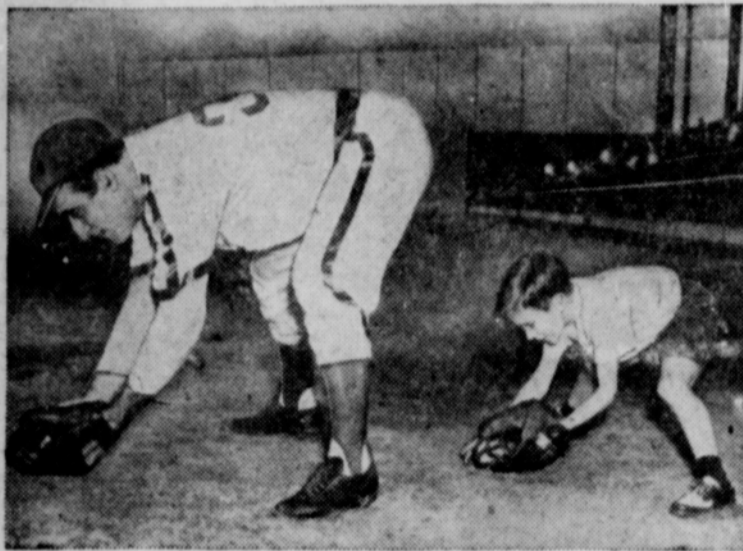






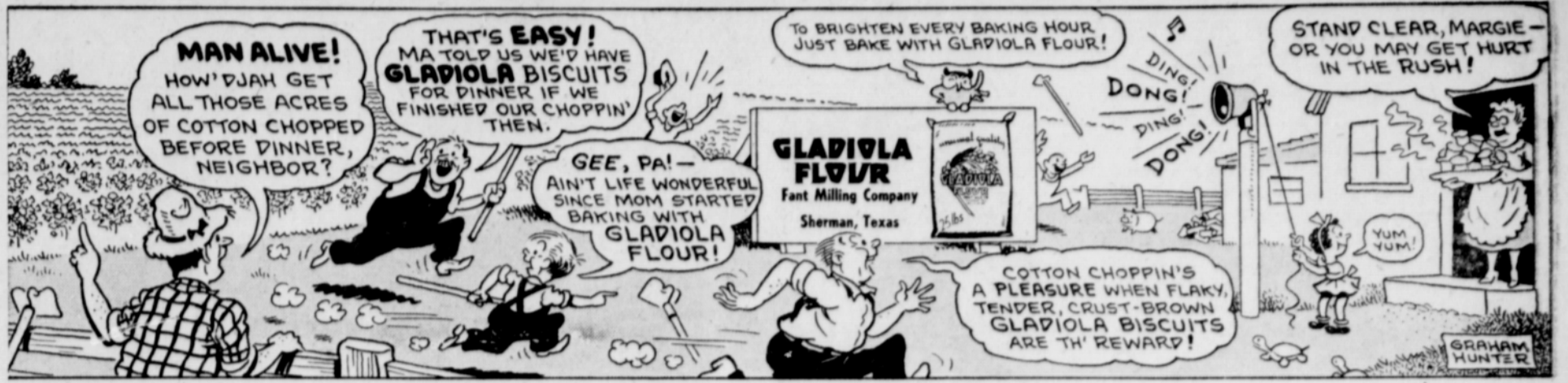

**LAMPS MAY CHECK SCHOOL EPIDEMIC**

Control of measles, chickenpox and mumps by the installation in classrooms of germ-killing ultraviolet ray lamps developed through General Electric research, is being tried on an experimental basis by the New York State Dept. of Health.

Chosen as proving ground for the equipment were the Cato-Meridian and Port Bryon Schools, Cayuga County and the Mexico School, Oswego County.

Lamps are made of a special glass which permits the ultraviolet bactericidal wave lengths to pass through, but the design of the fixtures protects against sunburns. Data will be kept over a period of several years.

**CATTLE DIE FROM WHEAT POISONING**

About 8,000 head of cattle, valued at \$607,300 died in 30 Texas counties last spring as a result of wheat poisoning. Some animals died after grazing in wheat fields as little as two weeks while others had grazed on wheat three or four months before they became victims. A study of the cause of wheat poisoning is now underway.

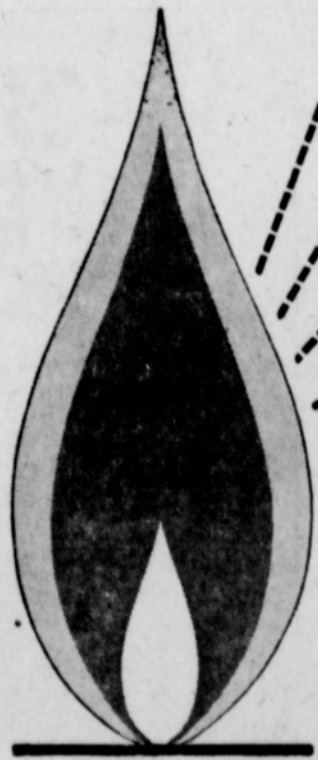

**BEEF CATTLE PRODUCTION PAYMENT TO FEEDERS**

Cattle feeders in Callahan County can now apply to the county AAA office for beef production payments under the Government's new program to increase the production of meat.

The purpose of the beef production program is, (1) to encourage greater beef production by giving the feeder higher returns from feeding more cattle and feeding to better finish, (2) to avoid higher prices to consumers, and (3) to promote better distribution by directing more cattle to authorized slaughterers who sell through regular trade channels.

The beef cattle production payment amounts to 50 cents per hundredweight on good or choice cattle weighing 800 pounds or more and selling for at least the minimum stabilization price which for sales in this county is \$13.50 per hundred.

To be eligible a feeder must certify on his application (1) that he owned and fed the cattle at least 30 days before their sale, (2) that the cattle weighed at least pounds, (3) that the cattle brought not less than \$13.50 per hundred weight if sold locally, and (4) that the cattle sold for slaughter to an authorized slaughterer. The application will also require to furnish satisfactory evidence of sales such as, invoice, sale tickets, receipts, etc.

An authorized slaughterer is any slaughterer who operates under Federal inspection or under OPA Permit at the time he slaughters the feeder cattle on which the payment has been made.

The beef production payment is available to all feeders, including slaughterers who also are feeders, provided their cattle meet the program requirements.

Any feeder whose operation is carried on in this county may now file an application for beef production payment, on eligible cattle sold during the period May 19 to June 30, 1945 inclusive, at the Callahan County AAA office. Applications covering cattle sold during this period must be filed by August 31, 1945 to be eligible for payment.

**5% OF CATTLE TESTED INFECTED WITH BANGS**

A total of 151 head of cattle have been tested for Bang's disease in Callahan County, as of Monday, July 2, 1945.

Out of this many head, four reacted as positively having the disease and four others reacted suspiciously. This is a little more than a 5 per cent average of infection among the herds tested. All of the herds seemed to be in good health and so far the sickness was confined to only one or two individuals in a herd. The removal of these animals will clean out the herd and prevent any further spread of the disease among them.

The tests were conducted by Dr. C. M. Barnes, of Cisco, Texas, and the herds tested were located at Baird, Deep Creek, Admiral, Cottonwood, Cross Plains, Rowden, Denton, Eula, and Clyde.

Final results will be published as soon as the reports come in from the tests made Wednesday July 11th.

**LAMPS WITHOUT OIL**

"Give us of your oil, for our lamps are gone out." (Matt. 25: 28). In a crisis this is what the foolish virgins said to the wise. What are lamps worth without oil? If a lamp fails to give light, it is worthless, and if it has no oil, the finest lamp in the world will give no light. The wise virgins told the foolish that they had none to spare. And this reminds me that no one can live the Christian life for two. No one ever had a surplus of righteousness. If we had them to spare, we could not loan or give away Christian graces. Some people want to borrow everything they need. They never have anything of their own. They are lazy, careless, indifferent and worthless.

The lamps of a great many church members have gone out by worldliness. Paul says, "For ye were sometime darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord; walk as children of light." (Eph. 5:8). And to the Roman Christians he said, "Be not conformed to this world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your minds." (Rom. 12:2). Rome was an adverse environment for living the Christian life, but people could behave as Christians even in Rome. Paul did not tell the Roman Christians to do as Rome does.

The Bible teaches us that life can be lived victoriously in the most distracting situation. But there are many who acquiesce in the ways of the world, with the conviction that no one can rise above his environment and live better than his neighbors. Christianity has the power to lift us up and plant our feet on a higher plane, but if we do not embrace that power, it does us no good.

**FALSE PROPHETS**

The devil has a counterfeit for everything that is good. The world is glamour-conscious and the devil furnishes the glamour. He knows how to make a mediocre regime look pretentious. Paul says, "But I fear, lest by any means, as the serpent beguiled Eve through his subtilty, so your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity which is in Christ." (2 Cor. 11:3). The serpent told Eve that the fruit would not kill her, but would open her eyes and make her wise as God—that was the devil's deceptive glamour.

And in this same chapter Paul says, "For such are false apostles,"

deceitful workers, transforming themselves into the apostles of Christ. And no marvel; for Satan himself is transformed into an angel of light. Therefore it is no great thing if his ministers also be transformed as the ministers of righteousness; whose end shall be according to their works" (2 Cor. 11:13-15). All false teachers and their dupes are doomed to perish together. Concerning the Pharisees Jesus said, "Let them alone; they are blind leaders of the blind. And if the blind lead the blind, both shall fall into the ditch." (Matt. 15:14).

Concerning a great false leader Paul wrote, "Even him, whose coming is after the working of Satan with all power and signs and lying wonders, and with all deceivableness of unrighteousness in them that perish; because they received not the love of the truth, that they might be saved. And for this cause God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie; that they all might be damned who believe not the truth, but had pleasure in unrighteousness" (2 Thess. 2:9-12).

A lie pure and simple does little harm. It is when mixed with truth that it misleads and does harm. The devil knows this and always finds a truth that seems to fit his lie. Of course it is a great sin for people to accept a lie, when they know it is a lie. But it is also a sin for people to accept a lie when they think it is the truth. Paul says, "Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits and doctrines of devils speaking lies in hypocrisy; having their conscience seared with a hot iron" (1 Tim. 4:1, 2). —W.
