

## County Polls Heaviest Vote In History

Sherman County voters polled the heaviest vote in the county's history in the Democratic Primary election Saturday. According to unofficial tabulations 775 votes were cast in the election. The county had a possible voting strength of 965.

In the Governor's race 694 votes were cast for Allan Shivers, 9 for Charles B. Hutchinson, 1 for Wellington Abbey, Jr., 26 for Caso March, 2 for J. M. Wren, 4 for Gene S. Porter, 4 for Mrs. Benita Louise Marek Lawrence.

In the Lieutenant Governor's race 128 votes were cast for W. O. Reed, 29 for Kyle Vick, 33 for Cyclone Davis, Jr., 5 for R. B. McAshan, 32 for G. C. Morris, 8 for Fred Red Harris, 11 for Virgil E. Arnold, 205 for Preston E. Smith, 43 for Ben Ramsey, 98 for Pierce P. Brooks, 11 for Roger Q. Evans, and 10 for Peyton Elliott Womack.

Price Daniel, unopposed, received 743 votes for Attorney General.

For Place 1 Associate Justice of the Supreme Court Fagan Dickson received 251 votes, Will Wilson 222, Walter L. Wray 98.

These things are quite important and the band instructor hopes he will have the opportunity to advise parents before the selection of a musical instrument.

World conditions have been credited with the advance in cost of some instruments from \$10.00 to \$30.00. Advance in the price of other instruments is expected.

A reputable music store has promised the band director to bring a display of instruments to Stratford if enough parents are interested in making purchases. All purchases may be made subject to September delivery.

## Fire Insurance Rate Lowered In Stratford

The Texas Fire Insurance Commission has lowered the fire insurance rate in Stratford from 63 to 59 cents. The four cent credit was obtained through locating the Sherman County Farm Bureau fire truck in Stratford, the fire prevention program inaugurated in the schools, and the passage of an Arson Reward Ordinance by the City Council.

A further reduction in the local fire insurance rate is expected when the Southwestern Public Service Co. completes installation of new fire plugs, completes a new water well and installs a new booster pump. These projects are in a process of construction.

The new key fire insurance rate became effective July 15.

### Santa Fe Executive Succumbs

Lee Lyles, 57, assistant to the president of the Santa Fe Railway Co., died at St. Luke's Hospital in Chicago Friday at noon after an extended illness. Born at Cameron, Texas, August 18, 1883, Lyles entered Santa Fe service as a stenographer

and clerk in April 1911, in the operating department at Temple, Texas. He advanced through various positions in the freight traffic and law departments until 1930 when he was transferred to the executive offices of the Santa Fe in New York City. In June of 1936 he was appointed assistant to the president at Chicago and placed in charge of the newly-organized public relations department, which position he held at the time of his death.

There is a small percent of people that is becoming negligent in the payment of these fees, and this obligation must be met. Some have been cut off for non-payment and others soon will be unless payment is more prompt, and a charge will be made for re-connecting same.

The present council had nothing to do with the building or set-up of the sewer system program, but they do think it is a fine thing for our town and it must be paid for.

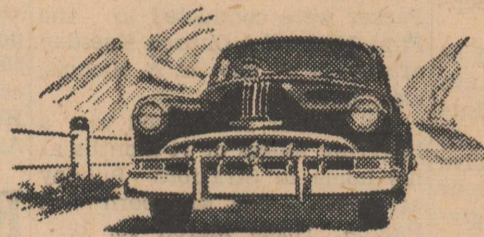

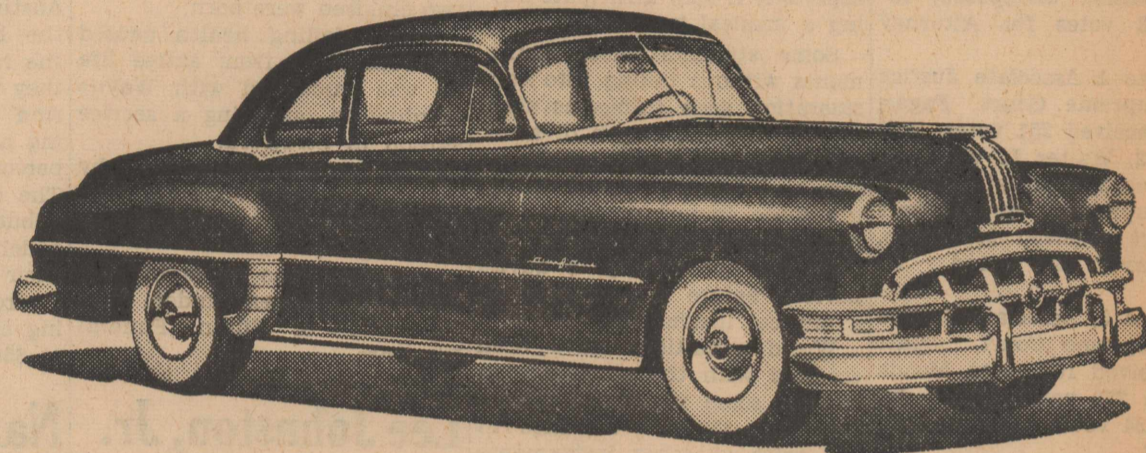

### Malaria

No Longer Health Hazard

WASHINGTON—If the pioneer of a century ago could return to the United States for a day, probably not even our automobiles and airplanes would amaze him more than a simple announcement recently made by Dr. Justin M. Andrews, United States public health service. The announcement was: "Malaria will probably be eliminated as a major public health hazard in the United States by 1952."

To the frontiersman, even in northern states, his life was often built around the "shakes." Preachers scheduled their services and judges set hours for court sessions with an eye to avoiding the time of their recurrent attacks of "ager."

More than one ghost town dotted the Mississippi, the Missouri, the Ohio and other rivers, its surviving inhabitants having fled after as high as 80 per cent of the population fell to malaria.

The disease gradually receded as the effectiveness of quinine as a specific became widely known in the 1840's. However, recent reports place the number of cases in the United States at between 1,000,000 and 8,000,000 yearly with 1500 deaths.

Malaria has been making a stubborn retreat as land has been drained, farmers have moved to the city, and the level of education has become more widespread. With these conditions offering hope for success, the U. S. public health service organized a five-year campaign against the disease in 1947—the campaign which led Dr. Andrews to make his hopeful prediction.

### Ju-Ju Charm Gives Out, User Jailed for Theft

LAGOS, NIGERIA.—Prof. Yesufu Owo, an Arabic scholar, was sentenced to one year in prison because his experiment with a ju-ju charm failed to work.

The professor, a gaunt, bespectacled Nigerian with traces of Arabian blood, said he was convinced he had a ju-ju, given him by an Ibo witch doctor, that was "a sure thing."

It had special mumbo-jumbo to make people sleep while burglaries were in progress.

He put the ju-ju, an inch-square leather sack full of magic herbs and stones, around his neck on a string and went out to test its power.

**NATION WEEPS  
Recalls Last  
War Message**

NEW YORK—A little over eight years ago, May 6, 1942, to be exact, the United States suffered one of its worst defeats after a hard, bitter battle—the fall of Corregidor.

And, it was on that day that Irving Strobog, 22, a radio operator in the signal corps, sent the farewell message that made a nation weep.

Strobog was on General Wainwright's staff and knew on May 5 that surrender was only a matter of hours. He helped set up the broadcast by which surrender was arranged for the next day at noon.

Even with surrender arranged, however, the Japanese continued to attack. Then, when he had cleared all official radio traffic, Strobog began to send his own account of the surrender and moments leading up to it.

approached the tunnel from which he was sending his messages: "My name is Irving Strobog. Get this to my mother, Mrs. Minnie Strobog, 605 Barbey street, Brooklyn, New York . . . My love to Pa, Joe, She, Mac, Garry, Joyce and Paul. God bless 'em all. Hope they will be there when I come home.

"Tell Joe wherever he is to give 'em hell for us!"

That was the last message from Corregidor. Army and navy officials at Honolulu hovered over radios. But there was only silence. A month later a stunned nation wept when the last broadcast was made public.

But Irving Strobog went home to Brooklyn. In October, 1945, he went home just like he said he would. After that there was a round of publicity and welcome that upset Strobog who had spent the intervening years in a Japanese prison camp.

A regular army man, he stayed in after the war and went to Paris for a while. He later resigned to take a job in Paris.

That patchy and profane last message probably shocked the nation as much as did the attack on Pearl Harbor. That was just a little over eight years ago.

**Air Propulsion Soon May Power Barges in Italy**

ROME—Air plane propellers soon may be used to power barges plying Italy's northern inland waterways.

In this way it is proposed to make use of the old Venetian canals whose walls, built centuries ago, could not resist the wash from conventional underwater screws.

The idea of using air propulsion was presented to the recent inland waterways conference in Padua by Prof. Luigi Sante Darios, who has made a long study of the problem of adapting the ancient waterways to modern navigation needs.

## National Farm Safety Week

Were you or some member of your family among the more than one million farm people who were injured last year as a result of a farm accident? A friend or relation may have been included among the 17,000 who met death in some kind of farm accident during this same period. A majority of these deaths and injuries could have been prevented, says E. C. Martin, assistant state agent for the Texas Extension Service and chairman of the State Farm Safety Committee, if those involved had only stopped to think.

He says that the latest available statistics reveal that farm-

ing has moved up from fourth to third place as the most dangerous way of making a living. In 1948, 55 deaths for each 100,000 workers engaged in agriculture were reported. Only the construction industry and mining and quarrying had higher occupational death rates.

The home is the scene of more accidents than any other part of the farm, and falls lead the list of causes. Animal accidents ranked second in the South and West while machinery accidents held second place in the Northeast and Central sections of the nation.

Martin points out that time lost as a result of accidents to farm people amounts to the time needed to plant, cultivate and harvest about one-half of the average annual wheat crop of the nation. Records show

that an average of 20 working days are lost by each person injured. The cost in dollars for medical aid, time lost, and property damage from accidents and fires affecting farm people approximates one billion dollars per year to say nothing of the cost in human misery.

Martin says that something can be done to stop this needless loss. He cites as examples the fine records that have been made by the communities that are participating in community improvement programs. The families in these communities have organized for the purpose of making their communities better places in which to live and almost without exception farm safety has been one of their first considerations.

4-H club members in many counties have conducted farm safety surveys and have tagged with the "cross bone" sign all accident hazards they found on the farm. Refugio county 4-H members last year were pre-

vented a plaque for having conducted the most outstanding program in the state.

Rural fire companies have been organized in several counties and extensive educational programs on fire prevention have been conducted by the extension service in cooperation with fire department officials and other interested groups.

Martin believes that farm people everywhere must become more conscious of the accident hazards that are present on every farm and in many homes. Corrective measures must be taken and every member of the family must be continually on the alert to see that hazards are removed before an accident happens. When safety on the farm and in the home is practiced every day by every member of the family, the accident rate for farm areas will drop, says Martin.

## Set Price Supports For Grain Sorghums

A price support program has been announced for the 1950 crop of grain sorghums. Farmers in Sherman County will be able to obtain price support on grain sorghums at the rate of \$1.75 per cwt. Price support on this grain in 1949 was \$1.98 per cwt.

In the case of grain sorghums placed under loan or delivered to CCC under a purchase agreement in an approved warehouse, evidence must be submitted with the warehouse receipt that all warehouse charges, except receiving charges, have been prepaid, through March 31, 1951, or a deduction of 20.5% will be made from the support rate.

If offered as a security for a farm-storage loan, the grain sorghums must have been stored in the granary at least 30 days prior to inspection for measurement, sampling and sealing. In either case, the grain sorghums must be of any class grading No. 4 or better and containing not in excess of 13 percent moisture.

Loans and purchase agreements will be available from the time of harvest through January 31, 1951.

## Navy Calls For Waves To Re-Enlist

NEW ORLEANS — Four naval activities have been named by the Eighth Naval District to process and give medical examinations to enlisted Wave Reservists who volunteer for active duty.

They are the naval station here, naval air stations at Dallas and Corpus Christi and the naval station at Orange, Texas.

Waves belonging to organized or volunteer units were asked to apply for active duty through their commanding officers. Others should apply by letter directly to the district commandant, district headquarters announced.

Volunteers must have at least one year's obligated service remaining in their enlistments. Accepted Volunteers will be ordered to one of the three Texas examining activities or to the naval station here.

Qualified applicants will then be sent to Corpus Christi for outfitting and to await permanent assignment by the Bureau of Naval Personnel.

### New Plants Program Launched

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has launched a "new plants" program and already more than 2,000 foreign introductions and collections from the wild flora are included in the program.

Plants have been collected from practically all corners of the earth, except Russia and her

satellites. Many have come from Central and South America, Africa, India, Turkey and the Philippines.

The purpose of the program is to find out if the crops under investigation can be grown commercially in Texas or if they can be used in the plant breeding work being done by the Station. Many of these plants may be resistant to disease and the plant breeder will try to breed this resistance into new or improved varieties of our basic crops.

The program is being handled

by a committee composed of Dr. R. G. Reeves, professor of agronomy and genetics, who is chairman; Dr. R. C. Potts, department of agronomy; Dr. O. E. Sperry, department of range and forestry; E. Mortenson, horticulturist, Winter Garden Experiment Station and Dr. H. T. Blackhurst, department of horticulture.

Substations and field laboratories of the Texas Station are studying each crop that the specialists feel may be adapted to the area in which the substation is located.

At Texas A. & M. College, the departments of agronomy, horticulture, range and forestry and floriculture and landscape architecture all have work underway on the program. Field units at Chillicothe, Sonora, Weslaco, Winter Haven, Stephenville, Montague and Yoakum with crops that may be adapted to those areas.

Under study are many species of oilseed crops that have not previously been produced commercially in Texas. Among the horticultural crops are new peaches, cucumbers, cantaloupes, avocados and other tropical and sub-tropical fruits. Many of the introduced plants consist of new types of old crops while others are either uncommon in Texas or entirely new. Some are obviously not adapted to Texas agriculture, but are being studied because they may have characteristics that will prove valuable to the plant breeders.

This new crops research program in the United States is organized on a national, regional and state basis and Texas was the first state in the Southern region to get its project going.

Director R. D. Lewis of the Texas Station, is the administrative adviser for the Southern region.

#### Capitalism Most Undersold System, Stassen Reports

WASHINGTON — Capitalism is the most undersold economic system in all history and socialism and communism are the most oversold, Harold E. Stassen recently told a group of business men.

Correcting the situation is a job for industry, he added. It could mean the end of the cold war and possibly prevent the much talked about third hot war.

"It is my view that the most important single informational job that needs to be done in America is to develop a better understanding by American workmen of the modern capitalistic economic system of which they are a part.

"If they get to thoroughly understand it, they will never change it . . . They will force both major political parties to stop the drift toward socialism in America . . . This country will retain such freedom and economic power that it

will definitely win the cold war, and roll back the tide of communism and oppression," the president of the University of Pennsylvania said.

He said it was not surprising that the American workman is misinformed about the operation of his own economic system.

"He has been subjected to a steady bombardment of misinformation by left wingers, by many labor leaders, and by many politicians."

He added that the task of informing American workers is "a job to be done in your town, in your plant, in your own office and among your neighbors—by you."

#### Ways to Finish Birch

Birch is a close-grained wood that does not require a paste filler. It can best be given a mahogany or walnut color with a penetrating stain. While it is often given a natural finish with a gloss or dull varnish, a lacquer or a wax, it supplies an excellent base for enamel and may also be bleached.

**GOLF BALL AND GEIGER COUNTER**

More and more privileges are being taken from us. Scientists are about to make it impossible to lose a golf ball. In Akron, Ohio, a rubber corporation has turned out a radioactive ball which "talks" amid the weeds, dead leaves and tall grass. The supplemental equipment is a miniature Geiger counter to which the pellet says, "Here I am—a little to the right of that bush!" The nonloseable golf ball will soon be put on public sale. It makes us sad. We could always lose golf balls without trouble. In fact we were for years high-stand man in our club for unrecovered ones. It was our only golfing distinction. And now science steps in to make us spend more time in the fairways!

Between six and seven million golf balls are lost every year, the rubber company says. (That's an understatement. The average foursome loses that many in one summer season.) The radioactive golf ball will cost no more, but the Geiger counter will set you back about \$25. This \$25 will, it is pointed out, keep you from losing at least \$100 worth of balls.

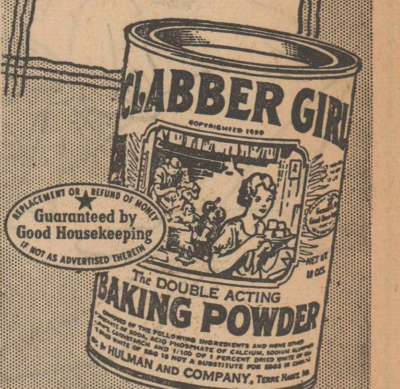

The Executive Secretary of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission has announced details of the special antelope

hunt west of the Pecos, October 2 to 10, inclusive. First priority will be given permit holders for the 1948 hunt who withdrew their names in time for assignment of an alternate. The alternates were those whose names were not selected in the drawing which was required when more than 702 applications for permits were made.

The number of permits for this fall will not be set until the results of the 1950 antelope census is completed. The Executive Secretary indicated that the total permits allowed may be less than during the last open

season in 1948.

Texans with a first priority rating are being notified and are being sent application blanks. Other hunters may receive the blanks by writing the Game Department. Their names will be placed on the eligible list when they return the filled-out blank along with the \$5.00 special license fee.

### Justice

Very Strict at Times

MILWAUKEE — Coley B. McAllister, 37, has learned that judges can be very strict.

McAllister was released from the house of correction after serving 30 days for vagrancy. A couple of days later he stopped Patrolman Clement Schmidt and said: "Take me in. I want another 30 days." Again he was taken before District Judge Harvey L. Neelen on a vagrancy charge. Said the defendant:

"I've reconsidered my propo- sition, judge. I don't want any more time in jail. What I plan to do is write to my sister in Greenville, S. C., and ask her for money to return home."

"Well, you can do that when you're in the county jail," replied the judge. "There'll be pen and ink."

"Oh, I won't get any money if I have to write from jail," McAllister said.

"What difference does it make where you write the let- ter to your sister?"

"It makes all the difference in the world: I planned to tell her to send me money because I was sick."

"That would be obtaining money under false pretenses," said the judge. "Ten days in the house of correction."

### Communists Are Waging All-Out War

Should the United States go in for an aggressive "Marshall plan of ideas" to implement its material assistance to the West- ern world? Senator Benton of Connecticut, who has been urg- ing this move in Congress, thinks so and his belief is shared by a great many people who are gravely disturbed by the success of Russia's high-powered propa- ganda.

The masters of the Kremlin are thorough. They have press- ed ahead in the cold war with weapons, with what amounts to blackmail on a high interna- tional level, and they have been clever and efficient in using their satellites as instruments of conquest. They have devel- oped well-trained undergrounds everywhere, including the Unit- ed States, whose duty is to ad- vance the cause of communism by every conceivable means, in- cluding, in the event of all-out war, sabotage and destruction on a far broader scale than most Americans seem to be able to contemplate. The evidence in this regard which the FBI has painstakingly gathered over the years, some of which was recent- ly made public, shows that the Politburo leaves no stone un- turned. And, in addition, the Russians regard propaganda as one of the most important of all weapons, and are acting accord- ingly.

In one of his late columns, Marquis Childs described the pattern of Soviet propaganda in Germany. He wrote, "Basic elements in this pattern are the petitions for peace and against the atomic bomb being circulated by the millions in both zones

of Germany. These same peti- tions were signed by several million north Koreans begin- ning in 1947 when they were first introduced on orders of Moscow.

"The objective is clear. It is to identify communism with peace and to put the United States in the role of aggressor, holding the terror weapon of the atomic bomb over the heads of peace-loving peoples every- where. If and when the United States should resort to the atomic weapon, then the base would be prepared to foment a world-wide hatred of America and Americans."

It may seem absurd to Amer- icans that the Russians can suc- ceed with this propaganda line. But according to men who are in the best position to know, they are succeeding. The Western nations, it is true, have beaten the communists in all postwar elections. But in many the communist vote has been heavy, and the communist minority is undoubtedly far better organ- ized, and forms a far more co- hesive whole, than it's opposi- tion.

In a recent speech, William C. Bullitt, who was an Amba- sador to Russia under Franklin Roosevelt, said, "In Italy, more than 20 per cent of the workmen are unemployed, and the Com- munist, who gathered one- third of the votes at the last election, are gaining in strength. In France, the government is far weaker than any French government before the Second World War, and its entire ap- paratus is riddled with commu-

nists. Even the head of French atomic research is a communist.

Situations such as these are not,

of course, the result of Soviet propaganda alone. But that propaganda has been and is a powerful factor. Hence the

growing interest in a "Marsh- plan of ideas" through which we would tell the world the truth as we see it.

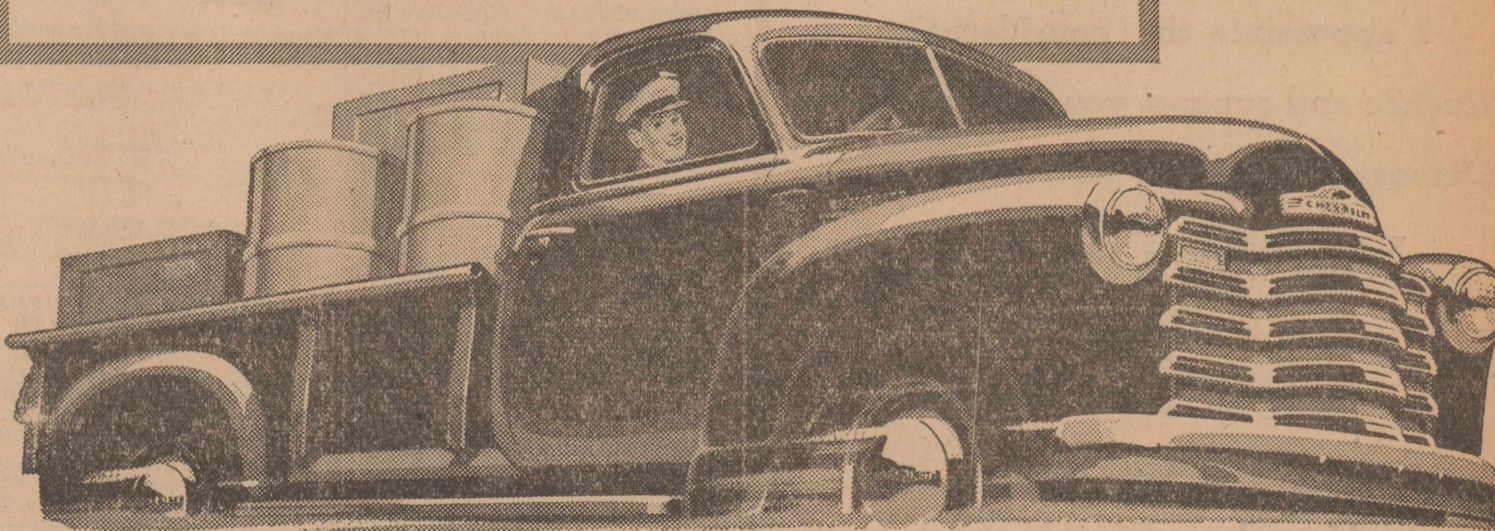

UN Flag Ordered Flown In Korea; Gen. MacArthur Named Commander Of International Forces in Area

UNITED NATIONS: Fights Aggression

There are moments in the march of current events that make history. In the eyes of many political observers such a moment occurred recently when Secretary General of the United Nations, Trygve Lie, picked up the three by five-foot blue and white UN flag and handed it to Warren R. Austin, chief U.S. delegate to the UN, and asked him to send it to General Douglas MacArthur.

The Security Council had just authorized the UN flag be flown alongside national standards in operations against the Red Korean invaders.

And as he handed the flag to Austin, he said:

"Bring it back when the job is done."

On these words hinge the hopes of the free world. Observers saw in them a belief that the United Nations effort in Korea will be successful and at last a world organization has been formed that will endure and protect the minorities for generations to come.

Observers were particularly impressed because it climaxed firm and positive action by the community of nations to secure world peace.

Up to this point the United Nations had:

(1) Demanded the withdrawal of Communist invaders from South Korea.

(2) Quickly endorsed the United States action of sending aid to South Korea and called upon all members of the United Nations to render assistance to carry out the police action against the Communists.

(3) Appointed General MacArthur commander of international forces in Korea.

The historic flag which Lie handed to Ambassador Austin was the one that flew over the headquarters of Dr. Ralph Bunche during his successful mediation of the Arab-Israeli war. It is the visible symbol of the first military sanctions ever levied against an aggressor by a world organization.

THAT SMELL: Not The Russians

Four towns in Illinois and three in Iowa provided the nation with a chuckle, but it was not funny at the time at least to residents of those towns.

A foul smell crept through Moline, East Moline, Selvis and Rock Island, Ill., and then spread across the border into Muscatine, Bettendorf and Davenport, Iowa.

Some residents went into hysterics, one man insisted to Selvis police that "the Russians are flying over and gassing us," citizens were forced from their beds and from taverns, police switchboards were jammed with calls and firemen kept on a near-emergency basis. Scores of Moline residents jumped into their cars and drove in their night clothes to high ground and fresher air.

When the excitement died down investigation disclosed the odor resulted from a leak in a tank of entalmar being hauled through the area on a truck headed west. Entalmar is an odorant used to inject a smell into natural gas, normally odorless, to permit detection of leaks. It is not injurious but can cause nausea.

REORGANIZATION: New Plan Killed

President Truman's plan to create a new department of health, education and security has been killed by the house. It was, incidentally, the first time this session the house has rejected a reorganization plan. The senate has killed six.

The house adopted, 249 to 71, a resolution of disapproval of the measure. It was killed apparently by opponents who argued it would be a step toward "socialized medicine."

Democrats who supported the plan, however, denied it had any bearing on socialized medicine. They said only congress could bring this about by passing necessary legislation.

RETAIL PRICES: Up Another Notch

The Korean situation was not the only worry of Americans during the past week or so. Living costs went up another notch with the prices of meat and bread being increased in retail stores.

Cocoa, coffee, sugar, hides and tin continued upward, cotton soared to \$15 a bale, and cattle went to the highest price level in a year. It is all blamed on the Korean war, but other factors entered in.

KOREA: The Tide Flows

Military observers, still watching the Soviet Union for any signs of open participation in the Korean war, were of the opinion the tide has begun to flow—against the aggressors.

During the first two weeks of the conflict South Korean and American troops, acting under orders of the United Nations, took a beating. But as the battle went into the third week, American arms—guns, tanks and planes—and U.S. soldiers stemmed the rush of the Communist armies.

At a point some 50 to 60 miles south of Seoul, capital of South Korea which fell into the hands of the invaders a few days after the sneak attack, American and Communist troops met.

At first American troops were forced to withdraw before Red tanks. And at the moment when it seemed the invaders might break through again, U.S. big guns and tanks, plus fresh foot soldiers poured into the area. The attack was stopped and many observers believe the counter attack will come as the stream of supplies increase.

A big factor in the blunted Communist attack was the U.S., British and Australian air forces. Fighters and bombers carried out continuous attacks upon tanks, roads, and bridges. They ripped open Communist positions with low flying rocket and machine gun attack. The big bombers blasted away at supply lines and communication centers. Their blows were felt by the invaders and will spearhead the inevitable counter attack.

Meanwhile, American divisions within the United States were being readied to move to the Far East. General MacArthur had, at the beginning of the conflict, four divisions in Japan. He has already drawn upon them and troops within the country will replace those from Japan plus reinforcements for the battle area.

TRUTH CAMPAIGN: Counteract Propaganda

For years Communist propaganda has been spread around the world, but no one seems to know just how much of the story of democracy has reached the enslaved peoples of the world. Now the state department has announced plans for "a great campaign of truth" to counter Moscow's broadsides of propaganda against the United States and other democratic nations.

Secretary of State Acheson told about the plan in testimony before a senate foreign-relations subcommittee. General Eisenhower also testified before the committee, declaring, "Truth could almost be classified as our T-bomb (truth-bomb) in this warfare."

General Marshall, who also testified, said he is firmly convinced that "we must confine ourselves to the truth" and that we must meet the Soviet procedure in what is called their conquest of the minds of people.

Acheson told the senators the Communist campaign of vilification "jeopardizes the security of the United States and is a threat to the security of the free world."

"The cynical aggression of communism in Korea, and the falsehoods that have preceded and accompanied it, make inescapably clear the importance of the campaign of truth," he said.

Economy

Economically the nation seemed in much better condition as the labor department reported signs pointing to record-breaking employment this year, exceeding the 1948 peak of 61,600,000. Secretary Tobin said much of the nonagricultural employment gain stemmed from seasonal activities, intensified especially in the construction industry which is enjoying record-breaking activity.

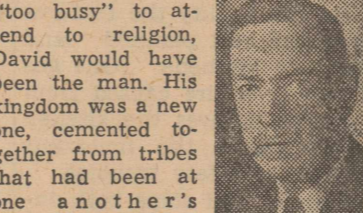
THE BIBLE SPEAKS

Great Man's Faith

Lesson for July 30, 1950

NO MAN is too busy to serve God. He may think he is, but the excuse will not stand. There are too many busy men who do serve God. One of the most famous men in history is a shining example. If ever a King was "too busy" to attend to religion, David would have been the man. His kingdom was a new one, cemented together from tribes that had been at one another's throats not so long before. He was surrounded by enemies who kept him at war most of the time. He was commander-in-chief of the army, chief justice of such courts as there were, chief executive in civic affairs; and furthermore, the times were not "normal" but turbulent in the extreme. Still he had time for religion. He led in that as in everything else.

Public Religion

THE first thing he did as king was to conquer the "unconquerable" city of Jerusalem, which had been in enemy hands for hundreds of years. And the next thing he did was to bring the Ark to Jerusalem and settle it there, making Jerusalem not only the civil but the religious capital of the nation.

In an almost spectacular way the king made himself sponsor for the organized religion of his people. For centuries before David, the Ark and all the formal worship that went with it had been stuck off in minor towns, inaccessible and unpopular, in fact disregarded by most of the people, as the book of Judges shows.

Now David, by bringing the Ark to Jerusalem and selecting for it a site on the city's highest hill, made sure that in his realm religion would never be an obscure thing. Sometimes we hear people say, "I believe in Christianity but not in the church." That is like saying "I believe in justice but not in the courts," "I believe in love but not in marriage," "I believe in education but not in schools."

David knew that if organized, public religion has to hide in holes and corners, it will not only lose respect, but people will soon forget all about it. The Ark was not an idol; neither is the Church. But if the Ark then, and the Church now, do anything else for religion, at least they keep it out where people can't help knowing about it.

Private Religion

DAVID knew, as some of his successors did not, that public worship is not the whole of religion. His personal relationships were controlled by his religious faith.

Take the case of Mephibosheth (chap. 9) for instance. If David had followed the usual pattern, he would have had poor Mephibosheth beheaded before breakfast. For the young man was the one remaining grandson (so far as we know then) of David's bitter enemy, King Saul.

In those days you always went on the principle that if a man was your enemy, so were all his relatives. It was generally true, too; and under the customs of those days Mephibosheth might have been expected to plan revenge, sooner or later, for his grandfather's and father's deaths.

David did not let him sink into obscurity but gave him what we would call a pension, a princely one too, treating him as if he were one of his own family.

The Inner Life

WELL, religion has its outside but it also has its inside. Public worship and loving your neighbors are not the root of religion but its fruit. The roots of it are deep within the soul. And David had that true faith which comes from within.

He was humble, not proud, as Psalm 24 shows. Great king though he was, he knew there is only one King of Glory. He was confident, as every leader must be; but his confidence was based not on himself but on his God. (II Sam. 22, which is re-written as Psalm 18.)

And when David sinned, as he shamefully did, he did not make excuses for himself or sink with easy satisfaction into his worst self. If to be a saint is to be without sin, then David was no saint (and you are one?). But if being a saint means that in spite of sin one comes to have the cleansing kind of experience that Psalm 51 records, then David was a man after God's own heart.

cidents happen in the kitchen, says Dorothy Dixon, Home Demonstration Agent, but few outrank carelessness and household disorder.

Poor connections on the gas stove; overheating or using kerosene in coal or wood ranges, gas escaping when a boiling pot has extinguished a flame, pots and pans containing hot food or water upset by children, using worn-out equipment, especially electrical appliances, matches not placed out of the children's reach and accidents that often happen to the homemaker while frying foods in deep fat; these are the common causes of kitchen accidents.

Miss Dixon says that a well kept kitchen, one that is provided with plenty of cabinet and storage space, is most likely to be a safe room. However, carelessness can nullify the features of even the best planned and constructed kitchens. One gas explosion or a fire caused from hot grease removes the kitchen and oftentimes the housewife from further safety troubles.

The stairs and steps both inside and outside the home seem to have been made especially for creating accidents by falling since so many home accidents happen there. It is dangerous under any circumstances to walk on stairs with both arms loaded and it is doubly so when the stairs or steps are cluttered. Stairway treads should all be the same width and the same height, says Miss Dixon, and the treads should not be polished.

The stairway is no place to store the broom, mop nor the children's toys. Scatter rugs should never be placed at the bottom nor the top landings of the stairway. Loose or frayed runners are extremely dangerous. Cellar steps are usually poorly lighted and also catch more of the items that are just temporarily set there until they can be moved into the cellar. These are the items that cause many of the serious home accidents. They are not moved until someone gets hurt.

Protection from fire hazards, orderliness, timely repairing, using tools and equipment as they were intended to be used, disposing of worn out appliances and the use of common sense will greatly reduce the number of home accidents, says Miss Dixon.

### DOMESDAY BOOK

### First Census Taken 1086

LONDON—The 1950 edition of Domesday Book, the English version of a census, is now being planned, it was announced recently. The first census was ordered by William the Conqueror in 1086. Americans, who have been upset by the number of questions asked by tabulators this year, were no more upset than the Englishman of William's day when he announced his decision to have the survey made.

"So very straitly did he cause the survey to be made that there was not a rod of ground, nor—it is shameful to say what he thought no shame to do—was there an ox or a cow or a pig that passed by

that was not set down in the accounts," an anonymous report said.

**Census for Tax Purpose**  
William was not primarily interested in the population. He was more interested in taxes. The levy of two shillings per "hide" of land had not yielded the expected revenue. Besides that, he had no way of checking up on defaulters. He had no adequate records even of his own holdings. The time had come, he decided, for a reckoning. Besides counting noses, the local "census takers" were called upon to make three estimates of the value of the land in yearly revenue—at the time of the census, at the time it was acquired by the current owner, and at the death of Saxon King Edward in 1066.

All this information was duly assembled, classified and copied by clerks in two great volumes which were given the name of Domesday Book. As the inventory covered all but four counties, those still held by Saxons, the book was a lush guide to the King in refilling the royal treasury.

Besides the tax problem, the book also provided a list of all landowners and tenants and the Christian names of subtenants, peasants and slaves.

In fact, the book was a tax roll, land register, military register, census of population and topographical dictionary. The American census this year is designed along many of the same lines. Government officials report that the complete United States census will take the guess out of many phases of life in this country. Unlike the original Domesday Book, tax levies will not be made from the census. Nor the amount of personal income, one of the questions asked by census takers this year, be revealed to anyone.

### Information Small

These figures when accumulated, will provide accurate data on the standard of American life today. The centers of population, industry and potential wealth will also be clearly outlined after the census is tabulated and analyzed, census takers report.

William the Conqueror planned to use his census as sort of a fifth column within the country. For instance, the Norman lords with whom he shared his loot after conquering England, had built up feudal centers of considerable strength. William had no definite knowledge of their resources either in property or men. He suspected some of them of trying to create little independent kingdoms within the realm to challenge his power. His census provided this valuable information.

Like the Domesday Book, the American census will be a valuable source of information for future historians.

### 15 Million Hens Give Bakers Two Trillion Eggs a Year

CHICAGO—The bakers of America keep approximately 15,500,000 average hens busy each year providing the 2,706,000,000 eggs used in baking enriched bread and other bakery products, according to the American Bakers' association.

About 225,500,000 dozen or 300,000,000 pounds of eggs are purchased from the American farmer annually, the association pointed out, explaining that the baking industry is the farmer's biggest industrial customer.

The bakers' purchases of flour, milk, cane and beet sugar and other farm products total close to a billion dollars annually.

**Honeydew**  
Honeydew is the sweet viscid excretion of plant-sucking insects, such as aphids and scale insects. That portion of the plant juice or sap which these insects cannot utilize is ejected in the form of a sweet liquid.
