President Obama **Circumvents Congress** Over Immigration Policy

On Friday, June 15, President Obama issued an executive order saying that his administration will not deport illegal aliens under the age of 30 if they meet certain criteria.

His action effectively disregards the will of Congress, where immigration policy should be

Rewarding those who are here illegally only demeans the effort that legal immigrants put forth to become American citizens through the legal channels established by our laws.

I am extremely disappointed in President Obama's actions, which are increasingly governed by politics rather than policy.

There is no question our immigration system is complex and desperately needs to be reformed. But it should not be done by offering shortcuts to those who ignore the laws of our country.

The solution to our immigration dilemma must be a comprehensive, consistent solution that is publicly and openly debated in Congress.

the time, date and location of services, and location of burial may be included.

If publication will be after said services, the time will not be included.

Obituaries printed in the Muleshoe Journal are printed at the rate of \$4.50 per column inch, and may contain a variety of information, including but not limited to: Date and details of funeral and place of burial; date and place of birth and parents names; date of marriage; biographical information; names of parents, spouses or children who have preceded the person in death; names of survivors; and where memorials may be directed.

Texas Milk **Production Up Slightly**

Texas milk production totaled 847 million pounds during May, up one percent from last year's production of 841 million pounds.

April 2012 production totaled 843 million pounds.

The number of milk cows during May averaged 440 thousand head, up 10,000 head from last year but unchanged from the April 2012 number.

Production per cow averaged 1,925 pounds during May, 30 pounds less than last year, but 10 pounds more than April 2012.

Milk production in the 23 states participating in the monthly survey totaled 16.4 billion pounds, up 2.1 percent from production in these same states in May 2011.

April revised production, at 16.0 billion pounds, was up 3.5 percent from April

Production per cow during May averaged 1,924 pounds, 22 pounds above a year ago.

The average number of milk cows in the 23 states was 8.52 million head, 77,000 head more than last year, but 3,000 head less than April 2012.
