

## To Consider Weather Improvement

A meeting of farmers will be held Tuesday, March 25, at 1:30 P. M. in the court house in Stratford. The meeting will be with a discussion of the weather improvement program of the OTK area followed by an election of a board of directors. The future agricultural situation and county goals for 1952 will be presented. A discussion of conservation practices and the development of a local water ed area north of Stratford will be included in the latter part of the meeting.

This is a very important meeting for farmers in this county as the directors and weather improvement Association need to know what you think about continuing this program in Sherman County. If you are in favor of continuing a program then a board of directors should be elected to work on the program in preparation for signing a new contract when the present one expires in May.

R. C. Buckles, chairman of the board, states there is considerable new information and some developments the farmers need consideration before making a decision on continuing or discontinuing the present project.

## City Paving Issue Must Be Decided

Paving contractors will soon meet with the Stratford City Council to bid on placing a new street on the paved streets of Stratford.

At this time it will be possible for the Council to accept bids for construction of new pavement on streets where they are property may place a request for paving with the City Engineer. This request does not bind the property owner to the paving project at the contractor's price. It does give the council in a position to bargain for a price on the work. Property owners will be contacted for their approval of the proposed paving projects.

The paving contractor who is to secure the street coating contract is not likely to be placed for putting in curbs and gutters. The council however, does have an opportunity to place a contract for curbs and gutters with another contractor who specializes in this work.

Property owners who place a request for paving should specify as to whether or not they will also want curb and gutter construction on the lots to be paved.





## Dean Turner In Island Earthquake

Sgt. Dean Turner, on duty with the U. S. Army in Otaru, Hokkaido, Japan, writes his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Turner, of his experiences during the recent earthquake. A portion of his letter follows:

A few words to say, I hope you are happy and feeling fine today, and that the sky of Stratford is not so gray as the sky in Otaru, and the roads not so icy and cold. Otaru is under stress normally enough by the rugged winter, but at the present time thousands of Japanese families are homeless, hundreds others are suffering from wounds and shock sustained from the earthquake that rocked the whole island of Hokkaido earlier this week.

When it occurred I was making a phone call, calling my daily ship activities reports to Yokohama, and all of a sudden I had a feeling that my body had become light as a balloon and I was beginning to swirl up in a terrific gust of wind. I said, on finally deciding what was taking place, "Hold the phone, Captain, we're having an earthquake up here." By this time the girls were screaming their heads off, and the walls were cracking, and a five hundred pound safe box fell off its pedestal and crushed a dent in the cement floor. Pictures flew off the walls, S.P.s ran into the building and assisted in raising all windows, oblong desks near the windows. Through the windows you could not see anything but a great avalanche of snow that had packed five feet deep on the roof of the building and now was discharged.

The one good thing the earthquake did was remove the snow from the building roofs. Our own building is five stories high and being the strongest, most modern building in the city, succeeded in holding together fairly well in one piece, with the exception of broken glass and walls. In the CIC room next door a chandelier fell and coo-cooed a Nises head.

When it finally ended (lasted about two minutes) I went back to the phone and said, "Well Captain Rosenbloom, we can resume our conversation. You're probably the first man in Yokohama to learn an earthquake took place up here. Hold on, it's starting all over again." And it did. The island trembled lightly for about another sixty seconds. I hung up and told him I'd call back later, maybe.

Trains were derailed and smashed all over the island. One passenger train between here and Sapporo was derailed, but fortunately leaned against an embankment where nothing happened except the mountain discharged a fine volume of snow that covered it completely up. The people got out in a matter of hours. Had the train leaned right instead of left, it would have fallen 200 feet down to the Japan Sea. In that particular instance only a few hundred bumped heads. I've told you how thick the poor Jap peasants ride the beat up old choo-choos. On the other side of the island cars and trains rolled down mountain sides. The crushed houses and buildings in Otaru (where the earthquake was weakest) are pathetic sights. The poor people are out and starting reconstruction. U. S. airplanes have flown supplies and hundreds of blankets to the worse stricken areas. These people are fortunate to be under American occupation, or rather to have been. They are free now, and you find some of them are not too appreciative, even though the other country would have treated them so well as America has. Who knows how many millions of tons of clothes and food and cash we have given them. Most of them, however, are understanding and grateful and realize the mistake of their war.

feeds and cotton, farmers should make every effort to increase production by obtaining higher yields on the available acreage.

"The defense program and the maintenance of a high living standard have drawn heavily upon your reserves, while the first, urgent requirements are so great that we cannot hope to replenish feed reserves in 1952, farm planning must make provision for building those reserves to safe levels. At the same time we must protect our basic soil resources so they will continue to produce abundantly for the greater number of people in the years ahead."

Here, says Mr. Buckles, is the challenge that faces the farmers of Sherman County and throughout the nation in 1952.

The goals call for a 6 per cent increase in the production of food, feeds and fibre over the 1951 production or about 50 per cent more than was produced in the 1936-39 pre-war years. The increased production must come from about the same acreage that produced the 1951 crop and the crops back in the pre-war years. And if living standards are not to be lowered, this same land will have to continue to produce more and more to meet the needs of an additional two or three million people each succeeding year.

The only way the need can be met according to the chairman, is to check the forces of soil deterioration and to build up the land to support increasing population. Only through an effective program of soil and water conservation can this be done.

In this effort grasses and le-

gumes must continue to play the leading part, in rotations, as cover crops, or as temporary and permanent pasture. For this reason, says the chairman, the Agricultural Conservation Program is stressing more than ever the practices which tie into grass and legume production.







THIS STARTLING PICTURE is the result of study by the National Chamber's Government Economy Program, based on figures from the U.S. Department of Commerce. Incomes of all people include all money that goes to individuals as wages, salaries, interest, rent, and dividends. Since latest Commerce Department figures available for the map were for 1950, the Chamber estimated total 1953 incomes at 15 per cent higher than those for 1950. Total 1953 spending under the President's budget would equal the incomes of all persons west of the Mississippi plus 96 per cent of the incomes in Wisconsin and all the incomes in Mississippi.

"When we get straightened out with Mr. Shea," he said, "we want it clearly understood that this promotion offer is closed. Future offers, if any, will have a definite closing date."



February 15, Texas farmers were receiving 2 cents less for chickens, 30 cents less for hogs, and 80 cents less for lambs. Average prices received as a percentage of parity for live-stock and livestock products are: veal calves, 134; beef cattle, 130; lambs, 115; butterfat, 105; milk, 102; chickens, 83; eggs, 78; and hogs, 80. Ratio of the Index of Prices received to the Index of Prices paid dropped to 100 for the first time since July, 1950.

**Agricultural Prices**

Prices received by farmers on February 15 were 4 per cent below the January 15 level. During the same period, prices of things farmers buy advanced one-third of one per cent to a new high.

Only 3 field grown crops were bringing prices equal or above parity. They were cotton, 108; potatoes 118; and sweet potatoes 137. All feed grain and most hay prices were lower than in mid-January. Oats prices were 94%; corn, 93; wheat, 89; grain sorghums, 88; and barley 85. Rice prices in mid-February were 93%; peanuts, 78; and wool 91.

For the third consecutive month, prices received by farmers for eggs have declined sharply. During the month ending February 15, egg prices in Texas were off 9.7 cents per dozen and were only 78% of parity. During the month ending Feb-



**Enrollment in U.S. Colleges Shows Big Drop in 1950**

CINCINNATI, O.—Dr. Raymond Walters, president of the University of Cincinnati, and nationally known statistician of higher education, reported that nearly 75 per cent of 492 approved American colleges and universities reported decreases in enrollment in 1950. Nearly 58 per cent recorded considerably smaller freshman classes.

This fall's drop continues a downward trend begun last year from the postwar peak. Dr. Walters attributed the decline to the departure from the campus last June of the large 1950 graduating classes, a major proportion of whom were veterans of World War II, and also to the small freshman classes, diminished in consequence of the low birth-rate of the 1930s.

Total full-time attendances at the five largest state universities reporting were: University of California, 36,989; University of Illinois, 23,500; University of Minnesota, 22,000; Ohio State University, 20,500 and University of Michigan, 19,000.

The five largest universities under private control reporting in today's study show these estimated full-time totals: Columbia University, 22,050; University of Southern California, 20,153, with more than 50 per cent veterans; New York University, 20,000; Boston University, 11,200, and University of Pittsburgh, 10,007.

Other representative universities under private control report these estimated full-time totals: Harvard University, 5,000; University of Chicago, 6,750; Johns Hopkins University, 2,400; University of Detroit, 8,720; Cornell University, 9,600; University of Pennsylvania, 9,850, and Vanderbilt University, 3,175.

Among municipal institutions reporting estimated full-time totals are: Colleges of the City of New York, 26,376; University of Cincinnati, 6,162; University of Louisville, 3,224; University of Toledo, 2,840; University of Wichita, 2,500, and University of Akron, 2,020.

**Popular Recipe**

GIVE YOUR LINENS the proper care during holiday time, and you'll glow with housewifely pride when you set the table. Some table linens require a little extra care, but they repay you in their beauty and increased service.

Most linens do not require special stain removal before laundering, especially if you can use a chlorine bleach on them. This is best placed in the suds, so it works on the linens while washing takes place.

Soil removal is more certain if you let table linens soak for 20 minutes in clear, cool or lukewarm water before laundering. Plan to

Sweet Potato Sausage Stuffing  
(For fowl or roast pork)  
4 medium sweet potatoes  
6 tablespoons butter  
1/2 cup orange juice  
1 tablespoon grated orange  
1/2 pound sausage meat  
1 onion, minced  
3 stalks celery, chopped  
1/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning  
1 1/2 cups bread crumbs  
Scrub sweet potatoes; cook until tender in boiling, salted water. Drain, peel and mash thoroughly. Add butter, orange juice and rind. Beat until smooth. Cook sausage meat slowly for 10 minutes. Add onion, celery, poultry seasoning and salt to taste. Cook until meat is brown. Drain off fat. Add mashed sweet potatoes and bread crumbs, mixing thoroughly. This is a moist stuffing and should be packed into bird loosely.

wash linens separately from other items so they do not acquire fuzz from them.

Second launderings are advisable if the first one has not removed heavy grease stains. Always rinse three times in lukewarm water, or more often until the odor of the bleach disappears.

Light starch may be used to give gloss, but stiff finishes on linens are not desirable. Bluing, too, is unnecessary if laundering methods are proper. When used, bluing should be distributed thoroughly to prevent streaking.

Dry, hot air destroys the crispness of Irish linen. Dry in sunshine, but whenever possible, have temperatures as close to 70°F. as possible.

**One County in U.S. Has No Federal Employees, Report**

PIERRE, S.D.—It's hard to believe, but there is at least one county in the United States that does not have a single federal employee—Armstrong county, South Dakota.

It has only 52 residents, mostly Indians, and only 12 residents are taxpayers. It is a broad expanse of prairie in the north central part of the state.

The land is scarred by innumerable gullies which make travel possible only by horseback. There are no roads, towns, schools, or churches.

It not only has no federal employees; it also has no state employees, no county employees, no government, no postoffice, no federal agencies. In a moment the reader will be convinced there's no county.

It does exist, however, 525 square miles of grassland and gumbo which supports thousands of cattle, jack-rabbits, coyotes and grouse.

Armstrong's claim to fame as the only U.S. county without a federal employee was revealed in a report issued recently by the joint committee on reduction of nonessential federal expenditures, headed by Senator Byrd of Virginia.

Armstrong county is part of the Cheyenne river Indian reservation. The land is virtually inaccessible. It is bounded on the south by the Cheyenne river and on the east by the Missouri river. The soil is so poor that it has never been settled. It is good grazing country, though.

For governmental purposes Armstrong county is attached to Stanley county on the south.

All seven of its residents who voted in the last election voted the straight Democratic ticket.

**Trapper Fights Off Cougar That Invades Isolated Home**

CAMPBELL RIVER, B.C.—Edward McLean, a rugged part-time trapper and linesman with the Canadian department of transport, revealed recently his hand to hand battle with a fierce cougar in his lonely one room cabin.

He reported he was getting ready for bed when a big cougar crashed through the window of his cabin—120 miles northwest of Vancouver.

He fought barehanded in the dark, punching and kicking the 60 pound cat as it went for his throat.


"The crazed cougar clawed and chewed at my right arm and throat," he said. "I managed to drag him to a corner of the cabin and grabbed a butcher knife. Using my left hand, I plunged the knife into his throat and stomach."

McLean ran barefooted, and clad only in his underwear, to his nearby rowboat, intending to summon help from a line cabin six miles to the south. A brisk wind kept him adrift for more than two hours.

He reached the cabin but no one was there. He was too weak to strike a light. He crawled into a sleeping bag and slept for nine hours in subzero temperature.

When he awoke, he used the transport department's telephone to call for help. Two men rushed McLean 54 miles to a hospital. Then they returned to his cabin. The cougar was still alive, but barely breathing. A bullet finished it off.

Brice left her there and went out. He wanted to look the town over and talk with old friends.





### Soviet Medical Paper Says 26 Million Americans Ill

MOSCOW, USSR — The Soviet newspaper Medical Worker reports Americans are in a bad way. According to the newspaper 26 million Americans are chronically ill.

The newspaper also reports that eight million Americans are insane; that each year two million Americans lose their ability to work because of accidents; that 18 million are partly or completely unemployed, and that the ordinary farmer or worker rarely is able to undertake treatment to cure a disease because of the expense of medical assistance and medicines.

About 260,000 families are homeless in New York alone, the newspaper said, and claimed the cost of a week stay in the average American hospital exceeds by two or three times the average monthly wage of the average American worker. On top of this, the newspaper charged hospital treatment is seldom possible for the average American. To top its fantastic claims, the paper said that only a small percentage of those ill with diabetes in the United States are able to procure insulin. The drug, the newspaper explained, is in the hands of monopolies which intentionally restrict production to small proportions to get an exorbitant price for the product.

The article concludes: "The exclusively low level of public health in the United States is an expression of the general fate of capitalism, under which even poverty and illness are a source of enrichment of a small group of capitalists."

### Arrested 'Graduate' Tells Of Safe-Cracker's School

CADILLAC, Mich.—Dale Line, 22, of Ewart, Mich., recently arrested for cracking a safe containing \$800 in cash and bonds, told police a school for safe-crackers, complete with tuition and movies on how to blow safes, is operated in Chicago.

The ill-starred "graduate" said pupils paid \$2.50 a lecture, illustrated with moving pictures. He refused, however, to tell who operated the school or where it was located.

Chicago police said Line told them that whenever anyone in Chicago can't open a certain type of safe, there is a telephone number to call and an expert will take the job for half the proceeds.

Line said he met his "professor" in a Chicago bar, and after telling the man that he was an ex-convict, the safe expert invited him to become a pupil.

### 1951 Broke Records In National Parks

U. S. rangers have closed their books on the greatest travel year in the history of America's national parks.

From Maine to Alaska and Hawaii, more than 36,700,000 people—one in every four Americans—visited historic shrines and saw majestic scenery that they themselves own as part of the far-flung national park system. The figure broke the 1950 record by nearly four million.

Uncle Sam's public park domain—mountains and monuments, canyons and caves—embraces more land than the combined area of Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Delaware and half of New Jersey. Half of the total is in 28 National Parks; the remainder in 175 National Monuments, historical sites, battlefields, and memorials. National forests, ten times as big, are not included.

### Hunting Dogs

The English harrier, halfway between the beagle and foxhound in size, was developed in England for pack hunting of hares. While some have found "their way to America they have never been very popular here.

Many hunters like fox or 'coon hounds for running rabbits. These faster hounds are usually inefficient in hunting cottontails as these rabbits are likely to "hole up" before fast hounds. However, varying hares are much different quarry. These big "snowshoe" hares will run for hours ahead of the hounds and seldom hole. In the deep snow of the north woods many prefer a fast foxhound for this sport—the faster the better. Few hounds are fast enough to catch these speedsters but it can be done.

'Coon or tree hounds. Perhaps the aristocrat of hounds is the "straight 'coon." by "straight" is meant a dog that will run nothing but raccoon. Such hounds usually do not reach perfection short of three or more years of age. Other "varmint" hounds run opossum and skunk.

### Rod Gadget

Anglers who fish from a boat will find this gadget helpful. Take an old bicycle tire and cut three pieces from it about three inches long. Turn the open side up and fasten on the inside of your boat three or four inches below the gunwale to hold your rod when not in use. It will not only keep the rod from being knocked overboard, but keeps it away from sand and water and also lessens the chances of it being broken.

### Who's Right?

Sensational catches of largemouth and Kentucky bass in the impounded TVA waters in the past two years are adding fuel to the argument by many anglers that bass do not actually hibernate during the winter.

At Kentucky Lake, Dale Hollow, Lake Herrington and over at newly-impounded Wolf Creek Reservoir (since officially named Lake Cumberland by the Kentucky Legislature) catches of bass during even the coldest weather have been amazing.

What does this prove? It proves, asserts the "bass-don't-hibernate" school that the scrappy species can be taken the year round, wherever water is open, and that the reason this knowledge hasn't been shared by all the angling fraternity is that too many of the members sit around a warm fire vegetating during the winter when they could be out catching bass, if they knew their business.

There is no gainsaying the fact that many and big bass are being taken in the winter in the big lakes, and we can add a personal note that it has been done in the streams, too. For instance, in Elkhorn Creek, near Frankfort, Ky., one plugcaster took five small-mouth in five casts on a cold, February day. The creek was clear, but about two feet high when he pulled the feat.

We'll grant that this is not a performance that can be duplicated day in and day out during the winter months, but we think any reasonable angler will have to re-examine his views on the matter of bass fishing being dead in the winter-time, if he is aware of what anglers have been doing in the lakes.

### Too Good To Keep

Panfish fishermen, this is for you!

Remember how all of us have wondered why someone couldn't come up with the one lure that absolutely would fill a creel with the tasty finny denizens known as bream?

Well, we believe we've found one. A picture of it is included in this article, as you see. The lure is called the "Deep-Minno." It is made by the Weber people at Stevens Point, Wis., and Weber's Mr. A. L. Bauman, who sent us some of the lures to test, did so without

any fanfare or without any super-claims for the lure.

But look what it did:

On New Year's Day, a day more conducive to radiator-sitting than fishing, we took it to a nearby pond and in two hours caught 48 bream with this one lure. Four bait-fishermen, using worms and minnows, caught only 21 between them, and three other fly-rod men on the pond at the same time, took a total of only 25 fish.

A lure that will produce like that is, we thought, too good to keep still about, so we're passing along the information here to all you anglers who find much of your sport fishing ponds and other impounded waters for bream or crappie. We haven't tried the lure on crappie yet, but have every reason to believe it will be just as effective.

### Other Doctors

### Life Is More Than Making a Living

MANY others besides doctors have made the same discovery. What is a "hobby," after all? It can be only an elaborate twiddling of the thumbs, something to "kill time"—horrible thought! It can be something done merely to relieve nervous pressure. It can be something not really worth doing.

But what Dr. Luke found, countless others, including some readers of these lines, have also found: that even when we have to spend most of our time making a living, we can dedicate our "spare" time, under God, to making life.

### Doctor's Hobby

Lesson for March 30, 1952

DOCTOR Luke is a man to whom we are all indebted. Without him, not in the church would have lost some of our finest hymns, the "Magnificat" and the "Nunc Dimittis;" without him we might never have heard of the story of that first Christmas night when the shepherds watched and the angels sang. He was the only Gospel writer who remembered to tell us those matchless parables, the Lost Sheep and the Prodigal Son, and many another.

It is only from him that we know of Jesus' prayer at Calvary,—"Father, forgive them, they know not what they do." Furthermore, it is only Luke who conceived and wrote the book of Acts.

### Some Hobbies Are Famous

THE interesting thing is that Dr. Luke was not a professional writer. He was a professional physician. All the writing he did was what we today might even call a hobby; that is, he got no money for it so far as we know, he just wrote because he loved to write.

Very likely he was a good doctor; he is called the "beloved physician," and we hope that enough people who loved him also paid their bills promptly so that he could make his living. But it was not the doctoring that endeared him to the church of Christ.

It was what he did in his spare time, it was his missionary work and his writing, it is the Gospel of Luke and the book of Acts that are his main claim to fame.

Luke is not the first man nor the last to accomplish more by a "side-line" than by his main job. We remember David in the Old Testament, whose rise to power began not with his sheep-herding, which no doubt he did to perfection, but with his music, which his father may well have thought a waste of time. We remember Marcus Aurelius the emperor not for his military campaigns, which were masterly, but for the "meditations" he wrote in snatches of spare time on those campaigns. We remember the Apostle Paul not for the churches he founded (most of which folded) but for the dozen or so letters he managed to squeeze into his busy evenings.





The English harrier, halfway between the beagle and foxhound in size, was developed in England for pack hunting of hares. While some have found "their way to America they have never been very popular here.

Many hunters like fox or "coon hounds for running rabbits. These faster hounds are usually inefficient in hunting cottontails as these rabbits are likely to "hole up" before fast hounds. However, varying hares are much different quarry. These big "snowshoe" hares will run for hours ahead of the hounds and seldom hole. In the deep snow of the north woods many prefer a fast foxhound for this sport—the faster the better. Few hounds are fast enough to catch these speedsters but it can be done.

"Coon or tree hounds. Perhaps the aristocrat of hounds is the "straight cooner," by "straight" is meant a dog that will run nothing but raccoon. Such hounds usually do not reach perfection short of three or more years of age. Other "warmint" hounds run opossum and skunk.

### Who's Right?

Sensational catches of largemouth and Kentucky bass in the impounded TVA waters in the past two years are adding fuel to the argument by many anglers that bass do not actually hibernate during the winter.

At Kentucky Lake, Dale Hollow, Lake Herrington and other at newly-impounded Wolf Creek Reservoir (since officially named Lake Cumberland by the Kentucky Legislature) catches of bass during even the coldest weather have been amazing.

What does this prove? It proves, asserts the "bass-don't-hibernate" school that the scrappy species can be taken the year round, wherever water is open, and that the reason this knowledge hasn't been shared by all the angling fraternity is that too many of the members sit around a warm fire vegetating during the winter when they could be out catching bass, if they knew their business.

There is no gainsaying the fact that many and big bass are being taken in the winter in the big lakes, and we can add a personal note that it has been done in the streams, too. For instance, in Elkhorn Creek, near Frankfort, Ky., one plugcaster took five small-mouth in five casts on a cold, February day. The creek was clear, but about two feet high when he pulled the feat.

We'll grant that this is not a performance that can be duplicated day in and day out during the winter months, but we think any reasonable angler will have to re-examine his views on the matter of bass fishing being dead in the winter-time, if he is aware of what anglers have been doing in the lakes.

### Doctor's Hobby

Lesson for March 30, 1952

DOCTOR Luke is a man to whom we are all indebted. Without him, we in the church would have lost some of our finest hymns, the "Magnificat" and the "Nunc Dimittis;" without him we might never have heard of the story of that first Christmas night when the shepherds watched and the angels sang. He was the only Gospel writer who remembered to tell us those matchless parables, the Lost Sheep and the Prodigal Son, and many another.

It is only from him that we know of Jesus' prayer at Calvary.—"Father, forgive them, they know not what they do." Furthermore, it is only Luke who conceived and wrote the book of Acts.

### Some Hobbies Are Famous

THE interesting thing is that Dr. Luke was not a professional writer. He was a professional physician. All the writing he did was what we today might even call a hobby; that is, he got no money for it so far as we know, he just wrote because he loved to write.

Very likely he was a good doctor; he is called the "beloved physician," and we hope that enough people who loved him also paid their bills promptly so that he could make his living. But it was not the doctoring that endeared him to the church of Christ.

It was what he did in his spare time, it was his missionary work and his writing, it is the Gospel of Luke and the book of Acts that are his main claim to fame.

Luke is not the first man nor the last to accomplish more by a "side-line" than by his main job. We remember David in the Old Testament, whose rise to power began not with his sheep-herding, which no doubt he did to perfection, but with his music, which his father may well have thought a waste of time.

We remember Marcus Aurelius the emperor not for his military campaigns, which were masterly, but for the "meditations" he wrote in snatches of spare time on those campaigns. We remember the Apostle Paul not for the churches he founded (most of which folded) but for the dozen or so letters he managed to squeeze into his busy evenings.

### Other Doctors

LUKE was not the last Christian doctor who has found in what for some, might be a "side-line" his finest means of service and best source of happiness. Dr. Howard Kelly of Baltimore was a cancer specialist of no small fame; but he was even better known as a scientist who not only saw no conflict between science and religion, but who brought his skill and his science to the service of Christ.

There was another doctor, a surgeon in a midwestern city, not many years ago, who was ready to retire. He had enough to live on in comfort, and the life of a successful surgeon in a great city is a wearing one. But instead of retiring, he went out to China, and in a remote province he spent his "retiring" years at his own expense, hardly knowing a word of Chinese, but having the time of his life and rendering himself if possible more nearly indispensable out there than he had ever been back in the states.

Again there was the surgeon Alexis Carrel, who with another scientist first succeeded in keeping living tissue (a chicken's heart) alive for years beyond the time when it "should have" died,—a surgeon who also believed in the power of prayer and whose book "Man the Unknown" is valuable as combining the scientific and the Christian view of man.

Or there was Dr. I. J. Archer of Chicago and North Carolina, who operated two sanitariums more easily than some doctors can run one office, and yet who found his life's deepest satisfactions in the Sunday school class he taught for years.




