





**Saccharin may prevent cavities**  
 NEW YORK (AP) — The artificial sweetener saccharin, long thought to promote less tooth decay than sugar, may actively prevent cavities even in diets rich in sugar, a dental researcher said Friday.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Americans should leave their cars home one day a week to help ease gasoline shortages that will last at least through the summer of 1980, a Carter administration energy official told Congress Friday.

However, David J. Bardin, head of the Energy Department's Economic Regulatory Administration, stopped short of endorsing legislation to accomplish this goal.

He said there is a limit to what government can do to ease long gasoline lines. Motorists can make a bigger contribution simply by driving less, the official said.

"Leave your car home one day a week and we will get through it," Bardin told a joint hearing of two House subcommittees investigating the current gas shortages.

At the White House, press secretary Jody Powell said he had not heard President Carter express any opinion on the driveless day proposal.

Powell did say, however, that he understood the proposal could not be a substitute for the standby rationing plan which the president proposed and which the House killed.

While not specifically mentioning legislation which seems to be gaining support in Congress to mandate a one-day-a-

week driveless plan, Bardin's comments put the administration on record in support of the general idea.

Bardin also said motorists should use more public transportation where available, carpool to work and "consolidate errands."

However, he also said that constraints on motorists shouldn't be too stringent. "Let's not stay home. Let's not shut the country down," he said.

Bardin said the gasoline crunch will probably last until October. And it will repeat itself again in the summer of 1980, he said.

"The gasoline shortage is real," Bardin testified, "because the planet Earth has been producing less crude oil than all the people want."

He blamed the shortage largely on the nation's three-month loss of Iranian crude oil and, to a lesser extent, on the lack of enough U.S. refineries to handle increasing demand for gasoline and heating oil.

Bardin also acknowledged that the cumbersome federal allocation system being used by refiners to distribute gasoline to retail dealers is contributing to the severity of the current West Coast shortages. But he said misallocation of supplies is not the sole cause for the long lines in California as some critics are contending.

Bardin testified at a hearing held jointly by two subcommittees of the House Commerce Committee seeking information on the current shortages.

The inquiry is mainly concerned with whether the shortages are real and whether motorists are being overcharged

for gasoline as a result, said Rep. Bob Eckhardt, D-Texas., chairman of the investigations and oversight subcommittee.

The overall outlook for this summer and beyond "is not a very bright picture," said Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., chairman of the energy and power subcommittee.

On gasoline prices, Bardin said that while the Energy Department is pursuing several thousand cases involving alleged overcharges, only a fraction of the nation's 187,000 service stations are being audited.

"There is no quick and easy way to determine if an individual station is in compliance," Bardin said.

He said, however, that since February, 7,000 letters have been sent to gas stations suspected of charging unusually high prices, another 2,000 stations are "targeted for onsite investigation" and 847 station owners have been cited.

There have been reports from California of overcharges as high as 24 cents a gallon over the posted price, Bardin said. The energy official

draw generally skeptical responses from members of the two subcommittees.

Rep. Albert Gore Jr., D-Tenn., an outspoken critic of administration energy policy, said that by not routinely auditing gasoline stations, the department has fostered a climate that makes it easy to overcharge consumers.

And Rep. Carlos J. Moorhead, R-Calif., said the agency should do more to help ease California gas lines directly.

**NRC OKs reopenings**

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Nuclear Regulatory Commission said Friday that some atomic power plants shut down for improvements after the Three Mile Island accident can resume operation.

The commission followed staff recommendations that enough safety improvements have been made for Duke Power Co. to operate its three Oconee reactors at Lake Keowee, S.C.

NRC staff members said improvements have moved swiftly at eight nuclear plants designed by Babcock & Wilcox Co., which designed the Three Mile Island plant, near Harrisburg, Pa.

The commission on April 27 ordered that the plants either close or stay out of operation until they were reviewed because the Babcock & Wilcox systems seemed sensitive to malfunctions and hard to control. Oconee Unit 1 was allowed to continue operating temporarily.

Harold Denton, NRC director of reactor regulation, said Friday that Oconee Unit 1 would have had to shut down Saturday if the commission had not lifted its previous order.

# Beef prices rise in April, but not as fast as earlier

WASHINGTON (AP) — Retail beef prices rose 3.1 percent in April, but it was the smallest increase of the year, new government figures showed Friday.

Also, the Agriculture Department said, retail pork prices dropped an average of 4 percent last month. That was the sharpest drop in pork prices in about two and a half years.

Farmers have stepped up hog production this year and their market prices have dropped sharply.

But the beef supply depends on much longer breeding and growth cycles for cattle and it will be several years before production is able to match demand again.

The April decline was the second in a row for retail pork prices, following a dip of 0.1 percent in March. According to department records, the 4 percent drop was the sharpest since retail pork prices dropped 5.9 percent in Nov. 1976.

Prices of U.S. Choice-grade beef averaged a record of almost \$2.33 a pound on an all-cut basis in April, compared to slightly less than \$2.26 in March.

Last December, beef averaged less than \$1.97 a pound and then rose 5.8 percent to almost \$2.05 in January, 5.1 percent to more than \$2.15 in February, and 4.9 percent to about \$2.26 in March.

Compared with \$1.76 a year earlier, the April price of \$2.33 a pound was up by 32.3 percent.

The all-cut April average of pork in retail stores was slightly less than \$1.51 a pound, down from almost \$1.57 in March and more than \$1.57 in February. The all-time high for pork was more than \$1.58 a pound in October 1975.

# New Exxon device results in savings

NEW YORK (AP) — Exxon Corp. on Friday unveiled a new electronic device that it said would provide "significant" energy savings for electric motors.

The device — called an alternating current synthesizer — would allow the speed of fairly large industrial alternating-current electric motors to be varied efficiently. The company said small-scale test applications of the system have produced savings in power costs of as much as 50 percent.

Exxon, the nation's largest oil company, predicted that by 1990 the synthesizers could produce a savings of equal to 1 million barrels of oil daily — about 6 percent of current oil consumption.

"We are dealing with a technology that we are convinced will result in a significant saving," said Joseph Graves, senior vice president of Exxon-Enterprises' energy group. Exxon Enterprises is a division of the company set up to explore non-oil business ventures.

Exxon said it planned to acquire Reliance Electric Co. to help it market the new technology. The Cleveland-based maker of electrical components and systems grossed nearly \$1 billion last year.

Large oil companies have come under fire in recent years for diversifying into non-oil areas. Exxon President Howard C. Kaufmann said the development of the energy-saving technology and the acquisition of Reliance would "not have an impact on our investment in refining capacity or (oil) production."

# Deficit lowest since 1974

WASHINGTON (AP) — House and Senate negotiators agreed Friday on a 1980 target budget that would cut the federal deficit to \$23 billion — \$5.4 billion below President Carter's goal and the lowest deficit figure since 1974.

The House-Senate conferees also projected a budget surplus of between \$2.1 billion and \$5.6 billion in 1981.

The target budget, which still must be approved by the full House and Senate, calls for \$532 billion in spending in fiscal 1980, which starts Oct. 1, with revenues of \$509 billion during the year.

The president had proposed a \$532.3 billion spending level on revenues of \$503.9 billion for a deficit of \$28.4 billion.

The House-Senate conferees reached compromises on their major differences over defense spending and job programs late Friday afternoon when the House negotiators largely accepted the Senate's higher level of defense spending.

The conference approved \$124.2 billion for defense, just slightly below the Senate's figure of \$124.3 billion. The House had favored spending \$123.5 billion on defense.

The House conferees also reduced their demand for education and job money by \$800 million while the Senate increased its figure for that budget function by \$600 million.

The conferees also compromised on revenue sharing, approving funds for state general revenue sharing, which was opposed by the House, as part of an agreement to allot money for Carter's targeted fiscal assistance to cities, a program opposed by the Senate.

The projected \$23 billion deficit for fiscal 1980 is more than \$10 billion below Congress' estimate.

ed \$33.4 billion deficit for fiscal 1979. Carter proposed a \$28.4 billion deficit in his 1980 budget. The 1974 deficit was \$4.6 billion.

Much of the difference in the congressional deficit figure comes from increased revenue estimates that reflect the higher-than-expected rate of inflation and the deletion of the president's "real wage insurance" program, a part of Carter's campaign against inflation.

That program, which would have partly protected the pay of workers who cooperated with the president's 7 percent wage hike guidelines, would have cost at least \$2.5 billion, according to the administration.

The House and Senate also projected budget surpluses for fiscal 1981, which starts Oct. 1, 1980, and fiscal 1982. However, they disagreed on precisely how much of a surplus would result. The House conferees predicted a \$2.1 billion surplus in fiscal 1981 while the Senate put its surplus estimate at \$5.6 billion.

The Senate also forecast a tax cut in fiscal 1982 and a surplus of \$4.1 billion. The House, not including a tax cut, set its projected 1982 surplus at \$32.6 billion.

The target budget sets spending goals for broad categories of government programs. After it is adopted, congressional committees use the target amounts in determining appropriations for specific programs.

Late in the summer, Congress will review the target figures, revise them and make them permanent spending levels just before the new fiscal year begins on Oct. 1.

# UTPB nears new funds source

**AUSTIN BUREAU** — University of Texas Permian Basin has come one step closer to cashing in on the multimillion dollar Permanent University Fund. By a 101 to 36 vote, House members approved a constitutional amendment that will spread the wealth of PUF

to UTPB as well as abolishing the 10 cent state ad valorem tax and creating a new constitutional fund for 16 free-standing, state-supported senior colleges. PUF is a multimillion dollar land endowment. Proceeds from mineral leases of the land, now approaching \$70 million a year, are earmarked for funding construction at selected UT and Texas A&M campuses. UTPB is not among the designated campuses, but would be under the provisions of SJR 7. Like the version already approved by the Senate, the House version abolishes the 10 cent tax, which has been used to finance construction at the designated colleges that are not part of either the UT or A&M systems. In place of the tax, which is under legal challenge, SJR 7 authorizes creation of a State Higher Education Assistance Fund (SHEAF) to finance construction at the 16 schools and their component institutions. The version approved by the House differs from the Senate version in the formula used to distribute the money among the schools.

Senators called for a formula based 75 percent on projected enrollments over the next ten years and 25 percent on actual need. Over the objections of House sponsor Rep. Al Brown of San Antonio, House members changed the formula to 60 percent enrollment and 40 percent need for both the A&M system and the 16 SHEAF schools. House members rejected a similar change for the UT System, which would have affected UTPB. Under the amendment

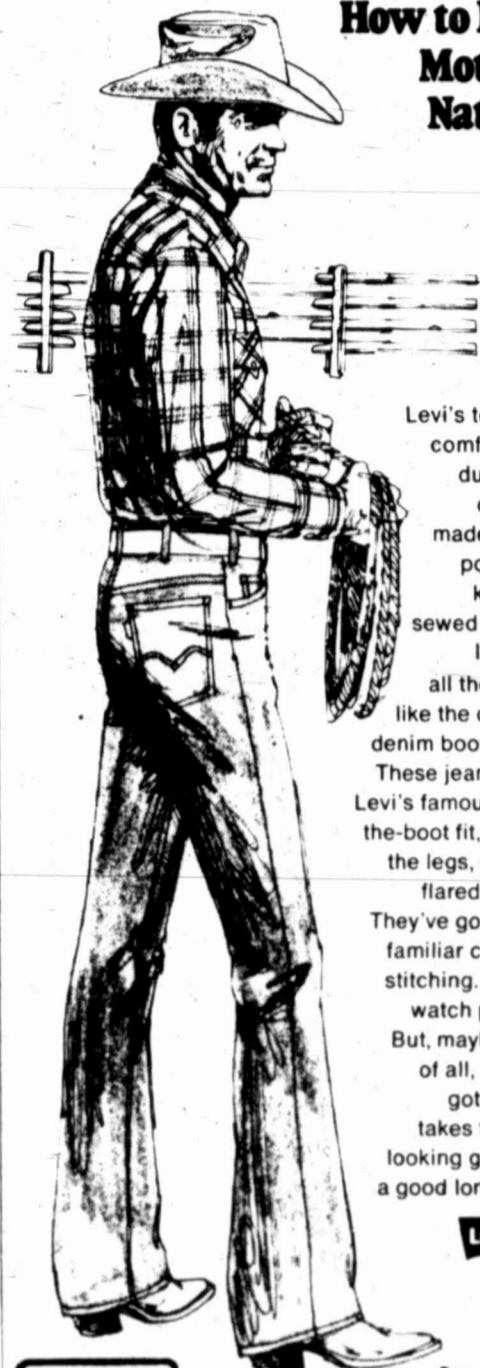
as approved, all UT institutions would be brought under PUF and be able to use the fund's proceeds to secure bonds issued for building construction, to acquire educational equipment such as computers, and to pay for library books and materials. Unless senators concur in the new distribution formula and three other floor amendments added by the House, the proposed amendment will go to a conference committee where the differences will be ironed out.

# 'Brother Roloff' bill may have been killed in House

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The "Brother Roloff" bill, exempting child care institutions from state regulation if children are placed in their custody by court order, received a possibly fatal blow Friday in the Texas House. Representatives voted 78-59 to postpone the bill to May 26, two days before the regular legislative session ends. "I want to kill it!" said Rep. Froy Salinas, D-Lub-

bock, who made the motion. Under House rules, no bill may be brought up on second reading — the status of the Roloff Bill — in the final 72 hours of the session, which ends at midnight May 28. Rep. Mike Ezzell, D-Snyder, a sponsor of the bill (HB554), said an attempt to persuade representatives to reconsider their decision to postpone the bill was "a possibility."

## Chiles doesn't care if he's confirmed

DALLAS (AP) — Eddie Chiles is not mad at sensitive state senators who are balking at confirming his nomination as regent of North Texas State University. He doesn't care whether they confirm him or not.

Chiles, the conservative boss of The Western Co. in Fort Worth, regularly tweaks politicians through a series of radio spots that urge voters to "fire" lawmakers who fail to perform according to the standards of those voters. The spots often begin with an announcer asking, "Who are you mad at today, Eddie Chiles?"

When Gov. Bill Clements nominated him to the board of regents, Chiles' spots quickly came into play, and at least one senator got mad.

"He (Chiles) doesn't have the ability to guide the minds of our youth," said Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur.

Right on, said Chiles in a telephone interview Friday.

"No, I don't think I have the ability to guide the minds of our youth," said the 69-year-old Chiles. "But I would try to help organize the university so it would be a place where that could be done by the proper people."

"His (Chiles) ads cast a slur on almost every elected official in the nation," charged Parker.

Aw, come on, said Chiles. "I have no intention of doing that." Chiles said. "If it's interpreted that way, it's accidental. I don't think I ever singled out any party or any particular group of people. It's just the liberal-socialist philosophy against the conservative philosophy. I do hit at big spenders and high taxes."

"If that's what he's talking about, I do that of course."

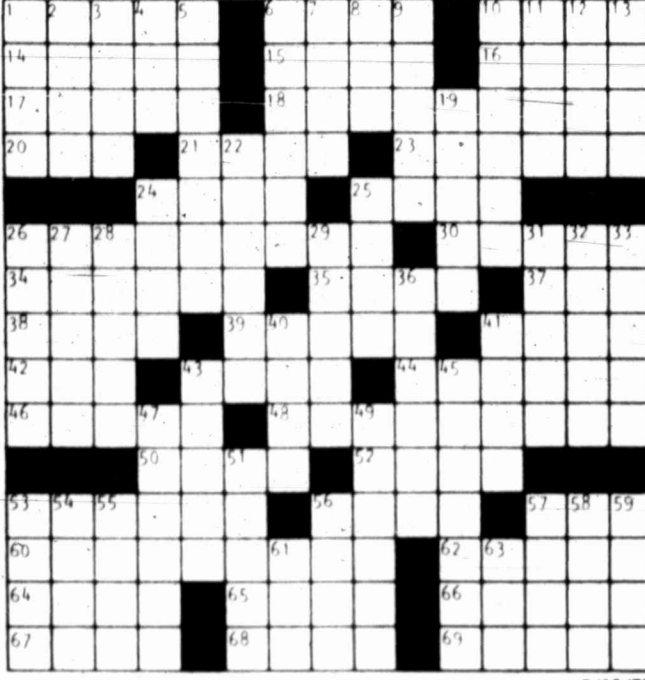

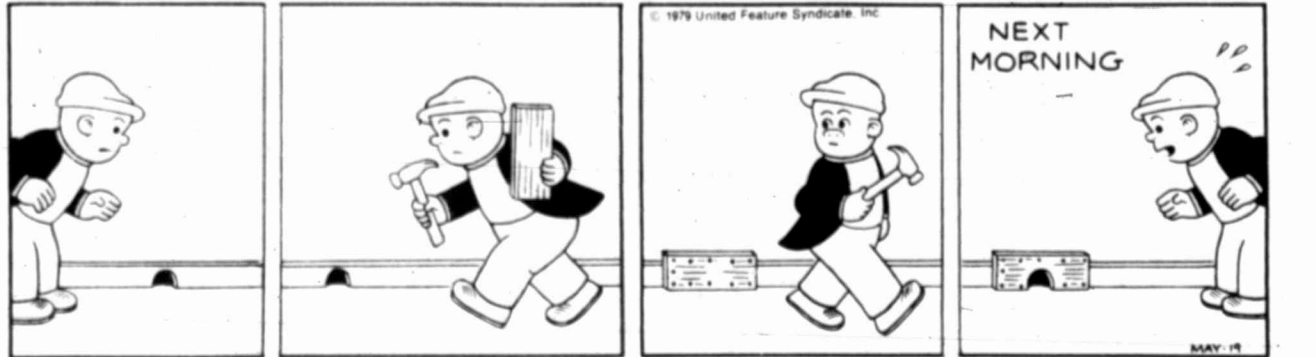

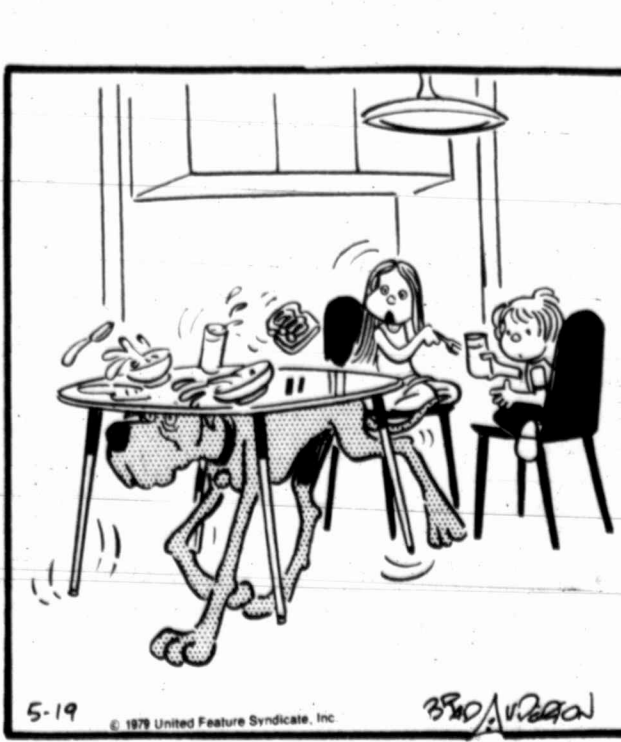

# Norse penny blamed

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — A University of Iowa anthropologist says he thinks the famous Norse Penny, the oldest documented coin ever found in America, may be linked to a 900-year-old murder.

The penny was found 18 years ago in an ancient Indian shell heap in Maine.

"I suppose that about the only way a Norseman would give up a penny like that would be if he were killed or something," said Marshall McKusick.

"That is, coins were so scarce on Greenland (where there were many Scandinavian settlements) that not one example of a Norse penny of any period has been found," he said.

McKusick already has had two articles published nationally on the coin's significance and will soon publish a third on his latest findings.

If East produced the ace of hearts at the first trick he would continue the suit. You would take the third heart trick, and then West would be your enemy.

You would therefore cash the ace of diamonds and lead the nine of diamonds for a finesse. Here also you are safe if the finesse loses and even better off if it succeeds.

### DAILY QUESTION

Partner opens with one spade, and the next player passes. You hold: S-J642; H-AJ974; D-62; C-95. What do you say?

**ANSWER:** Bid two spades. Your hand is not quite strong enough to bid a suit of your own first and raise spades later. If the jack of hearts were the king you would bid two hearts.

# New rules offered for flying smokers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Civil Aeronautics Board proposed new smoking rules for airlines Friday, suggesting that pipe and cigar smokers be separated from non-smokers by at least seven rows of seats.

Also among the new proposals are rules that would establish a buffer zone of at least one row between smoking and non-smoking sections. The proposed regulations also would require cigar and pipe smokers to sit by air vents or at the back of the plane and would require smokers to be separated from non-smokers by a partition.

Other proposals being considered would require smokers to extinguish cigars and pipes on request, ban cigar and pipe smoking on domestic flights, prohibit all smoking on aircraft with 30 seats or less or on flights of one hour or less.

The public and the airline industry have until Aug. 20 to comment on the proposed smoking rules. The public may write the CAB at Civil Aeronautics Board, Washington, D.C., 20428. After that the CAB will decide whether to implement any of them.

The only existing restriction on smoking in airliners is a CAB regulation requiring airlines to segregate smokers and non-smokers. Any airline could ban smoking on its own, a board spokesman said. But the majority of CAB members has made clear it will not order such a ban.

A final CAB rule issued in January ordered airlines to take precautions to ensure that non-smokers are not subjected to unreasonable amounts of cigar and pipe smoke. But that rule was left vague to give the airlines time to experiment with solutions to the smoking problem. The CAB said it would propose detailed rules later.

# Pope prays for peace

MONTE CASSINO, Italy (AP) — Pope John Paul II prayed that the world be spared the de-

struction of war Friday as he walked amid the graves of more than 1,000 Polish soldiers killed in the Allied assault on this hilltop Benedictine abbey during World War II.

The Polish-born pontiff said Mass at a permanent altar erected near the Monte Cassino Abbey to mark the 35th anniversary of the battle, scene of some of the war's most ferocious fighting. Polish forces stormed the abbey and cleared the way for an advance to Nazi-occupied Rome.

# Ma Bell hangs up on dating game

PARIS (AP) — The telephone company has squelched a do-it-yourself electronic dating service for French lonely hearts, stamping out what it called "unofficial exploitation of the telephone system."

A whining sound has been installed on a telephone circuit that gives the exact time every 10 seconds. The whine prevents hundreds of people from shouting their names and phone numbers to each other in the silence between each recorded announcement.

According to phone company officials, subscribers calling for the right time often would hear a babble of voices on the line. What they heard went something like this:

"It is 23 hours, 12 minutes and 20 seconds...hello out there, this is Francois, I'm lonely, any feminine voices on the line?...It is 23 hours, 12 minutes and 40 seconds...Veronique here, Francois, call me at 326 91 93...it is 23 hours and 13 minutes...Got it. Hang up Veronique, I'm dialing you now...it is 23 hours, 13 minutes and 20 seconds..."

The clandestine dial-a-date network became so well known in Paris that Frenchmen refer to it simply as "Le Reseau" — "The Network." Such Networks have operated since the dawn of the telephone age in France, but none was more popular

than "L'Horloge Parlante." — "The Speaking Clock."

One hundred persons were able to dial The Speaking Clock simultaneously, and sometimes the network would draw up to a dozen people into group discussions.


