

To Contract 31.198 Miles Of Paving

James G. Lott, district highway engineer stationed at Amarillo, has released a notice to contractor's this week, of the State Highway Department's intention to let a contract June 21 for 31.198 miles of paving in Sherman County.

The contract includes paving from a point 8.6 miles East of Stratford on the Stratford-Gruber road to the Hansford County line, from the Sherman County line southeast 2.2 miles, from 18 miles east of Stratford north to the Oklahoma state line on farm to market highways 289 and 1289.

Bids will be received until 9:00 A. M. June 21, and then publicly opened and read.

Plans and specifications are available at the office of J. R. Harris, resident engineer at Dumas, Texas.

For example, the first day of the calendar quarters are January 1, April 1, July 1 and October 1. Applications received prior to July 1 will become effective January 1.

New Wheat Farms Eligible For Allotment

Producers who have land in cultivation but have had no acreage of wheat in any of the years 1948, 1949 or 1950, are eligible for 1951 wheat allotments under the following conditions:

(a) The producer files a written request for a 1951 wheat acreage allotment before June 26. Producers may acquire these forms at the local PMA Office.

(b) The land for which an allotment is requested is suitable for the production of wheat.

(c) One of the following conditions is met: 1. The producer can establish the fact that the farm operations have changed and the extent the system of farming to be followed by him in 1951 will require wheat; or (2) It is known that an established rotation system followed on the farm would include wheat in 1951.

Time Is Here For Spraying Weedy Wheat

Thin wheat which producers hope to harvest must be sprayed within the next two weeks if the wheat is to be harvested free of weed seed, County Agent Ernest Goule warned this week.

Previous experience in killing the weeds with chemicals clearly shows that the weeds must be sprayed before they head out for best results in knocking down the weed crop. Weeds past this stage have a stem that becomes so tough that even though the plant is killed it remains standing to give trouble during the harvest season.

Weeds in their present stage usually respond to 2-4-D treatment by falling to the ground, leaving the wheat for harvest.

Commercial aerial spraying firms are listed with the County Agent. These firms and their established spraying charges are available to wheat producers in the Sherman County area.

Tidelands Case Disappoints Mrs. Clark

Britishers Plan Way To Insulate Country From U. S. Recession

LONDON. — "Americans Are Poorer," says one London headline. "Recession, Depression, Or Slump?" asks another. Then on top of this comes the news that the domestic situation in the United States has engaged the attention of the British cabinet. It all adds up to this big question for Britishers: What can the United Kingdom do to insulate itself from the shock of an Amer-

ican depression?

The cabinet's economic committee, presided over by Sir Stafford Cripps, chancellor of the exchequer, is understood to have a plan in the hopper for any such eventuality. But everybody knows that no plan can alter the fact that an American depression would mean a slump in foreign trade which would affect adversely—as indeed it already has done—Britain's efforts to sell to the dollar market.

This move already has been characterized by Sir Graham Cunningham, chairman of the newly formed dollar export board, as a

"matter of self-preservation." Sir Graham put it this way:

"Unless we can substantially increase our trade with the dollar countries in the short time at our disposal, during which Marshall-plan aid will continue (until 1952), we shall be unable to procure some of the most important raw materials needed to maintain our economy and, without that, it seems to me the inevitable result will be more severe unemployment in this country and subsequent deterioration in our living standards.

Zinc is Found Component Of Blood in Light Amount

WASHINGTON.—Zinc, in barely detectable amounts, appears to be an essential component of human blood. Its chief concentration is in the leucocytes, most abundant of the white blood cells.

First measurements of the amount of this trace element, the function of which is entirely unknown but which probably is essential to health, are described in a report just issued by the Nutrition foundation.

It may now be possible, by con-

trolled animal experiments, to determine the role of zinc deficiency in disease.

The experiments, carried out with human subjects in several laboratories, show an average zinc concentration of about nine-millionths of a gram per cubic centimeter of whole blood. Only about one-third of this concentration was found in blood plasma. For the leucocytes, however, the content ran as high as 20 millionths to a gram—or about .03 of a millionth of a gram per million cells.

Leucocytes are the body's infection fighters. They also are the cells

whose multiplication gets out of all control in the usually fatal disease leukemia, closely allied to cancer.

Thus zinc may be an important part of the body's armament against disease.

No important difference was found between healthy and sick subjects, except that in the sick there was more variation in the zinc content of the blood from day to day.

SCIENCE ADVANCES

Electronic Brain Works

WASHINGTON.—A new electronic brain, bigger than an upright piano and looking like a panel of gymnasium lockers, has started thinking big thoughts.

It will think—or remember—for the agriculture department, and hence will cogitate over everything from the Hessian fly to the care and feeding of a goat.

Reporters got their first look at the contraption at a special news conference.

Ralph R. Shaw, librarian, said its real name was microfilm rapid selector; that Dr. Vannevar Bush (who also worked on the atom bomb) first thought it up, and that this is the first such machine ever built.

Photographs, books, pamphlets, index cards, and so on will be photographed on microfilm.

Then when some scholar wants to know all the available information on, say, the Plymouth Rock pullet,

the film will start purring through this machine, 360 feet to the minute. Each page on the film is no bigger than your thumbnail, yet even at that speed the machine will find pullet news and photograph it.

"It works on the same principle as the electronic door," Shaw said, "only more sophisticated."

"The door opens because you have broken a beam of light."

"Here the same thing is done. Everything is indexed in code numbers, represented by dots. The dots have to correspond exactly for the picture to be taken."

Perfect Selection

"In effect, this opens the door, too. But out of 10 million people, it only opens the door for the right one."

Shaw thinks the machine not only will save a lot of space now used for files, but also will enable scientists to take on more difficult research jobs.

John E. Parker, president of the engineering research associates of St. Paul, the company that built the brain, was on hand.

He said the government put up \$56,000 for research on such a gadget, but that that had run out and the company had put in another \$50,000.

Parker thinks medium-sized companies, as well as complex government departments, eventually will have such machines.

Wheat Growers Are Helping Themselves

Sherman County is one of the sixteen wheat producing counties that make up the newly organized Wheat Producers Association of Texas. Officers for the State organization are Carl Kuper, Of Dalhart, President; R. C. Buckles of Stratford, Vice-President; and Kenneth Kendrick, of Stratford, Secretary-Treasurer.

Officers for Sherman County are Kenneth Kendrick, President, H. T. Jackson, Vice-President, and Ernest Goule, Secretary-Treasurer.

Wheat producers of these sixteen counties plan to contribute 1/4 cent per bushel on all the wheat they market. A portion of all money collected will be kept in each county to use to foster their pure seed wheat program. Sixty percent of all money collected will be sent to the State organization. The State will foster the programs to help get rid of surplus wheat, and will send a portion of its money to the National organization which is already set up with temporary National Headquarters at Dodge City, Kansas. Herb Clutter of Holcomb, Kansas is President of the National Organization.

Purposes of the Texas Wheat Producers Association are: (1) To find new uses for surplus wheat, through chemical analysis, and through new industrial uses. (2) To sponsor National advertising campaigns about the various uses which may be made of wheat. To acquaint the general public with facts concerning wheat. (3) To cooperate with the National Association of Wheat Growers. (4) To Employ expert personnel and find new foreign markets for wheat. (5) To work out a program for wheat growers that is acceptable to all sections of the country, and to encourage legislation to embody such a program.
