Small grain fields are not likely to be damaged by an early build-up of the greenbug popu-

Surveys were made by the experiment station and the U. S. Department of Agriculture between July 15 and September 1 to obtain information on summer survival of greenbugs. Dr. Hanna reports that 425 field inspections were made in 71 counties. Several greenbugs were found on volunteer wheat in Deaf Smith, Floyd and Motley Counties.

In a less extensive survey made in late October to deter-mine the immediate danger of a general greenbug infestation, 71 inspections were made in 31 Mr. and Mrs. Oc counties, most of them in the their home in Stratford. Northwest Texas grain area. Very few greenbugs were found.
