Tax opposed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Russell B. Long, chairman of the Senate committee with jurisdiction over taxes, chided President Carter Friday for stirring up "a lot of hatred and resentment against the oil companies."

The Louisiana Democrat also said he opposes quick action on Carter's proposal for an excess profits tax to capture part of the revenue the oil industry will receive from lifting federal price controls on domestic petroleum.

However, Long did not rule out the possibility that some sort of oil tax would be enacted.

Core cooling

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — Technicians on Friday began the final phase of cooling down Three Mile Island's damaged nuclear reactor, a contaminated cauldron that has been simmering for 17 days.

Federal officials said the core's temperature was being lowered 10 degrees an hour. But no timetable was given on when it would reach cold shutdown, a point where it would no longer pose any risk of a nuclear chain reaction going out of control.

Trucks under fire

PITTSBURGH (AP) — More than a dozen trucks were targets of snipers and roadside vandals Friday in western Pennsylvania, where some Teamster members have vowed to continue the strike despite the union's tentative contract with the trucking industry.

No injuries were reported. "We all thought that the Teamsters strike was settled," said state police Cpl. Tom Kline. "We don't know what's causing this uprising," he said, adding that state police did not have any suspects in the violence.

Disaster declared

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter declared Oklahoma a major disaster area Friday as a result of tornadoes which hit the state this week.

Carter's declaration will make federal funds available for relief and recovery efforts in designated areas of the state.

The declaration was issued by the White House while Carter is on vacation in Georgia.

Residents return

CRESTVIEW, Fla. (AP) — Roadblocks were taken down and 1,200 evacuees returned home Friday, apparently safe at last from any harm from 28 tank cars of dangerous chemicals that derailed Sunday, authorities said.

"Everybody is back home," Lt. Everette Helms of the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Department said after residents got permission to return home. "Only two barricades remain up and those are only to keep people away from the site."

Anhydrous ammonia was being pumped from several wrecked tank cars to other tank cars so it could be hauled from the bridge four miles west of Crestview where the 116-car Louisville & Nashville train wrecked.

Hundreds follow Christ's path in Jerusalem's Good Friday rites

JERUSALEM (AP) — Hymns echoed along the narrow, serpentine Via Dolorosa on Good Friday as hundreds of Christians, some bearing wooden crosses, followed the path Christ walked to his crucifixion.

Believers from dozens of nations stopped for prayer at the Via's nine stations of the cross before flinging into the Church of the Holy Sepulcher to visit the last five stations.

Thousands crowded into the incense-filled church, built by the crusaders about 800 years ago, and climbed a steep staircase to the top of Calvary. After descending, many knelt to kiss the marble stone of unction, where Jesus was wrapped in a shroud.

In Rome, Pope John Paul II carried a light wooden cross for 40 minutes during a 1,300-yard, way-of-the-cross procession through the city's pagan ruins. In a brief sermon, he called on the world's 700 million Roman Catholics to express "deep solidarity with

our brothers and sisters in the faith, who in our own time too are subjected to persecution and discrimination in various parts of the world."

The bells of Rome's 500 churches were silent and the altars were bare as the Polish pontiff joined in a day of fasting to recall Christ's agony.

Th throngs in Jerusalem moved from Praetorium, where Jesus was sentenced to die, to the traditional site of Calvary, where he was nailed to the cross, in winding processions from just after sunrise through midday under a hot sun.

A few hundred pilgrims followed the official procession of the Roman Catholic Church, led by Franciscans in flowing brown robes, but many more made the solemn half-hour trek individually or in groups of a few dozen.

Police barricades closed off side roads to allow an uninterrupted flow along the famous walled street.

The actual path Christ trudged was

lost centuries ago as original Jerusalem was buried under the rubble of wars and disasters. The current Via Dolorosa was believed to have been traced during the crusader or Turkish period, but the original street of sorrow may lie 30 feet below.

Tourism ministry officials say about 100,000 tourists and pilgrims were in the Holy Land for the season and Jerusalem's old walled city teemed with crowds.

The Christians were here to mark Christ's suffering and to celebrate Easter—his resurrection. Jews were commemorating the week-long Passover holiday, marking the Israelite exodus from Egypt.

Good Friday services were held outside the city walls at the garden tomb, which some Christians revere as the true site of the crucifixion.

The mausoleum will be the center of celebrations Sunday when the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem recites High Mass.

Bar Association serves as forum for ethics complaints

Lawyers have a code of ethics they're supposed to follow — and if they don't, it becomes a matter for the Bar Association to police.

Midland County Bar Association President Lloyd McDonald also is a member of the Grievance Committee for District 16 of the State Bar of Texas.

And it's to that body that clients take complaints — about ethical violations, anyway.

More incompetence is not enough to interest the Grievance Committee, McDonald explained.

The committee member said he had no figures on the number of complaints to come out of Midland County, but it is a very small number. And

he contended, the same is true of West Texas in general.

Even the vast majority of complaints that reach the Grievance Committee turn out to be a failure of communication somewhere along the line, and are resolved amicably after an investigation, he claimed.

"In most instances...after everything is out and understood, in the vast majority of instances, it's a matter of lack of communication or miscommunication... Most folks seem to leave happy and satisfied," he said.

Most of those kinds of complaints arise out of family litigation, such as divorces, he said, adding it comes from "the whole unhappy situation."

After that kind of litigation, he said, no one is happy, and people tend to think something more could have been gained.

McDonald said the kinds of things the committee would be interested in would include a conflict of interest, advising a client to mis-state information or file a false affidavit or filing suit without the client's authorization.

An alleged violation first is assigned to one or more committee members for investigation, McDonald explained.

When the case is presented to the full committee, he said, the proceeding is much like that of a grand jury. Both the attorney and the complainant can call witnesses, but questioning is done entirely by the committee, and "it's not necessary for everybody to be there at the same time."

Wichita Falls residents now burying dead

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP) — Terri Mahon, a 17-year-old crushed under the wall of a steak house where she worked to earn money toward her planned marriage, was buried in a white coffin embellished with pink flowers Friday — the first of 17 burials in a tornado-ravaged town.

In all, 44 people died when a twister chewed an eight-mile path through south Wichita Falls on Tuesday. It was part of a storm system that spawned 8 to 10 tornadoes Tuesday in Texas and Oklahoma, and 15 others died in Lawton, Okla., and Vernon and Harrold, Texas.

On Friday, people in Wichita Falls began burying friends and family, a solemn chore that will preoccupy hundreds over the next few days. They will pause only on Sunday — Easter Sunday — when no burials will be conducted.

The story of the tornado and its aftermath has tragic similarities for many families.

No emotion flickers in Richard Swift's eyes as he tells about the deaths of his two little girls.

He describes in a flat, emotionless voice the horrifying scene which met him Tuesday evening when he arrived home only minutes after a tornado exploded his home — killing his 5-year-old daughter, Kari, and his 10-year-old daughter, Audra, and critically injuring his wife, Linda.

"I drove as far as I could before the wreckage blocked my way. I ran the last seven blocks. I never felt any tiredness in my legs, or even my heart speeding up," Swift said. "When I turned onto my street, every house on my block was completely toppled, totally destroyed."

"By then, I just went bananas. I

was running. People were yelling at me, telling me everybody was all right, but I just kept running," he continued.

"When I got to my house, I saw my wife lying in the yard. I took her in my arms. She looked like someone had just grabbed her and shook her real hard. My older daughter was lying in a pool of blood beside her. I picked her up and my wife said, 'Richard, she's dead.' But I said, 'No, she's not. She can't be.'"

But Swift's slender, blonde-haired older daughter — at that awkward stage when she wasn't a little girl any longer but not yet a young lady — was dead.

And although Swift did not find out until much later Tuesday night, so was his chubby-cheeked, curly-haired younger daughter, who died of massive head injuries at the hospital where she was taken by neighbors in the first frantic seconds after the deadly twister moved through the neighborhood.

Swift said he can handle his losses calmly for the moment but he knows that blessed numbness won't last forever. "When it wears off, I'll probably go off my rocker."

Swift, already at his job as night manager of a Pizza Inn when the storm struck, said he saw the ugly black column of destruction moving toward him.

"I saw four funnels join up on one side of it. It was the biggest thing I've ever seen," he said. "Complete houses collapsed, flat, just as if someone had stepped on them."

Mrs. Swift is recovering from her injuries in Wichita Falls General Hospital. She knows her children are dead.

New leader takes oath in Uganda

KAMPALA, Uganda (AP) — To the beat of African drums Uganda's new president, Yussufu Lule, took the oath of office Friday and asked citizens to "help me erase the traces of eight years of Idi Amin."

While he and his Cabinet were sworn in, Tanzanian commando teams in plain clothes reportedly scoured the north and east in search of the deposed president.

"You have a legal government in office and Amin is now the rebel," Lule told thousands gathered for his inauguration. Lule and his Cabinet stood in the hot sun on the steps the long disused parliament building, where scarlet-robed, white-wigged Chief Justice Sam Wambuzi swore the new president into office.

After Lule took the oath, Ugandans broke out their tribal drums and began a dance punctuated with high-pitched cries — a striking contrast to the decorous British-style inauguration ceremony Uganda was a British protectorate from the end of the 19th century until after World War II, then became a member of the Commonwealth.

Members of the crowd waved banana fronds, beat the drums and cheered as Lule spoke to them after taking the oath.

Ugandans danced in the streets, hugging and kissing each other in jubilation. "There is no more jungle law," a poster said.

A few of Amin's soldiers desperately seeking escape were reported holding civilians hostage and demanding cars, but Tanzanians were pursuing them.

Lule, clad in a blue safari suit, called on Amin's forces to surrender, saying "they have nothing to fight for."

The loudest shouts erupted when Lule asked the crowd to give three cheers for Tanzanian President Julius Nyerere, who sent his army in to end Amin's bloody dictatorship.

Lule promised to reinstate the rule of law and said the government would be the servant of the people and not its master. He appealed to Ugandans to stop looting, saying "looting and vandalism are not part of our character."

But most buildings in the city center had broken windows and there was some residential looting by civilians seeking revenge for eight years of poverty under Amin.

Some Ugandan civil servants tried to return to their jobs to help the restoration of civilian authority but many found their offices ransacked.

An official of the new provisional government said Amin would be tried for murder and treason if caught and the ousted leader's former government radio said he "deserves the gallows."

Amin was last reported at Jinja, 50 miles east of Kampala. Ever the showman, he said in his own broadcast, apparently recorded and transmitted from Soroti, 200 miles north-east of Kampala:

"We have got our soldiers controlling the country."

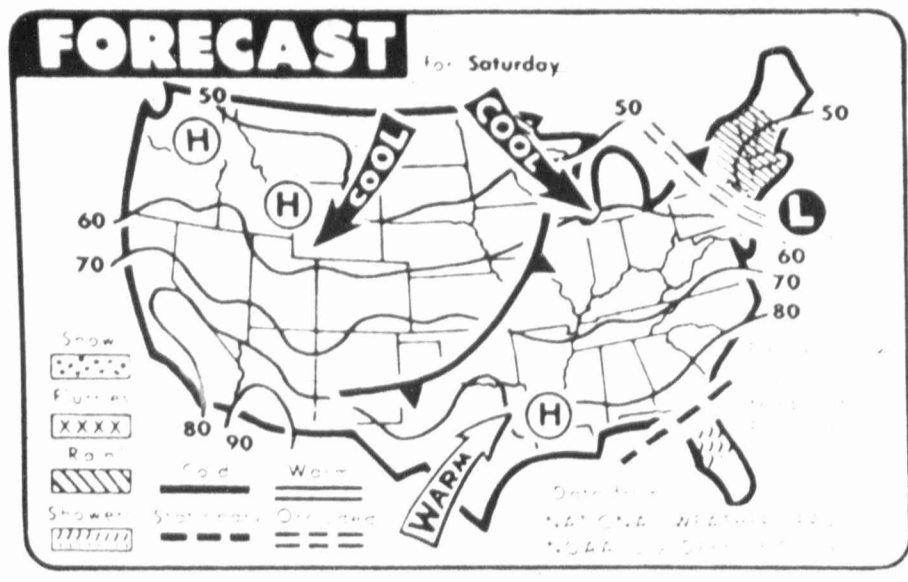

Judge denies request to prohibit censorship

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — A federal judge rejected on Friday Oregon Magazine's request that he prevent the CIA from censoring a humorous article about the spy business in Uganda containing 16 words the agency contends would endanger national security. U.S. District Judge Robert C. Belloni ruled after holding a brief closed-door hearing on the magazine's petition for a temporary restraining order against the CIA. The request was filed after representatives for the magazine and the CIA failed to agree on whether the 16 words should be deleted from a planned article. The government argued a restraining order was not called for because nothing had been done to interfere with publication of the magazine. "You're back where you were before," Belloni said, adding he was not ruling on whether the 16 words might endanger national security. Representatives of the magazine and the CIA continued their talks in private after the judge's ruling. In dispute were parts of a story by former CIA agent Jay Mullen of Medford. The article details such things as Mullen's coaching of a basketball team and swimming in Amin's swimming pool, said Oregon Magazine editor Tom Bates. Bates said Friday he had agreed to make some deletions in the story, but refused to make others after a meeting that ended shortly after midnight Thursday. As negotiations resumed, Bates said he did not know what the CIA was going to do, but he was going to the printers to get things rolling on the May issue. "It looks like we've got some time to work things out," he said after CIA lawyer John Greany arrived at the Times Printing Co. in Forest Grove, a farming community 23 miles west of Portland. The CIA has said its concerns involved matters of "national security." "It's not an emergency situation," Greany said before he and Bates met. "I'm optimistic we will reach an agreement." Neither Greany nor Bates has mentioned court action. Greany said he flew out to help the magazine meet its deadlines, but Bates had said the agency was notified of the article on March 23. Mullen submitted the article to the CIA in keeping with an agreement CIA employees make when they join the agency, CIA spokesman Herbert Hetu said in Washington. Bates said the first 20-page section of the magazine, which did not contain any of the material objectionable to the CIA, would be printed Friday and the remaining 60 pages on Monday and Tuesday.

Police probing two burglaries

Midland police were investigating two possible burglaries Thursday. Pam Williams of the 500 block of South Lincoln Street told police that two handguns, a credit card and a movie projector, with a total value of \$400, were taken from her home. Police said entry to the home was gained by throwing a rock through a patio window. A total of \$530 in belongings was reported taken from the home of Albert Eugene Carlon of the 3000 block of West Louisiana Avenue, police said. After a birthday party for his daughter, Carlon told police, he noticed that a calculator, an eight-track cartridge player, a wine bottle of pennies, an undetermined number of phonograph records and a watch were missing. Police said they have a lead in the case.

Not much 'brave' about this world

MATHEWS, Va. (AP) — A teacher who asked his 11th-grade students to do book reports on a nearly 50-year-old science fiction classic, Aldous Huxley's "Brave New World," said he was told he would be fired if he went ahead with the assignment. L. Stuart Gibbs, 33, was notified by the Mathews County School Board on Thursday that his contract to teach would not be renewed after this school year ends. Gibbs said some of his students' parents objected to sexual and religious references in the book, first published in 1932. The book is available, without restrictions, in the school library. School Superintendent Gray W. Bradford insisted, however, the controversy over the classic had nothing to do with the decision to terminate Gibbs' contract. Gibbs, who teaches U.S. history, is the only teacher to be denied a renewal of his contract this year in this rural county bordering Chesapeake Bay. "I was told I would be fired if I went ahead with this assignment," Gibbs said Friday. "I chose to go ahead to get the students to turn the book report in and now my job has been terminated because of it. I do plan on pursuing it to court." The Virginia Education Association said it has hired a lawyer to represent Gibbs. Mathews High School Principal Harry Ward said school officials had intimidated Gibbs he might be fired if he went ahead with the assignment. Ward said he asked Gibbs to change the assignment and, when he refused, a special school board meeting was called last month. Sunny Easter weather likely

Sunshine, mild breezes and warm temperatures will visit the Midland area this Easter weekend for a welcomed change from the sand-drenched skies and brisk-to-high winds. The pushy April winds that have been shifting cultivated topsoil from one farm to another will change to a docile 10 to 15 mph from the southwest today, said a weatherman at the National Weather Service at Midland Regional Airport. Coming with the breeze today will be fair skies and short-sleeve weather with temperatures into the upper 70s. Tonight's low will be near 50. Sunday will be another day belonging to the outdoorsman: temperatures in the low 80s. The record high temperature for a April 13 is 99 degrees recorded in 1972. The record low for a April 14 is 28 degrees in 1957. The sun shone over Texas Friday except in parts of West Central Texas and along the Rio Grande River in South Texas where clouds blanketed the areas. The National Weather Service said generally less than a half inch of rain fell in the Panhandle, while the High Plains received less than a quarter of an inch, except for Shamrock which had 1.06 inches. Priest acts as mediator in strike between farmers, onion grower

RAYMONDVILLE, Texas (AP) — A Brownsville Catholic bishop took on the role of labor mediator in an effort to reopen negotiations between striking farmers and a local onion grower. As Bishop John Fitzpatrick met separately with union leaders and company officials, the striking farm workers drove from field-to-field and later met at the Willacy County Sheriff's Office to protest the arrest of five strikers. Texas Farm Workers Union leader Antonio Orendain returned to the picket line Friday after meeting with the bishop. Orendain confirmed that the negotiations will continue through the bishop. Fitzpatrick said he was "trying to get minds together." He said he would not be doing it unless there was some "hope" of progress. "But I don't know if that's the same as confidence," Fitzpatrick said at a local church. The arrests were made at a western Willacy County field by Department of Public Safety officers. They were charged with trespassing during an incident Thursday after they entered an onion field and tried to convince strike breakers to join the walkout. The five were taken to the sheriff's office where they were to be arraigned Friday. Two women were also arrested outside the sheriff's office as farm workers began marching around the building. Both were to be charged with misdemeanors. The onion workers walked off the fields last week in a strike aimed at higher wages and recognition for their organization. Pickets also continued Friday at the Charles Wetogrove Co. packing shed here. Workers at the shed have also joined the strike. The bishop's efforts have helped stem the threat of increased violence, the strike leaders said. Some union organizers said they had heard that strike sympathizers from around the state might arrive here this weekend. Hearings slated on costs of electricity

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — A bitter battle is being waged over whether utility stockholders or customers will pay the estimated \$1 million-a-day cost of replacing electricity generated by the crippled Three Mile Island nuclear energy plant.

Pennsylvania's chief rate-making official said Friday the issue would not be decided for at least 60 days while the state conducted hearings and completed an investigation.

"Our prime concern is to see that customers are

served — at reasonable rates," state Public Utility Chairman Wilson Goode said.

"I get about 100 letters a day on the matter. I guess 99 percent say the customers shouldn't pay for the accident," Goode said. "Who should pay will be determined by what the facts say after the investigation. Anything else is pure speculation."

Hearings are scheduled to begin Tuesday to determine how to allocate the cost of replacing electricity that had been generated by Three Mile

Island's two nuclear reactors, now out of service indefinitely. One reactor was crippled by the recent accident and the other was shut down as a precaution.

Replacement costs are normally passed along automatically. That would mean the 346,000 customers served by Metropolitan Edison Co., operator and part-owner of the plant, could pay an extra \$7.50 a month, according to federal energy experts.

Metropolitan Edison informed the Public Utilities Commission it

would hold off any rate increase until the commission made its decision. The utility customers' March bills were based on February rates.

If the commission bars the automatic pass-through of costs to customers, General Public Utilities, Metropolitan Edison's parent company, would shoulder the burden. General Public Utilities has 177,000 stockholders.

Preliminary estimates of cleaning up and repairing the core of the damaged nuclear reactor have mounted to about \$140 million, a cost that would be absorbed by the \$300 million in insurance that Metropolitan Edison carries for such purposes.

Meanwhile, battle lines have already been formed between company and customers in the emotionally charged and unprecedented issue.

"It's the investor whose money is used to build plants and expand operations. If we don't pay him back a return, or if return drops, we'll lose him," said Metropolitan Edison spokesman Dave Klusick.

"Then we'll have to borrow at high interest rates to pay capital costs and repay previous loans. We'll be forced to charge customers in the long run anyway," he added.

But consumer representatives see it differently.

"We will fight like hell to prevent our people from paying for this disaster. Stockholders are the ones who took the gamble, now they want a

guaranteed return," said group Pennsylvania Association of Older People.

Supreme Court denies request of mother to spare her son

WASHINGTON (AP) — A unanimous Supreme Court rejected on Friday a mother's request that the life of her son, a condemned Alabama murderer, be spared temporarily.

The court's denial, however, apparently will have little effect on the fate of death row inmate John Louis Evans III.

Evans, who originally was adamant in his desire to die in the electric chair, asked an Alabama federal judge Thursday to postpone his execution pending formal appeal of his death sentence.

It is likely that Evans' execution will not be rescheduled until he has exhausted all appeals, a process that could take months or even years.

Nonetheless, following the latest Supreme Court decision, Alabama Attorney General Charles Graddick said he would petition the state Supreme Court Monday to have a new execution date set.

Evans, 29, was sentenced to death for the 1977 murder of Mobile pawnshop owner Edward Nassar.

Evans had chosen not to appeal his scheduled April 6 execution. But hours before Evans was to die, Supreme Court Justice William H. Rehnquist ordered state authorities to keep him alive until the full Supreme Court could consider an emergency request by Evans' mother, Betty Evans Dickson of Beaumont, Texas.

That request was denied without explanation Friday. Chief Justice Warren E. Burger issued a one-sentence statement: "The application for stay of execution, presented to Mr. Justice Rehnquist and by him referred to the court, is denied."

There were no dissents, but Justice William J. Brennan Jr., who believes the death penalty is never a constitutional punishment, filed a brief concurring opinion.

He said that because Evans filed an appeal and stay application of his own, "it is apparent that there is now no need

to grant the application (filed by Evans' mother)." Evans, on death row in Holman Prison near Atmore, Ala., had said for months that he preferred death to spending the rest of his life in prison. But he apparently had a change of heart after Rehnquist's postponement.

Guerrilla leader Nkomo escapes 'kidnap attempt'

LUSAKA, Zambia (AP) — Rhodesian commandos disguised as Zambian troops blasted black guerrilla leader Joshua Nkomo's home here Friday in a pre-dawn raid 65 miles inside Zambia. Nkomo, who said he escaped through a secret door as bullets pierced his house, called the raid a kidnap attempt.

Hospitals said at least 10 guerrilla guards were killed. Nkomo said 11 others were wounded and that three raiders died. The raiders destroyed two other guerrilla offices while a separate group blew up a ferry in Botswana.

Witnesses said most of the raiders in the Lusaka operation were black.

"Our boys did a good job although they were outnumbered," Nkomo told delegates at a rally of the Afro-Asian People's Solidarity Organization Friday night. "They knocked out the teeth from one of the commandos and blew the brain out of another."

He displayed teeth and a brain to delegates of the 26-nation group. AAPSO Vice President Vassos Lyssarides stood with Nkomo by the smoldering house and promised cheering delegates. "We shall fight with the Patriotic Front who are our friends until independence."

By independence, the guerrillas mean their control of Rhodesia.

The Nkrmo said the raiders came in trucks with Zambian markings.

Robert Mugabe, whose Mozambique-based guerrillas form the shaky Patriotic Front alliance with Nkomo's forces, told the rally, "Together we are determined to carry the battle to the finish."

President Kenneth Kaunda called up Zambian army reserves following the attack which was within a half-mile of his home.

Other Rhodesian commandos dressed as Botswana soldiers blew up a ferry in Botswana. Both Zambia and Botswana, which border Rhodesia on the north and west, harbor guerrillas who have sworn to disrupt Rhodesian elections scheduled for next week.

The Kazungula ferry across the Zambezi river where Botswana, Zambia and Rhodesia meet was blown up with the loss of at least three lives, according to Botswana President Seretse Khama.

Rhodesia confirmed both raids but declined to provide details. It said the ferry was being used by guerrillas.

The attacks came four days before black majority rule elections begin in Rhodesia. The Patriotic Front has vowed to wreck the elections they say will mean continued white rule behind a facade of black stooges.

The elections are to pick a black-majority Parliament for the first time in Rhodesia, although whites will retain enough control to block changes in the constitution and will control the military.

Rhodesia lifted censorship for foreign journalists for the five-day elections next week. Censorship will continue for domestic journalists.

Rhodesian Bishop Xabel Muzorewa, whose Black United African National Council is expected to win the elections, defended the raids, which followed four air raids on Zambian guerrilla targets in the past week.

He told a news conference in Salisbury: "The security forces work on

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Deadline near on status change

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government issued a reminder Friday that time is running out for members of the clergy who may have changed their minds and want to be covered by Social Security.

The deadline is Monday night at midnight for any clergy to revoke their exemption from Social Security, if they wish to do so, the Social Security Administration said.

Congress gave the clergy a one-time opportunity in the 1977 Social Security Amendments to change their status. The offer applied to those who decided in the past to take advantage of an exemption for the clergy from paying into the system.

The agency warned the ministers they may sacrifice both Medicare and Social Security protection if they remain outside the system. However, they acknowledge that some clergy could gain these benefits by working at other jobs that are covered by Social Security.

Clergy are treated as self-employed for Social

Security purposes and they must decide at the end of their first year whether to stay out of the system.

The clergy must fill out Internal Revenue Service form 4361-A if they wish to revoke their exemption, the agency said. A spokesman said it was not known how many have done so since 1977, or how many clergy are exempt.

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers asked to lead cleanup effort

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP) — Long distance telephone service was restored to almost all of the Wichita Falls area Friday as residents began to piece together their wind-blown lives in the wake of Tuesday's thunderous tornado.

Southwestern Bell officials predicted local service will be back in operation by Sunday evening.

Friday morning, the city council officially asked the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to take over the massive cleanup operation.

President Carter's assistant, Jack Watson, and Federal Disaster Assistance Administrator Bill Wilcox surveyed the damaged eight-square-mile area Friday morning and checked on three federal disaster centers that will open Saturday.

Fifteen federal agencies and a variety of state and local groups will be represented at the two centers here and a third in Vernon.

Adjustors for the American Insurance Association estimated damage at \$204 million to insured structures in Wichita Falls.

The Red Cross said 20,000 persons were left homeless when the vicious twister destroyed more than 6,400 homes, 1,100 apartment units and 150 mobile homes in North Central Texas.

Red Cross Director of Disaster Assessments Richard Balnick predicted 90 percent of the properties were injured.

A National Weather Service spokesman described

the storm that ravaged Wichita Falls as huge, and only one of 8 or 10 tornadoes tracked by NWS radar Tuesday evening.

"They were beautiful, classic tornadoes," he said. "We tracked the storm for about 65 miles (on the ground). It originated southwest of Wichita Falls, near Lake Wichita, and was followed on radar to near Ardmore, Okla."

Meanwhile, private church and community relief groups poured into the area. Red Cross officials from across the country were joined by Mennonites from Kansas and Ohio and Baptist groups from all over the South.

Benefits available in tornado area

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Persons unable to work because of Tuesday's North Texas tornadoes can file unemployment claims in Wichita Falls and Vernon, the Texas Employment Commission said Friday.

Following the designation of these locations as disaster areas by President Jimmy Carter and Gov. Bill Clements, persons whose employment was prevented by the tornado damage became eligible for disaster unemployment assistance, said TEC chairman Noam Ward. "Our offices in those stricken localities are handling any added manpower

Silkwood attorneys request \$60 million claim increase

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Lawyers for the Karen Silkwood estate moved Friday to increase their claim against the Kerr-McGee Corp. by \$60 million, saying they wanted to punish the company for allowing Miss Silkwood to become contaminated with plutonium.

If U.S. District Court Judge Frank G. Theis approves the motion to amend, made Friday in his chambers, it would bring total damages being sought in the negligence case to \$71.5 million.

Silkwood lawyer Gerry Spence told Theis he made the motion because Kerr-McGee lied to its workers about the cancer risks of plutonium radiation.

"To me, that has to stop and it won't stop when we're dealing with one-half of one percent of their assets," he said.

"Ten million to the corporate assets is about as

ridiculous as six cents to the income of the average man."

Spence told Theis he was "unaware of the nature and extent of this company's assets and income" until last month, after the trial began.

Kerr-McGee is an energy conglomerate with interests in oil, natural gas, uranium, helium, coal and other areas. It is one of the 200 largest corporations in the United States, according to Fortune magazine, and has an annual income exceeding \$2.1 billion.

Miss Silkwood was a lab technician at Kerr-McGee's nuclear fuel plant near Crescent, Okla., when she died in a 1974 auto accident.

The lawsuit filed by her estate alleges her employer was negligent in allowing her to become contaminated with plutonium. Kerr-McGee contends she contaminated herself, possibly to

dramatize her claims that working conditions at Kerr-McGee were unsafe.

The trial is in its sixth week. The plaintiffs have rested their case, and the defense has presented three witnesses so far. Testimony was to resume Monday.

Spence said the failure to seek punitive damages in excess of the \$10 million on the record at the start of the trial "was a fundamental oversight" made before he entered the case.

Theis said he probably won't rule on the motion until just before the case goes to the jury.

Kerr-McGee lawyers refused to respond to the motion except to say they need time to prepare a full brief on the matter.

Justice reprimanded

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Justice of Peace Robert R. Cole of Dallas has received a public reprimand because he personally chased a speeding motorist at speeds exceeding the state speed limits.

The State Commission on Judicial Conduct said Friday the reprimand was issued after a hearing held April 6 in which Cole appeared as a witness. The commission said the hearing resulted from a story in a Dallas newspaper that was headlined "Hard-nosed Dallas JP Gets His Man."

The commission's order said that "the commission finds that in pursuing a speeding motorist on a public roadway Judge Cole was himself in violation of the law in driving his automobile at rates of speed in excess of the legal limit and placed himself and other motorists in jeopardy in his efforts to keep the subject under surveillance. This conduct is aggravated by the assertion by Judge Cole to the news media that he would do it again under the same circumstances."

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Hotel guests evacuate safely

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — Some 200 guests were evacuated safely Friday when fire broke out in the basement of a 20-story Holiday Inn. The fire chief said he would cite the hotel for "illegal partitions" in the basement.

A hotel spokesman was not immediately available for comment on the charges by Chief Thomas Hanlon.

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Variety of services available to Midland elderly

EDITOR'S NOTE: Senior citizens lead diverse lives, with a few common problems but many differences in the way they live. This is the last of a seven-part series on Midland's elderly, using portraits of individuals to indicate a range of responses to growing older.

Problems that come with old age afflict more than one of eight Texans now — but since most people hope to live long enough to grow old, the elderly also are of concern to the rest of the population.

Population projections indicate that by the year 2000 one in every five Texans will be 60 or older.

During the last 10 years or so, the problems of that age group have been getting more attention.

While federal grants providing funds for aging programs in Texas amounted to less than \$1 million a year in the early 1970s, current figures are running in the neighborhood of \$25 million a year, according to the Governor's Committee on Aging.

In Midland, the level of services also has jumped.

One such service is Meals on Wheels, a partially state-funded project which sends a hot meal each

weekday to home-bound senior citizens who can't cook balanced meals for themselves.

A companion, completely local and self-supporting program is Share-A-Meal for elderly persons who need the meals, but can afford to pay the full cost of the service.

Elizabeth Glenn is director of both programs.

"The only reason I'm doing Meals on Wheels," said Mrs. Glenn, "is because someday I'm going to be a little old lady."

The director said one problem she encounters is eligible persons who are too proud to accept the help.

"They feel like when they start receiving meals...they've given up, and that's not true," she contended, explaining that the meals often are the thing that allows the older person to stay at home and live independently instead of having to go to a nursing home.

For many, the Meals on Wheels volunteer is the person's primary contact with the outside world. Some have families that can help on weekends, but many are all alone and feel unwanted, she said.

Mrs. Glenn told of seeing one woman who has severe health problems walking down the street. She said she asked the woman why she was out walking, and the answer was, "I was hoping I would just drop dead."

Transportation is another problem many older Midlanders face. Midland College and Casa de Amigos offer general transportation on an appointment basis to shopping areas and other places users need to go.

Midland Community Action Agency provides bus services to medical appointments.

Transportation to the Senior Citizens Center is provided by special bus, available by reservation.

The center, currently located at First Christian Church, is a project of the city of Midland Parks and Recreation Department. It offers a variety of activities, including games and classes in various hobbies.

It's open each weekday. The city plans to convert the current Circle Drive Fire Station into a new and larger center when the opening of two new fire stations allows the city to stop using the facility for a fire station.

Casa de Amigos also has several programs for older citizens.

For the elderly person who wants to go back to school, Midland College charges senior citizens no tuition. And several stores offer discounts to senior citizens.

The elderly get a tax break from all the local governing bodies in the form of a homestead exemption of \$6,000 of the assessed value of their houses. Under a new law, an additional \$10,000 is subtracted from the 100 percent valuation on school taxes only.

Among organizations for senior citizens in Midland are the American Association of Retired Persons, National Association of Retired Federal Employees, Midland Retired Teachers and First Methodist Church's Golden Agers. For those who like to dance, there's the Over-55 Dance Club.

Senior Services of First Christian Church has published a Directory of Information for Senior Citizens.

It lists all the above organizations, plus a variety of others with special

programs available to the elderly. As a general rule, in each case, the idea is to help elderly Midlanders cope with the most common problems — which, most observers agree, are declining health and isolation.

Elderly Midlanders should learn about SSI program

Many elderly Midlanders could be missing out on much-needed cash income because they don't know about the Supplemental Security Income program, according to Erven L. Fisher, district manager in Odessa.

SSI, administered by Social Security, makes monthly cash payments to people over 65, or who are blind or disabled.

A person can have assets worth \$1,500, \$3,250 for a couple, and still be eligible for SSI, and not everything counts in that figure.

The house a person lives in doesn't count as an asset, nor does an older car or personal effects. What does count are items of value — bank or savings accounts, cash, jewelry, other real estate, antiques, large insurance policies and other items.

Not all income counts in income limits, either. Generally, the first \$20 of unearned income in a month does not count. Above that, though, the SSI payment is reduced dollar for dollar.

The first \$65 a month of earned income is exempt. Above that, the SSI payment is reduced \$1 for each \$2 of earnings, officials said.

Living arrangements also can affect the amount of payment. A person living in someone else's household generally receives a reduced payment.

The maximum federal SSI payment is \$189.40 a month for an individual and \$284.10 a month for a couple.

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California homes get 'the bends'

RANCHO PALOS VERDES, Calif. (AP) — The road along Portuguese Bend winds gently past wispy pepper trees and rambling ocean-view homes, its slightly cracked surface the only hint of a slow-motion disaster residents say is "tearing everybody up."

More than 30 fashionable houses in the Abalone Cove neighborhood of this affluent Los Angeles suburb are splitting and cracking inch by inch, victims of a creeping landslide that began last spring.

"When I noticed cracks in the ceiling last April, I thought I needed to paint again," said resident Jacqueline Moxley. Now, as the cracks slowly riddle her home from kitchen to back bedroom, Mrs. Moxley says "it just breaks your heart."

Shifting real estate is no stranger to Portuguese Bend. Some 150 homes not far from Abalone Cove were either destroyed or damaged between 1956 and 1958. But until last year, homes in the Cove section had remained untouched.

"It's amazing to watch," Mrs. Moxley said. "Monetarily and emotionally, it's tearing everybody up."

The once-choice homes are now impossible to sell at their pre-slide worth, and banks will not make loans to prospective buyers, according to residents.

"We're losing something we paid a lot of money for and worked for," said Maureen Griffin, a homeowner. "We're losing our biggest asset."

Melvyn Lewin said his \$210,000 home is now "practically worthless." He said the four- to six-inch cracks in his floors "look like caverns" and open wider with each new rainfall.

Just next door, Lawrence Horan cut his slowly sliding garage away from his house to keep the rest of the building intact. But a few weeks ago the home began "pivoting around the fireplace," Horan said.

"I have a contractor coming out to cut another portion of my house off," he said. "The thing is moving very erratically."

Nearby, a two-acre palm-studded waterfront estate once used to film the comedy "It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World," has suffered cracking throughout the grounds.

The owner, Mrs. Betty Hardin, put it up for sale last year for \$875,000. "It's still on the market and I can't sell it," she said.

While the slide has turned most homeowners against the caprice of nature, it also has pitted some residents against local government.

Mrs. Griffin and Mrs. Moxley said the city and county should have warned residents about a slide possibility after a sewage pumping station nearby was damaged by ground movement three years ago.

"If only we had known, we could have done something about it before it got like this," Mrs. Moxley said. "It's a real stab in the back."

But Mayor Ken Dyda of Rancho Palos Verdes said the city "had no privileged knowledge" that the homeowners didn't have.

"It's just like earthquakes," he said. "When you live in California and you haven't had one in awhile, you tend to forget about them."

Lewin said the city has dragged its feet on a geologist's report that said the slide might be stopped by pumping out ground water from heavy rains. Geologists think the extra water caused the slide.

However, Dyda said the city has "done the only thing you can do." It proclaimed Abalone Cove a disaster area.

The county recently agreed with the city in confirming the disaster rating. If the state follows suit, low interest loans for repairing damage would be made available to homeowners.

But because Abalone Cove is a private area with private roads, funds for halting the slide will have to come from residents, Dyda said.

He said the city is working on the introduction of state legislation to allow the residents of Abalone

Cove to tax themselves to raise funds for restoring the land.

For Maureen Griffin, that amounts to the city and county doing nothing "unless we pay for it."

"Our homes are falling apart more every day and...they wonder why we're half crazy up here," she said.

Hurrying in wrong direction is fatal

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

Many a bridge player takes pride in playing quickly, but speed is no advantage when you're going in the wrong direction.

South ruffed the third diamond, drew trumps and tried the spade finesse so quickly that it made dummy's head swim. (Dummy was used to this; he had played with South before.)

East took the king of spades and got out safely with another diamond. South then slowed down, leading his last trump in the vain hope of squeezing somebody.

Since South still had to lose a spade or a club, all was lost save honors.

South's line of play would work only if West had the king of spades—an even chance. If South starts the clubs after drawing trumps he will develop the game-going trick if West has the king of clubs, the queen of clubs, or both. The odds would be 3 to 1 in South's favor instead of just even money.

As dealer you hold: S 7 5 H A K Q J 10 8 D 6 3 C 10 9 2. What do you say?

ANSWER: Most bridge books advise you to pass. Don't tell anybody, but my own preference is to bid one heart. If partner bids ambitiously, you have six sure tricks. If he doubles an opponent you can safely bail out by bidding more hearts.

Airport custodial firm overbilled state \$1,371

BALTIMORE (AP) — A custodial firm at Baltimore-Washington International Airport deliberately overbilled the state \$1,731 last year, according to an audit.

State Aviation Administrator Karl R. Sattler said Thursday the audit revealed that Pritchard Services, Inc., of Dallas, submitted inflated payroll costs between Oct. 12 and Dec. 31.

Sattler added that the manager of the firm has resigned and that the overbilling has been repaid in full.

Sattler said a Pritchard supervisor apparently submitted pay slips to the state showing a full work force when there was less than a full staff on duty.

"He was doing it just to show he had enough people on 'the job,'" Sattler said, adding that the audit found no evidence that any Pritchard employee had illegally pocketed money from the state.

"There is no evidence that any state employees were involved," he added.

The attorney general's office is discussing the possibility of bringing legal action against the janitorial firm's employees, Sattler said.

The cleaning firm has an \$852,957 contract with the state to provide custodial services throughout the airport. It is one of the largest service contracts at BWI.



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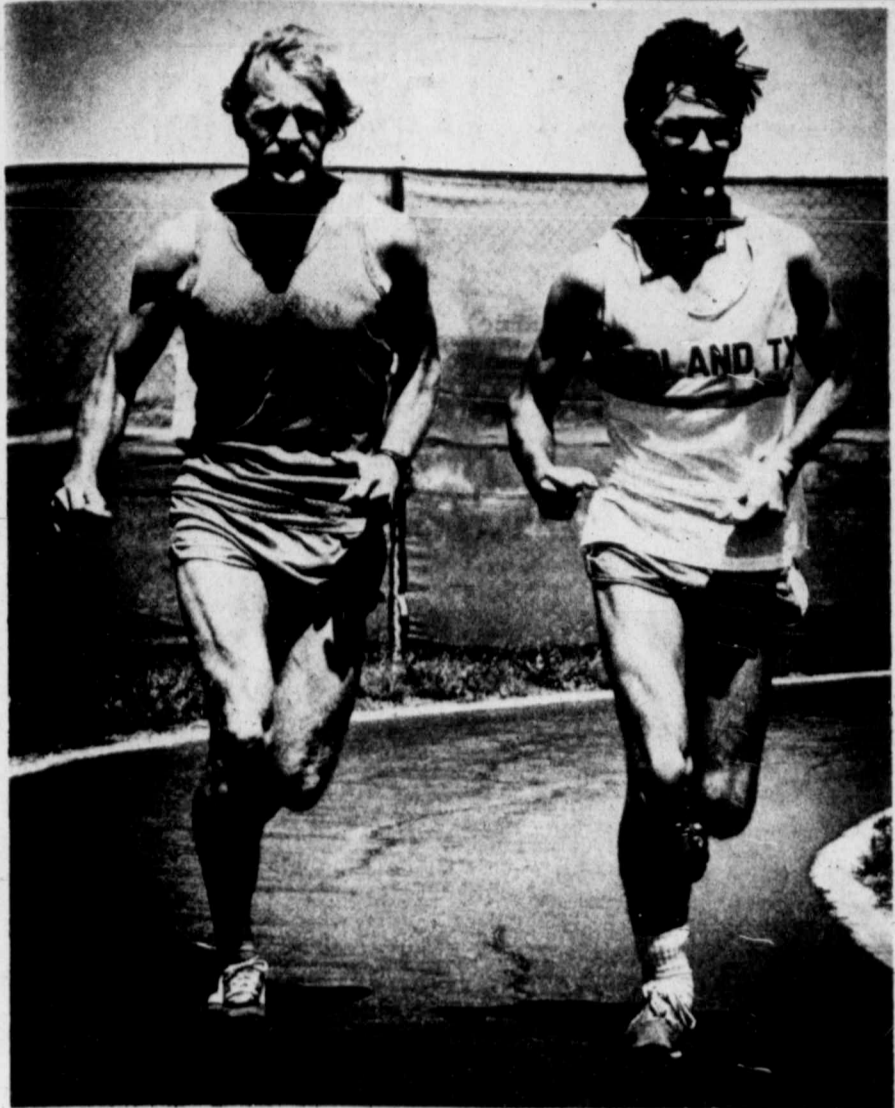

Two Midland runners to take on marathon

Two Midland runners, Norman Smith and John Carmony, will be among the 7,500 men and women running in the 83rd annual Boston Marathon, reputed to be the world's most prestigious run. The running kicks off at high noon on Monday. Smith, 32, an exploration geologist who deems himself a "compulsive runner," ran last year's 26-mile, 385-yard run (42.2 kilometers) from Hopkinton, Mass., to downtown Boston in two hours and 45 minutes. The run will be Carmony's debut at Boston, though he qualified for the "tortuous" Boston Marathon by racing the 26.21875 miles in Dallas' White Rock Lake Marathon last December in a 2:58.24 time. Carmony, a geo-physicist, has been running steadily for the past year. Smith, who has been running for

four years, hopes to best his 2:45.28 time from last year. He came in 814th in a field of thousands. "I'll try to do better than last year," Smith said Friday, on the eve of his and Carmony's departure for Massachusetts. "But it'll depend on the weather." "It'll take a day to acclimate," Carmony said of Sunday's rest there. Winning last year's Boston Marathon was Bill Rodgers, 31. He ran the route over rolling hills in 2:10.13. His best run was 2:09.55 in 1975. "Certainly, I won't have a chance of winning," said Smith, "but it's an honor" to take on the Boston Marathon. Smith and Carmony will be representing the Midland YMCA in the run.

Boston policeman runs interference

BOSTON (AP) — Although Robert Dunn was one of the first across the finish line in a half dozen Boston Marathons, he received little attention. It didn't bother him; the state policeman was too busy shoeing spectators, bicyclists and dogs away from exhausted runners. "It's hectic, and it's getting more hectic," said Lt. Dunn, who has viewed marathons from the saddle of a motorcycle or the front seat of a squad car over the last 17 years. This year, Dunn will supervise an escort of about a dozen state troopers who will run interference for an estimated 7,500 participants in the 26-mile run from Hopkinton to Boston. Joined by officers from towns in the marathon's path, it will be Dunn's job to clear a way for the runners through the estimated one million spectators who clog the roads along the route. "Most of the crowd is really helpful to the runners," said Dunn. "They pass out cups of water and orange slices. But sometimes they're too helpful. Some of the runners don't want help, and these people get in the

way." There are major points of congestion along the race, particularly adjacent to the lung-wrenching hills. "A lot of people like to watch them run the hills because of the degree of difficulty," explained Dunn. "It's the place to be, where people are partying and having a good time. It isn't a disorderly crowd. It just pushes out onto the street." There are other problems besides the crowds. Dunn and his men must deal with bicyclists who accompany some of the runners and the occasional canine spectator who takes a fancy to one of the road race participants. "Every once and a while the dogs will chase someone, but they're generally more interested in the motorcycles than the runners," he said. Dunn, who does some running on his own, said his men often find themselves cast in the role of impromptu coaches to some of the runners. "A lot of them talk to the guys on the motorcycle," he said. "They might tell how they think they're doing, how they feel, just to have someone to talk to."

Al Unser claims CART wasn't pulling a bluff

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The dissident Championship Auto Racing Team wasn't bluffing when it said it had an offer to race somewhere besides Indianapolis on Memorial Day weekend, defending Indy 500 champion Al Unser said Friday. "If money is all we were after, we have an offer to go somewhere else for more money than the Speedway is offering," Unser, a three-time winner at Indianapolis and driver for Midland's Jim Hall, said. The CART group relented Thursday and submitted its 44 entries for the May 27 race, including most of auto racing's top drivers. Another 10 entries delivered Friday pushed the field to a record 93 entries representing 18 racing teams. Speedway officials said any mailed entries postmarked before midnight Sunday will be accepted. Earlier in the week, CART leaders had threatened to boycott Indianapolis and stage their own race the same day, and Unser said he had been ready to do that. "I don't like missing any race, but if it takes that, I was sticking behind the people I'm with," Unser said. "Sometimes somebody has to stand up. If the CART people had decided not to go, I would stick with them." He added: "All of us want to run at

the speedway. We were not trying to avoid that place. We're not against the speedway but against USAC. The Speedway is the big red apple of auto racing." CART and the U.S. Auto Club have been split over a USAC rule change reducing turbocharger boost. CART president U.E. "Pat" Patrick indicated his group will continue to pursue a change in the rule. Unser said he opposed the sharp slowdown caused by the lower boost. "These cars are designed for 200 miles per hour," he said. "If they're going to back up 20 years, why don't they wait until I'm gone? I'm not ready to go that slow." The entries received Friday included one from Rasmussen Racing Products, with Eldon Rasmussen as the driver; three from Leader Cards Inc., Milwaukee, Wis., with Sheldon Kinzer and Bill Vukovick as drivers; two from Bruce Crower, Chula Vista, Calif., with Jerry Sneva as the driver; one from Hucui, Hunter and Arndt, Prince George, Canada, for driver Cliff Hucui, and one from Beaudoin Racing, Brookfield, Wis., for Billy Engelhart. Sherman Armstrong of Winchester, Ind., and Rolla Vollstedt of Portland, Ore., also added one more car to their team entries.

Lawsuit against Rose dismissed

CINCINNATI (AP) — A lawsuit filed by a Florida woman asking child support payments from Pete Rose of the Philadelphia Phillies was dismissed Friday in Hamilton County Juvenile Court. Judge David E. Grossmann dismissed the suit at the request of Ed Benson, attorney for Terry Rubio of Tampa, Fla. Rubio, 25, alleged in lawsuits filed here and in Florida that Rose is the father of her 1-year-old daughter, Morgan. Benson said the Florida suit would be pursued and that he had been instructed by Rubio's attorney there to ask the Ohio court to drop the case. The suit was filed first here because of a Florida law that bars a married woman from lodging a paternity claim against a man other than her husband. However, attorneys say a recent Florida Supreme Court ruling opened the way for filing such a claim for child support in Florida. At the time Rubio's child was conceived, she was married to another man but was separated, she said. She claims to have been Rose's lover for more than two years after meeting the baseball player in spring training in 1976 when he was with the Cincinnati Reds. Rose, who is married, has refused to comment on the lawsuit which asks that he be ordered to pay hospital and other costs related to the child's birth and to make support payments. Rubio contends she has had no income since Rose quit sending her money last December.

Regaining his form at the start of the second set, Borg's powerful shots proved too much for Clerc the rest of the match.

Bosox must lower prices

BOSTON (AP) — Fenway Park's 7,400 bleacher seats will be reduced in price by \$1 for six games starting today under an agreement that penalizes the Boston Red Sox for an improper \$1 ticket price hike at an unspecified number of 1978 games.

State Attorney General Francis X. Bellotti also announced Friday that the American League team will donate proceeds from sale of 10,000 reserved bleacher seats, worth \$3 apiece, to charity.

Rick Gross, an assistant attorney general in the Consumer Protection Division, said his investigation didn't turn up evidence that showed the team "willfully or intentionally" violated ticket policy. A ticket office mix-up was possible, he said.

The \$30,000 donation, from the sale of 10,000 now-reserved bleacher seats, will go to the Massachusetts Advocacy Center, a non-profit organization that aids underprivileged youths throughout the state.

In addition, through the game of April 19, all \$3 reserved bleacher seats will be sold for \$2, and unreserved \$2 seats will be sold for \$1.

Two unseeded players, Victor Pecci of Paraguay and John Alexander of Australia, along with Vitas Gerulaitis of the United States, also advanced to the semifinals.

In Saturday's semifinals, Borg will face Pecci and Alexander will play Gerulaitis.

In an out-of-court settlement, the Red Sox effectively agreed with Bellotti's allegation that the team occasionally violated its stated 1978 ticket policy, hiking unreserved \$2 bleacher seats to \$3.

Last year, the team tried a policy of raising unreserved bleacher price by \$1, making them reserved, when all other reserved seats at the ball park were sold in advance.

The aim was to let fans buy reserved bleacher seats before the day of the game. Traditionally, bleachers at Fenway Park have been sold on a first-come, first-served basis.

But responding to fan complaints and reports in The Boston Globe, Bellotti's office concluded that the Red Sox sometimes hiked bleacher prices even when some reserved seats had not been sold.

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Rossman to face Galindez today

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Mike Rossman and Victor Galindez, knocked out of a fight in Las Vegas Feb. 24 because of a dispute over officials, will meet today in the Superdome, the site of Rossman's light heavyweight title victory.

Rossman already was in the ring when his rematch in Las Vegas was called off because the World Boxing Association and the Nevada State Athletic Commission could not agree on who should appoint the fight officials.

The officials for Saturday's fight will be named by the WBA, who appointed the officials when Rossman won the WBA title by stopping Galindez in the 13th round last Sept. 15 on the same card in which Muhammad Ali regained the WBA heavyweight championship from Leon Spinks.

Fernando Mandry Galindez of Venezuela, president of the WBA, said Friday at a rules meeting that one judge would be from Puerto Rico and one from Venezuela. The referee also will be from a neutral corner.

The names of the officials will not be released until fight time, about 4:15 p.m. CST. But the referee is expected to be Stanley Christodoulou of South Africa and the judges are expected to be Waldemar Schmidt of Puerto Rico and Jesus Celis of Venezuela.

Schmidt was a judge when Rossman stopped Galindez on cuts 55 seconds into the 13th round. At the end of 12 rounds Schmidt had Rossman ahead 116-113. Judge Arsenio Bernal of Mexico had Rossman ahead 118-113 and referee Carlos Berrocal of Mexico had Rossman ahead 116-115. All three officials had given Rossman

rounds nine through 12.

The fight, which will be televised on ABC's Wide World of Sports beginning at 4 p.m. CST, will be Rossman's second title defense. In his first defense, the 22-year-old from Turnersville, N.J., stopped Aldo Traversaro in the sixth round Dec. 5 in Philadelphia to bring his record to 36-4-3, with 23 knockouts.

The 30-year-old Galindez will be trying to regain the championship he held from 1974 until last September. He won the title by knocking out Len Hutchins in the 12th round at Buenos Aires Dec. 7, 1974, and defended it successfully 10 times. His record is 51-6-4, with 30 knockouts.

Galindez had trouble making the 175-pound weight limit for the first Rossman fight, and Rossman thinks the dispute over officials in February worked to the Argentine's advantage because "I don't think Galindez was in shape in Las Vegas."

But Tito Lactoure, the Argentine promoter, feels Galindez is in top shape for Saturday's fight, noting that Galindez weighed 175 earlier in the week. The weigh-in is at 7 a.m. today.

Trainer Slim Jim Robinson said he has had no problems keeping Rossman physically and mentally sharp despite the disappointment caused by the postponement.

"He's a champion," said Robinson. "He's supposed to adjust himself to this things."

Rossman adjustment is earning him \$150,000. Galindez is getting \$50,000.

There also will be a 12-round fight and three 10-round bouts on the card promoted by Top Rank, Inc., and Super City Boxing.

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Indianapolis Motor Speedway officials received 10 more applications today to compete in the 63rd annual 500-mile race, raising the total so far to a record 93 entries in the May 27 classic.

Speedway President Joe Cloutier said entries postmarked prior to midnight, April 15, will be accepted for this year's race. Practice will begin May 5.

Today's entries included one from Rasmussen Racing Products, Indianapolis, with driver Eldon Rasmussen; three from Leader Cards Inc., Milwaukee, Wis., with drivers Sheldon Kinzer, Bloomington, Ind., and

Bill Vukovich, Coarsegold, Calif.; two from Bruce Crower, Chula Vista, Calif., with driver Jerry Sneva, Spokane, Wash.; one from Hucul, Hunter and Arndt, Prince George, Canada, with driver Cliff Hucul; and one from Beaudoin Racing, Brookfield, Wis., with driver Billy Engelhart, Madison, Wis.

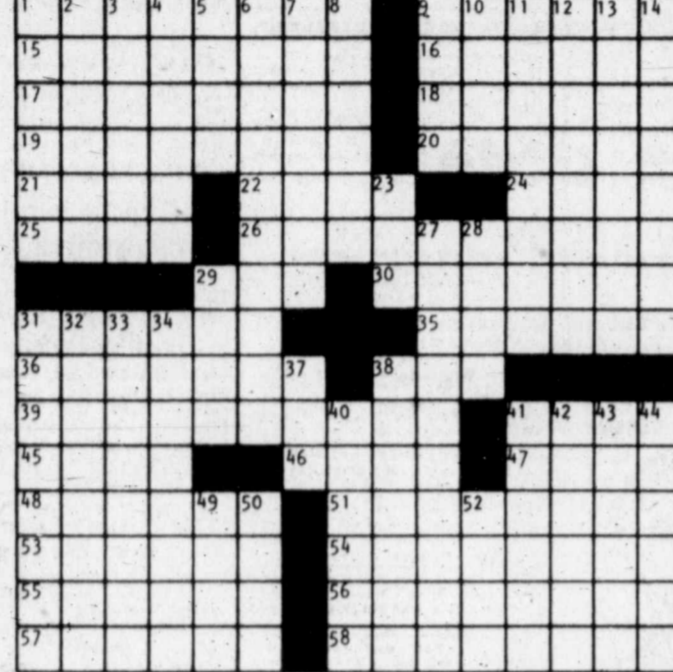
