### It Takes All Kinds

THE ideal community is one which everybody is a Christia and indeed all belong to the sam church. But such communities an few and far between. Most of u live pretty close—and sometime uncomfortably close-to people wi are not Christians, except perhag in name, and who may be hard i get along with.

How can we live with such people in a Christian way? Paul, ip Romans 12, makes some practical suggestions. He knew very well that no city or town in the Roman Empire was Christian or anywhere near it; yet he shows how to have the Christian spirit never-the-less. Christians should be the most va uable members of any community But are they? Is this true in you community? If so, what is it the the Christians contribute? And not, is it maybe the Christians fault?

#### \* \* \*

The Law Above Laws **A** group of people who act toward each other in no better way than the laws of the land require may be a neighborhood but it is ne community.

The laws (and useful they are, to be sure) can regulate our behavior, but they cannot touch our hearts. They can forbid us to harm our neighbor, but they cannot force us to feel kindly towards him. For complete community, something more than law is necessary; and again Paul puts us on the track of it.

Love is above all law; it does not break laws but it goes far beyond them. It is not the law-abiding citizens who are the best ones; the true ornaments and treasures, the First Citizens of a community, are the love-abiding.
