## Leaders Open New Era

WASHINGTON (AP) — Egypt and Israel signed a treaty to-day ending 30 years of war as a first prayerful step toward peace

between the Arab world and the Jewish state.

On a chilly, spring afternoon on the White House lawn, Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat signed copies of the treaty written in English, Hebrew and Arabic.

President Carter, whose peacemaking trip to the Middle East two weeks ago brought the two former antagonists to Washing-

Hundreds lined the black iron White House fence to watch the signing. The signing ceremony was broadcast throughout the United States and back to the Middle East.

Close to 1,000 protesters gathered at Dupont Circle about a mile away to march to Lafayette Park across the street from the White House. They carried Palestinian signs and flags saying: "Palestine Is Not For Sale," "Sadat is a Traitor," "Sadat is

shington's Lackey" and "The Shah is Gone, Sadat is Next." Tonight, Carter, Sadat and Begin planned a celebration under huge, red and yellow tent on the White House grounds with 1,300 dignitaries invited for dinner:

'This is the day we hoped for. Let us rejoice," Begin said be-

thout the region In East Jerusalem, in Lebanon, on the banks of the Jordan River and in the occupied Gaza Strip, Arabs used bombs, rallies and strikes to show their opposition to the treaty. Their leaders

called for economic sanctions and a political quarantine to express their hostility to Egypt for breaking ranks. In Washington, haggling over the final wording of the treaty did not end until shortly before the ceremony. This morning.

State Department officials said experts from the three countries were still working on the exact form of the final agreements reached Sunday night. Carter went over the final drafts of the pact in separate meetings this morning, first with Sadat and then with Begin. It was

not until late Sunday evening, after a final meeting between Begin and Secretary of State Cyrus Vance, that the negotiators

were certain there would be a ceremony today.

Egyptian officials said the final compromise involved an Israeli pledge to withdraw from the Sinai oil fields seven months

after the signing of the treaty instad of nine months as the Isra-elis had wanted, or six months as the Egyptians proposed. American officials confirmed this schedule and said it repre-sents, basically, a return to an agreement tentatively struck

months ago.

Sadat arrived at the White House for the treaty signing and a conference with President Carter at 10 a.m. CST. They posed for pictures and Carter told the Egyptian leader he saw "a good opportunity in the next few months to open up Egypt to American investors." Begin arrived about an hour later.

The Israeli prime minister presented Carter with a book of photographs of Carter's visit to Jerusalem. Carter gave both Sadat and Begin a volume of photographs beamed from the Voyager spacecraft as it orbited Jupiter.

Carter broke an impasse between the two countries last September at Camp David, where he persuaded Begin and Sadat to agree to a compromise under which the two countries would make peace.

Egypt would regain the Sinai and Israel also agreed to begin negotiations on an autonomy plan for the West Bank and Gaza Strip that would require the end of Israeli military government and the withdrawal of Israeli troops to specified areas.

Negotiators met in Washington to conclude the treaty and in November announced that they had reached a tentative agree-

But in the interim, the rest of the Arab world condemned Sadat for making peace with Israel without getting a guarantee of Israeli withdrawal from all the territory it had taken in a 1967 war. Sadat requested tighter links between the peace treaty and solution of the Palestinian problem, while the Israeli Cabinet

raised objections of its own. From the verge of peace, the two sides again stepped back. The negotiations became more rancorous this time and threatened to break down altogether. Finally, Carter went to Cairo and Jerusalem earlier this month. His mission seemed about to fail before a dramatic breakfast meeting with Begin resulted in

Under the final agreement, Israel will begin withdrawing from the Sinai within three months, vacating the principal city

of El Arish. Within nine months, Israeli troops are to withdraw to a line drawn between El Arish in the north and Ras Muhammad in the south, giving Egypt two-thirds of the Sinai.

After 10 months, Egypt and Israel are to exchange ambassadors and Israel must withdraw to its 1967 borders within three

A saddened Lubbock Fire Department today continued its investigation into the deaths of three of its men, who apparently succumbed to toxic fumes early Sunday while fighting a fire at a 34th Street restaurant.

But early this afternoon the question of the specific cause of the death of the three - Larry Tucker, 25, Kenneth H. Haggard, 34, and Eddie C. Swafford, 30

Fire Chief Tom Foster said this morn-

cates the men, despite their wearing air pack masks, inhaled toxic fumes, resulting in bleeding in the lungs.

The deadly fumes, which officials say could be caused by any number of burning chemicals, apparently seeped through the firefighters' safety masks moments after they entered a smoldering building at 711 34th St. shortly before 7 a.m. Sun-

The fire at Moris Kitchen and Ice Cream Parlor, formerly Underwood's Bar-B-Q Caleteria, not only killed three men, but sent two firemen to Luband respiratory problems for other fire-fighters called to the scene at 4:30 a.m.

Eugene Melcher, 38, and Robert Perkins, 21, were rushed to West Texas Hospital after battling the blaze, but were released at 8:55 a.m. today.

Foster said the department today had not learned what caused the fire or why the fumes were able to penetrate the air masks. Foster and other fire officials this morning were testing the masks, distributed by Scott Airpack of Dallas and Hous-

District Chief Lee Turner said that be-

the ones worn by the dead men, had rup-tured filters. The filters, located in the masks' air regulators, appeared to have been penetrated by some type of chemi-

Asked if the filters were checked regularly, Turner said, "They will be. They hadn't been up until now.


Several sources have said it appeared the toxic furnes had been emitted by burning ceiling tile. "That seems to be the obvious thing right now," Foster said

However, the chief added that the mysterious case was still under investigation and no conclusions had been reached. "I've speculated on this until I'm not going to speculate anymore."

The chief said it was not known early today how long Tucker, Haggard and Swafford had been in the smoldering structure, or who was the last person to The one-alarm call came in at 4:30 a.m.

Swafford had been a member of the department since April 28, 1973. Haggard had been a city fireman since April 1, 1969. And Tucker had been a fireman less than a year, joining the department July

"These guys were like all of our men. They were quality people," Fire Chief Tom Foster said this morning. "They didn't take unnecessary risks and I don't think they took unnecessary risks this time. I don't think you could have found finer boys anywhere," Foster added.

For two city firemen, the Sunday morning tragedy not only meant the loss of friends and co-workers, but also that of a brother.

Dennis Haggard, 31, and Thurmond Haggard, 37, are both firemen at the department's station at the Lubbock International Airport and the brothers of Kenneth, who was pronounced dead at 9:30 a.m. Sunday at West Texas Hospital.

Thurmond, who has been a Lubbock fireman 13 years, said he talked Kenneth into joining the force. "He was real happy. I never thought we made a mistake until yesterday," Thurmond said this morning during a telephone interview.

"I loved him like a brother, and he was like a daddy too since our father died." said Dennis, attempting to keep from crying. "He would have done anything See TRAGEDY BRINGS Page 14

### Syria Interrupts Flight Of WASHINGTON (UPI) - Syria today make a slight turn to verify his position

ordered a Pan American World Airways jumbo jet carrying 105 people to make an unscheduled landing in Damascus, but the plane was allowed to depart after three hours on the ground, U.S. officials

State Department officials said Syria claimed the plane - Pan Am Flight 24 violated Syrian airspace on a non-stop flight from New York to Dhahran, Saudi Arabia. They said it was released after paying a landing fee, but no fine.

Department officials said the Pan Am pilot, Capt. Frank J. Altomari, apparently had navigation equipment problems and was ordered by flight controllers to Officials said the turn may have led to the alleged violation of Syrian airspace.

A State Department spokesman said details on the incident were "very confused." He said he had no confirmation that Syrian fighters were involved, as some officials reported initially.

The unexpected landing by the U.S. jet came only hours before the signing in Washington of the Egyptian-Israeli peace treaty. There was no immediate indication, however, of a link between the jetliner incident and the signing of the treaty that has raised the ire of many Arab na-

ed in Damascus at 7:40 a.m. CST. There were conflicting reports about what time the plane left Damascus, with the FAA saving 11:15 a.m. and Pan Am officials saving 11:48 a.m.

The FAA reported the plane's destination as the Persian Gulf island of Bahrain. But Pan Am said the route - heavily used by oil industry officials from the United States and other nations - recently was changed to go to Dhahran instead.

Pan Am officials said the flight carried 14 passengers in first class and 75 in economy class. Officials said the crew included five in the cockpit, 10 flight attendants

The FAA said all 105 still were aboard when the plane took off from Damascus for the nearly two-hour flight to Dhahran. Pan Am said U.S. embassy personnel were in touch with passengers while the plane was held in Dam

A White House aide told reporters the Syrian government "requested" that the plane land, but that it was not forced down by fighters. Other officials said the plane was ordered to land by Syrian con-

A Pan Am spokesman, Brad Dressler, said the Boeing 747SP jetliner left New York at 9 p.m. Sunday and originally was

"According to the information we have received, the airliner was asked to come down," a State Department spokesman said. "It has been alleged that the plane had violated Syrian air space."
State Department officials said there were apparently no injuries or shots fired during the incident.

"We do not know precisely what the circumstances of the landing were," said Pan Am spokesman James Arey. "We

have been in touch with the captain. He said that he was proceeding to Dhahran." Earlier today two bombs exploded near the U.S. embassy in Damascus. No inju-



tate - \$7.6 million - after taxes. Valued at \$10.1 million upon Presley's death in 1977, the estate grew to \$15 million the following year with record royalties and other income, according to probate documents filed last week. Expenditures, including taxes, left \$7.6 million on July 31, 1978.





The singer's former wife, Priscilla, was not a beneficiary But she has received a total of \$192,000 in alimony and child support payments and also got \$12,000 from an insurance policy. Elvis and Priscilla Presley were married in 1965 and divorced in 1973. Lisa Marie was their only child.

## IRS Telephone Service Sparks Solon Concern

By United Press International Sen. Thomas F. Eagleton, D-Mo., says

he finds it "just absolutely incredible" that Internal Revenue Service employees provide information about federal income tax returns over the telephone.

Wilson Fadely, public affairs officer for the IRS in Washington, told UPI Sunday a caller can get data from a return by giving only a name, an address and Social Security number.

"I consider that to be just absolutely incredible," Eagleton said from his Washington home

Eagleton and his Missouri colleague Republican Sen. John Danforth, said they want to investigate the situation Danforth is a member of the Senate Finance Committee, which oversees the IRS and some other agencies.

'It seems to be a little loose to me.' Danforth said during an interview from his home in Washington. "I have griped so much about violations of the right to privacy in so many different contexts that it is something that interests me.'

Dennis Bollmaier, disclosure officer for the IRS in St. Louis, told UPI Friday the agency required written requests for copies of returns but would furnish information from a return over the telephone.

Information that could be obtained by phone, Bollmaier said, included income, the amount of tax and the refund

Fadely said by telephone from his home in Maryland that he talked with another official at IRS headquarters in Washington before confirming Bollmaier's statement. Asked what was meant by the confirmation. Fadely said:

"That if a taxpayer inquires — giving his name, Social Security number and address - he can get information from his tax return."

It was pointed out one person could pose as another over the telephone with-

"Like I mentioned before," Fadely said, "we will - hopefully our people will use judgment, you know, in giving out this information.

'If they have some reason to believe that it may not be the taxpayer, they may do something like, say that 'We'll mail it to the address you gave us, or at the taxpayers' address.

Fadely said IRS clerks may ask additional questions to confirm the identity of the caller. He was asked if questions were asked of all inquirers.

"I can't say they do it on all inquiries that's correct.

If an imposter sounded convincing. Fadely admitted, he would only need to give a name, address and Social Security

### **Newton Awaits Retrial Decision**

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) - Black Panther leader Huey Newton, whose murder trial ended in a hung jury, is to find out Tuesday whether he will be tried again in the street shooting of a prosti-

Newton, who fled to Cuba and jumped \$42,000 bail shortly after the Aug. 6, 1974, shooting, also will learn whether contempt of court charges will be filed against him.

Newton, co-founder with Bobby Seale of the Black Panther Party in Oakland in 1966, refused orders from Alameda County Superior Court Judge Carl W. Anderson to disclose during cross-examination the names of people who assisted his escape. He said his helpers were "friends who would be harassed by the IRS."

## Years, Garwood Comes Home

GREAT LAKES NAVAL TRAINING STATION, Ill. (AP) - Marine Pfc. Robert Garwood came home accused as a traitor, speaking with an accent and as a stranger to his loved ones. But he cried at returning to the United States.

"I love you America, I'm glad to be home," he shouted over the din of reporters and photographers, with a big smile on his face.

On advice from his attorney, Garwood refused comment Sunday on preliminary charges that he deserted in time of war, urged American soldiers to quit fighting and unlawfully communicated with the Viet Cong during the Vietnam War.

"The only one who knows what has gone on in the last 14 years is Bobby Garwood," said Dermot Foley, his civilian attorney. "Let's give him his constitutional right to presumption of innocence and remember that the last 14 years have not been very good for Bobby. Let's give Bobby the additional benefit of compas-

Garwood, accompanied by three Marine officers, arrived in Chicago Sunday after a 15-hour flight from Okinawa, Japan. He was kept away from reporters at the airport and was seen only for about one minute when he entered the Navy hospital here for medical tests.

He was taken to a room for a reunion with relatives, including his father and stepmother, all from Greensburg, Ind. They will have three days to visit with

Marine Corps officials said Garwood read letters from his family during the plane trip. "They brought tears to his eyes, knowing that his family still supported him," said Capt. Bob Bowen. "He was 18 when he saw his younger brothers and sisters, and now they have families of

their own. He was just happy to hear about their lives.

"And he was just happy to talk to Americans in English. He hadn't spoken much in English in a long time - he's got a definite accent. But he was just happy to order American food in English."

Lt. Col. Arthur Brill said Garwood 'isn't under arrest. ... He could get up and leave if he wanted to, but he doesn't want to." He said Garwood's official status is that he is assigned to the hospital and would be there for "an indefinite



## Cambodian Refugees Describe Killings

ARANYAPRATHET, Thailand (UPI) Cambodian refugees say their country is a chaotic killing ground neither as peaceful and organized as Hanoi claims, nor as opposed to the Vietnamese inva-

sion as Peking says.
Living in near anarchy between the Vietnamese occupation army and Khmer Rouge guerrillas, the Cambodian people are attempting to enjoy their partial, and probably short, spate of freedom by filling their bellies for the first time after four years of Khmer Rouge rule.

Recent refugees to Thailand said they saw Khmer Rouge kill villagers consi-

stopped them.

'The crowd beat them to death." But while refugees said the people hate the Khmer Rouge, they do not trust the Vietnamese either, despite good treat-

Officials of the new pro-Hanoi Cambodian government were frightened and appeared to function mostly as interpreters for the Vietnamese, they said.

"I saw dead, stinking bodies along the roads," Ty said. "We heard the guns every night and saw many burned-out trucks and tanks."

## Working Couples Tax Break?

WASHINGTON-A new federal income tax revolt is brewing. Involved are those battling against the added taxes that married couples pay

or the so-called "marriage tax." Legislation sponsored by more than 100 mem-bers of Congress would do away with provisions

in the current tax laws that critics claim discriminate against working couples.

Take, for example, a working couple with the husband earning \$15,000 and the wife earning

\$10,000, for a total income of \$25,000. If they file a joint return, claiming the standard deductions, their income tax will be \$4,057 or \$535 more than the tax on two singles with those same incomes. That's 15.2 percent more than

the singles pay.

At higher levels of income, the marriage penalty is even stiffer. A husband and wife, each of whom earn \$30,000, must pay \$3,654—about 24 percent—more than two single people with the

THIS DISCRIMINATION against working couples is caused mainly by the fact that they derive no benefit from the income-splitting feature that is built into the schedule of tax rates normally used by married couples

Under the present tax laws, they can elect to file separate returns, but if they do, they come under special rules that are quite different from those for single persons and usually end up pay-ing more tax than if they filed joint returns.

With more than 20 million tax-paying couples

now paying the annual marriage penalty, the law-makers led by Sen. Harry Byrd, I-Va., chairman of the Senate Finance Taxation Subcommittee and Rep. Millicent Fenwick, R-N.J., report that strong pressure is now building up in Congress to end this discrimination

More than half of all wives are now in the labor force and with their numbers growing, Sen. Byrd and Rep. Fenwick stress that both conservative and liberal women's organizations are calling for

AS A STARTER, Sen. Byrd plans to hold early hearings on legislation to let married couples file as singles as they could before 1970.

If passed by Congress and signed by the President, the proposal would save these taxpayers an estimated \$2 billion each year.

Although administration officials have opposed this approach because of the huge loss of government revenue, Sen. Byrd believes that President Carter will have no other alternative but to sign the legislation if Congress passes it. There are two basic reasons for this conclusion.

During his campaign for the presidency, President Carter called for an end to the so-called narriage penalty. But the tax reform package he sent Congress early in 1978 proposed no change. Rather than break his campaign pledge, Byrd believes the President will approve the legislation if sent to his desk by Congress.

ence is that the marriage penalty discriminates against women in particular and the President is courting the women's vote.

To illustrate the women's problem, Sen. Byrd is citing the following example

"The wife of a \$20,000 a year worker takes a job that pays \$7,000. The federal income tax alone will siphon off about 30 percent of all she earns. If the husband earns \$30,000, the tax will take about 37 percent of her pay-not counting social security taxes."

These situations, says Sen. Byrd, represent an unfair bias against women because they are regarded as a secondary earner even though their earnings are used to help finance children through college and care for aged parents as well as pay other bills.

CRITICS OF the marriage penalty charge that the law is a significant barrier to a number of young people getting married.

There is even evidence that it may be one of the major reasons for the recent rapid rise in couples living together without getting married.

To support this argument, the critics cite the rapid rise in cohabitation without marriage since Congress in 1969 wrote the so-called "marriage tax" into the present laws.



## Shoppers Riding High On Food Price Spiral



(Fourth of five columns) IN THE FACE of soaring food prices and a spiral that would have inspired deep resentment and at least mumblings of a boycott a mere few

years ago, you are starting to return to your mon-ey-saving habits, even though, as the following shows, you are still spending relatively freely. Fewer of you are cutting back your meat pur-chases, according to a survey conducted for the Food Marketing Institute, a leading supermarket trade association.

Fewer of you are avoiding prepared or ready-made "convenience" foods; fewer of you are shopping at different supermarkets to take advantage of special sales than two years ago. And more of you actually are buying impulse items.

THESE ARE among the findings of a survey by pollsters Yankelovich, Skelly and White. Launched in 1974, the survey is repeated regular-

But the above results, while still valid to some extent, date back to the spring of 1978-and data just collected for the first two months of 1979 suggest you are again increasing your efforts to

Consumer resentment over the cost of food is not yet as intense as during 1974, when food prices jumped about 14 percent. The findings your worries about prices in general reflect a mounting resignation to relentless infla-

To gauge how consumers feel about food prices, the survey has developed what it calls the "Outrageous Food Price" index based on shoppers who indicate they were infuriated by the prices of 11 items.

United Press International Writer The coup d'état this month in the tiny Caribbean island nation of Grenada, the first ever in a former British colony in the Western Hemisphere, could have profound consequences for the region.

Americas — Canada, Jamaica, Trinidad-Tobago, Barbados, Guyana, the Baha-mas, Grenada, Dominica and St. Lucia — already are fully independent. Three others — St. Kitts-Nevis, St. Vin-

cent and Antigua — will soon follow suit, while Britain for the time being keeps eight territories in the Americas as colo-

nies: the Falkland Islands, Belize, Anguilla, Bermuda, the Cayman Islands, the Turks and Calcos Islands, Montserrat and the British Virgin Islands.

Most Latin American countries — and most former British colonies on other continents — have long histories of military coups and violent overthrows of their governments. But British territories in the Caribbean — the independent nations as well as the colonies —all seemed to have a holy respect for the British are to have a holy respect for the British parliamentary system.

Democratically, voters got a chance every five years to change their government or give the sitting government a new mandate.

At least, that's the way it was until the coup in Grenada, the spice-island in the eastern Caribbean with a population barely over 100,000. The coup was staged by left-leaning opposition leader Maurice Bishop against Prime Minister Eric Gairy, a maverick who went around the world

talking about flying saucers but who was widely viewed as oppressive at home.

Although he was denounced by the opposition as a tyrant and a violator of human rights, Gairy's Grenada United Labor Party held a parliamentary majority of nine seats against six for Bishop's opposition alliance built around the radical New Jewel Movement.

The coup could be significant because, for the first time, residents of the English-speaking countries of the Caribbean have been given the idea they don't have to wait every five years for elections, sometimes viewed as fraudulent anyway, to change their rulers.

The Grenada coup also could scare those who feel their power threatened in othe nations into dictatorial measures such as closing down parliaments and stifling opposition.

MONROE, La. (UPI) - Gov. Edwin Edwards today testified former Rep. Otto Passman, D-La., offended South Koressman Tongsun Park by returning gold cuff links and other jewelry on a

Edwards was called as a prosecution witness in the conspiracy, bribery and tax

accused of taking bribes from Park to arrange United States rice sales on which Park earned huge profits.

The governor underwent only 22 minutes of direct questioning by government prosecutors. He was second witness today as the trial went into its fourth week.

Edwards came to the stand after defense cross-examination of former agriculture marking official Frank McKnight.

Edwards, who accompanied Passman on the 1970 trip to Korea, said he accepted gifts from Park because he did not regard them as substantial.

gave me some items of jewelry to give to my wife and daughters that he knew on a first-name basis," Edwards said. "He gave Congressman Passman some cuff links, but (Passman) asked me to return them to Tongsun with his appreciation. "It was kind of like a double insult -

"As we got ready to leave. Tongsun

Edwards said he pleaded with Passman to accept the favors, but Passman steadfastly refused and said he did not want to get involved in any way with Park.

"Tongsun was offended by it," Edwards said. "I told him I would be glad to take them back to Elaine and the girls. I tried to get him (Passman) to keep (the jewelry). I told him, 'It's no big deal, if you don't want them just give them to

er than a gesture to Passman. "He (Park) left me with the impression that he was buying the sweet potatoes as a concession for what I had done for

him," Edwards said, Asked what Park would do with 1,000 cases of sweet potatoes Edwards said. 'Park indicated he probably was going to have to give them away or eat them him-

Edwards also said Passman dealt with Park when necessary but never became

personal friends with the South Korean. They were not friendly. Park was trying very hard through me to get Otto

to like him. Otto had the opinion that we

persona non grata with Korean officials.' In previous testimony, Passman was accused of selling watches to Park at inflated prices to cover payments from Park. ### Miss Marvin **Slated To** Take Stand

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Michelle Triola Marvin's suit claiming \$1.8 million of actor Lee Marvin's assets is in its final days of testimony, with Miss Marvin set to make her final appearance on the witness stand.

Miss Marvin, 46, the former showgirl who lived with the actor for six years, was to testify today as the last witness in her rebuttal case as the trial enters its 11th week

conclude by Wednesday.

Superior Court Judge Arthur Marshall will receive written briefs on the case from attorneys before they present final arguments April 10. He has said he will issue a written decision in the case shortly thereafter.

Miss Marvin has testified about her love affair with Marvin twice before in the trial. Her attorney, Marvin Mitchelson, called her as one of his first witnesses when he opened her case in January.

These omnipresent computers, he adds, will be equipped with IQs eqivalent to those reqired by construction workers and bank tellers, and will respond to ad lib oral commands and requests. Everyone, he says, "will be a DP (data processing) manager."

Dr. J. Daniel Couger, professor of com-puter sciences at the University of Colo-rado, says newborn infants will be prov-ided an "ankle-attached transducer," which will monitor their health and warn parents of any problems. As the infant grows, more sohisticated wrist devices will be provided to monitor health and to instruct him. More and more sohisticated

instruct him. More and more sohisticated versions will be provided everyone throughout the various stages of adolescence and adulthood, for education, entertainment and communication, he says.

Common throughout such future visions is the belief that computers will in every way enhance life. But certain trends, even today, suggest this may not be so. Too often, say some critics, computers are designed to deprive people of participation in their work.

Peter Schwartz, a noted futurist at tanford Research Institute at Me

Peter Schwartz, a noted futurist at the Stanford Research Institute at Menta Park, Ca., is another who believes the computer revolution contains the seed of social disruption, as well as possibility of greater democracy.

Schwartz, who recently helped produce a TV docu-drama called "Roots of the Puture," which will be broadcast in 1980, says the microprocessor, combined with breakthroughs in telecommunications, has produced "a new wealth-information. Some people will have more of it than others will...We are going to have information rich people and information poor people."

To Schwaritz, this means the "Information Age" could create a new "underclass" of people who lack the skills necessary to take advantage of the new technology.

He also fears that the expanding com-

new technology.

He also fears that the expanding computerization of the world may actually increase our sense of social alienation and lack of community. "I think, on the whole, it's not necessarily a very desirable direction to go in," he says.

But that may change as new genera-tions of people, raised with computers, come of age, he adds. "A culture is being created, the kids are really comfortable with microprocessors and calculators and computers in a way that their parents and I never were."

and I never were."

Given this adaptability, he feels, the computer could help to radically change the existing political and economic structure, opening it up to wider and wider participation by people at the base of the social pyramid. The information explosion, he says, offers at least the potential for creating new, ad hoc linkages among millions of citizens, allowing them to organize and respond to events and thereby increase everyone's political power.

"What I suspect we're going to have are global-flowing power structures that are short-lived and that influence things as long as they are needed," he said, cit-

as long as they are needed," he said, cit-ing the student anti-war movement of the 1960s as the kind of organization that would be best served by "information

would be best served by "information networking."

"It amounts to an effective expression of global consciousness," says Schwartz. Ideally, he adds, the revolution now taking place will involve "a transformation in consciousness, a kind of expansion of the brain. As we have become 'technological man' through extending our physical capabilities and senses, so now, with the microprocessor, we are extending human consciousness."

WASHINGTON (AP) — An early-warning system has been set up in Mexico that is expected to give U.S. producers of corn, soybeans, sorghum and wheat advance warnings that new crop diseases may be headed their way.

The Agriculture Department said the cooperative U.S.-Mexico effort involves the planting of the four crops — using breeding lines that are susceptible to ma-jor diseases — at five experiment stations in northeastern Mexico.

James O. Lee, deputy administrator of the department's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, said the crops are examined each month for signs of new diseases or evidence of new types of existing diseases.

"Early warnings of new disease threats in field crops are important because there is no practical way to treat for diseases in the field," Lee said.

With the warning system in Mexico, he said, U.S. scientists and others hopefully will have time to develop preventive techniques such as resistant varieties before the diseases are carried into major crop-producing states.

The blasts Sunday night were the responsibility of an anti-Castro group known as Omega 7, according to a telephone call received by The Associated Press. The male caller, speaking with a Spanish accent, promised "similar actions will continue". tions will continue

On Dec. 29, 1975, a still unsolved explosion at LaGuardia Airport killed 11 people and injured 75. Authorities estimated the blast, for which no one claimed responsibility, was the equivalent of 25 sticks of dynamite.





## House Panel Lauds U.S. Intelligence Agencies

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Nearly a month before Chinese Vice Premier Deng Xiaoping's visit to Washington, President Carter knew China was likely to attack Vietnam and tried to dissuade his visitor from carrying it out.

A tipoff from American intelligence sources came in early January and was corroborated by other sources, says Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., chairman of a House subcommittee on intelligence oversight.

Carter. Aspin said, told Deng privately and "in no uncertain terms" that he disapproved of any such attack - but his pleas had no effect.

Aspin's committee has held closed hearings with government analysts over the past few weeks to determine the quality of U.S. intelligence in this latest Indochina conflict

In a subcommittee report and an interview, Aspin concluded: "On the whole, the intelligence community served the nation well in the Indochina crisis

"Its ability rapidly to observe, assess, and report military preparations informed policy makers of impending Vietnamese, Chinese and Soviet actions well in advance," he said.

During his U.S. visit in February, Deng warned publicly that China would "teach a lesson" to the Vietnamese, but his meaning remained mysterious. Chinese troop movements were observed at the time of Deng's visit, but their aims were not certain and until now it was hard to assess the warning of the im-

Later the Soviet Union accused the United States of encouraging, or at least acquiescing, in the invasion, but administration officials flatly denied the

The intelligence community's prediction of the Vietnamese attack on Cam-

bodia in December, China's intervention against Vietnam, and Moscow's atti-

tude were described in the subcommittee report.

The subcommittee found that the Strategic Warning Staff at the Pentagon

warned early in January that: "The Chinese may choose to engineer a strong localized demonstration of Chinese power along the frontier."

Aspin said the Strategic Warning Staff has a more "alarmist bias" than other elements of the U.S. intelligence community. In June 1978, it predicted "a military incident" between China and Vietnam with "growing potential for escalation into a more exercises coefficient. tion into a more serious conflict."

At that time, the intelligence community as a whole did not regard a China-Vietnam conflict as likely, Aspin said, but, "they (the Strategic Warning Staff) were right early about Vietnam's attack on Cambodia, and China's attack on

### Cool Front Rolls Deep Into Area

A cool front swept into the South Plains this morning, causing temperatures to dip a bit in much of Northwest Texas. Fog was reported behind the front in the Texas Panhandle.

The mercury reached 58 degrees in Lubbock at 11 a.m., but passage of the front dropped the reading to 57 at 1 p.m. A high in the mid-70s had been forecast here today.

Generally fair and mild conditions are forecast through Tuesday in Lubbock, allowing area residents a glimpse of summer before the expected midweek arrival of a new upper level disturbance brings cloudy skies and the chance of showers.

The approach of the disturbance is expected to cause increasing cloudiness Tuesday over the Hub City, with the posof showers extending from Wednesday through Friday. Along with the threat of precipitation, area tempera-tures are predicted to cool slightly to highs in the 60s.

Temperatures this afternoon and Tuesday were forecast to climb to the mid-70s, with a low tonight in the mid-40s.

Lubbock temperatures Sunday were just as ideal - an afternoon high of 76 degrees and a low of 42 degrees.

Across the state, weather conditions early today were also placid. Mostly fair skies over the entire state this morning were expected to remain over North Texas today while partly cloudy skies develop over portions of southern Texas.

High temperatures today were expected to range from the 50s in the Panhandle, the recipient of a mild cold system from Kansas early today, to the 70s and 80s elsewhere in Texas.

Spring has officially arrived, but winter still held some parts of the nation in its icy grip today, with snow reported in parts of the Midwest and the Northeast. A weakening spring storm brought new

snow to the Dakotas and Minnesota, while both snow and rain were reported in Nebraska.

To the east, snow fell in Michigan, the northern half of the Ohio Valley and parts of West Virginia. Rain continued in a few places in New

England early today, with light showers reported on the North Pacific and mid-

His lawyers contended Spenkelink was denied adequate hearings on claims that electrocution is an "unnecessarily tortu-rous and wantonly cruel means of execution" and that Florida's death penalty laws are unfairly imposed on the basis of race, sex and economic condition.

Florida has not executed a prisoner since 1964. There were 118 prisoner's on Florida's death row as of last month.

been switched on, indicating the men were aware of a foreign substance entering their air flow.

Fire Marshal Robert Stokes and a team of investigators were at the fire site about noon today trying to determine a cause of the fatal blaze. "We're not going to do any more guessing until we know for sure what caused the fire," he said at the 34th Street location.

If the ceiling tiles are proved to be the cause, a source said, the fire marshal's office will check with the manufacturer about distribution in this area.

Preliminary results from autopsies ordered by Justice of the Peace Wayne LeCroy reveal evidence of smoke inhalation, traces of carbon monoxide and internal hemorrhaging in the three dead

Foster said the department will have to wait for complete autopsy reports and re-sults from the Department of Public Safety's toxiology lab in Austin on the firemen's urine and blood before deterng what chemicals emitted the

Asked if the tragic incident will change the department's procedures in fighting a fire, Foster said, "What we find out will bly change our procedures.

"We're not going to wait around for someone else to die. We thought we had the best equipment and the best training available to us."

The chief this morning met with Stokes, and deputy chiefs Horace Anglin and Wayne Mahaffey. Foster said he would call on the families of the victims and then continue heading up the investigation at the station and on the scene of

Tucker, of Route 4, Lubbock, was pronounced dead at 8:30 a.m. at Methodist Hospital by LeCroy. Slaton resider Swafford was pronounced dead at 9:12 a.m. at Health Sciences Center Hospital. And Haggard, of 4410 17th St., died at 9:30 a.m. at West Texas Hospital.

Foster said the three men were taken to different hospitals so they could get maximum emergency treatment.

Blood tests were administered to the 16 firefighters who had been at the tragedy scene. The men were from station th at 30th Street and Texas Avenue and from central fire station at Sixth Street

Although none of the firemen from central fire station was admitted to a hospital, several reportedly were suffering from headaches, minor respiratory prob-lems and skin rashes Sunday.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The prospects that the Senate will ratify the expected strategic arms limitation treaty are shaky," says former Secretary of State

the shock even greater.
Says fireman H.G. Trammel: "It's going to be a great loss to the department. The full blow hasn't hit yet because we're still in a daze."

## Reception In Dallas Unexpectedly Warm

DALLAS (UPI) - Texans wanted to visit with President Carter during his half-day, tightly scheduled visit Sunday. and made the most of the scattered opportunities here and there. A 12-year-old

named Burton did it the best. Carter, likey looking ahead one day toward the signing of the Mideast peace treaty in Washington, breezed through three appearances and then left for the nation's capital but an unexpectedly warm reception slowed him down and delighted him a few times.

Carter arrived at Love Field with no fanfare, lunched privately with Democratic leaders, submitted to interviews with local television stations and then made a speech to the National Association of Broadcasters convention.

## Carter Wants Less Regulation

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter, saying it's time to regain control over the government bureaucracy, is pro-posing legislation to streamline a "regulatory assembly line" of federal rules and paperwork.

In a speech to the National Association of Broadcasters, Carter said Sunday that he will send to Congress today "a comprehensive proposal to reduce, to rationalize and to streamline the regulatory burden throughout American life."

"For far too long," he declared, "we have acted as if we could throw another law or another rule at every problem in our society without thinking seriously

about the consequences."

The president said many Americans encounter a "bewildering mass of paperwork, bureaucracy and delay" in dealing with the federal government and are not willing to support "needless rules, excessive costs, duplication, overlap and

After announcing the proposal in Dallas, the president returned to Washington to prepare for today's signing of the peace treaty between Israel and Egypt. The president said the signing may be "the most significant occurrence during my own term as president.

The NAB speech capped a weekend of presidential travel that began Saturday in Elk City, Okla., with a warning to business to comply with the administration's

anti-inflation program.

Carter told the broadcasters that 90 separate regulatory agencies issue 7,000 new rules each year. As a specific exam-ple, he said the Federal Communications Commission requires 18 million man-hours a year from broadcasters to fill out

The legislation would extend to independent regulatory agencies such as the FCC the same requirements Carter imposed last year by executive order on line agencies under the control of federal de-

It also would authorize \$20 million over three years for public interest groups that

participate in regulatory proceedings.

Carter said the package would force regulators to "get the job done at the least possible cost": help eliminate outdated rules: insure that regulations are not developed in the "secret inner sanctums of the bureaucracy": and end delays and "procedural nightmares" in the regulatory process.

Before the speech, the president was the star attraction at a luncheon for Tex-as elected officials at the Dallas home of

as elected officials at the Dallas nome of Ambassador Robert Strauss. Strauss, the administration's trade ne-gotiator, said the fried chicken lunch was intended for politicians who could help the president's 1980 election campaign in the state. The guests included John Dal-

ton. a former Dallas resident who is treasurer of the Carter-Mondale Presidental Election Committee.

The president's trip to Elk City fulfilled a promise he made 3½ years ago to return to the small town that gave him one of his warmest receptions as an unknown candidate.

ELK CITY, Okla. (UPI) - The old redbrick church was packed to capacity while a crowd of several hundred milled around ouside, and the minister appeared pleased the special guest who prompted the heavy turnout had stayed in the background as best he could.

At last, there was Poco Timber, descendant of a famous Quarter Horse champion, for the perfect roping horse "to put you where you have to be when you throw that loop.





#### Wildlife Handling **Measures Lauded**

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Cabinet officer said Saturday that reorganization of natural resources management agencies should enhance joint U.S. Canadian efforts to protect the wildlife and environ-

ment along the international boundary. In remarks prepared for a meeting of the National Wildlife Federation in Tothe National Wildlife Federation in Toronto, Canada, Interior Secretary Cecil D. Andrus said President Carter is proposing a new Department of Natural Resources "in scale with the scope of its undertaking, a department with sufficient mettle to meet its continuing task: the truly enormous job of listening carefully and acting wisely."

Excerpts of Andrus' remarks were released here by the Interior Department.

### Teamsters President Remains Undecided

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Teamsters President Frank Fitzsimmons said today his union has not decided whether to call a nationwide strike or a selected walkout against a few firms if a settlement is not reached with the trucking industry by midnight Saturday

Fitzsimmons made the comment as he entered negotiations today at a suburban Arlington, Va., hotel. A strike could cripple the nation's transportation system. Unofficial and incomplete reports

showed rank-and-file Teamsters voted during the weekend to authorize a strike if the leadership determines it is necessary. The 300,000 truck drivers and warehousemen voted in their respective local union halls

Asked if a decision had been made on whether to conduct a nationwide or selective strike, Fitzsimmons replied: "No, sir, we haven't. We'll make that decision later on.

Asked to assess the bargaining situation as talks moved into the final week before the old contract expires, he replied. "Well, we're still trying. An industry source said progress was

made during the weekend on non-money portions of the agreement, and the two sides were resuming discussions on such issues today "I would be greatly surprised if it (the

strike option) were disapproved," union spokesman Bernard Henderson said Sunday. "Members usually give their bargainers authority to call a strike fairly

The Teamsters initially asked for a 35 percent wage-benefit boost during three years, including a 14 percent to 15 percent wage hike the first year. The union rejected the industry's initial offer of a 6.9 percent wage hike the first year.

Last week the Labor Department reported a 1.2 percent rise in the Consumer Price Index for February, the largest jump in more than four years. Chief industry negotiator J. Curtis Counts said the increase lessens the chance of the union accepting a contract within President

Carter's 7 percent wage-price standards. Teamsters Local 705 in Chicago voted 1,931 to 82 in favor of the strike authorization - 96 per cent. Union officials said suburban locals were voting in favor of a

Officials said Ohio's 16 union locals, representing about 35,000 workers, were solid in their endorsement of a strike.

In New England, the strike authorization call was reported passing easily. And in St. Louis local 600 passed a strike authorization by a 10-1 margin, officials

Johnny J. Raney, president of local 667 in Memphis, Tenn., said 1,300 workers voted to strike compared to about 80 negative votes. A 397-12 strike call was reported in New Orleans

don't want to play baby games any more.'

"It's just my way of telling you, son. It's our secret code."
"I know, I know," I said. "I'm tired of your silly secret code. Three squeezes, one-two-three. I love you. I mimicked in full-toned sarcasm. Never again,

The words burned in my mind as I stared ahead. I could still see her hurt Three squeezes always had been our love language. Because of that simple code, countless cuts and bruises had been healed. How often had we sat in

church hand-delivering our secret message, or had walked through the park saying, "I love you", in silent communication? During my 16-year lifetime Mom and Dad must have invested a trillion hours per year just helping me. Ever since I could remember there had always been

thoughtful rewards, and lately, dollar bills for feeding my gas tank or feeding my date. But always delivered with our secret code, the secret code that my hands had, only two hours ago, grown too large to return. I had never faced a problem entirely alone before. Rog ha always shepherded

the state gives us six months to be certified. While the clinical requirements of (the other portions of the course) can be completed in hospital emergency rooms, we need 100 hours of mobile intensive care unit experience for the

cardiac segment," he said. The six defibrillators EMS wants each monitor a person's heartbeat and, should the heart stop, administer an electrical shock to start it beating again. The hospital district is hoping to raise enough money from private donations to the foundation to

purchase the equipment Once the equipment is installed in the ambulances, paramedic students must obtain 100 hours of experience using it on ambulance runs to meet state certification requirements, Enabnit

Enabnit added that he is hopeful the equipment will be purchased soon and that by July, Lubbock will be served by a crew of paramedics who can treat patients more effectively The EMTs already have been practicing part of their training

for more than two months. In late December they completed the first segment: administration of intravenous fluids. Through radio contact with the four hospitals which offered Plains, West Texas, Methodist and Health Sciences Center the technicians assess a patient's vital signs to emergency room personnel and, if the technician thinks the patient needs intravenous treatment, he asks to speak with the physician on call, who will then either agree to or deny the request.

Statistics for January and February of 1979 show that of the 70 intravenous requests made by EMTs, physicians approved 58 almost 83 percent. EMTs were able to have the IV in place before reaching the hospital in almost 76 percent of the cases.

The IVs are vital in instances where a patient is suffering from a severe blood loss, is in shock or is having a diabetic seizure." Enabnit said.

He said that in a recent auto accident, in which a person was

pinned in his vehicle, EMTs administered two IV solutions to the patient before he was freed from the wreckage And though many physicians were at first hesitant in granting

the EMTs permission to administer IVs, Enabnit said, most doctors now have confidence in the technicians' abilities to discern when an IV is necessary and to administer it. "We (EMTs) are covered under malpractice insurance and so

are most of the doctors (at the hospitals)," Enabnit said. Additionally, attorneys for the Texas Medical Association

which helped set up the paramedic program have stated: "The physician would not be responsible for actions of the paramedic in an emergency situation while in two-way radio communica-

They said that under the Texas medical malpractice act of 1977. "no person shall be liable in civil damages who admi-

nisters emergency care in good faith. The second part of the program, which includes a total of 300 hours of clinical experience in addition to the classroom studies, is advanced airway management, or breathing

Enabnit said he expects the EMTs to put this portion of their training, which includes performing tracheotomies, into effect about the time all classroom work in the course is completed next month.

Then, all the EMTs can do is wait - and hope - for the cardiovascular care equipment before advancing beyond just being "specially skilled," he said.

Angered by security policies, alleged assaults by inmates and the bludgeoning death of a veteran guard captain, guards at both prisons walked off the job Sunday in similar, but apparently unrelated, protests. Guards in both strikes demanded better security and more guards. Pay was reportedly not an issue.

Felix Mokychic, 60, was bludgeoned to death with a baseball bat at the Pennsylvania prison last Tuesday. An inmate has been charged in the slaying.

### **GOP Senators** Introduce **Health Bill**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas and two other Republican senators introduced a health insurance bill today that they say will protect all Americans from catastrophic medical expenses.

"What we are offering is a bill that can pass," said Dole, a candidate for the GOP presidential nomination in 1980. "It is a responsible Republican alternative. Dole was joined by Sens. John C. Danforth, R-Mo., and Pete Domenici, R-

N.M., in introducing the bill Under the Republican plan, Medicare benefits would be expanded, employers would be required to make at least catastrophic health insurance plans available to their employees and the government would subsidize premiums for low-income people not covered by public or private health plans.

"It will create a health insurance program providing a means for all Americans to protect themselves and their families from financial bankruptcy caused by catastrophic illness or medical expense, Dole told reporters.

He said initial cost estimates for the bill, if passed, would be about \$500 million in fiscal 1981 when the Medicare part would be initiated, and \$3 billion in fiscal 1982 when the entire program would be-

Last week, President Carter proposed a limited "phase one" health insurance plan that would protect Americans against catastrophic health costs and expand some benefits for the aged and poor. It would cost \$10 billion to \$15 billion beginning in fiscal 1983. Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass.,

however, criticized the president's plan and vowed to submit his own comprehensive national health insurance plan next month. Kennedy also is drafting the final ver-

sion of a bill intended to hold down rising hospital costs. The Senate Finance Committee also will begin hearings Tuesday on another catastrophic health insurance bill offered by Chairman Russell B. Long, D-La.

Long's bill would cover all Americans for medical expenses after the first \$2,000 or after 60 days in the hospital, beginning Jan. 1, 1981. It would also broaden the Medicaid program, now generally available only to welfare recipients, to include low-income workers.

most promising new drugs in the war on cancer may prove to be as old as the human body itself, three researchers say.

Drs. Jordan Gutterman, Kurt Isselbacher and Saul Green are each involved in developing a different natural anti-cancer substance to fight the disease that causes one of every six deaths in the United States. This new generation of natural drugs,

most of which are still experimental, have the advantage of being produced normally by the human body, the doctors said Sunday at an American Cancer Society seminar. Thus they are less poisonous than con-

ventional anti-cancer drugs, which often

make patients violently ill and can even induce new tumors. The new drugs also have in common an element of mystery: doctors know they

work, but not how or why. Also a mystery is their precise chemical composition. "It could be we are looking

don't know that yet, but I think it's possible," Isselbacher, of Massachusetts General Hospital, said in an interview. The best-known of the natural cancer

lated in 1957.

Tests in Sweden have shown that interferon doubled the survival rate of children with bone cancer. Doctors at 10 U.S. medical centers, including Gutterman at M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston, have just begun using it on patients with cancers of the lymph system, bone marrow, skin and breast. The \$2 million trial is sponsored by the Cancer Society. Isselbacher has found that another

promising anti-cancer drug, known as CAGA, can cause a 90 percent reduction in growth rates for human breast and pancreatic cancers transplanted to mice. Unlike interferon, which is species-specific - meaning that only human interferon will work in humans - CAGA from humans works equally well against hamster tumors.

Green, of Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York, has discovered a substance he calls nHG, which has killed some human tumors in mice as at different parts of the same elephant. I quickly as 24 hours after injection into their blood.

But all three of the natural cancer drugs are expensive. The interferon used in the U.S. tests costs up to \$450 a day.







# Ex-Tech Star Still In Gym

What happens to the college athlete when his playing days are over and there just isn't any room for him in the pros? Suddenly he can be yanked from the

limelight into that "real world" that his professors always warned them about. The feeling must be something akin to that of the man who falls out of the boat, in deep water, without a life jacket.

For Keith Kitchens, who was a playmaking guard at Texas Tech from 1973-77, the choice was a natural one. He headed back to shallow water- Shallowater, Texas that is.

— and make a contribution.

Then he served as a graduate assistant to Coach Gerald Myers in 77-78 and got his degree that May. Kitchen's still attends Tech's home games when he has the chance but admits that it hurt's a little to go back.

"But it made me realize how fortunate was to get to play at a big college," he added. "Not many people get that opportunity. And I know my days are over. The players now are bigger, faster and can

He is reported to be seeking a top administrative position at UCLA.

Israel, for its part, found Sadat's overture offered the shining opportunity of taking Egypt — the most powerful and populous of the Arab states — out of the

A U.N. Security Council resolution adopted after the 1967 war and reaf-firmed after the 1973 conflict said peace would be based on Israel relinquishing captured territories in exchange for

The 1967 war resulted in a thorough rout of the Arabs. But the 1973 war ended in a near tie, an arrangement Kissinger may have helped by the timing of U.S. arms shipments and cease-fire negotia-

An overwhelming Israeli victory, Kis-singer believed, would have so discredit-

With the war's end, relations between Cairo and Washington, broken by Egypt in the 1967 war, were repaired. Egypt, meanwhile, had cut most of its links to the Soviet Union and U.S. policy was geared to replacing Moscow's role in the "moderate" Arab world.

The war brought another force into play: first a temporary oil embargo against the United States and then a four-fold increase in oil prices.

Russians sent it and Syria \$2.6 billion worth of arms and other equipment to re-place losses suffered in the 1973 war. Egypt and Syria were the principal com-batants with Israel in that war.

Thus, the cost of arms resupply alone, without accounting for inflation, human costs and the cost of equipment shipped to both countries, was more than is now

being sought for the Egyptians.

Members of Congress want to see the administration's justification for the expenditures, but there is little indication they will not support Carter's requests. Sen. Gary Hart of Colorado, a young







The four-year-old, non-profit organization is trying to get blacks to think of alcohol in unglamorous terms.

"Because of a combination of a lot of factors," said Ronn Rodriguez, regional director of the commission, "black people have relied on alcohol since slavery

In doing so, he said, they have created shockingly high mortality rates for themselves compared to whites. Miss Tate said alcohol misuse had also figured in a high percentage of crimes committed by blacks, according to several studies.

The opera is loosely based on Charles Dickens' book, "Great Expectations." But the very wordy libretto - sometimes too detailed to be understood - abandons much of the novel. By presenting itself as an inquest, the opera focuses largely on the character of Miss Havis-ham and the reason for her madness and

The difficult and busy score, conducted by Julius Rudel, had few sustained melodic lines. Instead, it set moods and provided the framework for the numerous monologues and dialogues.

The opera ends in a grueling, 20-minute sung and spoken monologue by Miss denounces her memories and the "wickedness and cupidity" of men."

Miss Havisham appears first as an aged, ugly woman perishing as the wedding gown she has worn for half a century goes up in flames. The rest is the usual stuff - belch jokes, jokes about Roper's sexual equip-





By VERNON SCOTT HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Ken Howard, a king-sized blond Caucasian, is the star of "The White Shadow," the only dra-matic television series on the air dealing seriously with the black experience in ur-

Howard, 6-foot-6 and 200 pounds, plays a basketball coach in a ghetto school with a predominantly black enrollment. Most of the faculty, including the principal, are

Miraculously, the series avoids blackwhite cliches, sentimentality and idealized liqle credited with much of what "The White Shadow" represents. The series was his idea to begin with.

A veteran of two unsuccessful series, "Manhunter" and "Adam's Rib," the big guy was a basketball flash at Long Is-

thing about it. "I came up with the idea of an ex-pro-fessional basketball player becoming coach of a largely black team," Howard said. "I took the idea to (producer) Bruce Paltrow, the husband of Blythe Danner, my costar in 'Adam's Rib

He worked in New York theater, made

a few movies, appeared in such Broadway hits as "1776," "Child's Play" and "Seesaw," getting good notices. But he wasn't exactly setting the world on fire.

A couple of years ago Ken was bemoan-ng the low quality of weekly television fare when a friend suggested he do some-

"Bruce picked up on the format right away and built it into its present form. He understood the racial aspects of the show immediately. If the series was going to work the coach had to be a tough, cocky, impatient guy.

"He calls his players 'animals' and sometimes 'girls' to get them soing

Bruce never wanted me to be a nice, sincere, wonderful man. The coach is a guy who loves basketball and wants to win.

"We decided never to let the audience know he really cares for these guys. The show is colorful, full of action but nonviolent. There are no shoot-outs or car

"The important thing is the baseketball court, which isolates the characters from

other elements. It's easy for us to get into human values without leaning on heavy sociological implications.

"The coach ian't a great white liberal knight. But our stories manage to bring more weight to bear on racial problems than any other TV show has ever done. We go as far as network restrictions allow ne."

Howard played basketball with blacks, learning the game as a kid on play-grounds. His Amherst team was Illy white. He can indentify with the problems of the black population and with the young black actors on the show.

"The White Shadow" was getting its share of the ratings — as high as 17th — until CBS moved it from Monday to Sat-

urday nights a month ago. The Nielsens dropped drastically. Now the network has shifted it back to Mondays.

Howard said black viewers approve of the series and the role he plays.

"Almost without exception black people tell me they like the show," he said. "They even stop my car to say, 'Right on!' A few have called me 'blood' and 'brother."

brother."
"The spirit of what they're saying is, 'You're okay for a white dude,' And that's fine with me.
"Until now, shows based on sports have never done well on television. They usually put too much emphasis on the sport itself. Also, the sports action was ludicrous and unbelievable."



### **Avoiding Fats**

By LAWRENCE E. LAMB M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a 15year-old male. I am 5 feet 10 and weigh 145 pounds. A year ago I went on a diet and lost 25 pounds. By most standards, I am at the right weight. The problem is my stomach and chest are still flabby - not as much as before. I would like to know if I should lose more weight and exercise or just exercise. Also, I would like to know

what kinds of exercise I could do.

DEAR READER — Yes, by most tables your weight is fine. The prob-lem is that tables provide weight in pounds and are not designed to tell whether a person is too fat or not. The only way you can tell if you are too fat or not is by how much fat there is underneath the skin. Regardless of your weight, if you have a reasonable amount of fat deposits underneath your skin, you are too fat.

At your height, weight and age, I would be reluctant to suggest that you try to diet anymore. If your abdomen and chest are flabby as you say, I would prefer to see your gradually develop a good exercise program that will help build up your muscles.

As you use calories for exercise, you may eliminate any excess body fat

that you still have. At the same time, you'll be developing muscles. There will be a trade-off effect. The end result might be that your weight would be about the same but more of your body would be muscle and you would

have less fat. You should use exercise that involve using the chest muscles and the abdomen since that seems to be your greatest concern.

You might also take a good look at your legs and see if you have enough muscles in those. It sounds to me like you need a generalized calisthenic program that includes sit-ups, pushups, leg lifts and perhaps exercises for

your legs and arms.

Talk to your physical education teacher and see what facilities are available to you that you might be able to use. A number of school gymnasiums have exercise equipment that's really quite good in developing muscle strength. This way you ean use exercises that contract the muscles over the front of your chest and develop the musices between your shoulders for good posture as well.

Then, of course, to maintain your improved fitness you need to develop some exercise hobbies that you like. If you don't like them, you probably won't stay with them. If you're interested in tennis, you might try to devel-op some skill in that. Swimming is an excellent exercise and if you don't know how to swim, you ought to learn

Jogging is wonderful to develop the heart and vascular system and, for that matter, the endurance of the leg. It will not do the thing you are inter-

ested in for your appearance in terms of your chest and abdomen. What about those stories about peo-ple dropping dead when jogging? Peo-ple who have heart disease die in bed, in cars and wherever they happen to be and while doing an unending list of things. The ones who get in trouble are usually those who overdo it and try to beat the clock. You won't have this problem at your age.

### 30-Year-Old Wagon Finally Finds Home

NORWALK, Conn. (AP) - The Little Red Wagon. Kids collected scrap metal in them for the war effort in the 1940s. For years, they've been used to haul newspapers and the like. Even today, you'll see one racing lickety-split down a hillside, a screaming youngster aboard.

At one time or another, almost every

child has yearned for one Here is the story of one Little Red Wa-gon, an Overland, delivered to a store in Norwalk from the factory in Omaha 30 years ago. It remained in that box all that time,

untouched by a child's hands. It was in the store's basement until the shop went out of business last year, and it was turned over to a church for sale.

There, the Little Red Wagon was pur-chased for \$5, probably about what it

would have cost in the Christmas season of 1948. Most of its kind built then have long since rusted away.

Out of the box, each solid steel part, painted red or black, was wrapped in sheets of the Omaha Evening World-Herald of April 25, May 1, May 5 and May 14, 1948, and the Chicago Sun-Times comics section of May 2, 1948.

The newspaper wrapping was a history of this Little Red Wagon's earliest days. In Washington, the newspaper said, the House approved an appropriation of \$55.-859,690 "containing an anti-communist provision affecting an estimated 1,600

### Terrorist Activities Undermine U.S. Peace Efforts

By GEORGE GEDDA WASHINGTON (AP) — Last December, administration spokesmen were touting the American peace effort in Namibia as the most successful U.S. undertaking in Africa during 1978.

Since then, a steady stream of bomb-ings, executions, abductions and other terrorist activities in Namibia have left administration officials wondering whether peace is a realistic objective in that often-ignored area of Africa.

South Africa is being pulled in two directions as it weighs the merits of allowing the territory, also known as South-West Africa, to become an independent country through U.N.-supervised elections.

For one thing, South Africa's military presence in the dry, underpopulated, Texas-sized territory is expensive. The South Africans also realize that an accommodating attitude toward Namibia could boost their sagging international

On the other hand, Namibia provides a 1.000-mile buffer zone for South Africa between it and Marxist-ruled Angola, where more than 20,000 Cubans have been stationed for the last three years. The installation of a hostile regime in the Namibian capital of Windhoek could pose new security problems for South Africa along its northwestern frontier.

The dilemma is not restricted to South Africa. Namibia's main guerrilla group. the South West Africa People's Organiza tion, or SWAPO, has been waging a 12year war against the South African presence. Its forces have shed much blood in the process and it feels no other group in the country has as much right to take power in an independent Namibia

But could SWAPO win a neutral election? South Africa does not believe it can. The United Nations has designated SWA-PO to be the sole legitimate representative of the Namibian people, but, as the South Africans see it, this simply demonstrates that SWAPO is much more popular outside Namibia than inside.

Despite the intense mutual suspicion between South Africa and SWAPO, there were clear signs last year that the two sides were ready to let U.N.-supervised

#### **Home Woes** Overshadow Peace Trip

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Americans are pleased about the Israeli-Egyptian peace treaty and their part, through Jimmy Carter, in getting it accomplished. To the national pysche, playing a major role in a peace settlement is the morale-bolstering equivalent of winning a war.

But as has been said repeatedly in recent weeks, Carter's foreign policy accomplishments aren't going to get him re-elected next year.

He surely knows that, and it is of some ficance that on his return from the Middle East, he turned immediately to

the domestic problems that do cast a low over his second-term prospects. There are plenty of those problems, but mone are more central to his political future than inflation and energy.

If prices continue to rise at near double-digit rates and if oil products be-comes both scarce and prohibitively expensive this spring and summer, Carter will be vulnerable both to challenge from within his own party and to a strong Republican candidate in the fall of 1980

In these areas, Carter needs two things to put himself in the traditional strong position of an incumbent seeking re-elec-

First, he must be able to point to some kind of progress in stemming inflation. Abstruse economic indicators will not do; he must have something to show ordinary people that prices have gone down or held steady. Second, he needs enough oil without

huge price increases to get the country through the next year without serious dis ruption of the life styles Americans consi-

Carter recognized these needs earlier and tried to do something about them. The vital question is whether the programs he put in place in the first two years of his term will pay off in the third and fourth years.

He expended an immense amount of political capital in getting Congress to pass an energy program in 1977-78. Whether the tattered package that emerged from that battle can solve any part of the nation's energy problems re-

mains unproved.

It is possible that the program, even if practical, cannot deliver any political dividend in time to help Carter's political Jortunes this year. If that is the case, it

rould hurt him very badly.

In the anti-inflation battle, he took the risk of igniting a full-scale liberal revolt by holding down his 1980 budget for social programs and sticking to a voluntary

program of wage and price restraints.

If there is no sign of slackening price increases or if wage settlements bust the guidelines wide open in the next few months, both Carter's anti-inflation program and second-term prospects are in

jeopardy.

There were suggestions that Carter would have improved his leadership image even had the peace treaty effort failed, although obviously there was more to gain from success. Good intended to the courage in pursuing them are to

some extent their own reward in foreign relations, according to this theory.

But no one thinks Carter can get off the inflation and energy hooks simply by giving them it his best shot. It is the voter's pocketbook and the voter's car that are at take in these areas. take in these areas.

After two days of intense discussions, the Western five agreed that progress had been made but none was more cautious about expressing it publicly than the American delegation.

South Africa's objections to the absence of any provisions in the U.N. plan for U.N. monitoring of SWAPO bases in Angola and Zambia.



According to South Africa, the U.N. proposals will enable SWAPO to intimidate voters, thus making a mockery of the election process. As a confidencebuilding measure, the United States has

offered to provide the United Nations with electronic monitoring devices capable of detecting troop movements.

South African Foreign Minister Roelof Botha carried this and other proposals back to his government for a decision on whether they are an adequate basis for proceeding with the U.N. plan.

But now American officials are worried about possible new complications. They are wondering whether an influence-buying scandal which is engulfing South Africa will lead to a governmentwide paralysis, precluding a definitive decision on what the country should do about its most sensitive foreign policy issue.
