

Stratford Boys And Girls Win Cage Tourney

Stratford Elketts and Elks won first place honors in a highly contested fifth annual invitation basketball tournament here Saturday night. The Elketts won over Textline girls in a hotly contested first quarter. During the remaining periods of the game they gradually built up a lead to win the game by a score of 37 to Textline's 23 points.

Stratford Elks won their honors over Adrian in a game that held spectators spellbound during most of the game. The Elks trailed Adrian by a few points during most of the first part of the game. In the third quarter the Elks pulled into the lead for the first time. The score tilted back and forth until the last period when the Elks built up a substantial lead. Adrian made a scoring rally which left the Elks with a three point lead at the final whistle, winning the game 48 to 45.

Adelle Cunningham, Janet Garoutte, and Jeanne Garoutte, played forward positions for the Elketts in the starting lineup with Letha Fedric, Lynn Reeder, and Martha Crabtree playing the positions of guards.

Adelle Cunningham, fed under the goal by Jean and Janet Garoutte, scored all of the 11 points of the Elketts during the first quarter. Textline girls made 11 points during the same quarter.

The Elketts took a 6 point lead during the second quarter. Guards tightened their defense and the Garoutte twins started hitting the basket. Adelle Cunningham counted 1 point, Jean Garoutte scored 2 points, and Janet Garoutte scored 5 points. Georgia Lowe replaced Martha Crabtree as a guard. The score at the half was 19 to 13 in favor of the Elketts.

In the third quarter Cunningham came back scoring, piling up 3 points. Jean and Janet Garoutte each scored 2 points. The Elketts score was 31 and Textline 18 at the end of the quarter.

The last quarter of the game was evenly matched with Textline scoring five points while Cunningham and the Garoutte twins each counted 2 points for a six point gain to bring the game to an end with a score of 37 to 23.

During the quarter Martha Crabtree replaced Georgia Lowe as a guard. Gaynelle Parker replaced Lynn Reeder as a guard. Dorothy Arnold replaced Adelle Cunningham and Rogene Seaman replaced Jean Garoutte as forwards.

Total points for the Elketts forwards were: Cunningham 22, Jean Garoutte 6, and Janet Garoutte 9.

Stratford Elks battled with Adrian as the underdog from the beginning of the game. They played a good offensive game but were slow on defensive plays, allowing Adrian to take the scoring lead on fast breaks.

During the first quarter Bobby Lovelace led the scoring pace for the local team scoring 8 points. Green scored 4 points, Williams and Keener each scored 1 point. The quarter ended with Adrian leading 18 to 24.

During the second quarter the Elks continued to trail the Adrian boys. Lovelace scored 2 points, Green scored 2, and Tommy Wakefield limbered up to score 4 points. The half ended with the Elks trailing Adrian 22 to 25.

In the third quarter the Elks started hustling for possession of the ball and strengthening their defensive team work. Green scored 6 points, Williams counted 4 points, Keener tallied 3, and Wakefield scored 2 points. The Elks took the lead in this quarter by a score of 36 to Adrian's 32.

Adrian countered with a man-to-man defense to take possession of the ball and open a scoring rally. The Elks fought off the attack to maintain a 3 point margin and win the game 48 to 45. Drafteres May Register With Mrs. Boney

AUSTIN — Boys who reach the age of 18, required to register with the nearest draft board, can register in Stratford with Mrs. Lelah Boney.

The nearest draft board is Local Board No. 25, Dalhart, which has jurisdiction over Dalhart, Hartley, Moore, and Sherman counties.

Mrs. Boney's service as registrar enables Sherman county boys to register in their own county without having to go to the expense and trouble of travel to Dalhart.

A local board is maintained for the four-county area because one board can take care of it under present circumstances and thus help keep down the cost of government.

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said today that "people should appreciate the service Mrs. Boney is rendering the people of Sherman county. She does this job without pay as a patriotic service to her country."

All males are required to register under the draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.

Maximum penalties that can be applied for failure to register is \$10,000 fine, or five years in prison, or both.

Soil And Water Conservation Planned

A group of 23 farmers met at the court house Tuesday morning and planned a Soil and Water Conservation Program.

The farmers were interested in development of a water diversion system on their land to reduce the damage done to their land by water erosion. The area under consideration is located north of Stratford, south of the north county line, embodying thirty sections of farm land. The area was blocked out and the natural drainage areas plotted by farmers on their land. They recommended a water diversion system which was plotted on the map by the County Agent. Most of the diversion system was worked out so that the water would be diverted along the fence lines and county roads to the natural drainage areas. In developing this water diversion system it was planned for each section to take care of the water that falls on it.

The PMA, represented by Marcella Gillis, Vernon Bullard, and R. C. Buckles, discussed conservation practices that may be applied on the land under the PMA Program.

The S.C.S., represented by E. L. Seitz, stated that they would furnish the engineering service to survey the area.

The farmers felt that one of the main things causing a lot of their trouble could be corrected by opening up the bar ditches along the roads and requested the assistance of their local road commissioner in taking care of this problem.

The meeting was conducted by the County Agent and preliminary plans were completed. He was instructed to call another meeting of the land owners as soon as the preliminary survey was completed by the engineer.

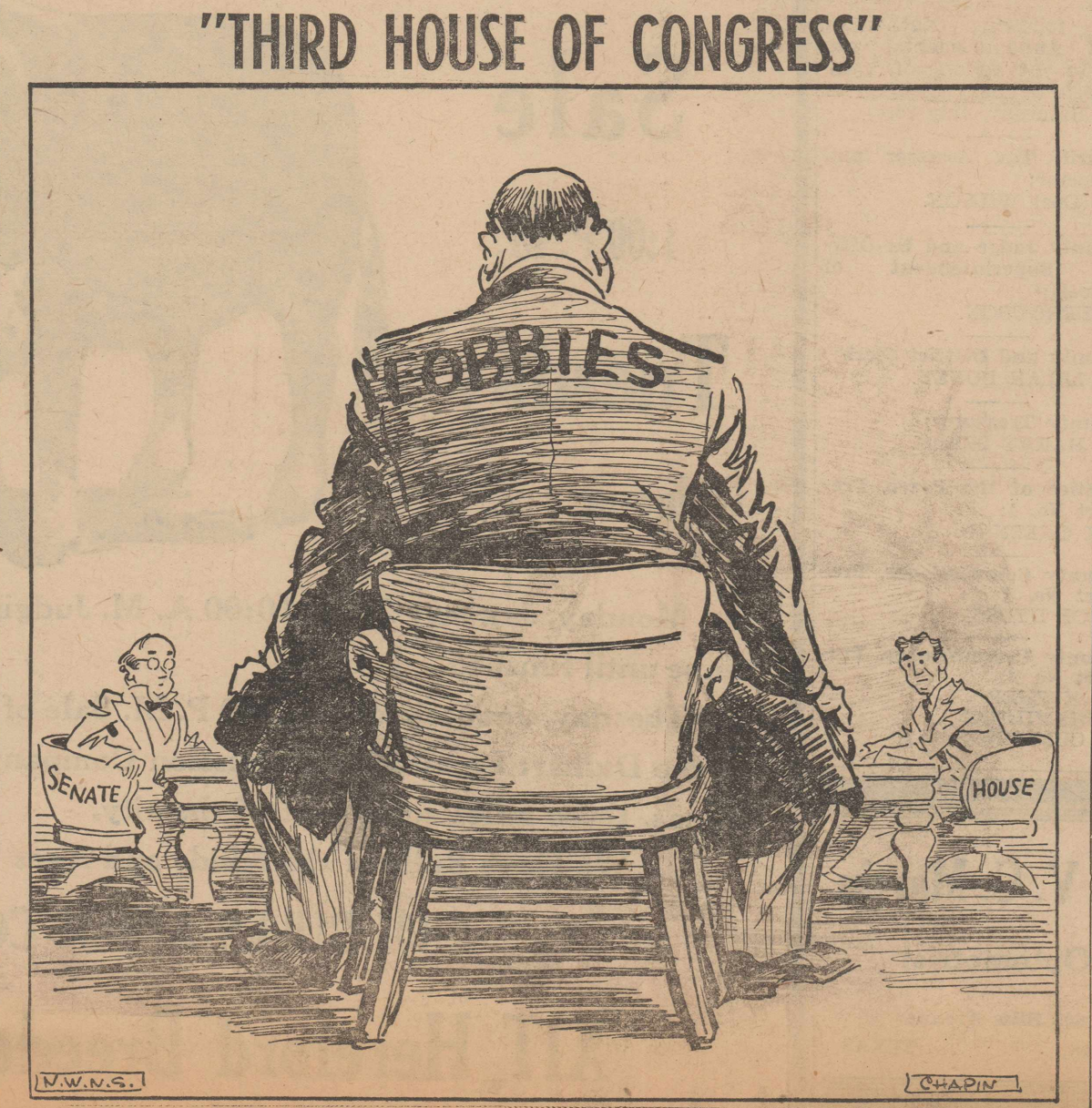
Harrison Building Is Being Repainted



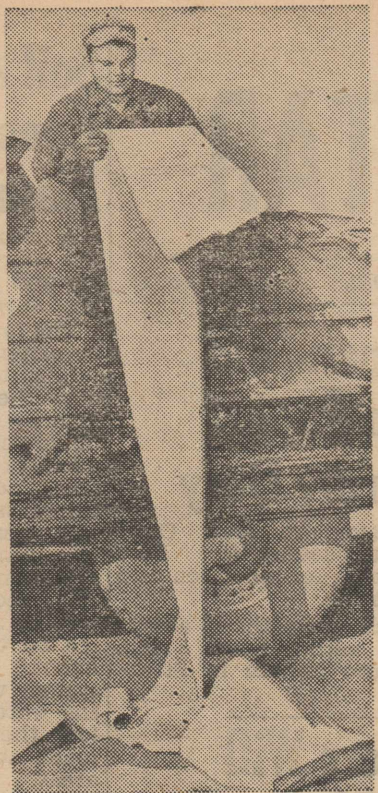

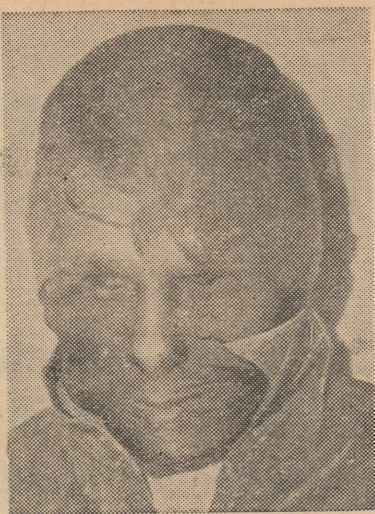

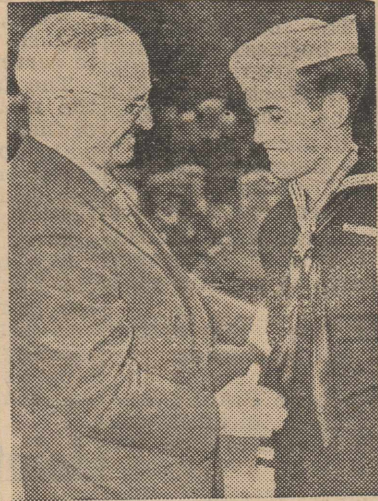

Popular Recipe

WHITE SPOTS on furniture caused by water or heat may be removed by rubbing the spot with a cloth dampened with spirits of camphor, ammonia, or alcohol. As soon as the mark is off, rub with furniture polish or wax. White spots on highly polished furniture, caused by hot or wet dishes may be removed by rubbing the spots with essence of peppermint.
Nothing beats the hot and cold treatment for loosening the tops of fruit jars and olive bottles. First, immerse top in boiling water and then dip quickly in water as cold as possible. Instant contraction loosens the top.
When making apple pie from fresh apples, peel and use large shredder for preparing the apples; they cook much quicker.
To loosen buttermilk that clings so tenaciously to the jar, glass, or pitcher, drop into it one teaspoon of baking soda and fill with water; let stand.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK
Cranberry Sherbet
(Makes 1 quart)
4 cups fresh cranberries
2 cups sugar
1 tablespoon gelatin
¼ cup cold water
Juice and rind of 1 lemon
Juice and rind of 1 orange
Combine cranberries, water and sugar and cook until cranberries are soft, about 10 minutes. Put through sieve or food mill. Soften gelatin in cold water and dissolve in hot cranberry liquid. Stir in fruit juices and rind. Pour into refrigerator tray and freeze until firm.

To prevent webworms from getting into your meal in the hot weather, sprinkle a little salt through the meal, but be careful when making bread not to add too much salt.
To freshen your garbage pan, use one tablespoon lye to one quart of hot water.
Never wash the hands with water after peeling onions. Simply rub them with coarse salt and the odor will disappear.
Has milk ever boiled over on your stove? It is difficult and messy to remove unless you sprinkle a layer of salt on the milk. Salt and water soaking in a charred steak pan also loosens the dirt and makes cleaning easier.

Spitzbergen Coal Mined By Russians

The coldest crossroads of the cold war are Norway's jagged Spitzbergen islands, where polar bears nose inquisitively into the only mining settlements operated by Soviet Russia on the free side of the Iron Curtain.

Svalbard — "land of the cold coast"—is the ancient Norse name for this Arctic archipelago which became part of the Kingdom of Norway a quarter of a century ago. Once an international no man's land, Svalbard has recently become a strategic question mark.

It straddles potential polar air routes between Europe and North America. But under a 1920 treaty, the islands cannot be fortified, and signing nations (United States, Great Britain and its Dominions, France, Italy, Japan, the Netherlands, Denmark, Sweden, and Russia) are guaranteed continued access to any economic interests they might hold there.

Today both Norway and Russia mine Spitzbergen coal. Norway is a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization; Russia is not. Svalbard's status is somewhere between.

Budgetwise Meals

BUDGET MEALS are much in demand currently, but they still must satisfy the family in taste appeal and appetite interest. If the homemaker does the kind of job she should, both in trimming her food budget a few dollars a week, and keeping the family happy with meals served, only she need be the one to be aware of the economy.

Just as it's inspiring to turn out an interesting meal from leftovers, so it is to turn some inexpensive dishes into attractive meals that have color, glamor and eating pleasure.

To trim down costs on dishes as much as possible, make wise use of leftovers so that nothing of value is ever fed into the garbage pail. Another good way is to use canned foods alone or in combination as they will substantially lower the cost of food.

Here's a satisfying as well as handsome main dish that is appealing to the eye as well as nutritional adequate.

*Meat Pin Wheel Shortcakes (Serves 6)

- Part I**
- 1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 1/4 teaspoons baking powder
 - 3 tablespoons fat
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 2 small cans deviled ham, liver paste or other potted meats
- Sift together flour, salt and baking powder. Cut in fat with a pastry blender or two knives until the mixture resembles coarse meal. Add the milk, mixing to a soft dough; knead on lightly floured board and place for thirty seconds. Roll into a rectangle approximately 12 x 8 inches. Spread with deviled ham or other meats. Beginning at the longer side, roll as tightly as possible. Cut in approximately 1-inch pieces. Place cut side down on baking sheet and bake in hot oven (450° F.) 15 minutes.

- Part II:**
- 2 tablespoons butter
 - 2 tablespoons flour
 - 1 1/2-pound can peas
 - 1 4-ounce can button mushrooms
 - Milk
 - 2 tablespoons chopped canned pimiento
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Melt butter over low heat in saucepan; blend in flour. Drain liquid from peas and mushrooms; add enough milk to make 1 1/2 cups. Add to blended flour and butter; cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Add peas, mushrooms, pimiento and salt; keep over low heat until vegetables are heated. To serve, place half of the pin wheels on platter, top with creamed vegetables and remaining pin wheels.

Last-of-the-Meat Loaf (Serves 4)

- 2 tablespoons melted butter
- 2 tablespoons dry crumbs
- 2 teaspoons grated onion
- 2 cups mashed potato
- 1 cup cooked grated carrot

LYNN SAYS: Dramatize Flavor In Serving Vegetables

Whole kernel corn takes on a more appetizing flavor if you crumble into it 2 strips of cooked bacon. Saute the corn in bacon drippings. To heated, drained green beans, add a small can of sliced mushrooms and let stand until heated. Mix thoroughly before serving. To heated, drained peas, add 2 tablespoons of mint jelly. Cover, let stand for a few minutes and then serve. They'll be delicious.

Corned Beef Ring (Serves 6)

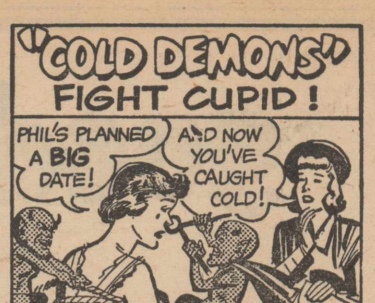
- 1 tablespoon prepared mustard
 - 1 cup soft bread crumbs
 - 2 tablespoons chopped onion
 - 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
 - 2 tablespoons butter, melted
 - 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
 - 2 cups finely diced corned beef (12-ounce can)
 - 1 cup milk
 - 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- Combine mustard, bread crumbs, onion, green pepper, butter, pepper and corned beef; mix well. Combine milk and eggs, add to corned beef mixture, mix well. Pack into well-greased 1-quart ring mold, place in pan of water. Bake about 30 minutes in moderate oven (350° F.). Fill center with creamed peas.

When you're in a hurry, put the pressure cooker to good use by cooking a dinner in it that would ordinarily take much longer. An hour or more of cooking time can be cut down to actual 15 to 20 minutes with this savory dinner:

- Quick Chop Suet (Serves 6-8)**
- 1/2 pound lean pork, diced
 - 1 pound round steak, diced
 - 1 tablespoon fat
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 - 1 1/2 cups chopped onion
 - 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons sugar
 - 2 tablespoons soy sauce
 - 1 tablespoon concentrated meat extract
 - 1 cup hot water
 - 1 tablespoon dark molasses
 - 1 No. 2 can (2 1/2 cups) bean sprouts
 - 5 tablespoons cornstarch
 - 1/2 cup cold water
- Brown meats in hot fat. Add seasonings, vegetables, sugar, soy sauce, meat extract, water and molasses. Heat to 15 pounds pressure. Cook 10 minutes. Reduce pressure gradually. Add bean sprouts. Combine cornstarch and cold water; stir into mixture and cook over low heat until thickened; stir constantly. Serve over fried noodles.

When you're using canned vegetables, drain off the liquid and cook until reduced in half. Then add the vegetable and just heat through. They'll have more flavor in this way.

Don't toss away those large outer stalks of celery. Dice and cook them until tender, then add white sauce. Add a few leftover green peas for color, if desired. Waxed or yellow beans can be both flavorful and colorful if you add to them some chopped pimiento, lemon juice and melted butter.

International Union Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 9:9-17; Luke 8:27-38.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Matthew 18:24-28.

About Face

Lesson for January 20, 1952

TAX collectors and customs officers in these days are highly respectable men. They are not (officially) popular; but every one knows they are necessary. What they collect is fixed by law, and they get no commission on their collections. They live on a salary also fixed by law. If any one feels "gouged" by taxes he never accuses the collector, the fault is somewhere else.

Now in Palestine, in the time of Christ, it was different. Throughout the gospels the name "publican" or, as translated in present-day English, "tax-collector", is evidently a name for a mean man. Jesus himself used publicans as examples of the lowest level of society. The reason was this: In the Roman system of tax collection, the privilege of levying taxes in a given district was "farmed out", that is to say, offered at auction. The highest bidder was given the franchise, and then he, or men he hired, would proceed to collect all the traffic would bear.

Palestine at that time was under the Romans, and the Jews had the army of occupation with them year after year. What the tax collectors did was to turn over to the Romans what the Romans wanted, and everything over and above that amount went into the collector's strong-box.

A Christian's Job

ONE day Jesus just said "follow me" to one of these men, named Matthew, and the man got up and followed him. So far as we know, he never set foot in his office again. Very likely, as a great preacher has suggested, this was not the first time Matthew had seen Jesus. Possibly they had had conversations before, out of business hours. The preacher goes on to suggest that Matthew may have come to loathe his job, but never have seen just how he could leave it.

Be that as it may, Matthew understood quite well that he could not be both a publican and a follower of Jesus. This raises a question: Are there occupations today which a true Christian cannot follow without sin? There was a dope peddler one night sitting on a stone wall outside a New England church. Somehow the Spirit of God blessed the singing that night, for one of the hymns sang its way straight into that man's heart, and that very hour he threw his packet of dope away and became a Christian. He never went back to that business. We can all see that he was right; but are there other businesses also that cannot have the blessing of Christ upon them?

Whom Do You Follow?

THE story of Matthew suggests that also that every one is some kind of follower. Some people just "follow their noses", that is, they just keep on in the routine of their lives, doing today what they did yesterday just because they have the habit of living in this way. Others follow an ambition, others a desire for revenge, others follow pleasure, others attach themselves to a leader (political, social or what not) and follow somebody else's band-wagon.

The tragedy of the Christian church is that although every Christian, or rather every church member, has solemnly promised to follow Jesus Christ, they don't all follow him, by any means. They go right on following habit, or pleasure, or ambition, and they do not ask (as Matthew must have asked) whether these things are such as Christ can bless, or not.

In spite of Jesus' plain statement: You cannot serve God and Mammon (the god of money), people go right on serving Mammon in spite of their Christian profession.

About Face!

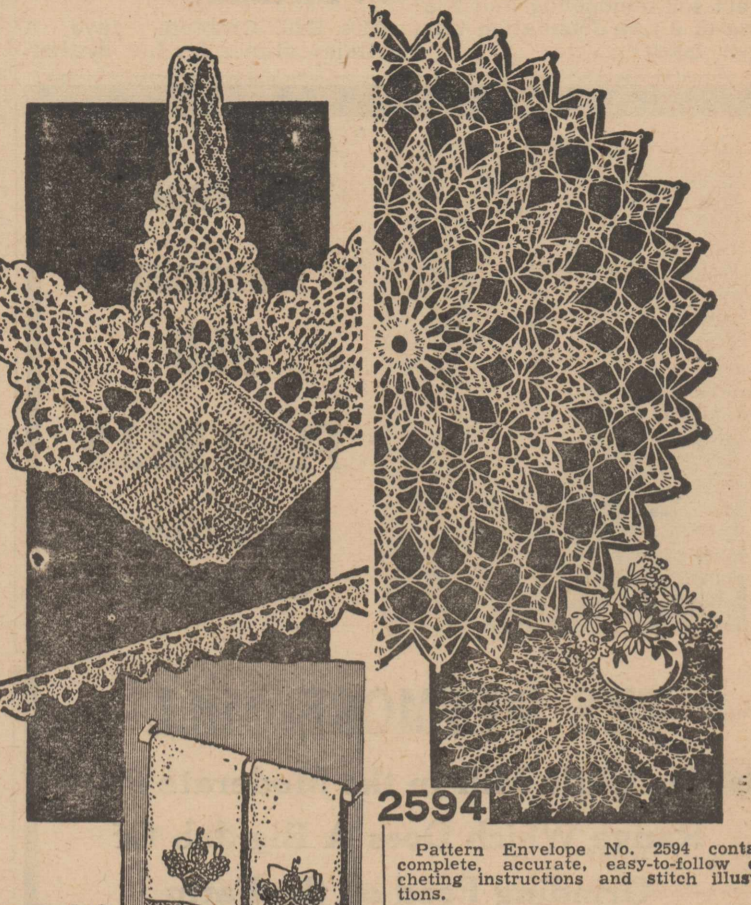
THE word "conversion" means simply "turning around". It means turning all the way around. When the sergeant says "About Face!" it won't do for the rookie to twist his face around, or to turn one foot. It's all the way or nothing.

Yet when Jesus our Commander gives the command "About Face!" how many Christians barely move a muscle!

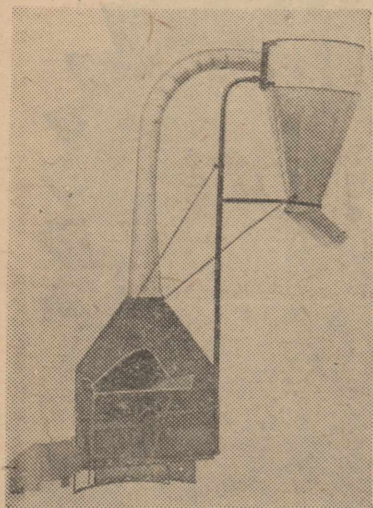

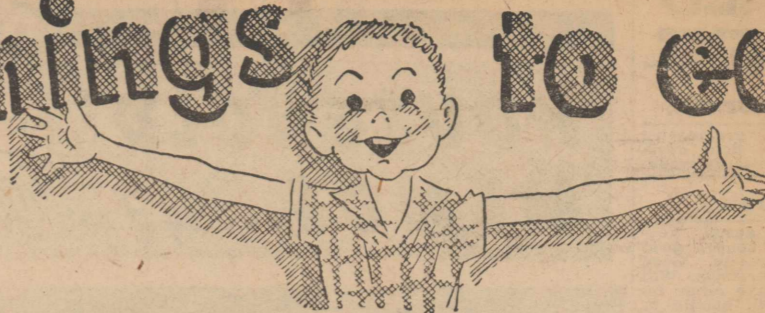
