ful information？ The inflated economy is an uncontrolled chain
reaction，a wage－price spiral that feeds on itself and
radiates problems throughout society，deftying pro－ radiates problems throughout society，defying pro－
posals of the nation＇s best economic brains．
It isn＇t localized；it can＇t be．Its impact spreads． Whatever it toucuedes becomes the source of more，and
in the process is sometimes devoured．Night and day in the process is sometimes devoured．No
