#### Chavez trial commences By MARSHALL STINNETT Journal writer

A jury trial of Sonny Chavez, Manuel Flores and Arturo Esquivel for assualt on Estevan Sandoval was set to go to the jury on Wednesday after two days of testimony.

The State alleges that the defendants all struck Sandoval with bats and a four foot steel pipe on the evening of April 20, 2003 and that Sandoval was not armed at the time.

The defendants alleged Sandoval was armed with a knife and that Chavez was the only person who hit Sandoval.

Chavez admitted striking Sandoval twice with the pipe, breaking both of Sandoval's arms.

The incident took place at Chavez's body shop just off American Boulevard on West 19th Street.



The groundbreaking ceremony was held for the new Bailey County Jail Complex in Muleshoe on June 18.

Before the ceremony, the city hosted a free lunch on the courthouse lawn. Leal's Restaurant catered the lunch and Mayor Victor Leal said, "I cooked most of the food myself." According to Leal, about 150 people enjoyed fajitas with all the trimmings. Soft drinks and bottled water were served with the meal.

The meal was furnished by James Parkey, president of Corplan Corrections and design/construction manager of the project, and the underwriter, Michael

Parkey said, "This is a great turnout for a groundbreaking ceremony."

Special guests at the ceremony were Jerry Hicks, former Bailey County sheriff; U.S. Marshall Ronny O'Neal, and Jim Warren, a DPS officer who was raised in Muleshoe. All three of the guests came from Lubbock for the ceremony. Judge Marilyn Cox said, "We were honored that they came." Also present was Rex Massey, senior project manager of Hale

The new jail will be across the street from the current sheriff's office on the 400 block of West Second Street. The 96 bed facility will measure 20,220 square feet. The new building will also accommodate the justice of the peace's office, the sheriff's office and a new handicap-accessible courtroom. Construction is scheduled to begin July 13 and is estimated to be completed within a year.



Once Upon a Time, the

Little Church Was a Church

remembered the name on the sign, didn't know what particular Baptist association the church had been affiliated with, and didn't particularly care, but he knew it had been a Baptist Church of very modest size which he probably would hardly have noticed at all except that he had performed a wedding there once upon a time.

He knew it had been a Baptist church. But, as he later drove down the freeway the other direction and paid close attention this time, he saw strange letters on the sign, and where the cross had been, a crescent moon. That church is now an Islamic Community Center.

Within spittin' distance from that particular point in the Phoenix freeway were once a number of Christian churches of varying flavors including two Baptist, one Church of Christ, and one Nazarene. Those churches would almost certainly disagree on some points of faith and practice

(mostly of the molehill variety and just maybe one or two mountains among the various pious peaks the various groups like to label as mountains), but they all are serious about honoring Christ. I happen to know some folks in that particular Church of Christ well enough to know that a few of them are so narrow, as one old preacher said, a gnat could stand on the bridge of their nose and kick out both eyes with one foot. Some of them are, well, a bit hardheaded, but I imagine the Baptist and Nazarene folks across the freeway well balance them with a few counterpart hardheads of their own.

I promise you, though, that each of those churches and their members are there because they want to honor the Lord Jesus and lift up the cross of Christ in that community.

And now there is one less church. And one less sign with a cross. And one less group meeting to honor Christ.

That, my friends, is a loss to more Christians than just Baptists. God help us not to be so willfully blind that we fail to see that!

I don't doubt for a moment that among Muslims, Buddhists, Hindus, etc., are some fine people. I don't share their beliefs, but they are not the "enemy." The Apostle Paul makes it clear that Christ's people fight only against Satan and his dark forces, not against a foe of flesh and blood. If we "conquer" anyone, the "battle" is to be won by love.


But Christians of all stripes should be eternally grateful and actively and vocally thankful for anyone and any group who strive to honor Christ. I'm so thankful for all here who do!

# Cotton farmers eligible for failed-acre credit

Many High Plains farmers have felt the effects of recent storms reflected in elimination of cotton as their production crop for the 2003 growing season.

Cotton farmers in each of the five eradication zones on the High Plains who have failed their cotton crop for whatever reason may be eligible for a credit against their assessment if they certify the crop as failed with their local Farm Service Agency office by July 15, according to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation.

The same policy is in force as the one that was in place during the 2002 growing season.

The commissioner of agriculture has approved giving growers in these zones a full credit against the assessment for failed acres, provided all plants in the fields have been destroyed

by the July 15 date, and also provided thefields are kept free of cotton plants capable of supporting weevil feeding and reproduction for the remainder of the growing season.

The five High Plains Eradication Zones that this applies to are: Northwest Plains (Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro, Bailey, Lamb and parts of Randall counties); Northern High Plains (Swisher, Briscoe, Hale, Floyd, and parts of Randall and Armstrong counties); Southern High Plains (Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby and parts of Dickens, Terry, Lynn and Garza counties); Westen High Plains (Yoakum, Gaines, Andrews, and parts of Terry and Lynn counties); Permian Basin (Dawson, Martin, Howard, Ector and parts of Borden and Midland counties).

A spokesperson for the

Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation says that Foundation personnel will keep watch on failed fields to ensure they remain free of cotton and will report any field out of compliance to the farmer and to the Foundation's Assessments Department in Abilene.

Fields that have not been kept free of cotton throughout the growing season do not qualify for the credit.

Growers with questions about the failed-acre credit should contact their local boll weevil office or foundation Headquarters in Abilene.


For the Coors, making art out of cowboy rope is a God thing - a ministry to share their faith, a way to transform themselves into more Godly beings and a reminder that God is always with us.



# Sorghum offers long-term benefits

LUBBOCK — Grain sorghum may prove to be an attractive alternative for cotton producers on the Texas High Plains whose cotton crops fell victim to recent storms and hail. The situation has many growers looking at alternative crops such as grain sorghum to replant in their fields.

Grain sorghum can offer long-term benefits to producers who traditionally grow cotton. Research con-

ducted near Brownfield, Texas, by Dr. Dan Krieg, agronomist at Texas Tech University, indicates that a crop rotation consisting of grain sorghum and cotton can increase cotton yields the following season by at least ten percent. Krieg also has found that rotating sorghum with cotton can have positive impacts on sorghum yields.






