Niehous released

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) -William Niehous, an Ohio businessman kidnapped from his Caracas home more than three years ago, has been released in a rural town about 350 miles from Caracas, a television station reported late Friday.

The Caracas station gave no further details and government officials were not immediately available for comment.

Temblor felt

BIG BEAR, Calif. (AP) - An earthquake - the second in less than 24 hours - jostled a large section of southern California Friday, shaking desks and rat-

tling windows. The temblor, which occurred at 5:34 p.m., registered 4.8 on the Richter scale and was centered just south of this resort community in the San Bernardino Mountains, a spokesman for the California Institute of Technology said.

The earthquake Thursday registered 4.4 on the Richter scale, and was also centered in Big Bear, 90 miles east of downtown Los Angeles.

MIAMI (AP) — A 12-member jury was seated late Friday to hear the trial of Theodore R. Bundy on charges of murdering two Florida State University sorority sisters.

The seating ended a week-long search for jurors that was hampered by widespread reporting about Bundy and the 1978 slay-

When defense attorney Robert Haggard and prosecutor Larry Simpson called a halt to eliminating jurors with challenges, Judge Edward D. Cowart swore in the seven men and five women and told them they would be sequestered during the

One alternate juror was seated Friday night and Cowart said he planned to convene court ond alternate.

Toon to tour

MOSCOW (AP) - U.S. Ambassador Malcolm Toon will make a speaking tour in the United States in mid-July in support of the new strategic arms limitation treaty signed with the Soviet Union, U.S. officials said Friday.

They added that Toon, who said earlier that he had doubts about whether the treaty was adequately verifiable, will go to Washington July 11 for consultations before beginning his tour.

The sources said Toon would not disclose why he was now ready to lend public support to SALT II, which faces a battle for Senate ratification.

Carter walks 'tightrope' in Korea

CAMP CASEY, South Korea (AP) and drizzle before units of the 31st - In his first public remarks in this authoritarian nation, President Carter said Saturday the United States stands for "basic human rights, and we also believe in standing by our allies.

During his 43-hour stay in South Korea Carter is walking a tightrope, trying to support President Park Chung-hee, a long-time ally, without endorsing his suppression of political

Carter flew in from Tokyo after winding up a seven-nation ecomomic summit, then spent the night at this American military post 13 miles from North Korea and set the pace for 120 troops on a three-mile jog at dawn

Then, after a ceremony that included a 21-gun salute, Carter stood in fog Infantry Division here. He said the United States is "fit to fight" - a motto of troops here - and is confident about preserving the peace.

He gave a clenched-fist salute to the cheers of several hundred GIs, then went through the mess line for a breakfast that included grits. Commander-in-chief Carter began

the morning by jogging along a raindampened asphalt road between Camp Casey and neighboring Camp Hovey in the gray morning mists. As he passed bleary-eyed reporters at the side of the road, a chipper

Carter, clad in blue shorts and a gray

short-sleeved tee shirt, yelled "come He got a lot of laughter, but no

takers. The 120 men and women of the 122nd Signal Battalion sang as they ran in formation behind the president: "Raise your eyes and what do you see; Mr. President is running with me.

On the return lap Carter was far in front of the pack with Brig. Gen. David L. Buckner on his heels. And straggling along, far in the rear, were national security adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski and his press aide, Jerrold

The normal pace for the troops on the three-mile route is eight minutes a mile, but Carter normally runs farther and faster on his own daily

Carter was forced to skip a planned mid-morning visit Saturday to Hill 191, an observation post three miles from the demilitarized zone, because rain and fog made helicopter flying

The weather also forced him to travel by ground from Camp Casey to Seoul, where he was greeted by president Park and a crowd estimated in the hundreds of thousands.

Neither president made formal remarks at the welcoming ceremony, in Seoul's Yolda plaza. They rode together in a limousine and inspected an honor guard.

South Korean leaders hope the the visit will help them persuade Carter to cancel the now-frozen withdrawal of the 31,000 U.S. ground troops here. Dissident leaders hope the president will speak out against Park's repress-

South Korean officials said Friday they expected Carter to tell Park privately that the U.S. troops would remain, but White House officials to the post.

The U.S. officials said Carter would not make any decision on troop withdrawal before he leaves South

The president, who was mobbed by South Korean photographers when he emerged from his jet, Air Force I, at Seoul's Kimpo International Airport after the flight from Tokyo, was given a low-key greeting when his Marine helicopter touched down at the military post.

His quarters for the night were the post commander's bungalow in a wooded area next to a creek

The president brought Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance, Defense Secretary Harold Brown, and national security assistant Brzezinski with him

'Curiosity' kills dog problems?

If your closets are full of old plastic jugs and your yard's a haven for neighborhood mutts, don't despair.

The only catch is the dubious-seeming solution may bring on a problem of another type - curious Midlanders.

"You'd be surprised at the people who stop and ask about it," said Vallie Smith, 1915 N. Tyler St., in response to a question about why he had six or seven plastic jugs filled with water scattered around his front

The water-filled jugs are supposed to discourage dogs from, "ahem ..., messing in the yard," explained Smith. "Dogs sure do respect those bottles," commented Smith, but he's not

The jugs must be plastic, of that he is fairly sure, but whether they have

to be filled with water is a matter yet to be determined by Smith. "Water probably just keeps the bottles from blowing away," Smith con-

Smith, who has lived in Midland since 1939, said he learned about

using the jugs from a man who had them in his yard. how it worked," said Smith, "just in case joke on me." But Smith did try out the technique once he got home.

"Don't cost anything to try," he said. One day a man who was a "little bit drunk" was walking by the house, said Smith. He saw the jugs out in the yard and stopped to looked at them

After a while Smith said the man turned to him and asked what the jugs were for.

On one point they all seem to agree. The jugs, whatever the reason, work The dogs stay away.

Robert Britton, 12, 1203 Britton Rd., thinks the color of the jugs may have something to do with their success.

"I think brighter color white ones work the best" he said. Ruben Munoz, 18, 1212 Lynn Ave., a neighbor who didn't have any plastic jugs in his yard, said he guessed they might work but thought the whole idea is "just a little crazy" anyway.

their safety. Representatives of independent truckers met most of the day with presidential assistant Jack H. Watson Jr. and a six-point program was worked out, including the agreement that the administration would seek to lift weight or length restrictions in

Another self-proclaimed leader of independent truckers. Michael Parkhurst, had been invited to the meeting, but Watson's office said he insisted on bringing along some 20 other truckers. When that request was refused, Parkhurst stayed away.

The assurance that the president is backing the agreement was given by Vice President Walter F. Mondale, acting in Carter's absence. Carter currently is in South Korea after attending an economic summit in

"We depend on you," Mondale told the truckers' representatives. "I urge each of you to recommend this package to your members and return to

Among the major demands by the independent truckers has been that all states permit truck weights of 80,000 pounds and a length of 60 feet. About a dozen states restrict either weight or length or both to less than

In addition to the promise to seek nationwide length-weight standards and the safe corridors, the six-point plan includes: -Action by the Interstate Com-

merce Commission to enable truckers to fully recoup increased fuel costs. -A pledge of administration support for equitable allocation of avalable fuel supplies.

Creation of a federal-state task force on inependent trucking to address truckers' continuing problems.

-Creation of a group that will specifically address the problems of "exempt haulers.

The plan for the safe corridors also sets up a 24-hour hotline that truckers cap call to get information and to ask for escorts.

The corridors include five interstates on north-south routes and three going east-west.

Miami to Boston, I-95 and the New Jersey Turnpike; Mobile, Ala., to Cleveland, I-65 and I-7l; New Orleans to Chicago, I-57 and I-55; Houston to Duluth, I-35 and I-45; San Diego to Seattle, I-5.

Richmond to Dallas, I-58 to I-20; Philadelphia to Los Angeles, I-70 to I-15; New York to San Francisco.

Watson's message to the governors asked, on behalf of Carter, "use of state police escort of convoys through your state, when it seems necessary and appropriate.'

He said he had been assured by state police directors that they were willing to provide such escorts.



Watson told the governors that although indications are that the highways are open and generally safe, some independent truckers and regulated carriers are hesitant to operate due to fear of violence or intimida-

Earlier in the day, California's Gov. Edmund Brown Jr. had called off Carter to push for "lifeline" routes assuring fuel for trucks carrying farm products. He warned of "poten-

tial anarchy on the highways.' Brown also urged other governors to use their emergency powers to create such routes, including the lifting of the weight limits and an assured diesel fuel supply.

ass action suit filed for aliens

Contending their 14th Amendment rights are being violated, a group of Mexican-Americans have filed a class action suit against the Ector County Independent School District seeking an end to tuition payments for illegal aliens

The suit, filed Tuesday in U.S. District Court in Midland, names as defendants William Holm, superintendent for the 23,000 student school district, and the Ector County board of

Plaintiffs in the suit "are undocumented aliens and fear reprisal," according to the suit, and were not named

Counsel for the plaintiffs is Warren Burnett, an Odessa attorney:

According to the petition filed in federal court, the group contends that preventing those children unable to document their U.S. citizenship or legal resident status from attending public schools free of charge is a violation of equal protection clauses in the 14th Amendment.

The suit asks an immediate, temporary injunction declaring that "the policy is of no force and effect."

Plaintiffs are seeking a permanent injunction prohibiting the ECISD

lowa towns now cleaning up following deadly tornadoes

MANSON, Iowa (AP) - Residents Street. of two northern Iowa towns on Friday began digging out of the devastation caused by a string of tornadoes that killed five persons and injured at least 50 others.

Clean-up work began before dawn in Manson and Algona, as bulldozers and dump trucks were brought in to move the piles of broken lumber, bricks, downed trees and other debris which blocked streets-and filled lots that once contained houses.

"This is something that only happens to other people. It's not something that happens to you," said Bev Ostrander after a tornado ripped a 15-block path of destruction through the center of Manson, population 1,-900, Thursday night.

"So many people lost so much," she said. "At least we're alive."

Despite the blare of warning sirens, three persons were killed in Manson and about 30 were injured. More than 100 homes were damaged or destroved, as were two dozen businesses when the twister churned down Main

That may be one of the few ways to keep cool today and Sunday. The reason? The weatherman says it will be hot, hot, hot.

SOUL CITY, N.C. (AP) — The signs of a bright new future are all over Soul City.

There is the sign marking the expansion of the housing development, and the sign showing where the townhouses are to be built. There is the sign marking the site of the half-constructed firehouse. There are even street signs for streets that aren't

But the future is destined never to arrive at Soul City. Floyd McKissick's dream of a model multi-ra-cial community ended Thursday when the federal government announced it is pulling out of the

Officials from the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development said only 124 people live in 33 houses in Soul City, where McKissick planned to build a city of 50,000.

HUD estimated its loss in seven years at about \$28 million, plus \$65,000 for a consultant's study saying Soul City would never be "economically viable."

The government will pay off \$10 million worth of guaranteed bonds and seek to negotiate a takeover of the land owned by the Soul City, said Bill Wise, HUD's assisant secretary for urban affairs. It then plans to sell the land for an estimated \$800,000.

If a settlement can't be negotiated, the government will foreclose, Wise said. Officials said those living in Soul City will be free to remain.

Lewis Myers, vice president for marketing for Soul City, said three HUD representatives arrived at Soul City Thursday morning to deliver the official news that HUD was cutting its ties to the community.

"We have nothing to say because we don't know what to say," Myers said. "We don't know what it

Business went on pretty much as usual last week at Soul City. Construction continued at the firehouse, and visitors continued to arrive at the information center to see the exhibits and the film depicting Soul City as a model combination of urban advantages in a rural setting.

Children and adults, many from the surrounding area, splashed in the the only public pool within 50

But pool manager Kathy Wright, who lives in a rented trailer near the recreation complex, threw back her head and groaned when told of HUD's decision to pull out.

"It's like the city out here in the country," Miss Wright said. "People here are very friendly.

McKissick, former head of the civil rights group the Congress of Racial Equality, said last month that Soul City faltered because of a lack of support from North Carolina's congressional delegation. Hopefully, he will understand why we had to do

Gas rationing plan gaining favor WASHINGTON (AP) - Sentiment is building within the Carter administration and in Congress for making a

gasoline rationing plan soon. With gasoline lines lengthening and the heaviest of the summmer driving season yet to come, political pressure is growing to give President Carter authority to limit the amount of fuel that motorists can purchase.

fresh attempt at enacting a standby

In the most recent reflection of a change in attitude, Deputy Energy Secretary John O'Leary said Friday that rationing "should be considered," perhaps by summer's end.

That is different from the position of all other Carter administration officials, who have said repeatedly that rationing would be invoked only in a national energy emergency. And O'Leary's statement seemed to contradict those of his boss, Energy Secretary James R. Schlesinger.

INTERVIEWED IN TOKYO by CBS News on Friday, Schlesinger was asked if rationing is just around the

"I would certainly hope not," he replied, "and I do not believe that this is the case:

"We need a standby rationing plan to deal with a severe shortfall that would come with the closure of the Persian Gulf. We should have a standby rationing plan, but rationing should not be a normal part of American life, in my judgment.'

In his testimony before three House subcommittees with jurisdiction over energy issues, O'Leary said he doubts that rationing is necessary to deal with the current level of shortages.

But, he said that gas lines are unlikely to get any shorter by fall. Rationing would at least provide a minimum supply, O'Leary added.

"Maybe we ought to go back and look at (rationing) more seriously,"

SIX WEEKS AGO THE HOUSE soundly rejected a Carter administration standby rationing plan under which gasoline coupons would have been issued to motorists on the basis of how many cars they own.

Angered by the vote, the president said it would now be up to the Congress to propose any rationing scheme to deal with a major short-

Nonetheless, it was learned Friday that Carter may submit a new rationing program to Congress within a matter of weeks

However, an administration official who accompanied the president on the trip to Japan and South Korea cautioned that it was not certain a new plan would be submitted if that plan was likely to be rejected.

"We're not going back up there and waste a lot of time without feeling the Congress has learned something from the last time," said the official, who declined to be identified.

Since then, according to administration sources, there have been discussions between White House aides and officials in the House and Sen-

"The atmosphere has changed," said one source. "The sentiment is different now.

HOUSE MAJORITY LEADER Jim Wright of Texas predicted the House will take action on an energy conservation plan that might include standby rationing authority. "I do think some form of rationing authority is probably necessary," he said.

House Democratic Whip John Brademas of Indiana said momentum appears to be growing rapidly in the House for the rationing proposal.

"I detect more and more members saying we've got to give the president basic authority to put together a rationing plan," he said.



Scheuer made the accusation at a hearing of the House energy and power subcommittee. Oil industry officials have steadfastly denied similar accusations in the past.

ALSO APPEARING AT THE subcommittee hearing, the chairman of the Federal Trade Commission said the Energy Department has consistently refused to turn over information on individual oil companies to FTC officials.

Michael Pertschuk said the agency he heads has been trying to obtain information from the Energy Information Administration for about 18 months. The EIA is an agency within the Energy Department.

Pertschuk said a law passed by Congress in 1974 requires information about individual oil companies collected by the Energy Department to be made available to the Federal Trade Commission.

But Lincoln E. Moses, administrator of the EIA, said his agency has been collecting information from the industry under a separate law.

In addition, he said, if oil companies know their data may be turned over to enforcement agencies such as the FTC, they may not be willing to coop-

Moses said these companies "may become unwilling, cautious, guarded or interested in frustrating the inqui-

Daughter's suit claims negligence

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - Mary Visocki's children used to say laughingly that she looked like a clown when she came home from work at the factory covered with white flakes of asbestos

Now, 40 years later, her youngest daughter is suing the asbestos works, claiming she developed a rare form of cancer because of her mother's job.

Irene Hill's suit in U.S. District Court against the Johns-Manville Corp. and its subsidiaries charges exposing workers to "ultrahazardous and abnormally dangerous materials.

Johns-Manville officials declined comment on the Mrs. Hill said in a telephone interview at her

Raritan home on Friday that when her mother used to return from work, she would be coated in a white film of asbestos. "She really looked funny to us.... Of course, we didn't know then what it was," Mrs. Hill said. "She

would come home and hug us and kiss us. The 48-year-old woman said she discovered six

months ago that she is suffering from mesothelioma, suit describes as a "rare cancer causally asbestos. relat.

Mrs. Hill, who never worked at an asbestos plant, was baffled when she discovered the cause of her disease. Then she remembered her mother's 23 years at Johns-Manville.

'She used to fight quite a bit to get something for protection," she recalled. Her mother, now 74, suffers from asbestosis, a respiratory disease caused by asbestos particles, she said.

Asbestos, a mineral that is mined for use in insulation and fireproofing, once was widely used in manufacturing various products. Several years ago, however, national concern grew as workers who used the materials were being stricken with cancer and other diseases 25 years after exposure.

In New Bern, N.C., an East Carolina University professor filed a \$20 million damage suit on Thursday against 10 companies. Harvey J. Hewitt Jr. of Greenville claimed he got cancer from working with asbestos insulation in the Navy. The Johns-Manville Sales Corp. was among the companies named.



Recession almost 'a certainty'

- Higher prices for imported oil and an increas- the \$12.70 price only ingly sluggish economy seven months ago. have made recession almost a certainty in the United States this year 8.5 million barrels a with no relief from inflation, economists in and out of government predicted Friday.

"It's really a question of how deep will the re-cession be," said Congressional Budget Office analyst James Annable.

Meanwhile, one of the nation's top private forecasting firms, Data Resources Inc. of Lexington, Mass., confirmed that it now is predicting declines in economic growth for the final three

quarters this year. If the forecast of economic declines at annual rates near 2 percent in each of those quarters is correct, the nation faces "a recession near the magnitude of the 1970 recession," said Data Resources' research economist Patricia Mosser.

A recession traditionally is defined as two consecutive quarters of negative growth.

Inflation, Miss Mosser added, could rise above 10 percent and some 1.4 million persons could lose their jobs by mid-

ALSO FRIDAY, the Commerce Department's reading of an index designed to forecast future economic trends showed a weak 0.4 percent bounce-back in May from a sharp 2 percent decline in the previous month.

"It's all doom and gloom around here," said one government analyst who asked not to be named. "I don't think you'll find a single optimistic forecast anywhere.

Pentagon ponders asking more fuel

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Pentagon, which has had to tap some war reserve stocks, is considering asking for special allocations of jet and diesel fuel to avoid cutbacks in military operations and training. Service efforts to conserve have been unsuccessful because the Defense Department is now about 12 percent short in its fuel inventory.

The problem is compounded by some suppliers who claim they are unable to fulfill fuel contracts at prices agreed to before their costs surged, Pentagon

'We've not had to go deeply into reserve stocks, but it's been happening more frequently than it should be," said one official. He said these stocks had been replenished as soon as possible.

Military officials say that essential training and military operations have not yet been curtailed, but that belt-tightening actions have been taken in other activities

The Defense Department, the largest single petroleum consumer in the United States, has not previously asked for what it calls "preferetial treatment

for fuel allocations. But George Marienthal, who is in charge of Pentagon energy matters, has let it be known the department may have to make such a formal request to the Energy Department if the situation continues to

The Pentagon spends about \$4 billion a year on fuel, but only about 3 percent of supplies are in the form of motor gasoline

The vast bulk, about 68 percent, is jet fuel for fighter planes, bombers and transports. Another 20 percent is diesel fuel to run Navy ships, Army and Marine tanks and trucks and various kinds of ground vehicles. The remainder goes to heat and otherwise support bases.

The steeply rising cost of fuel is causing service chiefs another major concern beside supply because it is biting deeply into money Congress voted last year for operations this year.

Carter stands by guidelines

WASHINGTON (AP) - Carter administration inflation fighters are going ahead with plans to deny large federal contracts to companies that accept labor agreements exceeding the voluntary wage guideline.

The administration's game plan for dealing with wage violators was drawn up at a meeting Wednes-

day, said sources who asked not to be named. The sources said the group discussed United Airlines and the three major tire companies that recently accepted labor contracts administration officials say are above the 7 percent pay standard.

President Carter's anti-inflation program calls for withholding contracts worth \$5 million or more from companies that exceed the guideline.

But United, the nation's largest commercial airline, holds no federal contracts worth that much, the sources said.

While it does carry thousands of government workers, the administration feels it cannot require federal workers to fly on other airlines, they

The tire companies - B.F. Goodrich, Uniroyal and Firestone - have about \$110 million worth of federal contracts and would appear more vulnerable to government action. But the sources said it might be difficult to get enough tires for government vehicles from other tire makers.

Also, the companies may hold defense contracts that other firms cannot fulfill, said the sources. The game-plan meeting was chaired by Labor Secretary Ray Marshall and included chief inflation adviser Alfred Kahn, Barry Bosworth of the Council on Wage and Price Stability, and chief presidential






The two leagues, which contributed 16 players and eight referees to the National Basketball Association







Prison fight tops weekend TV

Fights in prisons may not be uncommon but one in a penitentiary covered by national television cer-

When James Scott takes on Bunny Johnson Sunday in a scheduled 10round light heavyweight bout at Rahway (N.J.) State Prison, NBC's SportsWorld will be there. Scott, an inmate at the prison after convictions for armed robbery and parole violation, is serving a 45-year sentence. He also has been ranked anywhere from fourth to inth in th division and holds a decision at Rahway over then topranked contender Eddie Gregory.

Johnson is the British light heavyweight champion and took the fight with just a week's notice. Originally, Yaqui Lopez was to battle Scott but dropped out with a broken hand. The promoters tried to sign Jesse Burnett, Gary Summerhays and Vonzell Johnson but all three balked at fighting at

Scott has a 14-0-1 record and is a hero of the prisoners at Rahway and, presumably, at other prisons throughout the country.

Scott has set a precedent throughout America," said NBC Sports' Mike Cohen. "He has charisma. He's no dope. It's tough to sympathize with a two-time loser but he makes no bones

And NBC makes no bones about the difficulty of broadcasting from a pris-

"The problems are obvious," said John Gonzalez, who will direct the telecast. "You have to get permission for everything. Our guys are used to going into Yankee Stadium and having the run of the place.

'We're bringing in millions of dollars in equipment that must be safeguarded. The inmates must be separated from the public, so they'll be behind a five-foot chicken wire

"We don't want to ruin the effect," added Gonzalez, a veteran of several Muhammad Ali fight telecasts. "The promoter wanted to use a tent but we wanted it in the prison courtyard. We want to show the guards posted, the prison tower, the fortress of Rahway



Pelisek was a Communist Party Central Committee member during the "Prague Spring," when former President Alexander Dubcek took a stab at liberalizing the country. The movement ended in August 1968 when the Soviet Union led an invasion to reimpose its orthodoxy on the nation, which was known as one of Eastern Europe's most free and stable democracies until its dismemberment in

"What is involved is the biggest action so far undertaken in Czechoslovakia against defenders of human rights," committee spokesman Ivan

Medek said in Vienna. "It is unquestioned that the activities of Czechoslovak authorities against the members of the committee represents an attack on Charter 77," said Medek, a former broadcasting critic whose dissident activies cost him his job. He was reduced him to washing dishes before he finally fled Czechoslovakia last year.

Foreigners in Czechoslovakia say that in the weeks before the May 29 arrests, authorities were tightening enforcement of restrictions on Czech citizen's contacts with outsiders especially Westerners.

Czechoslovak law requires employees of "sensitive" enterprises to report within 48 hours on contacts with foreigners. But even taxi drivers told of being discouraged from excessive contacts with Westerners.

There is also speculation that the moves reflect Soviet-directed efforts to enforce orthodoxy throughout the bloc, at least partly in dissatisfaction with the political results of the Helsinki agreements on European security, human rights and other issues.

Charter 77 accuses the Czechoslovakian government with not living up to 1975 Helsinki agreements guaranteeing human rights.

With four years of Helsinki-inspired attacks behind them, there are signs Czech officials would like to clear the decks before next year's Helsinki fole w low-up conference in Madrid

Marijuana opponents meet to plan strategy

NEW YORK (AP) - Opponents of marijuana met here Friday to swap stories and map strategy for stalling the movement to decriminalize the

"It's refreshing to come to a conference where the views one has are adhered to rather than the other way around, as it is at most conferences, Dr. Darold Treffert, a psychiatrist from Winnebago, Wis., told an audience at New York University.

Treffert was one of a dozen doctors, educators and health workers at a session on psychiatric and social aspects of the drug.

Organizers of the Second Annual Conference on Marijuana said it was expressly convened to call attention to what they describe as the dangers of the drug.

Dr. Mitchell Rosenthal, president of Phoenix House Foundation, a drug rehabilitation group that co-sponsored the event, said there was no attempt to weight the scientific sessions Thursday either for or against marijuana. But in the social science sessions Friday, he said, "Perhaps the representations were a little bit

skewed.' "We know two people can share a joint without bad side effects. Our big concern is the kids and the attitude in this country that marijuana is a totally safe alternative," said Robert Fuller, head of the American Council on Marijuana, the conference's other

Treffert and other psychiatrists

said marijuana interfered with the motivation of their patients - particularly schizophrenics — to improve.

Lee Dogoloff, director of the White House Office on Drug Abuse Policy, said he was concerned about the drug's use by drivers, whose reflexes may be impaired, and adolescents, who may use it to escape facing conflicts that must be resolved to grow

her efforts to use community pressure to combat the sale of drug paraphernalia to children.

One group not invited to paticipate in the conference panels was the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws, a leading proponent of the drug. But several NORML offi-

cials turned up anyway. "To the extent this conference improves the understanding of marijuana and its handling by kids and parents, I support it. But I'm afraid one of the things it's done is to reinforce the traditional scare tactics," said Richard Evans, an Amherst, Mass., attorney and NORML regional coordinator

But Dogoloff said he felt the conference was balanced. He said public attitudes have swung in recent years from regarding marijuana as very dangerous to quite benign.

"I would say both views are based on the same amount of information none," Dogoloff said.

Bolivia schedules another stab at presidential election

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) - This Andean nation, which has had two military coups since last year's presidential election, will try again Sunday to elect a civilian, democratic govern-

The official campaign period ended at midnight Thursday and was relatively peaceful, although two persons were killed and several wounded in a shootout on May 20 in the conservative stronghold of Santa Cruz in eastern Bolivia.

Eight men are seeking the presidency, but the race has narrowed down to two major candidates, neither of them likely to receive the majority required for direct election.

The frontrunners are Victor Paz Estenssoro, 72, and Hernan Siles Zuazo, 66, both for ler presidents and one-time political allies who engineered and led the 1952 revolution which brought major social reforms

Paz Estenssoo, who has been president three times, heads the National Revolutioary Movement, a centrist coalition which advocates a "great national alliance" to make democra-

leftist parties called the Popular Democratic Unity.

A third candidate who is expected to grab a fair share of votes is Gen. Hugo Banzer Suarez, 53, the military dictator who was overthrown shortly


after last year's July 9 election. No one is expected to get the absolute majority - one vote more than half those cast - required by the constitution. That means the winner would be decided by the newly elected Congress, which takes office Aug. 6.

Last year's elections were annulled after an avalanche of election fraud

The official candidate in that election, Gen. Juan Pereda, forced Banzer, who had ruled for seven years - a 20th Century record - to resign. Then Gen. David Padilla pushed Pereda aside on Nov. 24 and immediately called for elections.

Banzer, who kept Paz Estenssoro and Siles Zuazo in exile during much of his rule, has repeatedly warned that fraud can be expected in Sunday's election.

"It's not a matter of whether there will be fraud," one political observer said. "The question is whether it can be controlled enough to keep it from affecting the legitimate outcome of the election."

Pulau Bidong: island of misery

PULAU BIDONG REFUGEE CAMP, Malaysia (AP) — The gong awakens them at 6 a.m. to days of

No work, no shops, no streets, no mail, nothing but thousands upon thousands of human beings everywhere, and a slim, desperate hope of getting out.

Here on Pulau Bidong, an island in the South China Sea 20 miles off the Malaysian coast, 42,000 "boat people" refugees from Vietnam are crammed into a camp on 11/2 square miles of level ground wedged between hills. This collection of huts is a city of misery that ranks as one of the most densely populated spots on Earth.

The refugees, many of them ethnic Chinese, have sailed across the South China Sea from Vietnam in rickety, crowded boats, landing on Malaysian beaches. Those lucky enough not to be forced back out to sea were rounded up by authorities, processed as refugees and brought to Pulau Bidong or other

The government says it has towed more than 14,000 that has assumed financial responsibility for all boat newly arrived "boat people" back out to sea since people in Malaysia. mid-June, but it says it will not evict the tens of



Mob-gambling ties investigated

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) - FBI documents alleging that mobsters are behind the scene in some of Nevada's famous casinos are reverberating through this town, making gambling figures as nervous as a blackjack player down to his last dollar.

Since the documents were made public, state officials have revoked the gaming license of a major Strip resort hotel and scheduled license revocation hearings for two other hotels. They are expected to act against at least one other hotel-ca-

In addition, officials have recommended placing the names of four men in the state's infamous "Black Book," a list of persons prohibited from entering any gaming establish-

All the actions stem from the alleged ties of the hotels - or the persons who run them - with persons purported to be organized crime figures in Detroit, Chicago and Kansas

THE ALLEGATIONS are contained in a 1,088-page FBI affidavit that was unsealed June 15 in Kansas City. It has information collected by federal investigators - using wiretaps, other electronic eavesdropping equipment, and informants - as part of a wideranging investigation by the Justice Department's Organized Crime Strike Force into alleged mob infiltration of the gambling industry.

The affidavit also revealed that some of the reputed mobsters felt they had control over at least one top Nevada official. Harry Reid, chairman of the Nevada Gaming Commission, has said federal authorities felt he was the "Mr. Clean" referred to in wiretapped conversations. But Reid has denied any connection to organ-

ized crime. Hotel executives here and state officials long have feared that federal intervention would result unless they showed they could adequately police the industry. And they've claimed the industry has been relatively free of mob control since the 1940s and 1950s when Benjamin "Bugsy" Siegel and other mobsters ran major casinos.

Strict controls, including more stringent accounting, were instituted in the late 1950s and 1960s, a move that helped reduce underworld influence. A policy change, allowing publicly traded corporations to take over hotel-casinos, also helped.

The allegations came as a surprise to many here, but not to all. Richard Bunker, appointed in January as one of the three members of the Gaming Control Board, the Gaming Commission's investigative and enforcement arm, said it was no shock to him.

"I'VE LIVED HERE all my life," he said. "I'm not naive. It's not a question of being aware, it's a question of the lingering suspicion all the time.

Bunker and other gaming control officials claim the FBI was able to get the evidence because it has much broader powers to use electronic eavesdropping than do state gaming authorities. "That's the only way they were able to get that kind of information," Bunker said. Earlier this month, the Gaming

Commission revoked the gaming licenses of the Aladdin Hotel and its two top officers following the conviction in Detroit of the hotel corporation on charges that the hotel was illegally controlled by reputed mob figures The casino operation has remained

open under a state administrator who

took over in an agreement worked out

between gaming officials and the club's owners. The state has ordered the hotel be sold. A proposed buyer for the Aladdin, HMA Inc., withdrew a \$135 million offer Thursday, saying its directors had decided not to branch out into the

gaming business. HMA operates sev-

eral insurance companies from its Denver headquarters. The Kansas City affidavit alleges that Joe Agosto, the former producer of the "Folies Bergere" show at the Tropicana Hotel, was the purported overseer at the club for reputed Kansas City organized crime figures. Agosto has denied this accusation.

GAMING OFFICIALS have hinted they will act against the Tropicana in July after a law takes effect allowing a state-appointed supervisor to run a hotel until allegations against it are

The board also recommended that Agosto be placed in the Black Book, along with Frank "Lefty" Rosenthal, former entertainment director at Argent Corp.'s Stardust Hotel; Carl Thomas, a long-time Las Vegas casino operator; and Carl DeLuna, who according to the FBI affidavit is the No. 2 man in the Kansas City organized crime hierarchy.

The FBI affidavit included a tran-

script of a bugged conversation be-

tween Thomas and others in which he

allegedly explains how cash can be "skimmed" from a casino before it is reported for tax purposes. Thomas' alleged scheme involved key persons in the counting room, the falsification of records, and blocking television cameras used to watch in-

ternal casino operations by standing

Argent, controlled by San Diego financier Allen R. Glick, operates the Stardust and the Fremont Hotel.

in front of them.

ANOTHER FBI affidavit alleges that Glick is just a figurehead controlled by reputed organized crime

figures in Chicago and that Anthony 'Tony the Ant' Spilotro oversees operation of the club for the mob.



voting irregularities. It was a zigzag, flip-flop sequence that brought tears and chuckles, arguments and embraces, but withal, that spirited, full-fledged commitment to the cause of spreading the

"Let's get on with this obsession," their famed evangelist Billy Graham exhorted 48,000 of them in Houston's Astrodrome, brushing aside the intramural bickering as beside the point.

The odd turn-around of affairs, however, apparently derived at least partly from the casual, easygoing makeup of the annual meeting, and offhand voting procedure, with some 'messengers' apparently casting multiple ballots.

Any Southern Baptist - up to 10 from each of the denomination's 35,-000 autonomous congregations - is eligible to attend, speak (if he can get recognized in the crowd) and vote. which could mean a possible total of 350,000 people

But the count usually is around 20,000 or less, with time and geography having a lot to do with the makeup, and the bulk of "messengers" coming from the area nearer the meeting site.

That gives the conventions a regional flavor, with conservatives tending to dominate meetings in the Southwest and Far West, but moderates more numerous at conventions in the Southeast and central states.

Since the site is shifted annually, the attitudinal pendulum swings with the locale. Texans from Houston and Dallas led the conservative drive to elect a president to tighten up on Bible interpretation - and won the first round with election of the Rev. Adrian Rogers of Memphis.

But then, says campaign organizer, the Rev. Paige Patterson of Dallas, his forces melted away and failed to stick with the convention in ensuing days to push through measures to get the job done.

The coalition consequently abandoned further efforts, including a proposed demand for a "loyalty oath" from convention officers. The moderates took over in effect and turned the tables with counteractions.

It was a contrasting sequence, but fusses among Southern Baptists, with their bent for Southern warmth. humor and demonstrative affection, tend to end up with handshakes or a

The amiable new president, Rogers, although backed to victory by the conservative block, disavowed belonging to any faction or anyone except Jesus and pledged to give "postive, loving, soul-winning" leadership

to all Southern Baptists. Back in Memphis in his first appearance in his home pulpit at Bellevue Baptist Church since his election, he was interrupted by an apparently deranged man who bounded on stage shouting incoherently at Rogers. Aldes restrained the man and led him

In 1976 and '77, Snyder served as pastor of the Assembly of God at Lewiston, Mont. He became co-pastor of the Christian Center of Bozeman, Mont., in 1977, remaining in that post until accepting the pastorate of Midland's Gardens Assembly of God several weeks ago.
