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## Junior Fair Exhibits Are Being Gathered

FFA and 4-H club members are busy getting ready for the second annual Junior Fair to be presented in cooperation with the fourth annual Stratford Jamboree celebration September 7, 8 and 9. The fair will be held Saturday, September 8, in the school car barn. It is hoped by the fair committee that adult citizens of the county will prepare a large number of exhibits.

**WHEAT**  
Wheat exhibits will be accepted on an open class contest from all exhibitors. All the different varieties of wheat will be placed in one class and judged 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc. from top to bottom. Ribbons will be given through the 8th place.

Wheat judging is scheduled to start at 9:00 A. M. Saturday, September 8.

**BEEF CATTLE**  
FFA and 4-H livestock exhibits will be shown. Calves will be separated into junior and senior classes by weight, dividing the entire group into two classes of approximately the same size. Calves of the same age and of approximately the same size should go in one class.

Each class, the senior and junior class, will be judged in blue, red, and white groups. In other words the senior class will be divided into 3 groups by the judge, placing the calves that are in good condition and as far advanced with proper care as might be expected of calves at this time fairly good flesh, but could have been in better condition had they been pushed a little more in the red ribbon group. The white ribbon group calves will be those that are not in condition or up to the standard that might be expected had the calves been given good care. The junior class will be broken into the same groups as the senior class.

A grand champion will not be selected in either class.  
If there is an open junior bull class or heifer class they will be judged on breeding characteristics and placed 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, from first to the bottom of the class. Anyone wishing to enter either a junior bull or heifer should notify Duard Lamb or Ernest Goule.

Card judging is scheduled to start at 9:30 A. M. Saturday, September 8. The senior class will be judged first, the junior class second, and breeding classes third.

It will be necessary for the judging to be completed by 10:30 A. M. in order for those who are to be in the parade to get in position by 11:00 o'clock.

**HOGS**  
Hogs will be divided into classes of gilts, junior sows, aged sows, barrows, and boars. Each breeding class will be judged on breeding characteristics and placed 1, 2, and 3 in order to the bottom of the class.  
Barrows will be judged for fat hogs, based on their present condition, and placed in order from the top to the bottom of the class.

Judging of the hogs is scheduled to start immediately following the calf and breeding cattle judging. It will be necessary for the judging to be completed by 10:30 A. M. Saturday, September 8.

**POULTRY**  
Poultry entries will be made up of coops of three, one cockerel and two hens; coops of doubles, 1 cockerel and 1 hen; coops of singles, one hen or one rooster.

Coops of chickens will be divided into single purpose and dual purpose chickens as follows: single purpose chickens for laying; dual purpose, laying and meat production; single purpose, meat production. Ribbons will be awarded entries for the first 8 places.  
Judging of poultry is scheduled to begin at 8:30 A. M. Saturday, September 8. The judging must be completed by 10:30 A. M.

**FIELD CROPS**  
Field crops will be divided into two classes; head samples should be tied in groups of ten heads, and bundle samples made up of stalks and tied in bundles at least 4 inches in diameter. The head samples will be divided into the following classes: Martin, Plainsman, Hegari, Kafir, and other grain sorghums. Each variety will be placed in order for 8 places.  
Sweet sorghum and sudan will be divided into head samples and bundle samples. The head samples will be awarded ribbons for the first 8 places.

Judging of field crops is scheduled to commence at 9:00 A. M. Saturday, September 8.

**GARDEN PRODUCTS**  
Garden products will be entered in special classes such as cucumbers, squash, tomatoes, okra, etc., and each sample in each class will be awarded ribbons for the first 8 places.  
Numbers required in samples are: cucumbers 3, onions 12, turnips 12, carrots 12, beets 6, tomatoes 6, corn (ears) 12, cabbage 3, summer squash 3, winter squash 1, cushaw 1, pumpkins 1, watermelons 1, cantaloupes 3, peppers 8, okra 12, apples 5, pears 5, peaches 5.  
Judging of garden products is scheduled to begin at 8:30 A. M. Saturday, September 8.

**BAKING EXHIBITS**  
Baking exhibits will be placed on display Saturday, September 8. Although the County Baking show will be held August 31, the ribbons will be placed on the exhibits September 8 at 9:30 A. M., and other awards will be made at this time.

## FFA Boy Has Economical Feeder

Roy Newman, feeding one of W. O. Bryant's Angus calves, is well pleased with the rate and economical gain he is getting.

The calf was purchased January 11th and moved to Newman's farm immediately. He weighed 225 pounds. The calf was weighed last week and topped the scales at 750 pounds.

This was an average gain of 2.5 pounds a day. This takes in the period of changing from one nurse cow to another and getting him started on feed.

He has made this gain at the rate of one pound for each 2.7 pounds of concentrates eaten. Added to this amount of feed is his milk and hay.  
Roy has his eye on the prize money to be given next spring to the boy who has put the most economical gain on his calf.

### Farmers To Aid In Defense Production

Chief aim of farm families cooperating in the local program of the Farmers Home Administration this fiscal year, will be to bring their farms to maxi-

mum efficiency and help produce the food, feed, and fiber needed for national defense, J. J. Roan, Jr., FHA County Supervisor, said this week.

A total of 55 family farmers in this five county area are currently using the agency's supervised credit to buy, enlarge, develop, or operate farms, or to improve inadequate housing. As a result, these families are now better able to raise products in

short supply. "The small farm is the greatest potential source of domestic agricultural labor. Yet it is producing far below capability because land is not being effectively used and capital reserves or suitable credit is lacking. The Sparkman Committee of the United States Senate has pointed out that in the farm families over the Nation are only a third as productive as families on well-developed and well-organized family farms such as the Farmers Home Administration creates. Some of these farmers are in this locality."

Mr. Roan explained that his job and other County Supervisors' jobs were to help borrower families arrange cropping systems that would make the best use of the land, and as far as possible, to work out programs

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to needy persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for such purposes and providing for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government for such assistance; providing that the payment of such funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the necessary election, and providing for the form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:** Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; and for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not be considered as a sale for the purchase of other real property of like value. If any recipient of assistance or spouse shall not be eligible for assistance if it be shown that all proceeds from such sale have been used by such person and spouse for normal living expenses; and for the purchase of other real property of like value. "The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such assistance may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Act shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at the Election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the Second Tuesday in November, 1951, which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the amendments to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State Fund expenditures for such purpose each year."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

### Doesn't Expect Vampire Bats In Texas

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, today took mild exception to recent reports that South Texas faces an invasion from rabid vampire bats.

The health official referred to a widely circulated newspaper story quoting a Mexican government rabies specialist, Dr. Aurelio Malaga-Alba, that pig-faced vampire bats carrying the dread disease had been discovered 100 miles southwest of Presidio County in the Big Bend country.

"I think it's a remote, fantastic interpretation," Dr. Cox said. "This whole problem was discussed at the U.S.-Mexico Border Public Health Conference in Chihuahua two years ago.

He said he was sure Dr. Malaga-Alba is "entirely competent" and that the State Health Department would take every advantage of his warning.

"But the story didn't mention several pertinent facts about the situation. Vampire bats require a tropical environment. The story didn't mention that. And it didn't mention that vampire bats are relatively rare even in tropical countries."

The newspaper story, originating in the Austin American, was "interesting," the long-time health officer said. But he believes it might make all bats vampire bats "in the eyes of the public."

"And for the most part, bats are beneficial. Only the vampire is a blood sucker. The rest feed on harmful insects, including mosquitoes," Dr. Cox warned.

San Antonio has an ordinance which makes it unlawful to kill bats of familiar species. The State Bureau of Laboratories said they had never found bats positive for rabies.

Dr. Cox's statement: "The invasion of Texas by this vampire bat is a remote, fantastic interpretation (of Dr. Malaga-Alba's report). This bat is known to inhabit only certain southern geographical locations. Vampire bat history was discussed last year at the U.S.-Mexico Public Health Association in Chihuahua. Its limited migrations are to be expected.

"Isolated rabies infections caused by the bat have been reported from time to time in animals and man; however, there is no reason to expect bats to visit over the Rio Grande."

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment

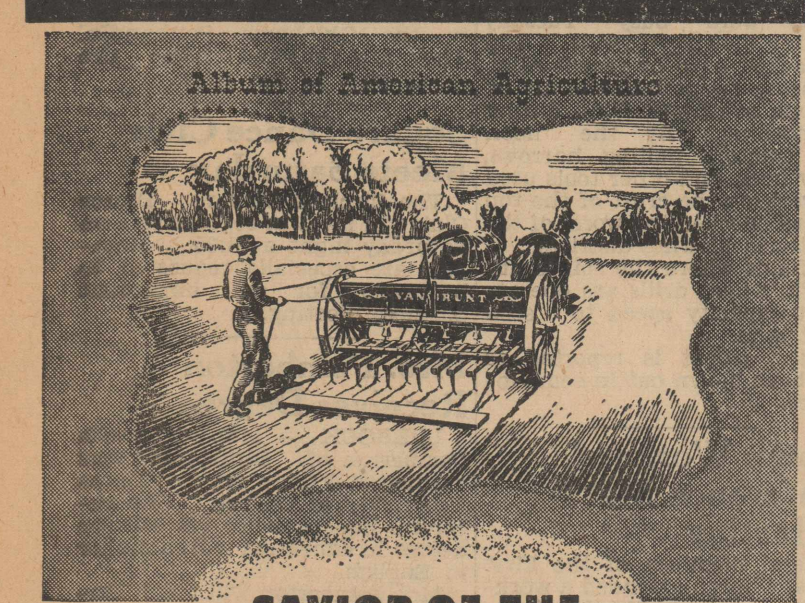

The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such Amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested in any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which

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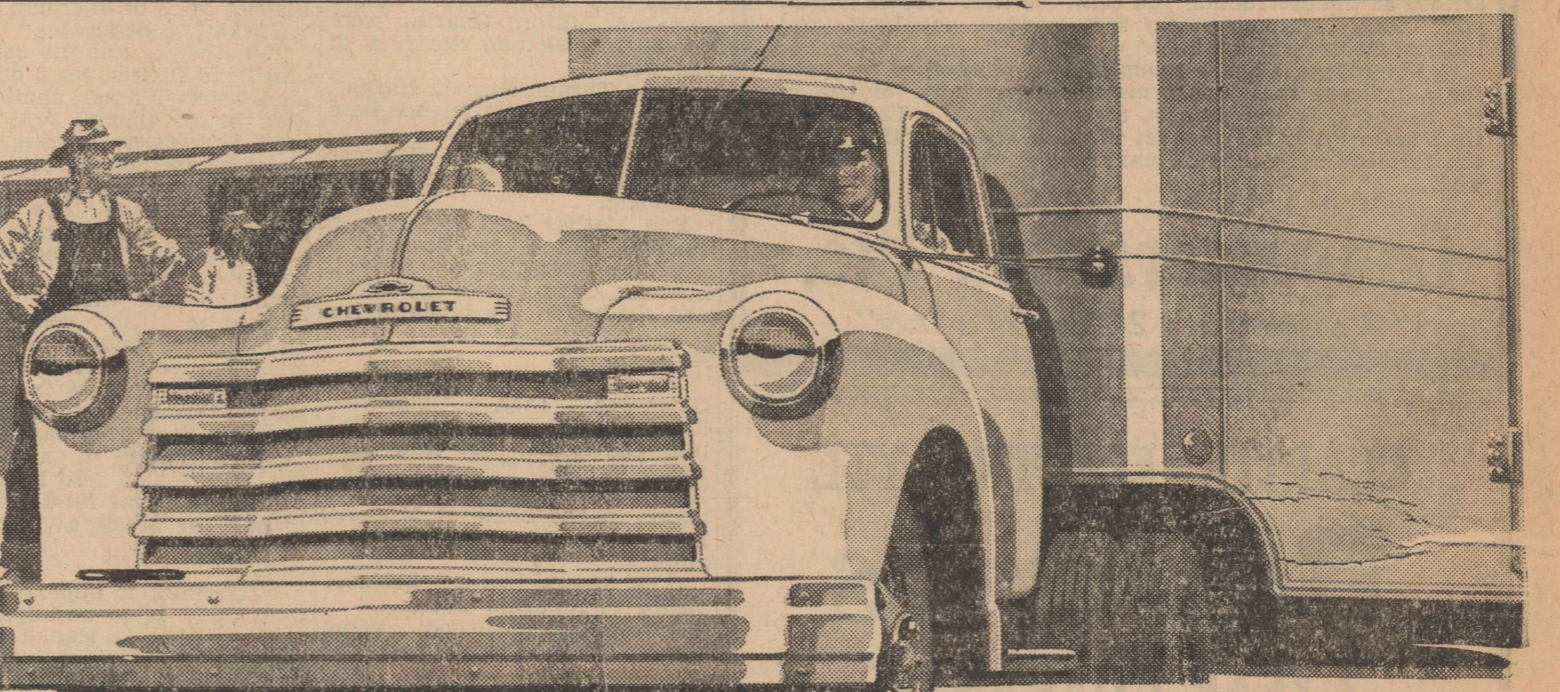

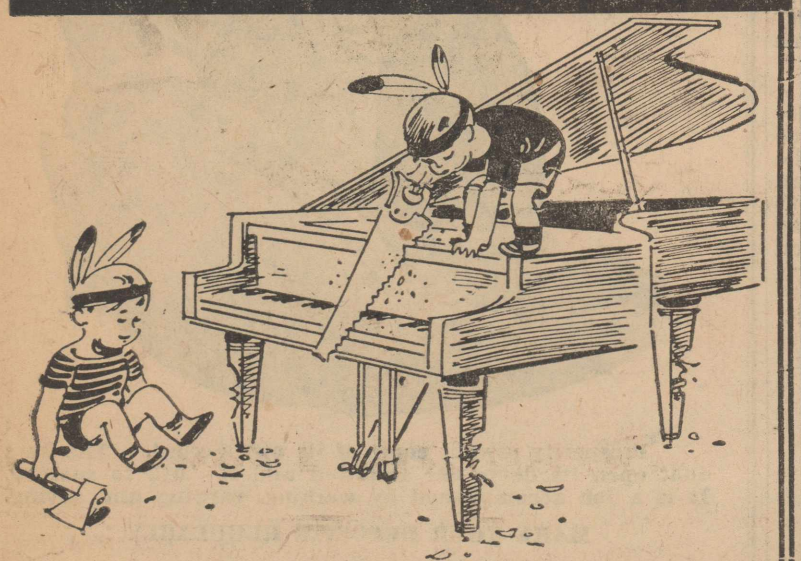

A.—All I know is a pitcher don't always better himself by getting out of the minors and joining the majors. Suppose he has to meet the Yaks the first week!

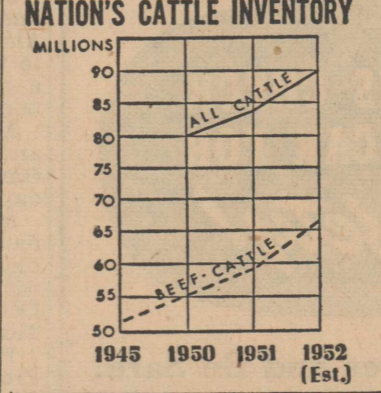
Q.—But is it not an unfair practice to let one big-league club keep a good player on a farm team for years when he might well get a job with another club?

**Farm Topics**

**Number of Cattle In Nation Increases Record Total Indicated; Swine Crop Nears Peak**  
According to a late department of agriculture survey, the number of beef cattle and swine on the nation's farms is near an all-time record.  
The department estimates the country beef-cattle may total 85,400,000 by January 1, 1952. This would be 5,800,000 more than last January 1, and 7,600,000 more than at the wartime peak of 1945.  
Dairy cattle, a source of calf meat and processed meats, but not



The above chart gives an indication of the upward curve of beef production in the nation during the past few years.  
significant as a source of beef, are excluded from these figures.  
With this rise in beef cattle, all cattle would increase from the 80,000,000 level of 1950, and the 84,200,000 level of 1951, to between 90,000,000 and 91,000,000.  
The department estimated the 1951 pig crop, which will come to market from the middle of September on, is the second highest in the nation's history. The crop is estimated at 106,000,000 pigs, or 5 per cent greater than the 1950 crop.  
Pork production, 5 to 10 per cent larger than last year, is expected to continue until next March. Chickens, too, are at record levels.

**Larger Family Farms Hope Of American Agriculture**  
The future of American agriculture and the possibility of it meeting increasing production demands, depends largely on the hope of increasing the size of family farms to take full advantage of mechanization.  
This, in brief, is the opinion of the bureau of agricultural economics after an analysis of what happened to make possible increased production during World War II.  
Large farms, the bureau reported, are now producing nearer to total capacity than most family farms. They are up-to-date, use more advanced technology, and are more nearly balanced. Therefore, these show few opportunities for further increase in efficiency.  
During the war an enormous shift took place from small to larger family farms. This shift enabled the larger family farms to take advantage of gains for mechanization.  
There is doubt, however, that large farm efficiencies continue beyond the point at which the farm gains full advantage of mechanization. Beyond the size of the fully mechanized and up-to-date family farm the problem of hired labor intervenes.  
The future of agriculture depends on increasing production on larger family farms.

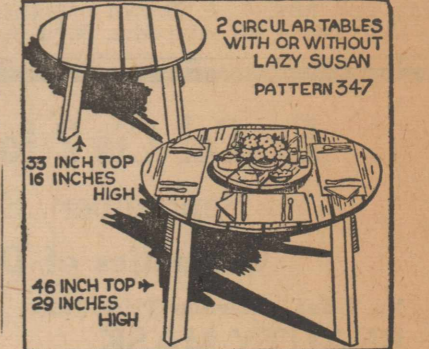
**Handy Tool Hangers**

SCRIPTURE: John 4:4-14; Acts 10:28-29; Colossians 3:11  
 DEVOTIONAL READING: Isaiah 11:1-10

### One World

Lesson for September 2, 1951

HOW rare it is to think of persons simply as persons, without any tags or labels! We think "policeman" or "lawyer" or "soldier" or "farmer" or "Japanese" before we think "man." One of the commonest tags we use is the race-tag. So-and-so is a Negro or a Pole or an Italian or a Pole or a Mexican or a Scotchman, — at least that is the way he looks to us, even before he is Dan or Tony or Steve or whatever his name is.

We say off-hand, "All Negroes are like that" or "All Mexicans are that way" and we don't often take the trouble to see whether a particular Negro or Mexican is really "like that" or not. But from the Christian point of view, the first and most important fact about any person is that he is a person and not a thing.

A Lower Race  
 The story of Jesus and the Samaritan woman shows how Jesus treated a person of a "lower" race than his. We needn't argue the question whether the Samaritans were actually beneath the Jews. In any case, the Jews treated the Samaritans like dirt.

On top of all that, the particular woman with whom Jesus talked at Jacob's well was poor and with no good reputation even among her own people. The disciples were surprised that Jesus talked with her at all. But as we read the story, it is clear that while Jesus "spoke of her condition" as the old expression is, he was dealing with her all the time as a particular human being, not merely as "a Samaritan."

Evidently, to be sure, she was greatly inferior to Jesus, and admitted as much herself; yet this fact did not raise a barrier between them.

A Dominant Race  
 We often talk of "race prejudice" as if it were prejudice of top dog against under-dog. But prejudice runs in both directions. Of course all race prejudice includes a strain of contempt; but a citizen of a conquered nation may despise his conquerors, the weak may despise the strong quite as easily as the other way around.

In the Bible we have an excellent example of a Christian coming into contact with a dominant, that is, a conquering, race: the story of St. Peter and the Roman officer Cornelius.

Peter at first did not want to have anything to do with Cornelius. God had to shake him into it, so to speak. But once Peter saw the point, he saw it plainly: God made no difference between Cornelius and Peter's own people, the Jews.

It was not for Peter to call any man, even an officer of the foreign army that occupied his little nation and held the Jews severely down, common or unclean.

Which is harder: for a Jew to treat a Samaritan like a human being, or to treat a Roman the same way? Which is harder, for a white man to treat a Negro like a human being, or for a Negro to treat a white man like one? It may be hard either way, but it is Christian.

"In Christ There Is No East or West"  
 An old Scotch elder tells this story. "My church had invited the youth fellowship of all the denominations in the state to meet in our church, and the officers of our church were to serve the communion on the last afternoon. It had never occurred to me that some of the delegates would be Negroes, but when I stood up to pass the bread and wine, there sat some Negro young people right beside the white ones.

For a minute I thought I couldn't do it. In forty years as an elder in the church, I had never passed the communion plate to any but white persons. But then I thought, after all I am not passing the bread and wine to Negroes and white people, but only to Christians. So I went ahead with it and I never felt such a blessing as I had that afternoon."

The elder had discovered that what Paul wrote is true: in the "new creature" in Christ there is neither Greek nor Jew, slave nor free man; that in Christ's presence the stone walls that divide the human race melt like snow.

## Mize One of Game's All-Timers

AN old friend of mine by the name of George Ade once started a slogan, hooked up with an organization, which he called "Flowers for the Living."

This is not a bad idea. I don't know what flowers ever mean to the dead. Or kind words. Or cheers. Or anything except the peace of eternal sleep.

We feel that it is almost impossible to write too many kind words about an old Georgia friend known as Johnny Mize, the Demorest Destroyer.

Johnny has always been a large, powerfully built, rather slow-moving performer destined to be no part of a Ty Cobb, who came from a neighboring Georgia village.

Johnny reported at Greensboro slightly over 21 years ago. He was then 17 years old. Today he is on his way to 40.

Johnny lost three years of baseball in the Navy, 1943, 1944 and 1945, a three-year term which cost his record at least 100 or more home runs. Possibly 150 home runs, since he was hitting at that clip after he had surrendered his Navy cap.

Around 15 years ago, St. Louis tried to pass Mize along to Cincinnati's Reds. Johnny had a bad knee and the Reds turned him back. At that time everyone thought Mize was through—a fine power hitter with a bad leg.

So Mize had to move back to the Cardinals. He began hitting home runs without losing any time. He also began winning a flock of ball games.

The Cardinals, meaning Mr. Rickey, sold Mize to the Giants in 1942, nine years ago. They figured Mize was all through, a washed-up slugger.

Mize gave the Giants 26 home runs that season. But he gave them 51 home runs in 1947 and 40 home runs in 1948. Those were the two years he tied Ralph Kiner, the Pirate slasher, now the best of all the home-run hitters. Mize was sent to Kansas City in 1950. He was brought back to hit 25 home runs that year.

Mize was 35 when he tied Kiner's march the second time; Kiner was 25. That's the type of hitter Johnny Mize happens to be. He could spot 'em 10 years and handle 'em. But you can't spot 'em too many decades. Johnny Mize is one of the great power hitters of all time. And quite a fellow beyond that.

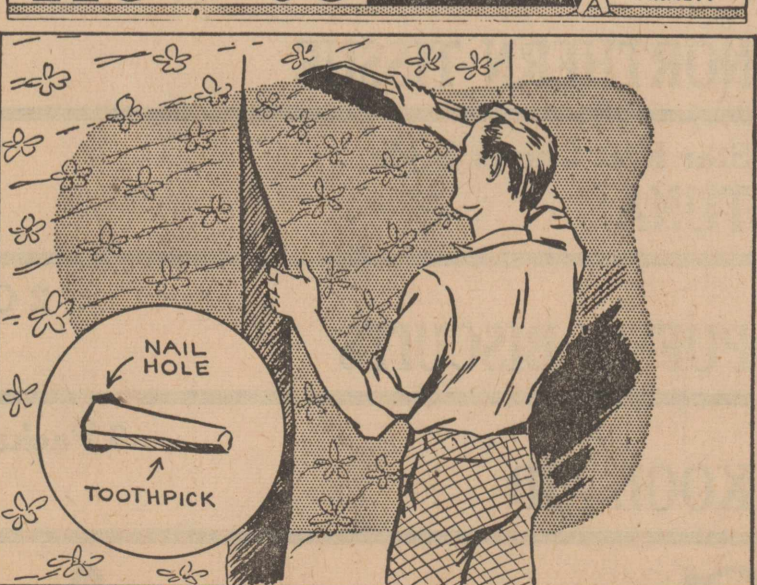

### Minute Meditation

**A Sacred Calling**  
As we honor the workingman again this Labor Day, the economic side of human existence is brought into sharp focus. The problem of producing goods necessary to satisfy human needs is becoming increasingly complex. "Economics" is a major interest to all men everywhere. Man must work by the sweat of his brow to live. It has ever been thus. But how he works; and what use he makes of the fruit of his labors constitutes one of the vital issues facing our world today. Man is not self sufficient. He does not live unto himself alone. And this truth expressed so long ago is even more apparent as we consider the dependent relationship of modern nations.

There is a religious foundation to this entire problem of making a living. The Old Testament prophets had much to say concerning social and economic justice, as well as man's use of the property he made his own through labor. And so did our Lord. We need only look to the Carpenter of Nazareth to find the solution to all economic problems facing our world today. He, and His Disciples, who were also laboringmen, brought an honor and dignity to labor never before witnessed in human history.

The New Testament repeatedly expressed a new conception of labor, that all work may be sacred. Jesus taught there is purpose in life; and that God has a plan for each individual, if only he will be sensitive to His Will. No longer is anything secular. Regardless of our work, whether professional or common labor, employer or employee,

if we work under a sense of God's Will for our lives, we carry our share of responsibility in the Divine process and purpose of human life. Such words,

then, as "justice," "fair play," and "brotherhood" enter into the total picture of modern economics. And over it all stands God's Judgment, as labor is "part and parcel" of the Divine Creation.

Sunday need not be the only "red letter" day on our calendar, and Labor Day may be a sacred day the year around. From this Christian point of view, every man everywhere may have a sacred calling!

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
