

# FARMERS REPORT GRASSHOPPERS

Lee Grimes reports a serious infestation of grasshoppers in his feed and in fence rows north of Stratford this week. An inspection by the County Agent revealed that he had a hatching area along the edge of his mill and in fence rows of Mexican grasshoppers. This is one type of the migratory hoppers which is about an inch to 1 1/4 inches long when they mature. The hopper infestation covers an area approximately 50 yards wide and a mile long. They were doing some damage to wheat. A count of the grasshoppers infestation revealed as many as 10 to 15 per square foot on young wheat and in the hatching area as high as 40 to 50 to the square foot. This is rather a serious infestation, but is localized in a very small area which can be eliminated by control measures if applied before hoppers begin migrating. Approximately half of these hoppers were winged and the other half had not developed wings.

This is nothing for the farmer to be alarmed about, however preventative measures should be used to control them to save the local crop and at the same time by eradicating them now it will reduce the possibility of a build-up in the spring where they are left to deposit their eggs this fall. Farmers may do well to inspect their fence rows especially around their wheat fields and old lake sites where grasshoppers might be hatching this fall. Where hoppers are located they may be brought under control by two different treatments. The young wheat infested with hoppers should be treated with chlordane at a rate of 1 1/2 to 2 pounds per acre, or toxaphene at a rate of 2 pounds per acre. Either of these chemicals sprayed on the young wheat will make it poisonous to the grasshoppers when they eat it. There will be some damage done to the wheat before the grasshoppers eat sufficient poison to kill them, however, once they eat the poisoned wheat they will immediately stop eating, and will usually die within a period of 36 to 48 hours. Where grasshopper infestation is in old weeds or mature crops the use of chlordane and toxaphene has not been so successful. Possibly a band of poisoned bran and sawdust will be more successful in their control. This is because the grasshopper has to eat the poison before it will kill him, and they will not eat the mature plants where there is any tender wheat nearby for them to graze on.

Where a band of the wheat has been eaten out already around the edge of the field poisoned bran may be spread over this area and give very satisfactory results. Some farmers may be under the false impression that the first light frost will eliminate any grasshopper infestation they have on their farm, but this particular type of grasshopper will survive light frost and may be in the area for some time unless there is a freeze. Farmers can help themselves not only by saving some of their crop around the edge of the field by poison at this time, but also will reduce the possibility of the hoppers depositing their eggs and hatching out next spring.

# FFA Boys Plan Commercial Feeding Project

Eight agricultural boys of the local FFA chapter are planning to purchase about 120 head of commercial steers. Some of these calves have already been purchased and others have been located. Johnny Summerour has purchased 30 heifers to be delivered the 12th of this month. Joe Everett has purchased jointly with his father and brother, 113 head of steers for wheat pasturing. Joe plans to buy 15 more head of the lighter weight calves. Donny Ellison plans to buy 15 head from his father. In the near future Tommy Wakefield plans to buy 15 head of calves, Bachman Bros. plan the purchase of 12 head, Douglas Carter expects to buy 15 head, and Roy Lee Newman plans the purchase of 15 head. The feeding program mapped out by the boys includes the use of wheat pasture as long as it is available, saving temporary pasture for rotation grazing next spring. The calves will be finished by feeding them for 90 days in the feed lots. The commercial feeding program makes allowances for the boys to dispose of their livestock at whatever time they or their fathers may see fit. The program is not being introduced to create competition in the "fat calf shows" but to supplement the fat calf show program with a practical follow-up in fat calf feeding.

# Beaver River Bridge On 287 In 1951 Plans

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**AUTHORITY IN RELIGION**

When we consider this vast number of people upon such a small area, we are made to realize that without authority there would be confusion. Evil men would live at the cost of the lives of others, and vice, corruption, and war would soon destroy all mankind.  
Today in religion there is

much confusion. Not because there is a lack of authority; rather, it is because we sometimes fail to see wherein or in whom authority lies in religion. If mankind could come to the realization of the fact that "it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps" (Jeremiah 10:23), but that authority and the power to guide lies in one far superior to frail man, then there could be unity among believers in Christ.  
But who has authority in religion? In Matthew 28:18 Jesus tells us "All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth." (American Standard Version). Then in verse 20 he continues, "teach-

ing them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you." (ASV). Again in Ephesians 1:22 we find that "he (God) put all things under his (Christ's) feet, and gave him to be head over all things to the church." Authority, therefore, is vested in Jesus Christ. This being the case, we must realize that when Jesus Christ speaks, we must obey, not because He is a tyrant, but because in him as the Son of the Most High God we find the only way to unity among believers and to salvation. But where will we find what Jesus requires of us? The only place where we have the words of Jesus recorded is in the New Testament. Hence, we must go there to find out what he would have us do, teach, and practice.

Thus, when we, frail and fallible, come to a full recognition that in Jesus lies all authority in religious matters and that he speaks to us in the Bible only, then we will be ready and willing to discard our own ideas, opinions and man-made standards and present ourselves humbly at the feet of Jesus and acknowledge Him as our all in all. ## State Fair Will Open In Dallas Saturday

THE STORY of big Jim Hearn is one of the more interesting baseball yarns of 1950. In addition to its human interest side, it also gives an important sideline on the part that luck or fate or the breaks of the game bring to many a ballplayer attempting to keep his grip on the game.

Young Hearn was a star at Georgia Tech some years ago. He is a big kid, 6 feet, 3 — weighing Grantland Rice around 200. He also had his share of stuff from the start. He was a good friend of Bobby Jones and played golf in the low 70's at Druid Hills Course.

Hearn is one of the nicest young fellows you'll meet. He is on the quiet or reserved side, although friendly enough at all times.

I know a couple of years back that Eddie Dyer had considerable confidence in his budding young star. Big Jim had one or two pretty fair seasons. Not big seasons. But not too bad.

Then a year ago he wasn't winning. He won one and lost three last year, then was sent to Rochester to finish out the season. This season Hearn spent most of the time on the bench. He might as well have been left in the minors. He wasn't getting enough work. He lacked control and lack of steady work was largely responsible.

Now it could easily have happened that the Cardinals again would ship the Georgia Tech star back to the minor patrol. But the Giants took a chance and called him in. The keen eyes of Leo Durocher had seen things in Hearn's arm, head and heart that others had overlooked.

There was no midnight parade for Hearn when he arrived with the Giants. He was just another Cardinal castoff. But he wasn't to Leo Durocher. He took Hearn from the bench to the rifle range. He put him to work. In short order the big college boy was one of the star pitchers of the league. Oddly enough, he has been outpitching the leading aces on the Cardinal squad.

Just why the Cardinals let such a stout right arm go is beyond us. Eddie Dyer is one of the smartest of the managers. Fred Saigh is a close watchman in the matter of his products. But they let a \$100,000 or a \$150,000 pitcher go for \$10,000—just as he was heading for the minors again. More than one

You may not believe it but Sammy Urzetta, present amateur golf champion, holds one of the oddest records in the venerable game.

For example, in checking back over past champions recently I discovered I had played golf with most of them—Charles Blair Macdonald, H. G. Whigham, Findlay Douglas, Walter Travis, H. C. Egan, S. M. Bryers, Jerry Travers, R. A. Gardner, W. C. Fownes, Francis Oimmet, Chick Evans, Jess Sweetser, Jess Guilford, Bobby Jones, Johnny Goodman and Max Marston.

In that long line not a one arrived unheralded—or as unheralded as Urzetta was. Most of those who won were given a chance. Most of them had played winning golf before. Not too much had been heard about Ted Bishop, who won at Baltusrol in 1946. But you knew more than a little about most of the others. Unknowns don't win amateur titles as Francis Oimmet won the Open in 1913.

But in checking back through pretournament dope I couldn't find anyone giving Sam Urzetta a chance of any sort.

That isn't all of the story. In every amateur championship practically every winner has to have one or two lucky rounds. I mean that he has to win while not playing too well.

But there was no such rickety playing on the part of Urzetta, who had won the N.Y. state amateur some time before. In round after round he stuck with par or better.

A short while back we were playing golf with a pair of club-swingers who seemed to take double interest in all the short holes.

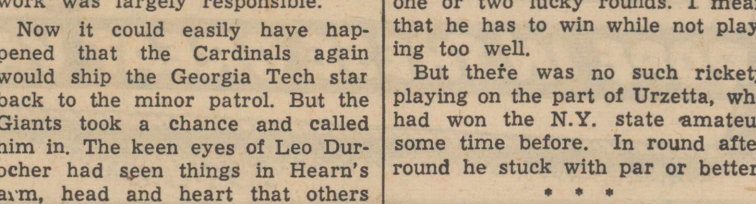
One landed a tee shot about 10 inches from the cup and almost picked up a fit.

**Giving Yourself**  
Lesson for October 8, 1950

"WHEN a girl throws herself away on a man, she generally takes pretty careful aim." That may be so; but more than a few persons throw themselves clean away without taking aim at all. They amble through life, they do not march. They have no personal five-year plans, not even five-week plans. They stumble from one day to the next, they live from hand to mouth. They care for nobody and few care for them. They may be found on Skid Row, living from one handout to another, or they may be found in the Silver Spoon Club, with plenty of money but no idea how to spend it and hardly enough energy to waste it.

**A Man Gives Himself**

MOST people, however, do give themselves to something. Every man who amounts to something, gives himself in one way or another. There was a college student once who practiced nineteen hours a day on the piccolo, it was said. Naturally he couldn't stay in college at that rate, so they got rid of him. But he landed, as you might expect, in one of America's finest orchestras.

If you want to succeed in music, give yourself to music. If you want to succeed in a law course, give yourself to your books. Men usually give themselves to what they think is of greatest value. Some give themselves; that is to say, they devote themselves to their own comfort and happiness.

That is cheap and selfish, of course, but there is a kind of transferred selfishness which is almost as common: giving oneself to one's family to the exclusion of everything and every one else. A good man will love his family, a good mother her children; but there is a kind of ingrown family affection and mother-love which is blind to community needs.

**Down the River**

THERE are bad ways of giving oneself. A prophet once said of King Ahab, he sold himself to do evil. That is still done. Some give themselves up to liquor and gambling.

There have been quite selfless and tireless advocates of atheism, and communism, and fascism, and bad religions of all varieties. Men have worn themselves thin in the service of Hitler and of other tyrants.

If the energy and persistence, for example, which is spent in trying to prevent the humane use of unwanted animals in medical research, were spent in intelligent support of preventive medicine, how much better the world would be!

**Say Yes to Christ**

SO Shall I give my life? The question is, To what? To whom? For three months these Bible studies consider "Growth in Christian Living." All growth starts at some point; and Christian growth starts at the point where the Christian gives himself to Christ and his cause.

Consider what "commitment to Christ" means. It is not sentimental devotion to his memory, it is not singing songs about him or to him. (Not that such songs are wrong!) It is not following a historical character, though Jesus was and is a real person. It is saying "Yes" to Jesus Christ. It is giving one's highest devotion, one's first loyalty to the Son of God.

It is devotion to the living Christ, ever-present; to the One whose reign is destined to be over all. It is devotion to Christ's cause; to his Kingdom, his control, his way of life. It means growing into his mind; it means becoming more and more like him, wanting to be like him, till at last Paul's words come true again: "For me, to live is Christ."

**You Get More than You Give**

IT IS a mistake to think that if one gives his life to Christ, then he cannot give his life to anything else. The astonishing truth is, when a person first gives himself to Christ, he finds that Christ gives back far more. Christians can be, and are, devoted scholars and business men and mothers and doctors and farmers. The more truly one is committed to Christ, the better he is likely to be at his job, whatever it is.

**American Jeweler Sentenced**

Warren B. Smith, 19, alias John K. Thomas, advertising manager of the American Jeweler, Lincoln, Nebraska, was sentenced in Omaha, Nebraska August 24 for using the mails to defraud.

Smith mailed his advertising orders to newspapers from Huntington, West Virginia. Advertisements offered special prices on nylons, silverware, and other merchandise. Postal authorities in Lincoln, Nebraska, arrested Smith, when he arrived to claim the accumulated mail. American Jewelers was non-existent and Smith admitted having no merchandise with which to fill the orders that jammed two mail sacks.

**Predatory Control Is Big Problem**

Predatory animal control is a big problem in Texas and its size is indicated by the annual report on the predatory animal control operations of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The report reveals that 30,395 predatory animals were taken during the control year 1949-50 by their hunters.

During the past year, predatory animal control work was carried on in 106 counties in the State by an average force of 130 hunters. In addition to this work, a few ranchers employed their own hunters, and game associations and county governments paid bounties for trapping the animals.

Of the 30,395 animals taken last year, 27,176 were coyotes. An important part of this catch included a total of 1,105 coyote

pups which were taken from dens, mostly in the Lubbock area. A new record was set in taking a total of 2,829 bobcats in Texas last year. Since very few bobcats are caught accidentally while trapping coyotes, the number taken was primarily the result of a special effort toward bobcat control with steel traps.

Widespread control action in wolf country resulted in a total of 356 red wolves being taken last year, an increase of 50 percent over the number taken in 1948-49. Although no specific full-time projects are directed toward mountain lion control, 18 of these animals were caught by the hunters in addition to their other predator control activities.
