James McAfee of Abilene took first place honors in the Second Flight with a four over par 76.

In First Flight competition, Joe Key of Albany took home first place consolation honors with an 81.

Second place First Flight went to Griffin High of Stamford with an 80.

Ed Farmer of Andrews took first place honors in the First Flight with a 79.

Championship competition, Roy Pearson of Ranger was up and down with 76-89-82 for a 227 total, good for third place. Pearson's 69 on Saturday tied the Shady Oaks course record.

Bob Moyers of Abilene came from way behind to take second place and even gave the eventual winner Brownfield a little scare in the final round. Moyers' rounds were 77-74-73 for a 224 total and second place.

Chuck Brownfield is our first champion and a good one he is. Brownfield fired a course record tying 69 on Friday, followed by 73 and 78 for a wire to wire four shot victory.

PEANUT GROWERS TO DECIDE CHECK-OFF PROGRAMS

Texas peanut producers will decide by casting mail ballots from September 9 to 24 whether Texas will join the other seven peanut producing states now conducting successful check-off programs. Under such programs collections are made at the point of first sale and funds so collected are passed on to a producers board to assist in peanut research, promotion and education.

Grower leaders are presently conducting educational campaigns in the major peanut producing counties of the state to advise growers of the mechanics of the proposed program. During the September 9-25 referendum growers will also be choosing by mail ballot the members of a 9-man board to administer the program. Candidates for the board from all the peanut producing areas of the state will be listed on the ballot. Those 9 receiving the highest number of votes will be elected to the initial board. Board members will serve for 6 years except that members initially elected will serve staggered terms. Elections held every 2 years for board members will assure representation of all grower interests in the state on the administrative body. It is anticipated that the board once elected will act rapidly in selecting an administrative officer to head up its program.

If the check-off is approved in the referendum, the program can be put in operation

by around October 1, 1969. This would enable collections to be made on all of the 1969 crop in the state with the exception of the early South Texas crop which will be marketed for the most part by September 1. The enactment of this plan effective with the 1969 crop would permit use of the funds in important promotional programs of the National Peanut Council being planned for the winter months ahead as well as for the annual all out National Peanut Week promotion in March of 1970.

Local producers were to meet Thursday, Aug. 21, in the American Legion Hall at Baird to discuss the upcoming referendum, with a representative of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Assn, presenting the program to growers from Callahan, Eastland and Brown Counties.

Records Will Fall If Heat Continues

BAIRD — Last month the consumption of electricity and water in the City of Baird established a record for the amount used in any one day, since the plants have been in operation. A monthly record was also established, however, the daily record has already been exceeded this month and we presume the monthly record will also go down.

The highest daily record of water through the filter plant last month was 830,000 gallons, compared to 850,000 gallons in one day so far in August.

The highest daily record of kilowatts produced last month was 27,400 compared to 28,400 so far this month. So the record has a good chance to be broken.

Last month the City of Baird paid out \$2,695.70 for fuel gas to generate the electricity that was used.

There will be no tax raise necessary to support the budget for the coming year. The rate will remain at \$1.30 per \$100.00 valuation as it has been since 1961.

The budget for 1969-70 calls for expenditures of \$389,222.00. The budget calls for expenditures by classification as follows:

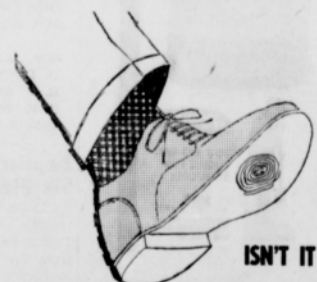
