### Billy returns

COLUMBUS, Ga. (AP) — A tanned and trimmed down Billy Carter returned home Friday, promising to renounce forever the beer drinking that sent him to a California hospital for six weeks of alcohol abuse treatment.

"He's the same old Billy, but I'm glad to have him back," said Carter's wife, Sybil, who, along with three of the couple's six children, met President Carter's younger brother at the Columbus airport shortly after noon.

### Incident 'over'

MOSCOW (AP) — An incident at the U.S. Embassy involving a man speaking Russian and brandishing two pistols was reported "over" Friday night by a U.S. Marine after gunfire was heard. He said no one was hurt. A witness, an American woman, said the man had been surrounded by Soviet police and plainclothesmen. The woman told The Associated Press she hurried from the building, then heard gunfire from inside the embassy.

### Man assigned

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Atorney General Mark White has assigned Robert O. Smith as a special assistant attorney general to aid a Laredo investigation of possible misuse of public funds in Webb County. White said Smith, former Travis County district attorney, was appointed Friday upon request by the Webb County district attorney and grand jury.

### Tremor recorded

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — An earthquake measuring 4.2 on the Richter scale jolted San Francisco and parts of the Bay area Friday afternoon. No serious damage or injuries were reported. The tremor's epicenter was 20 miles southwest of Berkeley, according to the University of California's seismographic laboratory.

### Sea law debated

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) — Reporting progress and failure, the 6-year-old U.N. Conference on the Law of the Sea ended its ninth meeting Friday but agreed to reconvene in New York in July to discuss seabed mining rights.

During the five-week session, delegates from 139 nations reached broad agreement on fighting ocean pollution and setting up marine research stations in developing countries.

They also reached a compromise on granting landlocked states access to surplus fish stocks in coastal states.

## Thirty minutes of terror ends with two dead

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — A rifleman firing from a parked motor home into a huge crowd at a downtown parade Friday killed two women and wounded at least 44 other persons, police said. The sniper was found dead in the vehicle after a half-hour exchange of gunfire with police.

Police Inspector Marion Talbert identified the sniper as Ira Atebury, who would have been 65 on Sunday. Talbert told reporters that Atebury had an arsenal of weapons and "enough ammunition to start a war."

"It is obvious he came to the parade with the plan designed to do what he did," said Police Chief Emil Peters.

Peters said 4,000 to 5,000 people were within range of the gunman when the firing began about 1 p.m.

One witness, Judy Gutierrez, told police she heard the man at one time yell, "Traitors! Traitors! Traitors!" before shooting and wounding a police officer.

The wounded — six police officers and 38 civilians — were taken to five city hospitals. Authorities said most of the wounds were superficial.

Tom Mueller, an exchange student from Dusseldorf, West Germany, was on a parade float with eight other teenagers when a policeman standing "not three yards away" was shot in the leg.

We all laid down. At first there was no panic. I heard bullets whistling over my head," said Mueller, 18. "It was just horrible. You can't just imagine what it was like. Oh, my God, it was horrible."

The Battle of Flowers parade, part of San Antonio's annual Fiesta Week, had drawn an estimated 300,000 people to the one-mile route. It was later canceled.

Peters said officers on parade duty quickly surrounded the motor home, a green and white Winnebago, and opened fire. He said shooting between police and the gunman, starting just after 1 p.m. CST, lasted about half an hour.

Peters said the incident ended at 2:15, following a period in which no shots were fired by either side. Police waited 15 minutes to move in because they thought the man might have hostages, Peters said.

Just before they stormed the motor home, officers lobbed tear gas at it, Peters said. They found the gunman dead inside.

Asked if the man killed himself, Peters said, "That isn't for certain. It looks like one of the wounds was self-inflicted, behind his right ear."

Frank Campa, a parade watcher standing across the street, said he saw the gunman open the side door of the motor home and fire. He said the man was struck by a spray of pellets, possibly from a police shotgun.

Peters said an officer shot the gunman as he entered the motor home after the tear gas was released, but added, "I assume he was dead when he (the officer) went in. I suspect he was killed before they put the tear gas in there."

Peters said two female spectators were killed by the gunman. Their bodies were found just a few yards from the motor home. Police identified one as Ida Long, 26, and the other was identified by her family as Amaia Castillo, 18.

Mrs. Castillo's daughter, Joanna Campos, said her mother was there with two of her younger children and a grandchild. Mrs. Castillo's children, ages 8 and 11, were wounded.

Talbert said that when he entered the motor home, he saw "at least six rifles lined up on the back of the seats."

He had enough ammunition to start a war," Talbert said. "He came prepared to stay awhile. I saw a lot of loaded clips in there."

On Aug. 1, 1966, another well-armed sniper, Charles Whitman, 25, a University of Texas student from Lake Worth, Fla., climbed to the top of the university's 27-story tower in Austin and shot 41 persons, killing 14, including an unborn child.

Whitman fired from the tower for 90 minutes, hitting victims blocks away before an off-duty policeman climbed the tower and shot him.

The motor home was parked in a small lot next to a tire store, giving the gunman a good view down two streets, Grayson and Broadway — the intersection where the parade was to start.

Local television crews had been on hand for coverage of the parade. At least one station had a live telecast of police cautiously closing in on the motor home.

Donna Kaplan, sitting cross the street from the motor home with her child, said she thought the man was armed with two guns.

I just saw this guy stick guns out the window and start shooting," she said. "He must have had one on each shoulder because I saw two barrels sticking out."

Reporter Susan Springfield from radio station WOAI was on the scene and said people in a two-block area dropped flat to the pavement when the shots rang out.

She said she hit the ground and started screaming. "Newspaper! Newspaper!" over a hand-held radio transmitter.

I'm flat on my face. We're being shot at."

## Ousted residents fight to regain their land

FLORENZA, Ga. (AP) — Ousted residents of a village that was turned into a World War II military airstrip and then into a wildlife refuge moved back Friday, vowing to stay until the government agrees to talk about returning the property.

The coastal community of Harris Neck had a population of 70 families, most of them black, in 1943, when residents sold the land for \$7 an acre to the government for an army airstrip. They say they sold with the understanding they could move back after the war, but the land instead became part of a 2,687-acre wildlife refuge.

A group of 50 protesters, some former residents of Harris Neck, some descendants of Harris Neck residents, moved into the Harris Neck Wildlife Refuge on Friday to stage a "camp in" at the site.

Leaders of the 15-car caravan urged protesters to remain peaceful. Edgar Timmons Jr., whose parents were among those ousted, said the group would stay "until we can bring them (the government) to the table and seriously negotiate the injustice that has been done."

Lynn Greenwalt, director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which manages the wildlife refuge, said the service is sympathetic to the plight of the protesters.

Greenwalt said the Wildlife Service will "allow them to express their grievances" as long as they don't build permanent shelters or damage the refuge.

The group contends the government promised local residents they could return to their village after the war and regain the land they were forced to abandon. The group has not said if it would be willing to repay the government for title to the disputed land.

Greenwalt said the group's "best course of action is probably to test the case in federal court" — a process that could be both lengthy and costly for the group, most of whom rely on odd jobs or fishing for a livelihood.


Rep. Ronald "Bo" Ginn, D-Ga., introduced legislation in 1976 that would have restored the land to the ousted residents but the measure died in committee.

Timmons contends the real villain of the land seizure was the son of a former slave owner who held title to a parcel of land adjacent to Harris Neck.

"There were several uninhabited sites right near that would have been just as good (for the airstrip), but he (the landowner) wanted to sell his property to the federal government and it wasn't big enough for the airfield unless you threw in Harris Neck, too," Timmons said.

So the landowner convinced the government that his site was preferable, sold his 70-acre tract for \$13,000 and forced the condemnation of the adjacent village, Timmons charged. The community was bulldozed when the airstrip was built.

"All they got out there now is wildlife and a few cows grazing," Timmons said. "We feel we're entitled to more than animals are."



## The times, they are a changin'

Once again, the hands on clocks will have to be adjusted for Daylight-Saving Time.

Which means that for a six-month period beginning Sunday the sun will, in effect, delay its daily exodus by an hour.

Clocks in West Texas — and in most of the U.S. — will be subject to the time change, which comes at 2 a.m. Sunday.

Key to setting the clocks at the onset and end of DST is the phrase: "Spring forward, fall back."

This Sunday, sunrise will be at 7:05 a.m. instead of 6:05 a.m. The sun will set at 8:27 p.m. Sunday, rather than 7:27 p.m.

And until the last Sunday in October, darkness, according to the clock, will come one hour later than on standard time.

As a result of all this, days will continue to get longer until the June 27-July 3 period, when the sun will set at its latest here — at 8:59 p.m. DST.

DST will afford Midlanders more daylight to partake of the outdoors after each workday. And, in theory at least, DST also is supposed to be an energy-saving move.

## NRC orders shutdown of other nuclear plants

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nuclear Regulatory Commission issued orders Friday to temporarily shut down nuclear power plants designed by the company that built the crippled Three Mile Island reactor.

The NRC's decision to order closing of the plants came shortly after a commission official announced that operators of the facilities had agreed to close the plants voluntarily to make safety improvements.

Harold Denton, the NRC's director of nuclear reactor regulation, told the commission that utility companies operating reactors built by Babcock & Wilcox Co. had promised to shut them down to conduct new safety analysis, make safety modifications, prepare new emergency procedures and improve the training of plant operators.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission voted to accept the company agreements for voluntary shutdown, then formalized the proposals by telling its regulatory staff to issue orders for the closings. The staff can allow the plants to be reopened without further commission action when the improvements are completed.

Seven plants to be closed are located in Arkansas, California, Florida, Ohio and South Carolina. The other two plants built by Babcock & Wilcox are at Three Mile Island in Pennsylvania.

Earlier, Denton had told the commission the plants would have to be closed at least two months to solve any technical problems. He said the reactors might have to be closed much longer if design changes are necessary.

Some utility officials have said a shutdown could keep the plants closed through the summer months, a time of peak demand for electricity, and could lead to blackouts in some areas.

But William S. Lee, president of Duke Power Co., which operates three of the reactors, told reporters, "I expect these outages to be routine, of a very short duration." And he said he did not anticipate keeping the plants closed during the summer.

Denton was skeptical, however, and said Lee "Perhaps he's ingenious and will come up with a way to do it."

Three of the plants to be closed

already are shut down for refueling or maintenance. Denton said they will remain out of operation until the improvements are accomplished. They are Arkansas Power Unit 1, operated by Arkansas Power & Light Co.; Crystal River Unit 3, operated by Florida Power Corp. and Davis Besse in Ohio, operated by Toledo Edison Co.

Denton said officials at the Rancho Seco nuclear plant in California, operated by the Sacramento Municipal Utility District, have promised to shut down Saturday.

He said Duke Power Co. has agreed to shut down one of its three Oconee units in South Carolina on Saturday and will close the second unit May 12 and the third the next week.

The two remaining Babcock & Wilcox nuclear plants near Harrisburg, Pa., already are out of action. The plants, operated by Metropolitan Edison Co., are the badly damaged Three Mile Island Unit 2, the site of the March 28 accident, and the adjacent Three Mile Island Unit 1.

Denton's deputy, Edson Case, recommended immediate shutdowns at an NRC meeting Monday.

## Robbery may be motive in slayings

BIG SPRING — Drifting sand Friday had covered all signs of where a retired rancher found the bodies of a mother and her son early Thursday morning.

The bodies of Ann Laurie Reeves, 40, and her son, Tracy Reeves, 15, of Big Spring were discovered about 1 a.m. lying face down beside a dirt road near the abandoned Center Point school north-south of Big Spring, Howard County Sheriff A. N. Standard said.

Mrs. Reeves was shot once in the head and twice in the hand; Tracy, twice in the head and twice in the chest, according to preliminary autopsy reports, said Standard Friday.

Preliminary reports also indicate facial bruises on both the victims that may indicate some kind of assault, said the sheriff.

Three spent and two unfired small caliber shells were found along with the Reeves' clothing a few feet from the bodies, the sheriff said.

The clothes did not have the appearance of being violently removed, said Standard.

Officials are awaiting the return of autopsy findings from Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene either Monday or Tuesday, said Standard.


Results of fingerprint tests are also expected early next week, he added. The Reeves family owns a Texaco Highland service station in the south part of Big Spring and the Interstate

20 Texaco station on an interstate bypass.

According to investigators' information, Mrs. Reeves and her son relieved an attendant at the I-20 service station about 6:30 p.m. Wednesday. Mrs. Reeves called an attendant at the Highland service station about 11:30 p.m. and the two made arrangements to meet at a local convenience store to exchange some money.

Mrs. Reeves did not appear at the meeting spot and the attendant notified the victim's husband, Charles Reeves, who drove to the I-20 station, officials were told.

When he found the station "out of order," Reeves told officers, he started looking for his wife and son.

As he was driving over the well-lighted Owens Street viaduct, Reeves said, he spotted a light tan purse on the road, officials said.

Reeves told officers he stopped and discovered the purse belonged to his wife. He then went to the police department to report his wife and son were missing, he told officers.

Standard said the Reeves report was made at 12:50 a.m. and the rancher called in about 10 minutes later — after discovering the bodies.

Investigating officers found two money bags from the I-20 station on the Snyder Highway five miles northeast of the city. The bags contained only receipts from the station, said officials.

Personal papers were also found scattered along the highway, officials added.

"Since the money bags were taken, we can only assume that robbery was the motive," the sheriff said, adding it might not have been the only motive.

Standard said a pair of bloodied undergarments were discovered in the back of the I-20 station Thursday morning. These were sent to the Department of Public Safety laboratory in Austin to be analyzed, he said.

About 2:30 p.m. Thursday, Mrs. Reeves car was found parked behind the Walls Industrial Building. It had been moved from its regular parking lot near the I-20 station, according to investigators.

Sears agrees to cut some prices to comply with Carter guidelines

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sears, Roebuck and Co., the nation's largest retailer, has agreed to roll back some of its prices after being told that recent price increases exceeded the Carter administration's guidelines, the administration announced Friday.

The price rollback marked the biggest victory yet for the administration's wage and price guidelines program, which has been weakened in the face of rapidly rising prices throughout the economy.

In another favorable economic development Friday, the Commerce Department announced that the nation's trade deficit fell to \$821.3 million in March, the lowest monthly deficit in nearly two years. Exports increased 7 percent to total \$14.5 billion, while imports rose 3.2 percent to \$15.3 billion.

Carter told a group of newspaper editors that the latest trade figures were "good news." The improvement in the deficit from \$1.3 billion in February should provide new fuel to support the recent improvement in the value of the dollar.

Sears' decision to reduce prices followed a personal telephone call from Carter to Sears Vice President Charles A. Meyer in which Carter was understood to have asked for cooperation with the program.

The Council on Wage and Price Stability also announced that it has notified two major paper companies, the Crown Zellerbach Corp. of San Francisco and the Hammermill Paper Co. of Erie, Pa., that they are "in probable non-compliance" with the price guidelines.

The administration lacks the authority to force businesses to reduce prices, but the Sears price rollback is an example of the kind of pressures the administration has said it will use to win compliance. Personal persuasion, or jaw-boning, by the president is a key tool.

"This is the kind of response we need to make the anti-inflation program work," said Barry Bosworth, the council's director. "We are very gratified at recent developments in this direction."

A spokesman for the Council on Wage and Price Stability said it isn't known what prices Sears will reduce or by how much. "Details will be developed over the next several days," he said.

The spokesman, Joe Carter, said Sears was told it was "out of compliance" with the program because its price increases during the first six months of the year exceeded the administration's guideline, which is aimed at keeping price increases below increases of the previous two years.

In Chicago, Edward R. Telling, Sears' chairman and chief executive officer, said that Sears' overall prices increased at an average annual rate of less than 4 percent, which "may prove to have been slightly above the administration's deceleration standards."

The retailer said the price reductions would take effect next week on a wide range of items.

"We want to be sure we are in compliance... All of us at Sears support the objectives of the administration's program to decrease the rate at which the price of consumer goods are increasing," Telling said in a statement.

Stantonites to vote today

STANTON — Voters in the Stanton Independent School District will go to the polls today to vote on a \$500,000 bond proposal which calls for a new addition to the primary school and refurbish other buildings.

The measure, if approved, would call for: —Remodeling the underground primary school, which has suffered water leakage and damage.

—Adding a second floor to the primary building, two additional classrooms and a new band hall.

—Adding a second entrance and exit to the primary building and a connecting corridor to the elementary junior school building.

—Renovating four classrooms in the elementary wing to free the existing library-cafeteria for better function.

Voting will be from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. in the Stanton Junior High School.

Education panel approves bill

AUSTIN — The Senate Education Committee has approved a bill by Sen. Pete Snelson of Midland, establishing an early childhood intervention program for handicapped children up to three years old.

One existing program, administered by the Department of Mental Health Mental Retardation, currently provides services for handicapped children in that age bracket, while another program, administered by the Texas Education Agency, provides services for deaf and blind children in the same age bracket.

Snelson's bill would combine both programs under TEA at a cost of about \$10 million a year.

But that's a bargain price, said many of the witnesses presented by Snelson, most of them parents of handicapped children.

"It may cost \$20,000 to educate a handicapped child, but it costs \$200,000 not to," said Don Rettberg of Austin, father of a child handicapped from birth.

Rettberg said because of early intervention assistance his child would not need to be institutionalized at a tremendous expense to taxpayers, but would become a taxpayer and a contributing member of society.

Apparently that argument was persuasive enough to win committee support for the measure.

Snelson also won approval for legislation transferring from the General Land Office to the University of Texas responsibility for accounting for millions of dollars in oil and gas royalties earned on state lands.

Currently, the General Land Office handles the bookkeeping on the royalties and forwards the money to the University.

Snelson told senators that if UT handled the money directly, it would be processed faster and therefore produce about \$87,000 a year more in interest.

Testimony on plutonium disputed

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — A Kerr-McGee Nuclear Corp. official disputed earlier testimony Friday that there is about 40 pounds of plutonium missing from the company's nuclear fuel plant near Crescent, Okla.

William J. Shelley, 57, of Oklahoma City told jurors in the \$11.5 million Kerr-Silkwood plutonium contamination negligence trial Kerr-McGee is nearly within Nuclear Regulatory Commission guidelines for unaccounted-for plutonium.

Odessa judge awaits report on Fife's psychiatric exam

ODESSA — District Judge Joe Connally said Thursday he is awaiting a written report of a psychiatric examination of Stephen Patrick Fife, who is charged with the July 20, 1978, murder of Catherine Ann (Fife) Murphy.

Connally said the examination was conducted earlier this week in Fort Worth by Dallas psychiatrist Dr. James P. Grigson.

The 24th district judge appointed Grigson to conduct the examination following a request by Fife's attorneys Royal Caswell and Cynthia Clack.

The judge, who said he had been in contact with Grigson by telephone, declined comment on the psychiatrist's verbal report.

Fife, 22, was taken to the Tarrant County Jail in Fort Worth Saturday by Ector County sheriff's deputies.

Connally will preside at the trial, which was transferred to Tarrant County on a change of venue. Jury selection will begin May 7.

Connally has not yet ruled on a defense motion to release Fife to the custody of his attorneys for a few hours so he can prepare a defense.

Miss Murphy, 19-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Murphy Jr. of Odessa, was reported missing July 19, 1978.

Fife has been held without bond since his arrest last February.

Cooler temperatures forecast

Postpone sunbathing one more day, unless you're prepared to spend a long time in the cool under clouds.

The weatherman is predicting mild but cool temperatures under a partly cloudy sky for sun worshippers. No thunderstorms and no dust are expected.

Friday ended with a dusty gust as a sand-laden cool front rumbled through the Midland area about 4:30 p.m. High Friday before the front's arrival was 83. But the overnight low dipped into the 40s.

Nonetheless, it wasn't record material. Record temperatures for today are 95, which occurred in 1974, and a cool, cool 38 in 1934.

Forget rain, the weatherman says. Precipitation this month is 1.63 inches, for the year, it is 2.86 inches.

The Andrews sheriff's office received a number of calls about the sudden arrival of the cool front Friday, which turned the sky a dusty red. The front passed through Lamesa about 3:30 p.m. and Big Lake at 6:30 p.m. It was cold and windy in its wake.

## House votes for repeal of 'honky tonk tax'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — House members voted Friday to repeal the 10 percent state admissions tax, assailed as a tax on the poor man's honky tonk but not the rich man's supper club.

A 63-51 vote set the bill up for final action Monday. No fewer than 36 of the 150 representatives already had left for the weekend when the votes were counted.

Rep. Gonzalo Barrientos, D-Austin, said the tax is unfair because customers pay it at dance halls like the Broken Spoke in Austin but not at the expensive Venetian Room at the Fairmont Hotel in Dallas.

"Would you say they charge the admissions tax where Democrats go but not Republicans?" asked Barrientos.

"That's right!" replied Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-

Corpus Christi, sponsor of the bill (HB504). According to the House Ways and Means Committee, the tax is collected at 555 dance halls, 50 skating rinks and 20 "racing establishments" that present horse and motorcycle races but not automobile races.

The bill would cut state revenue by about \$1.3 million a year.

Berlanga said the comptroller's office considers the tax an "administrative nightmare to collect" and added that its constitutionality is under attack in the courts.

Rep. Ben Grant, D-Marshall, led a group of East Texas legislators in attacking the bill.

"My basic philosophy is it is better to tax the vices than the virtues and better to tax the luxuries instead

of the necessities," Grant said. "... Dance halls and honky tonks are all we are talking about." Besides, he said, dance hall owners aren't likely to cut their ticket prices by 10 percent if the bill passes.

### House panel wants to hear ACB member

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A House committee chairman wants a Texas Air Control Board member to testify about allegations his engineering firm received \$59 million from a utility he later tried to prevent from being sued by the state.

Rep. Bennie Bock II, chairman of the House Environmental Affairs Committee, sent a letter Friday to Joe C. Bridgefarmer of Dallas.

"I am very concerned about recent allegations about your conduct as a member of the Texas Air Control Board," Bock told Bridgefarmer, an engineer.

"Certainly, I do not want to prejudice you in these serious charges," continued Bock, D-New Braunfels. "Therefore, I would like for you to contact me as soon as possible about your appearing before the committee, so that we can discuss these issues openly and fully, and provide you a forum to respond."

The Houston Post reported Friday that Texas Utilities has paid at least \$59 million since 1975 to Gibbs & Hill Inc., a New York-based engineering firm that specializes in power plant design and construction. Bridgefarmer has been general manager of the firm's Dallas branch office since it opened about two years ago.

The newspaper cited records of the Texas Public Utility Commission in reporting the fees paid to Gibbs & Hill.

The air control board staff wants to sue Texas Utilities for alleged air pollution control violations at its Martin Lake lignite power plant near Henderson in East Texas.

## Decontrol effort opposed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The revelation that President Carter's "windfall profits" tax would only mildly sting oil companies intensified congressional efforts Friday to block the president's accompanying decision to decontrol oil prices. Capitol Hill sources said the first attempt will be launched in the House next week to try to keep price lids on domestic-produced oil. Administration officials previously claimed any such move was sure to be rejected in the Senate if not in the House. Meanwhile, both liberals and conservatives in Congress were getting

their first look at Carter's formal tax proposal — submitted late Thursday — and expressing surprise that it would generate so little revenue for the Treasury. Although originally described by Carter as a 50 percent tax, the levy would cost oil companies only about 13 percent of the first three years' worth of extra income from decontrol, according to figures made public by the administration. "It's a sham, I'm from an oil-producing state, and I would support a greater tax than he's suggested," said Rep. Jerry Huckaby, D-La.,

who usually supports the industry position on energy issues. Rep. John Dingell, chairman of the House energy and power subcommittee, the leading House member on energy issues, said the modest dimensions of Carter's tax "trouble me rather substantially." He predicted that attempts would be made to turn Carter's proposal into a larger tax — especially in view of recent reports of oil company earnings for the first quarter of 1979. Mobil Corp., the nation's second-largest oil company, became the latest in a string of oil companies to report

## Soviet prisoners exchanged

WASHINGTON (AP) — Five political and religious dissidents were released from Soviet prisons and flown to New York on Friday in exchange for two Russians convicted of spying in the United States, the chief White House spokesman said. The Soviet group includes Alexander Ginzburg, one of the best-known Russian dissidents, White House spokesman Jody Powell said. The Russian spies, convicted last October of trying to steal U.S. defense secrets, were sentenced to 50 years in prison. They were reported by White House officials to be preparing to leave New York for Moscow on the same Soviet jetliner that brought Ginzburg and the others to the United States. Powell said the dissidents had arrived in New York earlier in the day. The two spies, Valdik A. Enger and Rudolf P. Chernyayev, were convicted in U.S. District Court in Newark, N.J., of attempting to purchase documents on anti-submarine warfare. Powell said the immediate families of the five released dissidents will join them shortly under an exchange agreement worked out in negotiations that began last fall. In addition to Ginzburg, the other members of the group were identified as Mark Dymshits, who had been serving a 15-year sentence at hard labor after he was convicted of plotting the hijacking of a Soviet airplane; Eduard Kuznetsov, arrested with Dymshits in the alleged hijack plot and serving a similar sentence; Valentyn Moroz, a leading Ukrainian

dissident held in Soviet prisons on various charges since August 1965, and Georgi Vins, a Ukrainian Baptist leader sentenced to a labor camp and exile for a total of 10 years on charges of "defaming the Soviet state."

## Sunday closings expected

You'd better fill up now if you plan on driving this weekend. April gasoline supplies are running out and up to 70 percent of the service stations in some areas will be closed on Sunday. An Associated Press spot survey shows a growing number of dealers are shutting pumps early, limiting weekend sales and raising prices. The severity of the problem varies widely, however, from area to area, with unleaded fuel the hardest to find. Robert Jacobs, executive secretary of the Illinois Gasoline Dealers Association, said that 1,500 of the 4,500 stations in the Chicago area would be out of unleaded gasoline by Sunday. He also said two stations were charging more than \$1 a gallon for unleaded premium at full-service pumps, but he refused to identify them. In Washington, meanwhile, the Energy Department said investigators found possible violations of gasoline price regulations at 150 of 251 stations audited last week in Los Angeles and New York City. Sixty of the station owners agreed to lower prices immediately, the department said, and legal action was initiated against the remaining 90.

The supply crunch stems from the fact that many of the major refiners have limited allocations to service stations to a fixed percentage of 1978 sales. Unless dealers ration themselves, they run out before the end of the month. Dan Lundberg, publisher of an industry newsletter, said that the oil companies allocated 8.52 billion gallons of gasoline to dealers this April. That's about 92 percent of the amount sold last April. The head of the Virginia Gasoline Retailers Association said the problem is getting worse. "In previous surveys, I indicated about 40 percent of the stations were closing on Sunday," said James Heizer. This weekend, he said, 60 percent to 70 percent of the stations may be forced to shut. "The stations along the interstates and main arterial highways will try to stay open." James Cresente, executive director of the Northern Ohio Petroleum Retailers, said up to 35 percent of his members close early during the week and will be closed Sunday. "There will be more of them closed this Sunday than last Sunday," he said. "As the weather gets better, people drive more... Our members are telling customers to drive on the top of the tank — keep it full — because the price might go up tomorrow." A check of Arizona stations indicated 80 percent are closed nights or Sundays. State officials said no community was completely without fuel, but they urged motorists to do as much of their driving as possible during the day and during the week.

# Snooze for views is her job

SEATTLE (AP) — Seven days a week, a 35-year-old Seattle nurse inserts earplugs, dons red pajamas, fluffs her pillow, pulls the covers up under her chin and falls asleep to the hushed wonder of spectators at the Seattle Science Center.

The woman, who prefers to remain unidentified and calls herself "Jodie" in the experiment, is the sleeping centerpiece of an exhibit called "Dreamstage." She's helping to show that people's brains and bodies buzz with action during sleep.

Perhaps for contrast, a human brain sits idle in a jar on a nearby pedestal.

When the unmarried nurse gets off her night-shift job at a Seattle hospital, she drives to the center and gets wired for the show. A technician pastes 11 electrodes to her head, which are then plugged into a laser device and a sound synthesizer.

When she is deep in sleep, regular ripples of laser light appear on the dark ceiling above the bed. When she dreams, the red, blue, green and yellow lights flash comet-like and irregularly.

"During deep sleep, the synthesizer emits an eerie low moan, but when she dreams, the synthesizer comes alive with a samba beat."

"It's a very easy, pleasant way to make \$150 (a week)," Jodie said Thursday, just before she dozed off for the day. She said she isn't shy about sleeping in front of crowds.

"My only job is to sleep and that's what I'm doing," she said.

Two panes of glass and a mesh screen separate Jodie from the public, so she shows up as a hazy silhouette, motionless except for an occasional rollover, which sends the special effects show abuzz.

She bought the pajamas and brings along her own pillow and blanket. She tacked two sailing posters on walls of the cramped cubicle, "because that's where I'd be, if I wasn't in here."

"Sometimes someone will knock on the window and I'll wake up," but I go right back to sleep. I don't harass them, Jodie said. "I don't make faces back."

Dr. J. Allan Hobson, a Harvard University psychiatrist, developed the display that opened in Seattle on April 20 and ends June 9.

Hobson selected her from about 200 applicants because, he said, as a nurse she is accustomed to stress, she lives in an apartment near a noisy street and still sleeps soundly and she is "a psychologically healthy, with-it person who is not particularly self-conscious."

The exhibit, which has appeared in Boston, St. Louis and San Francisco, "tries to show the excitement of observation, not dry research," said Hobson. "Jodie can demonstrate that far from being a time of rest, sleep is a time of periodically intense dreaming. People just crank 'em out."

## John Singer's rights were not violated

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The civil rights of polygamist John Singer were not violated when he was shot and killed by a law enforcement officer last January, the U.S. Justice Department says.

Ronald Rencher, the U.S. attorney for Utah, said Thursday the department's Civil Rights Division had determined the police officer who fired a shotgun blast at Singer was innocent of any wrongdoing.

Singer — who pulled a gun on officers trying to take him into custody at his Marion farm on an arrest warrant — died from the shotgun blast Jan. 18. Officials never have released the officer's identity.

Friends of Singer and others have contended Singer was shot in the back and that officers acted improperly.



## Pollution brings monument closer to death

AGRA, India (AP) — Surviving wars, floods and millions of tourists, the 327-year-old Taj Mahal now faces its gravest threat — air pollution.

Some 250 foundries have shot up around this north Indian city in the past 30 years, and people here say the white marble mausoleum has lost much of its pearly sheen because of effluents from the plants.

"The Taj of 15 or 20 years ago is no longer there," said a tour-company manager. "It's turned yellowish and now the new refinery will blow more pollution this way."

The refinery he spoke of, a \$250 million one, is scheduled to begin operating in April 1980, 25 miles northwest of Agra. The Taj is downwind of the refinery.

The refinery is opening despite the pleas of environmentalists. And, said K.V. Sounder Rajan, director of the government's monument department: "If there is going to be a refinery, it's going to be infinitely worse because the effluents are acidic."

Refineries throw sulphur dioxide into the air, which becomes sulphuric acid and corrodes marble when soaked with rain, causing the stone to flake. One Indian pollution expert, Dr. T. Shivaji Rao, calls the condition "stone cancer."

The Taj was built by the 17th Century emperor Shah Jahan to house the jewel-encrusted tomb of his second but favorite wife, Armand Banu. She was known as "Mumtaz-i-Mahal," or "Elect of the Palace," from which the name Taj Mahal is derived.

Mumtaz died while giving birth to her 14th child and her last words, as the legend goes, motivated the emperor to build one of the world's most perfect edifices. She is said to have murmured: "Build for me a monument of such perfect proportions and purity that no one could be in its presence without

sensing within himself the eternal wonder of the power of love and inevitability of its passing with death."

Some 22,000 craftsmen, several coming from as far as Europe, labored 22 years to complete the monument to love. Shah Jahan was overthrown by his son and spent his final days peering from a cell at the "poem in marble." When he died he was entombed next to his wife.

Petroleum Minister H.N. Bahuguna has stated that all precautionary measures were being incorporated in the refinery, now in its final stages of construction. He said the refinery will pose less of a danger to the Taj than nearby foundries and power plants, but his argument has not mollified Indian environmentalists.

The respected Madras newspaper, the Hindu, said that most filtering devices attached to smokestacks of Indian cement plants and power stations are not in working order. "There is no guarantee and little likelihood that the effluent treatment system of the Mathura refinery will perform differently," it said.

A committee of experts had recommended that all industrial plants near Agra should be shifted downwind of the Taj. However, a group of intellectuals complained that the government-owned Indian Oil Corp. has situated the refinery in such a way that it threatens the Taj.

Their "Save the Taj" committee sent an appeal questioning the accuracy of studies on the refinery's environmental impact to Education Minister P.C. Chunder, who is responsible for India's monuments.

The statement noted that reservations over the project have been expressed by both Indian and

foreign experts, including Dr. Giorgio Torraca of the International Center for Conservation in Rome.

Pro-refinery scientists have responded with a proposal to coat the Taj with a protective chemical layer, a suggestion which one Monuments Department official described as "crackpot."

"This sort of idea indicates that persons backing the refinery realize there is a real risk to the Taj," he said.

To many, including residents of Agra, economic development is a far more important concern than the preservation of a marble mausoleum, no matter how beautiful or famous.

"If the Taj was not here, no one would come here and that's a fact," said Agra taxi driver Lala Ram, 29, who earns his livelihood transporting tourists.

"But," he said, "I think that the refinery in Mathura is good because there are many poor people in India and they can work there and earn money."

## Price of pork registers first price drop in nearly a year

WASHINGTON (AP) — A preliminary government report showed Friday that retail pork prices have started to come down, the first decline in almost a year.

But the Agriculture Department report also showed that retail beef prices, as predicted, are continuing to climb.

The figures were in a weekly department report and showed preliminary figures through mid-April. Pork prices averaged less than \$1.56 a pound. That was a decline of 0.9 percent from the estimated March average of almost \$1.57 a pound.

According to department records, the pork

price decline was the first since it dropped a fraction of a penny in May of last year to around \$1.41 a pound.

The prices used by the Agriculture Department are on an all-cut basis.

Farmers have stepped up hog production sharply this year and their prices have tumbled.

## Oklahoma House considers castration

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — The author of a proposal to provide for amputation of part or all of the sex organs of some male sex offenders said Friday that he would prefer to have such criminals executed, "but the U.S. Supreme Court won't let us do that."

"I thought this would be the next best thing," said state Rep. Frank Shurden, a Democrat from Henryetta County, who said he will bring his bill up for a vote in the House either Monday or Tuesday.

Shurden's proposal was adopted Thursday as an amendment to a bill originally designed to repeal an old law that provided for sterilization of certain criminals and mentally ill persons.

Instead of repealing the old law, Shurden's amendment destroyed that portion of the bill and replaced it with tougher language regarding sex criminals.

The bill now calls for "asexualization," defined in the measure as "the incapacitation of the external male genitalia."

When asked exactly what that phrase means, Shurden said, "That would be up to the surgeon, but I think it could be removal of the entire male sex organ because some doctors have told me castration alone is not enough to keep a man from having an erection."

When asked why he felt such drastic legislation is needed, Shurden said, "The U.S. Supreme Court says we cannot execute anybody for rape, no matter how brutal it is, and I thought this would be the next best

thing." The court has ruled that the death penalty, if applied in cases of rape, would violate the Constitution's ban against cruel or unusual punishment.



Alfaro, injured in Thursday's 16-5 win over the Dodgers, Tracy and Lezcano are bunched together in rbis with Alfaro's 15 topping the club. Alfaro and Tracy each have three home runs while Tracy and third baseman Mike Turgeon are the doubles leaders with four each and Lezcano has three triples.

Eric Grandy projected himself into the rbi sweepstakes Thursday when he knocked in six against the Dodgers to bring his season's total to 11.

# Spring fever packs real wallop for gridgers

If you happen to see some of the city's muscular youths walking around like they were 80 years old in the next couple of days, don't get too excited. Spring training is here.

For the next three weeks, Midland Lee and Midland High football players will be going through that spring ritual of football training. Baseball may be on your mind, but popping leather will be the sound instead of the crack of the bat. In Midland, spring fever packs a real wallop.

Coach Gil Bartosh's Lee Rebels open the spring grind

today at 9 a.m. while Coach Dennie Hays' Midland High Bulldogs will start in earnest Monday after school. Lee will end the grind with the annual Maroon-White scrimmage at Memorial Stadium at 7:30 p.m. May 18. Midland High will hold its annual Bill Mims contest May 25 at the same time.

Bartosh expects about 60 players to report for the varsity this spring, but he is concerned with the number reporting from the freshmen group.

"We have only 39 freshmen coming out, and we usually have 80-plus. The declining enrollment is already hitting us. Big Spring probably has more freshmen than that," Bartosh stated.

Hays, on the other hand, expects approximately 110 kids to report at all levels, but he stated that the varsity would eventually carry from 40 to 45 players.

Both coaches think this spring will be more productive than last year when both were few at their jobs.

"It takes a year to get your program established, and the kids should know our offensive and defensive schemes this spring. That will make a lot of difference. It is a rebuilding year for us since we have only one offensive and one defensive starter back from last year. We have a lot of holes to fill and there are many positions up for

grabs. Gary Butler is back at quarterback and that's a good place to start and defensive back Steve Waldron is also back," Bartosh assessed.

Hays is also looking for a better start. "I think we are more settled and know the kids better and they know us better and what we want. We have had a good off season program and we've done about all we can do in that situation, so we are ready for spring training," Hays said.

Both coaches also feel that a lot can be accomplished this spring, and both seem to feel that the spring training ritual is beneficial.

Hays has some set goals as does Bartosh.

"We need to find some secondary people this spring," Hays notes. "We feel like we have some quality people at the running back slots and at quarterback. Most of the kids are back in that area. We are also happy with the size of the juniors to be in the line. We have some good size and strength. It will be a matter of finding out which ones are the best. We view spring training as a learning situation. We are not trying to prepare for a football game, and you can learn a lot about a lot of people in a situation like that. It's a lot different when you are preparing to play somebody."

Bartosh also likes to look at a

lot of players in the spring. "Some of our kids are still in track and baseball, but that is really good for us because it forces us to take a long look at some of the other players who didn't play quite as much last year. By the time all the players are in practice, everyone should be on about even terms. We need to get our offensive and defensive personnel set for next fall and see where all our kids fit in. We have only a couple of weeks to get ready for a game in the fall, so we need to use this time very wisely."

One thing is for sure, however, both coaches will know a lot more about their prospects for the 1979 season in three weeks.

# Auerbach accused of being dictator

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. (AP) — Red Auerbach has been acting like a dictator, not a negotiator, during contract talks involving All-America Larry Bird and the Boston Celtics, attorney Bob Woolf claimed Friday.

Woolf, who is representing the 6-foot-9 senior who led Indiana State to a second-place finish in this year's NCAA basketball tournament, made the comment in a press conference he held concerning the stalemated negotiations.

The Celtics, of the National Basket-

ball Association, had announced earlier this week they were breaking off negotiations for Bird, their No. 1 draft pick after his junior season last year.

"Dealing with Red Auerbach is a very difficult situation," said Woolf. "He treats everybody like he used to treat the referees. He taunts you, he baits you, he tries to intimidate you. He never lets up ... He's more of a dictator than a negotiator and I don't think Larry deserves this kind of treatment."

# Blalock cards 68 in Crisman Classic

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Jane Blalock carded a four-under 68 to claim the first-round lead Friday in the \$100,000 Otey Crisman LPGA Classic.

"I thought I had an advantage by playing late," said Blalock, who won last week at Orlando. "The wind and the sun dried the course out."

A soggy course at Green Valley Country Club early Friday refused to allow the ball to bounce and slowed the progress of the game. But by late afternoon, greens were pretty much dried out.

Blalock scored five birdies, but bogeyed the fourth hole after missing the green.

Pat Bradley, at 2-under par, said, "I'm pleased with my 70, but I think it would take a little more than 2 under each day to do anything in this tournament."

Bradley, who finished fourth here in 1977 and fifth last year, called the course, "a thinking man's course."

"It's not all muscle," she explained. "You have to hit the green."

# Astros lean on Latin Connection

MIAMI (AP) — Tal Smith has seen baseball's future, and it is Latin.

"They're not as spoiled, not as pampered, they're hungrier than the American players. Their whole life is baseball," said the general manager of the Houston Astros, who has six Latin-born players on its roster, the most in the majors.

"They play baseball year-round, and the interest in baseball in the Dominican, Puerto Rico and Venezuela is extraordinary," he said.

Houston is one of several teams building a strong foundation for what is expected to be an unprecedented boom in the number of Latin major league players.

The number of Latin players has nearly doubled, to about 70, since 1974. That figure does not include the 20 or so American-born players whose parents are Latin-born, like Pittsburgh pitcher John Candelaria and Boston pitcher Mike Torrez.

Philadelphia minor league director Dallas Green and Reuben Amaro, the Phillies' Latin America coordinator, have greatly expanded the club's attention to Latin America. And Green said the advent of the collegiate baseball draft has helped spur his team's Latin development.

Better organization in Puerto Rico and the Dominican Republic is better preparing players from those countries, and the success of Latin players in the states has increased national attention on U.S. baseball.

"All of a sudden, it seems like playing baseball in the United States is what everyone in the Dominican Republic wants to do," said Phillies pitcher Nino Espinosa.

Maduro helped facilitate rules changes allowing more U.S. ballplayers to play in the winter leagues and also improved relations with the club owners. He expects to see more major league players from the Caribbean, Panama, Venezuela, and even nontraditional baseball countries such as Nicaragua and Colombia.

"I think this new league will help get more Latin players into the major leagues. There is a great deal of difficulty for the players to adapt themselves here. That's one of the big reasons I started this new league.

"I feel the players, no matter how good the instruction, develop and learn quicker if they are playing for their own teams in their own countries," Maduro said.

Although Mexican players have traditionally preferred to play in their own country's leagues, Detroit veteran Aurelio Rodriguez, a Mexican, noted, "A lot of players come here, then go back, because they know they have a job there. But if they can make so much more money here, they might stay here longer."

San Diego Padres minor league director Jim Weigel, who said his team would love to come up with a Mexican star because of its proximity to Mexico, said, "There seem to be more Mexican players making it now. We've just hired a full-time Latin scout."

And as Preston Gomez of the Dodgers points out, the Latin increase comes without new Cuban ballplayers. In the early 1960s, most Latin players in the majors were Cubans.

But after a period of cool diplomatic relations between the United States and Cuba there are only four.

HOWEVER, President Fidel Castro began last year to allow exiles to visit Cuba, and may soon allow Cubans in the country to come to the U.S. to play baseball.

"Some day the political situation will be solved with Cuba, and then you will have a lot of Cuban players again," Gomez said.

The question underlying the coming Latin wave is whether greater numbers will result in greater militancy among the players, some of whom have giant lists of dissatisfactions, especially their pay and the lack of Latinos in managerial positions in baseball.

Some things on the list seem likely to be taken care of almost naturally. Baseball, at its heart, is fiercely competitive, and if fielding nine Latinos will beat the Yankees, it seems likely that any team would do that.

"Pittsburgh isn't an area with a lot of Spanish-speaking people, and I think that city has proven that people will pay to see a winner, regardless," said former Pirates outfielder and current Astros Manager Bill Virdon.

And Virdon and the Expos' Dick Williams, two managers with Latin coaches, agree that they are indispensable on a team with several Latin players.

"With more Latinos, I think a manager's job is a lot easier with a Latin coach," Virdon said. "He's very important for communication."

REASONS FOR the influx include the efforts of Roberto Maduro, a special liaison between Latin America's Winter Leagues and Commissioner Bowie Kuhn. Other reasons are the tremendous salary inflation in the major leagues and the increased Latin America scouting operations by many teams. Another doubling within five years seems likely.

MADURO LEFT the commissioner's office last year to start the new Inter-American League, a Triple-A caliber league with teams in Miami, Puerto Rico, Dominican Republic, Panama and Venezuela.

And as Preston Gomez of the Dodgers points out, the Latin increase comes without new Cuban ballplayers. In the early 1960s, most Latin players in the majors were Cubans.

TEAMS SUCH as Pittsburgh, San Francisco, Houston, Los Angeles and Cincinnati already sprinkle their farm systems with special Latin personnel, and other teams are doing the same. Several Latin players now have front-office positions, with titles such as Latin America coordinator, and the Inter-American League is giving former players such as Luis Aparicio a chance to gain experience running a franchise.

So far, the Houston Astros are the only team that offers formal classroom tutoring to enable Spanish-speaking players to learn American culture and language.

There are many in baseball who feel more can be done.

"There needs to be a concerted effort to be cognizant that there are social and philosophical barriers to the Latinos. Baseball must start doing things to ease those barriers," said Reggie Jackson of the Yankees.

"It seems to me that for any employer hiring young people who initially come from a different culture and different language, it would be most wise to offer help to ease that transition," said Marvin Miller, executive director of the Players Association.

# Spurs dred pesky Cheeks

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — The San Antonio Spurs and their explosive guard George Gervin have had quite enough of pesky Philadelphia rookie guard Maurice Cheeks.

The shifty, 6-foot-1 Cheeks averaged nearly 23 points in each of the first four games of the best-of-seven, NBA Eastern Conference semifinal playoff series.

And as if it wasn't bad enough Thursday night for Cheeks to get 18 points, 12 assists and eight rebounds, he added a stifling defensive job on the 6-7 Gervin.

Gervin, the NBA scoring champion for two consecutive seasons, got a paltry 13 points as the 76ers thumped the lethargic Spurs 129-97.

The victory trims San Antonio's lead to 3-2 and sends the series back to Philadelphia for a sixth game Sunday. If a seventh game is needed, it would be played next Wednesday in San Antonio.

Gervin, who had a series average of nearly 30 points per game, didn't

score until he hit two free throws with 8:56 remaining in the second quarter. He didn't score again until a layup in the third.

Nine of the points came in a meaningless fourth quarter. He hit only four of 13 shots, all of them dunks or layups.

"Maurice Cheeks is a good ball player, a pesky little guy, sort of like an insect," said Gervin. "Next time, I guess I'll have to bring my can of Raid."

"The ball just wouldn't fall for me, that's all," added Gervin. "There will be days like this. We got a bad effort from all of us. It rubbed off on everybody."

"I didn't do anything different. I just tried to deny him the ball. He missed a lot of shots," said the quiet Cheeks, a second-round choice last year from West Texas State.

Cheeks, a starter this season, averaged only 8.4 points per game. In the absence of injured 6-6 All-Star guard Doug Collins, Cheeks caught fire against San Antonio, put together games of 19, 24, 15 and 33 points.

"He's been great. He's killed us," said San Antonio Coach Doug Moe in a practice session. After the drubbing, Moe was too stunned to say much of anything.



# Is Fred Patek washed up?

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Is Fred Patek, last year's starting shortstop for the American League All-Stars, suddenly washed up?

Or will he be all right once a nagging shoulder injury heals?

"He's killing us out there," said Kansas City Royals Manager Whitey Herzog after a recent game in which the diminutive infielder, now 34, committed two throwing errors.

"We're going to have to do something," Patek, for 11 years the smallest player in the major leagues, slowed down last August with a shoulder injury. There is speculation his career may be coming to a close.

"Freddie's been a helluva player when he could play, but my coaches don't think he can play now," said Herzog.

General Manager Joe Burke seems to disagree.

"I still have confidence

in Freddie Patek," says Burke. "And I hope the rest of the organization has confidence in him."

Herzog is known to be urging the Royals to call up shortstop Todd Cruz from their Omaha farm club in the American Association. Cruz reportedly is not a good runner, which would make him a liability on the artificial turf of Royals Stadium.

"But he's got a good, strong arm and he's a battler, from all I've heard," said Herzog. The Royals traded relief pitcher Doug Bird to Philadelphia for Cruz during spring training.

"We traded Doug Bird for Cruz because we were short of infield help in the organization," said Burke. "One of these days Cruz will be a big-league shortstop."

One of the most popular players the Royals have ever had, Patek was off to a fast start this year with two four-hit games in the first home stand. But his bat cooled off and, most critically,

his fielding has been uncharacteristically shoddy. In a 5-4 victory over the Cleveland Indians Thursday night, he made two errors.

# Umpires' strike strikes Orioles

BALTIMORE (AP) — The major league umpires' strike has struck the Baltimore Orioles in their own backyard — and wallet.

The Maryland State Teachers Association has canceled next Saturday's second annual MSTANight at the Ball Park — a move to keep its members out of a position of having to cross picket lines, should the striking umpires bring their banner-carrying walkout to Memorial Stadium for the game against the California Angels.

The statement, issued Friday by MSTANight President Pete V. Trebley, read in part: "It was the consensus

of the board members that, should the umpires choose Memorial Stadium as a picketing site... it would cause considerable embarrassment for the association and much inconvenience for our members attending, since few, if any, MSTANight members would be willing to cross the picket line."

Because of the cancellation, the Orioles figure to lose 1,000 spectators at \$3.50 per head, according to Bob Aylward, Orioles sales director. He based the figure on last season's total of 900 MSTANight members who attended the first MSTANight.







## Rare whooping crane chick hatched

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — A rare whooping crane chick was hatched Thursday at the San Antonio Zoo from one of three eggs being tended by bantam jungle fowl hens acting as foster mothers.

The chick is "doing fine," said David McKelvey, senior aviculturist at the zoo. It is not yet possible to determine the sex of the chick, he said.

Ektu, mate of the late Crip, produced eight eggs last month, five of which were fertile. Crip died last month after living three decades in captivity.

One chick died last week after poking its beak through its shell. Another egg was sent to the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center in Maryland for incubation.

There are only about 100 whooping cranes remaining. The species nearly became extinct in the 1940s.

## Number of education jobs curbed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate says the proposed new federal Education Department can't have more than 17,239 employees. At least until Sept. 30, 1980.

The employment curb was approved on a voice vote Thursday as an amendment to a bill that would establish the new department. "I want to curb the natural tendency for a bureaucratic organization to grow beyond the bounds of reason," said Sen. Henry L. Bellmon, R-Okla., sponsor of the amendment.

The Senate is expected to resume work on the full bill Monday. The bill would combine education programs from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and other departments into one cabinet-level department.


