Continued from A1 buildings and residential areas. Moths may remain in these areas for several days to a few weeks; however, when temperatures will move to higher elevations offering cooler temperatures and new sources of food, he

"The moths spend the summer in the Rocky Mountains then in late August and September they return to the Plains to mate and deposit eggs. The subsequent larvae can be a significant pest in wheat and alfalfa," said

Vandiver.

"Control of these moths is very difficult. Sealing cracks around doors, windows, attic access points, plumbing and electrical fixtures is the first step to managing them," Vandiver said. "I have observed moths entering homes by the handful through doors and attic entry points."

According to Vandiver, light management may help. Keep outside lights around doorways and windows to a minimum, draw the curtains, and keep unused inside lights off.

Chemical control methods may provide limited control, direct spray contact gives the best results but the treatment must be repeated, he said.

"It seems if you kill one moth two take its place. Homemade traps might be an option to capture moths which have invaded enclosed areas on a limited basis," Vandiver said.

"I have found the use of a shop vacuum is much cleaner way

from inside the home compared to simply contact Vandiver 'swatting,'" he said.
