Chavez, Esquivel and Flores found not guilty

It took the jury less than an hour to find Sonny Chavez, Arturo Esquivel and Manuel Flores not guilty of assault on Estevan Sandoval last Wednesday in a Bailey County courtroom.

There was a full day of testimony about the incident that took place in front of Chavez's body shop on Tuesday.

The shop, a small tin building, is located on the 100 block of south 20th Street just across the street from Town and Country #72.

Sandoval suffered two broken arms after Chavez admittedly hit him twice with a four foot steel pipe. Chavez claimed Sandoval came at him with a knife. Sandoval claimed he was not armed.

The state alleged that Flores and Esquivel also hit Sandoval with bats. Witnesses for Flores and Esquivel said that Chavez was the only person who hit Sandoval.

Board approves budget

The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees approved a budget for the coming school year with a \$109,889 budget deficit.

The board will adjust the budget when the final tax income is available in August.

The budget allows for \$10,269,723 in expenditures.

The board held a public hearing regarding the budget and proposed tax rate. Nobody showed up for the public hearing.

The board accepted the resignation of Susie Pierce-Perez, a junior high reading teacher.

The following changes were recommended and approved at DeShazo Elementary:

Brittni Black will move from Watson Junior High to Dillman as a first grade teacher;

Nelda Wilhite will move from Dillman Elementary to DeShazo Elementary as a fourth grade teacher;

Misti Lassiter will be hired for the reading position at Watson Junior High. Lassiter is coming from Dimmitt. She is a graduate of Muleshoe High School and West Texas A & M.

Rains flood county line northeast of Muleshoe

Severe storms brought one and sixteen hundredths of an inch of rain to Muleshoe early last Thursday morning causing low areas on roads to be flooded. The storm lasted approximately 30 minutes but brought high winds, marble-size hail and torrential rains. A tornado was also reported that same morning near the Tolk Station, but no damages were stated.

Burris Collision Center and Shipman's Body Shop were called out to assist in removing a pickup and car from a ditch on north U.S. Hwy 70

near the Bailey and Lamb County lines. The two vehicles were unavailable for comment. According to Jackey Wayne Burris of Muleshoe, a foot of water was running over the

road making it difficult to remove the vehicles and causing the towing crew to wait for the water to recede.

It was also reported by Gaylon Conner of Springlake that the same highway near Springlake was under approximately five feet of water, making it impossible for anyone to get through.

Since the last reported rainfall, Muleshoe has received an additional 1.25 inches of rain for a total of 7.35 inches for the month of June.

Traffic was stopped until the vehicles were removed from the area. Many people were forced to turn around.

Local police get vest grant

The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) will award a grant of \$4,928 to Muleshoe, under the Bulletproof Vest Partnership Program to help purchase eight vests, U.S. Senator John Cornyn announced today. The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) approved the payment for the purchase of body armor to help protect local law enforcement officers.

"These brave men and women risk their lives every day to defend our homes and families," Cornyn said in making the announcement. "Providing these grants to help defend them is the right thing to do, and a small way of showing our appreciation for all they do."

The legislation authorizing the grants mandates that priority in awarding grants be given to jurisdictions with populations under 100,000. As a result, all \$59 million in funding this year will be awarded

to grantees in smaller localities.

"I know from my own personal experience that law enforcement in Texas is the finest in the nation. I've been honored to work closely with so many of them, and appreciate all they do," Cornyn said. "Through my travels in the state, and the roundtables I've held with first responders in cities large and small, I'm confident that local, state, and federal authorities must work together as partners to support and protect this critical layer of our homeland security."

More than 6,500 applications for vest grants were submitted nationwide to the BJA this year, and more than 5,700 will be funded. The funds will be available next month. Federal payment can provide up to 50 percent of each jurisdiction's costs, including costs associated with purchasing and shipping the vests.

musical's history", Director of Marketing and Public Relations Sheila Blackburn said. Rodriguez's real-life husband, David, portrays her on-stage husband, Jorge.

"It's been well-received, and Hispanics are a big part of this region's history," Blackburn said of the Rodriguez's character. "Carmen's been just great — always full of enthusiasm, with a smile on her face all the time."

Originally from Muleshoe, Rodriguez has lived in Canyon 13 years, however, her family has lived in Texas for six generations. The musical takes place around 1886, a time which Rodriguez's family already lived in Texas.

So, for Rodriguez, a vocalist since age three, portraying Hinojosa is an honor.

"I feel very proud every time I step out on stage.

Being the first Hispanic, it's a little scary — getting the accent right and being dressed correctly. But I'm proud to have been chosen for the part." "She's a very spicy character, but also very loving," Rodriguez said laughing.

"The addition of diverse characters such as Hinojosa has meant an attraction to more diverse audiences," Rodriguez said. Many Hispanic and Mexican-Americans approach her at the end of the show and compli-

ment her on a job well done.

Rodriguez, currently working on a jazz and blues album with Grandma Gerber records, attended Texas Tech University and West Texas A&M University. She received a Montessori degree and worked in education.

She was performing with her husband in the WT Jazz Band when "Legacies" band director Steve Hilton saw her perform and asked her to perform with "Texas Express."

of the things they liked most about her. When she asked me, I thought about it for a while.

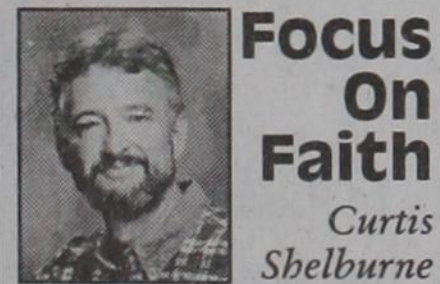
In my opinion, this adopted daughter of mine is so full of things to like that I hardly knew where to start.

Dear Editor:

Unadvertised redistricting meetings were held in several small groups last week, one of which was in Lubbock. I sent in a notice to your paper but it was not published. This is for rural West Texas a very important matter and can be looked at as a partisan issue because it is mainly designed to cut a number of democrats from the Texas legislature and has Tom Delay's hands all over it, even though redistricting was accomplished by the Supreme Court last year. However, more important, it is a Rural issue.

Many rural districts such as our 19th District will be redrawn to include the large cities. Ours will probably include Fort Worth, Tarrant County. We will never have a rural representative again, such as we have now from Lubbock in our newly elected representative Randy Neugabauer who is a republican, but will probably get the representative from Tarrant County and the heavily populated area included.

We in West Texas are barely acknowledged in the Texas Legislature (especially with our loss of Pete Laney, much less the U.S. Congress. If this plan goes through, be assured we will have

little chance of rural representation in the future.

After saying in 2001 that redrawing congressional lines during a special session would be "a waste of taxpayer's money," Perry flip-flopped (with Delay's urging) by calling a special session of the legislature to redraw congressional boundaries in the middle of the decade. In the regular session, the Republican redistricting plan needlessly divided up Texas, marooning rural voters in districts dominated

by suburban voters and cutting off urban voters from longstanding neighborhoods. Rural Texans, Hispanics and African-Americans all lose under the DeLay redistricting plan and it's going to cost the people of Texas \$1.7 million for this unnecessary special session. I hope that all rural West Texans will respond by calling our Texas Legislators to stop this effort to make the big cities King.

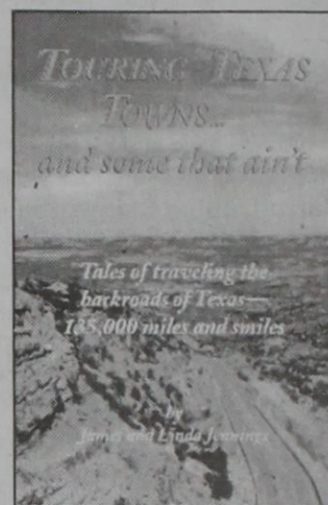
Book about small-town Texas to be debuted at Carolyn's opening gala
