Austin Coates, assistant colonial secretary, said three men buried the paintings in the grounds of the governor's residence. Only they knew where. All three men died. Each believed the other would tell where the pictures were buried. A search of government files has afforded no clew.

Thirsty Horses Still Will Drink in Downtown N.Y.

NEW YORK—For the past 54 years thirsty horses have been watered at the Madison avenue headquarters of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Recently the building was sold, but the horses still will be able to get a drink there. Through an arrangement with officials of the National Lutheran council, new owners of the building, the watering service will continue.

The Rev. Paul C. Empie, executive director of the Lutheran council, said that while watering horses was a "bit out of our line, we will be happy to continue this humanitarian service as long as there is a demand for it."

Italian Nationalists Fear Next May Be Foreign Pope

ROME, Italy — For the first time in centuries the next Pope could be a non-Italian.

There have been many non-Italians in the Pontificate—Adrian IV was an Englishman and there have been a number of Germans—but for several centuries now, all Popes have been Italian. Up to 1946 the Italian cardinals had an absolute majority in the Sacred College, but that is no longer true, for there are many foreign cardinals.

Now the nationalists in the church fear that if a foreign cardinal is offered as a successor to Pope Pius XII—who is in poor health—the foreign cardinals might vote together for him. They are asking: Will Cardinal Spellman be the first American Pope?

Woman Becomes American Citizen for Third Time

HONOLULU — Mrs. Katherine Yonemura is an American citizen again—for the third time.

She was born a citizen in Hawaii. She lost her citizenship when she married a Japanese alien. She regained it in 1936 when she was naturalized.

Then she went to Japan. The war caught her there. She voted in a Japanese election. The U.S. consulate there ruled she had forfeited her citizenship by voting.

Now Federal judge Delbert E. Metzger overruled the consul, saying she was coerced into voting and restored her citizenship.

30 Tons of Dirt Moved To Rescue Dog in Sewer

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich.— For 36 hours a foxhound by the name of Duke was trapped in an abandoned sewer. It took the combined might of the city, the county of Kent and the Michigan Consolidated Gas company to rescue him.

Their heavy equipment moved more than 30 tons of dirt in digging up the sewer. A crowd of 400 persons was at hand as his master, John De Young, picked him out of a litter of broken tile and crumbling earth.

The dog had dashed into the sewer in apparent pursuit of a raccoon.

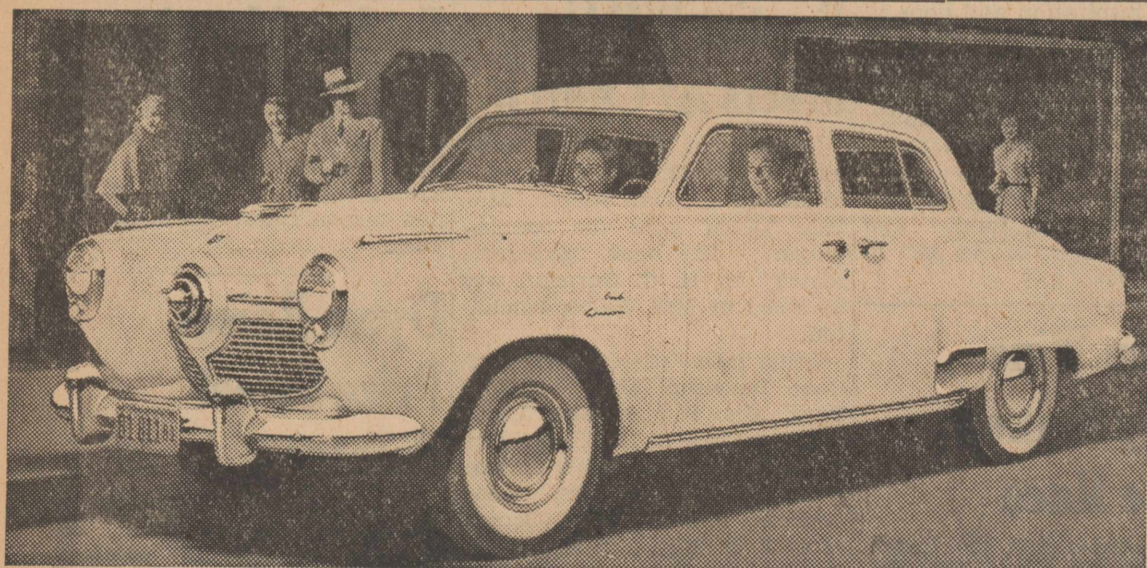

Great Powers Took Beating In Election

The significance of the last election will be the subject of heated discussion for a long time to come, as victor, vanquished, and objective observer alike try to figure out what made the people vote as they did. But, regardless of the verdict of history, certain conclusions can be drawn now with small chance of rebuttal.

First of all, Mr. Truman and his "Fair Deal" program took a stunning defeat. It is true that the Democrats have paper-thin majorities in House and Senate. But it seems impossible that any of the more controversial sections of the program can be pushed through while this Congress is in office. The majorities are just too small. A good many of the Democrats are notably unenthusiastic when it comes to the Brannan Plan,

compulsory government health insurance, regional authorities and administrations, virtually unlimited security, and the rest. They will line up with the strong Republican bloc to stop them.

The defeat of so many Democratic stalwarts rubbed more salt in the Administration's wounds. The loss of such Senators as majority leader Lucas and Tydings and Thomas is a bitter one. Men such as these carried much of the load for the President in his dealings with Congress. They will be extremely difficult to replace. At the moment, there seem to be no willing candidates for majority leader to succeed Mr. Lucas. Whoever the choice is, he will have a rugged and thankless job next year.

Perhaps the most unequivocal Truman supporter of all was Mrs. Helen Gahagan Douglas. She lost badly in the California senate race, and it must be remembered that this is the key state, which Mr. Truman carried last time. Another blow was for James Roosevelt to go down to overwhelming defeat in his try for governor.

But the Truman administration and the Democratic party were not the only losers in this election. Organized labor, as a political force, took a terrific whipping. The Taft-Ferguson election in Ohio was the key spot. The CIO-AFL high commands did everything conceivable to beat Senator Taft, whom they regard as their arch-enemy. Up to shortly before the election, they were confident of success. They felt that, at the worst, Taft would just squeak by. Actually, he smothered his opponent with a 400,000 plus majority. He even carried most of the industrial counties where union membership is greatest. In other words, the rank-and-file didn't obey their union officers. And that was true in other states and in other contests, including a number of very important gubernatorial battles.

Another interesting point is that political registrations don't necessarily mean a thing any more. Oregon is a fine example. In that state, on the basis of registrations, Democrats now outnumber Republicans by a substantial margin. Yet the GOP swept this election. Republican Senator Morse beat his Democratic opponent by better than three-to-one. Republican Governor McKay beat his Democratic opponent, a strong pro-Truman man, by two-to-one. The people voted for individuals, not party labels.

What caused all this? The international mess; the growing worry over the government domestic spending; the feeling held by millions of people that the Administration has been keeping secrets from them; the equally potent feeling that we have carried internationalism to an extreme and that it is just not possible for us to support and police the whole world; the ominous turn of events in

Korea, such forces as these, it seems now, caused the great revolution in voting that occurred last November 7.

Trawlers Dragged at Sea, Captains Blame Submarine

PORTLAND, Me.—Two fishing dragger captains reported recently that they thought the mysterious underwater object that almost sank their ships was a Russian submarine.

Capt. Arthur W. Jordan of the 110-foot Cherokee said that ten minutes after he had lowered his nets and made them fast with heavy steel cables, the nets were pulled taut and the boat was pulled, stern-first, for 25 minutes until the cables snapped.

Soon after that, the Cherokee picked up a distress call from the dragger Evzone, commanded by Captain Jordan's brother, Thomas. The message said it had been pulled astern for 90 minutes until the cables snapped.

Both captains ascribed their experiences to a Russian submarine because the Coast Guard reported there were no American submarines in the area. Neither did Canada have submarines there and it was not a whale, they held, because the cables had been snapped by metal.

President Truman's Marine Letter Is Sold for \$2,500

BATON ROUGE, La.—President Truman's now famous marine letter has been sold for \$2,500.

The letter dubbed the marines as "the navy's police force" with a "propaganda machine" likable to Stalin's. Mr. Truman apologized after marines and ex-marines exploded at home and abroad.

Theus J. McQueen, national adjutant of the marine corps league, announced that the letter would be sold. He said the \$2,500 check would be turned over to the league for welfare and service work among marine veterans.

McQueen reported he had conducted a telegraphic poll of the league's national staff and a majority approved the sale.

McQueen said that he did not know the identity of the purchaser.

Alpine Lakes

Switzerland is reported using some of its scenic Alpine lakes as "deep-freezes," lowering food and other perishable supplies in sealed drums 40 feet or more below surface level. There is plenty of room 40 feet and more down in Lake Geneva. The crescent-shaped lake fills a steep canyon of rock 45 miles long and eight miles at its widest, with water depths of as much as 1,095 feet.

Finish Girls Scrub Ship, Save Nation Large Fine

NEW YORK—A strike in Finland is hurting that country's effort to pay off reparations to Russia, which demands payment of a heavy fine for each belated delivery.

A recent report said that 80 engineers and 40 office girls managed to save the state a fine of 11 million Finnish markkas. In a shipyard the girls went to work on an almost finished ship, due to be delivered to the Russians at midnight. They scrubbed decks while the engineers hooked up electrical wiring and adjusted the engines.

Exactly 30 minutes before the hour of delivery, the reparations committee in Helsinki was told by telephone that the ship was ready. When the Russians came to take over, they remarked laughingly that they had never seen such clean decks.

Hot Weather in History

How weather has affected history through the centuries is told in scores of major events, including the storm at sea that helped to destroy the Spanish Armada and save 16th-century England; the rain that hastened the defeat of Napoleon at Waterloo, and the famed snows of Russia in which the legions of both Napoleon and Hitler were bogged down.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. — Emmet Cox, Chicago fire prevention expert, reported the safest place to be in a lightning storm is in a metal bed.
He explained this to the annual meeting of the National Fire Prevention association. A lightning bolt entering a room would follow a metal bedstead and leave its occupant unharmed, the expert said.

U. S. Must Guard Attacks From The Flank

A fine commentary on the United States and its history was recently made by Robert S.

Henry of the Association of American Railroads. "In the short space of a little more than a century and a half this nation has settled and civilized a continent," he said. "It has established a system of government and an operating economy under which men produce more, live better and have greater freedom, than ever before in history, or anywhere else in the world today."

"But for a long generation this truly incomparable record of achievement in human freedom, satisfaction and happiness has been under attack. Some of the attack has been frontal, from external sources. More insidious and more dangerous have been internal attacks from the flank, attacks working through those enterprizes which shape public opinion, working by subtle twisting of thought and debasement of values. In fictionalized biography, in decadent drama, in so-called 'realistic' novels great American figures are given a pseudo-Marxist complexion, while the self-supporting, tax-paying, substantial citizen of today, especially if he be a business man, is satirized or ridiculed."

"In a popular 'Ballad for Americans,' written no doubt with patriotic intent, the movement for American liberty is described in the following couplet:
'Nobody who was anybody believed it;
Everybody who was anybody, they doubted it.'

"The implication that the American Revolution was carried forward by nobodies against the doubts and indifferences of 'everybody who was anybody,' is a strange perversion of the part played in history by those great 'nobodies' who risked their all, and jeopardized their very necks, by signing their names

to the Declaration of Independence, or the part of that other great 'nobody,' George Washington. No, the American republic was not created by nobodies. It was created by great men, wise men, men of character and vision, supported by self-respecting, hard working men and women.
"Today, as never before, the continued strength, the very existence, of this nation depend upon public appreciation of the facts of the vast and varied organization of our free economy, what it is, how it works, what it does, what its achievements mean to us all."

That economy produced our railroads, our natural resource agriculture, our religious and education system, everything

that makes us strong. It is based on freedom. If we abandon it, the blessings we think of as American will die.

Thanksgiving

For 329 years, since the first year after the original colonists landed at Plymouth Rock, Americans have paused following the harvest season to offer Thanksgiving for the benefits that have been theirs.

Forgotten Red Prince Lives In Yugoslavia

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — The "Red Prince" of Yugoslavia, a man who might have been a king, lives in obscurity behind the Iron Curtain.

He is Prince George, elder brother of King Alexander, whose slaying in 1934 marked the real end of the monarchy. He is the uncle of Yugoslavia's exiled King Peter, who still clutches the hope of returning to his throne.

In the turbulent Balkans of a half-century ago, Prince George took his princehood and his politics seriously, dug deep into literature and history, little dreaming that Communism one day would rule the heritage of his dynasty.

Mystery Cloaks Past

Now the Communists tolerate him because many of the old-timers remember him from the years when he spoke out for liberalism.

Mystery cloaks his past, and the reason why this younger brother, Alexander, rather than George, became monarch of Yugoslavia three decades ago when liberalism was on the upsurge in Europe.

It is reported that Prince George kicked and killed a valet in a moment of temper and old King Peter, rather than risk the anger of his people, forced him to renounce his right to the throne in favor of young Alexander.

History might have been different had it been otherwise. George was brought up as a student in Switzerland, a brilliant if eccentric scholar who, twice wounded, won a soldier's reputation as a brave man in World War I.

Educated in Russia

Alexander, on the other hand, was educated in Russia, brought up as a darling of the court of the czars. A soldier's soldier himself, he ruled as an iron-handed despot when he took over, first as regent and then as king after his father was slain.

There was no quibbling about who was boss. There was but one king. His name was Alexander. He practiced politics with the skill of a born politician, playing party

against party, one leader against another. The "Red Prince" of Yugoslavia gets an income of about 30,000 dinars (\$600) mostly from the Communist masters of the country his family once ruled in return for property he once owned. It is a strange and startling ending for a man who might have been a king.

Last GAR Commander Dies; Only Nine 'Buddies' Left

VANCOUVER, Wash.—The last commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, Theodore A. Penland, 101, died recently of a heart attack. His death leaves only nine GAR survivors.

In the Civil War, he served as a private in the 152nd Indiana Volunteers with the Army of the Potomac. His father and three brothers served in the Union Army. His father was killed in the second battle of Bull Run.

Penland was elected commander in chief of the GAR at the 1948 convention at Lansing, Mich. At that time he said:

"I'm going back to Indianapolis next year to close up the last encampment. We held our first one there. Most of the boys are pretty old and tired. They can't take it any more."

Some of his buddies, frail but still stubborn, tried to talk him into holding "just one more encampment," but Penland held firm. He admitted that he wanted to be known as the "last commander in chief of the GAR."

U.S. Lawmaker Breaks Through 'Iron Curtain'

BERLIN, Germany—Representative Thurmond Chatham of North Carolina recently told of a 50 mile jeep ride behind the Iron Curtain and an eyewitness account of new Soviet baby tanks and jet planes. Had he been caught in such forbidden territory he would have been held as a spy and perhaps executed. The congressman said he was escorted on the trip by a Russian officer he had befriended while they were doing liaison work during World War II. Chatham told this startling story:
He recognized the Russian, in civilian clothes, in a west-Berlin night club.
"He threw his arms around me and we had a good talk. He asked if I would like to take a trip with him and I accepted."
Barked Way Through
The next day the Russian took Chatham to the Soviet sector of Berlin, put on the uniform of a senior Red army officer and took a jeep from the Russian motor pool. He barked his way through half a dozen check points, explaining his companion was a friend from one of the east European satellite countries.
At an airfield completed only six weeks before, Chatham said he saw new jet planes with swept back wings that looked to him as sleek and fast as the latest American types.
At another base there were about 20 tanks built lower than anything he had seen while in combat in both world wars—about three feet high but armed with long guns.
Chatham speculated that the tanks might be almost immune to ordinary fire from weapons that could not lower their muzzles enough to aim at the low tanks. The drivers, he conjectured, probably lie prone to operate the tanks.
Russians Lose Face
Chatham said his Russian friend gave him three personal opinions:
1. The Soviets have lost face in Asia over the Korean war.
2. The Kremlin drive to bring about Polish-east German friendship under Communist rule has failed so far.
3. "Every one legged German would carry a gun against us (the Russians) now!"
The congressman said he saw thousands of Russian soldiers in uniform bringing in the harvest. The officer, he related, explained this as a measure to maintain discipline in any army cooped up mostly in compounds and barracks. He estimated the troops numbered 250,000.

Photos Taken Mile in Air Show Minerals

ITHACA, N. Y.—A Cornell University professor has developed a new way of prospecting by looking at air photos taken from a mile or two in the air.
The method can be used for diamonds, uranium, gold, tin, iron, lead, or oil.
From Cornell University's airplane photos of about a third of the land of the entire earth, Prof. D. J. Belcher of the civil engineering school developed the clues for air prospecting.
The discovery is the outgrowth of World War II when Belcher wrote General MacArthur's staff suggesting what they could discover by looking more closely at aerial photos. He was instructed to catch the next plane.
Buried Pipes Show Up
Some clues are almost incredible. Drainage pipes, buried underground, and not visible when you walk over them, show as thin white lines. The earth is a little drier directly above them. This causes a slight change in color of vegetation, which shows white.
White spots the size of pin points in the Midwest were identified as ant holes. For several feet around each hole the ants track the vegetation enough to change the color.
Gold deposits have been discovered on photos by earthquake faults, iron by a slight change in colors of leaves. Air prospecting for oil is widespread.
Around uranium deposits there is usually colored earth, mainly yellow. On the photos this shows white.
Diamonds are found in "pipes." These are circular deposits of blue clay about 2 miles in diameter, extending deep down. Prospectors run plow furrows looking for clay, but this requires years. The vegetation on top of a blue-clay pipe is different enough to reveal the circular formation.
Sand Can Be Seen
The size of grains of sand may be "seen." An example is dunes, having what looks like long, gray fingers streaming inland. The winds blowing inland have stripped away the fine sand, leaving coarser stuff in ridges which reveal their presence by whiter color.
These fingers show sand which automobiles cannot cross, but tractors can. Farther inland are likely to be signs of clay, which automobiles can cross but which clog tractor treads.
Belcher says anyone can learn to read the photos. There are about 30 main formations. These repeat all over the world. The land forms around Cornell repeat in Nova Scotia and Switzerland; those of central Arizona in Iran, Australia, and Africa. The volcanic soils of the Aleutians repeat in Korea and Japan.
The main formations divide into hundreds of others which can be identified and interpreted.

Swedes Not Interested In Migrating to U.S.A.
NEW YORK — The Gothenburg Trade & Shipping Journal reports "America fever" rages in Norway and Denmark but not in Sweden.
United States immigration quotas of 2,377 for Norway and 1,181 for Denmark are filled for years to come by prospective emigrants but the quota of 3,314 for Sweden remains unfilled year after year.
For the last two decades the movement of Swedish immigrants into the U. S. has been more than compensated for by the return to Sweden of Swedish-Americans — mostly elderly people.
The "back to Sweden" attraction is apparently stimulated by legislation there which makes it possible for "ex-Swedes" to regain citizenship, after a two year residence, and also to benefit from comfortable old age pensions provided by Sweden's social legislation.

Angry Housewives Sweep Election in Small Town
MADISON, Miss. — An unknown chemical has been turning clothes and skin red in Madison. The town's housewives complained to city officials but nothing was done.
Finally, angered by lack of results the ladies named an all-woman slate to run for city office. They swept every post but one, that of city marshal, in the Democratic primary. That is the same as election in Mississippi.
Their first project is to find out what can be done about the water. The women say the red color can be washed off the skin, but that it ruins clothes.

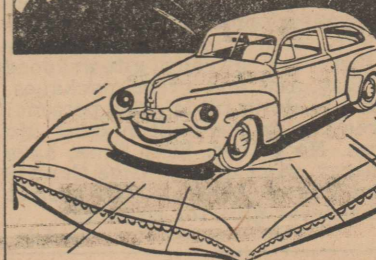

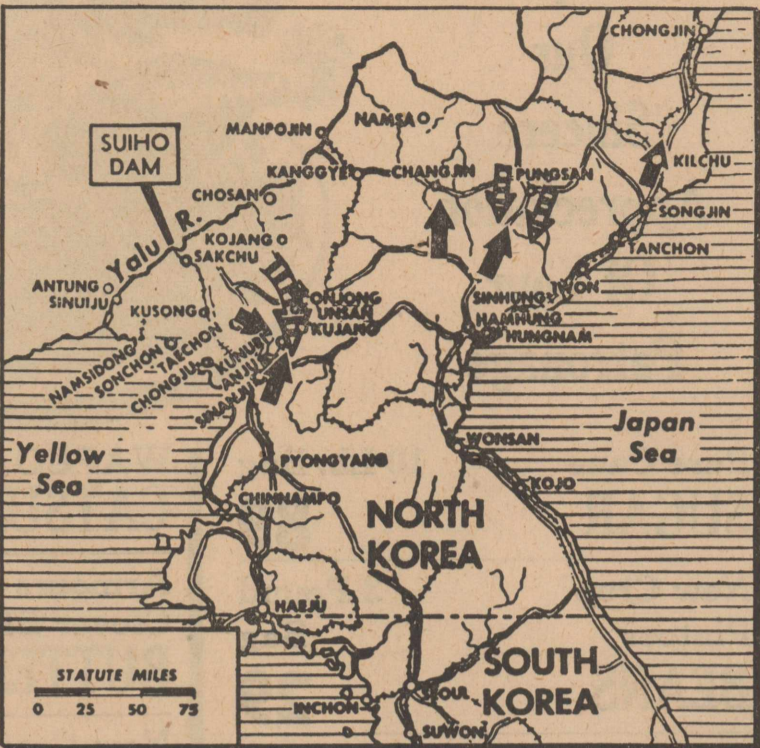

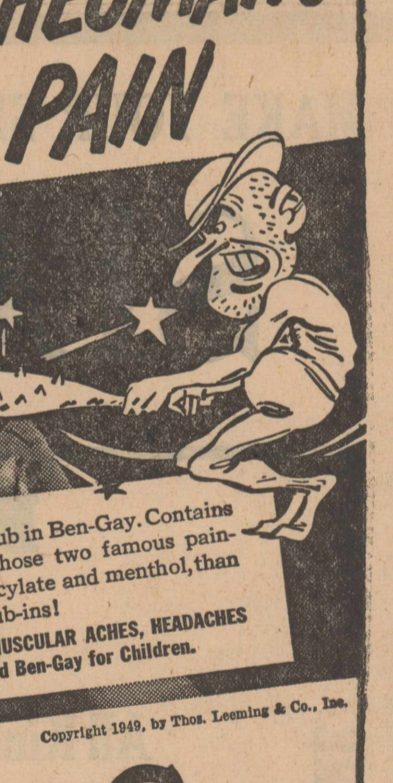

Russia Tests Seven Ton Guided Missiles, Report

STOCKHOLM, Sweden — The newspaper Aftonbladet reports the Russians have been lobbing seven-ton guided missiles over the Baltic area during the last summer.

The newspaper said the rockets were launched near Cranz in Soviet held east Prussia and were believed to have been aimed at a small island in Lake Onega, some 700 miles from Cranz.

The operation was labeled "Silent Maneuver" and was combined with radar practice.

The maneuvers began in mid-July and lasted several weeks. Their aim was to test the preparedness of the so called "first group of new radar stations and weapons bases."

The report said the Russians had a string of radar stations extending from the Russian leased base of Porkkala, 40 miles southwest of Helsinki, along the Russian controlled coasts of Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland and East Germany, as far as Wismar in the Russian occupied zone of Germany.

Dolled-Up Dobbins Making a Comeback On Western Farms

GLENVILLE, Minn. — According to P. H. Cottrell of Glenville, who deals in horses, the once beast for burden on the American farm is staging a comeback. But now he has a new role. He is becoming a pet.

He'll earn his keep by giving the farm pleasure of horseback riding, but use of that energy is a far cry from that he used to burn up tilling the soil.

Cottrell reports the horse is finding favor in southern Minnesota which is so highly mechanized that farmers don't even swat mosquitoes by hand.

The section used to be proud of its Clydesdale, Percherons and Belgians. Now such animals are as unusual as a 1912 Maxwell and at county fairs a matched team of Clydes get more attention than the midway.

The draft animal gave way to tractors. And something went out of rural living. A farmer and his team of horses held each other in mutual esteem. They worked for each other's living and fared equally in the fortunes of the battle of wrestling an income from the soil.

Cottrell reports farmers are now offering fancy prices for saddle animals. To meet the demand he has had to go to the Dakotas and Iowa for stocks.

It's a grand life the nag is leading now. Fed, groomed and cared for like high-priced milch cows, they go to the fairs trimmed with satin ribbons.

Shed no tears over the horse. He's on his way back to a proper station in rural America.

Russians Remove Prisoners' Pallor With Sun Tanning

UDINE, ITALY — The Russians want their prisoners to appear healthy. As a result nine Mussolini diplomats got a month's sun-tan treatment to remove their war-prison pallor before they were returned to Italy.

The diplomats, arrested in the Italian legation at Bucharest and Sofia in 1943, were returned to Italy after seven years' confinement in Russia.

When a reporter expressed surprise at their healthy appearance, one of the group said they were taken from their Moscow prison and sent to a Soviet camp near Vienna. There they were ordered to spend their days in the sun.
