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Parmer County Rival Defeated

The Mules served notice on District 1-2A Friday night with seven different Mules crossing the goal line. The Mules were on the road to clash with the Friona Chieftains. It was the opening district game for the two teams.

The Mules rolled up 528 yards of offense on the soggy turf in Friona with 328 yards being via the air and 200 yards rushing.

Caleb Wood completed 11 of 21 passes for 280 yards and five touchdowns. He rushed 19 times for 112 yards and one TD.

Austin Ross made four receptions for 118 yards and a touchdown.

The Mules defeated Friona 52-13.

The Mule defense held the Chieftains to eight first downs and 164 total yards of offense and the Mules claimed three of the four Friona fumbles. The Friona score board was out of order for the game.

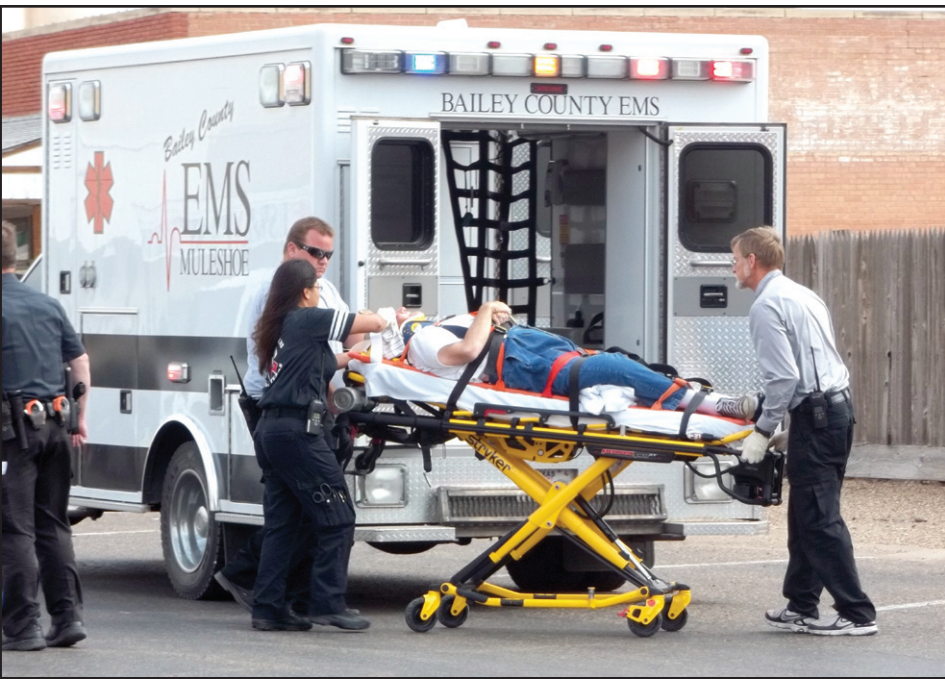
"It turned out to be a perfect night for football," said Mule coach David Wood. "We did not play a perfect game but we are getting better each week. The week off did not bother us and we came out

Cemetery Expansion Needed

"We're running out of space out there," Bob Graves of the Muleshoe Memorial Park Cemetery told the Bailey County Commissioners Court on Oct. 9 during his request for assistance.

Graves said that the cemetery is currently arranged in four "gardens," and there

is sufficient land for others to be added, but help was needed constructing a road to make the new area accessible.

"We're not out of plots now, but we're going to be," Graves said.

"We need to fix it before we get out there," Precinct 4 Commissioner Juan Chavez joked prior to his motion, which received unanimous

support, to assist with the road construction.

In other business, the commissioners' court:

- Received a report from Sheriff Richard Wills concerning felony forfeitures from the previous year.

According to Wills, there was one state forfeiture totaling \$7,171.87 resulting from a drug raid north of

Local Sales Tax Shows Increase

The City of Muleshoe's October sales tax allocation wasn't the largest amount to be received from the Texas State Comptroller's office this year, but its numbers show the largest percentage of improvement.

According to the comptroller's office, local merchants collected \$46,559.29 in sales tax revenue during the month of August, which was reported to the state in September and allocated this month, an 18.40 percent or \$7,236.70 increase from the same period last year.

In February, the city's allocation was a much

larger \$61,394.34, but it was also a .57 percent decrease from the previous year.

And while this month's 18.40 percent increase wasn't the largest for October

2012 — a prize claimed by Littlefield which registered a 23.89 percent sales tax percentage increase, it is Muleshoe's largest increase for the calendar year.

Bullying At MISD: Ends With Me

There is an increased awareness of bullying across the nation. Muleshoe ISD has placed a priority this year on stopping incidents of bullying in our school. We are committed to providing a positive learning environment that enhances respect for all students.

All charges of bullying are taken very seriously by faculty and staff. We are making every effort to prevent bullying from occurring.

Should an incident occur, we will do everything we can to handle and respond to every charge filed.

We have revised our procedures for reporting and dealing with incidents of bullying in an effort to streamline any investigation of a report of bullying.

Our counselors and administrators from Dillman, DeShazo, and Watson Junior High recently attended an all-day training on how to prevent bullying and how to deal with incidents of bullying.

Dr. Eric Cupp conducted the workshop in Lubbock entitled, "Bullying: It Ends With Me."

Dr. Cupp has conducted numerous workshops with students and educators across the nation on this topic.

Dr. Cupp contends the problem is not more bullies today, but fewer people standing up for those being bullied. He says students need adults who are aware of the problem and are determined to intervene for children's safety.

He also says that kids need to learn safe ways to stand up to bullying themselves without feeling "uncool" or being labeled a "snitch."

We also sent about 75 students from DeShazo Elementary and Watson Junio High to the workshop. The workshop gave students a great opportunity to learn about bullying and the effects it has on their classmates and their school.

Students learned how



to address bullying and what they can do to help stop bullying in our school.

The counselors and administrators returned to Muleshoe and are delivering the message to students who did not attend the workshop. In fact, many students have signed a contract to "make bullying stop."

They are taking the contracts home and are talking to their parents about the contracts. The

High School will have a "Bullying: It Ends With Me" assembly in the near future.

A few days after

the workshop, a student from DeShazo witnessed three older boys picking on another boy. He started yelling at the boys to stop. He kept yelling until he got some adults' attention.

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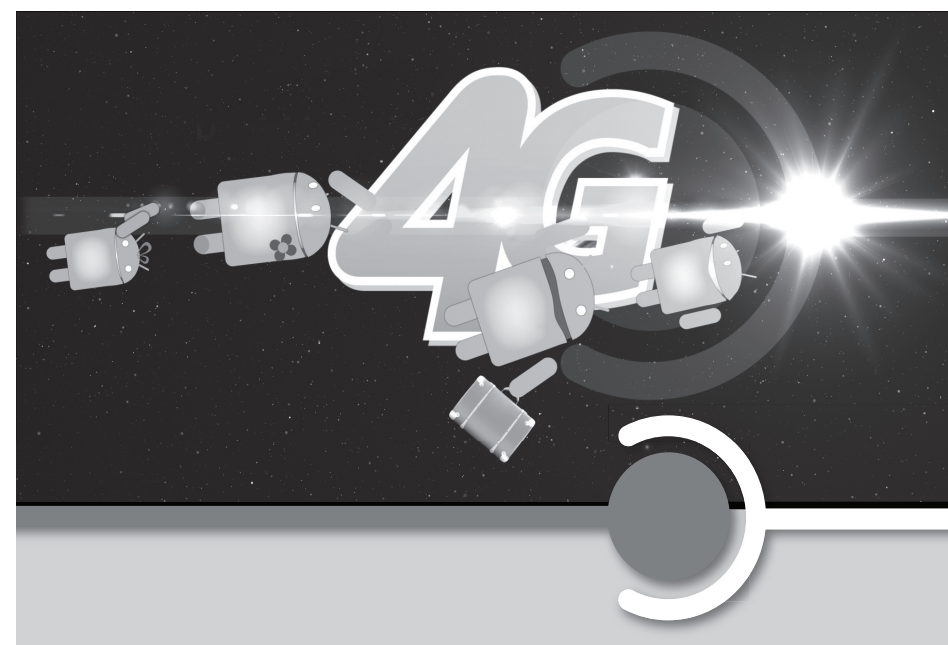
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 Many of us remember the words, and the tune of the Mickey Mouse Club theme song.

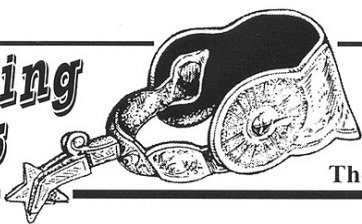
Some remember the original version with Annette Funicello and Cubby O'Brien, and others — especially parents dealing with toddlers today, with the modern animated version.

 Muleshoe, but that the district attorney's office was still awaiting a court decision regarding the funds.

- Approved payment of county bills for both the previous and the current fiscal years — \$63,442.02 from FY 2012, and \$60-830.04 from FY 2013.

- Approved minutes from the Sept. 10, 17 and 27 meetings and the Oct. 1 meeting.

- Approved an order to compensate county officials on a salary rather than a fee basis, an action County Judge Sherri Harrison

reminded the board was required annually.

- Authorized the judge to approve payment of monthly utility bills, state reports and postal requests that have to be approved prior to the court's meeting dates to avoid past due fees being assessed.

- Approved four hours of machine hire by Jim Pat Claunch for a total of \$500.

- Ratified the judge's signature on the FY 2013 SAVNS maintenance contract.

- Approved August's county treasurer's report and received the report from September.

 In its ranking among area communities, this month's numbers place Muleshoe above eight other communities in the monthly numbers, and in seventh place in year-to-date totals.

In YTD actual dollars, Muleshoe remains in second place at \$444,104.70' behind Littlefield with \$752,342.18 and on top of Friona with \$311,126.74.

In regards to the monthly totals, after Littlefield and Muleshoe, Bovina took third place with a 7.24 percent increase, and Olton took fourth with 7.09 percent.

On Oct. 10, Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced that state sales tax revenue in September was \$1.96 billion, up 11.6 percent compared to September 2011.

"Continued strength in the manufacturing and oil and natural gas sectors led to the sales tax revenue increase," Combs said, numbers that were unaffected by Bailey County.


"Collections were also boosted by improvement in consumer spending at restaurants and retail stores. State sales tax revenue has now increased for 30 straight months," she said.

The comptroller's office will send October local sales tax allocations totaling \$551 million to cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts.

October local sales tax allocations are up 9.1 percent compared to October 2011.

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

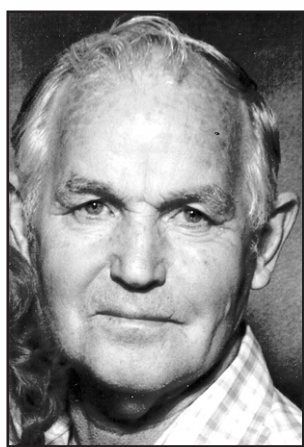
On Sept. 15, 1941, he married Veda Louise Tosh in Eldorado, Okla.

If you want to worry about your fries at McDonald's™, there's a "label" on the wall that will describe their fat content. There is no label that discusses how years of worry over such trivia will shorten your life or make you no fun to be around. Pass the salt.

Labels and more labels. At the pharmacy, Benadryl® allergy medicine, "Sleep-eaze®," and Tylenol

P.M.® all make you sleepy for the very same reason — they contain exactly the same amounts per capsule of diphenhydramine, antihistamine which not only might make you drowsy, it's so good at it that it is also marketed as a sleep aid.

Fine. Except that not only can labels be confusing, they can be dangerous. I wonder how many folks overdose by taking a dose of antihistamine and a dose of Tylenol P.M.® and unwittingly double dip? Neither label helps much.

Labels. They can be frustrating and silly, confusing and dangerous.

Nowhere are labels more confusing than on church signs.

In my own religious heritage are three groups with exactly the same roots. Not at all what our forefathers intended, now each group worships under its own sign — Church of Christ, Christian Church (independent), or Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

In the North, the names Church of Christ and Christian Church are used pretty interchangeably. Horrors! Imagine the difficulty! A person might stumble into worshipping with someone across the denominational fence — and maybe learn something of value while the wall is inadvertently breached.

I'm not picking on

And so do Podiatrists. Lite, Fat-free, Non-fat, etc. Just kidding.

'Think Pink' During October

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. From The Peninsula Hotel in Hong Kong to the Empire State Building, national monuments will be lit in pink to raise awareness.

Why is that necessary? Surely everyone is aware of breast cancer. We do it because one in eight women in the US will be diagnosed with breast cancer in their lifetimes.

We do it because the key to beating breast cancer is early detection. We do it because breast cancer is the second-most diagnosed cancer in the US and the fifth leading cause of death among women. And we do it because there is no cure. Every donated cent gets us closer to the goal of a cancer-free world, but this must truly be a collaborative effort.

For all the talk of Congressional gridlock, there are areas where bipartisan cooperation not only occurs, it is common. And many of us on both sides of the aisle have worked hard to ensure that cancer awareness gets the attention it demands.

In the Senate, I joined my colleague Sen. Barbara Mikulski (D-MD) to cosponsor the National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (NBCCEDP).

We know early detection is our best weapon in the fight against women's cancers, and this program has given millions of disadvantaged women access to vitally important cancer screenings.

In 1998, Senator Dianne Feinstein, (D-



CA) and I came together as original proponents of the Breast Cancer Research Stamp. Since then, more than 903 million stamps have been sold, raising over \$72 million to fight breast cancer.

And in April, 2011, I introduced Senate Resolution 144, supporting early detection for breast cancer and calling on the Senate to remain committed to ensuring access to life-saving breast cancer screening and treatment.

The following May, I again joined Senator Feinstein on the bipartisan Senate Cancer Coalition, to introduce a Senate Resolution designating May as National Cancer Research Month.

There has also been a tremendous role played by private and not-for-profit sectors. A good measure of the awareness-raising is due to the work by the Susan G Komen Foundation, which started the "Walk for the Cure" and which is responsible for the iconic pink ribbons.

The foundation was started by Nancy Brinker after her sister, Susan Komen, died of breast cancer. Nancy promised to do everything she could to help ensure breast cancer never claimed another victim.

The dedication of the Komen Foundation and its workers has increased awareness, which has led to more early detection and better survival rates and more research.

Breast cancer can hit anyone. Early detection is crucial, and self-examination and mammograms are key. And while there is no guaranteed prevention, there are some lifestyle habits that can lower risk, including maintaining a healthy weight, exercise, limiting alcohol intake and not smoking. Genetics can also play a part — ask your doctor

for more information.

Finding a cure will take all hands on deck. Better treatment outcomes for women (and men) depend on awareness and investment.

This Breast Cancer Awareness Month, I hope everyone will commit to steps that can increase early detection for themselves and their loved ones and give what they can to the national and international effort. As anyone whose life has been affected by breast cancer can attest, the possibility of a cure is worth every penny.

The freshmen Idalou Wildcats cashed in on a pair of freshmen Mule errors to take a 20-0 lead by the intermission.

The Mules came back strong in the second half to hold the Wildcats scoreless for all but 30 seconds of the second half.

The Wildcats defeated the Mules 28-21.

The Wildcats kicked off to start the second half and Josh Lopez returned to the Mule 14. Daniel Campos made back-to-back tosses to Antonio Vasquez and Brandon Chavez. Jose Mendoza burst up the

middle for 15 yards to mid field.

Campos connected with Kevin Mendoza for 22 yards. Vasquez made a double move and raced down the Mule sideline for a reception and a 28-yard touchdown pass and run.

Felipe Guerrero tacked on the point after. The Mules trailed 20-7 with 8:00 left in the third quarter.

The Mule defense forced Idalou to punt. Mendoza and James Lutz teamed up to stop the quarterback for a yard loss.

The Wildcat punt rolled dead on the Mule

35. Mendoza caught a pass over the middle for 16 yards. Lopez found a crease for 14 yards and Vasquez grabbed a Campos pass for nine yards.

Campos scrambled to recover a fumbled snap and tossed a 20-yard scoring pass to Vasquez.

The kick was good and the Mules had cut the Wildcat lead to 30-14 with two minutes remaining in the third period.

Idalou appeared to be back on track as they made three first downs. Julian Borunda and Vasquez stopped a

fourth down try at mid field short of a first. The Mules took over on downs.

Four plays later Campos found Mendoza open on the Wildcat five and scampered in to tie the game. Guerrero's kick gave the Mules a 21-20 lead with 7:12 remaining in the game.

Idalou strung together a 13-play drive for 63 yards and a touchdown. The long drive consumed all but 30 seconds of the game.

The Mules will travel to Denver City Thursday because of the great distance to Alpine.

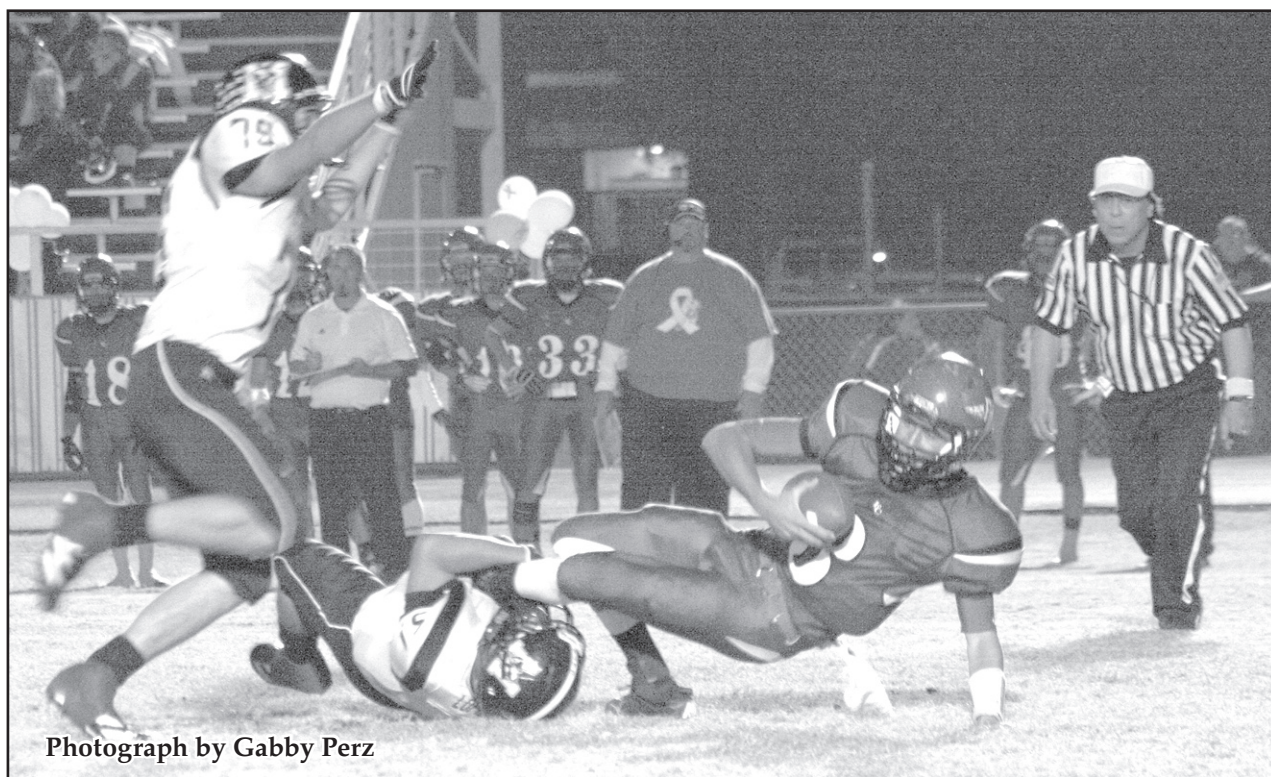
"Now we will spend the week getting ready for Bushland."

Gandara broke up a third down pass to force Friona to punt. The punt rolled dead on the Friona 42.

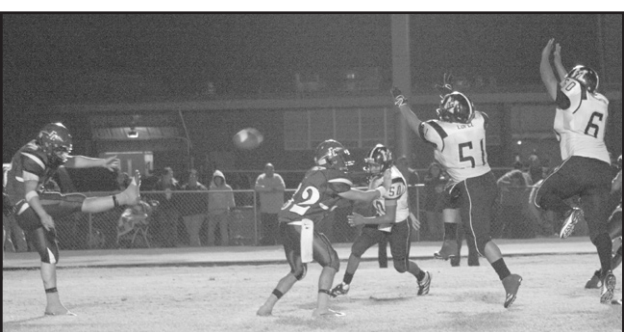
Short passes to Francisco Elizalde and Regalado set up an option pitch to Elizalde for a 37-yard TD. The Mules led 46-0 late in the third period.
