (AP) — Vietnamese refugee Huynh Tho, his wife and 13 children are finding a bittersweet purgatory in France. Their memories of 40 days of anguish aboard the freighter Hai Hong are all too fresh, their dreams of freedom too uncertain.

At two refugee "transit centers" in the Paris suburbs, Huynh and 221 other refugees who fled Vietnam aboard the Hai Hong have had six days' induction into their new life, with medical examinations, fr sh clothes and large helpings of "Asian cooking a la Française.

Within the next two weeks, all of them will be transferred to some 100 "lodging centers" in the French provinces, where public and private refugee agencies will try to find them jobs, locate relatives already in Europe, and integrate them into French life.

For the moment, though, Huynh and the others are in limbo. In their little dormitory rooms, with orange peels, ends of French bread, and nearly empty wine bottles on the table, they speak in whispers, so as not to wake their children. And they ask about the ones left behind.

"We hear there are no more boats coming. Is it true, are we the last?" Huynh asked this week.

But then there were fresh reports from Quala Lumpur that Thai air reconnaissance patrols have spotted more boats fleeing Vietnam and headed for Malaysia, the route of the Hai Hong.

Huynh, who has become a one-man message center because he speaks French, English, Mandarin Chinese and several Vietnamese dialects, quickly flashed this news, sending waves of smiling chatter down the center's orange-enamelled corridors.

"We are all a bit nostalgic, for our people, for our country. Even me, now in France, I am always thinking back, for I have seen with my eyes the story of what happened in my country," Huynh said.

The soft-spoken, 52-year-old Huynh, who still wears Vietnamese sandals but now has a gray second-hand French suit and a turtleneck for the damp winter, said he used to work as a business representative in Saigon for an American-based firm. He lost his job in 1975 after the fall of Sai-

"I tried a little farming but it didn't work," Huynh told Poul Hartling of

Denmark, U.N. high commissioner for refugees, who toured the center this week as part of his first official visit to France.

After Hartling had left, Huyhn told how he and some 2,500 other refugees bribed, conned, sneaked and begged their way onto the Hai Hong, which was docked in the port of Vung Tau near Saigon.

The Malaysian government would not allow the refugees to land, and many remained on board the ship for weeks, running low on food and water. In addition to the refugees here, most others went to the United States, Canada and Germany,

Those who managed to get aboard the ship were "mostly merchants, many of them of Chinese origin," said Huynh, who has some Chinese blood. Many had been made to do farm work after the government took their property, houses and personal belongings, he said.

Li Thoi Huyen, a former bank employee and friend of Huynh, said he had to pay 70 taels, gold worth about \$17,000, to get his family onto the boat. Others had to bribe guards at the dock, he said, adding: "There's al-

# Four students killed in truck-bus collision

ROBY, Texas (AP) — An oil servicing truck smashed broadside Friday into a school bus carrying boys' and girls' teams high school basketball players to a tournament. Four students were killed and 21 persons were hospitalized, six in critical condition.

Killed were a freshman girl, a sophomore boy and two senior girls. The injured "just rolled and tumbled and twisted" as they were being

loaded into ambulances," said P.L. Burnett, who lives near where the accident occurred 11 miles west of this West Texas town.

The bus, carrying students from McCaulley High School, was ripped in two and tossed upside down off U.S. 180. A trooper with the Texas Departgoing south on Farm Road 611, hit the bus in the center of the right side at the intersection.

'We just laid the dead at the corner (of the intersection) because we ran out of ambulances and back boards and stretchers," Burnett said.

The accident occurred about 30 minutes after the bus left McCaulley, a small community 12 miles east of Roby. The teams were to have played in a tournament at Hermleight, a community 20 miles southwest of the accident scene

Most of the kids were lying behind the bus" in subfreezing weather, said J.C. Cave, a passer by who stopped his car to help. He said some of the students were still lying inside the

The dead were identified as Rita Wilkerson, a freshman; Britt Jeffries, a sophomore; Bonnie Pippin, a

senior; and Loleta Perales, a senior. The Texas Highway Patrol said the injured were taken to five area hospitals - 11 at Snyder, five at Abilene, four at Rotan and one at Sweetwater. Two of the injured at Snyder were later transferred to Lubbock

The school's superintendent and principal - the coaches of the boys' team - were among the injured. Doyle Bell, school principal and apparently the driver of the bus, was listed in critical condition

# Record lows may continue your R-T | for a spell

Winter apparently has come to Midland to stay for a spell

Midlanders winced under punishing 14-degree weather Friday night with the mercury still descending as the season's first serious-seeming sprinklings of snow fell on the Tall City earlier in the day

And no end to the cold is in sight. Although the weatherman is calling for it to clear up and get a bit warmer today, the low tonight still should be only in the upper teens, with today's high predicted in the low 40s.

Sunday should warm up to the low 50s, according to the National Weather Service office at Midland Regional Airport

Friday's high of 27 degrees was expected to slide to a record low near 10 degrees overnight to put 1978 on the record books. That would beat a former record for Dec. 8 of 22 degrees, set in 1932.

While it left only a trace of moisture in the Weather Service rain gauge. the season's first snowfall was heavy enough in some areas of the Permian Basin to excite the younger set. Still, few Midlanders indeed located enough snow for a snowballs — most of the blowing white stuff melted as it

hit the ground That trace of snow represented the only moisture recorded so far this month at the Weather Service, leaving the annual total to date at 17.09

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

# French develop system for handling refugees

Nguyen Ngoc Long, a surgeon friend of Huynh, got his family of eight onto the boat by hiding in an alley beside the dock and then blending in with the big group getting aboard. "We benefitted from the confusion," Long said, smiling.

"Before leaving, I heard many stories about ships sinking but I was

not afraid," Huynh said. "But while we were on board, we suffered very much. Three died and three babies came.' Some of the teen-age boys and girls now hold hands as they scurry

through the center in their handed-down windbreakers and often new sneakers. Huynh said this is new. "No romance on the ship. It was too sorrowful," he said. "Now is

another story. We are happy now." France, which has long prided itself on being a "land of asylum," has

taken in 56,458 refugees from Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos since 1975 and has subsidized the major portion of their assistance. According to official statistics, this influx has swelled France's immi-

grant population to about four million, or nearly 8 percent of the country's total population of 53 million. President Valery Giscard D'Estaing has pledged to accept another 1.000 refugees per month through 1979, according to Christine Lakah,

director of refugee transit centers from a private group called "France Terre d'Asile" - France, Land of Asylum. This and other private groups, along with the French Red Cross,

have developed a system of handling the refugees, from meeting them on arrival to providing advice long after they have found jobs.

According to Ms. Lakah, the Hai Hong group had its share of problems on arrival. About 4 percent had tuberculosis, 10 percent had venereal disease, far higher than the normal incidence in France.

"Happily, these are easy to cure," Ms. Lakah said. "We also had some problems at first because many of them refused to eat French food. So we mixed in a little more rice and came up with Asiatic food a la Francaise. Now, they're all doing fine.'

# Meir was treated for lymph cancer

JERUSALEM (AP) - Golda Meir, the iron-willed grandmother who led Israel through its toughest trial by fire, died Friday in a hospital where she was being treated for cancer of the lymph system. She was 80.

The immediate cause of death was not disclosed. A Hadassah Hospital spokeswoman said the former prime minister had suffered for more than a decade from malignant lymphoma, a cancer of lymph organs that causes overproduction of lymphocytes, one kind of white blood cell.

The illness was a closely guarded secret during her term as head of government, 1969-74, which ended with her resignation in the aftermath of the Yom Kippur War against the Arabs

ple," Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan said in Switzerland, echoing sentiments of Israel's other leaders.

Similar sadness was expressed by many in America as well. As a young Russian-born immigrant, Mrs. Meir had taught for several years in Milwaukee before leaving for Palestine, and she later traveled often to the United States on fund-raising mis-

Americans "have always felt a special love and affection" for her, President Carter said in a statement released at the White House.

Carter said Mrs. Meir's first dream — a strong and free Israel — had been realized in her lifetime. "We pray that the second great dream of Golda Meir's life, for which she worked and hoped and prayed all her life, will soon be realized: a just and lasting

She had been in and out of the hospital recently. She was admitted to Hadassah for the last time Oct. 29. It was reported then she was suffering from back trouble caused by a slipped disc. Later it was reported she had developed a viral infection and was being treated for jaundice, a liver ailment

A hospital spokeswoman said Friday that cancer had been detected 10 or 12 years ago, and she was first treated with radiotherapy and later by chemotherapy.

She is survived by a son, Menachem, a daughter, Sarah, and a sister, Clara Stern of Bridgeport, Conn. Her husband, Morris Meyerson, from whom she was separated in 1933, died in 1951.

Death came to Israel's fourth prime minister as the nation stood on the brink of a lasting peace with Egypt, something that has eluded it for three

In 1974, Mrs. Meir said that peace would come, "but I doubt that I will still be here to see it.

Recently, Mrs. Meir let it be known at party meetings that she did not like the direction Prime Minister Menachem Begin had taken in his peace talks with Egypt. She opposed Israel's withdrawal from all of the Sinai Peninsula, including giving up a belt of Sinai settlements that were built during her five years and 78 days as prime minister.

A year ago, though, when Egyptian President Anwar Sadat made his peacemaking visit to Jerusalem, his meeting with Mrs. Meir and their exchange of jokes and small presents was one of the warmest moments of that historic weekend and an emotional signal that peace was possi-

Sadat sent messages of condolence Friday to Israeli President Yitzhak Navon and to Mrs. Meir's family, a Sadat spokesman said in Cairo. The messages' contents were not disclosed.

It was expected that the body would lie in state briefly at Israel's Parliament building, the Knesset, after the end of the Jewish Sabbath at sundown Saturday. Government radio said the Cabinet would meet Saturday evening to decide on details of the state funeral ceremony and mourning period.

An official statement of mourning by President Navon was read over Israel Radio, but a spokesman for Begin, who was in Oslo, Norway, to receive the Nobel Peace Prize this weekend, said the prime minister would have no statement until after the Sabbath.

Mrs. Meir became prime minister after the death in office of Levi Eshkol. At the time she appeared to be a compromise candidate who would be pushed aside when the Labor Party sorted out its rivalries. Instead she became an institution, running the government with a firm hand.

Though she hated the image of the "grandmother prime minister," she could not help contributing to it. She

would often invite her closest Cabinet advisers to her home for a meeting and then fuss over them serving coffee and cakes.

The initial reverses of the 1973 war - and the public's demand for accountability at the top of government - led her to step down in 1974.

# Castro formalizing agreement to free political prisoners

HAVANA (AP) - A delegation of 112 Cuban exiles met with President Fidel Castro Friday to formalize an agreement to free 3,000 political prisoners and reunite families separated by political differences.

Castro, seven members of the Communist Party Central Committee, and Aleida March, widow of Cuban revolutionary hero Che Guevara, met with the exiles in Havana's Palace of the Revolution.

The emigration of all current and former political prisoners and their families, along with all Cubans with relatives abroad, could result in more than 50,000 Cubans going to the United

A group of 96 exiles from throughout the U.S. arrived in Havana aboard a special Cubana Airlines charter flight from Atlanta late Thursday. The group returns to Atlanta on Sun-

Other exiles were already in the Cuban capital or arriving later from Miami, Puerto Rico, Venezuela and other points - bringing to 150 the number expected here.

Seventy-five exiles were here for the first meeting between refugees and Castro last month and 75 others received special invitations to join in the new talks. Many of them brought their wives, and for many it was the

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BI. ected first time they had returned to their homeland since shortly after Castro took over in 1959.

Castro culminated the first two-day dialogue with exiles on Nov. 22 by announcing that some 3,000 of 3,500 political prisoners in Cuban jails would be freed as rapidly as the United States would accept them. He also provided for an exchange of visits to and from the island by exiles and

The exile delegation brings back word to Castro that the U.S. government is prepared to accept 400 political prisoners and their families each

Attorney General Griffin Bell announced last week that the larger question of former political prisoners still living in Cuba who wish to emigrate to the United States would have to be considered after the current prisoners are released, a process that could take about eight months.

"This is a serious matter," said Reinol Gonzalez of Miami, an exile delegate who had served 16 years in a Cuban prison for counter-revolutionary activities.

'Many of these prisoners were freed eight, 10 and 12 years ago," he said. "They've been waiting a long time to leave. Now, the U.S. wants them to wait even longer.'

# Jewish body seeks converts for first time in history

By GEORGE W. CORNELL **AP Religion Writer** 

NEW YORK (AP) - For the first time in modern history, a major, national body of Judaism has launched an active, forthright effort to win converts to the faith.

The missionary program was adopted last week-

end by the board of directors of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations at the urging of its president, Rabbi Alexander Schindler.

'Millions of Americans are searching for something," he said in recommending a direct "outreach program aimed at all Americans who are un-

churched and who are seeking roots in religion." Approval of the step by the 1.2-million-member organization of Reform Judaism at a meeting in Houston marked the first officially endorsed effort at converting non-Jews in the modern era, a spokes-

man said. "It will be low key, and not hard sell," said Albert Vorspan, the Union's vice president. "It won't involve buttonholing people, street campaigns, or claiming Judaism is the only true faith.

"It will be aimed at the unchurched and seeking, not the already churched and will be done mainly through information centers, study courses and liter-

Although Jews in ancient times carried on vigorous prosyletizing efforts among pagans, it was proseribed when Christianity became the state religion of the Roman Empire, and also under Moslem conquerors, on pain of death.

'This served to cool our conversionist ardor," Rabbi Schindler said, although noting that Judaism did not totally abandon all proselytizing efforts until 400 years ago, in the l6th century.

advocated resumption of missionary work, and some small, independent groups have done so, such as in Los Angeles, Chicago and Philadelphia.

But the Reform body, one of three major wings of American Judaism which also includes Conservative and Orthodox bodies, became the first for centuries formally to initiate such activity on a nation-wide

Rabbi Schindler said present-day Americans are in the "grips of a great hunger" for religious values, with many people falling "prey to mystical cults which literally enslave them," as was tragically demonstrated by the mass suicides in Guyana.

"Well, Juadism offers life, not death," he said. "It teaches free will, not surrender of body and soul to another human being ... Judaism is a religion of hope and not of despair.

He said "repressive laws" and "fear of persecution" no longer block Jewish convert-seeking, and he called on members to "resume their time-honored voclation" by taking "affirmative action in championing the Jewish faith.'

A 30-member commission, drawn from the various educational and other branches of Reform Judaism, was authorized for the effort, including establishing information centers widely, publicizing courses on Judaism and developing convert-seeking publica-

Rabbi Schindler disavowed the "travelling circus" type of activity, saying the effort would not seek to wean people from religions of their choice," nor engage in rivalry with established churches.'

The effort, he said, is directed toward "a different audience entirely - the unchurched, those reared in non-religious homes, those who have become disillusioned with their taught beliefs, those seekers after truth who require a religion which tolerates, nay encourages, all questions, and especially the alienated and the rootless

He pointed out that Judaism has been suffering losses through intermarriage and assimilation, and appealed for special efforts to convert the non-Jewish partner in such marriages, and to make them feel more welcome in Judaism.

"Jews by choice are Jews in the full meaning of the term," he said.

But he also aimed the new activity at the growing number of "unchurched" Americans - a number put at 61 million by a 1978 Gallup poll."

# Rodriguez, aide plead guilty in Laredo scandal

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - Former Laredo Street Commissioner Jose Rodriguez and his one-time top assistant pleaded guilty here Friday to theft charges stemming from the scandal in the city's troubled street department. Rodriguez was sentenced to four years in prison.

Rodriguez, a one-time top lieutenant of former Laredo political boss and mayor J.C. Martin, pleaded guilty to one count of theft of services as part of a plea bargaining arrange-

Luis Guardiola, the former No. 2 man in the department, pleaded guilty to one count of felony theft. His sentencing was deferred pending a probation report. Webb County District Attorney Charles Borchers has recommended that Guardiola be sentenced to two years in prison.

State District Judge Peter Michael Curry also said he would await a probation report on Rodriguez before deciding whether to send the former commissioner to prison.

Rodriguez headed the Laredo street department for 29 years until taking a leave of absence without pay in October 1977, two months after financial irregularities were uncovered in the department.

He was named last January in 21 indictments alleging theft of services, felony theft, tampering with government records and engaging in organized crime.

Guardiola, who was fired from his position in April after an extended leave of absence with pay, had been named in 15 indictments alleging sim ilar charges.

The remaining charges against the two men were dropped as part of the plea bargain

A total of 24 Laredoans have been indicted since the financial irregularities were uncovered in the department's 1976 financial records.

The records showed that a third of the department's \$3 million budget was being spent to maintain its 87 vehicles. That \$1 million total, however, did not include gas, oil and tires.

The department, the records show, used an average of 55 auto batteries per month and a total of 107 radiators. for the 87 vehicles.

Several alleged cases of "phantom employees" were also uncovered, in which some Laredoans were allegedly paid with street department money for work they did not do. Laredo, a border city of 100,000, has

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# 'Grandmother minister' ruled with steel will

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - In her time, Golda Meir was one of the most

A bit stout in her later years, deep-voiced, her grey hair drawn into a bun, she was to many "the grandmother prime minister" - a nick-

name she didn't like - but it added something to the underdog image of

the country she directed with a steel will.

Mrs. Meir was many things in her lifetime: schoolteacher in Milwaukee, swamp-draining kibbutznik in Palestine, director-general of the Histadrut Labor Federation, minister of labor, foreign minister, secretary-general of the Mapai (Labor) Party, and prime minister 1969-1974 as the Israel-Arab conflict reached a bloody peak.

HER POLITICAL CAREER stumbled on the public's dismay at her leadership in the 1973 Yom Kippur War. But by 1977 she had a warm meeting with President Anwar Sadat of Egypt, who plotted the surprise

Sitting side-by-side during Sadat's visit to Jerusalem in November 1977, the two old enemies joked about Sadat's former habit of calling her

He gave her a cigarette case. She gave him a present for his new grandchild - "from a grandmother to a grandfather," she said, adding to an already historic event a touch that only Golda Meir could provide.

She was born Golda Mabovitch on May 3, 1898, in Kiev, Russia. One of her first memories, she once said, was of her carpenter father nailing the windows and doors shut against a coming pogrom threatening death

It was not an auspicious beginning. But at age 79 in 1977 she was at the Broadway opening of the play "Golda" based on her life and her dedication to the survival and prosperity of Jews and the Jewish state of which she was a pioneering founder.

Her family escaped the pogroms, emigrating to the United States in 1906 and settling in Milwaukee where her father, Moshe, was a railroad worker. As a teen-ager she became interested in Zionism, the idea that Jews should have a state in their ancient homeland. Palestine

HER INDEPENDENT STREAK also showed early. Her parents didn't want her to attend high school. "It doesn't pay to be too clever," her father said. So she ran away to a sister in Denver, Colo., to study and

At age 15, she met Morris Meyerson, a sign-painter, and "it was mutual love from the beginning." At 19 she became Golda Meyerson but their

Morris was shy, introverted, a lover of music and literature, and no Zionist. Golda was a speech-maker and political enthusiast, convinced that her place was in Palestine helping to carve a country out of the rocky hills and swampy lowlands.

She taught fourth grade in Milwaukee for several years, then in 1921 Golda and the reluctant Morris sailed for the Middle East, where their marriage eventually foundered.

Their first home was Kibbutz Merhavia in the Jezreel Valley. Work started at dawn and ended at dusk, planting trees, tending chickens, draining the swamps. The diet, which Golda tried to enliven with some variety, was bully beef and chickpea mush, laced with quinine to ward off

"I was too tired to eat, but I ate anyway, so that others wouldn't say, 'The American girl can't take it,'" she said years later.

AS IT TURNED OUT, MORRIS couldn't take kibbutz life, and they moved to Jerusalem where their children were born, Menahem in 1924 and Sarah in 1926. Now Golda was unhappy, not doing anything to advance the Zionist cause. She took her first political job in 1928, head of the Women's Labor Council.

It was hard on Morris and the children, for Golda started working with the eventual leaders of the Jewish state - David Ben-Gurion, Levi Eshkol, Moshe Sharett. They recognized her oratorical powers and dispatched her to the United States to raise funds and attract immigrants. Her daughter Sarah recalled later, "We were always lonesome for mother, for we saw so little of her.'

Mrs. Meir said, "I did not see as much of my children as a mother should. I was in America raising money for arms or machinery, or in Paris at a conference, and so on....My marriage was a failure.'

Golda and Morris officially separated in 1933. He died in 1951 while she was in the United States. Yet Golda always kept a photograph of

Her obsession was salvation for Jews, a people who in the 1930s were headed for of Hitler's "final solution" to the "Jewish problem." In Palestine there was trouble too, with Arabs rioting and rampaging against the increasing Jewish presence in the Holy Land, then held by Britain as a mandate from World War I.

THE FUTURE BROUGHT THE establishment of Israel and it was fated to fight four wars with its Arab neighbors.

Mrs. Meir's analysis: "The root of the problem is that our neighbors have never reconciled themselves to our existence.'

But in the 1930s the immediate problem was the Jews of Europe, and Mrs. Meir found exactly how much the world cared. She was sent in 1938 to a world conference called by President Franklin D. Roosevelt to find ways of delivering European Jewry from Hitler's oppression.

This may be the most important conference in all of Jewish history," she told her children as she left for Evain-les-Bains in France.

Delegates from 32 nations decided nothing. The American promise to

accept 27,370 Austrian and German refugees a year was a drop in the ocean. Mrs. Meir was disgusted.

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"They say the Jews are the chosen people," she said. "We are — chosen to take all the knocks and beatings and then turn the other cheek." In later years the United Nations would condemn Israel for its heavy military reprisals, and Mrs. Meir responded bitterly, "The world hates a jew who hits back....The world loves us only when we are to be pitied."

HITLER'S DEATH MACHINE consumed six million Jews, fully a third of the world's Jewish population. Yet the wretched death-camp survivors found little pity as many of them sailed for Palestine in crowded refugee boats. The British authorities turned large numbers of them back and again they were behind barbed wire - in refugee camps on the Mediterranean island of Cyprus.

The Jewish struggle against British rule in Palestine intensified, the British handed the problem over to the United Nations, and the world body voted on Nov. 29, 1947, to partition Palestine into Jewish and Arab

Mrs. Meir was then head of the Jewish Agency, and Jews were dancing in the street outside the agency building when Mrs. Meir leaned from a balcony to declare: "For 2,000 years we have waited for our deliverance....It surpasses human words.'

Overcome by emotion, she shouted, "Jews - mazel tov!" - good luck.

Israel declared its independence on May 14, 1948, and the Arabs declared war. Mrs. Meir got her first diplomatic mission for the Jewish state: disguised as a Bedouin Arab woman, she slipped across the Jordan River in a vain effort to persuade King Abdullah to keep his Jordanain troops out of the war.

WHEN THE FIGHTING ENDED, Prime Minister Ben-Gurion named her Israel's first ambassador to the Soviet Union. Her appearance at a Moscow synagogue on the Jewish new year attracted 40,000 Jews to see the envoy from Israel.

Her next job, 1949-56, was minister of labor, an important position as Israel tried to absorb, feed, house and employ the flood of refugees from Europe and Arab countries.

Then Ben-Gurion named her foreign minister, at the same time requiring that she abandon Meyerson and take a Hebrew name. She chose Meir, meaning "that which gives light." She explained it was "the closest I could get to a Hebrew version of Meyerson.

The world began to notice Golda Meir, the woman directing the diplomatic efforts of little Israel. But the job gave her one of her most distasteful moments, when she announced at the United Nations that Israel would withdraw from Sinai Peninsula territory conquered in the 1956 war with Egypt over its nationalization of the Suez Canal.

# Gold Meir won world's affection with her common sense, humor

JERUSALEM (AP) - Golda Meir won the affection of her nation and of much of the world for her simply stated common sense and humor, delivered in a Midwest American

Mrs. Meir became prime minister when she was 71. Her age and her matronly appearance helped cultivate the image of a doting Jewish grandmother which delighted most

Mrs. Meir, her wiry hair pulled back in a tight bun and her stout frame garbed in simple dresses, hated being called "the grandmother prime minister," but she could not help contributing to the image.

She would invite her closest cabinet advisers to her home for a crucial meeting, and fuss over them serving coffee and cakes. When she retired in 1974, she said she was looking forward to "cooking for my children and

grandchildren - something I have not done for a long time.

Her humor was often self-deprecatory. "It"s no sin to be 75, but it's no joke either," she said at a birthday

She was often accused of being stubborn and failing to put forward peace plans. But she scolded her Israeli critics by saying, "the Arabs don't want peace, So there is no point in the Jews arguing about it."

Simple language was her trademark. She once wrote that asking Israel to evacuate captured Arab territory was like saying that "because our national home had been broken into once, twice, three times, we should now move out and go elsewhere, instead of putting iron bars on the windows and extra strong locks on the doors.

Her distrust of the Arabs lasted beyond Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's visit to Jerusalem, even though the two laughed together about the days when Sadat called her that old lady.

Upon hearing that Sadat was going ahead with a deal to buy French warplanes after the Camp David summit, she asked if he would use them "to bring vegetables from Alexandria to Tel Aviv."

She admitted to xenophobia, but she had no illusions about her own people. Asked once about reports that Israeli travelers were being warned not to speak Hebrew abroad for fear of terrorist attacks, she quipped, "I know my average Israeli - he'd rather risk his life than shut up.'

Although a symbol of women's liberation, the movement bored her. When asked how she felt about being a woman cabinet minister, she snapped, "I don't know. I've never been a male minister.'

Her speech was always tinged with humanism, often with sadness at Jewish suffering. "There is one thing I want to see before I die," she often said, "and that is that my people should not need expressions of sympathy any more.

# Begin praises Israelis for 'great sacrifices'

OSLO, Norway (AP) - Israeli Premier Menachem Begin, arriving in Oslo Friday to accept his half of the 1978 Nobel Peace Prize, praised the Israeli people for "their love of peace and the great sacrifices that they have made to attain it.'

Hundreds of police and special security men were on duty as Begin landed at a military airfield here. Troops from Norway's special antiterrorist squad stood ready with M-16 rifles and patrolled the airport.

Begin stood hatless in the freezing temperatures and thanked the Norwegian Nobel Committee "for the great dignity bestowed jointly to the president of Egypt and the prime minister of Israel Egyptian President Anwar Sadat,

co-winner of the prize, said he would not attend the ceremonies and sent a special assistant, Sayed Marei, to receive his share of the \$165,000 prize.

# Gourd granddaddy gives pleasure, not business, top spot

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NATIONAL CITY, Calif. - One man had come to buy Wilbur Bradley's gourds. Another, a farmer, had come to sell.

But Bradley, for 20 years the undisputed granddaddy of gourds in this area just south of San Diego, puts pleasure before business. (As if his business itself weren't a pleasure.) He sat down on a crate in front of a pile of some 10,000 drying, buff-colored gourds, and took out his ukulele

 his three ukuleles. "Bubbles, tiny bubbles..." he began, singing in a sprightly, 85-yearold voice as he played.

Before the song was finished, he began another. "Oh, the old gourd king, he ain't what he used to be...'

"Don Ho Bradley," chuckled the man who had come to buy gourds. The other man just chuckled.

Bradley, clad in a Hawaiian shirt and work pants spattered with pumpkin-orange paint, went on to a hillbilly Bradley is a gourd middleman of

sorts. He contracts for gourds from growers and sells them to those who have big plans for the dusty, rattlelike gourds. Only, when he starts making too

much money, he cuts down his prices, Thousands of gourds are sold each

Bradley himself cleans a fair portion and paints some into holiday knickknacks. "Halloween's over," he said, looking at the orange-bright pumpkins. "Tomorrow it's turkeys." But Bradley may be best known for

the tours and entertainment he gives the thousands of girl scouts, handicapped persons and others who ring up his wife, Zilpha, every day for appointments.

The lean, white-moustached man has been in the gourd business since

But he used to be a chemist before he retired in 1955. When he graduated from the Uni-

versity of Southern California with a degree in chemistry in 1916, he asked for a ukulele.

Two years later, he asked for Zilpha's hand. They were married on a Christmas Eve during a flu epidemic as soon as the quarantine signs came down. They will celebrate their 60th wedding anniversary this year.

Bradley still has his ukulele, his wife and the gourd that started it

Pulling a huge, bowl-like gourd filled with onions from under the kitchen sink, Bradley identified the relic as the same one his mother-in-law had used to store onions under her

sink. "She was the one that told me to try gourds when I bought this property,' he said. "She gave me the seeds." But Bradley gave up the growing stems...



WASHINGTON (AP) - The typical motorist spends more than \$100 per year in extra fuel, tire wear and vehicle repairs directly related to driving on the nation's deteriorated roads, claims The Road Information Program.

Besides being hard on shock absorbers, TRIP's research shows, poor roads waste gasoline, inflate tire wear by an average of 156 percent, and accelerate brake, steering and suspension system damage by 72 percent.

More than half of the country's 1.8 million miles of paved roads are pocked by potholes, laced with broken and rutted pavement and bandaged with "temporary" fillings, the information group estimates.

Bad roads not only cost the driver for vehicle maintenance, but they also are the second leading cause of auto accidents, TRIP reports. In 1976, the latest year for which records are complete, road conditions were at fault in 3.6 million accidents, amounting to \$5.1 billion in losses, it says. Drivers can hold down their vehicle operating

costs and reduce their chances of having an accident by sticking, whenever possible, to the newer roads, such as the Interstates, TRIP president H.W. Reece suggests. Driving at a constant speed which modern high-

ways with good surfaces allow, can improve gas mileage by about a third, compared with variable speed, stop-and-go driving on deteriorated urban and rural roads, says Reece.





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

# How much inflation is really too much?

No, it doesn't, the government determined. Nothing is as simple as it seems.

The size of the candy bar increased, you see. So if you consider the increase in size, the price rise came to 9.4 percent, not 25 percent.

Hershey reported that it increased the price of all its products 13.75 percent in each of the past two years. Carter's rules seek to limit increases to half a percentage point less than the average of those years or to 9.5 percent, whichever is less. The figure so the 9.5 percent would apply

So the chocolate bar hike of 9.4 percent fits within average could still meet the rule.

But that's just one case and the inflation-fighting standards being developed by the Council on Wage and Price Stability have to apply to thousands of

When Carter announced his anti-inflation program-Oct. 24, administration officials talked about limiting price boosts next year to approximately 5.75 percent. The administration expects that figure to be achieved if its standards are followed.

The rules aren't final yet and some questions have to be resolved by top government officials or the president himself. But let's have a look at how things stand right now:

Just as brakes cause your auto to slow, the government wants its standards to slow increases in prices of goods and services.

So the basic rule is that price rises in the fiscal year which started Oct. 1 must be below half a percentage point less than the average price increase of 1976 and 1977.

That means firms that raised their prices more in those years will be allowed larger increases. For example, if a company raised prices 8 percent in 1976 and 12 percent in 1977, the average is 10 percent. Its limit would be 9.5 percent, also the maximum increase allowed. If your average was 15 percent, 9.5 is

On the other hand a firm which raised prices 3 percent in 1976 and 5 percent in 1977 would have an average of 4 percent and new increases would be limited to 3.5 percent under the rules.

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

MOUNTAIN VIEW. Calif. (AP) - A space ballet choreographed by American controllers and involving six separate unmanned spacecraft nearing Venus will debut Saturday as scientists gather a burst of information about the cloudy planet's climate and topography.

On Friday, scientists analyzed radar maps sent for a second day by the orbiting Pioneer Venus I to see if new data confirms the existence of a 600-mile-wide crater never before observed from Earth.

The crater, if it turns out to be that large, would be one of the largest discovered by man in the solar system.

On Saturday, five spacecraft will plunge into the Venusian atmosphere as a sixth craft orbits overhead. For a one-hour period, all six are designed to spew a wealth of information about Earth's nearest neighbor to tracking stations in California and Australia for later analy-

Officials at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Ames Research Center here, from which the \$225 million, 243-day Pioneer Venus probes are being controlled, say the multicraft mission is the first of its kind.

neer Venus I orbiter, has been following an elongated oval path around the planet since Monday. Once controllers finish tinkering with its orbit, it is supposed to pass within 90 miles of the Venusian surface once every 24 hours for 243 days and

It is mapping the planet's torrid, rocky surface, charting the "solar winds" which ravage its ionosphere, and sampling the ultraviolet radiation reflected by the dense, sulfur-dioxide clouds that shield the surface from Eartth



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# St. Louis sings Blues over falling attendance

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How attendance figures can't explain everything about the decline of a franchise. Team presidents can. And once you have heard the hairraising ordeal the St. Louis Blues endured, those little numbers at the bottom of the box score might be more easily understood.

The low point came on June 14, 1976. Emile Francis, executive vice president of a club with an uncertain future, made defenseman Scott Campbell his first-round selection in the National Hockey League's draft of amateur players.

Norm Kaplan, Campbell's agent, told Francis, "The worst thing happened today: you guys drafted Campbell and you got no money.'

"I was trying to keep the thing together and I went as far as I could, recalled Francis, who had been in office for two harrowing months. "I arranged a meeting with Kaplan in Chicago and I said, 'What I'll do is give you a personal check for \$25,000 and I'll guarantee he'll get the balance of the signing money on the opening day of training camp.'

THAT, OF course, was a grandstand play since Francis had little reason to believe there would be a training camp in the first place. Francis, his assistant Dennis Ball,

and a secretary were all that was left of the office staff that had to run the Blues and their Central Hockey League affiliate in Kansas City. Both clubs had finished first and had earned bonuses for doing so - but those bonuses went unpaid, legally nullifying all the contracts.

Shrewd businessman that he is, Francis did not dwell on these points when dickering with Kaplan. But when all was said and done, the bottom line was money.

"He said, 'We happen to have a (World Hockey Association) team waiting for us in Houston, and unless you come up with \$75,000 by tonight. we're catching a plane and Scott's going to sign tomorrow at noon," Francis recalled.

"NOW, I just didn't have \$75,000 hanging around that I could use to sign a player when I didn't know if we were going to have a hockey team," he continued.

Campbell went on to sign with the Aeros, who went on to go out of

The Blues, remarkably, didn't. Francis had the last laugh. It might have been the only one he's had since. The team still is recovering from the harrowing year without

money (Francis says he went three months without pay at once point) and without strong fan support at home because the team has played so poorly since.

No money, no players. No players, no fans. Simple mathematics.

IT GOT so bad, prior to training camp last season, that a friend of Francis' called from Port Huron, Mich., and said: "If you'd like to come here and train, fine. I'll get you a good rate at the hotel.'

Since negotiations with more than a dozen groups for sale of the team had fallen through, Francis accepted the offer "because at that point we didn't know if we were going to be in the

They played last season as if they weren't in the league. "From the standpoint of team performance, it was brutal," says Francis.

From the standpoint of survival, though, some commendation was in order. The Blues came very close to beating the Cleveland Barons in the race to become the first folded NHL franchise in some 35 years.

EARLIER, THE Salomon family (then-owners of the Blues) tried to sell the team's home arena to the city of St. Louis because that's where most of the debts had piled up through the mortgage on the building and in taxes owed the city. When the city wouldn't buy, the Salomons threatened to move the club.

Aside from the money, defenseman Bob Gassoff was killed in an off-season motorcycle accident; Campbell was lost to the WHA; Chuck Lefley, a 43-goal scorer in 1975-76 signed a new contract in August and "retired" in October, only to surface weeks later in the uniform of a German team.

'The people who had supported the club through the good and bad days said, 'Hey. What the heck is going on here?' And the dropoff in attendance started," Francis explained.

THE BACKLASH has not been overcome, though the financial problems finally were settled - just under a week before last season began when the Ralston-Purina people bought the team.

Now, all they can do is try to earn back the fans' trust. "You pay a good dollar, you want to see a good effort," says Francis, whose good efforts helped keep hockey alive and struggling in St. Louis.

# Drooling baseball scouts wait in wings for Kirk

NEW YORK (AP) - Kirk Gibson, a wide receiver who made pro scouts drool and then broke their hearts by choosing a baseball career, will put on a football uniform for the final time in

the Senior Bowl. Baseball is his job now, but loyalty is the name of Gibson's game. Loyalty to Michigan State University, which is why he played his senior year this fall after signing a lucrative baseball contract with the Detroit Tigers and spending most of the summer as an outfielder in the Florida State

And loyalty to Spartan quarterback Ed Smith, the nation's fourth leading passer on the NCAA charts, which is why he'll suit up in Mobile, Ala., on Jan. 13.

"When I signed with the Tigers, their first thought was that I shouldn't play football," Gibson said. "But I made it clear that there was no way I would sign unless I could play football. I owe too much to the university, to my friends and to my coaches.

"I WASN'T going to the Senior Bowl until I found out that Eddie was going. I have an opportunity to help Eddie, to maybe determine where he'll go and how high he'll be drafted."

The Tigers, who are enraptured by Gibson's raw slugging power and blazing speed, can only hold their breath and hope the injury jinx ignores him one more time. Gibson doesn't even know what that means.

"I've been asked about it all season," says the second-team Associated Press All-American, who was named the nation's top offensive end by the Downtown Athletic Club Thursday night and who might have been the first wide receiver drafted had he opted for pro football.

"I live carelessly, I guess. It's no secret. I'm very active and I do a lot of things. I did all my life, even before I came to Michigan State. I know what's careless and what's not and I have great confidence that I won't get burt. I don't want to quit football, but I know I have to. But I'll go out and give it all I've got one last time."

GIBSON SAID the only time he even thinks about getting hurt is "when someone asks me about it." Thus far, he's been lucky.

"I suffered a slightly separated shoulder the last game of my sopho-more year," he said. "And I missed three games last year when I tore some ligaments and fibers in my heel. This season, there was nothing out of the ordinary.'

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# Boston College risks 0-10 record in Mirage



Boston College plays Temple in the Mirage Bowl this weekend in Tokyo, hoping to salvage the tattered remains of Coach Ed Chlebek's night-

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### Rams host Western St. in semis

SAN ANGELO, Texas (AP) — Angelo State and Western State Colorado clash Saturday afternoon in a battle of unbeaten football teams in semifinal playoff game of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

Angelo State beat Oregon College of Education 32-0 last weekend to raise its record to 12-0. Western State, which has won six straight Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference titles, is 10-0.

The winner of the Division I NAIA playoff battle will advance to McAllen, Texas, next week to play in the City of Palms championship game against the winner of Saturday's other semifinal game, between Grand Valley Michigan and Elon, N.C.

Angelo State represents the Lone Star Conference, which has won the national title eight of the past nine seasons.

WESTERN State's Mountaineers enthe game as the leading NAIA offensive team in the nation with an average of 489.1 yards per game. Angelo State dominated defensive statistics this season in the LSC.

Angelo State running back Jerry Aldridge has been the Rams' chief ofensive weapon. The 210-pounder ran for more than 1,400 yards in the regular season and has rushed for more than 100 yards in 15 consecutive games.

Quarterback Charlie Thompson has averaged more than 235 games of total offense per game for Western State.

### Gridders says no violations

ATLANTA (AP) — Georgia Tech linebacker Mackel Harris says he has told NCAA investigators that no regulations were broken when Auburn football officials tried to recruit him from Americus High School in 1975.

Harris told The Atlanta Journal that Auburn officials did not offer him a car, although certain alumni of the Alabama school did tell him "where I could get a good deal."

"THE SCHOOL didn't do anything illegal that I know of," Harris said in an interview published by the Journal Thursday. "But there were some alumni ... they didn't come right out and offer me a car, but they told me where I could get a good deal.

"And there were some little small things, like giving me a lift in a car," he said. "They asked if my parents would be interested in being flown over for games. They said they could arrange that."

The Birmingham Post-Herald reported earlier this week that Auburn officials would meet Dec. 18 in San Diego with the NCAA infractions committee to defend against 64 allegations of recruiting violations.

HARRIS told the Journal he had been questioned twice by the NCAA since graduating from Americus and once by investigators from Auburn.

"The NCAA asked about some other schools," he said, "but in particular about Auburn."

NCAA officials asked him about being offered "money in a suitcase," he said, but "I didn't take any cash."

"That's something I don't have to worry about," he said. "It didn't scare me because I wasn't going to Auburn anyway. And I didn't tell them anything that hurt Auburn. I just told them the truth. They didn't give me any money."



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
