# Tornadoes, heavy rains carve path of destruction over North Texas area

### By The Associated Press

Tornadoes and torrential rain from three waves of ominous black clouds that swept across North Texas Thursday injured at least eight persons, none seriously, and left a trail of destruction estimated at \$2 million. Two afternoon tornadoes that tore

through the Dallas suburb of DeSoto, destroyed nine homes, damaged 12 businesses and DeSoto High School. The approximately 1,300 students, who had undergone a tornado drill

only hours earlier, spent a nervous but safe two hours huddled in the dark hallways of the school, which received only minor damage.

"The wind was blowing so hard, I couldn't hear the tornado coming.' said Carolyn LaFlower of DeSoto. "But I saw a table and the porch swing on the patio blow over and things started flying through the air.

"I grabbed my son and ran into the shower. I figured it was the safest place ... as it turned out, that was

# In the Basin, temperatures plummet to near-record lows

Near-record cold swept through the Permian Basin on the heels of a front Thursday, leaving Midlanders shivering in short sleeves and wondering where the recent, warm days of spring went

Warmer temperatures are, however, expected to arrive for the weekend, the weatherman said today.

Fair and warmer tonight and Saturday is the word from the National Weather Service office at Midland Regional Airport.

Thursday's high, recorded at midnight, was 68 degrees.

The temperature fell steadily from there to a low of 39, one degree aove the record for the date - the record having been set only last year.

Thousands of Dallas residents scrambled for shelter, others rushed to the streets to gawk at the boiling clouds when Civil Defense sirens echoed their eerie warnings.

The flurry of tornadoes came less than a month after a massive twister killed 48 and injured hundreds in Wichita Falls


Several tornadoes touched down within minutes of each other near Wilmer and Hutchins, about 10 miles south of Dallas, injuring four persons in a demolished mobile home, tearing the roof off of Wilmer-Hutchins High School and collapsing the roof on a supermarket.

Three men were slightly injured when the roof collapsed under the weight of collected water on a topfloor coffee shop at Dallas' Le Baron Hotel

"It got black as pitch and I heard the crash of falling debris," said hotel manager Frank Fry. Fifty mobile homes in two trailer

parks were damaged when a tornado roared through the tiny town of Red

Oak, 20 miles south of Dallas. Almost four inches of rain fell



In fact, an early May cold snap in 1978 broke a record for low temperatures that had stood since 1935.

Clouds which have hovered over the area for the past week delivered only a trace of mist Thursday, leaving the annual rainfall accumulation at 2.86 inches.

Today's cold north winds are expected to become light and variable tonight.

# Margaret Thatcher wins Britain's election

LONDON (AP) - Conservative Party leader Margaret Thatcher, champion of free enterprise and curbs on union power, swept to power today in Britain's general election, making her Europe's first woman prime minister.

Prime Minister James Callaghan went to Buckingham Palace to tender the resignation of his Labor Party government to Queen Elizabeth II. The queen will then ask the 53-yearold Mrs. Thatcher to form a new government

The British Broadcasting Corp. reported in mid-afternoon as the vote counting from Thursday's election neared completion that the Conservatives had passed the 318-seat mark in the 635-seat House of Commons, an absolute majority

Earlier, with 574 of the 635 seats in the House of Commons declared, the Conservatives, traditional party of big business, had 301, Labor 255, Liberals 10, the Scottish Nationalists 2, Plaid Cymru (Welsh nationalists) 2. and one seat for the speaker.

Computer projections showed a final overall majority of 41 seats for the Conservatives.

"I am aware of the very great responsibility," Mrs. Thatcher said ather jubilant headquarters. ".... It is very exciting, but somehow one has to

be very calm about it. I feel it will be all right."

The 67-year-old Callaghan, government chief for three years, spent his last hours in office closeted at No. 10 Downing St., official residence of the prime minister - as bouquets of blue flowers, the Conservative Party color, began arriving for Mrs. Thatcher.

The results showed the country deeply divided, with the prosperous south of England solid for Mrs.

Thatcher's Tories, while Scotland and the north of England, where the shipbuilding, steel, engineering and coal industries rely on state support, consolidated behind Labor

Union reaction to Mrs. Thatcher's triumph came swiftly.

Railwaymen's union leader Sidney Weighell warned, "We are going to have a confrontation situation generated if they do what they say they are going to do." Joe Gormley, leader of the National Union of Mineworkers, whose strike brought down the previous Tory government in 1974, said, "Just when we have got things

# A memory to treasure

# Federal building dedicated to Mahon

His graying hair tossled by chilly winds, former U.S. Rep. George H. Mahon Thursday humbly accepted the dedication of the federal building complex on Wall Avenue in his name. asking what more could he say than 'thanks, thanks, thanks."

Mahon, who until this year was the only congressional representative the 19th District had ever known, said he was honored that the building was being named after him.

We'll always treasure the memo-" the one-time dean of Congress told 150 Midland dignitaries and onlookers who endured cold, gusty winds and overcast skies to watch the 45-minute dedication ceremony.

Mahon's comments elicited a standing ovation on the part of the crowd.

Thursday's ceremony marked the final phase for the federal complex, Completed in 1974, the structure houses the U.S. Postal Service on the west side and a three-story building on the east containing offices for U.S. attorneys, marshals, a federal court, the Social Security Administration, Department of Agriculture, FBI and IRS

Mahon remained fairly impasssive under his heavy eyebrows as letters of praise from former colleagues and associates were read aloud by Ann Doughty, regional administrator for the General Services Administration and master of ceremonies for the dedication

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen praised Mahon's "leadership, integrity, and profound understanding of fiscal policy," and House majority leader Rep. Jim Wright offered his hopes that the George H. Mahon building "like its namesake, (will) stand for the best that America has to offer. The dedication was not completely

He said he was "thrilled, excited, and surprised" by the comments of his colleagues.

Glancing around the audience, Mahon said, "I always thought myself a modest kind of fellow. But I've got to reappraise my importance." The audience again applauded the smiling ex-politician.

Earlier in the ceremony, Mahon was given a portrait commissioned by the Midland Chamber of Commerce. The painting arrived just in time for the ceremony.

As chamber president Joe Kloesel explained, the painting left Houston early Thursday morning, was flown to Lubbock, then routed to Midland, where it was unveiled midway through the dedication.

A gentleman to the hilt, Mahon gave the portrait to GSA representative Ann Doughty, who announced that it would hang inside the federal building.

Mahon and his wife, Helen, were given a large, gold-colored key to the facility

Kloesel invited the Mahons to make the Midland-Odessa area their home. And speakers praised the federal building in regard to it having been designed and constructed by West Texas firms.

Neuhardt and Babb of Midland and **Covington, Shelton, Taylor of Odessa** designed the multi-faceted concrete. brick and glass structure. Area Build ers of Odessa constructed it.

# Americans still believe oil shortage is hoax

NEW YORK (AP) - "The energy crisis is real. I said so in 1977, and I say it again tonight, almost exactly two years later," President Carter told the American people almost a month ago. But a majority of the public doesn't agree, an Associated Press-NBC

News poll found.

Americans say energy shortages are a hoax and that they don't like Carter's decision to lift price controls on domestic crude oil.

However, the public's distrust of oil companies runs so deep that, when faced with crude oil decontrol, they overwhelmingly favor a windfall profits tax on oil company profits.

On April 5, Carter made the second major energy speech of his adminis-tration. He said he had decided to gradually lift price controls on old domestic crude oil and to ask Congress for a new tax on oil companies to prevent them from reaping excessive profits due to his decision.

The president argued that lifting price controls would give greater in-centives for searching for new oil fields, while the tax would keep oil

companies from benefiting unduly from the lifting of controls. Public reaction to Carter's proposals is mixed, in large part because Americans generally don't agree with his assessment of the nation's energy

Fifty-four percent said the nation's energy shortages are a hoax. Only 37 percent say the shortages are real. Nine percent of the 1,600 adults inter-viewed nationwide by telephone were not sure.

Less than a year ago, the public was split down the middle - 46 to 46 - on the question of whether energy shortages were real. In that August 1978 poll, 8 percent were not sure.

As a result, the public doesn't accept the president's reasoning for lifting oil price controls. Only 37 percent of the public backed his decision, while 50 percent said they opposed. Thirteen percent of those interviewed Monday and Tuesday were not sure.

The link between a person's view of the energy situation and that person's reaction to Carter's decision is direct.

Those who think the energy shortages are real split 48-42 in favor of lifting controls on crude oil prices. Those who say the energy crisis is a hoax come down 58-31 against lifting controls.

Even though they don't like the lifting of controls, the other half of Carter's decision struck a responsive chord among Americans. Nearly two-thirds of those interviewed said they support his proposal


for a new windfall profits tax on oil companies. Only about 24 percent opposed the action and 10 percent were not sure.

Behind this perception is a definite dislike of the oil companies: The public blames the companies for the higher energy prices Americans are paying today.


Thirty-nine percent of the public says the oil companies are responsible for higher gasoline and heating oil prices, putting them at the top of the list.

# Talmadge secretary denies incriminating memo

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Herman Talmadge's financial secretary has denied under oath that she typed a 1974 memo which appears to imply that Talmadge wanted to conceal two campaign contributions.

Allyne Tisdale also says she did not type another 1974 memo, which also bore her initials on the bottom. That memo instructed Talmadge's thentop aide, Daniel Minchew, to give the senator \$500.

But the clearly-nervous secretary acknowledged both memos were written "similar to my style."

The Senate Ethics Committee planned to question Mrs. Tisdale again today about the two memos. Both memos, as well as several other pieces of evidence introduced Thursday, were received from Minchew, who once was Talmadge's chief aide and is now his chief accuser. If hey are proven authentic, they would tend to support Minchew's credibili-

The two checks were for reimbursement of Senate expense claims. Both the check for \$10,604.68 in 1973 and one for \$2,289.99 in 1974 were funneled into a secret bank account set up by Minchew and did not show on office records.



# Redgraves lose again

MANCHESTER, England (AP) - Actress Vanessa Redgrave got only 225 votes - 169 less than last time - in her second attempt to win a House of Commons seat in Manches ter's Moss Side district.

Her actor brother Corin, who also ran in the general election Thursday on the ticket of the Workers' Revolutionary Party, got only 152 votes in the Lambeth Central district in south London

Because they got less than an eighth of the total vote in their districts, the Redgraves and their party's other 58 entries all forfeited the 150-pound (\$300) deposits required of all candidates.

The Moss Side seat was won by Laborite George Morton with 17,765 votes.

# Scandals blight career of former Liberal leader

BARNSTAPLE, England (AP) -Accusations of attempted murder and homosexuality ended the once-bright career of former Liberal Party leader Jeremy Thorpe early today as a Con-servative defeated him in the North Devon district he represented in Britain's House of Commons for 20 years.

Thorpe, 50, had tears in his eyes as the election return officer announced that a local businessman, Tony Speller, won the rural district's seat in the general election Thursday by 31,811 votes to Thorpe's 23,338.

Thorpe's wife, a former concert pianist who was once married to a cousin of Queen Elizabeth II, spoke softly to him as he took some notes from a coat pocket. He thanked the election officials, the police and the local postmaster and congratulated his successful opponent.

"He now has the task of looking after the people of North Devon which I hope he will accept as a very pre-

cious responsibility and which he will value as I have for the past 20 years,' Thorpe said.

To muted cheers he added: "North Devon for the past 20 years has been Liberal and I'm confident in the future it will be once again."

Thorpe, mentioned as a future prime minister when he led a Liberal Party revival in 1974, goes on trial next week at the Old Bailey, London's central criminal court, on a charge of plotting to murder Norman Scott, a former male model who claims they had a homosexual affair. Thorpe denies both the murder-plot charge, for which 20 years in prison is the maximum punishment, and the homosexual allegation.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Japanese Prime Minister Masayochi Ohira is ending his official visit after a stormy confrontation with House and Senate leaders over Japanese restrictions on U.S. exports.

'They really laid into him,'' an administration official said Thursday, referring to the treatment given the 69-year-old Japanese leader by congressional trade specialists.

Several U.S. officials, who asked not to be identified, said, however, that Ohira's visit probably helped ease pressures in Congress for retaliatory protectionist measures aganst Japan.

Even before Ohira's appearance Thursday on Capitol Hill, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Tex., took to the Senate floor to denounce Japan's trade policies. By tolerating the trade imbalance, the United

## Amin's troops on the run

KAMPALA, Uganda (AP) - Remnants of Idi Amin's army are reported fleeing from northern Uganda into Sudan and Zaire as the Tanzanian invasion force extends the new government's control east and north of Kampala.

Amin's forces are reported still in control of half of the country, north of a line stretching from Soroti, 125 miles northeast of Kampala, west to Masindi, 125 miles northwest of the capital.

But military sources said columns of Tanzanian troops and Ugandan exiles who returned with them were encountering little resistance as they moved into the northland preparatory to a linkup and a joint drive into Amin's tribal homeland in northwest Uganda

# U.S. aid sent to Saudi navy

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Navy has taken the latest step in a program to strengthen Saudi Arabia's armed forces by awarding a \$671.2 million contract to a combination of U.S. firms for training the Saudi Arabian navy to operate and maintain its bases and ships.

Meanwhile, on Capitol Hill Thursday, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee stopped short of approving a Carter administration request for an emergency \$50 million grant to help Turkey modernize its armed forces.

Saudi Arabia's importance to the United States as a major oil supplier has increased with the ouster of the pro-U.S. Shah of Iran.

## Italian terrorists strike again

ROME (AP) - Terrorists attacked Christian Democratic targets in Rome, Naples and Genoa following the Red Brigades raid on the Rome headquarters of Italy's dominant party that left one policeman dead and two wounded.

Police traded fire Thursday night with gunmen near the Rome residence of Christian Democratic Secretary Benigno Zaccagnini, and a firebomb exploded at the doorstep of an appeals court judge in the capital, causing light damage.

In Naples, a terrorist group called Organized Communist Nuclei claimed responsibility for the firebombing of a Christian Democratic study center which was badly damaged.

In Genoa, the car of a 37-year-old Christian Democratic city council woman, Maria Pia Bozzo, also was firebombed.



JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Police set up roadblocks and made house-to-house searches in the black township of Soweto today for guerrillas who stormed a local police station, shot and wounded three officers and three civilians, then set the building ablaze. The raid Thursday night was the boldest yet by the

guerrillas in South Africa. The six wounded - three black policemen and three black civilians, one a woman - were taken to a hospital where two of them underwent emergency surgery to save their lives, police said.

A police spokesman said three guerrillas were involved in the attack on the Moroka police station inside Soweto, a township of 1 million and site of bloody rioting in 1976.

# Warplanes fly in Mideast

Syrian and Palestinian gunners fired at Israeli warplanes zooming over Beirut today, and the Syrians promptly flew protective missions over the tense Lebanese capital with their own jet fighters. The low-flying Israeli jets drew anti-aircraft fire from guerrillas in the two major Palestinian refugee camps of Bourj el Barajneh and Chatilla as well as the shantytown of Sabra just south of Beirut.

A spokesman for Yasser Arafat's Palestine Liberation Organization said Syrian peacekeeping forces also fired on the Israeli planes from positions south of the city. Pedestrians and traffic scrambled off the streets for cover.

The district queen contest will feature the Saturday afternoon schedule of events.



Wishful thinking doesn't

CONGRESSIONAL CENSORS: Trying to keep memebers of Congress honest when they speak on the record-the Congressional Record, at least-is a job that would make-Diogenes weep. By their own rules, senators and reprentatives can "revise and extend" remarks they make on the floor before they appear in the Record next day. The results are frequently misleading. The one attempt-only partially successful-to reform the system of "second-though editing" had a macabre inspiration. In the Congressional Record for Oct. 18, 1972, Rep. Hale Boggs, D-La., was quoted as having made a speech recapping the significant legislation passed by the outgoing Congress, and wishing his House colleagues well. The trouble was that Boggs had actually died two days before in a plane crash. His remarks had been submitted before he left Washingtong. This grotesque evidence of the Congressional Record's longstanding falsity so outraged then-Rep. William Steiger, R-Wis., that he launched a reform drive. It culminated last year in a modest change in the rewriting rules. Beginning in March, 1978, an identifying "bullet" (a printed dot) must appear before every speech in the Record that was not actually delivered. When Steiger died last December, the customary eulogies were offered in the House. One colleague was moved to speak: It is a little ironie that so many of (the eulogies) must be 'bulleted' as a result of Bill's work here. His absolute insistence on honesty means that the record is going to show they were not present." Even the "bullet" reform was something of a dud. Some members of Congress-have stretched the revision-and-extension rule to the point where they can avoid the telltale mark by simply saying a sentence or two on the floor and then pasting a long speech onto the official transcript later. Steiger's reform succeeded only in forcing members to appear on the floor for a few seconds. Even the televising of House sessions hasn't deterred members from rewriting what they actually said. Few if any of their constituents will ever see the TV tape that would contradict their amended version of what they said, so the editing continues apace.

How anyone could expect anything but savage behavior from savages is one of the mysteries of the modern American mind.

Part of the problem is wishful thinking. Nobody likes to contemplate the possibility of war with the Soviets and a lot of people don't even like to admit that there really is such a nasty thing as evil in this world. Governments, however, are run by people and the character of the government is determined by the character of the people who make the decisions.

He manipulated their accounts, allowing huge overdrafts and juggling funds to cover them. On occasion, he signed their names to bank notes and checks. witnesses allege.

This led to tragedy for one member of the family. Beverly Banks David, the favorite brother of Lance's wife LaBelle. The two were so close that they named children after one

The financial worry, friends allege, helped bring on a nervous breakdown. He was found dead in his automobile inside a, closed garage on Nov. 24, 1974. The medical examiner in his home town of Jefferson City, Mo. ruled that the death was accidental, caused by carbon monoxide poisoning. But intimates believe it was suicide

At the time of his death, court records indicate that David owed the Calhoun bank \$254,383.54. Two of his checking accounts were overdrawn. one by \$55,383.54 and the other by \$18,081.25. He had due notes totaling more than \$180,000

Lance eventually made good on these overdrafts and obligations. The Calhoun bank then delivered the collateral to Lance, even though the stocks and securities were made out in David's name. The only assets under David's control at the time of his death -amounted to a paltry \$4.177.82.

Now the Internal Revenue Service is trying to collect from his widow a \$26,000 tax on the collateral that was

One crusty old American admiral has pointed out that military hardware has a short shelf life. It becomes obsolete. The Soviets would not be spending \$40 billion a year more than a much richer United States if they did not intend to make use of their investment.

There's one trouble with wishful thinking. It doesn't have the tiniest effect on reality.





# Carter's SALT II efforts show signs of backfiring

INSIDE REPORT:

WASHINGTON - President Carter's hard sell to persuade the Senate that Moscow can't cheat on the new strategic arms limitation treaty (SALT II) shows signs of backfiring. demonstrating anew his administration's propensity for falling into traps of its own making.

The backfire, clearly audible in Senate cloakroom gossip even among pro-Carter senators, carries this warning for Jimmy Carter: lack of a serious, well-coordinated political strategy to carry his great SALT II project through the Senate may trigger the worse defeat of his presidency. To make up for that absent strategy, Carter is now engaging in Carterstyle hyperbole which is costing him potentially valuable SALT allies.

In the face of sharply conflicting testimony from his highest military and intellegence officials, Carter told the American Newspaper Publishers Association last week that the new treaty "will be verifiable from the first day it is signed." That statement will haunt the hearing rooms of the Senate's Foreign Relations and Armed Services Committees when defense Secretary Harold Brown and Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) **Director Stansfield Turner testify on** the new treaty. Both have publicly disagreed with it.

Far more than Carter, Turner and Brown have been circumspect in predicting when American monitoring may be able to recover from the loss of two CIA stations near the Soviet border in Iran. Turner estimated full recovery could take up to five years;

Brown, even though under White House pressure to minimize the problem, said in a carefully-crafted statement April 17 it would "take about a year.

The discrepancy between Carter and the Turner-Brown team is no laughing matter to senators, some of whom feel Carter is not levelling with them or the nation in his zeal to ward off defeat in the Senate. What had made his position on the explosive verification issue even more worrisome to the Senate is the personal way he is acting to rising skepticism about verification.

"He acts as though we were calling him a liar just because we ask guestions," one verification skeptic told us. That defensive mood of presidential defiance toward genuine Senate concern over Soviet cheating is compounding Carter's political problem. Instead of conceding that real questions about verification do exist, Senate critics say he is treating the debate like an anti-Carter plot.

At least as troubling to the Senate is the surprising failure of the administration's early warning system to detect trouble on the verification front. Despite the virtually certain loss in the Iranian revolution of the top-rated Kabkhan monitoring station (capableof line-of-sight interception of missile telemetry seconds after a test launch), orders were not issued to devise substitute ways to monitor SALT II.

Only weeks before the predictable January departure of the deposed shah of Iran. Carter's budget chief. James T. McIntyre, cut more than \$100 million from Turner's fiscal year 1980 budget request for new verification monitors - presumably satellites. When Turner recently testified before a closed-door session of the Senate Intelligence Committee, his defense of McIntyre's cut, though obviously intended to show a united administration front, infuriated some senators.

The Senate committee is now recommending that the cut be restored and that, as one committee Democrat told us, the president order a "crash program" to build up U.S. monitoring to pre-Iranian revolution levels.

Carter failed to foresee that extra spending to enhance verification would serve his political purpose in the Senate debate. That failure was compounded by leaked administration reports that the high-flying U-2 spy plane might be used as a stop-gap verification tool. This tactic quickly backfired. Most experts doubt the U-2 could lift the antennas needed to pick up missile telemetry - performance data radioed from a Soviet missile test.

Even if it could, however, there is today no assurance of advance notice


of Soviet tests and therefore no sure way of knowing when the U-2 should take off to do its monitoring.

But more important, administration officials say the U-2 ploy could work only with Turkish overflight rights. Yet Turkish politicians have flatty informed the administration there is no chance for such overflights. U.S. Turkish relations are ministration.

Little wonder, then, that Carter's performance in the verification crisis - the first in what may be months of crises in his battle for SALT II - has left many senators dissatisfied and vaguely disquieted. The more he protests their raising questions about verification, the more questions they will raise - both about verification and about the credibility of Jimmy

# Grief process of death divided into five parts

EDITOR'S NOTE - This is the fifth of a multi-part series on death and how those involved handle the crisis.

### By GARRY OTT **Herald News Editor**

In talking with doctors, ministers and psychological leaders, one thing becomes abundantly clear: Dr. Elisabeth Kubler-Ross, a Swiss psychiatrist in Chicago, is the foremost expert in the field of death and of how to cope with the crisis.

Also, local leaders agree the study of death is a relatively new undertaking

In fact, most concur that for years death was not even discussed, leading to gross misunderstandings about the subject and serious mistakes in how to handle the crisis.

Dr. Kubler-Ross, during the course of her study, has broken down the grief process surrounding death into five stages. This system is now widely used by ministers as well as doctors and psychologists when counseling a "dying patient" or their family.

### THE FIVE-PART system is:

-Denial (this is not happening to me)

-Anger (why is this happening to me)

-Bargaining (God, please give me a little longer to live)

-Depression (sadness which includes crying and bemoaning the crisis) and

-Resolution (you realize death is going to occur and finally acknowledge the facts).

According to Sumter Hickman, a psychologist at Central Plains Mental Health-Mental Retardation, these phases are not finely defined and a person can pass through them with relative ease or great difficulty -

depending on individual personalities. "Although everyone is different."

Hickman said, "the denial and anger stages appear to be the two most difficult to overcome. Highly independent people often have trouble getting past the denial stage. They refuse to believe they are dying."

HICKMAN, WHO says his role as psychologist is to counsel and educate the patient and his family, also noted that some patients never make it through all five stages.

"It is not unusual for persons to die while still in one of the stages denial, anger or whatever.

"That's why it is often good for a person with a terminal illness to seek counseling. We can explain the fivepart system and help them move from one stage to another." Hickman said. He also said it can be extremely helpful for the family to seek help

because they generally experience the same five stages of grief. Most experts in the field agree that

an ideal situation is when the family and patient learn the five-part system together. That way the patient has a basic understanding of his own emotional feelings and learns to progress from one stage to another. Likewise, the family realizes their loved one is coping with the death crisis and therefore suffers less grief.

**OF COURSE**, those same experts also concur the above-mentioned situation is a "classic textbook case" and reality often is not as simple as it looks on paper.

Nevertheless, it is widely accepted that the best way to deal with death is to discuss the subject openly while at the same time holding out hope for the patient "that something good is still possible.

A local group - Make Today Count - meets regularly in Plainview and

attempts to bring together persons with terminal illnesses and their families.

A spokesman for that group told The Herald recently: "We discuss death openly at our meetings. We try to confront the realities involved and share common experiences. We help each other.'

Unfortunately, the meetings are not very well attended. In fact, at their last meeting only three persons were present.

Although most leaders contacted by The Herald for this series have agreed on the basic questions - that death should be discussed openly, that a dying patient does experience stages of grief, that religious people generally handle the death crisis better than others and that death has been ignored for much too long there are other issues where there is disagreement.

One of the major ones is if the patient suffers severe bitterness. Some - especially ministers - say they do


not witness a great deal of bitterness within the patient and when it does exist it quickly evaporates and is replaced by acceptance.

Others counfer that suggestion


HICKMAN, FOR one, insisted that bitterness (or the Why Me? question) is very common and often persists for a long period of time. He also said many people never accept death or that they are going to die. Ministers said acceptance was

quite common. There are others, but despite these differences it is becoming increasingly obvious that people are no longer ignoring death. Instead, they are

seeking more information and realize the need to cope with the crisis. Many questions on the subject remain unanswered but with more people specializing in death-related areas - especially those counseling the dying patient - answers should become more accessable Death will never be a pleasant field

# Agreement reached in Birmingham city strike

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) - Bargainers reached a tentative agreement early today that would end a strike by policemen, firefighters and sanitation workers who walked out in a health insurance dispute, officials said.

"The City Council will be voting on a proposal" later in the morning, said Lige Richardson, public information officer for the city.

A few hours after firefighters joined the walkout Thursday night, two empty houses caught fire, and only supervisory personnel of the Birmingham Fire and Rescue Squad responded to the alarm. No one was hurt. The unofficial word was that Blue Cross-Blue Shield would continue as the carrier of the city's health insurance program at least until April 1, 980, and that the city would take no disciplinary action against strikers.

Maintaing the Blue Cross-Blue Shield plan had been the strikers' major demand All police pickets were ordered down and policemen were asked to

assemble at the Fraternal Order of Police lodge for a special meeting. Details of the agreement would have to be ratified by both the city and the employee groups.

Gov. Fob James spent the night in town helping to work out an agreement, and federal mediators huddled with city officials and labor leaders throughout the night.

Mayor David Vann earlier offered amnesty without back pay for striking workers who returned to their jobs by 8 a.m. He promised disciplinary action, possibly including dismissal, for those who did not.

The city's 652 firefighters voted late Thursday to join about 1,700 other city workers - including the 570-man police force - on the picket lines, which went up Tuesday.

Soon after the vote was announced, Vann said 18 of the 29 fire stations were unmanned, and the rest had crews of supervisory personnel and 40 Natioal Guardsmen trained in fire protection.

Vann said he asked neighboring municipalities to assist in major emergencies, such as fires.

One supervisor, Lt. Sam Caffey, a 36-year veteran of the Fire Department, said his south side station's contingent was made up of three chiefs, a captain and a lieutenant.

"We'll just have to do the best we can to take care of the people," he said. "I feel responsible to the people."

A number of false alarms were reported by dispatchers, who were screening reports carefully to prevent unnecessary runs.





The last three of five area men involved in an income tax protest movement Thursday were sentenced to a year in prison and fined \$10,000 in Federal District Court in Midland by Federal Judge John H. Wood Jr.

Two others involved in the movement were sentenced last month.

Wood also placed the three, Midlanders Richard L. Enloe, Billy D. Cawthon and Thomas O. Fluornoy, on five-year probations under terms that they "divorce" themselves from the tax protest movement and that they pay their income taxes during each of the five years after their prison term

The three were found guilty, in separate jury trials last February, of failure to provide information to the IRS.

Flournoy filed suit against the federal government in August 1977, contending that the Federal Income Tax Law was unconstitutional

He contended that the law was illegal on the basis that federal reserve notes are not legal money and therefore cannot be taxed as income.

"The real purpose of the suit is to get backing of our money with gold or silver, and not be at the mercy of the Federal Reserve System," he was quoted as saying at that time. He was found guilty in February



LOS ANGELES (AP) - Hospital officials aren't saying whether any new cancer was found during surgery on actor John Wayne, who remained in stable condition at UCLA Medical Center.

The 71-year-old Hollywood superstar was moved Thursday from the intensive care unit, where he spent a restful night after surgery the day before. Doctors removed an intestinal blockage in an operation hospital spokesman Al Hicks described as common.

Doctors had not issued a statement on whether they found any trace of the cancer that led to the removal of Wayne's stomach in January, said hospital spokeswoman Bonnie Whitham. The hospital was running a routine cancer check, she added.

It was the third time since January that the actor had been hospitalized.

Wayne, who will be 72 on May 26, was taken to UCLA Tuesday night with abdominal pain. The hospital said he had been scheduled to return to UCLA for a checkup following his January cancer surgery.

In January, he underwent gall bladder surgery at UCLA which revealed cancer in his stomach and surrounding lymph nodes. The malignancies were removed during a 9½-hour operation.

Wayne then was admitted to Hoag Memorial Hospital in Newport Beach with bronchitis. He left that facility on April 25. Fifteen years ago, his left lung

was removed because of cancer.

says. The Federal Trade Commission staff, after a three-year investigation, said Thursday the medical profession's control of most Blue Shield plans

# Juneteenth holiday favored

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The House has tentatively approved a bill that would make June 19, Emancipation Day in Texas, a state holiday and drop Columbus Day from the list.

A final vote on whether to send the bill to the Senate was expected today.

Rep. Ron Bird, D-San Antonio, fought to keep Columbus Day as a recognized holiday on which state offices and banks could be closed.

Rep. Bill Messer, D-Belton, observed that before Columbus brought European civilization to America, "all men did was hunt and fish and women did all the work. They didn't have any income tax and there was no pollution.

"So why celebrate Columbus?" asked Messer.

"I don't know," said Rep. Al Edwards, D-Houston, sponsor of the bill.

Bird's amendment to preserve Columbus Day as a holiday was tabled.

The FTC staff recommended that the commission consider prohibiting physician organizations from controlling Blue Shield plans. Blue Shield, the largest private underwriter of health insurance, offers plans that cover about 40 percent of the population, the 409-page report said Thursday. Physicians control most of the na-

tion's Blue Shield medical plans that, in turn, decide how much physicians are paid for performing services, the report said.

'Medical control of a plan means that physician organizations set or strongly influence the prices that their members will be paid by the plan," the report said.

The Blue Cross and Blue Shield Associations disagreed with the major finding of the report, saying the regulation would be "unnecessarily costly to America's taxpayers, potentialy harmful to Blue Cross subscribers and factually unsupportable."

Walter J. McNerney, president of the group said, "The FTC's theory that physicians on Blue Shield Plans' Boards increase health care costs is without foundation.

He said, "Blue Shield Association's statistical analyses indicate little or no correlation between physician representation on Blue Shield Plan Boards and health care costs to Blue Shield subscribers. If anything, the analyses demonstrate a lowering cost influence.


The report said, "Physicians con-trol decisions concerning payment to physicians, coverage, or benefits in most of the nation's 70 Blue Shield plans. As of 1968, physician organizations selected the majority of members of the governing boards of 32 plans, and physician-controlled committees supervised or participated in decisions about payments and claims in 67 plans."

Subpoenas issued during the investigation produced documents in which medical societies referred to Blue Shield as the "economic arm of the medical profession," the FTC staff said.

In addition to controlling decisions on payments to physicians, the boards also control payments to their competitors for some services, including clinical psychologists, optometrists and podiatrists, the report said.







ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) - Kindergarten teacher Janice Dike hopes to work out a compromise with Azalea Park Elementary officials who said she could not breastfeed her baby at school.

After a federal judge refused to issue a temporary injunction against the school this week, Mrs. Dike said she will ask for permission to teach kindergarten just half a day so she can go home to breastfeed her daugh-

ter, Dyani Kaliska. Her other alternative would be to take an unpaid leave of absence until the baby is weaned. She said she breastfed for 3½ months in a locked classroom during her lunch hour before officials told her she had to

Mrs. Dike said Dyani proved allergic to formula, and that a breast pump also was unsatisfactory, so she decided to file suit.

But U.S. District Judge John Reed said Mrs. Dike has "a viable alternative (taking a leave of absence)" to breastfeeding

The likelihood for this lawsuit's success is not great enough to grant a temporary injunction. The accommodation the individual has to make is not great," Reed said.

Mrs. Dike's lawyers said the school's action was discriminatory and violated her right to privacy Superintendent Dr. Linton Deck said the school merely enforced a rule barring teachers from bringing their children with them while they were working

School attorney John Bowen said, "This is the weakest case I've ever SPPT

# GOP encouraged by close vote on balanced budget proposal

WASHINGTON (AP) - Key Republicans say the closeness of a House vote to reject a GOP balanced budget proposal could mean trouble for the 1980 budget recommendations backed by the Democratic leadership

House Republicans plan two major assaults against the Democratic-supported spending levels next week when the House resumes work on a tentative budget for fiscal 1980, which begins Oct.

The Democratic leadership prevailed in the first budget battle Thursday when the House defeated, 214-186, a GOP proposal to balance the budget in the upcoming fiscal year.

However, Rep. Ralph S. Regula, R-Ohio, who is co-sponsoring a GOP substitute budget with Rep. Marjorie Holt, R-Md., said the 28-vote margin of defeat "gives us considerable optimism."

Regula said many of the 21 Republicans who voted against the balanced budget amendment likely would support the GOP leadership on less drastic budget alternatives as would more Democrats.

Democratic leaders also are clearly concerned about the Republican threat. House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. said Thursday the Holt Regula vote "will be a very important vote."

The House Budget Committee is recommending spending \$532.7 billion in fiscal 1980 with a \$24.9 billion deficit. However, the full House trimmed that cut. spending level by about \$800 million Thursday.

# Mixed drink tax bill rejected by lower house

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Legislation changing the way customers pay the 10 percent tax on mixed drinks, which opponents contended would raise the price of cocktails, was defeated by the House on Thursday

The bill failed, 28-96

It would have required bars to add the tax to the price of drinks, disregarding fractions of less than half a cent

Rep. Gib Lewis, D-Fort Worth, the sponsor, said it would "put the tax out front and let people know what they are paying" and improve bookkeeping.

The major cut came when the House slashed \$1.1 billion in funds for government travel, filmmaking, overtime and other administrative matters.

However, money was added in other categories. including \$265 million for veterans affairs - \$150 million to keep some VA hospital wards open that otherwise might close, \$58 million to reinstate GI Bill benefits for Vietnam era veterans, \$50 million for burial benefits and \$7 million for research.

The GOP balanced budget proposal, sponsored by Rep. John H. Rousselot, R-Calif., would have matched \$515 billion in federal spending in fiscal 1980 with \$515 billion in revenues and provided for a \$10 billion tax cut.

Rousselot argued that balancing the budget would. help the economy by curtailing inflation and reflect the will of the American people. However, Democrats challenged his revenue esti

mates as faulty and claimed that enacting a balanced budget in fiscal 1980 would push the economy into a recession.

In approving its target 1980 budget last week, the Senate also rejected a balanced budget proposal. Both chambers, however, have stated as policy that the budget should be balanced by fiscal 1981;

The two major Republican atternatives reveeled to be considered Monday, would reduce the budget's spending levels and deficit, and provide for a tax

One substitute sponsored by Rep. Delbert Latta, R-Ohio, would trim spending to \$523.4 billion, set the deficit at \$15.2 billion and call for a \$15 billion tax

The Holt-Regula alternative puts spending at \$526.7 billion and the deficit at \$18.5 billion. Both GOP plans used higher inflation estimates than the committee and therefore projected higher revenue.

President Carter has proposed \$532.3 billion in spending and a \$28.4 billion deficit for fiscal 1980. The Senate's target budget calls for \$532.6 billion in spending and a \$29 billion deficit. The Senate used different economic assumptions and claims that its spending and deficit figures are actually less than those of the president and the House panel.

After the House completes work on its budget proposals, a House-Senate conference committee will iron out differences and Congress will then use those figures as a target when it prepares 1980 authorization and appropriation bills.

They met with Clements Wednesday and showed him a draft proposal for a flexible interest ceiling.

Both legislators attended Clements' news conference and said afterward the floating ceiling measure would be ready Tuesday for House floor debate.

Clements favored tying the floating limit to rates on 10-year U.S. Treasury bonds, plus a 2 percent add-on charge. For example, the bond rate as of Thursday was 9.31 percent, he said. If the floating ceiling were in effect now, he continued, the maximum rate would be 11.31 percent. However, the actual market selling rate is 10.55 percent, the governor added.

Clements said he would not lobby legislators to pass a floating ceiling, but leave that up to the sponsors.

"We've got our marching orders and we know what we have to do.

Meier said afterward. The senator said legislative strategy will be to push for House passage before moving on the bill in the Senate to minimize risks of more than one filibuster. With 25 days left in the session, a lengthy filibuster could be fatal to the measure.

# After 16 terms and 32 years, history-making mayor retires

BAY CITY, Texas (AP) - It could have been any other working day in the last 32 years. Mayor Richard Gusman sat in his City Hall office, next to the front door, bellowing a greeting to every person who walked by.

But this day the greetings were good-byes, for Gusman was cleaning out his desk. He had just completed his 16th straight two-year term the night before by swearing in his replacement.

It was not a melancholy task for the tall, robust 74-year-old, who tossed government pamphlets and regulations into a waste basket with glee while boasting of past accomplishments and plotting his future.

"I've had the longest term of any mayor in the United States," Gusman declared. "I was going to stop two years ago, but I read where one other mayor had/been re-elected 15 times.

"I could have run one more time and been elected, because I had enough pledged votes," he continued. "But I would have ended up at 77, and I'm trying to live to be 80

"I think I've got a better chance of doing that by getting out now, because the conglomeration of state rules and federal regulations was just running me nutty.

The job of mayor for this town of 20,000 people is full-time, and Gusman has been a one-man band at City Hall since he took over in! 1947

He held five jobs at the same time, including finance director, head of the city-owned gas system, director of the city service center, city manager and mayor.

"The only things that haven't gone up since I've been mayor is city taxes and my salary of \$125 a month,' Gusman said. "In salaries alone, I've donated more than \$1 million to Bay City during my term by doing jobs other cities put individal people in.

Gusman nurtured Bay City like his own business, bringing it along carefully during times of booming prosperity and keeping it out of debt until it grew from a community of 4,000 into the seat of government for Matagorda County

'We were still using outhouses when I came here," he said. "We had very little schools, very little of anything. We didn't even have mail delivery

'When I was first elected, I said I would run the city on a cash basis, and it's been free of debt for 32 years," said Gusman. "Last week I paid all the small loans at the bank and turned the business of the city over to the incoming administration without any outstanding bonds or notes. That hard-nosed, independent approach grew more and

more difficult to maintain as government, and the world, became more complex, Gusman admitted. "I enjoyed being mayor up until 10 years ago," he said. "We are no longer allowed to operate our cities, or have any free-thinking in this day and time.

"Getting out from under all that makes me feel better than I've felt in many a year," he said. "I'm just as happy as a lark."

NEW YORK (AP) - Why are so few women on corporate boards of directors? There are few qualified women, the chairmen reply. And the women retort: They wouldn't recognize a qualified woman if they saw one.

The argument won't be resolved soon. The women distribute lists of candidates; the chairmen reject them. The chairmen comb their prospect files, and claim those proposed can't make a real contribution.

Having listened to both sides, an observer sought professional help. He asked a professor noted for his input and observations about life in the executive suite.

The reason, the professor told him, is simple. Few women serve on boards for the same reason newspapermen are rarely seen on them.

EXPLAIN, HE WAS asked. What are those reasons? The same, he replied, as the reasons why management consultants, minister, and professional seldom are asked to serve. Yes? "They're not on the route.

There is, said Eugene Jennings, professor of management at Michigan State, author of numerous books on corporate life, and adviser to corporation chairmen, a precise route that leads to a directorship.

"The surest route is to become an officer of a corporation, and then get elected to the board of that company," he said. Having achieved that, you then find yourself sponsored for other boards.

"Once you serve on one board your chances are very high of being named to another, a third and to even a fourth," he explained. That route has existed a long time; it will continue in use, he said.

That assertion seems to be documented by the recent study of corporate boards by the search firm of Heidrick & Struggles. For one thing, it found women named in 1978 àlready had served on three boards.

WOMEN AREN'T ON boards in great numbers, he said, not because of inherent traits that disqualify them but because they fail to possess what is sought, mainly experience to help with business decisions. For a time recently that wasn't so, and it hurt

women as well as boards, said Jennings. Earlier in this decade, he explained, women were appointed as tokens, and often found to be "incompetent tokens.

That phase is gone. It proved embarrassing, said Jennings, who once was hired by a chairman to develop ways of making women directors better able to understand finance, marketing, and business poli-

Competence is sought now, whether in men or women. "Boards are more active, have greater responsibility. A premium is placed on people who need little startup time." That means business experience, he said.

"Further," he continued, "boards are now organized into working committees. Members are chosen for ability to contribute to them.'

THERE IS AN alternative route, Jennings conceded, but it is inferior to that of becoming an officer. It is to serve on a non-business board, become noticed by a business member, and then be sponsored.

It sometimes happens. Since business executives frequently join such boards - museums, philanthropic organizations, charities - they have an opportunity to assess another member's judgment, status and power. There is, though, a great divide between the non-business and business boards, Jennings finds. 'Most of the former collect and dispense money but they don't make it," he said. He feels it could distort views The bridge is much firmer on the main route, but that too presents a serious problem, namely, that "it's still harder to become an officer of a major corporation than it is to be elected to the board."

# Additional funds recommended for area institutions **Austin Bureau**

Senate Finance Committee members have recommended more money for Midland-area state institutions than is proposed in the version of the appropriations bill already passed by the House.

The Senate committee version calls for a biennial budget of \$10.8 million for The University of Texas of the Permian Basin. House members actually approved a larger amount, \$11.1 million, but because of an across-the-board 4 percent cut tacked onto the House bill, that is reduced to approximately \$10.7 million.

West Texas Children's Home was recommended for a \$3.7 million budget by Senate committee members. House members had approved \$3.5 million, but that too was cut by 4 percent.

Total for the Senate bill is \$20.8 billion, approximately \$500 million more than the House-approved version and still far above what Gov. William Clements says is the bottom line budget necessary to avoid his veto.

The bill is a 23 percent increase over current spending and appropriates all but about \$90 million of the amount Comptroller Bob Bullock says will be available to run the state for the next two years.

It includes a 5.1 percent salary increase for state employees and teachers, less than they pay hike approved by the House, as well as \$269 million in state aid to school district and \$450 million to reimburse school districts for revenue lost due to last fall's adoption of the Tax Relief Amendment.

In a routine procedural move, the Senate committee substituted its bill for the House bill and then sent it to the floor for debate.

After Senate approval; the bill will go to conference committee to adjust the difference between House and Senate versions. Traditionally the conference committee's work is not finished until the very last hours of the session.



Dear Dr. Solomon: During World War II, I worked as a secretary in a shipyard where asbestos was used. Do I have any risk of asbestos-related disease, or is it only those who actually worked on the ships who might have been affected by asbestos?-Mrs. E.F.R.

Dear Mrs. R .: It should be pointed out, first, that even those who worked with asbestos in the construction of ships may show no ill effects. Having said that, I must add that any worker employed in a shipyard, whether in an executive, secretarial or laboring capacity, may be at risk of an asbestos-related disease. Even the families of shipyard workers, who were exposed to the dust brought home on clothing, are included. However, the incidence of disease is

# Medical schools warned to cut back enrollments

BOSTON (AP) - American medical schools should cut back their enrollments now to avoid a glut of physicians that could lock doctors into cutthroat competition and promote unnecessary treatment, says a public health specialist.

"Increasing evidence suggests that there will be a surfeit of physicians in this country within the next three decades," says Dr. Donald B. Louria of the New Jersey Medical School.

In 1950, he said, there was one doctor in the United States for every 735 people. In 1980, there will be one for every 500, and by 2020, there may be one physiciaft for every 250 or 300 people if the current trend continues.

Writing in today's New England, Journal of Medicine, Louria said schools are turning out doctors at a far faster rate than the nation is growing.

Louria, who is chairman of his school' department of preventive medicine and community health, said this will mean more doctors scrambling for less business.

"To me, it seems clear that a doctor glut by 1990, 2000 or 2020 will make the practice of medicine unpleasant, create cutthroat competition, force an increasing focus by the physician on the monetary aspects of medicine, raise costs per patient work-up, encourage the ordering of unnecessary tests and examinations and undermine efforts toward less expensive preventive medicine," he wrote.

Frank Chappell, spokesman for the American Medical Association, praised Louria as a "distinguished physician" but said a doctor glut is contrary to the policy of the AMA's board of delegates as well as current trends.

'It's completely clear when you try to get an appointment with a doctor these days," Chappell said Wednesday night. "Anyway, how many doctors is enough? We haven't defined that...It's true there's going to be a lot of them, but that's a product of demand by the American people."

Louria also said there should be a national effort to find the ideal ratio of doctors and patients.

'If we wait until a saturation point is reached and then react, it will be too late," he said. "Even (harsh) measures will not prevent catastrophic effects on the practice of medicine in the United States."

Currently, 60,000 students are enrolled in American medical schools. Louria said. "We should begin now a phased reduction in the number of physicians trained, amounting ultimately to several thousand new students per year."

This suggestion may be opposed by politicians, he said, because it will norease the cost of educating individual doctors.





# Carter to visit two states

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter is embarking today on a "nonpolitical" trip to politically potent Iowa'and California because, according to a grinning aide, people there are keenly interested in Carter's programs.

Iowa is expected, once again, to be the first state to pick Democratic national convention delegates at party caucuses next January - caucuses that gave Carter a big boost toward nomination in 1976.

California has more voters than any other state and is the home of Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr., a likely Carter challenger in 1980.

A reporter asked White House press secretary Jody Powell Thursday if today's journey to Iowa and California, and Carter's trip last week to New Hampshire, traditionally the scene of the first presidential primary, were coincidental. Hardly attempting to hide the tongue that seemed lodged in his cheek, Powell responded, "There's a great deal of interest in the president's programs in these areas, it eems to us.

There is but one avowedly political event on Carter's two-day trvel schedue -- a brief appearance today at an Iowa Democratic party reception.

Carter's first destination was Des Moines, to address the Iowa Association of Counties, then to hold a regional news conference and mingle with local Democrats at the reception.

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal judge is hearing a legal challenge to President Carter's wage and price guidelines that administration officials warn could have a "debilitating effect" on the nation's struggle with inflation.

U.S. District Judge Barrington D. Parker called for arguments today on a request from the United Rubber Workers for a temporary restraining order to bar enforcement of the voluntary guidelines.

The union, meanwhile, says it is ready to rescind a strike call against Uniroyal, Inc., now set for 12:01 a.m. Saturday if Parker rules in its favor. The Rubber Workers, backed by the AFL-CIO, wants the order to stop government officials from threatening to deny large federal contracts to companies that don't comply with the guidelines.

The union claims the president lacks authority for such enforcement action. The Justice Department maintains the administration is on sound legal ground.

In court papers filed Thursday, Justice Department lawyers said a restraining order would "cast doubt on the legality of the anti-inflation program at a particularly crucial period.

They warned that a victory for the union "could create a precedent for other ongoing negotiations that could have nothing less than a debilitating effect on this country's concerted campaign against its number oneproblem, inflation."

Union officials said that while Rubber Workers President Peter Bommarito was ready to rescind the strike call against Uniroyal, they declined to predict what steps he would take if Parker ruled in the government's favor

Janis Froelich, a union official, said it was possible that contract talks would resume between the Rubber Workers and Uniroyal without a strike, however. No new negotiations have been scheduled in the contract. dispute.

"We would have to take a look at the package that's been negotiated and see what we can do with it," Ms. Froelich said.

Bommarito has made it clear for several weeks he would like to avoid a walkout against Uniroyal, a firm that would be hard-pressed to endure a long strike. The company employs about 8,200 URW workers.

"We are very desirous of avoiding a strike," Ms. Froelich said. But she added that the union president is prepared to use his "strike weapon." A temporary restraining order pre-



DALLAS (AP) - The National Football League annual draft again provided a bonanza for the Dallas Cowboys in the first two rounds although they drafted in the 27th and 54th positions.

'We would have to be awful lucky to do better than we have done," said Coach Tom Landry after the five-time Super Bowl participants chose center Robert Shaw of Tennessee and cornerback Aaron Mitchell of Nevada Las Vegas in the first two rounds respectively.

Landry said, "Shaw was no gamble. He has the potential to play guard as well as center. He moves well and pulls well. It gives us some needed depth in our offensive line.

'Mitchell has good size, speed and is very aggressive. We were delighted to get him. He was the last of the cinch cornerbacks. He has a 4.5 (in the 40) on grass and that is moving. He has the size of 6-1, 195 pounds that none of our cornerbacks have."

Shaw was the first offensive lineman the Cowboys have drafted in the first round since 1966 when they selected John Niland. It was the first time they had ever drafted a center in the opening round.

"I know it will tough beating out John Fitzgerald because he has beenaround seven years, but I am just

delighted to be drafted in the first round by the Cowboys," said Shaw. "I thought the best chance I had was to go late in the second round or perhaps the third round."

Shaw was All-Southeast Conference and an AP honorable mention All-America. He had a knee injury in 1977 and underwent surgery. The Cowboys flew shaw to Dallas so their doctors could give him a physical and he checked out fine.

Landry said Mitchell "really comes up and hits people, he arrives mean.

Mitchell likely will compete at left cornerback, a position he played in college. He must beat out either Mark Washington or Dennis Thurman. Landry said he could keep only four cornerbacks next year.

"Both players we had rated in our top 25 so that certainly makes it a successful draft as far as we are concerned," said Landry. "Both could possibly start, but that is pretty hard to do on a Super Bowl team. Not even Tony Dorsett started right away

Landry, who seldom gets carried away on players plucked from the draft until he can see them in summer camp, said, "I think they will help us. I'd be surprised if they didn't." He said that there would be five to six spots open for rookies this year because "we are always a building team. We have guys on our team who haven't made it yet.'

Assessing the National Conference Eastern Division, Landry said, "We may have our hands full against St. Louis - they drafted a backfield."

Landry was impressed with the drafting of running backs Ottis Anderson of Miami and Theotis Brown of UCLA.

"That was the best draft in our division by far." he said. "Philadelphia got a fine player in linebacker Jerry Robinson of UCLA.'

In the third round, the Cowboys collected 6-foot-6 tight end Doug Cosbie of Santa Clara

Defensive end Ralph DeLoach of California was the Cowboys selection in the fourth round.

In the fifth round, the Cowboys had three selections. They picked offensive lineman Bobby Hukill of North Carolina, defensive end Curtis Anderson of Central Ohio State and running back Ron Springs of Ohio State.

In the sixth round, the final round completed Thursday, the Cowboys selected defensive back Tim Lavender of Southern California, offensive lineman Mike Salzano of North Carolina and wide receiver Chris DeFrance of Arizona State.

LOUISVILLE - The distinguished author-handicapper-columnist Andrew Beyer attacked the city of Louisville in Tuesday's Washington Post. "If it weren't for the Kentucky Derby, Louisville could sink into the Ohio River without the world's noticing or caring," Beyer wrote. In the certain knowledge that lightning will be sent to part Beyer's hair, I am

avoiding his company. Many things put Beyer out of sorts here. He sees roving gangs of horse trainers and officials conspiring against the hapless bettors, one of them named Beyer. "Conniving trainers," he called them. Nor can Beyer abide corporate executives and college students who he says, make the local bars inhospitable to a man seeking intelligent conversation. If a man must spend a week in Louisville, Beyer said, "It does help consider-

ably to be inabriated. ... The city is a wastland .... devoid of good restaurants and good night life. A literary critic, on reviewing

Beyer's work, said, "Andy did the work of two men there - Laurel and Hardy." Another reader said, "Beyer's the kind of guy whom would take Ray Charles to a Marcel Marceau concert.'

I AM kinder.

I think Beyer has talked to too many horses.

Louisville is heaven. The dogwoods are in bloom this week in this city that is a veritable park. On the riverfront, the city is reaching for the sky with a group of new buildings designed to make Louisville's urban center the pride of Kentucky. Besides which, Louisville is the home of Phyllis George, who, though this is hard to beleve, is even prettier than the dog-

In rendering inoperative the fantasies of millions, Ms. George six weeks ago married the Kentucky multimillionaire, John Y. Brown Jr. Brown now is running for governor. In a press release, Brown's people sought to convince Kentuckians that Ms. George is more than simply another Miss America.

"Some of her domestic duties are sewing buttons on John's coats and putting his socks together," the press release said.

Little wonder, then, that John Y. fell for her. A woman who can put socks together is hard to find, even in Louisville.

Ms. George is not the only civic virtue here. Actors Theatre of Louisville is a nationally honored repertory company that three times has sent shows to Broadway. Mikhail Baryshnikov was so taken by the city in a visit last year that he will return this fall to dance with the Louisville Ballet company. One suspects Baryshnikov found a bar with intelligent conversation.

WHAT WOULD the world be like had Louisville sunk into the Ohio **River?** Not only would Baryshnikov have to settle for lesser cities such as New York and Moscow, perhaps even Paris, heaven forbid. We would also be deprived of the mint julep. Alone among cities, Louisville sustains the idea that bourbon can be improved by dropping a green weed in it.

Without Louisville, Muhammad Ali would have been, perhaps, The Albuquerque Lip. Colonel Sanders might have pumped gas in his retirement instead of licking his fingers. Without Paul Hornung, who learned to chase girls in Louisville, pro football would have been dull. Johnny Unitas came to Louisville to play college football, and Wes Unseld grew up very large here

All this is in addition, of course, to Louisville's reputation as a spawning ground of wonderful newspapermen. Modesty is strong but not strong enough to prevent my mentioning I worked for both of Louisville's Pulitzer Prize-winning newspapers, for 11 years.

# Lucky kicks work magic for Islanders

NEW YORK (AP) - Thore Nystrom and his hockey-playing son, Bob, finished a cup of afternoon coffee. Then Bob got up from the table, for there was a game to play against the New York Rangers.

"My dad gave me the traditional three kicks in the rear for luck and K left," said Bob Nystrom after the good luck kicks worked their magic. Nystrom, a right wing for the New York Islanders, scored at 3:40 of overtime Thursday night to give his team a series tying 3-2 victory over the Rangers.

Nystrom wasn't so sure. "Just standing there, waiting for it to come down, was one of the most anxious moments of my life. It seemed like a lifetime before it dropped." he said. "I guess I should have called for a fair catch.

Davidson, 30 feet from his goal and hopelessly out of the play, had similar thoughts. "But you can't call a time out and have a huddle, like in football," said the goaltender.

Nystrom awaited the disc's reentry, then surrounded it 10 feet from the vacant net. All that remained was the accurate shot that tied the best-ofseven series at two victories per team and gave the Islanders their third consecutive overtime triumph this season.

The Rangers, meanwhile, suffered their third loss in 11 playoff games this season - all of them in overtime.

"I guess we're just a 60-minute hockey team," mused Coach Fred Shero, not at all meaning what he said.

"Yeah," countered Rangers defenseman Dave Maloney, "but I can remember when we were a 10-minute hockey team."

They played 60-plus minutes Thursday night, most of them at breakneck speed. Rookie Rangers left wing Don Maloney scored twice, the second at 6:50 of the third period to tie the game.



LANDOVER, Md. (AP) - No matter how you spell relief, there's none in sight yet for Washington's defending National Baskethall Association champions

After struggling to eliminate the pesky Atlanta Hawks 4-3, the Bullets open another best-of-seven series against the San Antonio Spurs tonight in a battle for the Eastern Conference title. A sellout crowd of 19.035 is expected.

"Every step you take is a relief," said Washington Coach Dick Motta "We're happy to get away from Atlanta, but that doesn't mean San Antonio is going to be any easier.

NEW YORK (AP) - Fifty-eight performances and \$825,000 later, the first major bid to develop a Broadway audience from New York's big Hispanic community has ended in failure. "Zoot Suit" has closed.

But Bernard Jacobs, head of the powerful Shubert theater group that brought the Luis Valdez play-withmusic here from the West Coast, says he won't stop trying to develop that audience

"We learned a lot from this production," he says. "And we'll be back toiling in those woods again."

"Zoot Suit," still running in Los Angeles, is about pachucos, the Mexican-American youths in Los Angeles during World War II, and about the bigotry, hysteria and injustice of that era there

Performed by a primarily Hispanic cast in both English and Spanish, it premiered here March 25. It was preceded by heavy advance promotion in New York's sizeable community of Puerto Ricans, Cubans and other Latine groups

Jacobs estimates Hispanics account for about 30 per cent of New York's population of 7.2 million. Another estimate provided by the city's budget experts is much more conservative - 17.1 per cent.





Researcher calls radiation risks no panic cause

WASHINGTON (AP) - There is no evidence Americans should panic about radiation exposure, although tighter restrictions may be warranted, says the chairman of a major study on the health effects of radia-

Dr. Edward P. Radford of the University of Pittsburgh said Wednesday that the risks of radiation are real, apparently even at low doses. But the researcher, who favors tighter federal radiation guidelines, said the risks of cancer and death posed by such things as cigarette smoking are much greater than those posed by radia-

Radford's remarks accompanied the release of a major National Acad emy of Sciences report that says all low-level radiation apparetly increases the incidence of cancer and genetic defects.

But the study group said the risks of everyday exposure from sources of low-level radiation such as cosmic rays, medical X-rays and nuclear power still are relatively low.

The report released Wednesday confirmed the conclusions of a similar 1972 academy study that assumed there is no threshold below which radiation ceases to have adverse effects on humans.

The new study said Americans, on average, get about 100 millirems of radiation exposure a year from natural background sources, such as cosmic rays, rocks and building materi-

People get another 70 to 80 millirems per year from medical sources, such as X-rays and radioactive diagnostic materials. Exposure from other sources, such as nuclear power generation, are far less than this and relatively minor, the report said

Radford said at a briefing that present danger from radiation is not so great that people should become paranoid about it, even in light of the recent Three Mile Island nuclear power plant accident in Pennsylva-

"I don't think that the present alarm about radiation is entirely justified." he said.

Radford said that about 1 percent to 3 percent of the cancer detected each year is caused by background radiation and about 0.5 percent to 2 percent is caused by medical radiation.

Projecting over the lifetime of the present population, Radford said, additional annual exposure over the approximately 100 millizzms from background sources would result in an additional 2,400 to 9,400 cancers per million women and 1,200 to 4,200 additional cancers per million men

Dr. Dean R. Parker, professor emeritus of genetics at the University of California, said an exposure of ,000 millirems throughout the popu lation theoretically would result in an increase of five to 75 additional serious genetic disorders per million live births However, this added risk is small in reaserch. relation to the current estimate of serious human genetic disorders of 107,000 per million live births, he said. The Committee on the Biological Effects on Ionizing Radiation, which said prepared the study, said women appeared to be more vulnerable to cancer and men to genetic defects from radiation exposure. It also said younger people — those under 35 years old — appeared to face a greater relative risk than to older persons. OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - Jane Fonda wanted it, but two young UCLA graduate film students got it.

Miss Fonda went on to make "The China Syndrome," a nuclear power plant thriller that Buzz Hirsch and Larry Cano consider "one huge advertisement" for their project -The Karen Silkwood Story

Miss Silkwood, 28, died in an auto accident Nov. 13, 1974. She allegedly was gathering documentation for charges against the nuclear fuel plant where she worked, and was en route to meet a New. York Times reporter to turn over the information when the crash occurred.

The documents that witnesses say she was carrying never were found. Bruce Gilbert, Miss Fonda's partner in IPC Films, said in 1974, during negotiations for rights to the Silkwood story, he and Miss Fonda had problems getting agreements with all of the principal characters in the story, and encountered several legal entanglements.

"That made us decide it would drag on so long we would never get a movie made." Gilbert said in a telephone interview from Los Angeles.

"At that point we made a decision to go back to the original idea, which was to do a fictional story with nuclear power as the background," he said

For Hirsch, 34, and Cano, 29, patience was a big reward. When agree ments signed by some of the principals with a magazine expired, the UCLA grad students moved.

The two flew to Nederland, Texas, to meet with Miss Silkwood's father. Bill Silkwood, and went camping with him. Silkwood said he was interested in the idea of a movie about his daughter, but wanted to be cautious about who he authorized to do it.

Two ABC executives who recently brought "Friendly Fire," starring Carol Burnett and Ned Beatty, to television are working with Hirsch, Cano and their producers on the Silkwood story

There is no rush to get the movie made while the nuclear industry is in the headlines, he said. "It's a good story and a good story is timeless,' Hirsch said.







# Negotiations started Plowback supported

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) - Republican presidential hopeful John Connally said Thursday he doesn't feel the major oil companies are gouging the public, despite reports of quarterly profits up as much as 300 percent.

Connally said he doesn't believe the oil giants should be penalized for high profits through special taxes, but added that he would support a requirement that they plow the money back into further exploration for energy resources.

"I don't want to make a case for the oil companies," the Texas Republican told reporters. But he said analysis of the 27 oil companies' total financial picture showed that return on equity last year actually trailed manufacturing.

He chided President Carter for federal policies which failed to control runaway inflation, saving the best way to battle inflation was to increase productivity, not tax business.

"We don't need more taxes." he said, "We need more energy.

On another subject, Connally said the accident at the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant near Harrisburg, Pa., had not changed his opinion that the nation should continue development of atomic energy.

He said oil, coal and nuclear power are the three energy sources the nation will rely on for the remainder of the century and their development is essential "if we are not to live; in bondage to the OPEC nations." Connally, here for a GOP fund-raiser, was scheduled to meet Friday morning in Springfield with Gov. James Thompson and Republican legislators.

# Wild well still burning

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Wild well experts were working on two plans today to control a flaming natural gas well in marshes south of New Orleans

Max Hebert, a spokesman for Texaco Inc. which owns the well, said thedamaged drilling barge would be removed to permit direct access to the well, and another drilling rig would be set up.

Preparations were made Thursday to remove the drilling barge from the wellhead, Hebert said.

"This must be done before anything else can be accomplished in extinguishing the fire," he said.

it will die. One modification that seems to be gaining support would impose a three-car cap on coupon eligibility, said House assistant Democratic leader John Brademas, D-Ind

As submitted to Congress, the president's plan would allocate gasoline during serious fuel shortages based on the number of registered vehicles in a household. Critics say this would give people

who can afford many cars an automatic advantage over those who can't. They also argue that cars could be rescued from junk heaps and qualify for coupons.

Some people were even calling the president's plan the 'used car dealer's relief bill," joked Brademas.

Brademas also predicted as likely a provision aimed at appeasing western states' House and Senate members by guaranteeing extra gasoline rations to states where gasoline use is heavy - often because of long driving distances and tourism.

Brademas said various ways are being considered to permit changes designed to win support - including possible resubmission of the plan with modifications. A 1975 law severely limits the possibility for amendment to the Carter proposal, Brademas said.

The rationing plan is seen only as a last resort during times of severe fuel shortages, such as another Arab oil embargo. The president says its availability is "imperative" for the nation's energy future.

The House Commerce Committee rejected the plan earlier this week, but agreed to send it to the House floor without a recommendation.

Meanwhile, House Ways and Means Chairman Al Ullman, D-Ore., formally introduced Carter's "windfall prof

its" tax in the House Thursday. But he said the plan is only "a starting point" and his committee may decide to strengthen it - as House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill has

advocated Ullman announced hearings on the tax would begin May 9.

The oil discoveries included six in North Texas, four in the Midland area, three near Refugio, two each in South Texas and East Texas and one each in the San Angelo and Lubbock areas.

The wildcat gas wells included 11 in South Texas, six each in the San Antonio and Refugio areas, five in Southeast Texas, four in East Texas, two each in West Central and North Texas and one each in East Central Texas and near San Angelo.

Through April, the commission said, Texas operators have reported 151 oil discoveries, six more than in the first four months of 1978. There have been 462 gas discoveries, 160 more than at this time a year ago.



**DOE** law enforcement inadequate, says Durkin

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Department of Energy's inadequate enforcement of a 1973 law has led to major fraud in the repricing of crude oil, says Sen. John A. Durkin.

"I think it is the most serious indictment of mismanagement by (Energy) Secretary (James) Schlesinger and the people he has surrounded himself with," Durkin, D-N.H., said Thursday night.

The senator, a persistent Schlesinger critic, based his assessment on a draft report by the General Accounting Office.

He quoted the draft report as saying the department and its predecessor agencies consistently dragged their feet in sending cases of apparent criminal conduct to the Justice Department, with delays so severe in some instances that they made prosecution impossible.

The accounting office, an investigative arm of Congress, acted at Durkin's request to study DOE's handling of the law passed to prevent oil-price gouging.

Ed Vilade, an Energy Department spokesman, said the agency would have no comment until the final accounting office report is issued.

Schlesinger has headed the Department of Energy since its creation as a Cabinet agency in August 1977, but Durkin said he has done little in 18 months to spur oil price investigations.

# Station owners plan

NEW YORK (AP) - Buying gasoline the weekend of May 17-20 may be difficult in many parts of the nation if service station owners are successful in their plans for a "gasless weekend" to protest feheral controls on their prices.

The idea originated in California, where most dealers are expected by industry officials to participate, and since has spread to other states, including Connecticut, Illinois, Idaho, Iowa, Washington, Nevada, Louisiana and Arizona, according to officials of state dealer associations.

It is unclear, however, just how many dealers nationwide might participate in the proposed closing.

('If something isn't forthcoming rom the Department of Energy, many dealers may join the movement," said Charles Matties, who operates an Exxon station in West Hartford. Conn.

In one of the eight cases, the statute of limitations ran out last Jan. 31 and in another it will expire May 11.

-The Energy Department refused to recognize that Congress gave the Justice Department responsibility for determining whether conduct actually is a crime and should be prosecuted. Delays were caused by DOE going too far in its own investigations before referring apparent criminal activities to the Justice Department. No cases were referred in 1974 through 1977.

On Wednesday, the agency accused seven major oil companies of overcharging their customers nearly \$1.7 billion during a 5½-year period and said the money should be refunded.

However, Durkin said the department timed the announcement to counteract the GAO report, which is

due to be released soon.



WASHINGTON (AP) - After talking for months about asking Congress to authorize changes in the dairy price support formula, Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland says now he has second thoughts.

The current formula uses a "parity index" that reflects production costs of farmers generally, not just dairy farmers. Bergland has said he thought it unfairly took into account some production costs that milk producers actually do not incur.

But Bergland told reporters Thursday he is now undecided on what to recommend and indicated the current formula has some strong points.

One of the farm production items in the parity index that is used in adjusting milk price supports - the amount farmers are guaranteed by USDA for what they produce - is feeder cattle, the lightweight animals bought by farmers and feedlot operators to fatten into slaughter cattle for the beef market

# Ribicoff won't run in 1980

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) - Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, saying he has always admired men who know how to "go out at the top of their careers," is stepping out of the 1980 race for the U.S. Senate.

The three-term, 69-year-old Democrat's decision has left a new generation of Connecticut politicians jockeying for position.

"I'm very, very interested," Rep. Christopher J. Dodd, D-Conn., 34, told reporters shortly after Ribicoff's announcement Thursday i Washington. Rep. Toby Moffett, D-Conn., called the notion of becoming a U.S. senator "tempting.

"I have no preference at all," said Ribicoff, "and I will not declare a preference.

Ribicoff parlayed two terms in the U.S. House of Representatives in the 1950s into a successful campaign for governor. He was governor for six years, and after supporting the candidacy of President John F. Kennedy. Ribicoff became secretary of health, education and welfare in the Kennedy administration.

"In 1970 when we got him we thought he was old," Ziegler said. "At the Bronx Zoo, they had estimated his life expectancy by using his size and metabolism rate, but it wasn't conclusive.

Ziegler said Bronx's longevity may have something to do with the sunny, warm Miami climate, which is close to that of Bronx's native Africa

# Bergland's thinking again

Bergland has used feeder cattle as an example of why he thought the parity index should be modified, perhaps stripped of all non-dairy-related cost items.

He now says, however, that if the non-dairy index items were removed "we would automatically increase the weighting of feed in the price support formula.

Bergland said that would result in a formula "a good deal more volatile" then the one in current use because the parity ratio would rise and fall more easily, meaning the support might rise and then have to be reduced six months later, only to rise again six months after that.

"For these kinds of reasons, I'm tending to think that probably it would be prudent to leave it as it is, Bergland said.

Asked if he had decided firmly to leave the support formula unchanged, Bergland said, "At this point, I tend to that side, but I'm still looking at evidence and listening to arguments.

Bergland said he met Monday with. some members of Wisconsin's congressional delegation, including Sen. Gaylord Nelson and Reps. Alvin Baldus, David Obey and Robert W. Kastenmeier to talk over the dairy situation.

The meeting, he said, was at their request and did not involve any jawboning about the dairy price support program.

"I have not encountered any political pressure from them or anybody else as to the business of uncoupling some of the non-dairy components of the price support formula," Bergland said

Bergland said USDA analysts expect a "greater likelihood of a dairy shortage than a surplus" over the next year and a half, generally speaking. No one, he said, is forecasting a

# Mobile missile plan may face problems

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter's \$265. million request for full-scale development of a new mobile missile may face serious problems in Congress because of House efforts to impose an overall udget ceiling.

Funds for the weapon, known as the MX mobile missile, were included in a \$2.1 billion defense bill approved by the Senate Thursday and sent to the House

But House budget writers refused to leave room for Carter's request in a proposed version of a congressional budget ceiling. The full House still is considering the budget measure, but one earlier attempt on the floor to include the funds was reject-

Carter wants a total of \$935 million for the MX \$265 million in fiscal 1979 and the remainder in fiscal 1980. The missile, which will become a mainstay of the nation's nuclear arsenal in the mid 1980s, is expected to eventually cost up to \$30 billion.

It is being designed to replace the 1,054 Minutemen intercontinental ballistic missiles which are fixed in underground concrete silos.

Defense planners warn that the Minutemen will become vulnerable to Soviet attack in the 1980s, and the nation needs a mobile missile that i less vulnerable, bigger and more accurate.

In approving the defense bill Thursday, the Senate overrode objections from White House budget planners and voted 56-32 to spend \$1.3 billion to buy four destroyers that were ordered by Iran in 1974 but canceled after the ouster of Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi.

Deng at 74 is impatient to get China moving. Regarded as a realist, he figures that a nation with 850 million people to feed cannot afford the luxury of politics - either the Maoist or the American human rights kind - if it is to make the concentrated effort it needs to succeed.

His critics argue that in shrugging off dogma and ideological training. China may achieve modernization but it could become capitalist rather than socialist, or communist.

It seems certain that there are personal as well as political differences between Deng and his rivals, but these are not permitted to come to the surface.

It appears likely that Deng has had to give ground to keep the leadership team intact and to avoid the showdown that might destroy both himself and the moderniza tion plan.

This would explain the decision to bring the modernization program to a sudden halt in the area of plant purchases and to crack down on individuals demanding human rights, U.S.style

The plant purchases, chiefly affecting Japan, were frozen to permit a new look at the entire industrialization plan, particularly its financing.
