

#### Muleshoe's Junked Vehicle Ordinance

The City of Muleshoe's junked vehicle ordinance (Article 8.400 Junked Vehicles) states the following:

#### Sec. 8.401 Definitions

In this article words and phrases shall be defined as follows:

"Junked Vehicle" means any vehicle that is self-propelled and: (1) Does not have lawfully attached to it an unexpired license plate; or a valid motor vehicle inspection certificate. (2) Is wrecked, dismantled or partially dismantled or discarded; or (3) Is inoperable and has remained inoperable for more than 72 hours if the vehicle is on public property; or 30 consecutive days if the vehicle is on private property.

#### Sec. 8.402 Public Nuisance

A junked vehicle, including a part of a junked vehicle that is visible from a public place or public right-of-way: (1) is detrimental to the safety and welfare of the public; (2) tends to reduce the value of private property; (3) invites vandalism; (4) creates a fire hazard; (5) is an attractive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors; (6) produces urban blight adverse to the maintenance and continuing development of municipalities; and (7) is a public nuisance.

#### Sec. 8.403 Procedures

These procedures for the abatement of junked vehicles shall be administered by regularly salaried, full-time employees of the City of Muleshoe, except that any authorized person may remove the nuisance.

A junked vehicle removed pursuant to this article may not be made operable after

#### Sec. 8.406 Inapplicability of Article

This article does not apply to a vehicle or vehicle part: (1) that is completely enclosed in a building in a lawful manner and is not visible from the street or other public or private property; or (2) that is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed vehicle dealer or junkyard, or that is an antique or special interest vehicle stored by a vehicle collector on the collector's property, if the vehicle or part is in an outdoor storage area, if any are maintained in an orderly manner; not a health hazard; and screened from ordinary public view by appropriate means, including a fence, rapidly growing trees or shrubbery.

In this article: (1) "Antique Vehicle" means a passenger car or truck that is at least 35 years old. (2) "Motor Vehicle Collector" means a person who owns one or more special interest vehicle; and acquires, collects or disposes of an antique or special interest vehicle or part of an antique or special interest vehicle for personal use to restore and preserve an antique or special interest vehicle for historic interest. (3) "Special Interest Vehicle" means a motor vehicle of any age that has not been changed from original manufacturer's specifications and because of its historic interest is being preserved by a hobbyist.
