No Strike **Planned** In City

Avalanche-Journal Staff

While many parts of the nation braced for a possible four-day shutdown by gasoline dealers protesting federal controls on their price markups, most stations in the Lubbock area plan to remain open during regular weekend

In a spot check of several major and independent local dealers by the Avalanche-Journal this morning, most operators said they weren't going to honor the strike, which has been planned for Thursday through Sunday.

The strike, which is being pushed by members of the California Service Station Association who claim that if they don't close for a few days now they won't have enough gas for the Memorial Day weekend, was condemned by Gov. Bill Clements Tuesday, who urged Texas dealers to stay out of it.

Gerri Paul, public relations director for the American Automobile Association in Amarillo, said stations owners contacted by her in a 54-county area reported they couldn't afford to close their stations for four days

'The trend in this area." she said. is for stations to start closing earlier in the day if their supplies are running

Several Lubbock stations have been operating on a daily allocation basis, and closing their pumps when supplies are

Miss Paul said most dealers are receiving about 80 percent of their alloted supplies of a year ago, adding that only a See STATIONS Page 14

Filibuster Snags Loan Rate Hike

Although he has blocked other interest rate increases in prior years with threats to filibuster, the nonstop talk Patman began at 1:30 a.m. was his first full-scale filibuster in 18 years as a sena-

Patman called the move to begin debate at midnight on the bill raising the state interest ceiling on home mortgage loans a sneak maneuver, but pulled on blue jogging shoes and prepared threefoot stacks of reading material to bolster his filibuster against the bill he said will hurt the state's consumers.

We're being pressured heavily on this bill, that's why it's coming out at midnight," Patman said. "It's the midnight express. It's brought up at a time when most people can't be here.

When Patman took the floor to speak on his proposed amendment to the bill, Sen. Bill Meier, D-Euless, the bill's Senoff any further debate and his motion was approved 17-12, meaning senators could vote on the proposal as soon as Patman såt down.

OTTO FRANK SUES FOES

Famous Diary Under Attack

LONDON (AP) - Otto Frank at the age of 90 says he is still going to court to fight persons who claim his daughter's diary was a fake.

At this moment there are four trials going on in West Germany, two in Hamburg and two in Frankfurt, over accusations that 'The Diary of Anne Frank' is a fake," the old man told a reporter. "I fought this charge in 1961 and won, but still the ac-

cusations are made and I must fight and fight again." Written when she was in her early teens, Anne Frank's account of eight Jews in hiding together from the Nazis in occupied Holland became an international best-seller after the war, and a successful play and movie were made from it.

Anne and her sister died in the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in March 1945, three months before Anne's 16th birthday. Their father, the only member of the family to survive the war, came to London from his home in Switzerland to publicize a memorial program at the Theater Royal on June 12,

the 50th anniversary of Anne's birth. "Nazi sympathizers distribute pamphlets and other things saying Anne's diary is a hoax," said Frank. "I have lawyers engaged in these cases, but I have had to go to Hamburg with masses of documents

He recalled one trial he said was adjourned after the defense counsel said his client was 70 years old and "too thred" to appear. "Then a young man came into the courtroom and actually handed out some of the pamphlets,"

In another trial, a court in Luebeck ordered experts to check the handwriting of the original manuscript and to compare the manuscript with the pubhished diary

"The report of the handwriting expert was 36 pages long," said Frank. "The expert checked every letter and said they were all written by Anne, but even that has not been enough to stop the accusations."

Frank was freed from the Auschwitz camp in Poland by the Soviet Army. Anne's diary was found by a cleaning woman after the Nazis raided the hiding place in Amsterdam, at 263 Prinsengracht, and was given to two girls who had helped the hidden group.

The memorial program on June 12 will include musical numbers and readings from the diary. The money raised will go to the Anne Frank Foundation an educational trust housed in the Amsterdam hiding place, which has become a place of pilgrimage for young people from all over the world.

Zoners May Church Plea

Whether two 13th Street houses will be preserved as historic landmarks or give way to parking lots for the First Baptist Church will be determined at two meetings on Thursday.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment meeting at 8 15 a.m. in city council chambers, has been asked to approve the use of three lots and a portion of a fourth lot on 13th Street for additional church parking.

However, the Urban Design Commission, which meets at 7 p.m. in the EOC in City Hall, is considering historic landproposed parking area.

Probably, the ZBA will be asked to table consideration of the church request for a month to allow the design commission to reach a decision on the houses located at 2219 and 2223 13th St.

A spokesman for the Overton South Neighborhood Association, which is fighting to save the houses and stop further encroachment into the neighborhood by church parking lots, said negotiations have been going on with a church representative in an attempt to work out a compromise before Thurs-

We made what we feel are several reasonable and equitable offers in an attempt to resolve the questions and save the houses," the spokesman, who asked not to be identified, said.

~ "We are still hopeful some agreement will be reached," he said.

However, indications are that no compromise will be reached.

The two 13th Street structures have been under a moratorium issued by Urban Design Commission Chairman Beverly Stribling to halt any further dismantling of the houses.

The houses are now owned by E.G. Cone, owner of E.G. Cone Construction, who planned to move the houses, then restore them

If the structures are recommended for landmark designation by the Urban Design Commission, the Planning and Zoning Commission will consider it like any other zone case

The city council will have the final authority in deciding whether the houses should be protected with the designa-

If the houses are designated landmarks, demolition or significant structural changes would require the approval of the Urban Design Commission.

The relatively new commission has not designated any landmarks since its inception in September, but could recommend protection for the Depot Restaurant at 1801 Ave. G, as well as the two 13th Street houses, on Thursday.

Also on the ZBA agenda is consideration of a request of Guy Wilson, representing the City of Lubbock, for a special exception to allow a pump station north of 82nd Street and west of Memphis Avenue.

Area Clings To Chance For Rain

A-J News Services Rain-hungry South Plains residents

got a few encouraging words from weather forecasters today -- a 20 percent chance of thunderstorms tonight and Thursday.

And if it wasn't really better news than Tuesday's forecast calling for a 20 percent chance of rain today, at least it was an increase in duration.

Weathermen said an increasing southerly low-level flow through Thursday, combined with a weak upper-level impulse, will give the area a chance of mainly late afternoon and nighttime showers

Thunderstorms, however, were expected to be widely scattered and to produce generally less than a quarter-inch of moisture, although some heavier storms could bring rain topping the halfinch mark.

Any help at all no doubt would be appreciated by area farmers. May, normally the wettest month of the year on the South Plains, so far has produced only .07 of an inch of moisture. Thanks to a wet April, however, Lubbock is still running ahead of last year in rainfall totals.

National Weather service here has gauged 5.37 inches to date for 1979, compared to 4.11 on this date last year.

Nuke Move More Politically Potent Than Vietnam Protests

By ARNOLD SAWISLAK WASHINGTON (UPI) — The recent Washington gathering of 65,000 (or 75,-000 or 100,000) people to demand the shutdown of nuclear power plants was compared by some to the anti-war protests of nearly a decade ago.

As in those marches in 1968-72, the crowds assembled near the White House and flowed ("marched" implies some kind of parade discipline) up Pennsylvania Avenue to the Capitol grounds.

The participants were mostly young. with a sprinkling of older people. Their demand: "No More Nukes" could compare with the "Get Out Now" slogan of the Vietnam protests.

But there also were some big differences, and they may be more important than the similarities.

The anti-war movement was an uprising against the post-World War II U.S.

kind that moves voters. Anti-war protests began in 1964 and it was more than five years before they began attracting crowds of 100,000 or more to Washington. This was the first big anti-nuke effort in Washington and even if

Before the accident, there was a coalition of local groups concerned about specific nuclear installations; there was no massive national movement.

Three Mile Island could have been the catalyst that produces a national nonuke constituency and projects the issue into 1980 politics. It certainly seems likely that many more Americans now believe they are in personal jeopardy as a result of nuclear power plants than thought so before March 28. It also seems likely that these people will be looking for candidates to express their

California Gov. Edmund Brown Jr. no newcorner to the issue, was one of the Washington protest speakers. Sen. Edward Kennedy, not to be outdone, had his own proposal on nuclear power ready the next day. President Carter met with the organizers of the march and declared that while he wanted to minimize nuclear power, an immediate total shutdown would cripple the nation.

That may be so, and as the experts continue to insist, nuclear power, despite the revelations of the last few months, may be one of the safest energy

sources available. But as a political issue, nuclear power clearly has explosive

CHICAGO (UPI) - Rogers E.M. Whitaker took a train from New York to get to Chicago.

of the 20th Century Railroad Club. "It's great to recreate it. You feel you have class riding on it. Rail buff Bill Savage of Tampa, Fla. arranged a business trip to the area to coincide with the Chief's revival so he

In its heyday from 1936 to 1971, the famed luxury linr helped ferry the elite of the screen world from Broadway en-

gagements to Hollywood. The New York-to-Chicago leg of the journey was covered by the famous Twentieth Century Limited. Then the celebrities would transfer to the Super

Whil it made the 2,200-mile journey, passengers slept in its drawing rooms, clinked glasses in its lounge and dined on haute cuisme in its diner.

Jack Benny's famous butler, Rochesdian met aboard the Super Chief.

In 1971, Amtrak assumed ownership of most of the nation' privately operated passenger train, including the Super Chief. Santa Fe continued running the Chief under contract, but in 1974 Amtrak took over the management of the train completely and the Super Chief be came but a memory

The rail buffs, Amtrak and Santa Fe got together to bring back the Super Chief for the weekend's one special jour-

ney.
"I think it's wonderful, it brings back memories," said Flagman Jack Nagel, who served on the Super Chief on-andoff for a decade or so. Rail food preparer Henry Nelson,

whose days on the legendary train go back to 1946, wielded a mouth-watering plate of appetizers and said, "This is Whitaker said that for many years,

when he worked with Hollywood producets, he rode the Super Chief to the "It's a great train," he said.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Campaignin for president, John B. Connally is blan ing runaway politics for the woes of in-flation. He ought to know.

After all, Connally was the chief eco-

nomic spokesman for a Republican ad-ministration that did as much as any to tune economic policy to the political sea-

Richard M. Nixon tried to step on the gas and the brakes at the same time in order to check both unemployment and inflation in advance of the 1972 presidential campaign. As secretary of the treasury, Connally, then a Democrat, was both a draftsman and a salesman for the Nixon economic program.

He doesn't say much about those days now. But the economic platform he offers as a candidate doesn't sound much like the one he helped Nixon

shape.
The most dramatic of Nixon's economic moves was the wage and price freeze he imposed on Aug. 15, 1971. Connally was one of the economic advisers who urged him to do it; indeed, Nixon later called his treasury secretary "the architect of the new economic policy." After the 90-day freeze came mandatory wage and price controls, which re-mained in effect through the 1972 election and were lifted early in 1973.

Connally hailed the freeze as a new policy designed to solve hard core, basic lieve the president's program contains

U.S. Population Growth Down, **Bureau Says**

population growth of 14.8 million, or 7.3 percent, in this decade through mid-1978 is down from the 23.9 million, or 13.3 percent increase, of the 1960s, the Cen-

The U.S. population was estimated to be 218,059,000 on July 1, 1978.

The highest rates of population increase during the 1970s occurred in Florida, as well as the sparcely populated states of Alaska, Nevada, Arizona and

The government report shows most of the growth during the 1970s was in the West, which grew 15.1 percent, and the South, which grew by 12.4 percent.

Wyoming's growth can be attributed to the development of energy resources such as coal and uranium, as well as oil exploration. Alaska's growth has subsided recently with the completion of the oil pipeline construction.

In Florida, Nevada and Arizona, growth is attributed to resort and retirement development.

The Pacific states of California, Oregon and Washington have had above-average growth during the 1970s, but they didn't grow as fast as they did during

Washington state, which grew slowly during the first half of the decade after layoffs in the defense and aircraft industries, has picked up population in the

Three states that grew during the 1960s - Rhode Island, New York and Pennsylvania - and the District of Columbia all lost population in the 1970s.

Oil Refineries **Deny Slowdown**

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) - Representatives of the nation's oil refineries deny they have participated in a staged slowdown in oil production to push through increased consumer prices and promote de-control of the industry. They say there is a real gas shortage.

Officials of the American Petroleum Institute's refining department, in town through Thursday for their 44th midyear meeting, attributed the gas crunch to diminished crude supply, higher prices of crude oil, strict controls on refinery operations and panic at the gas

"The problem is not one of refining capacity but of crude supply," Robert Hall, API director of refining, said in response to allegations the nation's refineries are operating at far less than ca-

Jack Horner, vice president of API, attributed the crude shortage in part to the industry's reluctance to purchase foreign crude at drastically increased

"I think the U.S. industry was slow to react to price increases," he said. 'Our crude oil shortage is disastrous in comparison to the shortageworld wide."

The rise of private medical and government insurance plans which pay whatever is charged by whomever the patient selects has further reduced the patient's incentive to price shop and the medical profession's inrentive to hold down prices.

Medical care in the United States has become big business, an industry that is now aking in an estimated \$200 billion a year.

THE COST of health care has been increasing faster than the general cost of living. Americans today are spending four times as much on health care as they did in

The health industry is the third largest in the U.S., employing almost five million people. But unlike other industries, where com-petition provides a keen incentive to keep rices down, there is almost no competition

rays to pay the ever-escalating medical bills geon's fees to treat a cut finger.

AMERICANS HAVE always assumed with little attention paid to providing quality care at less cost.

That is the problem with the Carter administration's proposal for a national health insurance plan that would, by 1983, provide catastrophic coverage for all Americans and increase Medicaid and Medicare benefits.

A case history can be seen from Australia's experience with its national health insurance, called Medibank. Following the introduction of Medibank in FY 1974-75, health care spending jumped from \$828 million in U.S. dollars to \$2.62 billion (with a "b") in one year!

Hitler...Now Oil

"THE ENERGY CRISIS is not as bad as you think," U.S. Rep. Kent Hance says. "It's worse Hance believes, in fact, that the Free World now faces its "biggest problem since Hitler."

Americans would have but two choices today if foreign oil imports were to be cut off, the Lubbock Congressman asserts:

(1) Cut consumption in half, which would mean an even greater cutback for the family car if agriculture and other essential services were protected; or

(2) Go to war.

'This is a national defense issue," Hance says. Defeat of the standby emergency gasoline ra-tioning plan, he adds, guarantees that there will be "chaos and anarchy in the streets" should there by a complete cutoff of oil imports before a substitute plan is adopted.

THIS BLEAK SCENARIO gets its pigmentation from the fact that the United States now is dependent on a thin line of ocean-going tankers for about one-half of its petroleum needs.

"About 75 percent of that 50 percent of the oil we use every day comes through the Strait of Hormuz, Texas Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace tells me," Hance continues. "That strait is only 19 miles wide. Even World

War II guns can control an area that size. Our supply lines are extremely vulnerable."

The freshman Congressman says too many people erroneously believe the oil companies "created" today's spot gasoline shortages in order to get price controls lifted and drive up profits. They didn't, he says. Who, then, is responsible for the mess we are

ONE MAN'S OPINION

"THE PEOPLE TO blame," Hance declares, "are the people who instituted controls in 1974. Congress. And the guy who signed that bill into law. President Ford.

When the two-tier pricing system was brought into being, he explains, America was importing about 40 percent of its daily oil needs.

Under the hopelessly complicated controls, in-centives for increasing production of domestic oil have been lacking. Result: The U.S. is even more dependent on foreign oil today than it was five

Then the Carter Administration permitted the friendly Shah of Iran regime to go down the

THE SHAH WAS replaced by a hostile religious fanatic bent on political executions at home and punitive sanctions against America. Thus, our sit-

"We got about 3 percent of our oil from Iran," Hance says, "and it takes six to eight months from the time that oil leaves the field until it is in an American service station's pumps.

"You can see what happened to us when even that small percentage of our daily oil needs was interrupted. What will happen if the OPEC countries cut it all off?"

Knowing they have us in the corner, the Arab producers have driven the world price of crude to historic heights.

President Carter, belatedly recognizing that our only hope for survival, militarily and economically, is to become less dependent on imports without shutting down America, has moved to decontrol prices on domestic oil.

Under pressure from socialists and big spenders like Sen. Ted Kennedy, though, Carter has luxuriated in demagogic diatribes against the oil companies and pushed for a "windfall profits" tax on

the new revenues he would permit them.

Liberals love that idea because, as the OPEC countries raise the world price of oil ever higher, the U.S. Treasury would profiteer handsomely off the backs of American motorists and have more billions for redistribution to beneficiaries of a widening array of social welfare programs.

SO WHAT IS THE answer to our immediate energy crisis?

In addition to decontrols, Hance believes in restoration of the oil depletion allowance and of other incentives to the finding and producing of more energy in America.

He thinks we must have, too, a standby rationing plan along the lines of the last one considered and rejected by Congress, one that's fair to all sections of the country by being based on historic gasoline usage.

If, as he says, today's energy crisis is the biggest problem we've faced since Hitler, then the selfish, socialistic, parochial attitude that prevails in Congress is a heinous-perhaps even traitorous -threat to all of us.

Or have we forgotten how close Hitler came to conquering us?

Landfill Book Levels The Gully

WASHINGTON-He wouldn't have remembered the occasion, but my first impression of the late Bruce Catton was when he heard his own name through the call-system at the National Press Club.

A dozen or so of us were loafing or researching that day in the early 1950s when a name sounded 'Mr. Catton, Mr. Bruce Catton. Telephone, please. There is a difference between being a celebrity-

hound and a hero-worshipper and I am the latter; so I rose when he did, intercepted him, offered him my hand and murmured my name.
"Congratulations," I said. "It was a grand book."

I meant "The Coming Fury," his lead off volume (I think) on the Civil War series that made

UNTIL THEN Bruce Catton had been hardly more than "a flack" for various war agencies, but now he had jumped from obscurity to glory, at

least I thought so. There was a moment of embarrassment, and Catton must have read in my face the fear of a brushoff. My apprehension was absorbed like a dewdrop in the sun, at Catton's pleased and

"Thank you," he said; paused and then went on: "You know, it gives me quite a lift and a thrill to have my name recognized after a good

Only a man of character will show that sort of humble gratitude. It marked Bruce Catton for my admiration list, though I knew little of him beyond his eloquent and graceful books.

HE WRAPPED up the War Between the States, did an autobiography and with his co-author-son, turned back the American history pages

to Columbus' first voyage.

With William B. Catton, he gave us one for the road, "The Bold and Magnificent Dream: Ameri-ca's Founding Years, (1492-1815)."

It is too much to expect a book of 470-some pages, covering more than 300 years, to have the detail and tautness that the elder Catton put into his miniature epics that covered the Civil War.

His admirers will wish for less looseness and generalities, more formal style than one that is content with the cliche of calling the Napoleonic wars a battle between the elephant and the

I have not seen another history adult history book which treats the War of 1812 with the seriousness it deserves.

As the Cattons show, the United States was not yet time for Manifest Destiny, else the Canadian provinces would have been added to the existing states, and Spain would have been summar

swept off the Florida Peninsula.

But this second War for Independence was not "sideshow," even though the Cattons once used the term. These authors are far more within the confines of accuracy when they write:

"Besides the war settled something fairly substantial. America had fought the world's greatest power to a standstill and had won where it counted—on Lake Erie and Lake Champlain, at New Orleans and on the high seas...'

We have here a useful landfill that levels the gully between the Revolution and our approach to national greatness among nations. We proved our manhood in William Henry Harrison, Oliver Hazard Perry, Thomas MacDonough and Andrew

If there is to be a true greening of America, it would spring from such grass roots.

Gerald Bosworth, Lubbock County Hospital District's executive director, told the LCHD administrative committee he is considering two plans for alternative funding of financially troubled EMS - the surcharge, and turning oper-

ation of EMS over to a private company.

Under the surcharge plan, "You would pay \$12 a year for your family to be covered by emergency services," Bos-

He noted, however, that he did not yet know the legalities of such an action, and committee head Jack Flygare agreed that legal advice on the proposal would be necessary.

Presumably, such a plan would require city council approval. It was not explained how county resi-

dents who live outside the city limits would contribute under the plan.

EMS has been plagued with steadily mounting deficits. First quarter figures show the service piling up expenses of \$91,000 while revenue amounted to only \$26,000.

Regarding the private enterprise proposal, Bosworth said he has been in contact with Medical Services, Inc., of Eugene, Ore., about assuming the responsi-

The company currently is negotiating for a similar ambulance service contract in Amarillo, however, and the availability of the services to Lubbock is not yet known. Bosworth said he hopes to meet with firm representatives sometime in the next week "to explore what they have to offer and acquaint them with what's here."

He also said that such a private service would have to handle transferring patients as well as carrying out emergency system work. Two other local services currently provide transfer service between hospitals and other health care in-

Flygare expressed some doubt about

the surcharge plan. "It sounds great, but there's no point in guessing about it," he said. "In the meantime," he told Bosworth, "why don't you pursue the private enterprise proposal. It seems like it would be our answer."

In other business, Doak Enabnit, acting head of EMS, told the committee that in the last two weeks EMS has received 11 crank calls, compared to the four or five it generally receives in a

He noted the potential danger of such pranks, saying that the ambulance service was out on one such call last week when a shooting that resulted in a man's

He added he didn't think the delay by EMS in answering the call had caused the victim's death, but said he wanted to make the public aware that the risk of such an occurrence is real.

The ambulance service has had a spe cial device installed on its phones so that all calls to EMS can be traced by the

phone company, Enabnit said. He said EMS has the names and addresses of 11 crank callers and the prob-lem has been brought to the attention of the criminal district attorney, who will file charges "if needed" file charges "if needed."

Placing such a crank call is classified as a Class A misdemeanor, Enabnit said, and could bring a \$2,000 fine and one year in jail.

In other EMS business, Enabnit reported that a request by that service to locate a station at 5012 50th St., is now before the Zoning Board of Adjustment and has been tabled until the board's June meeting

A mobile home would be needed at A mobile home would be needed at the site to house EMS employees, but Enabrit said the area is not zoned for location of a mobile home. Thus the board of adjustment will have to approve an exception for the ambulance service.

The committee also tabled a request to the hospi-

Bosworth needs the authority of the

He said he could not hire a coordinator for any less than the minimum that range, and noted the need for sor one to oversee the administrative as w operations areas of EMS.

Flygare, however, said, "we don't vant to put the cart before the horse" nd added that "we want to evaluate"

In other business, Bosworth notified the committee that the district will take bids for the purchase of two new EMS

Flygare said that spending the money on new equipment would be contingent on the funding process for EMS, but agreed to initiate bidding. Bosworth sug-gested that no bids have to be accepted gested that no bids have to be acceptable should a private company take over the

Reported Turkish Position Termed 'Not Correct'

WASHINGTON (AP) — A report that Turkey insists on Moscow's approval before allowing U.S. spy planes into her airspace to monitor Soviet compliance with the SALT II treaty is "not correct," according to a top State Department of

But Deputy Secretary Warren Christopher, just back from talks with Turkish leaders, declined to go beyond that general denial when pressed for specifies on Turkey's position.

Christopher appeared Tuesday before the House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on Europe and the Middle East to push for the administration's proposed \$150 million in supplemental economic and military aid for Turkey. military aid for Turkey.

Asked by Chairman Lee H. Hamilton. D-Ind., if it were true that Turkey, in effect, was offering Moscow a veto on American U-2 surveillance flights, Christopher said that, "Beyond replying with a simple negative," he could not public-ly discuss the issue.

Hamilton cited a New York Times story that said the Turkish Foreign Ministry, to the consternation of the Carter ministration, had confirmed that any with the Soviets.

Carter administration officials told Congress last month that, in light of the loss of two electronic listening posts in Iran, it was considering flights over Tur-key to monitor Soviet missile test firings at the Baikonur launching site at Len-

According to accounts in the Turkish press, President Carter sent a three-page letter to Prime Minister Bulent Ecevit explaining the need for such flights.

In Ankara, Ecevit praised the SALT II pact Tuesday, but he said Turkey could not decide whether to grant permission for the U-2 flights before the Soviet Union and the United States finalize

The Times pointed to a subsequent statement by the foreign ministry which said, "It is only natural that Turkey takes into consideration its own security and relations with its neighbors."

Christopher repeatedly begged off when members of the House panel asked what information he had that would contravene the impression left by the published report.

Failure To Ratify Arms Treaty Could Cause Political Damage

U.S. Senate to ratify the second strategic arms limitation treaty with the Soviets would have "dire political implications, leading to "major political damage," the authoritative International Institute for Strategic Studies said today.

It said if SALT II falls short of ratification, President Carter's authority would be seriously undercut and the next generation of Soviet leaders would be skeptical about contractual agreements with the United States.

"In fact, it was the dire political im-dications of failure which — apart from the arms control benefit - emerged as the most powerful argument for ratification," the institute said in its annual

"Its ratification would be regarded as lemonstration of detente, its rejection

said. "Non-ratification would cause potentially major political damage.

The institute is a independent center for information and research on the problems of international security, defense and arms control in the nuclear

The survey described as "unrealistic" the hopes expressed by West Germany and some other Western European countries that burgeoning Soviet mediumrange nuclear capabilities targeted against Western Europe could be constrained in a SALT III Agreement.

The survey also said it is the nature and future of relations between the Soviet Union and the United States that is the true issue behind the technical debate on the merits of SALT.

Critics, however, quickly point out that 6.5 percent, whether in a savings account, corporate bonds, stocks, or Savings Bonds, doesn't earn you much, perhaps not a cent, so long as inflation con-

The new rate compares with Treasury Secretary W. Michael Blumenthal's inflation estimate of 8.5 percent for 1979, made almost simultaneously with nd rate announcement.

If his estimate is correct, it would mean old bondholders would be left with a minimum 2 percent loss for the year. New buyers would suffer more, because interest begins low and rises as bonds mature.

"The 6.5 percent interest rate, coupled with the tax advantages... represents a fair return and makes the bonds more attractive as a long-term investment," said Azie Morton, the U.S. treas-

The tax advantages are real. Owners of Savings Bonds pay no state or local taxes. And, instead of paying federal tax-es each year on the interest earned, they may defer payment until the bonds are

For long-term savers, these tax advantages can be compounded. A couple at peak earning power, for example, might defer taxes until they are retired, when they might be in a considerably lower tax bracket.

But, so long as inflation continues, there remains the question of whether 6.5 percent is a fair return, as the treasurer states, not just for holders of Sav-ings Bonds but for other savers as well.

It isn't true, as banks and government maintain, that you can't lose. The banks advertise that your savings are in-sured. From bank collapse, yes, but not from the economic theft of inflation, which in just 11 years has cut in half the

buying power of the dollar.

The same applies to bonds, which are promoted as being "backed by the full faith and credit of the U.S. Government," and 'never worth less than the amount paid for them." Only if you evade the unignoreable. What must be conceded is that the

what must be conceded is that the government is involved in a dilemma, because by raising the rate paid to bond-holders it simply adds to the inflation that dilutes the value of the bond. The one-half percent increase, for example, cost taxpayers \$400 million a year more.

Turkey Trades Grain For

Soviet Oil

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Soviet Union and Turkey are doing what many American farmers are advocating these

days: exchanging oil for grain.

The Agriculture Department said
Thursday that "Turkey has signed a contract with the Soviet Union to barter 40,000 (metric) tons of Bezostaya wheat for 50,000 (metric) tons of Soviet petrole-

Although the brief note, included in a weekly report on world production and trade, did not provide further details, it seems Turkey will be trading about four bushels of wheat for one barrel of oil.

The mathematics appear to work this way: A metric ton is about 2,205 pounds. According to the American Petroleum INstitute the average weight of a barrel of oil is 302.65 pounds.

Thus, a metric ton would be equal to 7.28 barrels of oil. But Russia is trading 1.25 metric tons of oil to get one of wheat, meaning it is providing 9.1 bar-rels of petroleum to get one metric ton

Wheat weighs 60 pounds a bushel, translating into about 36.7 bushels in a metric ton.

According to this arithmetic, Russia is getting about four bushels of wheat for one barrel of oil.

Commenting further on the ex-

change, the report said, "This is the first substantive contract under a three-year overall trade agreement signed by the two countries last June."

The Soviets are reported to be interested in getting an additional 300,000 metric tons of Turkey's wheat from the 1979 crop but "Turkish officials have decided to wait on a later assessment of the crop" before bartering any more for oil, the report said.

A third transition group includes Thailand, India, Peru, Colombia and countries that depend on the export of commodities. The debate over the existence of a "Third World" will not be reolved at the four-week-long meeting in Manila, but it illustrates how increasingly inappro-priate it is to speak of rich versus poor, north versus south, industrial nations versus the Third World.

"This conference is billed as a simple confrontation between rich and poor, but it is vastly more complex than that," a U.S. delegate said.



contains 18 short stories about alcoholism and its effects. Lardner wrote the foreward, and Allan Luks, director of the New York City affiliate of the National Council on Al-coholism, collected the stories from 513 submitted by writ-ers around the country.

Lardner, who wrote the screenplay for MoAoSoH, said an examination of an almanac's list of 187 of this century's writers led him to conclude that at least 62 had "drinking problem," or one in three. This compares with one in 10 in the general population, he said

In addition, he said of the eight Americans who won Nobel Prizes for Literature, Lewis, Eugene O'Neill and William Faulkner were alcoholics, and Hemingway and John Steinbeck were heavy dependents of spirits.

Judge Rejects Suit Filed By Sears

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sears, Roe- decided whether to appeal buck and Co. has lost an unusual court case that sought to prove the fideral government made it impossible for the company to eliminate employment dis-

U.S. District Judge June L. Green threw the suit out Tuesday, ruling that Sears, the nation's leading retailer, 'failed to present a justiciable case or controversy

The judge sided with government lawyers who argued that the Sears suit was "a political essay, not a lawsuit."

"Sears must recognize that personnel policies reflecting earlier and more limited national attitudes must be modified to widen employment opportunities for all," the judge wrote. "To be sure, reali-zation of that national policy of genuine equal opportunity for all citizens is a formidable task, but not one beyond the notable skill and competence of Sears."

Sears Chairman Edward R. Telling said in Chicago the company was "disap-pointed that this court was not willing to require the government to establish priorities and resolve conflicts which we believe are hurting the cause of equal

Telling said the company had not yet

"The overwhelming response to our suit throughout the nation represents a clear call to the administration and to

Congress to resolve this question; When the majority of Americans are covered by protective statutes, who gets jobs when not all can?" Telling said. The company filed suit Jan. 24

against 10 federal agencies, contending that government laws, regulations and policies conflicted with each other and made it impossible for the company to meet federal standards for hiring and promoting minorities and women. The complaint, filed as a class-action

case on behalf of all retailers with 15 or more employees, said the government it-self created "an unbalanced work force" dominated by white males. The firm also said federal regulations were inconsistent and at times capricious. The federal Equal Employment Op-

portunity Commission has accused Sears of discrimination, creating the possibility of a federal suit against the giant re-Sears has had 1,500 discrimination

complaints filed against it since 1965. "The harm or threat of harm must be definite and concrete, not speculative or conjectural," she said.

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter's plan for cutbacks in Amtrak rail service apparently is going into effect, but with less savings and more trains left running than the administration pro-

A revised version of Carter's proposal survived perhaps its last congressional test Tuesday when the House Interstate and Commerce Committee killed a resolution that would have given the full House a chance to veto the administra-

A similar veto resolution already had been killed on the other side of Capitol Hill by the Senate Commerce Commit-

Cutbacks in the government-subsi-dized passenger system are to go into ef-fect Oct. 1 unless the entire plan is vetoed by either house of Congress by next week. That appears highly unlikely now that the two committees have killed veto

Carter had proposed deleting 12,000 miles of track from the 27,700-mile system in a move the administration said

would save \$1.4 billion over five years.

The House committee killed the veto resolution on an 18-7 vote despite arguments by Rep. Albert Gore, D-Tenn. that gasoline shortages and price in-creases have combined to create "a poltical earthquake." He said that with the gasoline problems, Amtrak reservation calls have increased by 50 percent and the trains are completely booked for Au-

However, Rep. Marty Russo, D-Ill. said Amtrak cannot solve the nation's energy problems because even if all the trains are filled, they would carry less than 1 percent of intercity travelers.

The committee-approved plan adds \$60 million to Carter's request for \$552 million in government subsidies for Amtrak in 1980

Of the added money, \$35 million is to continue trains the administration want-



Khomeini Rules Out **Mercy For Traitors**

Ruhollah Khomeini today ruled out mercy for the "traitors" of the shah's regime but conceded a limited halt to revolutionary death sentences was necessary for economic revival in Iran.

The 78-year-old leader said his ban on executing anyone not accused of murder or torture leading to death should not be considered an amnesty to the "traitors, counter-revolutionaries and remnants of the accursed Pahlavi regime.

Instead, Khomeini said, his order was designed to help revive economic activities reported paralyzed by the purges and executions, and advance the political process toward the proposed switch to an Islamic republic.

His statement was issued under the signature of the secretive revolutionary council, which Khomeini heads.

It was the closest the ayatoliah has come to answer pleas by Premier Mehdi Bazargan that the Islamic courts and komitehs (committees) end the wave of 'revenge' executions.

Arbitrary actions by the komitehs were seen by Bazargan recently as a major cause of general unwillingness of officials to resume work in government, industries, universities and business institutions.

In another development, Sheikh Sadegh Khalkhali, the powerful chief of Tehran's central Islamic revolutionary court, said today that Islamic law did not restrict execution of women.

No woman has been executed so far, although several have been flogged on charges of moral offenses, including adultery and promiscuous behavior, as judged by the courts.

Others called the action premature

Islamic courts had hindered resumption

of economic activity and demoralized officials and businessmen. More than 200 men have been executed by Islamic revolutionary courts since the revolution in February.

In remarks broadcast earlier on Tehran radio, Khomeini lashed out at Iranian newspapers today for minimizing the sacrifices of the Islamic revolution and said the writing of "tales" would "not be tolerated."

The 78-year-old holy man who led the coup that ousted Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi warned that the revolutionary government would not permit newspapers to "reduce the Iranian nation's sacrifices to nothing." Tehran radio said.

"That cannot be tolerated," the radio quoted Khomeini as saying.

A delegation of "Moslem workers" from the Kayhan, Iran's largest daily

newsaper, were received by Khomeini Tuesday after they had occupied the building and published a four-page issue. The action by Moslem newspaper employees came after a governn

boycott shut down Iran's largest leftist newspaper, The Ayendegan, and threatened several other left-wing publications with closure. "The nation expects a newspaper to

write according to (the people's) opinion," Khomeini said. "It does not want articles or tales," he said in apparent reference to the mildly critical commentaries published by Kayhan,

Khomeini thanked the Kayhan workers for preventing "those who wrote against the interests of the nation" from continuing to work on the newspaper,

Venezuela Increases Price Of Crude Oil

CARACAS, Venezuela (UPI) - In a move likely to affect the price of gasoline in the United States and Canada. Venezuela today raised the price of its crude oil by 60 cents a barrel and announced plans to increase residual fuel prices by a "small amount" on Saturday.

The increase comes in the form of a new surcharge on top of the \$16.02 a barrel OPEC quarterly price and the marketing premium surcharge of \$1.20 a barrel applied last March.

The additional surcharge of 60 cents a barrel means Venezuelan light grade crude will now cost \$17.82 dollars a barrel. The new price will apply to all the country's clients, including those under

Venezuela, a founding and active member of OPEC, currently produces approximately 2.3 million barrels of oil daily. The country's exports average some 2 million barrels a day, most of which goes to the U.S. eastern seaboard market and Canada for home and ind-



WASHINGTON (UPI) - A 20-year study of 5,200 men and women in Framingham, Mass., has confirmed that diabetics are more likely to develop heart disease than non-diabetics.

The govrnment-sponsored project found that diabetes doubles the risk of cardiovascular problems for men and almost triples it in women.

In reporting the findings in the May 11 issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association, Dr. William B. Kannel said the Framingham study



eliminates some of the uncertainty that had existed about the role of diabetes in cardiovascular disease. But the study does not explain why people whose bodies are unable to deal normally with sugars and starches are more prone to develop artery disease.

Some elusive unique feature of diabetes that promotes cardiovascular sequelae must be sought out and the means to correct it found," said Kannel, who directs the Framingham study for the National Heart, Lung and Blood In-

Heart disease is only one of many complications experienced by diabetics. A Federal study commission reported four years ago that people with diabetes are 25 times more prone to blindness than non-diabetics, 17 times more likely to develop kidney disease and five times more prone to gangrene, often leading to limb amputation.

The life expectancy among people with diabetes is approximately one third less than that of the general population, Diabetes is believed to affect more

than 10 million Americans. According to a new report by the Naknown definitely whether the complications of diabetes are products of the disease itself, or whether diabetes and the complications are the results of a more

basic underlying disease process.

Although insulin injections or oral drug or diet treatment can correct immediate life-threatening symptoms of di-abetes and permit patients with diabetes to live productive lives, the treatments do not cure diabetes. Furthermore, the advisory board said current therapy may delay but does not prevent the develop-

ment of complications. "Conventional therapy for diabetics has not been demonstrated to prolong

In the Framingham study, it was found that non-diabetic men between the age of 45 and 74 had 19.1 cases of cardiovascular disease per 1,000 people while men with diabetes had 39.1 cases per 1,000. Nondiabetic women had 10.2 cases per 1,000 while diabetic women had 27.2 cases per 1,000.

The differences were even greater for deaths from cardiovascular disease. Non-diabetic men had a death incidence from that case of 8.5 per 1,000 while diabetic men had a 17.4 per 1,000 incidence of death from cardiovascular disease.

With women, it was 3.6 for those without diabetes and 17.0 per 1,000 for

The Justice Department counters that the president's program is legal because it is solely voluntary, even though violators could be barred from bidding on federal contracts worth \$5 million or

Assistant Attorney General Barbara Babcock argued that Carter's enforcement efforts have a "broad congressional mandate.

"The government is like any other consumer and it should use its vast powers to promote its policies," she told the court. "It would be shameful for the government to purchase from people who are promoting inflation."

She added that the judge would have to rule that the president is acting unconstitutionally and throw out his wage and price guidelines if he were to side in favor of organized labor and the congressmen.

Altogether, an estimated \$40 billion to \$56 billion worth of annual business with the government is at stake in the U.S. District Judge Barrington Par-

ker has indicated he will issue a ruling soon, possibly before the week is out. Parker scheduled today's hearing aft-

er rejecting labor's request for an immediate restraining order barring the government from threatening to deny contracts to guideline violators. A ruling in favor of labor would not

overturn Carter's program, but would undermine administration efforts to win compliance. The legal battle over the program has been building since Marcn 13, when the

AFL-CIO and nine member unions filed The suit contends that the threat of penalties against violators converts Carter's so-called "voluntary" program into

Overall output of consumer durable goods, those such as autos and appliances which last at least three years, were down 6.4 percent. Production of business equipment fell 0.7 percent.

Former LHS Principals Honored At Program

Avalanche-Journal Staff The past met the present today at Lubbock High School when seven of the school's principals from 1910 to the present were introduced before an enthusiastic student body.

Students clapped and whistled when each man was presented on the stage in the school auditorium during the program honoring all nine principals that have served the school since the early years of this century

The highlight of the program was the resentation of the senior gift - an oil portrait of Jay Gordon, who was principal at the school from 1955 to 1957. He is currently assistant superintendent for instruction for the Lubbock public school

"One of the greatest thrills of my life was being named principal of Lubbock High," Gordon told his receptive audience. "It's a great school and it will be for a long, long time."

Other principals honored were G.N. Atkinson (deceased), who served from 1910-1926; R.W. Matthews, 1926-1944; Floyd Honey, 1944-1955; Bill Howorth (deceased), 1957-1961; Howard Price, 1961-1965; E.C. Leslie, 1965-1969; Jerry Crawford, 1969-1970; and Knox Wil-

liams, 1970 to the present. The response from the students was especially enthusiastic at the introduction of R.W. Matthews, who lent his name to Lubbock's Matthews Junior

After the program, Matthews, 88, said he enjoyed his 28 years in the school system, which included a nineyear term as superintendent for the dis-

He has noted some changes, though, including the control of students by their parents "When I was in the schools, parents

had more control than they have today," said Matthews. "And if parents don't have control, schools can't. I think rules and regulations should be enforced. Matthews declined to comment much

on changes in education because he has not stayed close to the schools since retiring. "I promised myself when I retired I would never make any suggestions to my successor on how to run the school "he said

But he added that he broke that promise when he replied to a request by Superintendent Ed Irons for suggestions on how to deal with the integration problem in the schools.

He said he is "glad to see integration working out," but his suggestion to Irons revealed his disapproval of forced busing: "First call the school board togethtake the money and build portable buildings. Remove all boundary lines from the schools and tell the children they can go to any school they want provided they walk. Then give credit for physical education to any student who walks three miles.

Former principals Floyd Honey and Howard Price both noted the variety of course choices students now have as compared to the days they were working in the school system.

"There is a greater opportunity for students to find courses to meet their individual interests," said Honey. And when they moved from the semester to the quarter system, it expanded courses

Price said the variety in the curricu-

Violence Erupts In El Salvador

Police expanded their roadblocks around El Salvador's capital after terrorists killed three police officers and troops killed at least two demonstrators north of the city, raising the toll to 44 dead since May 4.

Two of the policemen were guarding the South African Embassy and were killed Tuesday night when at least eight guerrillas of the left-wing Popular Liber-ation Forces opened fire on them, seized their rifles and escaped in two cars in a hail of bullets from other officers.

Officials said they did not know if the guerrillas planned to raid the embassy. There had been rumors of a plot to kidnap South African Ambassador Archibald Gardner Dunn, who was inside the mission during the shooting but not

The other policeman was killed in a shootout with terrorists in downtown El Salvador, and the two demonstrators were killed in a clash with police during a protest in Limon province, 18 miles north of the capital, officials said

There were also unconfirmed reports that three other demonstrators were killed by troops when a mob tried to occupy the church in Soyapango, on the eastern outskirts of El Salvador, and that Popular Liberation Forces guerrillas shot up the Costa Rican consulate in Santa Ana, 30 miles northeast of the capital, to punish Costa Rica for its "alliance" with the military regime of President Carlos Humberto Romero.

Defense Minister Federico Castillo Yanes said late Tuesday that the govern-ment has "hundreds of proofs" that the vilence stems from "a communist plot that is seeking to take over political power through assassinations, terror, oc-

of distinguished persons." He added that "the armed forces are fulfilling their responsibility to assure respect for the constitution and if it is necessary the government will impose a state of siege." Under a state of siege constitutional guarantees are suspended for an indefinite period.

Leftist terrorists killed five policemen in El Salvador May 45, and burned six persons to death May 10 when they set fire to two buses north of the capital, government officials said.

The following day police killed four high school students near the University of El Salvador. Opposition sources said the four were putting up anti-govern-ment banners, but authorities said the four fired on police, who returned fire.

The biggest toll occurred May 8 when 23 demonstrators were killed by police outside El Salvador's cathedral, where they were marching in support of leftists who occupied the church to try to force Romero's government to release jailed leaders of the Popular Revolutionary Bloc, El Salvador's big worker-peasant opposition movement. A soldier also was killed in the shooting.

Bloc members are also holding the ambassador and five other hostages in the French Embassy and the ambassador and seven other captives in the Venezuelan Embassy in an effort to get the prisoners freed and the world spotlight turned on human rights violations in El Salvador. The Costa Rican Embassy was taken

over with the cathedral and the French Embassy May 4, but the Costa Rican ambassador and four other captives escaped May 7 and the militants got safe conduct and were flown to Costa Rica May 9. The Bloc planned to place a plaque

in front of El Salvador's cathedral Tuesday honoring the demonstrators slain there, but called it off

Inflation Rate In Britain Hits 10.1 Percent

LONDON (AP) — Britain's annual infiltion rate moved into double figures in April for the first time since December 1977, the Department of Employment announced recently.

The department said the rise in retail prices on a year-to-year basis stood at 10.1 percent in April, compared with 9.8 percent in March, 9.6 percent in Febru-

ary and 9.3 percent in January. The inflation rate thus was in double digits for the first time since December 1977, when it was at 12.1 percent. In January 1978 the inflation rate had

dropped to 9.9 percent.

The April increase was sharper than had generally been expected by economic analysts. At the upper end, one brokerage house forecast a 1.2 percent rise in prices during April, making the year-to-year increase just shy of 10 percent. Other forecasts had been for variously

more modest rates of inflation.

The Department of Employment said the April increase was due primarily to

the higher cost of rents and gasoline.

The rising inflation rate poses a major economic problem for the new government of Margaret Thatcher, whose Conservative Party won the May 3 general election and ended five years of moderate socialism.

Labor boasted in the campaign that it


had brought the annual inflation rate into single figures from a peak of around 26 percent in the late summer of 1975.

The Laborites relied primarily on wage restraint and price controls to curb inflation. But Mrs. Thatcher, a champion of free enterprise, has promised to allow market forces freer rein. During her campaign she maintained that the best way to curb inflation is unfettered competition in the market place.

Billy Rejects Fund Allegations

ATLANTA (UPI) - Billy Carter Tuesday rejected as a "bunch of bull" allegations that he illegally transferred \$500,000 from the family peanut warehouse to Jimmy Carter's presidential campaign at the height of the 1976 primary season.

A copyrighted story in The Nation magazine, written by free-lance journalist Peter Peckarsky, quoted an unnamed source "close to the Justice Department investigation now in progress" as describing the alleged April 27, 1976, money transfer. The story also appeared in several newspapers.

Peckarsky outlined an elaborate scheme in which the money allegedly was deposited in Billy Carter's personal accounts at the National Bank of Georgia in Atlanta and later partially "rede-

He said the president's brother allegedly passed the money to former Atlanta advertising executive Gerald Rafshoon, who then used it to buy media time for to comment on the story.

Rafshoon's advertising agency advanced a \$645,000 line of credit to the campaign, but Rafshoon has told UPI that was "a normal business operation and we did not have to borrow any money in order to do so.'

Declarer won the opening spade lead with the ace and cashed the king of trumps. The 5-0 trump break came as a rude shock. Declarer abandoned trumps to cash his three top hearts, discarding a spade from dummy. Next came three rounds of diamonds, and another spade was sluffed from the table.

Declarer now knew twelve of East's cards-he had started with at least one spade, three cards in each red suit and five clubs. If his thirteenth card was a diamond, declarer had a legitimate way to make his slam. He could simply discard from dummy on the fourth diamond while East followed suit, then exit with a spade. East, down to nothing but trumps, would be forced to ruff and lead a trump, and declarer would be able to make the rest.

However, this line would fail if East's thirteenth card was in a major suit. East would be able to ruff the diamond and exit safely, enabling the defenders to collect a spade trick in the fullness of time. Since it cost nothing to lead a diamond now in the

"Once you're a writer, you're a writer for life; you just can't give up," author Evelyn Nace of Pampa told the South Plains Writers' Club at a banquet

here Monday evening.

In an interview before the program, she said she had started writing in 1935 and, although she has stopped for other employment for brief periods, has been writing ever since. Whenever other en-deavors have called her away from her first love, she has managed to return to writing and pick up other projects.

Her most pressing present project is keeping up with the demand for her colcalled "Mending Mature Marriage." Several Texas newspapers currently run her column and her agent is offering it for syndication.

"Stay informed on what's going on in the world," was one bit of advice which Mrs. Nace offered to local writers. She said her column was a good example Back a few years ago when the kids were in charge of the country, nobody cared about the older folks, but now there is a real interest and a real

Mrs. Nace, who also writes under the name of Louise Pierce, has written over 300 short stories and numerous books and magazine articles. Her topic Monday was "Winning at Writing."

Credit Cards Delay Recession

credit cards in your pocket have done more this year than simply make it easier to buy things. They have played a major role - some would say the key role - in keeping the economy out of a

At the beginning of the year, many conomists thought a recession would have developed by now. A key reason was that consumer debt, already at record levels, was considered unlikely to keep expanding.

But it has. And that has kept the economy growing faster than many economists expected, thereby at least postponing the recession.

Inflation, and fears it will continue, are playing a role in the expansion of consumer debt. Consumers are buying now on the theory that prices will be

higher next month. "They are turning their worthless paper money into durable assets," said Michael K. Evans of Chase Econometrics, one of the economists who had expected consumer spending to slow.

But another reason for the decline is that, despite higher interest rates charged to businesses, credit is not harder to get for consumers. Nor, in many cases, is it more expensive.

Much consumer borrowing is through credit cards, on which the interest rate has long been 12 percent to 18 percent, mostly the higher figure. The prime rate charged to corporate borrowers has risen from 73/4 percent to 113/4 percent since the beginning of 1978, but consumers are paying the same rate they always

The consumer is not as sensitive to the cost of money as the corporation," notes PeterN. Goldsmith, a vice president of Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith Inc. "He has been trained over the years to accept higher interest

What is more, credit is easier to get now than it was during the last tight money spell. Many more banks allow consumers to automatically get loans by overdrawing their checking accounts. They might have given loans in the past, but now the consumer doesn't even have to face the trauma of walking into the bank to fill out an application.

Unfortunately, most economists see a contnuing boom in the economy as a bad thing, arguing that it will eventually lead to a more serious recession. The Carter administration is hoping for a "soft landing," in which the economy slows but does not fall into a recession.

The high demand, of course, also is hampering efforts to fight inflation. With consumers seeing each price increase as a reason to buy now, there is litle to stop sellers from imposing new increases.

There are now some signs that consumers are becoming overextended and may voluntarily slow down their purchases. But if that doesn't happen soon, the government may be forced to take

Goldsmith argues that raising the cost of money some more, by pushing up interest rates, is unlikely to work. Those accustomed to paying 18 percent for money will continue to do so as long as it is available," he says.



Wheat Crop Estimate Similar To '78 To

WASHINGTON (AP) - This year's total U.S. wheat crop seems to be shap-ing up about the size of last year's har-vest of around 1.8 billion bushels, ac-cording to the latest government outlook

Winter wheat production, which accounts for about three-fourths of the total, was estimated recently by the Agri-culture Department at 1.39 billion bush-

Although such a harvest would be 11 percent larger than the 1978 output of 1.25 billion bushels, it would be about 4 percent smaller than USDA forecast last Dec. 21, not long after the crop was

The new estimate, based on May 1 prospects, was the first since then.

Total 1979 wheat output will depend on how plantings of spring wheat turn out and on the remainder of the growing season for the winter crop.

Looking at the winter-wheat situation, officials said much of the reduction from December prospects "occurred in the Pacific Northwest where winterkill caused abandonment or reduced stands'

But overall the crop was reported in "fair to good" condition as of May 1 and generally had adequate soil moisture to sustain further development, the department's Crop Reporting Board said.

Production in Kansas, the leading wheat producer, was estimated at 321 million bushels, compared to 306 million in 1978.

The report said the May 1 survey showed farmers will have about 42.9 million acres of winter wheat for harvest this year, compared to 38.9 million acres harvested in 1978.

Nationally, the average wheat yield was estimated at 32.4 bushels an acre, compared to 32.1 bushels from each acre harvested in 1978.

No offical estimate of spring-wheat production will be made by USDA until July 11, along with the first production forecasts of 1979 corn and some other

major crops.

According to department sources, however, some experts say total output of spring wheat this year — including durum and other types — could range between 375 million and 475 million bushels, down sharply from 1978 produc-

KIDS-ONLY CLUB Baseball Cards Can Be Valuable

By SHARI LEWIS Sports card collecting. Boy, is it confusing. It's as though someone were trying to throw you off the trail: the cards are put out by Topps Chewing Gum, Inc., but you only get one piece of gum to a package, together with 12 pictures of athletes. They are often called baseball cards, but you can get football, basketball and hockey series as well. And a picture of a player (like, say, Willie Mays) put out one year may be worth much more than a picture of the same player issued a season later!

Here's how it works: each year, Topps puts out a new series of cards for each of the four sports - mainly pictures of that year's star athletes plus a few cards honoring special events (like the World Series). Baseball picture cards are the most in de-

One way to put together a valuable collection is to buy and trade with your pals until you have a full set — one copy of each card put out on a specific sport in a particular year. The 1968 baseball series originally cost \$10. It's now worth about \$75. Unfortunately, cards put out now don't gain rapidly in value because there are too

There's another way to go doesn't print the same number of cards for each player. It figures more people will look for the big stars' pictures rather than the lesser known players. (During the years when Willie Mays was a major athlete, lots of Willie Mays cards were printed. But Mr. Mays wasn't very important during his early years with the Giants, so during that period Topps didn't print many of his cards. His pictures from those earlier years are now rare and valuable, while cards put out during his starring years are selling for only 25-30 cents apiece.)

That has led to another kind of collection: you locate a complete set of pictures of a single player - one card for each season he





Nations Work For Better Wheat Prices

SASKATOON, Saskatchewan (AP) — The world's four major wheat-exporting countries have given their farmers new hopes for stable and profitable futures.

Representatives from Canada, the United States, Australia and Argen which account for about 85 percent of the world's wheat trade, pledged cooper-ation on production and marketing objectives at a one-day meeting las

They also agreed to work for better

world wheat prices.

"We, as four major exporting countries, sat down together and found we agreed on the objectives and techniques... to avoid a disastrous price war," said Otto Lang, the Canadian wheat board minister who called the meeting.

The most significant decision of the meeting was an agreement to consult each other in the future before policies are implemented.

The countries also said their senior policy and marketing officials will meet at least twice a year to ensure a greater coordination of policies.

"The fact our systems are so differ-ent requires us to consult constantly to

derstand what each of us is doing," said Lang.

Or as U.S. Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland put it, consultation is needed "so our policies are not influenced by

Bergland said efforts will be continued to get a new international wheat agreement involving importing countries. He told a news conference an international wheat agreement is still the "best forum for stock management and

pricing."

The participation of the United States in the meeting, Bergland said, was a "fundamental change in attitude."

But a city judge ordered a recount of all ballots cast in 25 percent of the city's wards, where tally sheets in machines were aligned improperly, according to District Attorney Ed Rendell. Rendell called it "horrible preparation and negligence," but not fraud.

Still, Bowser said he would contest the outcome.

Marston, 36, took the Republican nomination easily over three opponents. He is a former federal prosecutor who fought publicly with President Carter about the political spoils system as he was ousted as U.S. attorney last year by Attorney General Griffin Bell.

A Ford appointee, he had prosecuted on political corruption charges two of the state's most powerful Democrats. and was looking into two more when he was removed from office.

Green, 40, had lost to Rizzo in the 1971 primary and resigned in 1976 from a congressional seat he had held for 121/2 years in order to run for the Senate. He lost then, too, but carried Philadelphia

by 300,000 votes. Democrats have a 7-2 registration edge over Republica

Attorneys Request New Probe

To Advise Pot Smokers

WASHINGTON (AP) - At first ent had been smoking

Why else would the government advise marijuana users to smoke their vise marijuana users to smoke their marijuana through a water pipe or take it in brownies to avoid the effects of the herbicide paraquat which is sprayed, with State Department help, on Mexican

It turns out the State Department had no choice. It was forced, by a court suit filed by a small organization that wants to legalize pot, to consider how to mitigate paraquat's harmful effects on

Paraquat has been used for several years in an attempt to kill the Mexican marijuana crop, but some of the sprayed weed has been harvested and distributed

before the poison could destroy it.

The National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 requires federal agencies to assess the impact on the environment of government actions at home and abroad.

So the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws found out about the paraquat program, distrusted government assurances that the herbicide was not harmful to smokers, and went to court to insist on an environmental impact statement.

The State Department resisted, lost in a lower court, appealed and finally settled out of court on April 24, agreeing

to provide an impact statement It paid the Mitre Corp. \$255,211 for a several-hundred-page document that dis-cusses everything from the effect of the marijuana eradication program on family life among the Mexican campesinos to the effects on American marijuana smokers - and how they can be mitigated with water pipes and brownies.

The statement says the government spent \$68.8 million since 1970 on the program, on helicopters, communications ment, a \$3 million "electro-optical illicit crop detection system," pilot training, mapping, computer services, protective armor for aircraft and crews. a hangar, "specialized interdiction vhicles," weapons and contract technicians, services and equipment.

It probably represents the most sweeping review the government has ev-er made of the fallout from American

policy on marijuana.

The case illustrates how a small orzation with limited resouces can use the law and the courts to force the government to give a public accounting of

Peter H. Meyers, NORML's full-time lawyer, is chiefly responsible for the suit. He said its preparation cost about \$100 for paper and his salary.

Dozens of government lawyers, in at

least nine agencies, were involved in reviewing and commenting on Mitre's report. A draft was prepared, and com-ments were solicited. Each of 163 com-ments had to be answered in the final

Yet NORML is not satisfied with the product, and plans to return to court, seeking more detail — and hoping the government ultimately will decide to give up the fight and the paraquat pro-

The out-of-court settlement specifies NORML the right to return to court to challenge the adequacy of the impact statement.

Says Meyers of the State Department's first try:

"It doesn't explore enough the long-and short-term consequences of paraquat to the health of marijuana smokers. It doesn't look deep enough into the effect of paraquat on the health of Mexi-can peasants, the Mexican water supply or endangered species. And it doesn't adequately look into what paraquat might be doing to crops and animals raised on the West Coast of Mexico and exported to the United States."

The report estimates that 16 million Americans use marijuana and at any one time 85,600 of them are probably smoking marijuana contaminated with the

It says paraquat — odorless, colorless and tasteless — probably carries only a slight risk to the health of moderate marijuana smokers.

As for heavy users - those who smoke 10 marijuana cigarettes a day -"the health effects of long-term use of paraquat-contaminated marijuana are not known."

"The threat to human health from short-term exposure to paraquat contaminated marijuana is minimal," the report says. "However, a limited educational effort may be justified to inform the marijuana user that (1) visual distinction between Mexican and Colombian marijuana is virtually impossible and (2) it is extremely difficult to tell the difference visually between contaminated and uncontaminated marijuana."
As for mitigating measures, the re-

port says, "The United States govern-ment would be reluctant to suggest 'better' ways to undertake an illegal activi-

Tech Ag Laboratory **Holds Open House**

Avalanche-Journal Farm Writer From hydraulic dipping vats at the feedlot to a nursery for newborn hogs and nutritional studies on sheep, more than 200 persons visited exhibitions Tuesday at an open house for the Texas Tech University Lubbock County field laboratory of the College of Agriculture

Visitors, who came from as far away from the feedmill in the center of the 980-acre laboratory located five miles east of New Deal on Farm Road 1729.

The mill, with its modern micro-ingredient room, feed mixer, pellet mill and pellet crumbler, provides feed for most livestock in the animal science department and is essential for animals in-

volved in nutritional studies. The effects of processing methods on nutrient utilization, feedmill energy consumption, the effects of chemical and hanical treatment of crop residues

are some of the areas being researched. A feedlot, located next to the feedmill, features 25 pens with 10 head per pen, unloading chutes and covered working facilities, weighing scales and 10 individ-

ual pens for feed consumption studies.

The hydraulic dipping vats, constructed in a circular position so the cattle can't see what is ahead, are more efficient and cause less stress on the animals, according to C. Reed Richardson, supervisor of the feedlot.

About 30 cattle are monitored on a Citizen's Band frequency at the adjacent Beef Cattle Center.

Dr. Robert Long, beef cattle supervisor, said yellow ear tags attached to each steer activates an electronic feeder which records individual feed consumption as the animal enters a feeding stall.

The computer records the animal's number, how much he consumes each day and other data such how much feed is in the feeder on a printout.

Dr. Mark Hellman, dairy center supervisor, demonstrated the flushing system. By pulling a lever, a 700-gallon flood of water is released through the milking parlor to clean the facilities.

Located outside the milking parlor and nilk room are three lots with a capacity of 20-25 cows per lot. The lots are built on a 3 percent slope for drainage and 46 acres of irrigated pasture are available

The swine facility, under the supervision of Drs. Leland Tribble and Donald Orr, consists of a sow-boar building, a farrow-nursery building, a growing-finishing building and a baby pig building. Efficient production of pork is being preme champions in the world.

researched by considering methods of increasing the value of sorghum as a feed for swine, management practices for improving swine performance and utilization of facilities, and improving reproductive performance of the sow herd by selection, breeding system, nutrition and management.

Most animal sceince studies revolve around the Research Center, supervised by Dr. James Clark. The center has a hysiology unit and a metabolism unit.

According to graduate student Dennis McCarthy, three nutritional studies with restricted intake are being performed on sheep with results expected by the end

Utilization of treated mesquite, treat-ed gin trash, and cotton linters mixed with gin trash is being considered with the outcome being applicable to cattle, he said.

Dr. Dwane Miller, plant and soil science supervisor, said water use is the main point of research at his 75-acre facility.

"Water stress, photosynthesis, management studies, and minimum tillage are some of the items being researched, ' Miller noted, "all in an effort to find ways to conserve moisture throughout the year.'

Sheep, which are becoming a popular addition to farm income in the area, are being researched at the farm under the supervision of Dr. Frank Hudson.

Two livestock areas, one to house the permanent teaching flock of three purebred breeds and the other for transient research sheep, along with weighing, shearing and storage areas make up the sheep facilities.

Nutritional studies are one objective of the center and, as the flock increases, data will be accumulated for use in genetic and productive research.

Increasing interest from students has been generated with the completion of the horse barn, under the supervision of Dr. James Heird.

The horse program, with emphasis on Quarter Horses, has more than tripled both in horse judging and horse production in the last two years, according to

Heird. "When to handle horses and how little to handle them will be the center of future research." Heird said. "The amount of handling has been tied to the behavior

of the older horse." A new stallion, Bar H Raider, which was recently added to the horse herd, is expected to further improve the horse program. The stallion is one of 40 su-

Health Officials Fight Rabies

SANTA FE, N.M. (UPI) - Health officials from Mexico and the states of New Mexico and Texas are combining efforts to combat an outbreak of rabies found in dogs around the border city of El Paso.

The officials have planned to meet

Monday in El Paso. We will be there to discuss the current situation, what steps are being taken and what other steps could be taken to bring the problem under control," Dr. Jonathan Mann, New Mexico's chief health officer, said Tuesday.

Mann said the third rabid dog in southern Dona Ana County was found last week, bringing the total number of rabies cases in dogs in the New Mexico-Texas-Mexico area this year to 62.

"The dog was a German shepherd that was picked up in the Anapra area immediately adjacent t El Paso," he said. "It was a stray dog, which fortunately did not bite any people.

Mann said 43 of the cases have occurred in Juarez, Mexico, 16 in El Paso and three in New Mexico. More than 150 people in Juarez have undergone treatment for rabies, he said.

In New Mexico, Mann said, that state and local health officials and veterinarians are increasing rabies vaccinations in pets in southern Dona Ana County, which has been placed under a rabies quarantine, upgrading animal control activities and disseminating information on rabies to area residents.

"I can go back to the last two years and this year and in evaluating the program, it's very evident as fast as we're placing people, we're losing them. They're not staying. Our dropout rate is tremendous."

She and Flores indicated part of the roblem stems from the referral problem. Because of the feast-or-famine situation, they indicated, there is little time to ensure a client is suited for a job. And, because of the dropout rate, some potential employers are becoming disillusioned with the program, they indicat-

"The only way we can function is if we get a steady flow, some type of order" from intake so the SER counselor can work with and place "people in the right job." Flores said.

Clements Hopes Senate Will Uphold Veto Of Bill

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Bill Clements' expressed hope Tuesday that the Senate will uphold his veto of a local game bill overridden by a 90-42 House vote.

If the Senate supports the override attempt by a two-thirds vote, the bill would be the first passed into law over a gubernatorial veto since 1941.

The measure, sponsored by Rep. Bennie Bock, D-New Braunfels, would allow Comal County commissioners to set hunting and fishing regulations outside of the state uniform code.



Warning representatives to "consider the precedent you are about to set," Rep. Doyle Willis, D-Fort Worth, said, Every county should be under the authority of the state commission."

Rep. Gibson Lewis, D-Fort Worth, added, "If we get the governor in a situation where he will not sign bills until the end of the session, we may delay legislation that needs to be implemented immediately.

But Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, said, "We should show the governor that we will not allow local bills to be shot down.

An initial override vote failed by a 90-46 margin. But when a House majority



agreed to reconsider, several representatives either disappeared from the floor or changed sides. The second vote was passed with six tallies to spare.

Legislator Throws Out **Abortion Measures**

abortion bills have been thrown out literally - in what proponents called a 'grandstand play" by a Senate committee chairman irate that the authors of the bills did not attend scheduled hearings on the measures.

Sen. Gene Jones, D-Houston, stormed into the Senate chamber Tuesday, grabbed a microphone, asked for permission to speak and threw the twopills into the wastepaper basket beside

"Three times now I have posted these bills, notified the authors there would be a hearing, had them printed on the calendar - and three times the authors did not even care enough to show

up," Jones shouted. "That's the end of those bills," he added as he dumped them into the can. But a sponsor of one of the bills

charged Jones had repeatedly scheduled the committee hearings during filibus-

Witnesses that came to testify against one of the bills appeared stunned but pleased as Jones told them, "If you want to see what happens to these bills, just come get you a good seat in the Senate and watch.

The confusion over the committee hearing was created because the Senate was still in session, with Sen. Lloyd Doggett, D-Houston, filibustering against a presidential primary bill. Doggett earlier had refused to allow Jones the floor to announce the committee hearing, and to an abortion the bills' sponsors said they thought the tion by the law.

"That's the old flim-flam thing. I was not aware he had set a subcommittee hearing," said Sen. Walter Mengden, RHouston, sponsor of the abortion bill that would have prevented state welfare recipients from using state funds for obtaining an abortion except for medical

The other canned bill, sponsored by Sen. John Traeger, D-Seguin, would have regulated health standards at abortion facilities, permitted only licensed physicians to perform abortions and required abortions after the first trimester be performed in hospitals. The bill also established a records and reports system

and prohibited referral fees. 'You know when you don't really want something to pass, you stage a grandstand play," Mengden said of Jones. "If you'll notice every time he has set these meetings it's been in the middle of a filibuster.'

Mengden said that even if the bills had been heard in the meeting they could not have been approved since the meeting had not been recognized by the Senate and thus was illegal. He said the bills would not be heard in the committee and so for all purposes are dead.

Another more successfull Mengden abortion bill has passed the Senate and is waiting approval in a House committee before going to the full House. That bill provides that a child born alive due to an abortion is entitled to full protec-

Court Upholds Prison Term AUSTIN (AP) - David Owen

Attorneys Give Final Arguments

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - The prosecution depicted Dan White as "a coldblooded killer" but the defense said he mentally "snapped" when he killed Mayor George Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk in City Hall Nov. 27.

Those were the closing arguments Tuesday at White's murder trial - sharply different portraits of White drawn by prosecutor Tom Norman and defense wyer Doug Schmidt.

The case is expected to go to the seven-woman, five-man jury today.

Both attorneys, arguing before Superior Court Judge Walter Calcagno, said White fired the shots, but they disagreed on the proper verdict.

Norman asked the jury to convict White of first-degree murder with sppecial circumstances, which could carry

the death penalty Schmidt, his voice breaking, pleaded for a conviction of voluntary manslaughter, which carries a maximum of four years in prison on each count. A judge would have wide discretion in deciding that sentence.

Schmidt argued that more than two weeks of testimony showed White was mentally ill with severe depression. "He snapped" when he shot Moscone and Milk, Schmidt added.

"The defense is asking you to excuse this kind of conduct and call it something that it isn't," said Norman in rebuttal. "This is nothing more than a cold-blooded killing."

The prosecution wants a conviction of first-degree murder with special circumstances - either the kiling of an elected offiial to prevent him from carrying out official duties, or the commission of multiple murders.

Spurs Seek Final Win Over Bullets



NEW YORK (AP) - Major league baseball umpires are expected to return to work this weekend under terms of an agreement that The Associated Press learned was reached between their un-

ion and the two leagues Tuesday. Details of the agreement ending the dispute that has kept the regular umpires on the sidelines since spring training were presented to a joint meeting of the major leagues in Chicago today. The settlement was expected to be announced officially Thursday.

Both sides have been pressing for an end to the work stoppage and meeting almost daily for the last week. It was a marathon bargaining session that started Monday afternoon and lasted into the early morning hours of Tuesday that apparently signaled the breakthrough of the final issues.

Both the National and American leagues denied that any final settlement had been reached but confirmed that talks were making progress.

"We still have a way to go," said AL president Lee MacPhail. I would prefer not to discuss the issues."

But MacPhail agreed that the atmosphere between the two sides has improved considerably.

"We're a lot closer than when we started," he said. "We were eons apart then. Obviously, we've been trying to get it closed out and it's been a good faith effort on both sides. I'm hopeful, certainly more positive about this than I've been until now."

Richie Phillips, attorney for the umpires, said, "We are on the threshold of reaching a comprehensive agreement between the umpires and major league baseball which should satisfy all parties and insure labor peace for at least three years and beyond.

Terms of the settlment were unavailable although it was understood that as part of it, the leagues had agreed to employ an extra crew of umpires, allowing each of its officiating units to have some time off during the regular season.

The umpires also had been seeking CHICAGO improvements in salaries that range from \$17,000 to \$40,000, and increases in their \$53 per diem expense allowances.

Technically, the umpires were not involved in a strike. Such an action is barred under terms of their collective bargaining agreement that lasts until page was the same, forcing baseball to use minor league and sandlot umpires as Chicago Oakland E-Revering 5-LMurray. 1982. 



Yankee Owner Buys 'Million-Dollar Arms

NEW YORK (AP) — They are George Steinbrenner's "million do

They are like a Las Vegas slot machine - these guys who comprise the pitching staff of the world champion New York Yankees. They are fed by gold nuggets from Steinbrenner's seemingly bottomless coffers. They are always a gamble

Give the throttle a tug and - ding, dong, bang, bang, whammo, jackpot! As in the case of Tommy John. Another pull and - whir, whir, whir, thud - a plum, a bar and a lemon, as in the case of injury-plagued Don Gullett.

But together they form one of the

most intriguing conundrums in baseball: Who's pitching for the Yankees?

There's never been a staff assembled in the game that cost as much or boasted greater experience and credentials. Look 'em over. Five are under contracts of \$1 million to \$3.5 million. Seven have scored victories in the World Series. Six have had 20-plus victory seasons, some in multiplicate. Where or when has there been a staff

that could afford to let a man who pitched two no-hit games (Ken Holtz-man) decay on the bench for most of two seasons, a Cy Young winner (Sparky Lyle) spend his time in the bullpen spitting tobacco juice and discard a relief ace (Rawly Eastwick) who was a stopper for the Cincinnati Reds in their halcyon years in the mid-1970s? What other team could afford to take

its 25-3 Cy Young winner of the year before (Ron Guidry) out of the front lines and assign him to bullpen holding action? Guidry goes back to regular duty tonight, facing the Detroit Tigers at the

You have to give Steinbrenner credit.
He has had his clinkers and his bad luck but he's managed to keep his mound cupboard loaded whatever the cost. When one of his gold-studded throwers came up lame or sour, George reached out and got another, the latest 40-year-old Jim Kaat.

Conservative operators may decry George's free-spending proclivities as foolish. George responds by showing his detractors three straight American League championships, two World Series crowns, escalating crowds and a ledger with black - not red - ink on the bottom line.

The Tampa shipbuilder began assembling his mound nuggets by signing Cat-fish Hunter, te backbone of Oakland's world championship staff, to a \$3.5 mil-lion contract in December 1974. The Catfish, now 33, paid imm

dividends. He won 23 games in 1975 and 17 in 1976 before developing soreness in his right shoulder. He is in the last year of a five-year contract.

The Yankees added Holtzman (\$165,-000-a-year) and Gullett (\$2.09 million) in 1976. They picked up Andy Messersmith (\$1 million) and Eastwick (\$1.1 million) in December 1977. None measured up to the price tags although hope springs eternal for Gullett, a washout in 1978 and a question mark in 1979 because of shoulder problems.

Holtzman subsequently was traded to the Chicago Cubs. Messersmith, injury prone, was released, then picked up by the Dodgers. Eastwick was traded to the

searcher at the University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine is looking for cats with breast cancer.

Dr. Ann Jeglum needs the animals to aid in the development of a vaccine to mobilize the immune system to prevent spread of cancer cells once a tumor has been surgically removed from humans with breast cancer.

Cancer specialists are searching for an alternative to radiation and chemotherapies that is the current state of post-

The aim is to develop a vaccine using the patients' own cancer cell, so that it will attack specific cancer cells, rather



After surgery at Johns Hopkins University Hospital in Baltimore, the cats would return home with their masters and make periodic visits to Philadelphia for treatment and checkups. As technicians at the veterniary school are trained, Dr. Jeglum said, the whole procedure will move to Philadelphia

Her research extends that begun by Dr. Michael Hanna of the Frederick Cancer Research Center. Frederick. Md., who devised a vaccine from laboratory-induced, non-spontaneous cancer in guinea pigs.

For her vaccine, Dr. Jeglum takes cancerous tissue, freezes it to keep 80-90 percent of the cells alive and thereby more capable of stimulating the body's warriors to fight cancer. The cells are then X-rayed to stop them from reprod-ucing themselves when they are injected back into the patient.

Before injection the cells are fortified with a common nonspecific immunological agent developed from tuberculin cells in cows, called Bacillus Calmette Guerin BCG), which sets off the body's battle against cancerous cells.

In the next phase of her research, she said, half of the cats after surgery will receive BCG only, while the other half will get the BCG-fortified vaccine.

If significantly more cats getting the vaccine are free of any cancer after a two-to-three year period, then she said, she will feel it is a success.







Weicker, who said during his formal campaign announcement in March that he was the "longest shot in the field" for the nomination, said today that polls showed "my job performance ratings and levels of commitment among Republicans, Democrats and independents have dropped below the levels I enjoyed

He said he could not "accept any further loss of support among the consti-tuency I have worked so hard and so

long to build." Running for president of the United States is a monumental task. Connecticut voters may correctly assume that such a campaign exerts a distracting effect on a senator ... To allow presidential campaign goals to interfere with Connecticut voter perceptions of my record as their senator ... would be a mistake,"

United States Tax System Encouraging Underground Economy

By LeROY POPE NEW YORK (UPI) — The American tax system is driving so much of the economy underground that radical reform is needed to keep this segment from dangerously reducing national output, says Dr. Peter Gutmann.

Gutmann is the professor at Baruch College of the City University of New York who has sounding alarms in recent years about the underground economy

- tht segment of the population which works "off the books."

In the current issue of the academic journal Taxing and Spending (Institute of Contemporary Studies, San Francisco), Gutmann says the present tax system establishes too great barriers to social mobility. The system makes it too difficult for intelligent and ambitious persons to accimulate wealth and too ea-

To solve the problem Gutmann would cut income and capital gains taxes which he says would increase opportunities for upward mobility, and at the same time raise inheritance and gift tax-

es, which would affect the wealthy. Gutmann's views about the effect of tax rates on revenue collections appear at first glance to resemble the controversial Laffer Curve - high rates erode the supply of both labor and capital.

But Gutmann concludes that most underground income is created in legal business; the illegality comes from the wholesale tax evasion that results.

Gutmann says there has been a general change in public morality and attitudes about paying taxes, especially among younger workers who grew up at a time when protest against government

NEW YORK (UPI) - Grandpa Vanderhof really originated Proposition 14, Paul Sycamore and Mr. De Pinna ran an early underground bomb factory and Penny Sycamore jumped the liberation gun by a quarter of a century.

When a representative of Internal Revenue Service says Congress and the Supreme Court must be paid, Grandpa declares calmly, "Not with my money.

Grandpa dropped out of the business world 35 years earlier because he wasn't having fun. Now he keeps pet snakes, goes to the zoo and to commencement exercises at Columbia University.

Jean Stapleton plays his daughter, Penny Sycamore, as if the role were created for her. With a green eyeshade she writes plays, an occupation she began years earlier when a typewriter was delivered to their home by mistake.



Belli Argues **Bottle Suit**

CHEBOYGAN, Mich. (UPI) - Attorney Melvin Belli representing a 9-yearold girl blinded when a bottle of Pepsi-Cola allegedly exploded in her face says defendants in the \$850,000 lawsuit are guilty of breach of warranty.

Attorneys for the four defendants including the cola company and a local grocery store - were expected to deliver their opening arguments today before a five-woman and one-man jury in Cheboygan County Circuit Court

Belli Tuesday told the jury non-returnable glass bottles never should have been used as a container for soda pop.

Tiffany Sakcriska was 4 years old 1974 when she picked up a 16-ounce nonreturnable glass bottle of Pepsi at her parents' home near Pellston. Her parents. Leslie an William Sakcriska, claim the bottle exploded and a shard of glass cut the pupil of her left eye.

Mrs. Sakcriska said operations performed in the two years after the accident failed to prevent the eye from going blind.


The Sakcriskas filed suit against PepsiCo Inc.; Pepsi-Cola Metropolitan Bottling Inc. in Charlotte; Owens-Illinois, which manufactured the bottle; and a local grocery store, B&C Supermarkets Inc. The trial opened Tuesday.

The defendants contend the bottle shattered when it was dropped.

An opthalmologist, Dr. John H. Tanton, was expected to testify in the case. He said he has seen five eye injuries in the past 14 years caused by non-returnable glass bottles that exploded.





Customers in this gaudy medicine show are the NBC affiliates, in town this week for a dose of the Silverman tonic, ab-so-lute-ly guaranteed to cure their miseries. And all for the price of a little allegiance.

The affiliates, whose fortunes ride on the ratings success of NBC, want to be assured that something will go right for the network in the next season. NBC wants to be assured that the affiliates will remain affiliated. Thus, the show. It began Monday in Burbank, at NBC

Studio 4. The star of the show was NBC's peacock, recently unretired. He was everywhere - on baners, on lapel buttons, and most conspicuously, in the filmed promos for the fall schedule.

Robert Mulholland, NBC's executive in charge of making affiliates happy.



Writer Probes Curious Case Of Calibash Pipe

NEW YORK - If Dr. John H. Watson and Sherlock Holmes still reside in Martha Hudson's comfortable digs at 221B Baker Street, as many of us think they do, they won't have to go clattering off to Charing Cross Station in a twowheeler the next time the game is afoot.

At a cost of \$170 million, which was a pretty penny in Holmes's day, the London subway system has linked these two famous Victorian landmarks with a three-mile extension that was recently opened by Prince Charles,

who still rides in open carriages more often than in underground railway cars. The Baker Street tube station has been decorated with a number of posters depicting scenes from the adventures of the great consulting detective. These should please his many admirers around the world, but undoubtedly will elicit some complaints from the Sherlock Holmes Society of London, the Baker Street Irregulars in America, the Solitary Cyclists in Sweden and other scholarly groups, who will notice right off that Holmes is shown smoking a curved

pipe.

This, of course, he never did in any of the novels or short stories by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle.

Holmes preferred a straight-stemmed clay pipe or his favorite old briar root when he put down his violin and reached for his Persian slipper of tobac-

Two theories have been advanced to explain the curious case of the droop ing calibash pipe and how it entered into Sherlockian lore.

Down at the Players Club, a hangout for erudite gentlemen of the theater, they will tell you that the great American actor William Gillett, still revered in many quarters as the finest stage Sherlock of them all, adopted the curved-stem pipe as a prop because he couldn't speak his lines with a straight pipe in

Paxton Whitehead, the excellent British actor who has just completed a successful Broadway run in "The Crucifer of Blood," a dramatization of "The Sign of the Four" (with the opium den scene from "The Man With the Twisted Lip" thrown in for audience shudders), believes the familiar curved pipe trademark was the invention of Frederick Dorr Steele, who illustrated the Sherlock Holmes stories for American readers.

"The Crucifer of Blood" recently opened in London's West End, starring Keith Michell and Susan Hampshire, both accomplished Shakespearian interpreters, which is further evidence that Holmes still lives, even if 221 B Baker Street has disappeared as an address in London's revised street numbering system and the old premises, when I last saw them, were given over to a

If more evidence of Holmes's immortality is needed, movie houses across the land are packing them in with "Murder by Decree," in which Jack the Ripper meets Sherlock Holmes, as played by Christopher Plummer, and Dr. Watson, in a high camp performance by James Mason.

Several critics have acclaimed them as the greatest Holmes-Watson team ever, but I must remain loyal to Basil Rathbone and Nigel Bruce, even if Hollywood did cast aside the original Conan Doyle classics and toss them a lot of turkeys involving Nazi spies and wartime bomb plots.

Oddly, neither was British born. But Rathbone, born in South Africa, was the epitome of the lean, austere, masterful calculating machine given to fits of melancholy and blackest depression when the cases weren't rolling in. Bruce, born in Mexico, played the mumbling, fumbling, bumbling doctor to a fare thee well, although the thought of him entering an operating theater with a scapel in hand at times seemed to pose a worse threat to the health of the British nation than any of Professor Moriarty's diabolical plots.

Judging famous actors who have appeared in " these trifling experences,"as Holmes always down-played the results of his uncanny power of observation and deduction, the great detective seems destined to walk the board as long as Hamlet. Indeed in theatrical history their destinies seem strangely

Sir John Gielgud, perhaps the greatest Hamlet, played Sherlock Holmes on radio to Sir Ralph Richardson's Dr. Watson. Sir Laurence Olivier, an unforgetable Hamlet on both stage and screen, opted for the role of James Moriarty, the Napoleon of crime, in "The Seven-Per-Cent Solution," leaving the Holmes part to Nicol Williamson.

A few season back, John Wood and the Royal Shakespeare Company revived "Sherlock Holmes," the old William Gilette play. Fritz Weaver was a singing Sherlock in the musical "Baker Street." John Cleese from the Monty Python Circus played the great detective for laughs in the British TV series, and Buster Keaton went over the Reichenbach Falls in a barrel as the hilarious Sherlock Jr. Ethel Barrymore was a female client of the famous sleuth in one of Gillette's many plays. Clive Brook, Reginald Owen, Peter Cushing, Robert Stephens and number of others have appeared in the deerstalker's cap

Would Holmes today have any difficulty finding his way around the London Underground, which is the name of the subway system and not Moriary's

"Elementary, my dear Watson," filmdom would have him say, although he never did say it in any of the Conan Doyle stories.

Risk Proves Profitable For Refugee

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - A few days after Alex Egye arrived in the United States, a refugee from Hungary, he was shaking hands with Vice President Nixon at a White House reception and wear-

ing shoes that didn't match. 'I didn't feel I was broke. I just felt privileged and optimistic and very lucky to be there," said the 45-year-old Egyed. "Not too many people get a chance to go to the White House that way, even to-

It all happened as he settled in at Camp Kilmer, N.J., for processing, and applied to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce for help in getting college scholar-

"I got lucky and was invited to a luncheon at the New York Stock Exchange, then to dinner at the White House," he said. "I bought clothes at a Salvation Army store, and I thought it was real sharp without realizing they were 30 or 40 years old."

Egyed has come a long way since that day in 1956 - becoming an American engineer, an American citizen, and an American millionaire.

"That's what this country is all about." he said. "You take chances and you have to get rewards. The motivation for risk is profit."

Egyed is president of Basco, Inc., a growing chain of 11 discount catalog stores now doing an annual business of nearly \$100 million.

But he's prouder of a computer subsidiary, A.W. Consultants, Inc., with eadquarters in nearby Cherry Hill N.J., which created at his direction a merchandising-inventory system called Tel-O-Serv that has eliminated the familiar cash register.

"We just put a little electronics into retailing, and performance at the sales counter has improved 100 percent,' Egyed said. "All we need now is a cash drawer at the computer terminal."

Egyed said his system, which the big giants in the nation's computer industry refused to build, has given little A.W. Consultants a five-year head start.

"We had the guts to do it, and the potential is tremendous," Egyed said. We may be a midget in a sea of giant computer makers, but we've got knowhow that the big companies can't match

With the system, Egyed can know exactly how many toasters, or television sets, or diamond rings the company has in stock, and in exactly what stores and find out in just minutes.

"The normal way of catalog ordering has the customer filling out an order on a slip, which is sent back to the stock room where a clerk looks for the merchandise and either finds it or not," Egyed said.

'At our stores the customer gets the number of the item out of the catalog, or from the display merchandise, goes to a computer checkout point where the clerk writes out the order and within minutes the customer knows whether the item is available, the price, and where to pick it up. Everybody in the store is tied to the computer.

"The mini-computer stores information on more than 12,000 items in our catalog. A sale is completed in minutes, and the pickup may take another 10 or

Egyed said the system has already been sold to a retail firm with stores in Montreal and Quebec, Canada; to chains in Minneapolis and Des Moines with more than 100 outlets, and now is installing the system in 60 locations in England, Wales and Scotland.

'We don't have the size yet to serve the large retailers like Sears, K-mart, Woolworth, etc., but we're working on

Egyed, who has three children, first went to Quaker-run Earlham College in Richmond, Ind., where he learned English and met his bride, also a Hungarian

refugee and engineering student.

His first job was with Bell Telephone Laboratories in Murray Hill, N.J., and while there he and his fiance, Edith, were granted scholarships to Purdue University where they earned electrical

engineering degrees.

Before joining Basco in 1972 he worked with United Engineers in Philadelphia, Atlantic Refining Corp., and was chief electrical engineer in Philadelphia's Department of Public Property.


