Gusty Winds, **Blowing Dust Due Today**

A WEAK Pacific cold front moving eastward across the region will be ushered in by gusty winds and blowing dust today, with cooler temperatures expected through Friday.

Westerly winds may gust as high as 35 mph, causing wind warnings to be posted for area lakes.

A layer of clouds kept Lubbock temperatures in the lower 60s Wednesday. although Childress took honors as the state's coolest spot with 52 degrees. Lower Temperatures Due

Increasing cloudiness continues in the forecast for today. Temperatures are expected to reach into the upper 50s this afternoon, with the low tonight in the upper 30s.

Cooler temperatures are expected Friday, with highs reaching into the lower

Fog and low clouds lowered visibility to near zero in portions of North Central Texas Wednesday in front of a weak cool front that stretched from Midland to Wichita Falls.

Cloudiness Extensive

Mostly cloudy skies blanketed all but the extreme western and Lower Valley regions of the state. Scattered showers were reported over the Panhandle, along the upper Gulf Coast and through the northwestern parts of the state.

Skies today will be mostly cloudy statewide with a chance of rain or drizzle over parts of the Panhandle, South and Southwest regions.

Sadat Invites Shah To Return To Egypt

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) - President Anwar Sadat invited the Shah of Iran on Wednesday to return to Egypt for medical checkups, the Middle East News Agency reported.

The agency said Sadat's third invitation in a month was telephoned to Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi in Rabat, Moroc-

The shah departed Iran Jan. 16 and stayed with Sadat in Aswan, Egypt, for several days before going for Morocco. The shah calls his trip a vacation but the fall of his government in Tehran has made him an exile.

Sign Decision **Appeal Denied** By High Court

AUSTIN - The Texas Supreme Court Wednesday denied a motion for rehear-ing in the Lubbock Poster Company suit challenging Lubbock's sign regulations.

Attorneys for the billboard company filed the motion for rehearing Feb. 1, contending recent amendments to the federal Highway Beautification Act required a review of last month's decision by the Supreme Court upholding the sign

The case may be appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court, but attorneys for the company refused to speculate Wednes-

day on any future legal action.

The Lubbock Poster Co. suit, initiated about two months after the city enacted new sign regulations in July, 1975, challenged the city's right to require existing signs to be brought into compliance with the law by Jan. 1, 1982. Signs not complying would have to be removed with no compensation to the sign company.

Attorneys for the billboard company contended the regulations deprived them of due process, denied freedom of speech to non-commercial advertisers and amounted to seizure of company property without just compensation.

A 7th Court of Civil Appeals opinion,

affirmed by the Texas Supreme Court on Jan. 17, upheld the city's right to establish a "reasonable" amortization period during which the sign owners would recoun their original investments

In the motion for rehearing, attorneys say 1978 amendments to the Highway Beautification Act "affirmatively demonstrate that compensation is as much required for a removal by ordinance as by

"The statute's command is for actual and just payment, not a substitute 'payment' by amortization," the motion says.

Egypt, Israel Reopen Talks, Pledge Treaty

Israeli negotiators opened new Mideast peace talks Wednesday under U.S. auspices with a joint pledge to complete a peace treaty as soon as possible.

Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance took charge of the meetings at rustic Camp David, in the snow-covered Catoctin mountains of Maryland, but there was no word on whether new United States proposals were introduced to break the stalemate.

According to a joint statement. Vance. Egyptian Prime Minister Mustafa Khalil and Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan began the talks with a reaffirmation of their determination to bend their best efforts toward successful completion of the negotiations as soon as possible."

The three delegation heads had breakfast together Wednesday. Vance then met separately with Khalil and Dayan. This was followed in late afternoon by a 21/2-hour session of all three men.

A news blackout ordered by President Carter kept reporters and photographers away from the 147-acre retreat where the negotiations will be held in seclusion at least through the weekend.

The blackout, aimed at preventing 'leaks" to the public, appeared to be firmly in place. Carter's expressed hope is that secrecy will promote a settlement.

The grounds at Camp David were covered with two feet of snow, piled along cleared paths. The sumptuous cabins where the negotiators are lodged were stocked with firewood, and the fireplaces were in full use.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Egyptian and Carter said he could not discuss any proposals that may be under discussion or even whether Vance had presented any new ideas in the effort to find agreement on the treaty.

"If it is written down in Washington, it's leaked," spokesman Carter said, suggesting that any new American proposals would be offered informally.

thousands of Vietnamese and Chinese troops backed by heavy artillery were on the move Wednesday toward the Viet-namese town of Lang Son and what could be the showdown battle of the five-dayold border war, intelligence sources in Bangkok reported. fighting

The sources said Chinese strategists apparently intend to deal a final bloody blow to the Vietnamese military and then to withdraw most of their forces from Vietnam within three or four days.

Japan's Kyodo news service quoted a government official in Peking as saying hina hopes to end the conflict within a few days, but the unidentified official warned that it might be prolonged if Vietnam throws its regular army troops into the fighting.

That appeared to be just what Hanoi was doing Wednesday, as columns of regular army reinforcements were reported

"There is a question of how much authority we have in mandating a local tax reduction," said Sen. Grant Jones, D-Abilene, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

Clements' 1980-81 budget would spend \$13.76 billion from major state funds excluding federal money and certain dedicated state taxes — which is \$968.1 million less than the Legislative Budget

Board's proposal.

Hobby said 75 percent of the reduction proposed by Clements would come from education, including removing cost-of-living salary increases recommended by the budget board for 160,000 teachers and other school employees.
Also, the amount that local districts

must raise for the public school program would rise by \$189.2 million.

Approval Doubted

Asked about Clements' proposals, Hob-by said. "I doubt it (the budget) will

come out that way."

Jones said he feared Clements' no-newhiring proposal would drop certain job

positions — such as prison guards and mental health workers — to "dangerously low levels. There are those who think we must listen to the bureaucrats and what they say the people want," Clements told a joint legislative session. "I say that's non-

sense. We need to go directly to the peo

ple, and ask them what they want, and that is what I have done." Speaker Bill Clayton said he had never seen legislators in his 16 years in the House "totally abandon the LBB document for the executive docume "I think he'll compromise. I think he is a reasonable man," Clayton said.

Teacher Pay Hikes Hit
An estimated \$314 million of the difference in the governor and LBB budgets comes from Clements' proposal to scrap 5.1 percent annual pay raises for teachers, whose state organization opposed him in the November election.

He said automatic raises of 3.2 percent to 4.9 percent already are provided for

In all, Clements proposes reducing edu-cational spending by \$737 million from the LBB's figures.

A reporter for the Soviet newspaper Pravda, in a dispatch from Lang Son, also described alleged Chinese atrocities, saying that in one incident troops stopped a bus on a provincial road and executed all its passengers.

have penetrated as far as 12 miles into Vietnamese territory along the 450-mile

The Vietnamese claim to have killed 5,-000 to 8,000 Chinese soldiers, a figure intelligence sources in Bangkok consider inflated. These sources say Vietnamese losses have been much heavier than the Chinese.

A British Broadcasting Corp. correspondent in Peking, citing reliable sources in Peking, said that in the first two days of fighting the Chinese inflicted losses of 10,000 dead and wounded on the Vietnamese while suffering 2,000 to 3,000 casualties themselves.


Radio Hanoi said a Chinese division Tuesday tried to push deeper into the coastal province of Quang Ninh, in an area 50 miles east of Lang Son and a few miles from the sea, but was driven back with "700 Chinese aggressors wiped out."

The Vietnamese also reported repulsing a Chinese attack north of Lang Son on Tuesday

On Wednesday, three Chinese infantry divisions backed up by tanks were on the move through Quang Ninh again, apparently planning to swing inland to stage 'lightning strikes' to cut off the highway supply routes linking the defenders of

Lang Son with Hanoi, sources here said. Journalists on the Vietnamese side of the front reported that regular army reinforcements rushed to Lang Son Tuesday and Wednesday to take over from the militias. Reporter Kazuhisa Ikawa of the Tokyo newspaper Asahi reported seeing Vietnamese trucks loaded with troops and hauling 105mm artillery headed toward Lang Son from Don Mo. 40 miles from the frontier. He wrote that columns of refugees poured south along the high-

A Dallas native, Sigel started out in the business in Shreveport in 1934 — a time when it was easier to peddle booze in Louisiana than it was in Texas.

The location changed with the liquor laws and Sigel now owns a wholesale business and 12 package stores, all in Dal-

He's no teetotaler.

"I drink a little of all of it, beer, liquor, wine ... but wine is my favorite." he said in a recent interview.

The gray-haired, cigar-smoking Sigel said the boom in American wine drinking has just begun. Jets have shrunk the world, and peo-

ple have found the pleasure of drinking wine, especially with meals. "I know wines about as good as any-

body here, but I'm no expert," he said. Sigel thinks American wines, particularly the California brands, are reaching parity with European products. "The techniques are getting better and the vines are getting older. They have had tastings when a California wine has come in No. 1." He said California jug wines, such as hearty burgundy, are the top sellers in his stores.



The U.S. Supreme Court Wednesday refused to review the 1975 murder conviction and death sentence of Ronald Curtis Chambers, who had charged he was sentenced to die "by a tribunal organized to return a verdict of death."

In July 1975, a Dallas jury found Chambers guilty of beating to death 22-year-old Texas Tech University student Michael Mabry McMahan and assessed Chambers the death sentence.

Chambers, then 20, and another man allegedly abducted McMahan and his date, Deia Karlene Sutton, as the college students were leaving a Dallas nightclub

They drove in McMahan's car to the Trinity River bottoms, where they robbed the students, pushed them down the side of a levee, fired shots at them for dead, but Miss Sutton survived.

Chambers charged in his appeals that some prospective jurors were wrongly excluded from trying his case, such as one man who said the possibility of a death penalty would be on his mind, and a woman who said it would be "in the back of my mind."

The Supreme Court ruled in 1968 that no sentence of death can be carried out if prospective jurors were excluded simply because they voiced general objections to capital punishment or expressed conscientious or religious scruples against its

Chambers also challenged the Texas law which says a prospective juror shall be disqualified from serving unless he states the mandatory penalty of death or life imprisonment "will not affect his deliberations on any issue of fact.

hausted Chambers' appeals through the state courts, but he still may pursue appeals in the federal system. Justices Thurgood Marshall and William Brennan dissented in the court's ruling on the basis that they oppose all capital punish-

Chambers received a stay of execution in July 1978, when Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr. told Texas authorities to postpone setting an execution date to allow time for Chambers's appeal to reach the Su-

Chambers began serving time on death row three months after McMahan's slay-

McMahan, a junior mechanical engineering student at Tech, left Lubbock April 8, 1975, with 28 other students to attend an engineering conference at the University of Texas at Arlington. The group was to return to Lubbock the day McMahan was killed.

About 12:45 a.m. April 11, McMahan and Miss Sutton, his girlfriend of a year, were accosted at gunpoint by two men on the parking lot of a Dallas nightspot.

Miss Sutton, who had attended Texas Tech during the 1972-73 academic year, said that she and McMahan were forced to drive around in McMahan's Camaro as the two men debated the couple's fate. McMahan's car was followed by a second vehicle, occupied by two friends of the

Eventually, the two assailants, armed with a .22-caliber pistol and a .410 shot-gun, ordered McMahan to drive to a deserted levee near the Elm Fork of the Trinity River in northwest Dallas. The econd car followed.

At the levee, the couple was ordered to march to the river's edge and told not to look back. Seconds later two shots were fired. A .22-caliber slug struck Miss Sutton in the neck and McMahan was felled by a shotgun blast to the lower back.

The men then climbed up a hill and out of sight. At that point, McMahan raised up and asked Miss Sutton if she were all

The 20-year-old UTA student cautioned her date to be quiet, but the assailants heard McMahan's query and ran down the embankment.

Miss Sutton told the jury that one of the men asked McMahan, "Well, you're not dead, huh?" and then pummeled McMahan's skull with the shotgun barrel until the engineering student lay motionless.

A medical examiner testified that the beating, not the gunshot wound, was the cause of death.

Meanwhile, a second man punched Miss Sutton three times, choked her and rammed her face into the mud. When she feigned unconsciousness, the assailants left and Miss Sutton then walked about a mile to a nearby hotel and called police.



Java Evacuates 17,000 After Volcano Eruption

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) - Rescue teams battled poisonous gas and lava spewing from a volcano in central Java Wednesday, trying to rescue bodies left by an eruption that officials said killed 175 persons and injured 1,000.

More than 17,000 persons have been evacuated from six villages near the smoking crater of Mount Sinilia, according to police spokesman Lt. Col. Suprato. He said many bodies were sprawled in the streets or narrow paths of the vil-

Suprato said the eruption began Tuesday and was preceded by seven earth tremors and an underground explosion. Most local residents were caught off guard and brought down as they were trying to flee.

A reporter for a local newspaper said gas masks were few and even some of the rescue workers had been killed by the

The reporter said the village of Pucukan and another in the Dieng Mountains

had suffered the most damage. President Suharto called a meeting of his cabinet and ordered all available government aid to the area. Local police and health officials set up emergency clinics and kitchens and commandered all vehicles for miles around to help in the res-

cue effort. All roads leading to the Dieng range were shut and a search team was sent to the stricken area from Jakarta, the capi-

It was the volcano's fourth eruption in

51 years and the first since 1959. The Indonesian archipelago has at least 500 volcanoes, 127 of them active, and averages 10 eruptions a year. Mount Erapi, in Central Java not far from Sinila, is considered the most active, emitting hot lava and ashes almost every year. It is under constant observation.

The deadliest recorded eruption was that of Mount Tambora, on an island west of Bali, in 1815, when 92,000 people were killed.

The most famous was that of Krakatoa. said to be nature's greatest modern explosion, on Aug. 27, 1883. Krakatoa and three smaller islands in the Sunda Strait between Java and Sumatra blew up, killing 36,000 persons. The explosions were heard 2,500 miles away, and the estimated 27 million tons of debris hurled into the atmosphere caused a drop in temperatures in the southern hemisphere.

Krakatoa is not extinct. It rumbled for several months last year, and scientists measured explosions equivalent to the atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima. But no lives were lost.

PLO-Iran: Holy Khomeini!

comes as no surprise, including the business of cozying up to the PLO and the bid by the Communists for a greater voice in the new

Actually, if the truth were known, those events probably came as no surprise to certain echelons of the U.S. State Department, which may be a story in itself.

The throes through which Iran is going offer a classic example of what has often happened in recent years as so-called "liberation" or revolutionary groups kicked out the establishment and instituted their own brand of terror and ineptness.

THE UNFOLDING drama in Tehran only serves to emphasize what knowledgeable observers have pointed out for months, that Moslem leader Ayatollah Khomeini and his ragtag "religious" do-gooders need to clean up their own act before adjusting their hal-

In the first place, again to no one's surprise who keeps up with such things, Khomeini now admits that he got help from Palestine Liberation Organization chief Yasser Arafat and his bloody henchmen.

It was Arafat who came to Tehran as the first so-called "head of state" to greet Khomeini. To show his appreciation, the Moslem holy man promptly kicked out the Israeli delegation and gave the building to Arafat for an "embassy.

According to reports from Tehran, Arafat partment are surprised. We aren't.

FOR THOSE who are acquainted with won assurances from Khomeini that Iran such things, the scenario taking place in Iran will "turn to the issue of victory over Israel" after the nation consolidates its strength.

So much for Act I of the new drama in the Mideast

Also much in the news is the fact that the new government is continuing to carry out a series of secret trials and executions of former high level armed forces officers who served under the Shah or in the interim gov-

So far, at least eight generals have been quickly tried and shot to death. So much for 'reform' under an Islamic ruler.

WE QUESTION the sincere religious aspects of a regime which adopts exactly the same tactics of retribution and dealing out death to its enemies which it found so obnoxious in the government it toppled.

Khomeini's spokesmen may cite, as they did, the fact that the U.S. engaged in the same sort of "retribution" against the Nazi leaders at Nuremberg. But, without condoning those trials, at least they were carried out in the full glare of public testimony and opinion.

What we have in Iran today is exactly what this newspaper and others have warned we would have-a despotic dictatorship by another name, only with an ample helping of anarchy. Communism and hypocrisy tossed in for good measure. It is a pattern often seen in "liberated" Africa.

AN EDITORIAL:

Court Of Record Is Appealing

CREATION OF a Municipal Court of Record here, as proposed in legislation intro-duced this week by Sen. E.L. Short, is in the public interest.

The Lubbock City Council has made the change in its municipal court operations its

top legislative priority this year.

Lubbock County Commissioners Court unanimously endorsed the idea, knowing that it will relieve county courts-at-law of a tremendous load of misdemeanor appeals.

And the Lubbock County Bar Association finally gave its support to the proposal provided the Municipal Court judges are elected, not appointed.

THE MOST NOTICEABLE effect of converting to the new system will be to end the practice of a person getting two trials for the same traffic ticket or alleged violation of some other City ordinance.

As it is now, a person can have his cake and eat it, too. If found guilty in Municipal Court, he merely files an appeal to a county court-at-law. In all probability, the case never will be brought to trial but will be dismissed in one of those periodic docket-clearing blanket dismissal motions.

If his case is called at the courthouse, the defendant now gets a trial de novo, or entirely new trial, requiring policemen and other witnesses to appear and testify again. But if Municipal Court were a court of record, any appeal would be on that record; there would not be an automatic new trial.

INSTEAD OF 3,800 cases on appeal, there probably will not be more than a couple of dozen per year if the experience of other cities is any guide.

Thus, the new system should help immensely in making fair, equal justice available for all

Whether the judges should be elected or appointed is another matter. The proposed legislation would have them elected. A better option might be to let the voters, themselves, decide whether they want the City Council to appoint the judges or have them

WASHINGTON-A shocked Secretary of State Cyrus Vance privately proposed that President Carter leave for Mexico Feb. 14 without him while he stayed in the capital to handle possible new emergencies in Iran or Afghanistan.

He was turned down by Carter. Vance's strong concern was that the nation's capital should not be without one senior official to deal with the kind of crisis situation that cost the life of the American ambassador in Kabul and threatened the lives of Americans in Tehran.

With Carter. Vance and national security adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski all scheduled for Mexico City. Washington was stripped bare of senior offi-

Secretary of Defense Harold Brown was in the Middle East: Gen. David Jones, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, was in the Far East.

WASHINGTON-Events in Iran should be a jolt to those so-called "liberal observers" who have criticized Pope John Paul II for, in effect, his failure to call for a revolution of the poor and ill-treated masses of Latin America.

The critics were disappointed by the Pope's blandness" during his visit to Mexico. They had hoped, apparently, that John Paul II would become the ayatollah of that vast area south of the

It is ironic. The Pope's critics, most of them hanging judges of Iran's Shah, got what they wanted from the Pope when Ayatollah Khomeini's followers took over Iran.

AT THIS writing. Khomeini's aim is to install Islam as the government of that poor country. If it works out, Iranians will do what a religion tells

The Pope, on the other hand, has embraced the ideology not only of the liberals but of American Christians and Jews alike. He has come down firmly on the side of the separation of church and

What the Pope said in Mexico is that the clergy. while working for social reform within the church, must beware of usurping the role of the laity in the realm of politics.

He wants priests and bishops to lend an unceasing hand to the poor and ill-treated. He does not want them to lead a political revolution that could produce a church-operated government.

VERY FEW people can pose as theologians. But most of us know something about the history

of Christianity, especially the role played by its Founder. Jesus was not a social or political revolutionary. despite some of the nonsense written about Him

by present-day analysts. He did not incite people against the rule of Rome or that of the temples. He told them to render to Caesar that which was Caesar's-pay their taxes.

Some of the Pope's critics have deplored his weakness," he reflected by his Mexican sojourn.

As Cardinal Wojtyla, he was never afraid to confront the Communist state of Poland when it trampled on the rights of his children to practice their faith

But because he was a faithful follower of Christian doctrine, he never tried to replace that regime with a religious one

IN FACT, the Pope in Mexico spoke not only for Roman Catholics, but for Protestantism, Judaism, and every other sect fearful of the nonsecular state.

Unlike some of his critics, members of those sects have learned from history what happens when the clergy are encouraged to go political. The inquisition and the various anti-Catholic rulers were just as brutal as their Communist

successors. Josef Stalin once asked how many divisions the Pope commanded. The answer is none-in uni-

But you can bet he has the support of millions of troops in mufti who, like John Paul II, don't want any church or sect messing with the vital concept of that highest of walls that keeps the church on one side and the state on the other.

That left Vice President Walter F. Mondale, touted by Carter as the only vice president with real clout in modern American history. But Mondale was on a skiing vacation in Vail, Colo., and neither he nor anyone else suggested

his return to Washington. Even more than other officials, Vance was both infuriated and grieved by the murder in Afghanistan of Ambassador Adolph (Spike) Dubs, one of the State Department's top diplomats.

Vance took Dubs' murder and the invasion of the U.S. embassy in Tehran personally, explaining in part why he wanted to delay his departure for Mexico City.

JUST AS U.S. diplomats were informed by the Turkish government that U.S. Marines would not be welcome in Turkey for a possible rescue operation of Americans in Iran, the Pentagon leaked the news that Marines in HH-53 helicopters would soon leave for Turkey. The result: another embarrassing setback for

American diplomacy has damaged relations between the U.S. and Turkey.

The Pentagon also spoke too soon several weeks ago when it announced that F-15 aircraft being flown as reassurance to Saudi Arabia would refuel in Spain. But Spain had not been notified, said no and made it stick. The results of the Turkish snafu may be more

serious. Turkey never did object to the big rescue to six Cbeing positioned at a U.S. base in Turkey.

But the Turks felt U.S. Marines were provocative, and would hurt Turkish-Iranian relations The Turkish consulate in Tabriz was burned down by Iranian nationalists recently.

The deeper problem is the long congressional aid cutoff imposed on Turkey, insisted on by the Greek lobby. Although it is now ended, the arms embargo infuriated Turkey, one of the best cold war allies the U.S. has had.

The stiff Turkish stand on the Marines could be a harbinger of worse times ahead between the two old allies.

A SIMMERING feud between two of the nation's leading conservative Republicans which started at the Kansas City convention in 1976 reached the boiling point recently when Sen. Jesse Helms of North Carolina refused to meet with presidential front-runner Ronald Reagan.

Sen. Paul Laxalt of Nevada, Reagan's national campaign chairman in both 1976 and 1980, invited Helms to a meeting with Reagan during his recent visit to Capitol Hill. Helms' reply: If Reagan wants to see me, he

can come to my office. There was no meeting. Helms' complaint goes back to what started the trouble between them in the first place: Reagan's

designation of liberal Republican Sen. Richard Schweiker as his 1976 running-mate, a brainchild of campaign manager John Sears. Helms had insisted that Sears be dropped from Reagan's 1980 campaign and was furious when

told that Sears would have a key role. It is unlikely that Helms will run for President himself or even endorse somebody else. But he may well be a favorite-son candidate in

the North Carolina primary, posing potential difficulties for Reagan in a state where a 1976 upset victory kept him alive against Gerald Ford. LONG-SHOT REPUBLICAN presidential pros-

pect George Bush lost-but only by the barest of margins-to front-running Ronald Reagan in trying to sign up a Reagan operative for the 1980 Bush offered a key nationwide organizing job (No. 2 in his organization just below campaign

manager James Baker) to David Keene, who or-

ganized the South for Reagan in 1976. Keene, a former national chairman of the Young Americans for Freedom and ex-aide to Spiro T. Agnew, would have improved Bush's credentials among conservatives.

Instead, he accepted a lesser post in the Reagan campaign, probably as his emissary to Congress.

But Keene came close to taking the Bush job and turned it down only because of personal loy-

That he even considered leaving Reagan is the significant fact-reflecting more internal turmoil among Reagan aides and advisers than is generally realized.

A similar Taiwan bill has been proosed in the House by Rep. Clement Zablocki, D-Wis., chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee Although the amendment will almost

certainly clear the Senate panel, there could still be a fight when the issue comes to the floor.

But Wednesday's agreement within the committee seemed to signal a bipartisan consensus on the question.

The Javits-Church compromise in the Senate says the U.S. decision announced Dec. 15 to establish full diplomatic relations with China "rests on the expecta tion that any resolution of the Taiwan is sue will be sought only by peaceful

Any non-peaceful attempt to reunify Taiwan with the mainland represents "a threat to the peace and security of the Western Pacific area and (is) of grave concern to the United States," amendment says.

Pledging a policy of continued deliveries of U.S. defensive arms to Taiwan, it also says the United States will maintain a "capacity" to resist any military attack "or any other form of coercion that would jeopardize the security, or social or economic system of the people on Tai-

And it requires the president to notify Congress of any threat to Taiwan's secur-

'Capacity" in the amendment refers to the intent of Javits and Church to keep the United States militarily prepared to resist any move by China against Taiwan.

Javits originally urged that the bill include a provision requiring that the United States keep military forces near Taiwan in case of an attack.

Besides Church and Javits, Senate Minority Leader Howard Baker of Tennessee; Sen. John Glenn, D-Ohio, chairman of an Asian subcommittee; Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I.; and Sen. Richard Stone, D-Fla., have joined in support of the amendment. Stone had been one of Carter's toughest critics on the decision to recognize Peking at the expense of continued formal diplomatic ties with

was made by Javits, who had been insisting on wording similar to a 1953 mutual defense treaty between the United States and Taiwan. The treaty is to be abrogated at the end of 1979 as part of the new China policy.

Javits's original proposal said that an attack on Taiwan would be a "common danger to the United States and Taiwan' and declared it to be U.S. policy to maintain military forces near Taiwan "to resist armed attack."

Javits agreed to accept the compromise but said that it would be "the equivalent of a treaty.

Church disagreed, however, saying the Taiwan security amendment was instead in the form of a "unilateral declaration of American policy.

The Taiwan issue has threatened to delay Senate confirmation of Leonard Woodcock, due to be formally sworn in larch I as the new U.S. ambassador to



Smoking Curtailed On Airline Flights

WASHINGTON (AP) - Tightened restrictions on smoking aboard commercial aircraft take effect Friday. The new Civil Aeronautics Board rules

follow a study of the problem of smoking in the closed conditions of aircraft. Besides the formal comments and suggestions from organized groups, letters and cards from more than 31,000 individuals were considered by the board.

Particular note is taken of cigar and pipe smoke in the new rule, as the agency found smoke from these two sources was particularly offensive to nonsmok-

So, the rule calls for additional segregation of pipe and cigar smokers with individual airlines being left to decide how

The CAB suggests seating cigar and pipe smokers in the portion of smoking area most distant from nonsmokers. And, it adds, airlines may adopt the

policy of permitting cigar and pipe smoking only after determining that other passengers do not object.

While current rules provide for nonsmoking areas, the new rule will require that "all" passengers who want to be in such an area be accommodated and there be a means of expanding the area if necessary.



Insurance Board Staff Backs \$38 Million Rates Reduction

AUSTIN (UPI) - The State Insurance Board staff recommended a \$38 million reduction in rates for homeowners, fire and extended coverage policies Wednes-day, but critics said the cuts should be

Industry spokesmen urged that the cuts be held to \$29 million.

Attorneys and an actuary for the Texas Apartment Association said the state agency should demand better records from companies and use more accurate statistics on industry expenses to set

Gaylon Daniel, State Insurance Board staff actuary for property and casualty lines, said more accurate statistics enabled the staff to recommend a 2.3 percent average statewide reduction in homeowners' insurance rates instead of a 19 percent increase.

Joe Hawkins, former state insurance commissioner appearing for the apartment association, said companies should be forced to provide precise figures on commercial as well as private dwellings.

Hawkins also questioned the use of estimates in rate-setting formulas instead of actual costs companies incur in paying agent commissions and taxes.

"These numbers are available," Hawkins said. "I don't know why they don't use them. I recommended it for five years, but I never could get the board to go along with me."

Daniel estimated that using the statistics Hawkins suggested would mean another 4 to 5 percent reduction in rates.

The price cuts recommended by the State Insurance Board staff call for an overall 4.1 percent, \$38 million statewide reduction in homeowners, fire and extended coverage premiums.

The Texas Insurance Advisory Association proposed a 3.1 percent, \$29 million

Howard Lee, TIAA general manager, said the cuts were possible because there have been no big hurricane losses in recent years.

"The last several years have been fairly good ones," Lee said. "It's the first time in a long period that a hurricane hasn't substantially impacted the 10 years we review and consider in the rates.

On the most popular coverage, homeowners, the industry group recommended a one percent reduction compared to the staff proposal for a 2.3 percent average cut statewide. Homeowners in the seacoast territory

would see a 7.5 percent reduction in rates under the staff proposal while rates in the central rating territory would go up 3.3 percent. Rates for the northnorthwest would go down 5.7 percent.

The industry proposed reductions of 5.8 percent for the seacoast and 4.3 percent for north-northwest and an increase of 4.3 percent for the central territory.

Lyndon Olson Jr., presiding at his first major hearing since former Gov. Dolph Briscoe named him chairman of the three-man board last month, said he does not know how soon a vote will be taken on the staff proposals.

Program demonstrations will be conducted from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, and from 8:30 a.m. to 11 a.m. Wednesday. A closing luncheon session will be held at noon Wednesday.

The conference, the seventh in a series held throughout Texas, will feature 18 Texas public school programs and 16 other programs from across the U.S.

The conference will concentrate on problems of cost, effectiveness and change that many public schools are fac-

Texas Education Agency and the 20 regional education service centers in Texas are co-sponsoring the series.

Egyptian Pilots End U.S. Flight Training

CAIRO. Egypt (AP) - A group of Egyptian air force pilots have returned from the United States after completing a training course for the F-5E fighter jet which Washington has approved for Egyptian use, the semi-official newspa-

per Al Ahram reported Wednesday.

The paper said that the training was a first for the two countries, and the standards of the Egyptian pilots won the admiration of their American instructors. It was not reported how many pilots were involved.





We have had instances when a person is for all intensive purposes dead," he said. "This could go on usually for a few days or up to a few weeks."

Allee's bill, sent to subcommittee for further study, would make the common law part of Texas statutes. Brain death would be the definition only in cases where life is sustained by machines.

"In no way can this bill be considered to condone or legalize euthanasia," Allee chairman, Sen. Osear Mauzy, D-Dallas.

President Norman Hackerman of Rice University told the committee the original concept of tuition grants was to prov-ide for private students approximately one-half the average appropriation for students at state-financed colleges.

In 1971 the average state appropriation was \$1,200, so the private tuition grants were limited to \$600, Hackerman said. Now, "largely because of inflation," the average state appropriation has risen to \$2,475, he said.

Jones' bill would raise the limit of state aid to 50 percent of the tuition cost. It would also make part-time students eligible for tuition aid.

"I would not try to kid you that costs will go down in the foreseeable future," said Hackerman.

As the spokesman for Independent Colleges and Universities of Texas - ICUT Hackerman was the only witness on

the proposal. Representatives of 13 other private schools attended the hearing in support of the bill, however, including Baylor President Abner McCall.

ICUT, which was formed in 1965, has 40

Dallas Mother Charged In Deaths Of Children rive at the apartment after neighborhood

DALLAS (AP) - Co-workers said Kathleen Gradi was not the type to lose

But on the morning of Jan. 12, as she was rushing around trying to get ready for work, she discovered her \$1 in bus, money was missing - and suddenly the pressures of trying to rear two elementary school-age children alone and the hectic pace of her workaday world became

"That's when I lost my temper," the 32-year-old divorcee told police in a statement later. "I started hitting them and went into a rage. After that, I don't remember too clearly.

A Dallas County grand jury indicted Mrs. Gradi Wednesday for murder in the deaths of her children, Clifford Gradi, 11. and Aimee Gray, 8.

Two police officers found Clifford and Aimee lying mortally wounded in the blood-splattered apartment. The little girl had been stabbed in the eye, neck, throat, chest and abdomen with a screwdriver and was unconscious. Her halfbrother was found in a closet with a screwdriver embedded in his right eye. Clifford died 17 days later on Jan. 29. Aimee died Feb. 1.

"I didn't intend to hurt them. I don't know why I did it. I can't understand how I could go to work that way like nothing happened, when that happened like it did," said Mrs.Gradi's statement to police, which nevertheless did not admit specifically to the brutal attack on the But her statement and other

circumstantial evidence were the basis of charges of attempted murder filed against her before the children died, and she had been held on those charges in lieu of \$200,000 bond while the grand jury considered the case.

If convicted, she could be sentenced to a prison term of 5 years to life on each William Hunt was the first officer to ar-



NOW Boycott Weapon Uph As Legitimate Political Tool

KANSAS CTTY, Mo. (AP) — A federal judge Wednesday upheld the right of the National Organization for Women to use a convention boycott as a tool against states that liave not ratified the Equal

Rights Amendment. He called the Equal Rights Amendment. He called the boycott a legitimate political venture.

The case "involves political opponents, not commercial competitors; and political objectives, not marketplace goals," U.S. District Judge Elmo B. Hunter said in his 30-page decision.

in his 30-page decision. His action came 51 weeks after Missouri Attorney General John Ashcroft filed a suit charging that NOW's convention boycott tactics violated the Sherman Antitrust Act.

NOW officials maintain that the boycott has cost Kansas City more than \$8 million in convention business and has cost St. Louis about \$11 million. Similar boycotts in the other 14 states that have not ratified the ERA have resulted in millions of dollars in lost business, NOW

State officials contended that the boycott was "taking states as economic tages with the ratification of the Equal vention boycott "can be characterized as noncommercial in that its participants are not business interests and its purpose is not increased profits." And he said the boycott was not undertaken to advance the economic interests of the partici-

The "interest sought to be advanced by NOW, and especially the constitutional interests involved in protecting NOW's ability to exercise its right to petition and right to political association, outweigh the interest in protecting the business expectancy involved," the judge said.

The amendment, which would ban dis-crimination based on sex, has failed to crimination based on sex, has failed to win approval in the last six sessions of the Missouri Legislature. No ERA bills have been introduced during the current session, but two joint resolutions recommending a non-binding public referendum have been introduced. One was by Sen. Mary Gant, the only woman in the state Senate, who said she wanted to show that Missouri residents do not want show that Missouri residents do not want

Dr. Linda Thurston, president of the Kansas City Urban NOW chapter, sale she was surprised by the decision.

"We have worked so far and often taken three or four steps backward for every step forward," she said.

Ashcroft's office declined comment until the decision was reviewed.

The ERA must be ratified by 38 states by June 30, 1962, to become part of the Constitution. The original deadline of March 22, 1979, was extended by act of

The ERA has been approved by 35 states, but four have since rescinded approval. The validity of that move still is in question and the Justice Department has said it is up to Congress to decide. The states that have rescinded approval are Kentucky, Tennessee, Idaho and Nebraska. Kentucky's action was vetoed, however.

Vows Decision On Benzene, Cancer

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court said Wednesday it will decide whether the government may enforce tough and costly federal standards aimed at protecting more than 600,000 workers from benzene, a cancer-causing chemi-

The justices agreed to review a ruling that struck down the standards before they ever took effect.

Government lawyers say the high court's eventual decision could affect working conditions for millions of Ameri-

If the lower court's ruling is upheld, federál authorities may be precluded from regulating many other cancer-causing items present in the nation's workplaces, the government said.

Returning to the bench following a four-week recess, the justices took actions in some 400 cases, including these:

- Agreed to hear arguments by Dallas school officials who oppose a plan to racially balance the nation's eighth-largest school district.

The standards were to have taken effect last March 14 but the effective date was postponed when trade groups and manufacturers of benzene challenged the regulations.

Benzene is a highly volatile liquid which is used to make detergents, plastics, solvents and paint remover.

Worker exposure to the toxic chemical has been regulated since 1971 but the new standards were adopted after various tests produced definite links between benzene and leukemia, a fatal can-

In announcing the new standards, Labor Secretary Ray Marshall estimated that they would impose total first-year costs of \$187 million to \$205 million on in-

Marshall said the standards would require engineering control investments of some \$266 million and would require recurring annual costs of about \$35 million.

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals struck down the standards because the federal job safety agency had not calculated the precise relationship between exposure to benzene and the risk of leu-

Supreme Court To Review Dallas Busing

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court today voted to review an appeal by the Dallas Independent School District, which is trying to avoid massive busing in an integration plan.

Dallas schools, which make up the eighth largest district in the nation, have been involved in desegregation efforts since 1955, but the lawsuit sparking Wednesday's action was first filed in 1970 by the parents of black and Mexican-American students

After prolonged legal proceedings, U.S. District Judge William Taylor Jr. in March 1976 ordered enforcement of a racial desegregation plan suggested by the Dallas Alliance Task Force on Educa-

Under it, the school district's 140,000 students and 183 schools would be divided into six subdistricts. Five of those subdistricts would have to reflect the same racial makeup, within 5 percent, of the entire school district.

As of 1975, those percentages were 41 percent white, 45 percent black and 14 percent Mexican-American. School officials say the white school population now has dropped to 35 percent.

Taylor's plan, school officials estimated, would make necessary the busing of some 20,000 students at an annual cost of \$5.8 million.

Minority parents and the Dallas branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People objected to Taylor's plan because one subdistrict -East Oak Cliff, where 27,500 students would attend 16 schools - would remain

virtually all-black. Also, 50 schools in the other five subdistricts would remain essentially one-race schools, the NACCP noted.

Last April, the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ordered Taylor to restudy the Dallas case and come up with a new student assignment plan.

The appeals court told Taylor that his

desegregation order would have to "justify the maintenance of any one-race schools that may be part of that plan. If such schools could not be justified,

they should be abolished, the appeals court ruled. Dallas school officials appealed the 5th Circuit ruling, and last August asked Supreme Court Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr. to freeze proceedings in Taylor's court until the full Supreme Court acted on the

new plan has been announced. Dallas school officials argued that desegregation remedies used for small, rural school districts are not realistic for city schools.

Wisconsin Governor Signs Tax Cut Bill

MADISON, Wis. (AP) - Republican Gov. Lee Dreyfus, in office less than eight weeks, has signed into law a bill giving Wisconsin citizens \$942 million in temporary and permanent tax cuts.

Some lawmakers predicted the move could renew pressure for other states with treasury surpluses to return extra funds to taxpayers.

Wisconsin's surplus is projected to be in excees of \$1 billion.

"This could very well have a rippling effect," said Sen. Gerald Kleczka, D-Milwaukee, a negotiator in the tax compromise hammered out between the Republican governor and majority Democrats in the Legislature.

Sen. Michele Radosevich, D-Hudson, said she voiced satisfaction Wisconsin could cut taxes without being "forced to the wall" by a voter protest similar to California's tax-slashing Proposition 13.

A key provision of the measure is an eight-week state income-tax-withholding moratorium that will save taxpayers \$240 million in May and June. The bill also calls for property tax relief, including \$319 million in permanent tax cuts.

The law also reduces income tax rates.

Speeding Tree Mars Radar Prosecution

MIAMI (AP) - Motorists caught speeding by radar-type devices used by the Florida Highway Patrol and other police in Dade County had their trials postponed Wednesday after judges were shown a film in which a tree was clocked

In another example shown to Judge Alfred Nesbitt and other county judges, house was clocked at 28 mph.

The films were made by reporters for Miami television station WTJV, which is broadcasting a series on potential problems, including the accuracy, of the radar-type speed detection devices.

"Acting in my capacity as administrative judge, I have ordered that radar ticket cases be postponed until both sides have an opportunity to present evidence in court," Nesbitt said.

He said a test case would be selected soon in which defense attorneys and representatives of the Highway Patrol or other police agencies would be called to testify about the accuracy of the devices. The type of devices used in the television demonstration was not disclosed.

The order applied only to Dade County - Florida's most populous - but Nesbitt said he wouldn't be surprised if judges in other counties took similar

Bob Mayer, a reporter for WTVJ, said the series showed that the most common devices used by the Highway Patrol could be adversely affected by radio transmissions from Citizens Band radios and other devices. Florida Highway Patrol Director Eldrige Beach said in Tallahassee that he

wanted any questions about the devices' accuracy resolved, but he was confident that no serious problem existed. "There's some doubt in their (judges') minds, but there's no doubt in our

minds," Beach said. "We're going to continue using the radar. Asked what the effect on recent radar convitions might be. Nesbitt said they could "petition for a rehearing and those petitions would be heard at the same time as the new ones will be.

When Redmond announced the appointment of the group on Feb. 8, he called it a "Special House Task Force on the Cost of Government" and said it would deal with such issues as tax reform and government spending limits, replac-

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) - Illinois ing the state tax on corporate personal property and gasoline tax reform.

He said Tuesday the group had no deadline, but that its suggestions could lead to legislative proposals by the end of. the spring session.

"You can't get a snot-nosed kid out of college who can bring to the job the kind of experience and background I can,' said Don Eslick, a task force member whose \$38,000 salary makes him the second-highest-paid legislative staff member in Illinois.

Firm Seeks Okay For New Herpes Drug

WASHINGTON (AP) - A California drug company has asked the government for approval to market a new drug to treat shingles and genital herpes, the nation's fastest-spreading venereal disease for which no effective treatment is avail-

Developers of the drug ribavirin, produced by ICN Pharmaceuticals Inc. under the brand name Virazole, said Wednesday the substance could be a breakthrough in fighting a wide range of viral diseases from influenza and hepatitis to hemorrhagic fever. a deadly illness known in some parts of the world as Lassa fever.

But the Food and Drug Administration, known throughout the industry for its caution in processing new drug applications, said the studies it has seen so far give no reason to believe the substance represents "an important therapeutic

ICN now is asking for marketing approval for the drug to treat herpes genitalis, a contagious disease characterized by recurring, painful lesions in the genital region, and herpes zoster, a viral disease of the nervous system also known as shingles. Genital herpes, whose sexually transmitted nature has only been understood in recent years, is spreading at epidemic levels in the United States, particularly among the young, sexually active population.

It has been associated with cancer of the cervix in women, miscarriages and may cause serious or even fatal illness in babies born to women carrying the dis-

Together, shingles and genital herpes are believed to afflict millions of Americans, though estimates vary.

Wayne Pines, a spokesman for FDA. said the agency normally doesn't comment on new drug applications, which

Roots II Viewers Up, Poll Says

NEW YORK (AP) - An audience check of three big cities shows "Roots: The Next Generations" continuing an upward trend, with bigger audiences Tuesday night than for either of the two preceding installments.

Figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. Wednesday showed, in addition, that national ratings for ABC's sequel to the record-setting miniseries, increased slightly Monday night, the last period for which national figures were available.

Part I of "Roots II," broadcast Sunday night, had a rating of 27.8, and that increased to 29.5 for Part II Monday evening. Nielsen said Tuesday. The ratings organization says that means of all the homes in the country with TV, 29.5 percent saw at least part of the Monday night program.

The national audience is smaller than

that for the original "Roots" broadcast which pulled an average rating of 44.9 for eight episodes. "Roots II," as the sequel is known, is in seven parts.

More people watched Part III Tuesday night in three big cities than saw either the first or second episodes, continuing a generally increasing trend.

Overnight ratings for Part III were 34.2 in New York City, 32.3 in Chicago and 34.5 in Los Angeles, successively higher in each instance than for the previous two episodes.

The original "Roots," seen by more people than any other show in TV history when it was broadcast in January 1977, built an audience in similar fashion. The last episode of the original eight-part miniseries was the biggest ever for any single program, with a rating of 51.1.

Pines said the agency will, of course, study the application and supporting data, "but it's not in any remote sense the kind of drug that would go on our 'fast track," the top-priority consideration give to promising new drugs thought to offer a medical breakthrough.

ICN, whose principal earnings have come from the international marketing of such generic drugs as tetracycline, said it has spent \$21 million in developing and testing ribavirin since discovering the substance a decade ago.

The filing of the company's new drug application follows by only four months the FDA's approval of vidarabine, the first major breakthrough in treating a disease caused by a virus, in that case the deadly brain ailment known as herpes en-

Since the development of penicillin and other antibiotics, the medical profession has been able to subdue a wide range of bacterial infections, including the common strep throat, some forms of pneumonia and various localized infections. But in diseases caused by viruses, such as the common cold, influenza, polio and a variety of childhood illnesses, medical science has only been able to treat the symptoms while the illness runs it course and the body itself fights back.

Bergland Raps Demonstratoins By Farmers

HOUSTON (AP)— Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland said Wednesday that neither he nor Congress would "cave in" to militant farmers with demands that "are beyond the realm of wisdom."

Bergland, here to address the annual meeting of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, told a news conference he believes existing farm programs are working and that the recent tractor demonstration in Washington "left a bad impression.

"As a public relations effort it was a bust," he said.

The secretary said the farmers had the right to protest "but I don't approve of violence and vandalism. There were only a few troublemakers and that attracted a lot of attention."

Bergland also said consumers can expect an additional increase in beef prices within the next few months, perhaps 5 to 10 percent before leveling off.

"Already." he said, " consumers are showing a resistance to the beef prices. They are buying more chicken and cheese and pork. And about 40 percent of the beef being eaten now is hamburger."

In a speech to the 10,000 delegates, Bergland said many of the present "environmental regulations and requirements are onerous, contradictory and often exasperating.

"As in every movement, there are many zealots among die-hard environmentalists. They sometimes use the environmental issue as a political bludgeon."

Bergland said everyone agrees the environment must be protected and no one should follow the example "of some chemical companies and use our lands and our water as wastelands for producing cancer, respiratory diseases and general pollution.

"We have no alternative but to use a common-sense attitude...We need not support unnecessary and often capricious regulations. We must oppose the single-issue advocates who must have their way at any cost," he said.

He called on agriculture and agribusiness in rural areas to develop new sources of conservation power such as processing plants for soybeans and sunflowers, vital drying facilities, small manufacturing enterprises, municipal heating plants for rural communities.

Rep. Guy Vander Jagt, R-Mich., also criticized execessive regulation. He said the cost of overregulation now adds up to 30 percent to consumer electric bills.

Several speakers earlier had voiced the same concern.

Vander Jagt, chairman of the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee, said it now takes 10 years to build a power plant — "seven years to do the paper work and three to construct the facility."

Perhaps, he said, "the 96th Congress will begin to turn things around.

"Forty years ago you went down the country roads signing up your neighbors in the organization of the rural electric cooperatives. Now you need to go down those same country roads, organize politically and take the power back to the people," he said.

Dallas Police Kill Suspect

DALLAS (AP) - A 27-year-old New Orleans man suspected of hijacking a cab, robbing a pharmacy and attempting to rob a cafe within 15 minutes' time was shot and killed by a Dallas police officer Wednesday afternoon.

The victim was identified as Michael Kingston. Police arrested a 32-year-old woman at the scene of the East Dallas shooting, but no charges had been filed against her Wednesday night.

Police spokesman Bob Shaw said patrolman Richard A. Lawrence, 31, confronted Kingston on the parking lot of a closed barbecue restaurant about 3:30 p.m. When Lawrence asked to see the contents of a brown paper sack, Shaw said Kingston allegedly pulled a small caliber pistol and said: "Officer, stand

back.' Lawrence, a 7-year veteran of the force, pulled his .38 caliber weapon and fired five times, striking Kingston at least twice, Shaw said. Kingston was struck in the chin and the chest, Shaw said, and was pronounced dead on arriv-al at Parkland Memorial Hospital.

Carter Sees Hope On Wage Proposal

Carter expressed renewed hope Wednesday for passage of his troubled "real wage insurance" plan, while the head of the Federal Reserve Board said prices may rise more this year than the administration is projecting

We hope to have this legislation through the (House) Ways and Means Committee in the near future," Carter told a group of state and local officials.

"I believe it's accurate to say that the more that members of Congress have studied the basic principles of this proposal, the more progress has been made and the more support evolved." Grant Tax Rebates

Urges Inflation Plan Carter urged the public officials to emulate his federal anti-inflation program on the state and local level. They were asked to hold their own workers to the 7 percent standard, buy only from suppliers who meet the administration's price standard, and modify state and local regulations' that raise prices to consumers.

"You can be of great help to me," Carter told his guests.

Press secretary Jody Powell said the president later in the day had "some particularly straightforward discussion" at the White House with Democratic congressional leaders about holding the line on federal spending.

Powell said Carter made it clear to the lawmakers that he will veto spending bills that go too far beyond his \$532 billion budget.

Price Rise Estimated

G. William Miller, who heads the Federal Reserve, an independent moneymanaging agency, made his assertion about rising prices during an appearance before the House Banking Committee. The chairman said said he expects inflation to range from 7.5 to 8.25 percent in 1979, compared to the administration's estimate of 7.5 percent.

Noting that the administration's estimates are at the optimistic end of his own range of projections, Miller said "we could be fortunate", and hit the president's targets.

Private forecasters generally have been much less optimistic than either Miller or

the president. Some predict inflation rising to 9 percent in 1979 with a recession at end of the year. Beef Prices To Rise There were these other economic de-

Western Influences Returning To Tehran

Many restaurants have stopped selling alcohol, prohibited by Islamic tradition. Some are serving it surreptitiously in soft drink bottles. Open prostitution has also nearly vanished after the torching of the red light district by Moslem militants

This pale city of grey stone and concrete buildings, rarely accentuated by leafy trees or greenery, looks little different than before the revolution. Occasionally one sights burned-out buildings or the remnants of barricades littering some streets. Mostly small arms were used in the fighting and damage was minimal.

City police have returned to traffic control duty, led by Khomeini irregulars who encourage motorists to follow directions by a curt wave of an automatic rifle.

The city is quiet and people are starting to work again," said Mahmoud Salimi, a young Iranian whose family runs a plastics factory. "The factory has been open again since Saturday and things are the same as before.

But periodically, one can still hear machine gun fire ripping through the cool night air. Guerrilla groups still man sandbagged positions at key intersections and set up roadblocks at night.

The gunfire apparently stems from guerrilla groups testing their equipment or conducting training exercises. Although thousands of weapons have been turned in to mosques on Khomeini's orders, many more seized from army and police arsenals are still in private hands:

'Normalcy' Relative In Khomeini Capital

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) - There is a lot of talk in Tehran about Iran's returning slowly to normal.

The emphasis is on the word "slowly, Any normalcy in the Iranian capital is strictly relative to what was happening

Almost the only foreigners to tread the streets of Tehran today are a couple of

hundred reporters. They now believe things are "normal" if no one actually shoots at or near them

on an average day. It is perfectly normal to have guns thrust at one's head or stomach a dozen times daily, weapons wielded by wild-

eyed teen-agers who make up the rules as they go along. The breathalyzer. Iranian-style, has ar-

rived. This consists of zealous Moslem vigilantes holding a gun to reporters' heads. as they did two nights ago, and ordering them to breathe out hard.

In this case, alcohol was detected. But the reporters were let off with a severe warning by the soldiers of Islam, for whom alcohol is taboo.

Although there are no breathalyzer bags, there is an unsubstantiated theory that if the exhaled alcohol fumes are too strong they set off the rifles.

Some uniformed police are beginning

to appear on the streets again to direct

traffic, but they are far outnumbered by armed followers of the Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini. the 78-year-old Moslem leader who seized power 10 days ago. A night drive from the office to the hotel where most reporters are staying is a

nerve-wracking business. The traveler may be stopped between a dozen and a score of times by armed men whose only authority is the gun they carry. One driver carrying some reporters

Tuesday night stopped at one roadblock. opened the window and shouted a word in Farsi at the roadblock.

Rifle bolts clanged, and first pressure was taken on a couple of triggers.

The driver hastily shouted another word, and the car was waved on with friendly smiles.

"The first time," breathed the driver. I said 'pomegranates,' but tonight the password is 'apples."

On another occasion, one reporter at the U.S. Emesssy watching American evacuees leave for the airport politely asked a Khomeini vigilante if he would kindly remove the barrel of his rifle from under the reporter's left nostril.

Obligingly, the teen-aged militiaman removed thei mmunition clip and said, All safe now.

Asked if he had a bullet in the breech. he shook his head and pulled back the bolt to prove it.

He was as surprised as everyone else when a round jumped out into a nearby trash basket.

The radio and television blare martial music and a constant stream of revolutionary lectures all day, and hotel guests get a scowl and are ignored if they ask for the volume to be turned down.

Cigarettes have practically run out. But that, like other small inconveniences, is what is accepted as "normal" in Tehran today.

Iranians To Vote On Islamic State

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - Iran's new government announced Wednesday it will hold a referendum in 15 days on the issue of formally changing the nation's political status from a monarchy to an Islamic

The government statement, published in afternoon newspapers, said the single question on the ballot would be "Do you favor an Islamic republic?

A "yes" vote in the referendum would provide legitimacy for Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's revolution

And the man who delivered the good news was the president of the United

"There were butterflies from the top of my head to the bottom of my feet, especially when the president called," Mrs. Kraus said in a telephone interview from her home in Lansdale,

"Today, I'm the happiest woman, the happiest mother in the whole wide world." she added.

Revolutionary authorities had said they planned to try Kraus. 22, on charges he fired on Iranians during the embassy attack. Kraus was wounded in the attack and was being treated at a hospital in Tehran when he was taken for questioning to the revolutionary committee.

Kraus walked through the gates of the American Embassy compound Wednesday evening after one week as a "prisoner of the revolution."

Mrs. Kraus, a widow who lives with her daughter Iris Israel, said she had talked with President Carter for about two minutes Wednesday morning after a restless night of worry about her son

"He told me that Kenney was released and that he wasn't sure or had any confirmation when he would be here in America." she said. "He said he was safe with several other Marines and that they were going to do all they could to get them out of there as soon as possible.



New Orleans Strike Injunction Issued

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) - A state judge Wednesday issued a preliminary in-junction ordering an end to the 5-day-old policemen's strike that canceled Mardi Gras parades, but there was no indication

the men would obey the order.

Two temporary restrainting orders by the same judge, Civil District Court Judge Richard Garvey, went unheeded by the more than 1,000 striking police-

Garvey declined to issue a contempt ci-tation on his own if the men refused to obey the order, but he said the city could seek to file a contempt proceeding if it wanted. Such action could lead to the arrest of strikers, a development that union leaders said would trigger walkouts in the fire and sanitation departments.

"The court understands that the filing of a contempt citation might upset the delicate balance of negotiations," Garvey said in explaining his reason for not issuing a contempt citation.

The city and the Police Association of New Orleans were meeting for the third

trying to resolve the labor dispute when Garvey's ruling was handed down. A mediator reported progress after the pre-vious session but offered no prediction about how soon the walkout would end.

That's one question I sure would like to give you an answer to," said mediator Ansel Garrett.

Outside a police station, strikers walked their picket lines in silence as French Quarter shoplifters became more brazen and hotels scurried to salvage Mardi Gras business by arranging to bus tourists to carnival parades in the sub-

More than 1,100 of the 1,480 policemen participated in the walkout. The other 300 were assigned to extended shifts and told to concentrate on major crimes.

The long hours took their toll Wednesday when police Capt. Thomas Albert collapsed from an apparent heart attack in the 8th District police station that he commanded. He died soon afterward in Charity Hospital.

The police timed the strike to coincide

daily parades and street merriment. State police and National Guardsmen were put on patrol, but all parades and some other outdoor Mardi Gras activities were canceled.

Without the downtown parades, the French Quarter was the major attraction; visitors were welcome, petty criminals were not.

"People walk in off the street and take things off the counter in your store and laugh," said Ruth Ann Menutis, spokeswoman for a French Quarter merchants association. "They know you can't call the police. Who are you going to call?"

Unless more policemen are assigned to the French Quarter, some shops will close rather than risk further losses, she

The strikers were talkative until Tuesday night, when a group of 18 carnival club captains decided unanimously to cancel all remaining parades in the city-because they regarded their groups and the general public as "hostages" in the

Strikers on the picket line at the 1st District police station refused to be interviewed afterward. Those at police headquarters said the city was at fault in the cancellation of Mardi Gras, not their un-


"The city is only trying to make us look bad," said a picket who would not give his name.

One innkeeper estimated the city and state could lose more than \$300,000 in sales tax revenue if large numbers of tourists abandon plans to visit the city during Mardi Gras.

The Grand Hotel, which would have been on the parade routes Sunday and Mardi Gras Day, took action to stem an anticipated flood of cancellations. It chartered buses to take guests to the suburban parades on those days.
Rooms director Bob Ragsdale said

most guests who called the hotel decided against canceling their reservations after hearing of the bus plans.

"I think the tourists are just looking for a place to go for Mardi Gras," he said.





LEVELLAND - Dancing fiddles. dueling banjos and galloping guitars race to a climax, bringing the crowd roaring to its feet.

The country music show - with a little heart-tugging, a little western swing, a little raunchy rock and a whole lot of soul-satisfying sound - has been a blast. It, also, has been a lesson in performance and showmanship for country and

bluegrass music students at South Plains College here. Bringing in top performers is only one of the tools employed by a mushrooming SPC music program designed to make graduates performance-ready, capable of

stepping into any facet of the country

field with all the know-how of the self-

taught plus a solid grounding in music theory, technique and composition. It will happen again Saturday when Tiny Moore, a veteran showman with Bob Wills and Merle Haggard, takes the Texan Dome stage for Sandyland Opry.

SPC's monthly jamboree. Friday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Moore will conduct a workshop on both fiddle and mandolin, passing on the licks he learned in the only country music school of his day, the listen, look and practice do-it-yourself method.

In the time-honored manner, students will stay close to the stage to study licks and runs to further their own mastery of the country instruments. They will incorporate the knowledge into their own shows, performing in one of the SPC bands from the country and bluegrass department.

Lick-swapping and behind the barn trial and error ways have moved into the college practice room at SPC, which has pioneered the world's first bluegrass country degree program now drawing students from all over this eountry and some from Canada.

'We're better known 500 miles away than we are on the South Plains." John Hartin, a graduate of the self-taught system who developed the SPC program, said. Calls for specific talents or a combination of music skills come regularly 'from the West Coast and back East' and all points in between.

While his student of the hour tickled a banjo with eyes never leaving a sheet of music. Hartin explained the fantastic success of the special music program which began a few years back with one office and shared practice rooms but now has

An existing SPC facility is being remodeled for a complete plant to include a recording studio, which will broaden the program into the production field. Students range from the self-taught

professional, feeling the need to know music to further his career, to youngsters who got a guitar for Christmas. The program includes all the basics of

music plus the specialties of the country and bluegrass areas gleaned from the performing circuit by three instructors with degrees in other fields who have made their own way in self-taught coun-

"The real thrust is not picking and grinning: it's accelerated, high level academics plus performance." Hartin stated. "The objective is technique, shows and training to go into the job market and be five years ahead of experience expo-

When a student need includes a new in strument, one of the instructors - Hartin, Tim McCassland or Eddie Marsh heaves to and learns it in a hurry. The same thing happens when instrumentation in one of the SPC performing groups demands a new instrument to complete the wanted sound.

Energy Expert Provides Tips

By BARBARA J. BROOKS

Dr. Ernst W. Kiesling, chairman of the Civil Engineering Department at Texas Tech University, will provide insights into solar heating as an alternative energy form at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. sessions today of a public Save Energy Seminar sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Servce.

The seminar will begin at 9 a.m. in the Municipal Garden and Arts Center.

Other topics to be discussed during the meeting which continues Friday will include fireplaces, microwave ovens, designing an energy-efficient home, heating and cooling your home and selecting in-

According to Dr. Kiesling, the cost of converting a house to solar energy depends on what degree of solar heating the person desires. "It is impractical to try to depend totally on solar energy, because it is not reliable enough," he said. "You will have overcast days where there is little or no solar collection, and you will still need a backup heater.

We do plan to sell the concept of solar heating, someday. First, we must inform the public about the cost and what the elements are. I feel that we must look at the alternatives because this energy problem is much more serious than anyone realizes." said Dr. Kiesling.

"The reason I am interested in energy research for housing is because it can reduce our energy consumption without changing our lifestyles. I don't see that as being true in any other area. Transportation, for example, uses a significant amount of energy and if I am asked to use public transportation, to carpool or to curtail my travel, this would interfere with my lifestyle.

"I can curtail my use at home to a fraction of what it is now, without changing my lifestyle significantly. That is what makes energy use in housing attractive to me as a research area," Dr. Kiesling said.

The public is invited to participate in the seminar and there is no admission charge. Jane Cohen, energy specialist with the extension service, is the coordinator of the two-day meeting.





Public Meeting Slated On Food Sanitation

The Lubbock City Council will hear public comment today on a proposed food sanitation ordinance which has been the target of sharp criticism from those in the food industry.

Any action on the ordinance, however, probably will be delayed because of legal

The ordinance, which would replace one adopted in 1962, would require more frequent inspections of Lubbock food establishments and expand the number of businesses monitored by the city's Health

But a newly-formed coalition of food industry owners called Associated Food Industries of Lubbock has urged changes in the ordinance to require food service training for all Lubbock food service owners and managers.

The proposed ordinance mandates training only for employees of businesses which are closed following health inspections. The training also is offered by the Health Department on a voluntary basis.

Coalition members contend it is the responsibility of private enterprise to train their employees and say the training prevision of the ordinance constitutes an infringement on private enterprise."

The ordinance has been recommended to the council twice by the Health Board, the last time over the objections of restaurant association member Roger Loter, who recently was appointed to the board. Loter vowed to make his objections tothe ordinance known at the public hearing, scheduled for 2:30 p.m. today in city council chambers.

Since the council's decision last month to take no action on the ordinance before a public hearing, copies of the ordinance have been circulated among the restaurant association, warehouse owners and grocery associations for comment.

Also on the agenda for the 9:30 a.m. meeting is a discussion of the city's participation in the South Plains Association of Governments following a controversy over the distribution of federal criminal justice funds.

More than 67 percent of the monies allocated for the SPAG region are a direct result of the crime rate and population in Lubbock, but the city normally receives

little or no funding.

The funding situation prompted some city council members to call for a re-examination of the city's participation in SPAG, including the liabilities and ad-vantages to membership in the associa-

Also on the agenda is a discussion of the recurring "rites of spring" at Tech Terrace Park. Recent warm temperatures lured droves of students back to the park and the calls from angry residents to city hall haven't ceased since.

Last year the city placed barricades around the park and beefed up police patrols to curb vandalism and littering. Council members are scheduled to dis-

cuss a procedure for negotiating new con-tracts for seven industrial customers of Pioneer Natural Gas Company.

Earlier, the council held public hear-



Court Upholds Death Sentence In Conviction For Rape-Murder

AUSTIN (UPI) - The Texas Court of riminal Appeals Wednesday upheld the eath sentence given Edward Eldon Cory of Tyler, Texas, for the rape-murder a church organist, ruling he was given suitable competency hearing before eing tried.

Corley was accused of abducting Vicki ynn Morris from the Hebron Baptist hurch in Tyler on Sept. 14, 1974. Her ody wasa found the following morning out four miles from the church. She

had been shot with a .410 shotgun and had been raped. Three days later, Corley was arrested

in Panola County where he confessed to the murder. The trial was moved to Waco following a competency hearing in Tyler.

Corley contended that the jury was not

properly instructed to determine if he knew right from wrong before deciding if he was competent to stand trial. The court ruled the jury was given sufficient instructions to determine only if Corley

was able "to make a rational defense to the charges against him."

Judge Wendell Odom dissented with

the opinion, saying the jury should not have been instructed on whether Corley could make a rational defense, but rather on whether he knew right from wrong.

The criminal appeals court also upheld the life sentence conviction against Sugar Ray Franklin of Dallas for the torture death of Walter Simpson on April 17.

Franklin claimed the prosecution bolstered the testimony of Dr. Ross Zum-walt, who performed an autopsy on Simpson. But the court ruled Zumwalt's

testimony was based on his written re-port of the autopsy from which he drew his opinions and conclusions. Simpson suffered multiple blows to all parts of the body and Franklin led a group who at-

tempted to hang him.

Franklin also objected to cross-examination by the district attorney that presented "prejudicially assumed facts not

in evidence." The appeals court, however, said that when the accused testifies as a witness, he may be contradicted, Impeached, discredited and made to give evidence against himself.

The criminal appeals court also reversed the 10-year conviction against Jose Leonel Trevino of Waco for possession of more than four ownces of mari-

Trevino's wife testified she had been married to him for 22 years and known him for 32 and that ise had never been convicted of a felony. The court said grobation should not have been denied, all though Trevino had not testified about his eligibility for probation.



Perryman Convicted, Sentenced To 99 Years

A 140th District Court jury took only 15 minutes Thursday to find Larry Donell Perryman guilty of burglary of a habitation with intent to commit rape and another 15 minutes to give him the maximum 99-year penalty.

Perryman was on trial in connection with an incident Oct. 16 at the apartment of two sisters near the Texas Tech University campus.

The six-man, six-woman jury finished its work shortly before noon. Judge William R. Shaver formally pronounced sentence immediately after the jury was

Criminal District Attorney John T. Montford, referring to testimony that the two young women suffered multiple stab wounds when they fought rather than submit to being raped, said Perryman, 19, of 1812 E. 2nd St. "was so fatally bent on rape that he was willing to stab to get

Defense attorney Dennis McGill argued that Perryman entered the apartment only with the intent to steal and that he had been improperly charged under the law.

In Tuesday testimony the younger of the two sisters told of jumping on the back of a man holding a knife at the throat of her sister and being stabbed four times before the assailant fled.

"I knew I had to do something because I knew she wouldn't take that," the 18year-old Texas Tech University coed tes-

She and her 22-year-old sister, now a student at East Texas State University in Commerce, both identified Perryman as the man who broke into their apartment near the Tech campus last Oct. 16.
"What did you observe when you woke

up?" Montford asked her.

"A knife right at my neck," she said. "He said, 'Don't move or I'll slit your

Both women said Perryman started going from bed to bed threatening to kill

The older woman said he told them he needed \$300 "to buy a sniper gun because a white cop had killed his brother and he was going to get them" and that he became angry when told they had only \$6 between them.

Perryman has also been charged with aggravated rape in the reported Sept. 7 rape of a 21-year-old Tech student at her apartment and with burglary with intent to commit rape in a reported Sept. 13 break-in at the apartment of an 18-yearold Tech co-ed.

"He told us we were his seventh people and he was slick and bad and they hadn't he stuck the point of the knife into her caught him yet," the younger sister said. neck, the older woman testified. She said that when he got over her sis-

It was then that the 18-year-old Tech freshman sprung from her bed and jumped onto his back with her arm around his throat.

Fighting for the knife, the women and their assailant rolled off the bed onto the floor, and the younger one, stabbed four times in the chest and back, got up and then collapsed from loss of blood. The fighting stopped with the older sister holding his wrist with both hands and both of them looking at the girl where



Social Security's Solvency Probed

The hotly debated Social Security system is not going broke, but neither is it without some basic problems, according to a Texas Tech University economist. Dr. Robert Rouse said Tuesday at a

noon seminar on Social Security problems that the system may encounter temporary periods of severe recessions, but that he doesn't foresee bankruptcy in the

The financial soundness of the Social Security system is not dependent on the size of the trust fund, but on the government's effective power of taxation," said Rouse. "It depends on a sound federal tax system and on a healthy, growing The economics and business adminis-

tration professor told a group of about 25 persons that he believes the system has 'two or three" problems that carry serious implications for the future of Social Security. The short-run problem, said Rouse,

would be a prolonged recession or de-pression which would increase the difficulty of funding Social Security through the current method of financial support. The Social Security system is presently

funded by the "pay-as-you-go" method, in which retirement benefits are financed by current participants. Payroll taxes from employers and employees go into the reserve fund, while benefits move out, said Rouse.

In a recession or depression, he said, the resulting high level of unemployment would in turn result in a reduction of payroll taxes going into the reserve fund. Simultaneously, benefit payments would probably increase because the unemployed would be more apt to retire early. Thus, the reserve fund would be quickly reduced.

Rouse said the most likely solution to the recession or depression problem would be the incorporation of general revenue funds into the system.

The long-run problem with the Social Security system deals with the age composition of the population, said Rouse. If the current population trend continues, the percentage of the elderly in the nation will increase by the year 2050 to the point where the percentage of those paying into Social Security will drop sharply.

The percentage of the population 65 years of age and over will increase from 10 percent in 1979 to 18 per cent in 2050 according to current projections, he said. He added that while currently there are 3.5 persons in the labor force paying Social Security taxes for every person drawing benefits, in 2050 there will be only two persons paying into the system for every person taking out of the system.

The changes will result in either a "tremendous increase in Social Security taxes or a postponement of the retirement age to 68 or 70," said Rouse.

He said there has been a trend toward

airport.
Police used tear gas to break up a demonstration by striking teachers, and the gas drifted into the press center set up above the post office, causing an outbreak of gasping by communications workers and the few reporters present. The government workers want a recent

Hewanorra International Airport was closed from Monday afternoon to Tuesday evening after a Quebecair charter Boeing 707 smashed into the runway while landing. Two persons aboard the fully loaded plane were slightly injured.

Service stations were selling gasoline again Wednesday after two days of shortages. The government said new supplies arrived Tuesday, but taxicab drivers said retailers withheld it because a price rise has been authorized for March I and they did not want to sell at the current price of

High Court Accepts Lawyer Negligence Case From Felon

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court agreed Wednesday to decide if government-appointed lawyers who defend the poor against criminal charges may be sued by their clients for negligence.

The court accepted the case of Francis Rick Ferri, who is serving a 31-year sentence in the Lewisburg, Pa., penitentiary.

Ferri filed a \$5.6 million negligence suit against his court-appointed lawyer, Daniel Ackerman of Greensburg, Pa., contending it was Ackerman's fault that his sentence was so long. Ferri alleged that the statute of limitations had expired on criminal charges that accounted for 10 years of his sentence.

Ferri was sentenced in 1975 on charges stemming from the bombing of a car which the government said was intended to kill a business associate of one of Ferri's accomplices. The government said that the bomb exploded prematurely, blowing off the arm of Guy Bertini, a codefendant of Ferri's. The intended victim, who was not in the car, was un-

At the time he was brought to trial for the bombing. Ferri was already in prison on previous mail fraud charges.

In legal papers filed with the Supreme Court, Ferri accused Ackerman of "gross negligence and malpractice" and said the fact that Ackerman was a court-appointed lawyer should not shield him from being sued.

Ferri said that "many lawyers compete for court assignments" to represent the poor because they are paid substantial fees as public defenders by the government. He said that removing exemption from being sued would not threaten the supply of lawyers willing to take on the cases of indigent criminal defendants.

The Pennsylvania Supreme Court ruled last year that court-appointed lawyers enjoyed absolute immunity that has been granted to other officers of the court such as judges and prosecutors. The Pennsylvania court also pointed to a 1978 ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court which held that attorneys representing federal agencies are immune from suit.

However, dissenting members of the Pennsylvania court said that clients who hired their own attorneys were entitled to sue for negligence and it denies equal protection to the poor to deprive them of the same right.

Lawyers for Ackerman, urging the Su-

preme Court to reject the case, said, "If a damage suit could be visited upon a court-appointed lawyer from any disgruntled client, who would serve as appointed counsel?

Elvis Presley Poster Sales Fight Decided

WASHINGTON (AP) — A two-year legal fight over who enjoys the right to sell Elvis Presley posters ended Wednesday as the Supreme Court refused to review the controversy

The justices left intact a ruling that bars the Pro Arts poster company of New York and its outlet, Stop and Shop Companies, from selling a color poster of the late rock and roll star.

Presley died Aug. 16, 1977, at age 42. The next day, the Atlanta Journal ran a front-page color photograph of Presley for which Pro Arts purchased all rights. Pro Arts then published the photo in poster form and began to sell it. Factors Etc. Inc., one of the largest mass merchandisers of novelty items, and the Tennessee-based Boxcar Enterprises went to court to stop the Pro

Arts poster sales. Factors and Boxcar contended that they controlled all of Presley's "rights of

Boxcar had controlled such exclusive rights during Presley's lifetime, and two days after his death sold those rights to Factors.

The agreement was consented to by Presley's longtime personal manager, Col. Tom Parker, and his father, Vernon Presley.

It gave Factors exclusive control "in connection with the manufacture, sale, advertising and distribution of all merchandise, of whatever kind, size or na-

U.S. District Judge Charles Tenney of New York City issued an injunction barring Pro Arts from selling its poster.

Tenney ruled that Boxcar's control of Presley's publicity rights were not di-

The 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals last June upheld Tenney's ruling. In seeking review. Pro Arts lawyers argued that a 1968 Supreme Court decision involving posters gives the New York company a free-speech right to dis-

In the 1968 ruling, the court said posters that carry some type of "newsworthy" message enjoy constitutional protections and therefore may not be suppressed by restraints such as exclusive publicity rights.

The Pro Arts poster, however, does not concern itself with any newsworthy event, the 2nd Circuit court ruled. Pro Arts' appeal argued that its poster does communicate a message.

"It leads to a sharing of deep emotions and strikes a basic human note of personal memories among those who grew up on his music and emulated his life style," the appeal said.


But when they managed to book pianist Ralph Votapek, the first American ever to win the Van Cliburn Piano Competition, as a replacement, their spirits soared

Mustangs' coach Ron Meyer personally signed the keystones of the 1979 recruiting class — running backs Eric Dickerson of Sealy and Craig James of Houston. Dickerson, perhaps the most widely recruited ball carrier in the country, signed with Meyer at 8:15 Wednesday and two hours later James signed on with the Mustangs.

"I think this means we can beat any team we play." Meyer said last week after landing Dickerson and James. "A lot of these players realized that if we could land just one more good

The work done by Meyer and his band of assistants overshadowed the efforts of the rest of the Southwest Conference schools, although every team in the league signed athletes off the various blue chip lists.

A&M and Texas Tech, however, lost players they had signed

Coleman, who had signed with the Red Raiders, decided on Oklahoma instead and defensive back Donnie Fisher, highly re-cruited out of Port Arthur Lincoln, jilted Texas A&M in favor of

Quarterback Rick McIvor of Fort Stockton, tight end Dewey Turner of Lubbock Estacado and wide receiver Herkie Walls of Garland — the top players signed by Texas — stayed in the Lon-

Texas A&M, which had hoped to sign Dickerson last week, counted wide receiver Eference Murphy of Texaskana as its

leading prospect.

Arkansas fought off Notre Dame for the services of lineman Billy Ray Smith of Plano and Baylor came up with an outstanding quarterbacking duo of Rick Money of Dallas and Vic Vines of Odessa Permina.

TCU also had perhaps its best recruiting crop in a decade, highlighted by the signing of quarterback Reuben Jones from Tulsa. Jones had been heavily recruited by Oklahoma, but the Sooners told him they wanted him as a running back.

Jones, a quick-footed option quarterback who also threw for 1,400 yards last year, wanted a chance to be a signal caller in college. Both Arkansas and TCU recruiters said they would give him the opportunity to play quarterback and after visiting Fayetteville last week Jones signed with TCU Wednesday.



MIAMI (AP) - Coach Don Shula revealed Wednesday he has signed Biil Davis to serve as director of pro personnel and that free agent Larry Csonka has taken the first step toward rejoining the Miami Dolphins.

Davis, 40, was administrative assistant to Philadelphia Eagles Coach Dick Vermeil. He will assume the duties left by George Young, recently selected as New York Giants general manager.

"Bill will do all of our game scouting, and analyze our own offense. He will also be my administrative assistant, which means he'll be my right-hand man." Shula said.

This completes the reorganization of the staff," said Shula, who earlier hired Dan Henning from the New York Jets to replace Howard Schnellenberger as coordinator of the passing game. Schnellenberger took the head coaching job at the University of Miami.

You hate to lose people like Howard and George, but I think we got two good men to replace them," Shula said.

Shula said he and owner Joseph Robbie met with Csonka on Tuesday. Csonka, 34, led the Dolphins to back-to-back Super Bowl championships in 1972 and 1973. He jumped to the World Football League for an estimated \$2 million in 1975, and signed with the Giants when the WFL

"We had the first discussion with him, then he went down and had the physical examination with Dr. Herbert Virgin. He's indicated his desire to sign with us." Shula said.

There was bad blood between Csonka and Robbie when Robbie revealed publicly Csonka's asking price after the WFL disbanded. Shula, said, though, that the two-met without incident Tuesday.
"They sat down and talked," he said.

Barnes Brought **About Problems**

Marvin Barnes is one of the very best basketball players in the world. Marvin Barnes

Barnes, who once said he'd rather work in a factory than sign a contract to play bas-

ketball for less than \$1 million, now may have to live up to his words It's been two weeks since Barnes was placed on waivers by the Boston Celtics. Any club in the National Basketball Association could have picked him up for a paltry \$1,000, but all passed. Now even that \$1,000 price tag has been removed, and still there

are no takers. From the neck down, Barnes could help any of the 22 teams in the NBA. But not one

figures it can cope with Barnes from the neck up. Barnes' self-destruction is one of the greatest sports wastes of our time

This is a man of marvelous talent, a basketball player who can shoot, rebound, block shots, handle the ball and play with intense enthusiasm. You just never knew when, or

Reliability has never been Barnes' strong suit. His personal schedule was often at odds with the schedule of his team. There was always a measure of suspense as to

whether Movin' Marvin would show up by game time.

Sometimes it didn't matter. "I remember the time he was with St. Louis and Marvin didn't show up till halftime," said John Y. Brown, co-owner of the Celtics. "He got right into uniform and scored something like 40 points in the second half. I believe he could do almost anything he set his mind to on the basketball court."

But Barnes made irresponsibility a way of life. Not even five months in jail - for a parole violation after he had been convicted of assaulting a college teammate - could convince Barnes to get his act together.

His words sounded promising at the time. "I had a chance to check myself out while I was in jail," he said. "It made more of a man out of me. I paid my debt to society

and now I want to be a man and play basketball." But they were just words. Barnes lasted a little more than one season with Detroit, less than a season with Buffalo and less than half a season with Boston before being released. He had missed a number of practices and Celtics player-coach Dave Cowens finally said he didn't want Barnes in the same building as his other players.

"He's really not a bad guy," Bob Woolf, one of the most respected agents in the sports field, said of Barnes. "He's just not responsible, the same as he was in college."

But at the age of 26, it is time Barnes lived up to his responsibilities. Many people will tell you he's like a child, innocent and irrepressible. He means no harm, they say. You can't help but love the guy, they say.

Well, one of those who loves the guy ought to grab him and shake him until the message sinks in — he's blowing it. There may not be any more John Y. Browns around, willing to give Barnes yet another shot at pro ball. And working in a factory can be

mighty tough. It is time for Marvin Barnes to grow up.

ferring to the suit. "I don't want to em-batrass anybody." But when the payments stopped a couple of months ago, she says, "he left me with no alterna-



Boxing Tax Bill KOs Opposition

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) — A tax lowering bill that the Athletic Commission claims would keep major prize fights in Nevada won rapid approval Wednesday with a 37-3 Assembly vote.

That vote came just one day after the bill, aimed at keeping the next heavyweight

championship bout in the state, was introduced.

Assemblyman Bob Price, D-North Las Vegas, chairman of the Assembly Taxation Committee, successfully urged that the plan be routed on an emergency basis to the Senate for final legislative action.

Price said the measure was needed in order for Nevada to retain its advantage over other states in attracting top boxing matches.

Members of the Assembly panel, meeting jointly Tuesday with the Senate Taxatjon Committee, initially had some sharp words for the wording of the bill.

But the Assembly committee promptly formed a subcommittee to work out amendments so that the bill could be rushed to the Assembly floor. Backers of the plan hope

to move the measure through the Legislature by the end of the week. The proposed legislation follows a recent attorney general's ruling that the traditional method of taxing purses in Nevada has been wrong and that fight promoters mass start paying more money into state coffers.

Roy Tennison, executive secretary of the Nevada Athletic commission, said the new bill would bring "more big-time boxing into Nevada." If it's not passed, he added "big-time boxing will leave Nevada" for a more favorable tax climate.

The bill by Assemblyman Thomas Hickey, D-North Las Vegas, would reduce 150 gate tax from 4 percent to 3 percent and cut the amount of tax on the hotel payment to promoters from 4 percent to 2 percent. The tax levied on television payments would be 2 percent on anything below \$1 million and no tax on anything above \$1 million. nison said the new legislation would result in a 13 percent loss in revenues or

about \$18,000 annually The opinion issued by Chief Deputy Attorney General Bob Peccole said the 4 percent state tax must be levied on the total amount of money involved. Previously, the purse money was exempt from taxation on the grounds it was the fighters' personal

income. Nevada has no state income tax. Hickey said high taxes have kept major fights out of New York and California and said he feared the same thing would happen in Nevada.

Promoter Don King has said that an all-heavyweight card at the Las Vegas Hilton Hotel on March 23 depends on whether something can be worked out on the tax situa-

The fights include a World Boxing Council title defense between heavyweight Larry Holmes and Puerto Rico's Osvaldo Ocasio, and a 12-round elimination bout between Ken Norton, the WBC's No. 1-ranked heavyweight contender, and No. 3-ranked Ear-



Reeves In Lurch After Interview

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) -Dallas Cowboys offensive coordinator Dan Reeves, considered leading contender for the head coaching job with the New York Giants, said he was "wasn't encouraged or discouraged," after his interview this week with new General Manager George Young.

"I really have no feeling, usually you do when you come out of a meeting like that," Reeves said by telephone from Dallas. "It was a good interview, blunt and the point.'

Reves met with Young, appointed last Wednesday as general manager, for four hours Monday night in the Dallas-Fort Worth airport. The two men had never met before.
"He didn't beat around the bush and I

respect him for that," Reeves said. "I'm definitely still interested in the job, but I have no idea one way or the other about my chances. I have no feel for that."

The Giants are expected to make an announcement at the end of the week. The National Football League forbids one team from hiring another's assistant after March 1 to prevent break-up of a team's staff before the upcoming season.

If Young makes his selection by Friday, the new man will have just six days to hire current NFL assistants in putting together a staff.

Ray Perkins, the San Diego Chargers' highly regarded offensive coordinator, is Reeves' chief competition for the job. Perkins and Young are old friends from their days together in Baltimore and speculation has arisen that Young might feel more comfortable with Perkins than

Young has played down his friendship with Perkins

Young was expected to conduct anoth-

day, which he labeled "no big deal." Young met with New York Jets offensive coordinator John Idzik on Tuesday.

Seattle Seahawks offensive coordinator Jerry Rhome, interviewed by Young Sunday in Los Angeles, pulled his name out of the running Tuesday.

"I'm very happy here and just feel I have a commitment to take us that much closer to the Super Bowl," Rhome said. "I was very flattered to be interviewed by the Giants, and Young understood my feelings when I called him.

"The Giants had not offered me the job nor had they told me I was out of the running either. I just don't want to leave Seattle now. My decision to stay here had er interview at Giants Stadium Wednes- nothing to do with the Giants," he added.

Questions Point Up Seriousness Of Shortage

NEW YORK (AP) - The interruption of Iranian oil production has led to a situation that Energy Secretary James R. Schlesinger says is "prospectively more serious" than the 1973-74 Arab oil embargo. Yet most Americans have found no reason to agree.

Even though prices are rising and gov-

ernment officials warn there could be mandatory controls on oil use soon, there are no lines at service stations. Gasoline can still be bought on Sunday. And there have been no widespread shortages of any kind of fuel.

So why the fuss? Here are answers to

Q. Since Iran supplied only 5 percent of the United States' crude oil needs, why is the loss of the oil so important?

A. Five percent doesn't seem much, but officials say it is enough to tighten supply. One official put it this way: "Im-

agine if 5 percent of the nation's drivers were told they couldn't get gas any

Actually, the nation's loss so far is more like 2.5 percent because other oilproducing nations are making up some of the absent production. But experts say even that is enough to cause worry.

It is also important to realize that other countries, particularly in Europe, have been far more dependent on Iranian oil than the United States. Iran had produced 10 percent of world supply, and gans elsewhere are being filled from the same sources to which this nation must turn. The result: a worldwide supply

So, officials say, the world faces serious problems in the event of unexpected trouble like the oil field fire in Saudi Arabia two years ago. And U.S. supplies were tight even before Iran's cutoff.

Q. Oil imports have been running high in recent months, and the last tanker of Iranian oil just arrived. Why are there problems now?

A. High oil imports are the result of massive orders placed by the oil companies late last year to get oil before the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries' price rose 5 percent Jan. 1.

Nevertheless, supplies of some products such as jet fuel are tight because some companies rely on the spot market to meet demand. That is where sales not covered by long-term contracts take place, and although it accounts for only about 5 percent of oil supplies, it is important because because it is used to adjust inventories

The loss of Iranian oil has all but dried up the spot market and has sent prices for what is available there soaring as countries more dependent on Iran than the U.S. go there to make up their losses. Q. All right, there's a problem. But why

A. Experts say that if the shutdown in Iran lasts beyond a couple of months more it could cause serious problems

are the warnings so dire?

In addition, analysts say the govern-ment apparently is taking advantage of the situation to try one more time to con-vince Americans that they should conserve energy, evidently in the belief that a good scare might change wasteful habits once and for all.

Q. Will steps Iran now is taking to re-

sume production solve the problem?

A. Not necessarily. Even if oil begins flowing soon, the amount may be limited by mechanical problems, government quotas or political problems that could crop up. The theory, then, is to save now so that supplies can be stretched further

Q. Is that why Texaco and several other oil companies are limiting the amount of gasoline they sell to dealers now?

A. Yes. Gasoline consumption drops in winter anyway as bad weather curtails driving. With crude oil supplies uncertain, the companies want a lot of gasoline on hand at the start of summer so they can switch to heating oil production early for next winter.

Q. What's all this doing to consumer prices?

A. That's not quite clear. The base price of crude oil, from which other products are refined, was set by the Jan. 1 OPEC increase at \$13.35 per 42-gallon barrel. That price has generally held. But Saudi Arabia, the key nation filling the gap left by Iran, has placed a higher price on the extra 1 million barrels a day it is producing over its usual 8.5 million barrels. Other nations have done the same.

So far, there has been virtually no rise in consumer prices due to these special increases, because not much oil is involved. But should OPEC decide the market will bear higher prices, it could

eral price rise scheduled for this year. Q. Then why am I paying more for ga-

soline and heating oil? A. In both cases, that's the result of the Jan. 1 OPEC increase, which added about a penny per gallon to the prices of

In addition, some gasoline dealers, taking advantage of supply tightness, are increasing profit margins. In the case of heating oil, the price of which is not regulated by the federal government, the rise is quicker because a lot of heating oil comes from the spot market, where prices are higher. This is passed on to the

Q. Isn't this whole thing just a scam dreamed up by the oil companies to squeeze a few more pennies out of me at

A. There's little to support that oftmade accusation. In fact, the companies have appeared less concerned than the government, and say mandatory controls will be unnecessary. Of course, rationing would cut the amount of gasoline they sell and erode their profits. But the industry also is worried about its public image because it wants controls lifted from gasoline prices. The Energy Department backs that idea, which it says would encourage an expansion of refinery capacity. But the plan faces stiff opposition in Congress because of estimates that it would boost the price of gasoline at least 5 cents.

Such an increase obviously becomes less palatable as prices rise for other reasons. So. analysts say, the companies have nothing to gain from pushing the price up now as they campaign for decon-



We have enough money in 7 1/2 percent savings certificates — some of which were inherited. ited - to pay for a retirement home. We plan to retire in another state. Would it be wise to buy or build now, before inflation adds so much more to the price of the retirement house we want-that we would not be able to afford it? If we buy or build now, we would rent

the house out until we retire. A. There's no getting around the un-happy fact that the cost of building new homes or of buying older ones has risen in recent years a whole lot faster than that 7 1/2 percent interest is building up on your lifetime savings. And there's lit-tle or no hope that trend will change between now and the time you retire.

So, strictly on that basis, it would be a smart move to buy your retirement home now. I have to caution, however, against cashing in any of your savings certificates before they reach their maturity dates and, thereby, suffering interest penalties.

Then, you run into a problem of longdistance renting. That can be a big problem and has been the subject of some horror story" letters to this column. I say rent out your retirement home, only if you have some good friend in the town where you plan to retire who is willing and able to look after things there for

Pakistan Fireworks Blast Fatal To 13

The fund you switched out of aims mostly for growth and has missed its target all too often. At age 79, you should have been out of that poor performer many years ago.

Q. Do brokerage firms have what I'll call "service charges"? I bought 100 shares of stock a few years ago. I had the certificate registered in my name and my wife's name and sent to us. Since I haven't been back for a buy or sell since, would the brokerage firm have some sort of charge for having our account?

A. I doubt that even the greediest brokerage house would try that. If it happened, you could thumb your nose and

A recent column noted that some brokerage firms are levying charges for such things as holding customers' stocks. That column pointed out that the Securities & Exchange Commission blasted the brokerage fraternity for such "hidden charges." The New York Stock Exchange claims that brokers refunded such charges, after the SEC blast.

But letters from readers keep coming in, mentioning that such charges continue. The moral of the story is that some brokerage houses will keep laying on those charges - as long as there is no rule to the contrary.

High Court Views Business Related

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court Wednesday issued a host of business-related decisions on questions that ranged from nationwide industrial health regulations to disputes over Elvis Presley posters to the legality of bonds issued by financially troubled Cleveland.

In one of its most far-reaching actions Wednesday, the court said it would hear an appeal of new government standards.

an appeal of new government standards on exposure to benzene, a cancer-causing chemical used in making detergents, plastics, solvents and paint remover. The standards were set by the Labor Department's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and were to go into effect last March 14. They have be appealed by industry and could affect more than 600,000 workers and initially cost industries up to \$500 million in compliance costs.

The court refused to review an appeal brought by financially troubled Cleveland in a dispute over its authority to issue \$20 million in bonds to pay off some electric bills. In doing so, the justices let stand a ruling by the Ohio Supreme Court denying the city authority to issue the bonds to repay the Cleveland Electric Illumi-

nating Co., a privately owned utility. In the dispute over posters, the court let stand lower court rulings which found that exclusive publicity rights to Presley posters had not been divested at the rockand-roll star's death in 1977. Factors Etc. Inc. and Boxcar Enterprises, which had agreements for publicity rights, won their two-year fight to prevent distribution of a Presley poster by Pro Arts, a

New York poster company.

At issue in the benzene case is the extent of the government's authority to reduce exposure levels through regulations based on its assessment of risk and benefits. New standards, reducing the current exposure levels, were issued after studies

showed that benzene causes leukemia.

Last Oct. 5, the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that the standards could not be enforced on grounds that OSHA failed to show that lower exposure levels required by the new standards save enough lives to bear a "reasonable relationship" to the financial costs involved.

In its appeal, attorneys for the government have argued that such a decision might hamper the agency in setting safety standards for all types of cancer-causing agents.

In other business-related decisions Wednesday the court:

-Agreed to hear government arguments aimed at making it more difficult to sue federal doctors for medical malpractice. The case involves a Korean War

A BILL TO INCREASE THE INCOMES of sugar growers who, in many cases are facing the prospect of being driven out of business by a combination of low prices and increasing costs has been introduced by chairmen Al Ullman, Dof the House Ways and Means Committee and Thomas Foley, D-Wash, of the House Agriculture Committee.

"Consumers already depend on imports for nearly half their sugar supply," Foley said. "Unless we can take some effective action to maintain domest production. Americans will be left even more vulnearble to dramatic price in-

creases in future periods of tight world supply."

The legislation, which Foley said would have little impact on retail food prices this year, also is sponsored by Rep. Kika de la Garza, D-Tex., vice chairman of the Agriculture Committee, and by Rep, Charles Stenholm of Stamford. It would affect High Plains sugar beet producers.

THE AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE WILL HOLD public hearings on the legislation next Tuesday and Wednesday and March 1. The legislation also will be considered by the Ways and Means Committee.

"This proposal, if we can get it enacted, would provide a welcome and substantial increase in returns to sugar beet and cane growers without forcing a major increase this year in consumer costs," Foley said.

"I would personally like to see grower returns move higher than the bill provides because current prices are below production costs for many farmers. But I don't want to weaken our chances of reaching an urgently needed, achievable goal by proposing price levels which would be rejected by a Congress and an administration concentrating on fighting inflation and holding down government

The new sugar bill would set a market price objective of 15.25 cents a pound for raw sugar from the 1978 crop, compared with the current objective of 15 cents. In addition, the measure would authorize supplemental federal payments of up to 0.5 cents a pound, thus bringing the overall raw sugar return up to 15.75

THE MARKET PRICE OBJECTIVE would be reached, under the bill, by setting import fees to keep foreign sugar from underselling domestic sugar, and by backing up the fee system with import quotas when necessary.

The bi-l would remain in effect through the 1982 crop year. For each season beginning with 1979, the market price objective for raw sugar would be adjusted to keep pace with changes in production costs - but there would be an absolute ceiling of 7 percent annually, in keeping with the administration's anti-inflation guideline, on increases in the price objective. For each year, additionally, the market return would be supplemented by direct payments of up to 0.5 cents a pound.

IN THE 1979 MARKETING SEASON, for example, the formula in the bill would provide a market price objective of about 16.1 cents a pound and the total income goal thus would be 16.6 cents a pound:

The legislation includes provisions authorizing U.S. participation in the International Sugar Agreement, which is designed to stabilize world prices. It also contains a section providing minimum wages for domestic sugar field workers. Also included is a section which would specifically provide that the secretary

of agriculture would retain discretionary authority to operate a price support loan program for sugar

Farmers' Hopes, World Weather Linked

WASHINGTON (AP) — Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland said that poor weather someplace in the world this year could mean full production for American farmers in 1980.

Bergland made no prediction that this will happen, but noted again that "the world has produced four bumper crops back-to-back in the last four years" and that it "has never grown five good crops

Consequently, he told the annual meeting here of the National Association of Conservation Districts, "It's entirely conceivable that for erop year 1930 there would be no set-aside program" to curb the production of such major crops as wheat, corn and cotton.

In 1978 and again this year, acreage set-aside programs were put in place to help slow the rise in grain stockpiles, now the largest since the early 1960s.

Herbicide Found To Aid Certain Range Grasses

Grass may get greener and livestock may eat and gain more as a result of a herbicide which, if applied at high rates, would kill the grasses it nurtures. The herbicide tebuthiuron has in-

The herbicide tebuthiuron has increased plant water content by as much as 15 percent in initial studies conducted by Dr. Ronald E. Sosebee of the department of range and wildlife management at Texas Tech University. Increased water content means increased greenness which is attractive to livestock.

The form of tebuthiuron being investi-

The form of tebuthiuron being investi-gated by Sosebee has previously only been used by industry for complete con-trol of vegetation around industrial sites. Tebuthiuron has not been approved by the Environmental Protection Agency for rangeland use but may be shortly,

In lower rate applications than those used by industry, the herbicide acts in the reverse and improves rangeland grasses, causing treated plants to be preterred by livestock over untreated for-

When first applied, tebuthiuron top-killed grasses. Shortly after treatment, though, the grasses responded favorably to all rates of application. Some of the grasses improved include hooded wind-mill, sideoats grama, blue grama, purple threeawn and dropseed.

The grasses were dried and analyzed to determine reasons for increased greenness and preference by livestock. The results showed no significant difference in carotene or chlorophyll content and only occasional differences in protein contents, Sosebee said. Water content was the main factor which seemed to be improved in tebuthiuron treatment plants over untreated plants.

Five growing seasons after treatment, the treated plants remained vegetative longer than did the untreated ones.
