Mrs. Carter's office announced Friday she will appear before the Senate subcommittee on mental health and research to discuss the report of the President's Commission on Mental Health, of which she was honorary chairperson.

# Cold wind, loud protest greet Teng

HOUSTON (AP) — On a rainy, cold, windy day, Chinese Vice Premier Teng Hsiao-ping came to Houston and was given a pair of silver spurs, a tour of the space center that launched the moon landings, and a loud protest from the large Taiwan-

ese population of Texas' largest city. About 700 persons, waving a dozen flags of the Republic of China, stood in front of the downtown Houston hotel where Teng was to spend his nights in Houston.

Facing them were 600 policemen, armed with riot sticks, plastic shields, masks, and bullet-proof jack-

There was no trouble The Taiwanese sang their national anthem and shouted slogans against the Red Chinese, but made no effort to

cross the rope barriers. One group of Taiwanese carried a large banner, which stretched across the street, reading, "Impeach

Teng arrived at Ellington Air Force Base, now a deserted strip that once was a vital part of the nation's air defense system. It was blustery and cold, unlike the February weather expected in Houston, which embraces the generally warm flow from the nearby Gulf of Mexico.

When Teng stepped off the plane, a brass band from the University of Houston played "Hey Look Me

Gov. Bill Clements, the first Repub-

lican governor elected in Texas in more than 100 years and an avowed conservative, greeted Teng and presented him a large package of toys for "the children of China" and a wel-

come to Texas "where we have a reputation for hospitality. We have a great curiosity about China and we are glad you are here.

But neither the governor, nor Houston Mayor Jim McConn, joined Teng on his tour of the city.

At the Johnson Space Center, Teng smiled and gestured as he sat at the controls of a shuttle spacecraft and received a pilot's view of simulated landings.

He saw moon rocks Apollo astronauts brought back to Earth and he saw space programs, both past and

# Violence resumed in streets of Iran

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Ayatullah Ruhollah Khomeini brushed aside a new peace overture Friday from Prime Minister Shahpour Bakhtiar and again demanded Bakhtiar's resignation. Bakhtiar warned the army would "answer with bullets" any new civil disturbances.

As Iran waited nervously for clues to its political future, the violence that suddenly abated Thursday with Khomeini's return from exile flared anew, and three persons were report-

About 10,000 excited supporters besieged Khomeini's headquarters on his first full day in Iran in more than 14 years to get a glimpse of him.

The 78-year-old Moslem religious leader, architect of Iran's anti-shah movement, went to a ground-floor window of the building, a school, and waved to the crowds as they streamed past chanting "Hail Khomeini!" and 'Death to Bakhtiar!

Some also shouted "Death to Carter!" because of Washington's support of Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi and Bakhtiar, and "Death to Hyser'." referring to Gen Robert

Huyser, deputy commander of U.S. forces in Europe

Huyser has been in Iran for weeks, and some sources say he has been trying to muster support for Bakhtiar among Iranian generals and discourage a coup. But the opposition calls it another example of American meddling in Iranian affairs, and some say Huyser would be the man to give the go-ahead to any anti-Khomeini mili-

tary coup. People in the crowd assured foreigners they were not against Westerners individually, only the policies of their governments.

Khomeini wants to abolish the monarchy and replace Bakhtiar's government with a religiously oriented Islamic republic under his own guidance He said Thursday the government is illegal "and if they

continue they must be put on trial." Bakhtiar, who has repeatedly rejected Khomeini's demands that he resign, told state radio Friday he would like to meet with Khomeini to "find a political solution to the present problems of the country

# Situation in Iran could soon hike gasoline costs

NEW YORK (AP) - A few more months without Iranian oil could mean an 8-cent-a-gallon increase in the U.S. price of gasoline and mandatory restrictions on consumption this summer, industry analysts said Fri

Like restrictions and cost increases could come next winter for heating oil if the political crisis in Iran continues. they said.

We're going through something now not totally dissimilar to the 1973-74 oil embargo "said Arnold E. Safer a petroleum analyst at Irving Trust Co. "The reasons are different, but the effects on the world market are the same

"One can conceive of outcomes in Iran together with responses by other OPEC (Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries) producers such that we could be in really serious trouble," said David Nissen of the **Energy Economics Division of Chase** Manhattan Bank

Iranian oil fields used to produce 5 million barrels of crude daily, about 10 percent of world consumption. But they have not produced much more than 500,000 barrels a day for the past two months, an amount just slightly

over half of Iran's own demand Other members of OPEC - principally Saudi Arabia - have made up about half of the difference on the world market, but the 2.5 million barrels a day not being made up are creating a squeeze on world supply The squeeze is being felt in the United States, although Iran only supplied about 5 percent of U.S. consumption. 'At present levels of consumption,

there's likely to be some significant shortages developing in the not-toodistant future," said Eugene Nowak, an analyst at the Wall Street firm of Blyth Eastman Dillon

Some oil companies have already begun cutting supplies to dealers as a conservation measure. And should the Iranian shutdown persist beyond April 1, Energy Secretary James Schlesinger has suggested that something would have to be done to limit gasoline consumption, such as requiring gas stations to close at night and on Sundays and rationing fuel to dealers. He has ruled out direct rationing of gasoline to consumers

According to the price-increase plan approved by OPEC in December, the price of crude oil is scheduled to go up 2 percent on April 1. But OPEC may decide to raise it even

grave miscarriage of justice. "I object to it. To hire a pathologist to work on the payroll for the state would make him subject to the whims of the prosecutor and upset the very delicate balance of our criminal justice system," Howell said.

"WE'VE GOT ADEQUATE pathologists around. I think the district attorneys are complaining apparently because the ones who are here won't testify like they ask them to. It's the prosecution complex of district attorneys — so many times they have such poor investigation by law enforcement officials that they (district attorneys) want convictions on inadequate evidence.

Jerry Lopez, an Odessa trial law ver, said he thinks the hiring of a forensic pathologist would be a benefit to both prosecution and defense.

"If you've got a medical examiner who is very good and honest, I don't think he's going to give the prosecution an unfair advantage. When I was in San Antonio, I saw a medical examiner testify both ways. Sometimes it's helped the prosecution. And sometimes it's helped the defense," Lopez

"But I think I would want to make sure that the man who is being hired is a man of integrity.



# Funds flow freely for Connally

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Republican presidential candidate John Connally said Friday money is flowing into his nine-day-old campaign at an unprecedented rate.

Connally agreed, however, that a loss to Ronald Reagan next year in a Texas presidential primary might end his bid for the top political office in the nation.

But he said, "If I beat him, it might end his" presidential hopes

Pressed on whether a victory in Texas is essential for him, Connally told a news conference, "Sure, I think so — but it's not just my home

That was an obvious reference to former U.N. Ambassador George Bush of Houston, who also has said he will seek the presidency. "One of us has to win," Connally said.

# Rockefeller mourned by presidents, family

NEW YORK (AP) - Nelson A. Rockefeller, the former vice president whose life-long aspiration for the presidency fell short three times, was mourned by presidents and family members at memorial services Friday.

"That Nelson Rockefeller is dead is both shattering and nearly inconceivable," said former Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger, his voice breaking with emotion. "One thought him indestructible, so overpowering was his energy, warmth and capacity for love. His buoyant vitality, his deep faith in man's inherent goodness, uplifted all those whose lives he touched."

Among the 2,500 invited quests at Riverside Church were President Carter and his wife. Rosalynn; former President Gerald Ford; Lady Bird Johnson; Vice President and Mrs. Walter Mondale; Warren Burger, chief justice of the United States; more than 70 members of Congress and representatives of more than 70 countries.

Rockefeller died a week ago Friday of a heart attack at the age of 70. Family services were held Monday at the Rockefeller family compound in suburban Pocantico Hills and his cremated remains were buried in a family plot on the estate in line with family custom

Rockefeller served four terms as Republican governor of New York before briefly filling the role of Ford's appointed vice president. But the chief goal he had set for himself, the presidency, forever eluded him.

## Calling cards aimed at preventing rape

NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J. (AP) - Police will distribute unusual "calling cards" next week to female hitchhikers and women strolling alone at night on the Rutgers University campus here.

"If I were a rapist, you would be in trouble," the cards warn. "We're committed to spend time and effort on this heinous crime,"

said Middlesex County Prosecutor Richard S. Rebeck, who coordinated the prevention program with Rutgers University police. The program, to begin Monday, was created after six rapes were re-

ported during the past two school years, Rebeck said Friday. Although student guards, security officers and horsemen patrol the campuses here and in Piscataway at night, only uniformed police officers will be handing out the small, printed cards, said Rutgers Police Capt.

Thomas Thompson "We hope no one is shocked by it," he said. "Hopefully they won't ever put themselves in a dangerous or vulnerable position again.'

The security officials also will be passing out literature, offering rape prevention seminars and using police decoys on campus to cut down the

The key to rape prevention is to make women aware that they can become victims by failing to take the proper precautions, Rebeck said. 'Some women have that feeling that it isn't ever going to happen to

The atmosphere on a college campus often lulls women into a false sense of security, he said - in which they may drop their guard, feeling safe within the confines of the college campus. 'The thing that upsets us is that we've gone to considerable expense to

light some areas," he said. "But in some cases, a girl will walk on the other side of the street."

"Any dark secluded area of a campus is vulnerable," he said. The university also has started a van service to give women nighttime rides from dormitories to the library, but the service is under-used,



# Will women be rabbis?

NEW YORK (AP) - Conservative Judaism, the "middle road" among three branches of the faith, has taken a major first step toward admitting women to ordination as rabbis.

The change was recommended this week by a commission of scholars, including experts in theology, law, sociology, history and biblical standards, after two years of study and hearings.

Women should be admitted to studies for ordination "on a basis equal to that maintained heretofore for males" and when qualified, "ordained as rabbis," the commission

Reviewing mandates of Jewish law, the halakah, the commission said there is "no direct halakhic objection" to such ordinations.

The findings were presented in Los Angeles by commission chairman Gerson D. Cohen, chancellor of the Jewish Theological Seminary in America, to the national organization of Conservative rabbis, the Rabbinical Assembly.

But decisive action on the matter rests, not with the rabbinical body, but with the faculty of the seminary, the Conservative movement's academic center in New York, which trains and ordains rabbis for the country's 823 Conservative congrega-

"It's autonomous in a sense and controls academic standards, seminary degrees and ordinations," a spokesman said. It's sometimes called the "power seat" in the making of rabbis for 1.2 million Conservative Jews. But the commission findings now become a weighty factor.

The faculty — about 50 professors with tenure on a teaching staff of 70 is to decide on the proposed change before May 30, in time potentially for permitting women to apply for rabbinical studies starting this fall.

Of the other two branches of Judaism, the Reform wing opened its rabbinate to women in 1970, ordaining the first woman in 1972. Presently there are seven women among about 1,000 Reform rabbis, ordained by Reform institutions in Cincinnati, Los

Angeles and New York.

An additional four women have been ordained rabbis by a special school. The Reconstruction Rabbinical College in Philadelphia.

However, the third major branch of Judaism, Orthodoxy, the most exacting and literalistic of all in applying biblical and traditional law, strongly rejects ordination of women.

Conservative Judaism, in between Orthodoxy and Reform branches in its approach, maintains that Jewish law is flexible, evolving in keeping with historical developments.

However, the Conservative branch upholds Jewish dietary and Sabbah restrictions. These are not prescribed in Reform Judaism, which emphasizes the ethical content of faith.

Of the 14 members on the Conservative study commission, 11 supported its conclusions that women should be admitted to ordination, while a minority of three dissented.

They said in a brief minority opinion that such a step "would seriously compromise the traditional image of the Conservative movement," and could cause a "possible disruption" of its unity

However, the majority said that no matter whether the decision was for or against ordaining women, it "is going to give rise to some uneasiness in some quarters.'

On the basis of preliminary survey data, the commission said "a majority of the laity of the Conservative movement was ready to accept women in the role of congregational spiritual leader.'

While it would be an innovation in Jewish practice, the commission said "the receptivity to female rabbis" is much higher than several years ago.

Noting that Conservative Judaism fosters education of women but then suddenly differentiates between them and males at the point of studying for the rabbinate, the commission said:

It is "morally wrong to maintain an educational structure that treats males and females equally up to the final stage, but then distinguishes between them at that stage, without a ... clearly defineable halakhic reason for

Conservative Judaism in 1955 allowed women to participate in "aliyah," public reading of the Torah, and in 1973, allowed women to be counted in the "minyan," the minium of 10 for public worship.

Both previously were allowed in Reform Judaism, but not in Orthodxy, which, unlike the other two branches, separates worshippers by



# Nation's unemployment rate slips from 5.9 to 5.8 in January

WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's unemployment rate crept down from 5.9 percent to 5.8 percent in January, a sign that an economic slowdown forecast for 1979 has not yet surfaced, the government reported

The Labor Department said employment during the last month increased by a robust 450,000 as the jobless rate fluttered between 5.8 percent and 6 percent for a sixth consecutive month.

The Carter administration has predicted that the unemployment rate will rise to 6.2 percent by next fall as the government attempts to restrain economic growth as part of its battle against inflation.

Many private economists, in gloomier forecasts, are predicting a recession will set in this year and that unemployment will rise above the modest increase expected by the ad-

Janet L. Norwood, acting commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, said the January employment figures show "absolutely" no signs of recession. "The data clearly shows an

economy continuing to perform at high rates of employment," she told the congressional Joint Economic Committee.

January's job gain boosted total employment to 96.3 million while the number of unemployed fell from 6 million in December to 5.9 million.

The government said the number of working-age people holding jobs during the month climbed to a record 59.3 percent of the labor force. Excluded from the working-age population are children under 16 years of age and adults who are "institutionalized" in prisons or hospitals.

Virtually all of the 450,000 new jobs created in January went to whites, with men taking most of the jobs. But that did not cause any significant change in unemployment rates among any major groups of Americans, government employment ana-

Unemployment among whites was 5.1 percent in January, down from 5.2 percent in December, while unemployment among minorities remained at more than twice that rate: 11.2 percent in January, down from 11.5 percent in December.

Adult men, 4 percent, down from 4.1 percent in December. Adult women, 5.7 percent, down

The government analysts said none

of the percentage changes in these categories was large enough statistically to signal real gains or declines. Some of President Carter's economic advisers contend that a large increase in employment and a parallel decline in the jobless rate from nearly 8 percent two years ago helped fuel inflation by pushing wage rates up faster than could be justified.

As a result, these advisers are advocating action to slow the rate at which new jobs are created in a manner that would reduce upward

# Perez enters guilty plea in oil price hike scheme

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) - Angel P. Perez, retired president and board chairman of Florida Power Corp., pleaded guilty Friday to a conspiracy charge in an alleged "daisy chain" scheme to boost the price of fuel oil sold to the utility during the nation's 1973-74 energy crisis.

Prosecutors claim the alleged multimillion-dollar oil scheme cost utility customers in a 32-county area of west Florida \$8.5 million in overcharges.

U.S. District Judge W. Terrell Hodges said he would not announce whether he would accept Perez' plea until sentencing when federal prosecutors offer evidence of the charge.

Perez, 70, climbed the ladder in the company from a night plant operator during Depression days to the presidency in 1967 and finally to a \$92,000a-year board chairmanship in 1974. When he retired in 1977 he was credited with wielding a tough fiscal policy which brought success to the utility. He spent 41 years with the company.

The rosy-cheeked, gray-haired Perez stood quietly, flanked by his attorney during the 20-minute proceeding and answered the judge's questions in a low voice. He told Hodges he agreed to a plea bargain with prosecutors.

Hodges was deliberate and thor ough in his questions to make sure the defendant understood the nature of the criminal offense and the consequence of his action, such as losing his

The St. Petersburg Times, which spent more than a year investigating the alleged price-fixing scandal, said federal investigators believe Perez collected \$193,000 in so-called finder fees, but denies that the payments were related to Florida Power.

Perez was indicted last Sept. 14 with another Florida Power ex-executive and five oilmen, most from Texas, in an alleged scheme to manipulate the price of fuel oil sold to the St. Petersburg-based utility in the aftermath of the Arab oil embargo.

The scandal stemmed from an alleged "daisy chain" operation of buying and rebuying fuel oil from Texas suppliers, boosting the price with

Trial is scheduled to begin in Jacksonville Monday for five of the seven defendants. Houston oil broker Ray Granlund was granted an indefinite delay this week for health reasons. He will be tried separately later.

Perez was charged with a single count which carries a maximum penalty of five years and a \$10,000 fine. He was accused specifically of breaching his responsibility as head of

The plea agreement did not involve reduction of the charge. It specified that Perez would plead guilty and make restitution, and that the government would make no recommendation as to sentence.

Last month the Florida Public Service Commission and the company agreed to a \$6.5 million refund to Florida Power's 690,000 customers.

But this week, the settlement ran into trouble when the commission voted to approve it but leave the door open for more action in the case. Company attorneys said they would urge Florida Power not to implement the settlement unless the PSC agreed not to reopen the case - even if new evidence turned up. The indictment climaxed an 8-month investigation by

# Tarkanian runs home for Unloved basketballers

LAS VEGAS, Nev. - As high schoolers these players were, to use a show-biz term, monsters. Fat scoring averages, slick moves, rave reviews, heavy pressure from college recruiters. They were superstars.

The center went to UCLA, but the chemsitry was bad. For three years he mostly sat on the bench. Then he saw the neon light.

The forward pined away on the pines at USC, his confidence shrinking and his reputation as a malcontent growing, until he decided to search for greener pastures in the

coach at Houston, was labeled uncoachable, rode the bench and finally packed his bags.

Jerry Tarkanian, Tark the Shark, has always had a knack for taking in players who didn't quite fit in at other schools and fitting them

The current edition of the Runnin' Rebels, although far from his best team at this point, is perhaps the purest example of Tarkanian's special art. Not since his junior college coaching days in the 1960s, when he plucked future stars from faraway ghettos and city beer-league teams, has Tarkanian assembled such a diverse cast of characters and cast-

In spite of the restrictions and suspicions resulting from NCAA-imposed penalties, Tarkanian as lured four top freshmen and four potentially sparkling college transfers to UNLV. It is a frail-looking aggregation, typified by freshman Michael

His Runnin' Rebs finished third in the NCAA tournment two seasons ago, but then th situation deteriorated. UNLV was slpped with à two-year probation (maning no NCAA playoffs) and was dvised to take away Tarkanian's coching job for two years.

He is not intimidatingly suave and slick like some coaches. He dresses causually, even for games, when he wears short-sleeve dress shirts and baggy, off-the-rack slacks. Basically, he is a man of few for-

"At UCLA," says Vroman, "you felt you had to make an appointment a week ahead to talk to the head coach. There was a distance between

the coach and the players, but here you just walk into Tark's office and

talk man to man. Vroman moved from UCLA to UNLV, which in some respects is like moving to the ends of the earth. He is a 7-footer who played on John Wooden's last national championship team. He also played — and sat — for two years under Gene Bartow before de-

ciding to transfer. Vroman first no-

ticed UNLV when both teams were in Provo, Utah, for the NCAA regionals and Vroman watched the Runnin' Rebels work out.

"They looked like they were having fun," Vroman says. "It was the day before a game, but they were working out harder than we did all year. I pictured myself playing that style and enefiting.

HE TRANSFERRED, redshirted last year, and is the starting Rebel

Vroman is white, but six of the eight UNLV regulars are black. Much of the Tarkanian mystique and much of his success is a result of his ability to attract and interact with black play-

"Tarkanian is a Pied Piper of Negro youngsters," wrote Sports Illustrated in 1968, "not only because he is the best junior college coach in California and maybe the country, but also because he and his wife, Lois, take a genuine interest in the players' welfare. Jerry is a combination confidant and disciplinarian and Lois... is a part-time tutor."

Tarkanian was the first coach at a major college to play five blacks at

"I had a lot of success with black athletes when I was at junior college 16 years ago," Tarkanian says. "I had a lot of blacks when a lot of other coaches didn't. They say I exploited blacks. That's so far from the truth. I played them when a lot of these guys wouldn't. If a black kid really itrusts you and has faith, that's the in portant thing. The ones I played have been extremely loyal and have helped me recruit others.'

The result is an unofficial nationwide network of Tarkanian recruiters, many of them black. They will tell a prospective play er

that Tarkanian is a straight shooter.

"Our style of play is attractive," he says. "Kids like to get into a fast game. A lot of coaches tell (high) school) kids, 'OK, we're gonna run when you come to our school, and then the kid gets to the school and they don't run. So many black kids feel they've been lied to so much throughout their lives, if a coach lies to 'em, it causes a bitterness that's really hard to resovle."





PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) -Lon Hinkle, occasionally forced to putt through standing water early in the day, birdied his last two holes for a 4-under-par 68 and a 2-stroke lead Friday after the second round of the \$300,000 Bing Crosby National Pro-Am golf tournament.

Hinkle, regarded by many as the longest hitter in golf, put together a 36-hole total of 138, six under par, despite the typically trying conditions - wet, wind and cold - off the picturesque Monterey Peninsula.

'The wind blew. It was a lot more difficult to play today," Hinkle said.
As an illustration of the strength of the wind, and his own enormous power, Hinkle needed only an 8-iron shot to the par-3 17th hole at Peoble Beach. The hole measures 209 yards. Jack Nicklaus, who isn't playing here this year, hit one of history's great 1-iron shots to that hole in his 1972 United States Open victory.

**HINKLE GOT** his shot 15 feet below the cup and made the birdie putt for the lead alone. He chipped in from 18-20 feet for a birdie-4 on the final hole and stretched the margin to two shots halfway through this unique event that has the pros playing one round on each of three courses before moving to Pebble Beach for the final 18 holes Sunday.

As usual, weather was a major factor. It was windy and cold. A heavy overnight rain left many greens spotted with puddles of water. The sun was shining through broken clouds, but it was shining on snow that

covered the tops of nearby hills. "We were very near to not being able to play," said Leonard Thompson, whose 69 at Cypress Point put him in a tie for second place at 140. "One more little shower and the fourth green would have been unplay-

He paused a moment. "Come to think of it," he grinned, "it WAS unplayable."

THE HUSKY Thompson shared the No. 2 spot with Curtis Strange, who had a 70, also at Cypress Point. John Schroeder, with a 71 at Cy-press Point, and rookie Brad Bryant,

with a 70 at tough Spyglass Hill, were next at 141. Tommy Valentine, with a 71 at Peb-

ble Beach, and Dr. Gil Morgan, a non-practicing optometrist and No. 2 money-winner last season, were at 142. Morgan had a 73 at Cypress The three men who shared the first-

round lead at 68 - Jay Haas, Mike McCullough and Australian Graham Marsh - drifted back in the pack. Marsh, troubled by a pulled muscle in the right leg, limped to a 77-145 at Spyglass. McCullough was 2 shots better on the same course. Haas took a 77 at Cypress. Tom Watson, who kicked off Player

of the Year seasons with Crosby victories in 1977-78, struggled to a 76-148 at Spyglass. John Mahaffey, winner of the Bob Hope Classic, shot a 75 his first round over par this year — at Spyglass and was at 145. Ben Crenshaw, the Phoenix winer, was 75-146 at Spyglass. Lee Trevino took a fat 78 at Cypress and had a 153 total.

"It seemed awful tough out there," said Hinkle, who scored his first tour

triumph and collected \$138,000 last year. "Every low spot, including the greens, was covered with casual water. The pins were all set on

"IF YOU got the ball above the hole, on the slope, you had little chance to two-putt. If you've got it below the hole, you're putting through

casual water.' He ran a 25-footer through the puddles — "about 10 feet of water" — for a birdie on the fifth hole. "If I'd moved it to avoid the water, I'd have had one of those" - he made a wide, sweeping motion with his arm indicating the break - "so I figured it was better to putt through the pud-

He flipped a piching wedge to with-in 18 inches of the flag on the seventh, scored from 20 feet on the 11th, bogeved the 16th from the wet sand of a fairway bunker, then closed with his two birdies.







Tark vs. the NCAA is the hottest rivalry in college basketball, although the two sides are currently observing a sort of mutual cease-



UNLV, to show it is not defying the NCAA, has appealed to have the injuction blocked. The case will eventually be hard by the State Supreme Court.

"Everything's all right, from what my attorney says" is all Tarkanian will say. His case rests on the assertion that a person can't be denied his right to make a living without due process.

The accomplishments of Tarkanian's teams will long be remembered, but he will probably achieve more lasting fame as the guy who stood up to the NCAA

# Arkansas' Sutton plans to apologize

Texas Coach Abe Lemons said Sutton bumped Moore and called him a dirty player.

"I asked him what the hell he was doing badgering my player. He (Sutton) wasn't calm. He was right up against John, raving at him. He was screaming like a banshee. He's not supposed to berate the kids.'

SUTTON DENIED he bumped or shoved Moore. "There was never any contact between us," he said.

# Research has new problem

WASHINGTON - A few years ago, a group of social scientists took some perfectly ordinary children and assigned them to teachers who had been

told they were subnormal. The test was designed to show that teacher attitudes are a major factor in children's school performance. The researchers were right: the children

did badly. The project was a success. Its results were widely quoted, and it may have prevented other children from

being type-cast. But there is a recurrent nightmare among researchers these days that the children in the test will come back to haunt them, claiming they were irreparably damaged. Where they? If so, are they entitled to compensation? And if they are, who pays and how

much? This case is only one in a Pandora's medicine chest that scientists worry about under a new fedral rule on

compensating victims of research. The regulation, in effect since Jan. 2. orders reserch institutions to tell their subject that kind of compensation is available if they should be injured taking part in a project.

THE PROBLEM, RESEARCHERS say, is that the rule does not define injury and does not set up any means of making compensation. It only requires that the human guinea pig be told whether compensation is avail-

"It's so ill-defined, so open ended that in our litigious environment it's really making people cautious," said John Sherman of the Association of American Medical Colleges. "Being told ther is no comensation, a person may just be completely scared away from whatever ordinary project he's asked to take part in.' Even worse, people may decide

they were hurt when it otherwise might never have occurred to them. Suppose someone develops depression in the wake of answering a questionnaire about family food-buying habits. There are no guidelines to decide whether the events are connected, whether depression is an injury, and if so, whether compensation is warranted.

"You're promoting liability - the

might be injured," said Jerold Roschwalb of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges Further questions arise. The basic idea that victims of research should be compensated is universally supported. In the past, research subjects generally found institutions willing to pay for their injuries, but that might have been because few claims were made. A January 1977 study by a Department of Health, Education and Wel

fare task force found that 3.7 percent

of 133,000 research subjects, or nearly

5,000 people, suffered some kind of

injury in the study period. Nearly

four-fifths of those were classified as

"trivial," while only 1 percent, or about 50 persons, were fatally hurt or permanently disabled.

The study looked for horror stories of injured persons left out in the cold, but apparently it found none. The injury rate, it said, was about what all

of us run in the course of daily life.

ONLY ONE INSTITUTION, the University of Washington, currently holds insurance covering possible injury to its research subjects. The Aetna Life and Casualty Co. policy pays only actual hospital, wage loss and other costs associated with an injury, and it cost the university a premium of \$35,000 last year, according to Diana McCann of the Human Subjects Office. In seven years of operation, it has paid off 15 persons, the largest amount being \$1,500, she said. The university has an estimated

35,000 research subjects each year. Still, McCann said, the new federal rule is troublesome. "This policy renews annually and may change, or we may go to self-insurance to save money ... We can't honestly tell subjects we will compensate them in the future, or that we won't do it, either.



## Punk rocker found dead in New York

Sid Vicious was found in a Greenwich Village apart-NEW YORK (AP) - The nude body of punk rocker ment Friday and police said he apparently took an overdose of heroin at a party celebrating his release from jail.

Police said a syringe, a spoon and "what was probably heroin residue" were found near the body when it was discovered at about 12:30 p.m. by the musician's mother, Anne Beverly.

Mrs. Beverly had gone to the Bank Street apartment to awaken her son for his required daily check-in at a police station, Detective Richard Houseman said.

The 21-year-old British citizen, whose real name was John Simon Ritchie, had been released from jail Thursday on \$50,000 cash bail. He was accused of killing his long-time American girlfriend, Nancy Spungen, last Oct. 12 by stabbing her in the

Vicious had been freed once before on bail, but it was revoked after he was accused of hitting Todd Smith, brother of rock singer Patti Smith, in the face with a beet mug during an early-morning fracas in a nightclub.

Vicious, bass guitarist with the now-defunct Sex Pistols punk rock band, was bailed out again Thursday and left jail saying he wanted a slice of pizza.

Houseman said Vicious went to the Greenwich Village apartment, which was rented by out-of-work actress Michele Robinson, for a party to celebrate his release.

The detective said others at the party told him Vicious was "jovial, happy and contemplating a bright future." He drank beer most of the evening, Houseman said, but at about midnight gave himself an injection of heroin.

"About 45 minutes later he went into a seizure, but came out of it," Houseman said he was told.

The party broke up about 2 a.m., and Vicious went to bed about an hour later, the detective said.



## Bathtub baptism offered

ROANOKE, Va. (AP) - Jail inmates who turn to Christ in Roanoke won't have to wait baptisms will be performed on the premises.

The \$6 million city jail under construction will include, to the surprise of some officials, a baptismal tank

The tank will be about 5 feet long, 3 feet wide and 4 feet deep - large enough for total immersion ceremonies.

Sheriff Alvin Hudson said he found out about the tank from a construction worker at the new jail. He said he didn't know who ordered the tank or why.

Only about five or six prisoners from the Roanoke city jail ask to be baptized each year, Hudson said. In the past, they have been taken to a church for the cere-

City Manager Bern Ewert also didn't know about the tank.

However, John Marfleet, the architect for the project, was able to explain the \$1,200 tank. He said it was ordered by a study committee that did much of the planning for the jail.

Marfleet said the committee felt that even though only a few prisoners ask to be baptized, it would be best to perform the service inside the jail rather than break security by taking them to a church.
