

## Arrange For County Blood Bank Reserve

Frank Sutton, American Legion Commander, completed arrangements with Dr. Churchill of Terrell Laboratories in Amarillo Saturday morning for a Sherman County Blood Bank Reserve.

Those making donations of blood to the blood bank should have nothing to eat or drink except black coffee for four hours previous to making the donation.

Although the blood bank reserve for the county is being sponsored by the American Legion it is possible for anyone in the county to make a donation of blood.

Blood donors will not receive pay for their blood. The blood will be held in reserve for the use of any patient from Sherman County, who may be ill and need a blood transfusion.

Those who plan to make blood donations to the blood bank reserve of the county should contact either Frank Sutton or R. O. Dickson before going to Amarillo. This will make possible the keeping of records to avoid asking a blood donor to make another donation only a short time after he has given blood for a transfusion.

The blood bank reserve is sponsored in Amarillo by the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Records kept locally will include the type of blood, RH factor, and the date donated.

The blood in the Sherman County Blood Bank Reserve kept in Amarillo will be available for use for any person whose home is in Sherman County. Orders making this possible have been filed in Amarillo and signed by both the commander and adjutant of the local American Legion Post.

## Young Men Take Physical Examinations

Sixteen young men from Sherman, Dallam, Hartley, and Moore Counties took their physical examinations for entering military service in Amarillo Tuesday. Twenty-four men from the four counties will report for their physical examinations August 15. Forty men from the four counties are expected to be called for physical examinations the first of September.

No information has been made available as to when these men will be inducted into service. At present there is no indication that a quota will be set up for each county. Classification is being determined by the age group of young men 25 years of age in the four county area as a unit. Those nearest their 26th birthdays will be called first according to present plans.

At present there are no provisions for deferment even though a young man may be engaged in farm labor. At the meeting of the Draft Board in Dalhart Monday night, a state representative told the group, that unless farm surpluses were depleted it was likely that there would be no such a thing as an agricultural deferment in the present conflict.

A spokesman for the four county draft board of the Selective Service said very few instructions were made available to them.

## Brooks Opens Campaign For Run-Off Election

Pierce Brooks, Dallas insurance executive who led a field of 11 opponents in the first primary election, opened his run-off campaign for lieutenant governor with a charge that his opponent did nothing as a legislator to halt "the runaway cost of state government."

"My opponent was a member of the Texas senate from 1941 to 1948 when the cost of our state government increased approximately 500 per cent and he didn't or couldn't do anything about halting the runaway cost of state government. If he didn't or couldn't do anything about it then, what can the people expect him to do about it now?"

Brooks also charged that his opponent made no effort during his eight years as a senator to comply with the law providing for legislative redistricting after each federal census. The Dallas county candidate said he always has been a staunch advocate of redistricting.

Brooks hailed the result of the first primary which he lead, as convincing proof that the people of the state want a lieutenant governor who is completely free from entangling alliances and political obligations and who won't be dominated by "a certain group of money hungry and power thirsty individuals who are seeking to control the office of lieutenant governor through the election of one of their key men."

Brooks said that "any man who goes into public affairs with the all-out support of any special group must pay for that help, one way or another, when and if he goes into office."

"My sole allegiance," Brooks said, "is to my God and the people of Texas."

## Wheat Producers Ask 1c An Acre For Organization

A contribution of one-cent for each acre seeded to wheat for the 1950-51 crop has been asked by the directors of the Sherman County Wheat Producers Association as a means of raising funds for continuing the work of the organization. Funds for operation of the organization were originally based on a contribution of one-fourth of a cent for each bushel sold at elevators.

As a result of drought and hail damage very little wheat will be available for sale in the county after the seeding season. Kenneth Kendrick, R. C. Buckles, Jim Taylor, H. T. Jackson, and Ernest Goule, members of the board of directors, devised the plan for financing the organization at a meeting Monday morning.

The purpose of the meeting was to devise a plan to raise money for the Sherman County Association in order that work might be continued which has been started in the county, state and national association.

Each producer in Sherman County will be asked to contribute one cent per acre on his 1950-51 wheat allotment. A farmer who will sow 500 acres of wheat this fall will be asked to make a contribution of \$5.00, and the farmer who will sow 1,000 acres of wheat this fall is asked to make a contribution of \$10.00.

Forty per cent of the money collected will be kept in Sherman County and each farmer making a contribution will be given a year's subscription to the National Wheat Grower, which is to be a monthly paper published by the National Association of Wheat Growers with headquarters in Dodge City, Kansas. The first official issue should appear in September, and all names and addresses of farmers contributing 1 cent an acre this year will be placed on the mailing list. The paper will contain various articles and information concerning the wheat growers, the type of wheat grown in various states, and in general what the National Association of Wheat Growers is doing.

Funds will be used for the benefit of the wheat farmer in production, marketing, finding new uses for wheat, and new chemical analysis. Kenneth Kendrick is chairman of the county organization and Ernest Goule is the organization secretary.

## Advocates Farm-Road Program

Texas \$78,000,000 a year program of new highway construction, with emphasis on farm-to-market roads was praised Thursday by Ben Ramsey of San Augustine, who is actively forwarding his runoff campaign for lieutenant governor.

"In every section of the state I've visited during my campaign, I have found farm-to-market roads completed or under construction," Ramsey said.

"Many more roads are needed to further the development of our rural sections, and I pledge my fullest support to the members of the state highway commission who are seeking to continue this wise policy," he declared.

"It is also a great source of pride to me, as an economy minded public servant who for many years in the Texas Legislature has helped to maintain the policies and prestige our fine highway department, that this vast system of ours is being maintained at a minimum cost, in spite of the tremendous volume of traffic," Ramsey declared.

"This efficient maintenance by the engineering forces of the highway department thus allows the major portion of our state highway funds, some \$78,000,000 out of approximately \$100,000,000 expended annually on the Texas highway system, to be concentrated upon the construction of new highways, of which the greatest number are the badly needed farm-to-market roads."

Miss Bennett and Miss Weatherford have outstanding records during eight years of 4-H club work.

Miss Mary Ann Hunter, of Tuxline, also received the award for outstanding 4-H club work in Dallam County. Miss Corrine Stinson, Dallam County Home Demonstration Agent, judged the county baking contest.

Miss Stinson will accompany the 4-H girls to Bastrop Park for the Junior Leadership Laboratory training course. The school will open August 28 and close September 2.

## Weed Control Demonstrations Are Scheduled

County Agent Ernest Goule announces that demonstrations of the use of sodium chlorate for control of bindweed and Johnson grass will be held in the county this month. Three demonstrations are being planned, one at Texoma; one in the Spurlock community, and the third one at Stratford. The use of two sprayers owned by the County spraying unit will be demonstrated. Dates of the demonstrations are to be announced.

38,000 pounds of sodium chlorate is being distributed this week to the Sherman County farmers who have pooled their orders for this chemical to be used for control work on Johnson grass and bindweed.

## Kenneth Wilson Is Released From Hospital

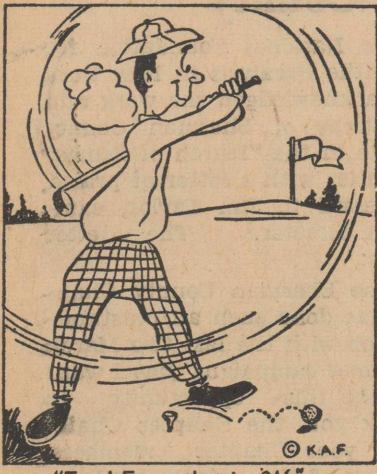

## Korean War Values Weapons

In the light of current events, it is interesting to look back about a year, to the time when the headlines were largely occupied with debate over what kind of weapons we needed, and how the next war would be fought. The star of the Air Force was then in its ascendancy, and its more extreme partisans were arguing passionately that the airplane, and most especially jet fighters and the huge inter-continental bombers, could do practically all the job. The Navy, the argument ran, would in the future be only a minor, auxiliary service, and should be deprived of most, possibly all, of its own planes and carriers. The tank was obsolete, or nearly so, because new weapons had made it practically as vulnerable to fire as a jeep. And the role of the foot soldier, always paramount in past wars, would be a relatively minor one next time.

This is what prompted U. S. News & World Report, in an article on military planning and strategy, to say: "War (in Korea) is putting U. S. military ideas, new weapons, and strategy plants to the test of experience. On the basis of the record to date, the report card on first performance can be marked: 'Flunked.'" For our experience in Korea has certainly proven that, in this particular kind of "small" war at least, the new weapons and new ideas have not worked the expected wonders.

In this war, the biggest bombers have not been used, nor are they likely to be used to any extent. They are adapted to global, all-out war, in which they would carry A-bombs to vital enemy targets thousands of miles away from their bases.

The Air Force has performed splendidly in Korea, and has inflicted heavy damage on Red forces. But reports from the front have said time and time again that the jet planes, in this time of campaign, have been a disappointment. Valuable as they are in air combat, they are too fast, and too limited in the time they can stay aloft, to operate as well in close support of troops as piston-engined planes.

Navy air power, once written off as an obsolete weapon, has proven enormously vital. The carrier planes operate in support of the ground troops, and are a major defense against amphibious landings. A traditional Navy dominates the sea lanes and the harbors.

The most dramatic examples of the worth of an old weapon is found in the tank. It was the greatest single factor in making possible the North Korean drive. The Russian tanks which the Red troops used apparently were superior to ours in fire power and armor.

Finally, the role of the foot soldier has again been all-important. Despite all the new and revolutionary concepts yet uttered, the "poor, bloody infantry" has been the queen of battles in Korea.

It may be that in the future, and in another kind of war if it comes, those new concepts may find some justification. They have not so far, and it is evident that it would be a disastrous folly to accept them at theoretical value.

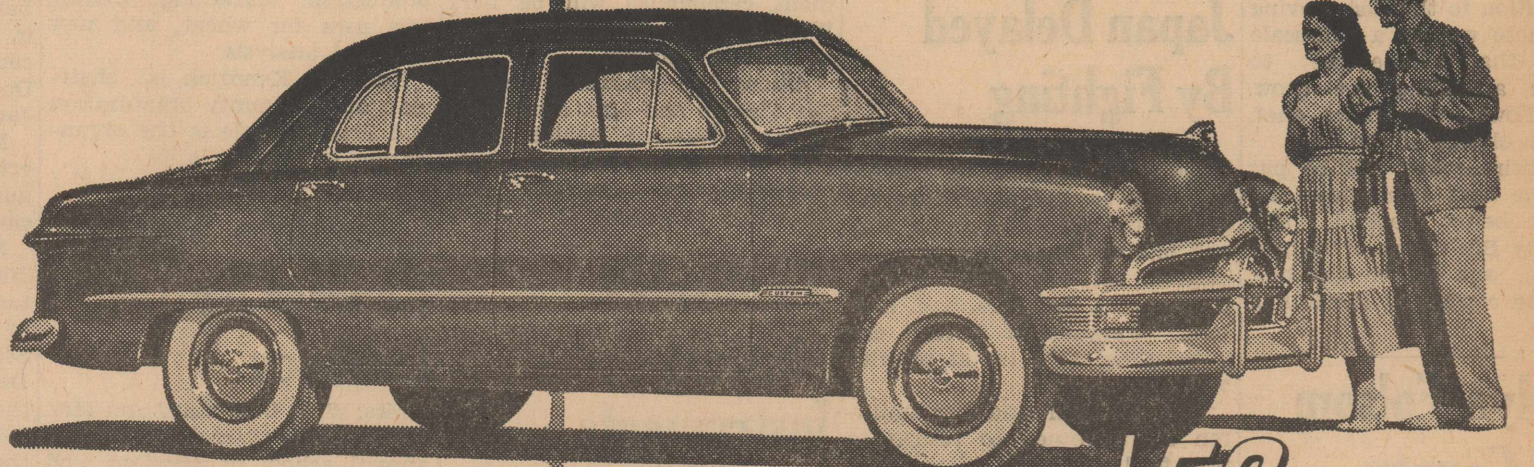

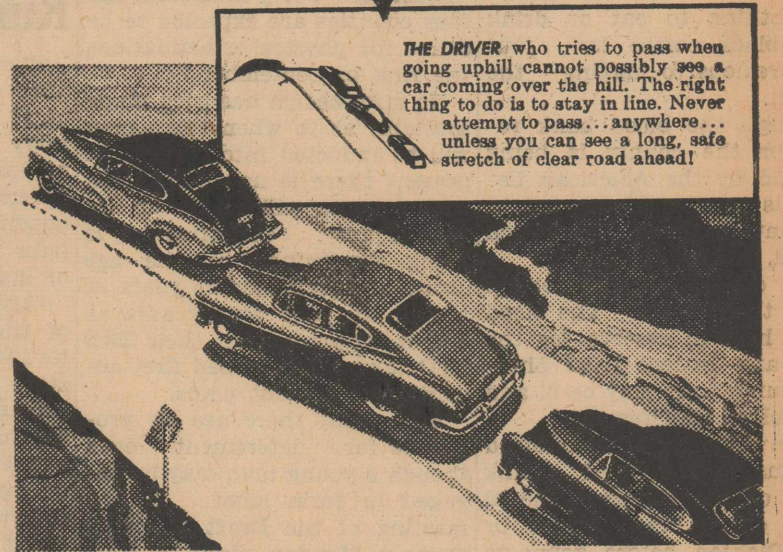

### Time Nears To Elect PMA Committeemen

Although PMA Committeemen Elections are three or four months away, it is not too early to begin to think about the selection of farmers to administer the 1951 Agricultural Conservation and other Production and Marketing Administration programs, says B. F. Vance, chairman of the Texas State PMA Committee.

Chairman Vance holds that the provision for farmers to elect their neighbors as commit-

teemen, to administer farm programs is one of the most significant and progressive developments in agriculture. He adds, however, that "Unless farmers give careful consideration to the selections of committeemen and participate in elections, the administration of the farm program is not truly democratic nor representative."

He calls attention to the fact that many administrative positions in the Nation's agricultural structure ranging from state committeemen to the Under Secretary of Agriculture have been filled from committeemen ranks, indicating the most important place the relatively new farmer-administrative system has attained.

As representatives of the farmers in their community, the chairman points out, community committeemen are called into consultation to discuss and make recommendations on provisions of the various PMA programs as well as to help carry out the resulting programs in their communities.

County committeemen, he

explains, are largely elected from the ranks of the community committeemen, and these farmers administer PMA programs on a county level.

State committeemen, although appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture, usually are selected from the committee ranks. State committees administer PMA programs at the state level and have a voice in formulating and administering national programs.

Vance says that he is sure that if farmers realized the importance of the "Committee way of administering farm programs" and what it means to the farmers of Texas to have these programs administered by farmers they have had a voice in selecting, "there would be no need to encourage greater attention and more participation in committee elections. Every thinking farmer would be eager to carry his share of responsibility."

### Peas Can Be Preserved By Freezing

Texas homemakers are urged to take advantage of the plentiful supplies of black eye and other varieties of peas such as cream and purple hull that are now available, and to preserve a supply for winter use. They are good frozen; are a nutritious food and will add variety

to your meals later in the year, says Jimmie Nell Harris, associate extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

Homemakers should remember that freezing does not improve the quality of a product and if you want a quality product, she points out, you must very carefully select the peas to be frozen. The peas should be tender and at the right stage for good eating. It is best to harvest them early in the morning before they absorb heat from the sun. Once they

have been picked, the preparation and processing for freezing should not be delayed. She says they should be washed, then shelled or cut as you would prepare them for eating or canning. Next they should be scalded in boiling water.

She suggests that you use a large enamelware, aluminum or stainless steel kettle for the scalding operation. It should contain about one gallon of boiling water and only about one pound of the prepared peas should be placed in the kettle at one time. It is best to use a wire basket or a loose cheese cloth bag for holding the peas while they are in the boiling water. After the peas are placed in the kettle, replace the cover and keep the heat on high so that the water will continue to boil and don't, she cautions, attempt to scald large amounts of peas because the water will be cooled too much. Start timing as soon as the peas are immersed in the boiling water and for small peas containing a high percentage of snaps, scald for three minutes. Shelled peas should be scalded for four minutes, she says.

Place the scalded black eye peas immediately in running cold water or in a container of ice water. This chilling stops any further cooking and prevents loss of quality, she adds. From two to three minutes will be required to cool the peas and next day they should be drained and packed in air-tight, moisture-vapor-proof containers. Seal the containers immediately. Black eye peas which have been carefully selected, properly prepared and frozen may be stored in the freezer or locker box and will retain their quality for one year, says Miss Harris.

Homemakers should remember that frozen black eye or other peas will require only about one-half the cooking time of fresh peas. Here are suggestions from Miss Harris on cooking frozen peas. Bring one-half cup of salted water to a boil and add to it one pint of frozen peas and don't thaw the peas before cooking. Boil them, she says, from eight to 15 minutes and season exactly as you would fresh peas.

freedom from surface water; suitable housing with proper floors and good ventilation; sunshine; and manure disposal.

He cautions that crowding birds in too small a house or on too small a piece of ground is one mistake in sanitation, while allowing the flock to run all over the farm at random is another. Dr. Banks recommends that

not more than 200 or 300 birds be kept on each acre of ground, depending on the age, breed, and size of the turkeys. In addition, he says that it is always good to have some extra land available to which the birds can be moved if trouble appears in the flock.

He warns against moving the sick birds when disease appears,

saying that the healthy appearing birds are the ones that should be moved to clean ground, and the sick ones left where they are.

Dry litter is simple precaution against losses from coccidiosis, a parasitic disease caused by an

organism which requires warmth and moisture to survive. Poults are born free from intestinal parasites, and Dr. Banks says that loss from these organisms can best be prevented by keeping the poults in frequent-

**He Loved Teaching**

Lesson for August 13, 1950

WHAT WOULD you do if you had a million dollars? Several thousand school teachers were asked that question a few years ago. Seventy-five per cent of them gave the same answer: "I'd resign." They weren't real teachers, they were only hired help. The other twenty-five per cent were the real teachers. A great university teacher, Palmer of Harvard, wrote that he had the perfect job. Believe it or not, he said, "Harvard actually pays me for doing what—if I could afford it—I would gladly pay Harvard to let me do."

**No Finished Product**

THE REAL thing about teaching is that you are dealing with people, young people, growing people. In every other line of business, whatever you turn out begins to depreciate almost as soon as it leaves the factory.  
It doesn't take long for butter to get rancid, or bread stale. A cold-storage egg is a feeble imitation of a fresh one. A car that has changed hands once, even if it has run less than 1,000 miles, is already a "used" car on its way to the junk-pile.

But the products of the teacher's classroom are by no means "finished" products when they leave it, even if it is a finishing school. If the teacher's work has been done well, the product will go on improving for years, instead of running down.

**Three Aims**

PROFESSOR EZRA, of Babylon and Jerusalem, was one of history's most famous teachers. We note (Ezra 7:10) the same three aims in Ezra's life that you would expect to find in all good teachers.  
First of all, he "prepared his heart" to do what he did. The "heart" is the Bible expression for character, for life as a whole. No one can be a truly good teacher who has a bad character.  
Now Ezra prepared his heart to do three things. The first was to "seek the law of the Lord." What a teacher teaches may be as important as who his pupils are; and Ezra's "subject" was the law which God had given his people—part of what we now call the Old Testament. Nowadays this is called research, but a simple word for it is just study. A lazy teacher is a poor one. A good teacher will spend more time studying than any of the pupils do—and will learn more, too. In fact, the best way to learn anything, including the Bible, is to try to teach it for a while.

Second, Ezra prepared his heart to do the law. The old sneer, "He who can, does; he who cannot, teaches," is true of poor teachers, not of the good ones. Particularly not true of Bible teachers. The aim of Bible teaching, from Moses' time till now, is always practical. "Truth is in order to goodness," as the Presbyterians say. One who has not tried out the Bible ideals in daily living will never do for a Bible teacher.

And third, Ezra set out to "teach in Israel." Your research scholar may or may not make a good teacher. The good teacher is not bored by teaching as some researchers are. He loves it. He is happiest at it.

**Take Yourself, for Example**

NOW LET US see how this comes out in your own home Sunday school. If yours is like most Sunday schools, the main trouble with it is that they can't find enough good teachers, enough people who really want to know about God's word themselves, who live and love to help others know it.

The Rev. H. M. Lewis of Texas has said in his essay, The Dividends of Teaching:

"When you begin to teach you will realize that at last you have found a purpose for your religion... Teaching gives a motive, the highest motive, for all acts of religion and for all pursuit of knowledge—'For their sakes.' Every Christian has the missionary obligation and is by virtue of his profession of faith, a missionary.—'Go, teach all nations.' Make your particular nation young America and your special opportunity systematic work in the Church school. Once you believe that you must be a teacher because you are a Christian... you will have heard your life's call."

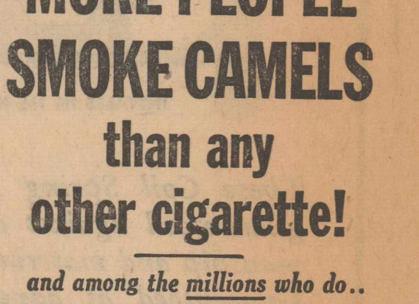

### 4-H Club 'Fencer' Foils Post Decay

#### Creosote Treated Posts Will Last Thirty Years

Terry Liston, 17-year-old president of South Carolina Four-H Clubs, has "snowballed" one well-known conservation practice into triple savings—savings of timber, money, and his own time and energy.

Thinning a woodlot on his father's farm near Smoaks to allow healthier growth of the trees, Terry ended up with 700 fine fence posts! But he had noticed that pine fence posts rotted out in the ground faster than he could grow new ones.

Presenting his problem to the local county agricultural agent, Terry learned that pressure-treating the

posts with creosote would give them a life expectancy of more than 30 years.

Although he realized that he was making an unusual request that normally could not be filled, Terry contacted a nearby Charleson, S. C., wood treating plant and asked to have his posts pressure treated with creosote, along with ties and poles which Koppers treats for railroads and utilities.

Word of Terry's attack on the farm fencing problem spread among the community with the result that other farmers have turned to use of the specially treated posts as a better farming method.

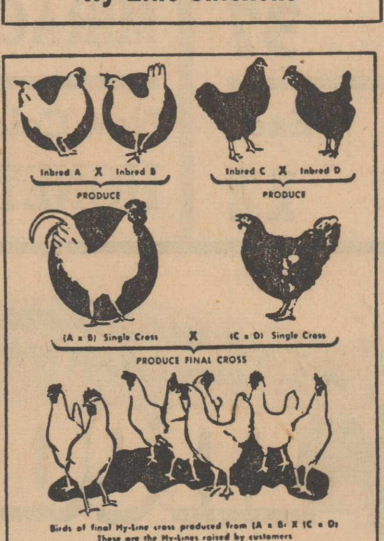
### Sale of Farm Churned Butter at New Low

The U. S. department of agriculture reports the dairy farmer and his wife who used to take pride in the fine quality of the butter they churned and retailed to a favored list of discriminating buyers in town—often at a good premium above the price of "store butter"—are vanishing.

In 1947, farm butter produced for sale had dropped below the 50 million pound mark, and for 1949 it had dropped still further to about 41 1/2 million pounds. This is less than one quarter of the 175 million pounds marketed in 1924.

In only eight states in 1949 was the total of farm butter marketed greater than 2 million pounds.

### Hy-Line Chickens



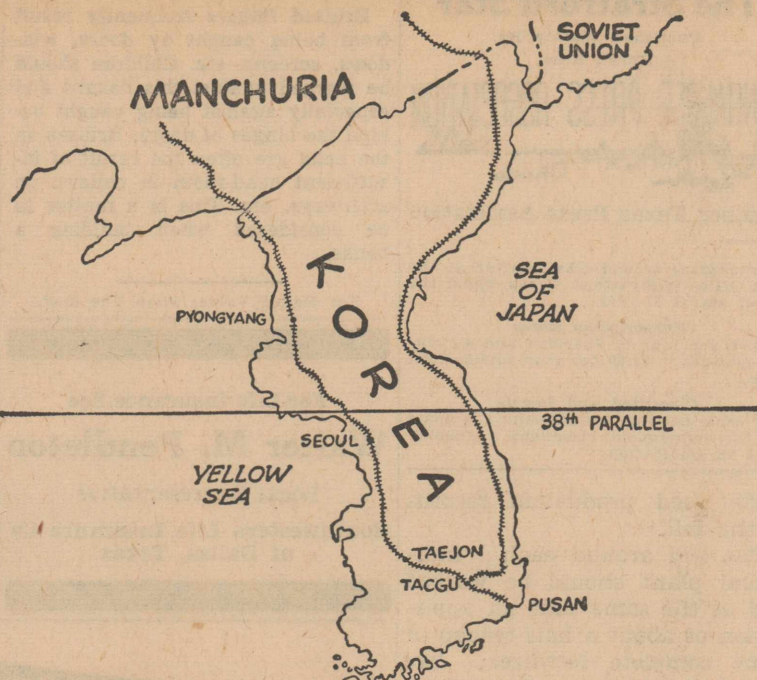

### Nebraska Farm Families To Have Less Income

Nebraska farm families will have about 10 per cent less net income in 1950 than they did in 1949, according to L. F. Snipes, extension farm management specialist at the University of Nebraska.

He says these are the reasons: The total cost of farm production this year will be about as high as in 1949. Items needed by the farm family will be as high or higher than in 1949.

## Korea Has Struggled for Unity And Independence for 50 Years

A great many people in the United States were very vague about the location of Korea until the recent outbreak of fighting in that little country that juts from Manchuria and the Soviet Union, not unlike Florida from the southern part of this country.

It is a rugged land of 30,000,000 people with mountain ranges comparable in height to the Appalachians covering virtually all the country. Granite hills up to 6,300 feet fold the terrain of the United States sponsored Republic of Korea—the Indiana-sized southern three-seventh of the peninsula land. They form a twisting network of valleys which invaders have always followed.

So completely do the rugged hills crease the country that rail and highway routes twist fantastically in connecting cities and towns.

Chief transportation artery of South Korea, for instance, is the double-tracked, standard-gauge railroad running diagonally from Haeju in the northwest on the violated 38th-parallel boundary through Seoul, Taejon, and Taegu to the southeastern port of Pusan. From Haeju to Pusan by way of the cities named is just about 290 air miles and 400 miles by rail.

### Rice Main Crop

At some time in the past, nature's forces tilted the southward-pointing peninsula down on the west, or Yellow sea side, and up on the east, the coast of the Sea of Japan. As a result of this tilt, Korea, although it averages 150 miles in width, has its drainage divide only about 15 miles inland from the east coast.

The west coast has a partly submerged shore line marked by countless fjordlike bays and islands. Yellow Sea tides, fluctuating 25 feet and more, have created broad tidal mud flats.

The east coast on the other hand, has almost no islands and a straight, steep shore line. Mountains slope into the sea or from narrow sand beaches washed by clear water.

South Korea is the agricultural part of the peninsula as divided arbitrarily at the 38th parallel in 1945 as a Russo-American military expedition for the disarming of Japanese troops. Rice is grown on every flat space where irrigation is possible. Thatched farm houses and green terraces snuggle in every narrow valley between the endless lines of folded hills. Soybeans, hemp, wheat, barley, and vegetables are cultivated in dry fields.

Throughout its modern history the ancient nation of Korea has been engaged in a tragic struggle for freedom, unity, and independence. Japan annexed the country in 1910 and proceeded to exploit its resources thoroughly until the end of World War II. But for years prior to the annexation, Korea had been a pawn in the big power politics of Japan, China, and Russia.

Peace-seeking Korea ushered in its modern era by concluding an "open door" treaty with Japan in 1876. But Japanese promises of independence were soon forgotten. The Sino-Japanese war of 1894-95 left Japan the dominant foreign power in Korea. This hold was consolidated by victory in the Russo-Japanese war a decade later, and the Koreans had no free government of their own until the elections held in 1948 under United Nations auspices.

Founded in 1122 B. C. Old Korea's origins are obscure by time, but her people claim a history of more than 42 centuries. Korean legend celebrates a founder named Tan Gun, of superhuman origin, whose alleged tomb is still venerated. More credible are the historic references to a Chinese

Potential barrier to an invader's progress is the population of South Korea. It is now 20 million, three-fourths of them on farms. Despite the mountains that rule out cultivation of most of the area, that is more than twice the population of North Korea, and five times that of Indiana, comparatively a farming paradise.

### Glass Rod's Future

What of the future of the glass rod in angling? How do glass rods differ? What should the angler look for in choosing a glass rod?

For authoritative and expert answers to these questions, this writer contacted the Wright & McGill company of Denver, Colorado, who pioneered the development of the glass rod and whose Nyla-Glass casting rods are rated at the top of the field.

A. D. McGill, himself, forwarded the information sought. He wrote: Basically there are three types of glass rods, or rather three methods of making glass rods. Each method makes a rod that differs from the other two.

There are solid rods made from glass fibers and plastic binder. There are rods made from glass fibers and plastic binder that have a wood core running through the center of the rods. There are hollow glass rods made from woven glass cloth and plastic binder.

We followed the method of making solid glass rods from glass fibers and plastic binder. Our method is to take glass fibers which come to us from the manufacture of fiber glass filament and resemble in appearance the fine hair-like filaments of raw silk that is spun by the silkworm or the fine filaments of rayon or nylon.

Upon receiving the glass filaments they are laid up in lengths to form a rod of desired diameter and length. The filaments are then coated with plastic binder and then stretched tight to hold each filament taut and straight to avoid any one filament from crossing any other filaments and to allow the plastic binder to coat each filament.

After the rods are coated as stated above, they are then placed in a form and heated to set or harden the plastic binder.

Glass Rods made with wood cores are made in much the same manner as above described; however, the wood core is used to help hold the glass fibers, as they are wrapped to the wood core by means of a spiral wrapping which is removed after the rod is set by heat.

Most hollow glass rods are made by wrapping woven glass cloth around a tapered mandrel. They are then saturated with plastic binder and heated to set the binder. The mandrel, or core is then removed leaving a hollow rod.

Fiber Glass is not new, but it was glass fishing rods that made the public very conscious of the qualities of fiber glass.

Glass Rods are also made in various shapes. Wright & McGill have made rods of square or quadrate shape as this shape gives truer flexing action, more power and kick, even flexing with less danger of side action when casting. However, many rods are made round in shape and some are made pentagon or five sided.

Rods made from fiber glass are here to stay and the past four years have proven that glass rods are very popular and that they can deliver what most fishermen have hoped for in rods.

They are durable, have fast action and power to fight and land the gamest fighting fish. They withstand the damaging effects of salt water. They will not rust or rot. They are fungus proof and under normal fishing conditions will not take a set or break.

### Fly Fish Upstream

In fishing fast water with flies, the most productive technique will be upstream fishing. After the fly is cast, pull the line through the guides with the left hand to keep out slack, and watch the line or end loop where the leader is tied. If there is any slowdown, or side-wise movement of the leader, strike — and strike hard! Also, strike at any flash of color or other sign of trout moving for the fly. Almost all the strikes will be missed if you wait until you feel the fish. Many strikes are missed by experienced anglers, but even a beginner will hook enough fish by this method to make things interesting.

### Salmon Safeguard Against Plotting

Due to their reputed, and the fact that the land-locked species can survive in cold, clear, deep lakes where minnows are plentiful, salmon have been introduced into many northern waters during the past few years.

They may be taken in more regions than is generally known, and each season sportsmen from all parts of the United States and Canada, and even from Europe, visit the select salmon rivers and lakes.

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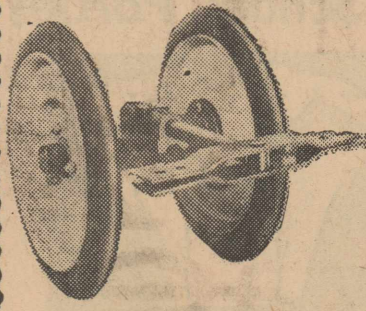
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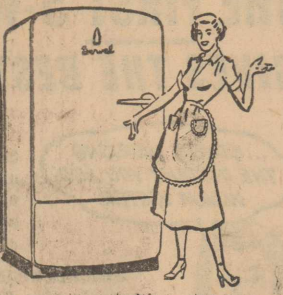

(Continued from Page 5) ly cleaned brooder houses, not letting them have any contact with old chickens or turkeys, and keeping them on clean ground.

In summarizing a sanitation program, he points out that the poults should be started clean, kept clean, and fed from clean equipment and emphasizes that key farm.

**Fall, Favorite Garden Time**

In most sections of Texas, there are from 60 to 90 days of good growing weather during the fall season and that is sufficient to grow a good fall garden. Today's high prices may mean, says John Hutchison, extension horticulturist of Texas A. & M. College, that if we don't grow our vegetables, we may not have them.

He says in most areas of the state there is more art to growing a fall garden than a spring garden when nature may be in a more cooperative mood. He points out there is real satisfaction in having cool crisp, tender fresh vegetables on the family table for the vitamins and minerals they supply not only add that fresh color to the cheeks, but are just naturally good for everyone. Then there is another very important item, that fall garden will cut dollars aplenty from the family's food bill.

August weather is not always well-suited for outdoor work but now is the time to begin operations. It is best, says Hutchison, to start with some of the old spring vegetables provided they can be rejuvenated and made to produce on into the fall. Tomatoes, okra, peppers, and egg plants if properly cared for, will

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make good production records in the fall. The soil around each individual plant should be worked and at the same time an application of about a half teacup of some complete fertilizer like 5-10-5 should be made. Work it into the soil, then put a two to three inch mulch of hay or similar material around the plant. The mulch will help to conserve moisture and to keep the ground cool. They should be irrigated every 5 to 7 days.

In the case of tomatoes, Hutchison says it is best to select two or three suckers or sprouts that are growing near the base of the old plant and then remove the parts of the old plant which have lost their vigor. Give them the same treatment recommended for rejuvenating other plants.

Before new plantings are made, he says the garden area should be cleaned up. Remove all trash, weeds and grass and if barnyard fertilizer is available, broadcast a three or four inch layer over the plot and either spade or plow it under. In other areas where commercial fertilizers can be used, he recommends the use of three to four pounds of 5-10-5 for each 100 feet of row space. It should be applied prior to planting.

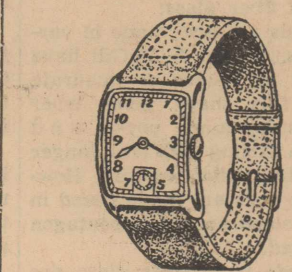
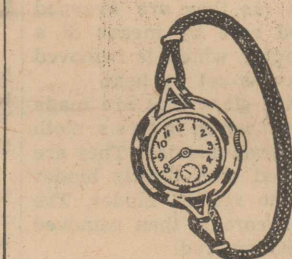
Dry weather complicates the seed bed building process but a thorough irrigation will help solve the problem. He says you'll be wise to use from 20 to 25 percent more seed than you do in the spring and to cover the seed a little deeper.

Hutchison cautions against overplanting and says the wise gardener is one who plants just what he can properly take care of. Prepare the rows so irrigation water can be run down the middles and at the same time make the beds high enough to keep the vegetables from drowning out when the heavy fall rains come. Check your seed catalogue or with your local county extension agents for the varieties that can be planted now and later. The big job at hand is to get the garden started, concludes Hutchison.

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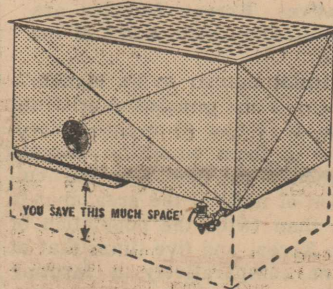
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
