## Willclo No. 3 Will Make An Oil Well

A second producing oil well in Sherman County has been virtually assured by the showing of oil in the Willclo No. 3 well in the southeast part of the county.

The well swabbed 115 barrels of oil in 9 hours. It has been estimated that the well will probably produce between 200 and 300 barrels of oil when completed.

The Phillips Willclo No. 1 set off a flurry of excitement in the county last year with the discovery of a 250 barrel oil well. Oil from this well has been transported to refineries by truck.

## 1951 Wheat Marketing Quotas

Monday of this week Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan made the announcement that wheat marketing quota regulations would not be effective on the 1951 wheat crop. This means that although marketing quotas are not in effect, wheat farmers in order to be eligible for participation in the 1951 price support program for wheat, must not overseed his acreage allotment.

It is expected that the Secretary will issue a statement giving the National wheat acreage allotment on or about July 10. Individual farm wheat allotments can be expected to be available to producers by July 20.

## 1950 Wheat Price Support Is Announced

The Production and Marketing Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture announces that the 1950 wheat crop will be supported at 90 percent of the parity price as of July 1, 1950, for producers who complied with acreage allotments. The July parity price will be available in a few days when the actual calculation will be made and announced.

If the loan rate for wheat had been computed on the basis of May 15 parity, the national acreage rate would be \$1.97 a bushel. Price support for the 1949 crop was \$1.95 a bushel as a national average.

Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan announced last July that marketing quotas would not be required for the 1950 crop of wheat, but that price support would be conditioned upon producer compliance with acreage allotments. Producers who planted within their wheat allotments will be eligible to receive price support.

Price support for wheat will be effected through producer loans and purchase agreements, as in 1949-50. Storage allowances will be continued on the same general basis as last year. This means that the Commodity Credit Corporation will make farm-storage payments and assume warehouse storage charges on wheat which may be delivered to CCC under the support program.

Loans and purchase agreements will be available through January 1951.

## Will Spray City To Kill Insect Pests

Stratford will be sprayed by plane the early part of next week to eradicate insects if weather conditions permit.

As a measure to make the spraying more effective the City Council asks citizens to cut weeds in order that the spray may cover the ground as completely as possible and result in a more effective kill.

A DDT solution will be used for spraying Stratford. The program to wipe out insects in the city will be carried out as a precaution in an attempt to do away with the possibility of a polio epidemic this year.

The sharp decrease in the number of polio cases in the city following such a precaution in past years has been satisfactory. Citizens may make this insect control program more effective by cooperating in keeping the grounds near their homes and businesses free of weeds.

J. M. (Lank) Chapman, a nephew of Miss Pauline Jones, succumbed to a heart ailment at his home in Los Angeles, California, and funeral services were conducted May 27, according to a letter received this week by his aunt.

Mr. and Mrs. Chapman were packing to take a fishing trip when he became ill with influenza. Physicians state that the heart trouble he experienced was the after effects of rheumatic fever in his earlier years.

Mr. Chapman was a veteran of World War I and lived in Stratford with his mother a few years after he returned home from military service.

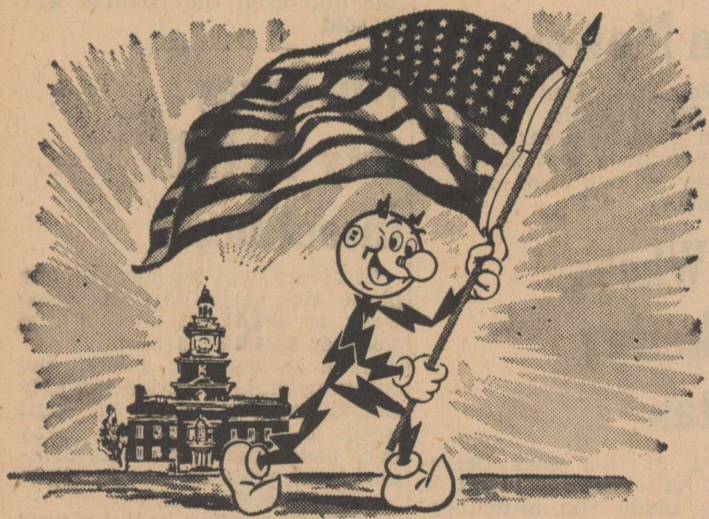

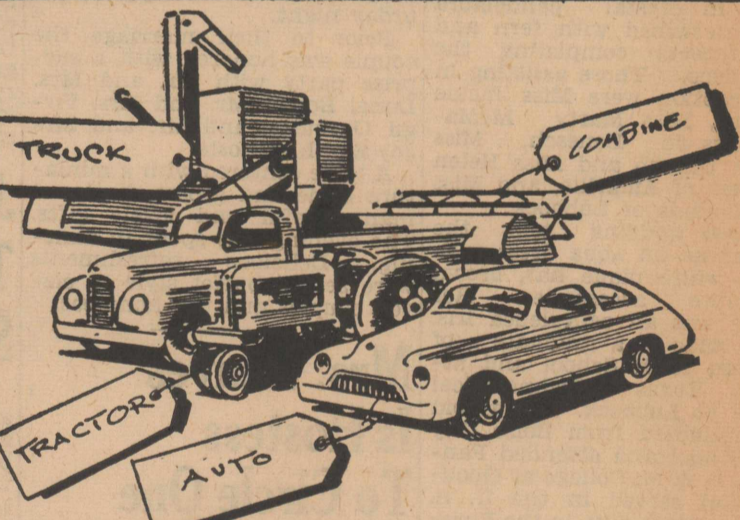

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Gold from Base Metals Have scientists ever succeeded in making gold from a base metal is a question often asked. The answer is yes, but only in extremely minute quantities and by methods which cost far more than the value of the gold produced. In 1941 two Harvard physicists bombarded mercury with atomic bullets from a cyclotron and turned it into a form of gold which was radioactive and itself decayed to other elements in a few days. Also, scientists have been able to produce a radioactive form of mercury, which then spontaneously changes to gold of the familiar and stable variety.

### Old Half Dollar Commemorates Trip

The Old Spanish Trail half dollar of 1935 commemorated the 400th anniversary of the first overland trek on land that now is part of the U. S.

The expedition, heading westward through the gulf states and ending in what is now El Paso, was organized by Cabeza de Vaca, a Spaniard, in 1535 in St. Augustine, Fla.

The 10,008 halves of this special series were struck at the Philadelphia mint in September, 1935, and they were distributed at \$2 each by the El Paso Museum committee, with the profit furthering the museum.

L. W. Hoffecker, El Paso coin collector and later president of the American Numismatic association designed the coin. Edmund J. Senn prepared the models. No portrait of de Vaca is known so, as the explorer's name means "head of a cow," this device was chosen for the obverse (heads) of the coin. The words include Liberty/Alvar Nunex Cabeza de Vaca/United States of America/E Pluribus Unum/Half Dollar.

On the other side is a yucca tree in full bloom superimposed upon a map showing the expedition's route through Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas, the dates 1535-1935 and the words El Paso/Old Spanish Trail/In God We Trust.

Novelty of the design attracted wide comment at the time. Dealers charge up to \$12 for the coin today.

**God's Greatest**

Lesson for July 9, 1950

**A GREAT** man cannot always be  
seen at close range. His con-  
temporaries may not know what to  
make of him. Current celebrities  
outshine him, his enemies cry him  
down, circumstances hide his true  
greatness. You have to stand off  
from him, perhaps several centu-  
ries away, before you can see his  
true height. Great men are like tall  
mountains; within a few miles of  
them, the traveler cannot see them  
for the masses of smaller ridges and  
peaks that hide the distant view. Only  
far out on the plain can we see the  
great peak towering into the blue.

**Not Much Chance**

**MOSES** was such a man. At many  
times in his life, if you had  
been there, you would have thought  
he had very little chance to live,  
much less to succeed. Suppose you  
had seen him in the first three  
months of his life? He was born  
under a death sentence; his par-  
ents were breaking the law of the  
land by keeping him alive at all.

**Then later if you had seen**

him in his sea-going bassinet  
among the reeds in the river,  
you might have thought: Will  
the contraption float? Even if  
a princess finds the baby, won't  
she know what he is and send  
him straight off to be killed?

**Or years later, when Moses was**

a sort of pampered stepson of the  
palace, what promise was in him?  
Pharaoh's court was full always  
of proud young fellows spoiling for  
a fight. Moses might have looked  
to you just like another useless  
aristocrat. And then when Moses  
was out in the wilds, tending an-  
other man's sheep, married to an  
ignorant back-country lass who  
never understood him in the least;  
would you have put much faith  
in that discouraged old ranch-hand?

**God's Man**

**BUT** don't judge a man by  
what his contemporaries say.  
We know now, we have known for  
centuries, that Moses was one of  
God's greatest and best.

**Consider what the world owes to**

that one man. Of all his services,  
let us note three in particular. For  
one thing, we trace the Ten Com-  
mandments back to him. Not that  
he was the first to call stealing or  
adultery or greediness wicked; men  
have known as much since early  
times. But we do associate the Ten  
Commandments with Moses' name.  
He preached and taught that religion  
is ethical; that is, right living  
is tied in with and tied up to right  
religion.

**Faith and life flow into and**

support each other. Some relig-  
ions declare that if a man  
pleases God that is all that  
matters; he can ride his neigh-  
bors as he pleases. Other relig-  
ions (or substitutes for religion)  
say that if a man treats other  
men right he can let God go. Not  
so Moses; not so the Jews nor  
the Christians!

**Moses was also the man through**

whom God revealed some of the  
most important truths we know  
about God. Moses taught his people,  
and through them teaches us, of  
a spiritual God, not like anything  
"in heaven above or the earth be-  
neath or in the waters under the earth."  
God has "no manner of form." God  
is pure spirit, without a body like  
men or like anything.

**To this day men find that hard**

to take in; but it is an important  
truth for any one who wants to  
think truly about God and to find  
him.

**Moses and Christ**

**ABOVE** all, there would have  
been no Christianity if Moses  
had never lived, or if he had failed.  
If the children of Israel had done  
what they wanted to do, sink  
back to Egypt and slavery, the  
whole great history of the Old Testa-  
ment would have been unwritten.  
Poets and prophets would have died  
unborn.

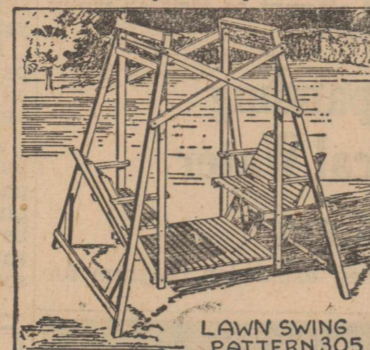
**But he would have had to**

make a start somewhere else  
besides with the Hebrew people,  
and the whole history of religion  
would have been different.  
There would have been no New  
Testament without the Old Testa-  
ment.

**Even Jesus of Nazareth either**

would not have been at all, or  
would have been entirely different,  
if it had not been for the whole  
background of the Hebrew story,  
in which Moses played such a lead-  
ing part. If the world owes a debt  
to Christianity (and what a debt!),  
it owes also a tribute to Moses.

### Austrian Winter Peas Make Good In Hansford Co.

Austrian Winter Peas are making a favorable showing in Hansford County this year. The plants were not harmed by green bugs, and they withstood the drought almost as well as wheat. County Agent Zack Jagers says the fields that were planted early in August made excellent fall and early winter pas-

tures, but were caught by a dry freeze in a luxuriant state of growth and the plants were killed by winter freezing. Peas that were planted late in August and in September did not make sufficient growth to furnish much fall grazing, but did not winter kill. They made excellent spring growth, and by the middle of May had made a deep luxuriant cover on the fields. Although this cover was suitable for a green manure crop, Jagers says that most farmers who had prospects for a seed crop left their peas to be harvested for seed. Jagers predicts that due to the satisfactory showing being

made by Austrian Winter Peas in Hansford County, the acreage will be greatly increased this season.
