The number of milk cows during February averaged 436 thousand head, up 11 thousand head from last year and up 1,000 head from the January 2012 number.

Production per cow averaged 1,835 pounds during February, 115 pounds more than last year but 65 pounds less than January 2012.

Milkproductioninthe 23 states participating in the monthly survey totaled 15.2 billion pounds, up 8.3 percent from production in these same states in February 2011.

January revised production, at 15.8 billion pounds, was up 3.9 percent from January 2011.

Production per cow during February averaged 1,782 pounds, 117 pounds above a year ago.


