Doesn't Expect **Vampire Bats** In Texas

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, today took mild exception to recent reports that disability pensions for appoint-south Texas faces an invasion from rabid vampire bats. disability pensions for appoint-ive county officials and em-ployees."

The health official referred to a widely circulated newspaper story quoting a Mexican government rabies specialist, Dr. Aurelio Malaga-Alba, that pig-faced vampire bats carrying the dread disease had been discovered 100 miles southwest of Presidio County in the Big Bend country. "I think it's a remote, fantas-

tic interpretation," Dr. Cox said "This whole problem was discussed at the U.S.-Mexico Border Public Health Conference in Chihuahua two years ago.

He said he was sure Dr. Mal aga-Alba is "entirely competent" and that the State Health Department would take every advantage of his warning.
"But the story didn't mention

everal pertinent facts about the situation. Vampire bats re-quire a tropical environment. The story didn't mention that. And it didn't mention that vampire bats are relatively rare even

The newspaper story, originating in the Austin American, was "interesting," the long-time health officer said. But he believes it might make all bats vampire bats "in the eyes of the public.

"And for the most part, bats are beneficial. Only the vampire is a blood sucker. The rest feed on harmful insects, including mosquitoes," Dr. Cox warned

San Antonio has an ordinance which makes it unlawful to kill bats of familiar species. The State Bureau of Laboratories said they had never found bats positive for rabies.

Dr. Cox's statement: "The invasion of Texas by this vampire bat is a remote, fantastic interpretation (of Dr. Malaga-Alba's report). This bat is known to inhabit only certain southern geographical locations. Vampire bat history was discussed last year at the U.S.-Mexico Public Health Association in Chi-Its limited migrations huahua. are to be expected.

"Isolated rabies infections caused by the bat have been reported from time to time in animals and man; however, there is no reason to expect bats to visit over the Rio Grande."







"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,-000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature (provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall hereafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact: provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.


